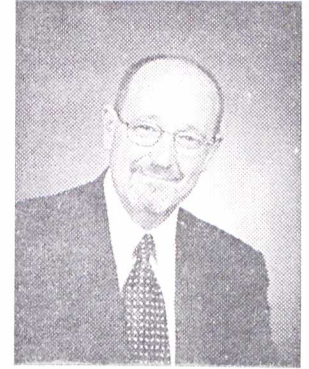

From The Editor

*"And she brought forth her firstborn
son,
and wrapped him in
swaddling clothes,
and laid him in a manger; because there
was
no room
for them in the inn."
Luke 2:7*



These are some of the most unpretentious words in all of the New Testament, yet hold the greatest promise ever given.

Not only are they the fulfilment of several very ancient prophecies, promises if you will, but they give the greatest hope to the largest group of people in the world. All the world to be exact!

We are touched yearly as we read this part of the Christmas story or stand and look at a manger scene somewhere. There is something about a babe in a manger. Especially one who was there because there was no room for him and his parents in the Inn where everyone else was staying. There were important things going on in Bethlehem in those days. Augustus Caesar had decreed that all would be taxed. Business was booming in Bethlehem and everywhere else touched by his decree as people traveled and ate and slept and spent their money and paid their taxes. Rooms were hard to come by, especially if you were poor traveling folk.

Zig Ziglar tells about his brother stopping at a hotel one evening and finding no room. The manager told him that they were full and not a single room was available. Ziglar's brother said, "Now be honest with me, if the President of the United States came here and requested a room, you would find one for him, wouldn't you." The manager replied, "Well if the president came we would find one for him!" Ziglar's brother said, "That's great, I know for a fact that he is not coming tonight so I will take his room!" If Joseph and Mary had looked more important that evening or a little more prosperous, there would probably have been a room for them in the inn. Little did the inn keeper know that the dusty, tired couple who stood before him looking for a room were the two most important people in the world that night!

Only hours latter, that forlorn looking couple would be the parents of the babe that came to save the world. All the while the people in the inn had not a clue as to what had happened in the alley behind them. Their conversation was all taxes and Roman oppression and business as usual. If you had asked them the following morning what happened the evening before, there would have been no comment about a baby being born, even if they had been aware of His birth. They didn't know or suspect that they were almost witness to the greatest event in the world in their day.

History would tell us that the world is shaped by the movers and shakers, the presidents and dictators and Caesars. I recently read an illustration that said that in 1809 the newspapers reported constantly of the move of Napoleon across Austria. It looked as if he was changing the course of history daily with his conquests. Little attention was paid to something

Angels From the Realms of Glory.....

When the Moravian Christians of Europe launched Protestant missions, they did it at a cost. Many of them had to leave their children behind in boarding schools across England and the Continent.

And so it was that the Montgomery family reluctantly placed six-year-old James in such an institution as they shipped off as foreign missionaries to the West Indies. When they later perished, James, left with nothing, spent his teenage years drifting from pillar to post, writing poetry and trying his hand at one thing then another.

In his early twenties, he began working for a British newspaper, the *Sheffield Iris*, and there he found his niche. When his editorials proved unpopular with the local officials, he was thrown into jail and fined twenty pounds. But he emerged from prison a celebrity, and he used his newly acquired fame to promote his favorite Issues.

Chief among them was the Gospel. Despite the loss of his parents and all his hardships, James Montgomery remained devoted to Christ and the Scriptures.

As the years passed, he became the most respected leader in Sheffield, and his writings were eagerly read by its citizens. Early on Christmas Eve, 1816, James, forty-five, opened his Bible, and was deeply impressed by Luke 2:13. Pondering the story of the heralding angels, he took his pen and started writing. By the end of the day his new Christmas poem was being delivered to England in the pages of his newspaper. It was later set to music and was first sung on Christmas Day, 1821, in a Moravian Church in England.

*Angels from the realms of glory,
Wing your flight o'er all the earth;
Ye who sang creation story,
Now proclaim Messiah's birth;
Come and worship,
Come and worship,
Worship Christ the new-born King.*

His parents would have been proud.

as lowly as the birth of a baby. Yet, that year, William Gladstone was born. He was to become the greatest statesman England has ever seen. Alfred Lord Tennyson was born and he would impact the literary world. Oliver Wendell Holmes was born in Cambridge, Massachusetts as well as Charles Darwin. A log cabin in Hardin, Kentucky saw a baby named Abraham Lincoln born. None of these births were marked as significant at the time, yet these men grew to impact their world. Their births changed the world more than Napoleon. The thing we remember most about him today is Waterloo, where he met defeat.

In 4AD August Caesar ruled the world and could command people to come and go and pay taxes. He transformed his world with armies and roads and cities. Yet, a babe born in his empire to humble folks who loved and listened to God changed the world more than an a multitude of Caesars or all the rulers of this world put together could ever dream of doing.

And He did it all for us. What greater reason to rejoice and celebrate at Christmas time!



WE NEED TO SHARE A BIG VISION!

