

Grand Slam in Louisville!

National Convention Report

Delegates to the 69th annual Free Will Baptist National Convention who met in Louisville, Kentucky, July 17-20, 2005, left town knowing they went two-for-two in the denomination's most important at-bat since 1935. Two precedent-setting

decisions made during the 2004 convention in Kansas City finally cleared the fence a year later in the Kentucky International Convention Center.

The first decision shortened the convention by one day in order to encourage greater participation in the business sessions by delegates. The new format left officials noticeably uneasy as the Louisville meeting got underway. They

should not have been concerned, because delegates enjoyed the shorter format and adjusted easily to completing business on Tuesday and Wednesday.

With the business complete, ending the national convention with the annual Wednesday night missions service – with a huge offering, an exuberant overflow crowd, and a rousing, Great Commission sermon – left delegates wondering, "Why didn't we do this sooner?"


A second precedent-setting decision has the evangelical publication world watching the way Free Will Baptists do business. In 2004, the convention voted to merge six national publications into a single magazine. Denominational directors and editors faced the challenge of doing what had never been done – and what many feared could not be done - blend six messages, six visions, six mailing lists, six budgets, and six editorial styles into one publication.

While the task was definitely not for the faint of heart, through the leadership of Executive Secretary Keith Burden, the hard work of editor Eric Thompson and cooperation of six national agencies, Free Will Baptists now have a unique platform in the Christian publishing world—it's called ONE Magazine.

The 48-page, bimonthly, four-color magazine launched with the April-May 2005 issue. Two key elements make ONE Magazine a home run. The publication is mailed free to every Free Will Baptist

who wants to receive it, and it now reaches 60,000 publications -Department), the Newsletter, Heartbeat House Publications), (Executive Office).



Four years ago, we began a Bible study in the home of the Nomura family, with the vision of someday beginning a church plant in their area. Mr. Nomura's job had led them to live in the Shiki area, another suburb of Tokyo. Since that time, with the help of Iriso Church Pastor Kojima, we have continued to have weekly Bible studies, along with

beginning two children's English classes. We had also began a church plant at that same time in the Sayamagaoka area, The Good News Chapel, along with members of the Tokyo Team.

This past year, we have worked to strengthen the ministries in the Good News church: prayer meetings, Sunday School classes, Nursing Home

services, and several home Bible studies and marriage counseling sessions with young couples.

Over the last several months, the church has gradually grown in attendance, and we have been privileged to work with fellow missionary Mirial Gainer, and a Japanese Christian, Miss Estuko Asahi, a graduate of Columbia International School of Missions. New people have been attending each

from their stateside assignment, we will be able to move into the Shiki area, and begin to work with the parents of the young students we are teaching. This involves fifteen families, none of whom know the Lord, so please pray for this new effort. We are excited to see what God will be doing as we step out in faith.

Pictured are two of the children's English classes we are teaching in the Shiki area. Ken and I will be moving into this area in the next few weeks to begin working more closely with these unsaved families. We have been holding a Bible study in the area for the past three years, and hope to get these

families involved with this.

Pray for the salvation of Mr. and Mrs. Kojima, their three children, and the other non-believers with whom we have contact.

Pray that we will be able to find affordable housing in the Shiki area, adequate for the initial stages of beginning a church plant.

Thank you for your support of our Missouri Home Missionaries. We are thankful for each one of you. Every dollar counts toward winning souls in our own back yards.



That's the conversation Mark Braisher recently had with one of the new families at the National Home Missions work in Overland Park, Kansas.




Mountain Grove Mexico Mission





Farmington Honors Veterans

The First Free Will Baptist Church of Farmington commemorated more than 46 veterans, who are members of the church, on Sunday, May 22, as 30 veterans paraded down two aisles to the stage, each with a 3x5 American flag. A number of the church vets could not be present as they are serving in Iraq, Kuwait, Germany, stateside posts or due to illness. Additional family members carried military flags in memory of deceased veterans and another in honor of a brother serving in Germany. Likewise, a tribute was given to Reginald Cleve, who has been missing in action since March 22, 1971.

A permanent display with pictures of its veterans has been arranged under a large American flag as a wall of honor in the south foyer of the church to recognize those who served in our countries armed forces.

Of the church veterans, 21 served in battle and received a total of 11 bronze stars. In addition, three received Purple Hearts for being wounded.

Two of the men served in Intelligence, another served at the pentagon and in National Security. Many served in more that one branch of the armed services during his tenure in the military. While the men outnumbered those marching in the celebration, there was also one lady, Joyce McClintock, who served in the Air Force.

All of the veterans were commended and honored for their various roles in the military during the special church service. A special mentioning is given to the following that saw extra action. Everett Huff was in eight major battles and was awarded two bronze stars for his service in WWII. Roy Clark received two bronze stars, a Purple Heart, and was a Prisoner of War on two different occasions during WWII. Bill Hughes received a bronze star and a Purple Heart in the Korean Conflict. Bill Gonz received a Purple Heart and a bronze star while fighting in two main battles in Korea and on one occasion was left for dead. Otis Brooks was awarded

four bronze stars in the Korean War, and Tom Barron received a bronze star for his role in the Vietnam War. Two of our veterans have just returned from Iraq.

The veterans represented all major wars and conflicts since WWII to the present time. Namely; WWII, Korean, Vietnam, Kuwait, Iraq, Somalia, Afghanistan, Desert Storm, and Haiti.

Rev. Roger Hogan, who served during the Vietnam era himself, addressed the congregation of more than 400 people on, "Five qualifications of a good Soldier"

A large table of memorabilia with special medals, pictures, a uniform, a rifle, Purple Hearts, Bronze stars, and many other items was on display in the churches cafeteria where the church had a dinner in their honor. A Power Point slide presentation with the photos and tour of duty of each person was shown during this time to honor each veteran.

The budget includes International Missions (\$7.1 million), Free Will Baptist Bible College (\$5.9 million), Home Missions (\$4.5 million), Randall House (\$4.1 million), Executive Office (\$705,000), Board of Retirement and Insurance (\$499,000), Free Will Baptist Foundation (\$456,000), Master's Men (\$139,000), Commission for Theological Integrity (\$4,325), Media Commission (\$4,000), Music Commission (\$3,800), and Historical Commission (\$3,150).

Elected 43 members to boards and commissions. FWB Foundation Board (9), General Board (10), Master's Men Board (4), General Officers (10), Board of Retirement (3), Home Missions Board (3), Executive Committee (3), Music Commission (2), International Missions Board (1), Commission for Theological

Changed the By-Laws, Section 4, to require payment of the annual representation fee (now \$100 per church) to be listed in the *Free Will Baptist Yearbook*.

Created a new nine-member board for the first time in more than 50 years. The Free Will Baptist Foundation Board will now operate independently from the Board of Retirement and Insurance and oversee the development of that agency.

Welcomed Ray Lewis as the new director of the Board of Retirement and Insurance.

Waved goodbye to National Youth Conference Director, Dean Jones who leaves his post in August.

Agreed that it was time to go back to press and reprint *Rejoice!* The Free Will Baptist Hymn Book. With revisions and
