


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

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From the Editor


State Meeting 2005 has come and gone. What a great meeting we had. From the opening services of the MOWAC to the last amen on Wednesday evening, it was a great place to be and a great bunch of people to be with! We not only had great services, but the business sessions were smooth and harmonious as well.

Our people made some momentous decisions at the meeting. A study committee was established to look at our Missions program. Our desire is to raise as much money for the furtherance of the Kingdom of God as possible. While our Show-Me Plan is working well, we are looking toward the future. We have been asked many times if we could expand our Show-Me Plan to include home missions. This and other concerns about the future of missions giving in Missouri has prompted the body to take this action. Please pray for those who will be serving on this committee. We are seeking God's leadership.

The body also commissioned a committee to explore the purchase of Stonecroft Conference Center in Branson. Our people are very familiar with this facility. We use it several weeks a year for our Ministers Retreat, MOWAC Retreat and Senior Adult Retreat. We learned at the Ministers Retreat this year that the property was for sale. After discussion at the State Meeting, we decided to explore making a bid for the property. There are several other groups interested and we are seeking God's will about this decision as well. Please pray as our committee examines the financial picture at Stonecroft to see if it is feasible for us to proceed.

We listened in our sessions as all our boards and committees gave glowing reports of their work in 2004.

- The Bookstore reported an increase in sales of over \$37,000.00 over last year.
- The Home Missions Board reported plans for a new work in Troy, Mo.
- Camp Niangua reported 1,266 enrolled in our 2004 camping sessions with 63 conversions, 71rededications and 7 special callings. They reported the purchase of an adjoining 22.5 acres of land and honored Bro Ken and Sister Judy Goff for their years of faithful service to the camp.



- The Christian Education Board reported activity in nine different areas, the newest being the Palmer Leadership Institute and Team Church with Dr. Alton Loveless.
- The Senior Adult Board reported an attendance of 270 for their two sessions of the Senior Adult Retreat.
- The Youth Ministries Board told of 172 entries in our 2004 State CTS Competition and a great State Youth Retreat at Windemere with Curt Gwartney.
- The Show Committee reported a new proposed budget for our Show-Me Missionaries of \$465,157.15. Carlisle Hanna was added back to the roster of Show-Me Missionaries this year.

The only resolution this year was one of thanks for Pastor Glenn Murray and his staff and folks at United Free Will Baptist Church for hosting the meeting. Our thanks go to the pastors and congregations of the First Free Will Baptist Church of West Plains and the First Free Will Baptist Church of Thayer for helping with the music.

Our meeting next year will be at the Clarion Hotel in Springfield on June 5-7. Please make your plans to attend. And by all means pray for the work of the Missouri State Associations and all our member churches. God is blessing the State Association but it is because He has first blessed our individual churches!

Now unto him that is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us, Unto him be glory in the church by Christ Jesus throughout all ages, world without end. Amen.



Missions News

The Turnboughs in Spain

Dear Friends,

With 38 days to go in this term of service in Spain, yesterday Susan and I began team-teaching an intensive leadership training module with our three main leaders. They are in the process of taking over

leadership responsibilities in the local church here in Villalba. Well, they soaked it in like a parched pavement on a hot summer's day. Even one of them that tends to be more skeptical and critical was very complimentary, saying things like, "Wow! This is good stuff. We can really use this here!" I said, "I know! I know! Isn't it great?!" When you are in the heat of the battle with what seems like a lack of vital supplies, and someone arrives with

"just what you needed," you appreciate it. People "in the trenches" of real, live ministry recognize and open their eyes, ears, and hearts when they hear something they know will be valuable for what they are doing.

Now all THAT was a wonderful feeling and sense of affirmation for us, because of recent decisions in our lives. As you probably already know, along with teammates Sam and June McVay, last year Susan and

I sensed the Lord was moving our ministry focus into the area of national leadership development. We have been, and still are church planters. However, one of the greatest needs we have experienced in church planting in Spain are strong and effective spiritual leaders to take over our works. We have done the best we can to train our own with what materials and time we have, but it has been a challenge and a struggle. Just like the Old Testament verse that states "without a vision the people perish", without effective leaders a local work flops. In our experience, effective leaders don't happen by accident, they need specific training.

As God just about always tends to do, when we stepped out on faith concerning this change in ministry focus, He opened the door for us to attend a fresh, exciting, and very intensive leadership course. Developed by missionaries for missionaries, it specifically focuses on the areas where I always believed our training was weak, NOT Biblical/Theological training, but rather very practical leadership skills. It was exciting, and we believe, a real God-send. It packages into one concentrated course the major elements and

practical skills that any and all leaders need to perfect.

Since it was in English, I took on the monumental task of translating everything into Spanish (in two weeks!). Hey, I am "out here in the trenches with these people" and I feel their pain. When God gave us these materials, I was ready to do whatever it took to get them into their hands, even if it meant a few weeks of 5-6 hours of sleep a night! I couldn't wait to share some of the concepts with

our leaders. As I talked with them about the materials, they told me that they couldn't wait either. That's a great combination.

