

Paul seems to have the solution to keeping our resolutions. He says in Philippians 3:12 that he is not what he wants to be....the attitude of the


resolution maker. He says that he does not dwell on the past but looks forward to the future, solid in the knowledge that it is not his ability that will make him different


Greetings to our Friends in MO! We are truly blessed to have you all supporting us through prayers and the MO Show-Me Plan. We are proud to represent Free Will Baptists in Tokyo, Japan. Since April, we have been traveling to another section of Tokyo to hold weekly Bible studies, church services in the home of the Osamu Nomura family, and teaching English and Bible classes to several toddlers and their mothers. We have been searching for adequate housing and a meeting place since August, but have not been able to locate anything affordable in our target area. One house we did find was in the exact neighborhood several of our young families are living in, but the owner would not rent to foreigners, so we continue to look. We spend two, and sometimes three days each week consulting with three different realtors in the Shiki area. Please keep praying that God will open the doors for either a house large enough for holding our meetings, or a meeting room that will accommodate our groups! Pray also that owners will be open to accepting foreigners as renters.

The currently average 220 in attendance. Bro. Gary expresses his thanks for our Missouri Missions program and the Coop for the support they received to help make the work in Ozark a success.

Pastoral Retirement

"When are you going to retire, Pastor?" "Oh, probably when I get to heaven!" Sometimes an exchange such as this is prompted by a pastor's zeal for the work and his inability to see himself not pastoring. Often, however, it is prompted by his lack of retirement funds. Missouri Free Will Baptists decided to help remedy this situation several years ago. They voted to establish a fund to contribute to any pastor's retirement account if the church he pastored contributed 10% to the Coop Plan.

Our plan provides one of the best retirement contribution programs of any of our Free Will Baptist states.

In order for a pastor, associate pastor, or full-time youth minister to participate in the Missouri Retirement Program, the church he is serving must support the Missouri State Cooperative Program with the full 1 0% of its regular tithes and offerings. This ministry is funded through cooperative

giving. (The associate pastor and/or full-time youth minister must receive his salary from the church as a full-time employee.) The individual must also enroll with the Board of Retirement & Insurance in Nashville, Tennessee.

A Retirement Pension Enrollment Form supplied by the State Office gives the following guidelines:.

I. Eligibility An applicant for participation in the plan must be gainfully employed a minimum of 20 hours weekly by a Free Will Baptist Church or church-related agency. Being gainfully employed is receiving reasonable compensation for services. Serving in a voluntary ministry -without compensation does not qualify a person for participation in this plan.

II. Types of Contributions

A. ER (Employer Contributions) - ER contributions are made by the employer as a budgeted amount above the employee's taxable income.

B. SRA/tax deferred contributions - SRA contributions are tax deferred, non budgeted employee contributions made through an agreement

between the employee and the employer. The church/employer withholds the specified amount and sends it direct to the retirement office.

C. EE (Employee) contributions - EE contributions are made directly to the retirement fund by the employee from taxpaid income.

Participation level A. Plan 1 - Full Employer Participation - pays the highest earnings The Church/employer is required to contribute a minimum of 5% of the employee's base salary (taxable income), which excludes housing and other expense allowances. The employer may contribute up to 25% of the employee's base salary as long as all tax deferred contributions (ER and SRA) do not

exceed 25% of base salary or \$10,500. In addition to the employer's contributions the employee may contribute any amount of tax- paid (EE) contributions. Employer contributions must be paid by church/agency check. \$25,000 term life insurance is required for participants in Plan 1.

B. Plan 2 - Individual Plan - pays 1/4% less earnings

than plan 1 The employee and/or employer is required to contribute a minimum of 3% of the employee's base salary (taxable income) which excludes housing allowance and other benefits. The employee may contribute any amount beyond the 3% as long as all tax deferred contributions (ER and SRA) do not exceed 25% of base salary or \$10,500. \$25,000 term life insurance is optional.

C. Plan 3 - Entry Level Plan - earns 1/2% less than Plan 1 The plan requires a minimum contribution of \$10.00 a month. The contributions may come from the employee or the church/employer. No Insurance is available under Plan 3.

Twice each year, shortly following January I and July 1, the Board of Retirement & Insurance, who holds the money in trust, disburses the amount stated by the Missouri State Association to the account of the participant. Presently the amount is \$500.00. Before this transfer is made the treasurer of the local church is asked to sign a form, sent from the State Office, stating that the church has supported the Missouri State Cooperative Program with the full 10% of its regular tithes and offerings.



Some great training for young firefighters took place. They lit the buildings on fire 15 times, and then put them out. Each time, they allowed the rookie


firemen to train on how to safely enter a burning building. They also hid fake victims in rooms filled with heavy smoke. Many lives could be saved in the future because of the training those men received.



A Dog, a Donkey, and a Horse

A dog, a donkey and a horse stood on the corner of our dining room table exactly where our two-year old granddaughter had placed them. I didn't want to move them. They gave me such a sense of her presence. As I sipped my morning tea and read a chapter from the Bible I would steal a glance at the little trio of animals standing faithfully at their post.

The miniature plastic horse had a saddle but no rider. Perhaps the imaginary rider had gone home to her house—just a few miles up the road—where she resides with her dad, mom and baby brother.

If it were left up to me, the three little reminders of her visit could remain where she placed them. However, I know that soon enough other little hands will search Grandma's "toy drawer". They will have their own plans for the dog, donkey and horse.

Perhaps this can be a gentle reminder that each day you may do or say something that will cause you to be remembered—it may be your words (spoken or written), voice, eyes, facial

expression or some other aspect of your body language.

When I was seven years old, the first of my two brothers was born. Consequently, I spent many hours doing farm chores working alone. However, I much preferred to work alongside my dad or mother.

Two concrete posts secured the gate that opened to our front yard. Each time I stepped between those posts I was reminded of "a day" I spent working with my dad. He showed me, by example, how to build a form for concrete. I helped him mix the concrete in a wheelbarrow, then shovel it into the wooden forms. From 16-penny nails I fashioned the digits 1952 and pressed them into the soft cement mixture. There they have remained for over 50 years.

Will today be a day remembered?

Each day you may do or say something that will become a permanent memory in another person's mind. Will it be good or bad?



FWBBC Dedicates Teaching Lab

NASHVILLE, TN – The new teach-

ing lab at Free Will Baptist Bible College was dedicated Monday, November 14, as a standing-room-only crowd of students, Teacher Education faculty and guests gathered in Room 201 of the Johnson Classroom Building.

Dr. Suzann Harris, T.E. faculty member at FWBBC since

1994, said, "This is such a wonderful occasion. We now have a room where teaching materials can be placed and made available to students. Apart from the curriculum lab in Welch Library, this is the first time we have a teacher-work area and a teaching lab where students can refine their teaching skills, as well as create their numerous learning centers, bulletin boards, unit plans and more."

In a carefully orchestrated surprise to the honorees, the teaching lab was dedicated to Dr. Milton Fields and Mrs. Helen Fields, and to Dr. Thurman Pate and Mrs. Ann Pate. Plaques designating the resource lab as the "Fields of Learning" and the teaching lab as the "Pate Teaching Lab" were placed on doors leading into the respective areas.


