
Another year of service, of witness for Thy love, Another year of training for holier work above. Another year is dawning, dear Father, let it be On earth, or else in Heaven, another year for Thee.

This hymn was a written by Francis Ridley Havergal in 1874 as a poem for the cover of her New Years card to be sent to all her friends. She was feeling optimistic over the coming year for her prospects were bright. An American publisher had contracted to represent her books and poems in America and she looked forward to a much needed income from their sale. Only days after writing these sentiments, she received word that the publisher had been ruined in the Stock Market crash of 1873. She said this poem was even more her thoughts and wishes after her disappointment. She said that her "victorious faith was brightening daily!" and that her disaster was met with a "song rather than a sigh!"

Havergals first stanza expresses a truth many of us have trouble with. "Father", she says, "let this new year be one with you whether it is in working or in waiting."

I do not wait well. Now I am sure that you do wait well, but I must confess to a certain impatience in daily living. I like microwaves, not crock pots! I will do with out rather than have to wait in line for what ever I want or need. More than two people ahead of me in the check out line is cause for despair. I know, patience is a virtue but I also know that to pray for patience is to invite tribulation!

I am quite sure that God is just as pleased with us when we wait patiently for His direction and commission to act as he is when we are busy working in His vineyard. I am afraid that many of us are too often drawn into the wrong action because we are un willing to wait on His direction. That old admonition




to "do something, even if it is wrong" is bad advice! There have been very few times that I have acted on my own that it turned out even remotely successful. By now I have learned that David's admonition in Psalm 46:10 to "Be still and know that I am God..." is advice I need often.

I think I will pray as did Havergal that whether I am working or waiting, I will do it as if the Lord were with me. I am sure that if I practiced his presence more faithfully it would produce calm in my "waitless" soul.

Her idea in the last stanza was that an other year is dawning and we don't have a clue what is ahead for us. But if we are with the Lord we really do not need to know what is ahead. He does. Isn't it great that all the things we worry about concerning the future are just so much insignificant detail to the Lord. The things that stress us because we don't know that is going to happen are so clear to Him. He has already put in place the thing we will need in the moment they do happen. That is why we are able to sing with Francis Havergal, "Another year is dawning, dear Father, let it be On earth, or else in Heaven, another year for Thee."

of Death

"Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil" (Psalm 23:4).

Many of us have memorized this beautiful psalm, but have you ever walked through the valley of the shadow of death? Have you ever stood before the gate of death? I want to share with you an experience I had just over two months ago.

My wife, Lorene, and I had spent the months of May, June, and July at the Christian Discipleship Center at Cortez, Colorado, working among Native Americans trying to overcome alcohol addiction. When the session ended, we began the 1500 mile trip home to Nashville. I did not feel normal but could hardly describe the strange feeling I was experiencing.

A week after we arrived in Nashville, I consulted our personal physician and again ten days later, but he was unable to make a diagnosis. Although physically I seemed normal, it was evident that mentally I was deteriorating rapidly. I could no longer balance a check book (even simple mathematical procedures were beyond me). I could not formulate words to converse on the telephone or work a crossword puzzle. I tried to teach a Sunday school class, but couldn't even quote Scriptures that I had memorized years ago. Eventually I had to give up driving; I couldn't remember how to get from our home to familiar places.

Finally an MRI was ordered for Saturday, September 4. Chronic bleeding around the brain was causing a massive subdural hematoma to push the brain to one side. A neurosurgeon was called in and

assembled a team to operate immediately. Acute bleeding apparently had begun the day before and he told my wife following surgery, "If we hadn't taken it out when we did, it would have killed him."

I was walking through the valley of the shadow of death but felt no fear. Hadn't Paul written: "For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain"? (Phil. 1:21). Those words were to be a real comfort to me in the days ahead. My only concern was leaving my beloved wife of 57 years. We had labored together as one all those years and the thought of leaving her behind brought sadness to my heart.

