



From the Editor



It was the first time I had been in a city bigger than Springfield, the first time I had eaten a Krispy Kreme donut., and it was the first time I had seen Free Will Baptist Bible College. For firsts, the later two ranked about equal.

I had traveled with Luther Gibson to the Bible Conference in the spring of 1967. I had answered the call to preach at youth camp a couple of summers before and Bro. Luther had taken me under his wing. He was pastoring First Church in Mtn. Grove and was the mentor I needed, even though we didn't know the term back then. He knew I needed to go to the Bible College and did all he could to see that it happened.

When we arrived in Nashville early one afternoon, my cousin Chris Dale, Dane Spurgeon and I set off to explore. As we walked to the corner of West End and Murphy Road, there it was. Resplendent in green and white with a red neon sign in the front window that said something about hot and fresh. Right there on that corner we had our first encounter with a donut machine that produced something just short of manna.

It was not difficult for the people sitting at the counter eating those hot, fresh donuts and drinking coffee to tell that country had come to town. It wasn't until I heard a snicker from beside me that I realized that I actually had my nose pressed against the glass window.

We each bought a dozen and ate them before we got back to Don and Carolyn Lombard's house just down Murphy Road. To our chagrin, Carolyn had fried chicken with all the fixin's ready because she knew that three boys like us would be hungry. There was even apple pie. Needless to say, we were stuffed as we went to our first service of the Bible conference that evening.

As memorable as my first encounter with Krispy Kreme was, it does falls short of my first experience with FWBBC. As we walked onto the campus, it felt



like no other place I had ever been. I was awed by all the old southern homes that made up a good part of the campus. I was impressed by being introduced to the president of the college as soon as we arrived. It almost seemed that he was waiting just for us! I was highly moved by the friendliness of all the students. Actually I was in awe of all those students. I mistakenly thought that all of them were there to train to be preachers and missionaries. I later discovered that there were a few musicians and teachers scattered here and there.

It really did feel like no other place on earth. Not because of the buildings and faculty and students, but because of something greater. There was a sense of higher purpose there, a tangible feeling that God was in this place and He was directing what was going on. I remember standing outside behind the auditorium at one point during my visit and telling God that I really wanted to come here if He would just make it possible. He did and I did.

I arrived on campus in the fall of 1968 and began my career as a student at FWBBC. I had been proud to tell people were I was going to college. It didn't take long to discover that it was not glorified youth camp but hard work. Really hard work. I wish I could say that I always worked as hard as I needed to. But somehow, in May of 1972 I walked across the stage in Memorial Auditorium and Dr. Johnson placed my diploma in my hands. How quickly it had arrived!

What did I gain? Well, a BA in Music and Bible, a fiancee (we were married two weeks after graduation) and the beginnings of a burning passion to know God.

Please join with us in giving thanks to God for His provisions. Please continue to pray for us as we prepare to return to Spain for another term of service.



This summer my youth group from the First FWB Church of Lebanon went on a mission trip to Reynosa, Mexico. The group consisted of nine people from my church and two people from the First FWB Church in Mountain Grove. We all got to know each other really well in a short amount of time. That's what happens when you travel 2,200 miles in a church van. It was fun, but for our next mission trip we will consider a plane.

We took two days to get there and two days to get back. We stayed the night at Collin Creek FWB Church in Plano, TX. A big thanks to them for their kindness and generosity. It was great to sleep in their air-conditioned building. After what seemed like a million bathroom and food stops, we made it to the Mexican border safely. We had no problem getting across the border, either (which we heard was extremely unusual since we were pulling a trailer). The

> Lord truly blessed us with safe travel. Throughout the trip, Dr. Thomas Marberry and his wife, Wilma, helped us a lot.

Our first night on the journey, our youth pastor, Jeff Myers, gave us a pamphlet called FaceTime; a simple devotional thought with verses to read and prayer suggestions. After splitting up and doing the devotion and reading the verses, we would fall upon our faces and have prayer. Some of the verses we studied for FaceTime were Proverbs 14:31, Ephesians 2:8-10, and Luke 18:9-14.

When we arrived at the seminary, we had our first encounter with the people we would be spending the next 3 ½ days with. At first we were really segregated – half the room was our group, the other half was the Mexican people who lived at the seminary.

Saturday, May 27 was a blast! We went site-seeing and shopping. That night we went to a youth service with one of the families that live at the seminary. Marco, who is the dean of the seminary, also is the pastor of one of the FWB churches in Reynosa. His daughter, Sarai, introduced us to several of her friends and we got know the outgoing and fun Sarai. They had a pretty good band and the whole service was in Spanish. It was neat to get to see them interact with each other in their own language.

Sunday, May 28 we got up early and went back across the border into Weslaco, TX. The First FWB Church of Weslaco is the church that the Marberrys attend. It was really cool because we got to hear a really good sermon in English by their pastor, Jeff Cates, then Sunday School in English, and then Bro. Cates gave the same sermon in Spanish. That night we were privileged to attend another FWB church in Reynosa. The pastor's name was Eric and his wife was Rosa. Our youth pastor, Jeff, preached while Dr. Marberry translated, so we got the best of both worlds.

Monday, May 29 was our workday. We did a lot of work around the seminary because it is in need of constant upkeep. The school year had just ended the day we arrived. So we all split up and cleaned bathrooms, mopped floors, mowed grass, and our biggest project was clearing out a pretty good sized lot that was filled with mesquite bushes.


TEEN CAMP 2006





Fellowship Celebrates Sixty Years

On March 19th, 2006, Fellowship Free Will Baptist in Park Hills celebrated their 60th anniversary with 321 people in attendance. The morning message was presented by Bro. Tom Malone, of Nashville, Tennessee, former pastor of Fellowship Free Will Baptist Church from 1965 to 1969. Dinner was served in our Fellowship Hall and the afternoon music was presented by the The Wanda Mountain Boys, from Wanda, Illinois.

