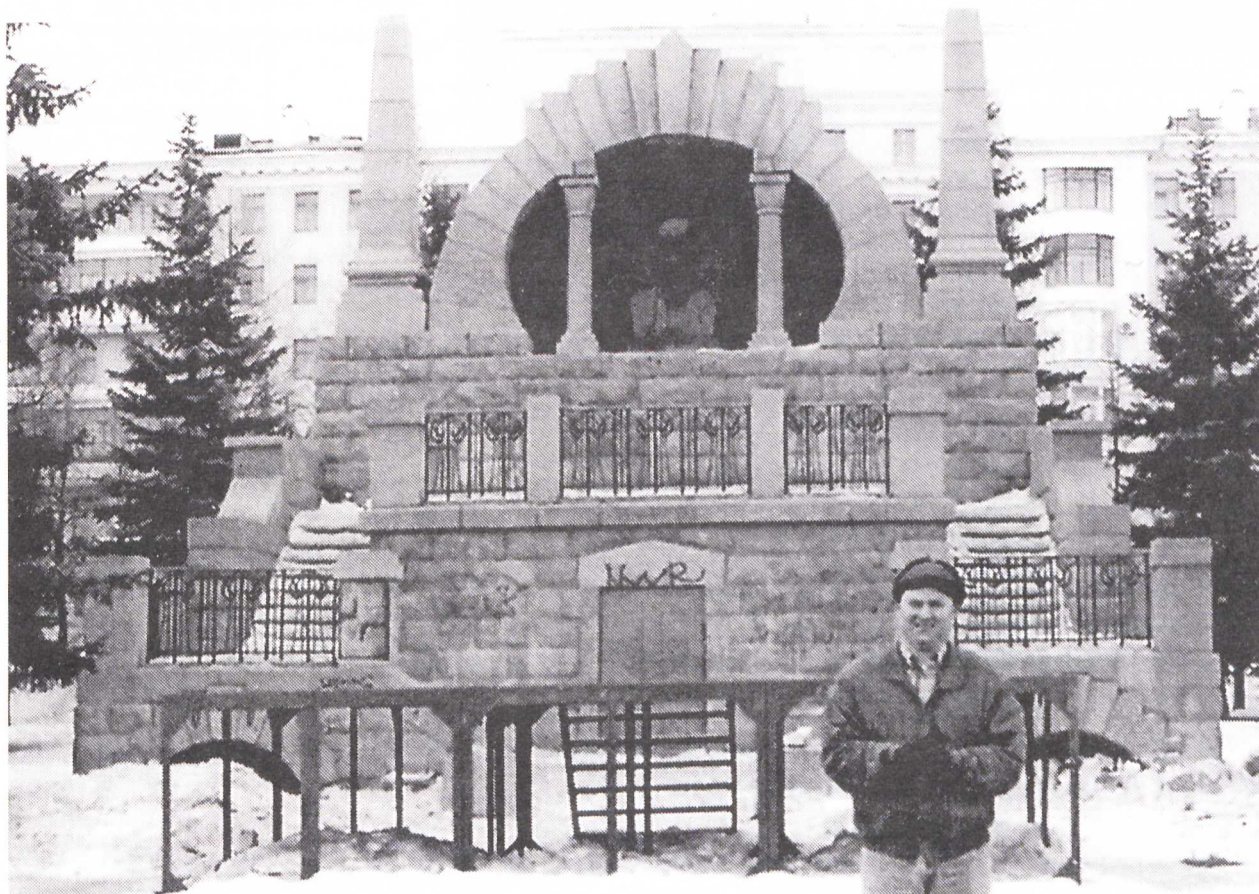

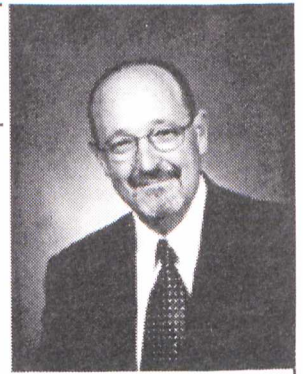

It was my joy just a few days ago to stand before the 2006 graduating class of Free Will Baptist Bible College.

