

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From the Editor



Dear Friends,

I just talked to Yolanda, one of the leaders of the Villalba Church in Spain. She, along with our architect Carlos met with a city official today. Like has happened before, this was another new person in the new city administration that was not familiar with our case. Just doing her job, this person was going to put another roadblock to keep the church from obtaining the building permit. After Carlos explained the history of our church's attempt to build for 13 years, the fact that we won a court battle in the Supreme Court, and that we are working in good faith, she said that we should have the permission that she grants by next week! Yolanda said, "Thank the Lord for Carlos!" I've said the same thing on several other occasions.

There are two permissions that the church needs to begin construction: one is permission for the activity that the church wants to carry out in the future building, and the other is permission to begin construction. This is different than when we began the process 13 years ago, but is part of the normal

process for the construction of a public building in Spain today.

The news from this meeting is a praise item. Please pray that city officials really work in good faith and go ahead with both permissions for the Villalba Church. As soon as these permissions are granted, we will go to the bank. Before I left Spain, I had already taken the loan process as far as I could without the building permit. So, our local bank director is waiting for the building permit to continue the loan application process. Please pray about that too. After that, the next big item will be locating a construction company, which of course means getting bids and deciding on the best company. All these items need divine intervention.

Another group from Woodcrest in Catoosa OK had to cancel out because of Hurricane Wilma. Their group leader was stranded in Cancun with his family for three weeks.

We made a run up to John and Paulina's house and took a load of their things that had been stored in the front bedroom here. They are working excitedly on getting ready for the grand opening of house number one on Nov. 19th. They are looking for furniture and making plans for the ceremony. Today we will take another load of boxes for the kitchen in Altamira, and be back Tuesday. Then I will have a week here before we head out toward Thayer MO for meetings before Thanksgiving.

When we come to mind, just look around your orderly office or room, and say a prayer that we can somehow bring some order to ours. God bless you.

A New Dorm for Camp Niangua?!

One that seems to be on everyone's mind is new dormitories with restrooms and showers in the building. That is why our camp board has voted to build a new dormitory. This will be the first of four which we hope to build and will be on the boys side of the camp due to the poor condition of many of the boys cabins. This dormitory will hold approx. 112 campers, will have restrooms in each room and will have central heat and air. The cost of this dorm will be approx. \$250,000 more or less depending on building material costs. (The recent hurricanes have a big influence on the cost of building materials.) Bro. Bruce Moore, our new camp director, will oversee this project which should begin after camp closes in August and will be completed as soon as possible. What we need now is your help. \$250,000 is a lot of money, and more than we have. As in the past, we are counting on those who support our camp to help raise the money for this dorm. Calvary Fellowship Celebrates 50 Years

On October 9th, 2005, Calvary celebrated their 50th Anniversary in grand 'old' fashion style. Bibs and prairie dresses were the style of the day with old and new coming to celebrate our Homecoming. Calvary Fellowship was organized in 1955 under the name of Meramec Heights FWB under the leadership of Rev. Johnny Land. In 1971, under the leadership of Rev. Al Helms, the church relocated to their present site in Fenton and the name was changed to Calvary Fellowship FWB. On July 16, 1978 the Liberty Mission Church, which

Rev. Jerry Norris pastored, merged with Calvary and called Bro. Norris to be pastor of the combined congregations. The church was a home renovated into an auditorium and educational space.

On November 11, 1979 a building program was begun and in the summer of 1981 the church moved into its new auditorium. But it was November of 1982 before the basement was finished and it could be occupied. In June of 1993 the church voted to build a Family Life Center, which took 5 years to complete. The Family Life Center was dedicated on September 14, 1998.

In celebration of our history our Homecoming was celebrated in 'Gaither Homecoming' style. Led by Ron Scott, with 30 singers on the platform accompanied by our Calvary Band, the morning was spent in a wonderful array of solos, duets, trios, quartets, choir and congregational singing. We have 27 current members attending Calvary that have been there for at least 25 years and those present were recognized.

Out of the original 7 trustees, 5 were present on this day. Prior to Bro. Jerry Norris bringing a message on Heaven there was a video presentation of members who have gone on to be with the Lord. After the message past members were recognized who had joined us for the day.