I remember being taken to the operating room, but I have basically a lapse of memory for the next week. The second day following surgery, Labor Day, a CT scan revealed that bleeding had resumed, so once again they had to open my skull to evacuate the blood and stop the bleeding.

It was during this time that I was for the most part in "another world." At one period, I saw before me a type of gate like nothing I had ever seen. The darkness surrounding it was foreboding, but I could make out a "gate" in the form of a wheel having spokes radiating from the hub. The hub was actually a passageway through which a bright light was shining. Although the light was brilliant, there was no way to reach it without passing through the gate, which did not open. It seems I stood before this gate for a long while. Was this the gate of death? I do not know. I see nothing in Scripture that is described in this manner.

My wife tells me that after the second surgical procedure, I apparently had something wonderful to tell her and was concerned that she knew about it. Even though I spoke slowly and deliberately, she could not understand a word. To her, it was a foreign language. Whether or not I was trying to tell her what I had seen, I do not know.

We who know the Lord believe that death is the doorway to heaven. Thank God that is true. We must pass through the experience of death to go to be with the Lord. But the Scripture says that death is our enemy: "The last enemy that shall be destroyed is death" (1 Cor. 15:26). If what I saw represented the gate of death, the only attractive thing about it was the light shining through from the other side – the Light of the World. Isaiah writes that the Lord "will swallow up death in victory" (Isa. 25:8). Paul quotes Isaiah and adds: "Thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Cor. 15:54,57).

Four days following the second surgery, I was moved to another facility for rehabilitation therapy. The next evening I was back in surgery for the third time. The CT scan showed more bleeding. The following Sunday, September 12, I remember waking up in ICU. It seemed surreal to be alive. My right arm was paralyzed, but I was alive! The arm soon began to regain its function and today is normal. I was moved to the floor the next day and then to rehab and one week later came home.

Today, two months following the last surgery, I feel that for the most part I am back to normal. I have no physical disability, my memory does not seem to be affected, I can quote those beloved Scriptures that I memorized years ago, I can solve mathematical problems, and I can speak and be understood—to God be the glory!

The question still remains: Why did God see fit to spare me and bring me back from death's gate? I'm sure that the fervent prayers of hundreds of God's people, my brothers and sisters in Christ, played a vital part in bringing about this miracle. I shall ever be grateful to those who prayed. Surely God saw fit to lengthen my time on earth in order to bring glory and praise to Him. I remember that when Hezekiah was at the point of death, God gave him an additional 15 years (2 Kings 20:6). Hezekiah disappointed God and acted foolishly. Above all, I do not want that to happen to me. Now that God has given me an extended time on earth, I do want to accomplish His will, whatever it may be. "He that doeth the will of God abideth forever" (1 John 2:17b).

"Now unto him that is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us, Unto him be glory in the church by Christ Jesus throughout all ages, world without end. Amen" (Eph. 3:20, 21).

In mid-September, we were thrilled to be able to return to Japan for one week to attend the



Caroline will be having eye surgery at Vanderbilt Children's hospital on Nov. 18 to correct a problem with alignment.

These first months of stateside assignment have been challenging, to say the least. We would appreciate your prayers that we will somehow be able to find time for refreshment and restoration during the remaining months in the U.S. Ministry opportunities and exciting possibilities await us in the very needy country of Japan. Pray that the Lord will fill us and equip us to resume our ministry there next summer.

Dear Friends,

Greetingsfrom Spain! We give thanks to God for His faithfulness. He has been faithful to supply all our needs during 23 years of service in the country of Spain. We give Him thanks for YOU who have been used of Him to make this possible. Many of you have stood with us since we left the USA in 1981. We are also thankful for the people God has given us here. He is forming His church, and it is a blessing to be a part of it.