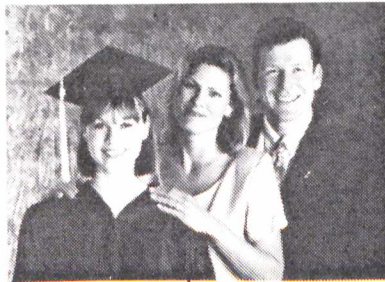
I was there to deliver the Commencement Address. I had been reminded by a friend that it was an address, not a sermon. He said that an address of this kind should be similar to one's street address.....short and to the point with only the necessary information.

As I sat on the stage before my time to speak, I was struck by a wonderful feeling. I saw in the crowd many of our denominational leaders and pastors. They were there to help the graduates celebrate their special day. There were parents and grandparents, proud of their children and their accomplishments. And there were underclassmen, looking at the graduates and hoping to be in their place someday.

Faculty and staff sat on the stage behind me. You could almost feel their sense of achievement as they looked from face to face. They remembered the lessons and tests these students had taken and papers they had written. You could hear them thinking it was all worth while. Of course there were those 59 students who had studied and worked to bring this day to realization. Every one there was excited and proud and rightly so.

But the feeling that overshadowed these was that God was looking at us all and that He was proud too. He was probably thinking about all the prayers he had answered for these students and their parents over the last four years of their college career. Prayers for money and provision. Prayers for recall at test time. (He didn't answer the ones that plead for the days of direct revelation to return.) Prayers for homesick and weary hearts. Prayers for help to get that last paper done on time. Even prayers about who to marry.

I am sure that He thought about the places he has called these graduates to journey and the areas of service he had planned for them each. His heart probably thrilled to think of the great blessings and success he has waiting for them through the years to come.



I am sure there were many things going through the mind of God that I don't know about or can even imagine. But I do think that God was pleased with the fact that several years ago these students had chosen to train themselves to serve Him.

Some were to be preachers, other missionaries. Many teachers and businessmen and women. Musicians and historians, but servants all. They stayed the course when they were tempted to quit and run. They learned at the feet of choice servants of God; men and women who have dedicated their lives to the training of people who will make a difference.

Yes, I think God was pleased as he watched that graduation, and others like it at our Free Will Baptist Colleges. Thank God for our schools and the people there who teach and administrate and the students who go and the parents who send and the pastors and churches who encourage students and support the college.

These are the thoughts that were going through my mind as I sat waiting to speak. My reverie was interrupted when I heard President Pinson introducing me. I rose and approached the podium only to discover that the notes for my address that I had placed there earlier were gone. New thoughts replaced the ones I had been enjoying. Oh, my notes were still there, someone had just moved them for me. But for that brief moment, my life flashed before my eyes and I was sure that I would be the only glaring failure in a day of success, forever remembered, not for what I said but for what I could not say without my notes!

A Great Irony

In March of this year I had the opportunity to travel to Russia to teach Old Testament Introduction and Survey at the Russian Baptist Union's Bible Institute located in Chelyabinsk. It was a wonderful experience. I am thankful to Mike Corley and Free Will Baptist International Missions for the invitation, and to Missouri Free Will Baptists who helped make this trip possible in so many ways.

Reflecting on my trip, I am struck by the impression that Russia is a nation of ironies. I think about the fact that beneath Revolution Square where the communists held their rallies there is an underground mall where capitalism is definitely alive and well. I think about the chill of the climate but the warmth of the people. I think as well about the "New Russians" who have come into their fortunes after the fall of communism, and whose homes are every bit as nice as any home I've had the pleasure to visit here in the United States but are nonetheless located right next door to run down village homes that are basically small log cabins with fancy shutters.

But the greatest irony of any I experienced was at Scarlet Field. Scarlet Field is a city park in Chelyabinsk that serves as a memorial to the martyrs and heroes of the Communist Revolution. On the southern end of the park stands a grand monument to Vladimir Lenin the leader of the revolution. But as you stand

before his monument to have your photo made you notice that on the northern extent of the park stands a church. I was told that this particular church is not much more than a monument today. It is really only used for organ concerts and for weddings.