The Roskowske family entertained the Pre-K - 4th grade children with many activities including puppetry, songs, clowns, egg toss, and a story. The special clowns for the day were Dottie and Dinky, Jr. They were fun, silly and very entertaining for the children. They heard a story about Daniel and how God delivered him from the mouths of the lions because of his obedience and faithfulness to God. The kids had a great time to say the least.

Special mugs with the church's picture on it were given to all adults present that day and silicon bracelets inscribed with 'Live Christ' were given to our youth. Our gym was decked out in checkered tablecloths, antiques on the tables, quilts hanging around the gym and more food than you can imagine.

It was a wonderful day filled with superb fellowship, great singing, a splendid message and the best food west of the Mississippi.



Country Chaplain Too Little, Too Late



The disappointment and sadness in my grandson's eyes burrowed deep into my heart. He didn't say a word. He didn't need to. The message I read in his eyes, and the expression on his face, communicated everything. My efforts to repair the glide-ride on his swing set were "too little too late"

The glide-ride had been a favorite of my grandson and his little sister. (She is one year younger.) In my mind's eye I saw their smiles and heard their laughter as they had mutually propelled the glide-ride back and forth in abandoned delight. At some point a bolt broke. "Grandpa can fix it", they both said.

I went by the hardware store and selected a bolt that would enable the glide-ride to be back in the service of my grandchildren and their little playmates. I thought that I would stop by my daughter and son-in-law's house sometime when I had a "spare moment".

Winter closed in and the glide-ride hung at an awkward angle throughout the months of cold wind, snow and ice. Spring came and went. Then came summer. One day I stopped by with my bucket of tools and the bolt that I had purchased at the hardware store. After about 10 minutes I proudly observed the successful repair of one of my grandchildren's favorite outdoor toys. Quick as a flash, granddaughter seated herself and grandson also straddled his plastic seat. However, this time there was no gleeful gliding through the air with joyful faces while their hair tossed about in the breeze. During the "year" that had passed, my grandson had "grown" —he was now too large for

the glide-ride.

That picture of his disappointment remains on full display in my memory.

I once read a book that spoke of the "tyranny of the urgent". Urgent things seem to demand my attention. Things like repairing glide-rides (that was urgently important to my grandchildren) seem to get pushed to the sidelines—"out of sight, out of mind".

Someone mentioned a man's name in prayer meeting. He was critically ill. I felt an inner urge to go to his house and see if he would be interested in hearing that Jesus Christ had died for his sins—he could believe and be saved! A week went by. Then I heard that that he had died. Now, 40 years later, I still remember.

Through the prophet Ezekiel, God said to His people: "When I say to the wicked, 'O wicked man, you shall surely die!" and you do not speak to warn the wicked from his way, that wicked man shall die in his iniquity; but his blood I will require at your hand. Nevertheless if you warn the wicked to turn from his way, and he does not turn from his way, he shall die in his iniquity; but you have delivered your soul" (Ezekiel 33:8-9, NKJV).

FWBBC Students Respond to Katrina

NASHVILLE, TN—Thirty-five Free Will Baptist Bible College students and faculty traveled to South Mississippi October 19-23 to assist in disaster relief in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, according to Christian Service Director John Murray who organized

and led the relief effort.

"The students worked hard, paid their own way, and gave of themselves to help those in need," Mr. Murray said. "They gave up their Fall Break and Mom's home cooking to cut trees, repair roofs, stack logs, remove debris and whatever else was asked of them. I saw today's generation at work where it made a difference."

The can-do group loaded a chartered bus at FWBBC's Nashville campus Wednesday, October 19, immediately after mid-term exams, and rode 400 miles to South Mississippi Free Will Baptist Youth Camp near Waynesboro where they were housed, arriving near midnight.

"The students awoke to a world of fallen trees," Murray said. "After a short night and a hearty breakfast, they unloaded chain saws, axes, and rakes, and began cleaning up the shattered pieces left behind by Katrina."

Friday morning the work crew went to nearby Gulfport and worked all day at Gulfport Free Will Baptist

Church which had been damaged by hurricane winds. They removed insulation and drywall stacked outside from fallen ceilings, and cleared debris from around the church.