To use an expression I have heard in the past (but seldom use), when it came time to start yesterday, my adrenaline was racing and we were all "pumped." They were sitting in their seats ON TIME, ready to learn! I think it is safe to say that when we left that



place FOUR HOURS later, none of us were disappointed and all of us were blessed. (In case they don't show up on the pages of your email, there are tears rolling down my cheeks as I write these lines.) Praise God from whom all blessings flow.

Please continue to pray for the leaders in the Villalba Church, as well as in Spain in general. Our hope and prayer is to be used of God to equip them to be strong and effective leaders, and for them to be used of God to move His Kingdom work forward in this part of His harvest-field.



consider it a great honor to be in that lineage of pastors in Farmington and always look forward to their wise counsel when I visit them.



"The Youth Look"

Nineteen years ago, I began writing a column for the GEM "The Youth Look." Recently someone asked me why I hadn't written anything in a while and I teased that my youth look had become something of a "middle aged

squint." In actuality, things had become a little crazy around here. As a result, I want to take a look at a very special youth.

My 12-year-old, Katie Poletti, was family dubbed "the healthiest child we knew." Things were pretty typical for a child her age — She was an all-A student in her first year of junior high, playing clarinet in the school band, loving the Lord and her church group of friends, enjoying basketball and soccer, and exhibiting the driest sense of humor I had ever seen in anyone her age. Unfortunately, things would soon change — and we had no idea how quickly.

I certainly battle my own set of health issues but Katie's caught me as off-guard as if I knew nothing about illness. In October 2004, she innocently turned her ankle. Two days later, she

was getting sick. It began with a low-grade fever, headache, and fatigue but, by the next day, was developing into something larger. The hospital saw nothing on the X-rays and thought she might have the flu which was complicating the painful recovery from such a "bad sprain." After a weekend of watching her become worse and my husband and I wearing out the numbers to two different

hospitals' helplines, we went in to wake her up on Monday morning. She had quit eating on Friday and just wanted to sleep. Katie was extremely irritable yet had no recollection of being grumpy. By Sunday night, she had begun crawling if she needed something, saying her leg "wouldn't do what her brain told it to." I guess Marty and I prayed that she would feel good as new as Monday dawned. Just the opposite....

As we approached her, the body heat reached us beforewe got to her bed. Her temperature was 106 degrees and we had a hard time getting her to respond. Her right leg was swollen to the point of looking unreal and there were deep red streaks reaching her knee from her ankle.

When we got her to the local ER, she was admitted to the Intensive Care Unit for aggressive treatment. Forty-eight hours later, there were more questions than answers so our wonderful team of Christian doctors decided to be honest with us and tell us that they really saw only one medical hope for her — to move her to Children's Hospital in Columbia and see if anything could be done for her there. With a prayer from our doctors, Katie was loaded into an ambulance and rushed to Columbia where she would face her first surgery of about ten shortly after we were unloaded.

Marty and I packed for a few days not knowing our stay would be over six weeks. When the first surgery took much longer than anticipated and the results weren't "what was expected" we should have been prepared for what was ahead... naively, we weren't at all. Katie spent most of the next six weeks in ICU. The right leg had developed osteomyelitis, a severe bone infection which had gone into the marrow, in turn spreading into the bloodstream and her body was poisoned. Every day was a stream of bad news as her organs quit functioning normally. Her lungs were infected with pneumonia from top to bottom, one of them with blood clots and the other collapsing. The breathing apparatuses to assist her were so invasive that she was kept in "a state" to be able to bear them. Her pancreas, liver, gallbladder, and GI tract malfunctioned. She was given 14 units of blood during her stay.

She had three different lines put into her body to feed her and help her with all the medications required to keep her alive. Her heart developed problems and the first surgery did not do what we were hoping it would; thus, the second surgery was required and found a mass of clots causing her heart to adhere to the wall. Drastic measures had to be taken to repair this. She had four surgeries on her leg and ankle with no promise we were getting anywhere.

When October turned to November and November turned to December, I decided it was time to come home. I honestly didn't know but what I was bringing her home to die but Marty and I made the choice to take on her full-time care at home with the assistance of a home-health team and frequent visits to our local team of doctors as well as the Columbia staff. We didn't know exactly what all that care entailed. While we had been extremely active in her care during the hospitalization, we brought home a critically ill child with tubes and needles and medicines that required an hourly list be kept so we did everything we were supposed to do on time.