Susan and I have asked Spain's Field Council permission to begin a transition in our ministry focus toward National Leadership Development: -For several years our Field Council Strategy has called for someone to develop this ministry. We believe the Lord is leading us in this direction. However, we will continue to work with the Villalba Church through the remainder of this term of service, and upon our return from Stateside Ministry (2006) we will begin to transition toward this ministry focus. Our plans are to help develop and promote training for all believers of all levels in our existing churches, as

well as for existing spiritual leaders. We pray that these efforts will help to stimulate the spiritual growth of believers in our churches, and therefore increase the pool of possible spiritual leaders. Along with afocus on National Leadership Development, we will team together with Sam and June McVay to focus more intensely on the development of our field's vision project of a National Ministry Center. Our prayer is that this center become FWB headquarters for the work in Spain, housing a retreat/camp center, headquarters for the National Association of FWBs in Spain, for the FWB mission in Spain, for the National Leadership Training Center, for future work with the NGO in Spain, as well as a place to receive and house visiting groups from the USA.

The Lord is working in Spain. There are three new church planting efforts under way.

1. Jose Manuel, the former pastor of the first FWB church in Alcalci de Henares, resigned that church and has begun a second church plant in the same city of 150,000 people. At this time a group of around 30

people are meeting in a storefront building loaned to them by the local chapter of Gideons International. Jose Manuel was elected President or Moderator of the International Fellowship of Free Will Baptists at the recent meeting in Panama. The next international convention is scheduled to take place in Europe, as a joint-effort between Free Will Baptists in Spain and France.

2. Juan Carlos, a graduate of the FWB Seminary in Cuba and former pastor there, has begun a second church plant in thecity of Colmenar Viejo, a city in the Madrid Province of around 40,000 people. Along with his wife, daughter and in-laws, they are now holding weekly meetings in a rented storefront building. This past Sunday, Jhon Fredy, a young

> believer in training as a pastor in the Villalba Church preached there. One young lady has made a profession of faith in the eight weeks of its existence.

3. For some time the Sierra Church Planting Team has been working to make contacts for a third church plant in Alpedrete, a town of 10,000 people, close to Villalba. Anthony and Lea Edgmon and Tim and Kristi Johnson are spearheading this effort. These two couples are doing a great job of becoming a part of the community, making contacts and plans to plant a church in this town that has never had an Evangelical church in its history.

Please pray that the Lord will give them much fruit for their labor. Thank you for your prayers for these new churchplanting efforts, as well as for the three existing FWB churches in Spain: Alcala de Henares, Villalba, and Santurce.

Eight people recently followed the Lord in Christian baptism. All of them were young, but five of them are part of the youth group that Susan teaches and directs in the Villalba Church. Please pray for these new believers -that God will protect their hearts and enable them to continue to grow in their faith.

The architect for the building of the Villalba Church called me this week to say that the plans are ready. I am anticipating a call to go and sign them, so that we can submit them to the proper authorities and

Rev. John Williams Honored for 25 Years in the Ministry

On October 10, 2004; the children of Brother John Williams surprised him with a 25 year Anniversary Service at Wolf Creek Freewill Baptist Church.

The Service began with congregational singing. Special music was offered by Brother John's children, Susan Keith, and the Rankin family. Brother John's eldest daughter, Shawn Felker, conducted the service which included a slide presentation, the reading of a brief history, testimonials from his children and fellow pastors, and the presentation of a commemorative plaque. A beautiful bouquet of flowers was presented to Sister Bernetta for her faithfulness to his ministry. In conclusion, Brother John's son-.in-law, Brother Ron Felker, gave a moving testimonial along with scripture and the dismissal prayer.

Brother and Sister Williams expressed their gratitude to God, who made these 25 years possible, to their children for being such an important asset to the ministry, to their parents and to all who had made it such a special day. It was a very heart warming and emotional service. All of Brother and Sister Williams' children and grandchildren were in attendance as well as their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Williams and Mrs. Maydell Dake along with many other relatives and friends. A reception followed in the church basement.

Following is a brief history of Brother John's ministry which was read that day.