During the Sunday school hour, a DVD history of the Church was shown to the congregation and the Charter members were recognized. A special room was prepared with memorabilia and pictures of Fellowship's history and heritage from the past sixty years. Bro. Wayne Phillips is the Pastor of Fellowship. He will celebrate 28 years of ministry at Fellowship in June 2006. Bro. Michael Hutton is our youth minister.

Fellowship Free will Baptist Church began on March 16, 1946, when some 50 people gathered in the old Buckley Store at 603 Buckley Street, in Flat River, Missouri. The Bible was presented as their only belief of faith. The Free Will Baptist Covenant was read and accepted by the body of believers and so a new house of worship for the Lord Jesus Christ was begun.

A good, solid base of tithing, Bible believers has been established and through the years our offerings have exceeded our needs as God fulfilled His promise to "Open the windows of Heaven." On May 7, 1946, the Church voted to send \$25.00 to the Foreign Mission Board and \$25.00 to the Free Will Baptist Bible Church, beginning a tradition of supporting all phases of our denominational works.

On, July 13, 1947, the Church began a local area outreach, as it began to purchase time on a local radio station, KFMO. We are still sending God's message from this same radio station each Sunday morning.

On July 24, 1946, the Church voted to purchase property at 601 Buckley Street. The property was purchased and groundbreaking ceremonies were held on August 26, 1946, as Brother Willard Lackey threw out the first shovel of dirt. The basement was completed and the first service was held on January 18, 1946. The sanctuary was completed and the first service as a Sunrise Service on Easter Sunday, April 17, 1949.

In 1955, a two-story education unit was added to the Church property. In 1973, the first floor of a new activities building was built and the second floor was completed in 1980. This building added classrooms and a large reception area where Church dinners and large gatherings could be held.

In 1993, God blessed the Church as he allowed us to reclaim the original property where the Church was started. The congregation voted to purchase the Cola-Cola property next door, giving us all the property on the right side of Buckley Street, from Taylor Ave to Laclede. The main building was made into classrooms, assembly areas, and a youth center. The warehouse was turned into a gymnasium. In 1995, the buildings were connected and the sanctuary enlarged and remodeled.

In 1947, the first parsonage was completed to provide housing for our Pastor and family. This parsonage served until a new brick parsonage at 337 Davis Court, Park Hills, was built in 1967.

From a rented store building to property covering a city block, this is proof of God's blessings upon this Church, and on the men and women who

were not afraid to step out on faith and trust God to take care of the results. Through the years, the buildings have changed, the congregation has changed. but through it all the original purpose of the early group of believers has not changed. We still meet to worship and praise the Lord Jesus Christ; go out to bring others in and study to grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior. Our ultimate goal is to be faithful until Jesus comes for his Church.

As we celebrate our 60th Anniversary our prayer is that the God we serve will count us as faithful servants and will commend us with, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant: thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things: enter thou into the joy of the Lord." Matthew 25



Leaving was the hardest thing we had to do. We connected with people on a level I didn't know was possible in three days time. It was such a learning experience. However, in some places God's love isn't taught, and that's where all of us Christians come in. The great commission is in effect for all us right now. I would encourage everyone to go on at least one mission trip, because no matter how many stories you read, it doesn't compare with the realization of being there. For example, during our last night's devotion, Marco and Marta and their kids Sarai and Santiago sat in with us. By the end of the night we were all crying and they told us, "Mi casa us su casa" or "My house is your house" and that we would always have a place in their hearts. We continue to keep in touch with them and are, in a way, sponsoring their family. A few years ago, Sarai fell into a chemical pit and burnt one of her legs severely from the knee down. FWBBC to Relocate

NASHVILLE, TN – The Free Will Baptist Bible College Board of Trustees wrapped up their June 29-30 meeting by unanimously voting to sell the West End Avenue campus and relocate within the Greater Nashville area by the fall of 2008, according to President J. Matthew Pinson.

"This may be the most significant decision the college has made since its founding in 1942," Pinson said. "We believe the time is right to make the move now. The financial climate is weighted in our favor. We received an excellent selling price for the Joelton property, and have a substantial offer on the West End campus. Our six-month feasibility study indicates that the denominational constituency is ready to come alongside us as we take the necessary steps to equip future generations of Free Will Baptists."

The Board of Trustees considered reports from capital campaign consultants who conducted extensive phone and mail surveys, and personal interviews among college supporters. They reviewed several financial options from local lenders. They heard projections from architects and contractors regarding design costs and construction deadlines within the college's 24-month window to build a new campus and relocate.

Colonel Mark Johnson, who led the feasibility study, said, "Our next goal is to secure a new campus site from the 'short list' of properties we are considering, and to finalize the sale of our West End campus. We will lease back the West End campus from the purchaser while we move forward with construction of a new campus."


College officials project that it will cost almost \$30 million to buy land, build a campus, and relocate. With proceeds from the anticipated sale of the West End campus and the sale of the Joelton property, plus cash reserves and tax savings, the college expects to have more than \$18 million to launch the project.

Board chairman Gary Fry said, "Now is the time for every Free Will Baptist to join us in this historic relocation effort. All the elements are in place for a successful campaign – the timing, the finances, the vision. The process to reach this decision has been carefully researched. We've never been more ready than we are right now. I'm excited about making this educational dream come true for our children and grandchildren."

President Pinson confirmed that Dr. Melvin Worthington, executive secretary emeritus of the National Association of Free Will Baptists, agreed to come on board to lead a future capital campaign after a new campus site has been purchased and the college has closed on the sale of its West End Avenue property.