How ironic! At one end of Scarlet Field stands a church that has become a monument and at the opposite end stands a monument to the man who more than anyone else had as his life's goal making all the churches of Russia mere monuments. That seems a sad thought until you look closer and realize that the monument to Lenin has been vandalized and is covered in

graffiti, but the church has recently experienced a renovation.

Now here is the greatest irony of all! In Scarlet Field stands a monument to the victor of communism who died believing he had triumphed over the church, and his statue's gaze is permanently fixed upon the church, which ultimately withstood and triumphed over communism! This reminds me of the promise of our Lord, "on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not overcome it" (Matt 16:18 NIV). How foolish it must be for anyone to devote his life to the destruction of God's church. The church in the end will always emerge victorious because the victory has already been secured by the head of the church through the shedding of his scarlet blood.

The words of Matthew 16.18 are found inscribed on the front wall of the sanctuary of the Good News

Baptist Church in Chelyabinsk. And let me assure you the Baptist churches of Russia not only proclaim the truth of these words, they demonstrate their truthfulness as well. Since the fall of communism the church in Russia has experienced a newness of life, not unlike the renovation of that church at Scarlet Field.

The churches I visited were all full, and there was a joyous spirit in their worship. They are praying for believers throughout the world who are suffering under persecution. They are also working to spread the gospel whether in their community, throughout their country, and even to those central Asian countries that we would consider the uttermost parts of the earth. As a matter of fact, the students at the Bible Institute that I worked with were all studying in the Missions program, and I count it a great privilege to have helped train these future missionaries.

The pastor from the church at Kurgan, Russia explained to me the motivation behind the Russian Baptists' missionary heart. This pastor spent time himself in prison under the communists for his Christian beliefs. He said, "We do not know if our religious freedom will last, or for how long, so we must work to win as many as possible while we can." Isn't that really true of all of us? As Jesus said, "As long as it is day, we must do the work of him who sent me. Night is coming, when no one can work" (John 9:4 NIV).

Kevin is a graduate of Hillsdale College in Moore, OK and of Midwestem Baptist Theological Seminary in Kansas City, MO. He currently serves on Missouri's Christian Education Board and is the pastor of the Rock Chapel Church in Norwood, MO. He and his wife, Sheila, have one son named Dagen.

Spain are many. As we have mentioned in our presentation, we ask you to continue to pray that:

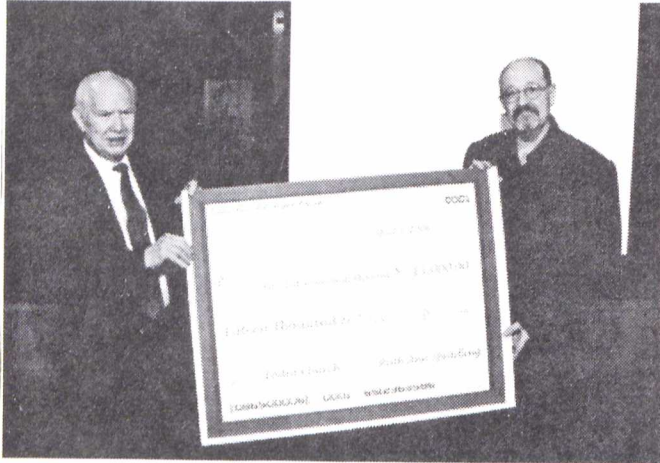
1. Many people in Spain will follow Jesus Christ.

3. Believers will assume spiritual responsibility and leadership in their local churches.
4. Local churches will link together to help stimulate a church planting movement.
5. Everything FWBIM workers do in Spain will in some way contribute to all the above.

We are thankful for the opportunity to spend time with family and friends in the USA. This year has been a time for us to build our family, because Melissa is adding a new member by marrying Mason. The attached picture shows one of our times together.

We still need approximately \$1,000 in new monthly support before we can return to Spain, as well as \$15,000 cash in our account. Would you please pray with us about this need? Your prayers always have, always do, and always will make a difference. We really need to have this support in place by June in order for us to be released to return to Spain in July. From our finite perspective, we have no idea how God is going to supply this need. But, he always has supplied our needs in the past, and we believe he will do it again. So, we rest confidently in Jehovah Jireh's hands. And, the Lord willing, we will continue to travel around from meeting to meeting in the USA!