Ten students walked through the neighborhood, saws and axes in hand, ready to assist neighbors with toppled trees, broken limbs, and home repairs.

The group spent Saturday chopping and sawing trees, and removing debris at the camp. That evening they celebrated with a campfire from 7:00 p.m. to midnight where they sang songs, shared testimonies and prayed.



When several students became ill and required medical attention, Mr. Murray took prescriptions into Waynesboro to be filled. A pharmacist, aware of the students' relief work, filled the prescriptions at no charge, telling Murray, "This is my tithe this Sunday."

The students divided into five ministry teams Sunday morning and preached and sang

in area Free Will Baptist churches before returning to Nashville in time to start classes Monday.

The student effort made an impact, according to Grady Pittman, a Mississippi camp leader. "I am impressed with the quality of students at Free Will Baptist Bible College. They came here and worked their hearts out. They worked without complaining. They are the 'real stuff."

Mr. Pittman's seventh-grade granddaughter ate Sunday lunch with the FWBBC students, then went home and told her dad to start putting aside money, because she was going to Free Will Baptist Bible College when she graduated from high school.



Lee Gibson, first time English teacher had this to say, "I fell in love with my kids. They were crazy, so we got along great"!

France – Women's basketball coach Autumn Drake, and some of the 2004-2005 Lady Saints Basketball Team - Leslie Owen, Lacey Trosper, Sheila Howard, Julie Stanford, Elisha Burdett, Erin McFarland, and Sacia Franklin - visited Free Will Baptist foreign missionary, Dennis Teague, and assisted in basketball camps. The Lady Saints partnered with the Lady

Evangels from neighboring Mid-America Bible College and competed against French men and women's basketball teams. When asked what the best part of the trip was, Lacey Trosper replied, "There was so much that I loved, I can't give just one thing"!

FWBBC President Selected for Leadership Development Council

NASHVILLE, TN—Reverend J. Matthew Pinson, president of Free Will Baptist Bible College, was one of 15 executives (presidents, CEOs, COOs) from national Christian organizations invited to participate in the twice-annual Leadership Development Council sponsored by the Crowell Trust, a Colorado-based firm.

'The three-day Fall 2005 session met October 12-14 in Colorado Springs, Colorado, bringing together executives from such diverse organizations as AWANA, Greater Europe Mission, John Stott Ministries and others. The majority of the participants traveled from all parts of the United States.

The Leadership Development Council (LDC) was formed over six years ago to assist key executives in becoming more effective in their ministry, by God's grace. The purpose of LDC is to provide a mentoring opportunity—where leaders build into the lives of other leaders by providing guidance, encouragement and accountability from their own successful careers and academic backgrounds.

The program founders—Paul E. Nelson and John T. Bass (Crowell Trust), Bill Anderson (Christian Booksellers Association), and Floyd Wilkerson (OC International)—are known leaders in the Christian community. They were mentored early during their professional careers and want to share the gifts and experiences that God has given them. They serve without compensation, and do so in response to the expressed desire of many people to be mentored by executives who have "walked in their footsteps" and understand the path of leadership.

When Mary was growing up, the farm was out in the country. The city now has grown until the farm is now within the city limits. Several developers would like to build homes on the farmland.

Mary: We have received modest payments from the farm over the years. I have allowed a neighboring farmer to graze his cows on the farm until recently. Since I inherited the farm from my parents several years ago, the value of the farm has greatly increased.

Bill: We checked with our tax advisor and the farm could be sold, but there would be a very large tax to pay. Since it is a good time to sell the land, we would like to sell. And then it would be good to let the sale proceeds grow for about 10 years until we plan to retire. In fact, we are hopeful that we can sell tax-free and then allow the proceeds to grow tax-free.

Mary: I was excited to learn from our tax advisor that there is a plan that does provide for our retirement. She explained that we could give the land into a special trust. With this trust the farm could be sold tax-free and the cash invested for growth. The proceeds can then grow tax-free inside the trust until we retire. At that time, the payouts will be taxable, but we could have as much as \$900,000 in the trust.

Bill: We will enjoy a very nice retirement. We already have an IRA and are planning to use that for retirement. Now with the extra income from this retirement trust, we will be able to travel and really enjoy our golden years.