It is always encouraging to read Nehemiah and see the way God used him to accomplish a great work. It all started with God giving Nehemiah a vision of what needed to be done in Jerusalem. Nehemiah then shared that vision with the people, and they were able to work together for its fulfillment. The vision we would like to share with you is not a vision that has been dreamed up by this Committee, or by the International Missions Department, or by the individual missionaries. It is a vision that has been given to the Church by God Himself. It is a vision of a lost and dying world and the plan that God has given to reach that world with the message of Christ. !Sometimes we are tempted to have the attitude that if it doesn't affect me or mine then it doesn't concern me. We need to remember that the Word of God tells us in 1 Corinthians 6: 19-20, that we don't belong to ourselves because we *"are bought with a price."* Therefore, anything that concerns God should concern us. In fulfilling the Great Commission, the Church needs both those who will go, and those who will send. God has placed us as His witnesses in Missouri, but He has also called us to help send those who will go. *"And how shall they preach, except they be sent?"* Romans 10: 15

Please share the vision and join the "Show Me Plan" team!

What is the Missouri Show-Me Mission Plan?

This is a plan to support our international missionaries from Missouri as a whole rather than individually. It is a plan through which Free Will Baptists in Missouri can cooperate toward a common goal and accomplish together what none could do alone. It is a plan that will get missionaries to the field more quickly, more economically, more refreshed

for the work than any method of support Free Will Baptists have ever used. It is a plan that will focus on missions more than individual missionaries, but at the same time will promote strong personal ties between our missionaries and the churches throughout our state.

Who Qualifies for Support Under the Missouri International Missions Plan?

The Plan is designed to support international missionaries who meet the following criteria:

1. Must be appointed by and in good standing with the International Missions Board of the National Association of Free Will Baptists
2. Must be approved by the Show-Me Committee.
3. Must have a history of strong residential ties to Missouri Free Will Baptists and presently hold membership in a Missouri Free Will Baptist church in good standing with the State Association.
4. Must be a full-time international missionary.
5. The candidate must, when home from the field, minister in the state of Missouri a reasonable amount of time.

Note: It is to be understood that the State Association will approve the recommendations for support on a yearly basis. It is also to be understood that should a missionary resign or be dismissed by the Foreign Missions Board, funding will be discontinued effective with the termination date of the missionary's employment.

How Can We Raise the Money to Support This Plan?

God's Word gives us the formula for success when it comes to supporting the work of the kingdom. We are reminded that all of the silver and gold belong to God and He owns the cattle on a thousand hills. There is no shortage when it comes to God's provision. There is often, however, a lack of stewardship among God's people. God puts within our grasp the ability to accomplish the work He has given us. He does not hold us accountable for what we cannot do, but He certainly does expect us to be faithful in what He has enabled us to do. Not all can give an equal amount, but all can be equally faithful.

The Share Concept: *We are suggesting a total of 3,000 shares. The cost for a share will be \$180 each or \$15 per month.*

Here are some Ideas that can be used by churches, individuals, and district associations to raise funds to support the Missouri International Missions Plan:

- * Include it in the church's budget.
- * Get individual in the church to pledge \$15 a month to under write a share each.
- * Have an offering one Sunday each month designated to the Missouri Foreign Missions Plan.
- * Have a district-wide "Walk-a-thon" or similar project to underwrite a or a large part of the district's goal of shares for the year.
- * Youth groups could adopt a number of shares, then have projects to raise the support.
- * Local and district chapters of WNAC could underwrite a number of shares through their special projects and offermgs.
- * A state-wide annual offering day for the Missouri Foreign Missions Plan could be adopted and promoted.
- * Use quarter folders to get kids and families involved. (36 quarter folders = 1 share)

The Disarmament did not begin 15 Oct as had been promised in many signed peace papers. Troubles continue to boil-some wish to return to actual war, while others pray for peace. It is an uncertain, unstable time still... Yet, a wonderful time to share the Prince of Peace ! With the one exception of the FWB Church at Bouakéé, All other FWB Pastors have remained with their Flocks...new ones are being added to God's Family and faith of other Believers strengthened..Praise God.

Third church celebrated its first Baptismal Service two weeks ago. Pastor Samuel constructed the baptistry from left over cement blocks. The results would be added up and announced with great rejoicing at the end of chapel. At first, only those who brought back money were treated to a steak supper. 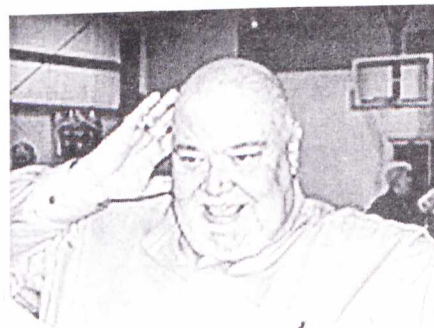
So, after his death in 1987, the Christmas campaign was named in his memory. This December, the college

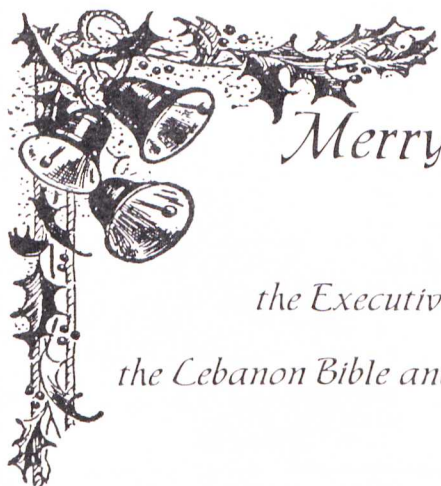