On March 16, 1957, a son, John Barry Williams was born to Edward C. Williams and Joan (LaFrances) Williams. The event took place at the Samaritan Hospital in Troy N.Y. The fact that his name was John and he was

born on the 3rd month and the 16th day, thus John 3:16, held little significance at the time, but would later become his trademark. John lived with his family in Averill Park, N.Y. until the fall of 1973 when they moved to Norwood, MO. The first family to welcome them was the Dakes, whose daughter, Bernetta, became John's wife on March 15, 1975

In September of 1976, one of John's dreams

became a reality when he was able to purchase a dairy farm in Hartville.

By then he had been blessed with a daughter, Shawn Marie, and soon to follow was Michelland then Aimee Johnette.

John knew what the

In July of 1979, while milking his cows, a neighbor pulled in and broke the bad news that his beloved dog, Heidi, had been in the road and was hit and killed. This was a wake up call for John along with the persistence of neighbors that week stopping by to invite him to a revival going on down the road at the New Hope Baptist Church. John carried the dog to the barn, tears running down his cheeks. As he walked into the barn, he noticed a Bible that his dad had given him a few months earlier. When he picked it up his eyes fell

upon 2 Samuel 15: 15 which read, "And the king's servants said unto the king, behold, thy servants are ready to do whatsoever my lord the king shall appoint." John knew what the Lord wanted him to do. He knelt down right there in the pit of the milk barn and answered the call to preach. That same week, he announced his calling during the revival at New Hope, and three nights later preached his first

sermon there. He was later licenced and ordained into the Freewill Baptist Association.

In his early ministry he was blessed to have good preacher role models. Brother RE. Helsley was truly a blessing to him as he shared his wisdom and gave much needed encouragement.

Soon after his calling he was asked to pastor

the Peace Valley Community Church at Norwood, where he and his family had attended since his move from N.Y. state. As the building was a community building, the church as not able to organize. Therefore, land was purchased just up the road and the Victory Hill Freewill Baptist Church was founded. Many memorable thing happened while at Victory Hill. One was the birth of their fourth daughter, Kati Sue, and he also baptized three sets of brothers at the same time,

Rick and Greg Dugger, Junior and Joe Johnstone and Denver and Danny Cottengim.

In December of 1981, the pastor of the Oak Grove General Baptist Church in Wasola, was killed in a farming accident. John was asked to fill the remainder of his term and was there until September of 1982.

He then felt the calling to pastor the Union Grove (Caudle) Freewill Baptist Church, Norwood MO. He started his work there in September of 1982, which was also the month his first son, John Barry Williams Jr. was born. It wasn't long until the church was overflowing and the new church was built. John and Bernetta's second son Jordon was born there in February of 1987 and in May of the same year John ended his pastorate there.

John went into full time evangelistic work for a time, but it wasn't long until the Lord called him to pastor again. This time it would be the Oak Grove Freewill Baptist Church in Norwood. The church had just built a new auditorium and was ready to grow. Everyone was eager and many great things happened there, including the birth of Joseph Boone in 1990. His ministry there spanned from August 1988 through March 1991. From there he filled in for a time at Victory Hill and also did evangelistic work.

In 1990 John was blessed to have the opportunity to preach at the State Association of Freewill Baptists. No one could have imagined at that time where that experience and others would lead him. Shortly thereafter John found himself in full time evangelistic work. In one year during this period he preached more than 30 revivals. If you don't think that is a lot, just ask his wife and kids. In 1995, John Jr. was 13 years old and John was busier than ever, and don't think Bernetta didn't have a full plate herself, trying to tend to seven kids, and run a farm while John was going "from revival to revival. It became very evident to the whole family

that something needed to change, but what they were not sure of.

Brother James Cameron accompanied John to almost every revival he held. He was a deacon at the Lead Hill Freewill Baptist Church in Mansfield. His heart was burdened for his little church, as they had no pastor and the attendance was down to six. The Lord began dealing with John about making some changes in his

ministry and he knew after much prayer and soul searching what he had to do. It was a very hard decision. He knew it would be better for his children to have a home church, and to have him home more, but there were no young people at Lead Hill and he worried the kids would have a hard time adjusting. When they went there, each family member had to take on a job, including teaching, singing and piano playing. But God was faithful

and a year later Lead Hill Freewill Baptist Church won a plaque at the State Meeting for 262% increase in attendance on Roll Call Sunday. A new sanctuary was built and Lead Hill soon became home to all of them. While therebetween October 1995 and January 2001 the five older children were married. His son-in-law, Ron Felker also accepted the call to preach during his time there, and was truly a blessing as he worked side-by-side with John as the Associate Pastor. (Ron is now pastoring the Oak Grove General Baptist Church at Wasola.) John ended his pastorate at Lead Hill in 2002 and at that time had been blessed with 12 grandchildren.