Br. Maness was ordained in Salem, Missouri September 5, 1964. His preaching ministry began November 20,1962 preaching in many Nursing Homes and filling pulpits in the St.Louis, Missouri area. He pastored Salem FWB, Faith FWB in Lemay, Mo., First FWB Waynesville, Mo., Bloss Memorial, Arlington, Va., became a National Home Missionary in 1975, began and established the New Castle, Delaware FWB, Thompson Memorial FWB in Vineland, New Jersey, and served in Philadelphia, Pa. two years before becoming the pastor of Glen Allen FWB in 1999. He has a good reputation as a soul winner. Br. Maness began doing ventriloquism in 1972 and has presented his muppets to a multitude of individuals in Youth Camps,



Vacation Bible Schools, Revivals, Special Services and in his own pastorates. He has been ask by hospital staff to perform in hospitals to cheer those with special needs.

In revivals and special services this year, Br. Maness has been received well. Many responded to the altar during these services. He has some scheduled meetings already but would like to expand his ministry to at least two or three Revivals a month. Br. I may have overwhelmed you with details yet I ask you to understand that this is only a sketch of what occurred. And with all stories shared by Christians, I tell it to get to the "good stuff." Do we have the same child we had in October? No, not really. Our days still involve a lot of medications, doctor's visits, lab tests, and painful physical therapy sessions. She's never been able to return to school which means that I have not been able to either. She is on a walker and does not have movement in her right ankle but her last x-rays showed a miraculous growth of bone in two holes in her shinbone — very minute and fragmented but present nonetheless. She tested positive for homozygous Factor V Leiden, a rare form of a genetic blood clotting disease and will be on lifelong treatments for such. There are other complications and limitations but WE HAVE HER!!!!!

I can't say Katie doesn't have her days when she's a bit teary about never being able to compete in basketball and soccer again or to march with her school band or to "just feel normal" but I can say that she makes us proud the way she handles her new abilities and disabilities. She strongly believes what we all believe: God had a plan for her and that plan has not been fully carried out yet. My family has grown a lot through all this. The physical, emotional, and financial burdens this has placed on us have taught us more spiritual reliability. Our church family came through in overwhelming ways. Our friends

and family went out of their ways as well to be there. Sister churches across the state, into other states, and even worldwide (Derbys, Cousineaus, and Pinkertons) joined the Katie support team through prayer and encouragement. Rejoice Church in Columbia supported us as if we were members of their own congregation. The list goes on and on. . . Unsaved people at the hospital began to take notice of the support and had a hard time drawing the lines between our biological family and our Christian family. (Isn't that the way it should be?)

So what do the years have in store for us? Ah, wouldn't we all like to know that. . . Every day is different in our household — some days good, some days bad. Prayer has become more than a means of communication and worship and has become an absolute lifeline on some days. We look into the blue eyes of a miracle every day. We catch ourselves gazing longer at the simple smiles that cross her face. And we vow that, even if God chooses to take her now, we have nothing for which to be bitter; He gave us more than was promised by the doctors a few months ago. Am I surprised? No, that's the very nature of God — to give us more than we ever hoped, dreamed, or predicted.

That makes me excited to get up in the morning and see what He has in store for the day!!!



The hill-country farm where I grew up had an abundance of rocks. Going barefoot in the summer was fun but I frequently stubbed a toe – bleeding and painful. Sometimes I stubbed my big toe, sometimes my little toe or one of my middle toes. Mother could fix them all. She tore a strip of cloth from which she fashioned a bandage. Before wrapping my "stubbed toe" she would pack the bleeding toe in sugar, then anchor the bandage with strips of cloth tied around my ankle.

Before I again exposed my calloused, bare feet to the rocky soil, Mother would soak my bandaged "stubbed toe" in turpentine. The sting was worse than the pain of stubbing my toe! In due time the toe always healed. (When turpentine was unavailable, kerosene seemed to work just as well.)

Jesus told the story of the Good Samaritan who treated a wounded man (Luke 10:30-37). Mountain bandits had robbed and beaten this man, leaving him to die beside the trail. Two religious leaders passed by. Perhaps their "appointments" were pressing. Or they may have been afraid to get involved.

The Samaritan man had been born into a "racial group" that was hatefully despised by the "main stream" culture (John 4:9). In spite of this, he stopped and dressed the man's wounds. After loading him onto his donkey, he

took him to the nearest inn. Before going on his way the Samaritan left sufficient money for the wounded man's care.

My mother must have been a "good Samaritan". With a compassionate heart she ministered to "broken hearts" and dressed wounds far more severe than my "stubbed toe".

About 700 years before Jesus was born, the prophet Isaiah prophesied that Jesus would model a ministry of salvation, healing, and compassion.

The Bible describes an event that occurred early in Jesus' ministry. "So He came to Nazareth, where He had been brought up. And as His custom was, He went into the synagogue on the Sabbath day, and stood up to read. And He was handed the book of the prophet Isaiah. And when he had opened the book, He found the place where it was written:


"The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me. Because he has anointed Me to preach the gospel to the poor; He has sent Me to heal the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed; to proclaim the acceptable year of the LORD."