Accord Freewill Baptist Church in Nixa in the Gem magazine. The church now has a membership of sixteen and we have purchased the building that we have been renting for the past year.



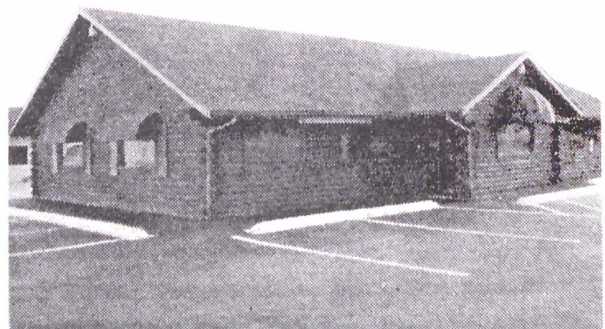

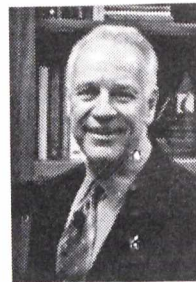

Greg Ketteman Named FWBBC Provost

NASHVILLE, TN — Dr. Greg Ketteman, a 29-year professional educator in the Metropolitan Nashville Public School system and principal at H.G. Hill Middle School, has been named to the newly-created position of *Provost* at Free Will Baptist Bible College, according to President J. Matthew Pinson.

In his role as Provost, Dr. Ketteman (50) will be the college's chief academic officer, fulfilling duties similar to those of the Academic Dean in previous years. He succeeds Dr. Milton Fields, the current Academic Dean, who will be shifting duty stations to become the college's Vice President for Institutional Planning.

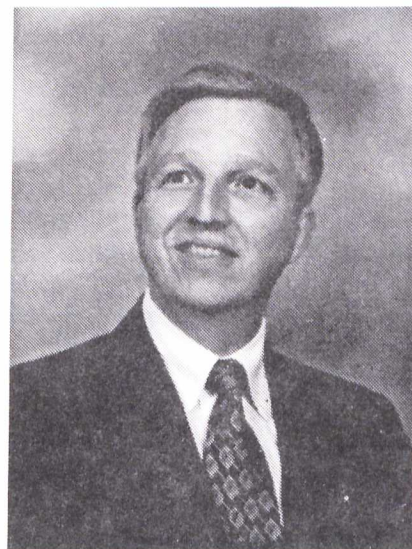
President Pinson said, "Dr. Ketteman is the ideal person to fill this position. He has served admirably as a teacher and principal, as well as a member of the FWBBC Board of Trustees. He brings solid academic preparation

in both public administration and educational administration. This, combined with his heritage, his love and support for FWBBC, his noteworthy church ministry, and his commitment to integrity and holy living, give him unique credentials for this administrative position."

Dr. Milton Fields said about Ketteman's appointment, "This has been one of my dreams for three years. Bringing Dr. Ketteman on board is a strong move to solidify academic excellence at FWBBC, and this will be an easy transition. Greg is a life-long Free Will Baptist, an outstanding educator, and one of the best men I've ever met. We are fortunate to have him as our chief academic officer."

Ketteman, a 1977 FWBBC graduate (B.S.), earned the M.Ed. degree at Middle Tennessee State University (1981) and the Ed.D. degree at Tennessee State University (2005). His career in public education includes 15 years as a teacher and 14 years as a principal. He is a member of Cross Timbers FWB Church in Nashville where he serves as a deacon, music director, and Sunday School teacher.

"I'm honored that President Pinson believes I'm the person for this job," Ketteman said. "Everybody there knows something about the job that I'm supposed to do. I'll ask them all. I'll need time to earn the trust of the faculty and staff, time to observe and listen and learn."

