For Sale: The Soul of Missouri

ver the past 200 years, many medicines and treatments have been developed using human subject research. While many lives have been effected by these developments, a question arises as to the ethics of using one humans misery to benefit another. What is justifiable in the effort to save lives?

Years ago the world was shocked as the story of Dachau prison camp came to light during the Nuremberg war trials. When the testimony of those who observed or even participated in the horrific experiments on the prisoners spoke, the world was outraged and said never again. We cannot abide

humans being tortured and killed, even it if does result in the advancement of medicine.

The guilty justified their actions by saying, "but the things we discovered helped keep our soldiers and sailors alive and beside that, these prisoners were going to be killed anyway. It would be a shame to let them go to waste."



The same arguments were used when again many in the US were outraged in the 1960's by the experiments conducted on the severely mentally retarded patients at Willowbrook State School on Staten Island, NY. For fourteen years over 700 children from age 3 to 11 were deliberately infected with viral meningitis. These tests were justified by saying that the research was necessary to help others with meningitis and that the patients would probably have contracted meningitis at the institution anyway and it would be a shame to miss such an opportunity.

Fortunately these kinds of atrocities are all behind us today. Well, actually not.

It's happening again!

There is a major push on in Missouri today for unethical, human subject research that always ends in death. This research requires the death of one human being so that another can benefit. This November, Missourians are going to the polls to vote on Amendment 2 making embryonic stem cell research a constitutionally protected procedure.



The same arguments are being used. "Think how many people are going to be helped by the cures we create. The embryos we use are not really people at all and would probably be destroyed anyway. We cannot miss an opportunity like this!" While the researchers are telling us they

will use some of the 400,000 frozen embryos left over from in vitro fertilization procedures, the truth is they are going to clone the embryos they need, all the while telling us that this amendment outlaws cloning.

We are being promised cures for every disease imaginable.

We are told no public funding will be used.

We are told that if you oppose this amendment you are opposed to curing children and cripples and are just heartless.

We are told that a group of legislators in Jefferson City want to keep you from having the same cures that the rest of the country may some day have.

Where is the truth?

You cannot trust the Missouri Coalition for Lifesaving Cures. This group receives their funding from the multibillion dollar bio-tech research industry. More specifically, they have received almost \$10 million from the Stowers Institute for Medical Research in Kansas City. Along with other groups who stand to benefit financially, they are the real power behind this reprehensible effort. Why? Successful embyonic stem cell treatments can be patented. Adult stem cell treatments cannot. Follow the money.

Their claim not to clone embryos for this research is one of their bigger deceptions. The procedure they use is called "somatic cell nuclear transfer." This is the same procedure that was used to create Dolly the famous cloned sheep. It is cloning renamed.

The Turnboughs in Spain

Dear Friends in Missouri,

It is great to be home! And Spain is home for us. We have now been back for almost a month. Being in the States was a blessing, but being gone from here for one year was entirely too long for many reasons. An important reason is relationships. Ministry is about relationships. It is extremely difficult to maintain new contacts and friendships for such a long period of time. While we are gone, life goes on for people, and so much happens in one year. So, that is something we will keep in mind for us and fellow workers for future reference.

We have visited with all the leaders of all our works. Each of them faces unique challenges, but all of them remain faithful to the Lord and are an inspiration and encouragement to us and to others. The Esperanza Church, the second FWB church in Alcalá, has purchased a new storefront building and is going through the process of seeking local government permissions to renovate it for their use. Please pray with them about this effort. The congregation is presently about 18 to 20 people, seeking to reach out to a very needy surrounding community. Please pray for José Manuel and the members of this local church.

The church in Colmenar Viejo is staying faithful to the Lord, is spite of unique challenges that the pastor, his family and different members of the congregation face. Beginning any new church in Spain is difficult, and I believe the level of difficulty multiplies when the main leaders also happen to be recent arrivals in the country. This is the case with this work. There are cross-cultural challenges of personal, family, and general social adjustments. There are many jobrelated and economic challenges. Please pray for Juan Carlos and the members of this local church.

The church in Villalba continues to fill up the little storefront building on Sunday, mostly with immigrants from many different countries. The church is waiting on a final word from the local city government for final approval to begin construction of its new building. That could happen any day now. Of course before construction can begin, the church will have to obtain a construction loan from a local bank, and then hire a construction firm. Those are

two important prayer requests. The pastor and church council members have remained faithful to the Lord and to the ministry, for which we give thanks to the Lord and praise Him. Please pray for the Lord's continuing blessings and protection for Jhon Fredy and the members of this church.

In all of our works the integration of immigrants is still a major issue. The challenge is not that immigrants would attend services, because they do. There are two concerns for which we request your continual prayers. One is that existing Spanish believers will wholeheartedly embrace immigrants as brothers and sisters in Christ into the church and into their hearts and lives. The second issue is that non-Christian Spaniards will not completely shun our churches because immigrants are present, thinking this is a church for foreigners. Pray that God will turn this around for His glory, and that Evangelical churches will be a positive model for Spanish society by reflecting a simple principle of the Gospel — "we are all one in Christ."

We had the privilege of meeting with the missionaries in our field council for three days last week. They are all an inspiration and a blessing. Surely there are great workers in other places around the world, but I can't imagine any better or more dedicated group of workers anywhere. We are truly fortunate and blessed to be a part of such a great group of faithful and loving people. All of the workers here truly merit the faithful support of their home churches. It is very encouraging to see and hear the many ways in which God is using our missionaries in our newest work in the city of Alpedrete. It is exciting to hear how God is working in the hearts and lives of our newest missionaries to explore new avenues of ministry in social outreach and ethnic ministries. These things are a direct answer to our prayers of many years for the work in Spain. Please continue to pray for our missionaries here as well as the people with whom they work. Thank you for your prayers and support of the Show-Me Plan! You are a vital link between God's purpose to touch the nations and the actual people who are touched. We are praying for the search for the right person to head up the State's mission program.