At the present John is the pastor of the Wolf Creek Freewill Baptist Church. There is no doubt this is where God intended for him to be. All one has to do is take a quick review of the past year and it is very clear that God's hand was in it. Good things are happening at Wolf Creek. Land has been purchased on Hwy 5 for a new building. Four more grandchildren have been added to the family and one is on the way.

The past 25 years have gone by quickly and God has truly blessed. John has held numerous revivals here in Missouri as well as the states of Oklahoma, Arkansas, Ohio, West Virginia and New York. He has also preached at youth camps and conducted many weddings and funerals. John has said many times that one of the things he is most thankful for is that all his children have been saved and baptized and are all active in church. We want to thank God and give him the glory for every soul that has been saved and every accomplishment that has been made.



Farmington First Celebrates Fifty Years!

This last December 29, 2004 the Farmington Church celebrated fifty years of service to it's members and the Free Will Baptist Denomination. Throughout this year the Church has been pleased to have all the living pastors who have served over the years for a year-long celebration of its fifty years.

The Farmington church was started as a mission church in the home of Raymond Grindstaff in the city of Farmington. The pastor of the mission was Rev. Charles Moyer. Rev. Dean Burpo later became pastor of the mission and served until Nov 21, 1954. A tent revival was held in Farmington that started on Sep 11 and ran 12 days until Sep24, 1954 The evangelist was Rev.Daymon Dodd of Nashville TN.

At the close of the revival the church was in a partial state of organization because there were no deacons or trustees. On December 5, 1954 Rev. James Barker was elected pastor. On December 18, 1954 Bro. Clyde Gross was elected deacon and Bro. George Heart trustee and the church was in full organization. There were 29 charter members at that time. A committee was appointed to negotiated the purchase of the church property at 305 W. Columbia from the Farmington Methodist Church. The church voted to purchase the building for \$25,000. They moved into the new building and held their first service on Wednesday evening December 29, 1954. Rev. James Barker served the church until June 30, 1963.

Rev. Everett Hellard was elected pastor and served until August 1965. The Mackie property was

purchased in April of 1964 and was used as Sunday school and Junior Church facility. On September 12, 1965 Rev. Bob King was elected pastor and served until July 1969. Rev. Bill Evens was elected pastor in July 1969 and served until 1974. During that time the Gideon property was purchased, it was first rented and then used for classrooms and eventually torn down and used for new parking area. The Cole property was purchased and used as a parsonage for the Bigaloes. The Pinkertons, missionaries to the Ivory Coast lived there while on furlough in 1975-76. The building was removed and the property used as parking in 1979.

Rev. James McAllister was elected pastor on April 3, 1974 and served until June 4, 1986. In January of 1975 construction of the three story educational building was started. In August of 1977 the Farmington Christian Academy opened with 65 students. The school was kindergarten through ninth grade. Gene Wilfong served as principal, in 1978 the new activities building was started. The school was expanded to the 12th grade. The church had grown to an enrolment of 1522 at this time.

Rev. Tim Eaton was elected pastor in June 1986 and served until Aug. 1989.

Rev. Roger Hogan is the current pastor and was elected on Aug. 23, 1989. The church to this day has served the Farmington community and continues to grow. The church has purchased 13 acres just out side the city limits and is looking forward to building a new facility to better serve the members and the community. The church continues to be a great supporter of missions and many men have been and continue to be called into the ministry. Continue to pray for the Farmington Free Will Baptist Church.