Dr. Ketteman has been part of the FWBBC family his entire life. His father, the late Paul J. Ketteman, was the college's first student in 1942, and later worked for the college 25 years in fundraising and public relations. His mother, Mrs. Helen Ketteman Smith, taught business 20 years at the college. Greg's wife Jill and their two children graduated from FWBBC. His sister, Mrs. Carol (Ketteman) Reid, is the college's Librarian.

"I believe that President Pinson has cast a wise, confident vision for FWBBC, and I'm delighted to be part of making it become a reality," Ketteman said. "I look forward to playing a role in the preparation of young men and women for a lifetime of effective service for Christ."

Joey McGlashan. The team was preparing to travel to Knoxville and compete in the regional tournament when inclement weather caused the tournament to be cancelled.

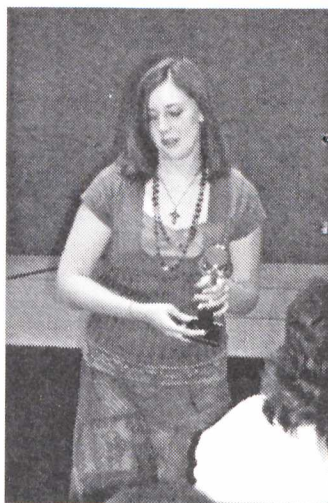
This marks the first time the Flames have won the Mid-East Region. This

puts FWBBC on the baseball map, and it will go a long way toward stabilizing the school's baseball program."

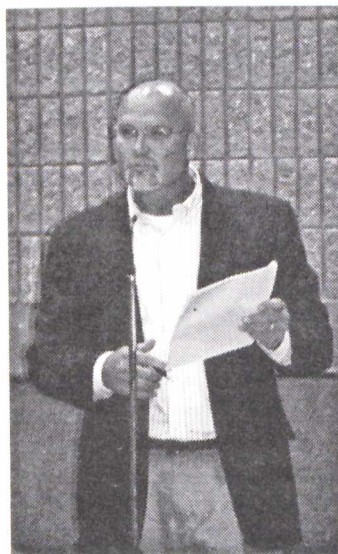
2006 State CTS Winners

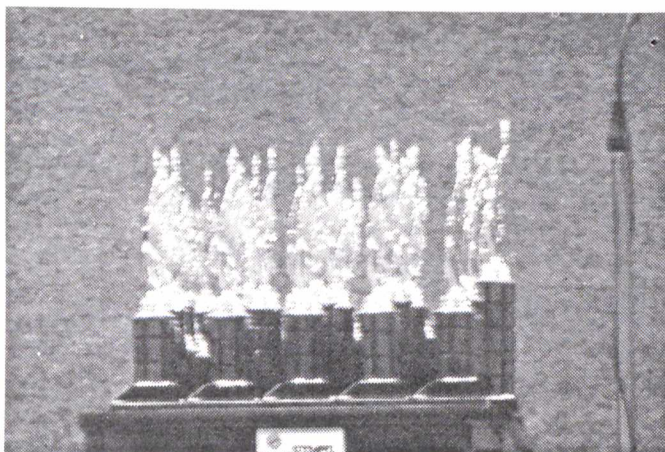
The competition was fierce and the judging tough with so many great entries.

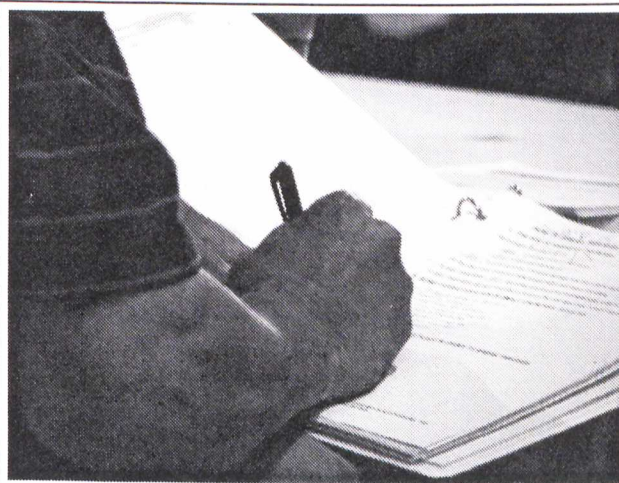