Andres Conor Turnbough



They promise cures for everything that moves. The truth is that there have been no cures or treatments to date for any disease created using embryonic stem cells. In fact, the research has been proven to be a disaster, usually resulting in cancerous tumors rather than cures. One such test saw embryonic stem cells inserted in brain tissue. Rather than developing brain tissue, the stem cells produced bone and hair.

We are told none of our tax dollars will be used for this research. Just the opposite is true. In fact, the failure of embryonic stem cell research to product anything to make a profit is driving this amendment. They are tired of wasting their money with no return, they want to waste ours from now on. This amendment actually says that the legislature can not specify that money could not be used for embryonic stem cell research. If the institution qualifies for research funds for any other purpose, they could use those funds for stem cell research.

Are legislators in Jefferson City trying to keep you from being cured of your diseases? If they are we had better get rid of them, not vote in an amendment protecting a disastrously unsuccessful research effort. The truth is that the biomedical research industry in Missouri is frustrated by the legislature's efforts to ban human cloning. According to Connie Farrow, spokesperson for the Missouri Coalition for Lifesaving Cures, "Every year we face a new challenge. If we put it in the constitution it will settle this issue once and for all...."

When challenged by the lack of success, these researchers remind us that this is basically a new and developing field. Which prompts the question, if that it true then why would we want to nail down something in our state constitution that can and will change tomorrow?

How does it work?

Embryonic stem cells are harvested from embryos created for the purpose. An egg has it's nucleus removed and a cell from another source placed in the egg. The result is an embryo that will develop into a human being if allowed to grow. The baby will theoretically be a clone of the person who contributed the cell. In this process however, the development of the embryo is halted at the stage where the stem cells can be harvested, usually before 14 days. The result: stem cells and a dead embryo. Those stem cells can then theoretically be used to create treatment for disease and injury.

This is where Christians must speak out. The scripture is clear that humans are created in the image of God and are human from before birth. (Ps.139) At the very moment of conception, everything necessary for the

development of a baby is present in the embryo. There is no moment from then on when it is not alive and human. Do we destroy what God has created in his image so that we may hopefully cure someone else's disease?

This procedure is both morally and ethically unacceptable.

Can it ever work?

Does this mean that there is no hope for stem cell therapy? Not at all. In fact, this is a very exciting area of research if the right stem cells are used

For 20 years adult stem cells have been successfully used in the treatment of cancer patients to replace bone marrow after chemotherapy treatments. Last year over 15,000 successful treatments were administered. In fact, treatments for over 65 different diseases and injuries have been successfully developed with hundreds more on the horizon. All with stem cells that are obtained from the person who will be treated.. It had been recently discovered that almost all of the 210 different type cells in the human body can be obtained from adult stem cells. These come from bone marrow, brain, blood, teeth, fat, the placenta, nasal membrane and others. There is great reason to support this type of stem cell research.

What can we do?

It would be a tragedy if Missouri joins California as the only two states in the union that protects the cloning and murder of embryos to satisfy the biomedical industry's greed. They are playing on the emotions of Missourians by using children and the sick as pawns in this grab.

Speak out. Tell your neighbors, friends and family to vote no on Amendment 2. Get educated on the subject. Here are some websites for further information:

"Without a vision, the people perish."



He needed a vision for how God might use him in this culture so foreign to the one he'd come from. At first, the lack of instant results discouraged him. Yet, as he worked alongside the founder and main pastor for this ministry to Puerto Rican nationals and U.S. military, he saw something special — a man with a vision. Daily, he watched this pastor go early into his office and pray. Weekly, he heard the weeping of a Godly man and the petitions for those caught in the grips of sin and sorrow. Monthly, he witnessed the love, compassion and understanding this pastor gave to those around him, producing tremendous fruit — life after life turning toward Christ.

The young missionary laughed as he realized the profoundly simple vision of ministry he'd learned from the older man. Changed lives do not result from effective programs or ministerial popularity, but touching hearts through honest joy and Christ-like humility.

"Freely you have received, freely give."

It was dark. The sky outside, the room, and the memories that had just returned after so many years — things no one should have to remember. For the past 10 years this woman had been unable to recall much of anything about her life before age 17. Then, on this odd morning, it all came roaring back. With all her horrors in front of her, she and her husband knew they had to get help. They turned to their pastor — a man who had not only preached about love, righteousness and healing, but who openly lived it.

Their pastor responded as their friend, their shepherd



and their gateway to Christ's healing. He told them immediately that he was unqualified to deal with the depths of the woman's woundedness or to advise her husband in how to wisely support her. Then he prayed for a miracle. His prayer was answered when the church — a small church with limited budget — offered to pay for professional counseling for both husband and wife. He also called the counselor often to find out how to best come alongside the couple during the long process of healing.

The pastor and his wife became close friends of the couple, and remained so long after the crisis passed. Once again, the Lord met His people through His minister and a great work was accomplished.

Two pastors in different situations, following the same Lord, and both powerfully blessing at least three lives. Have you seen Christ in the life of a pastor? Has it made a difference in your faith? NASHVILLE, TN — Dr. Danny Conn, a leading Florida pastor, educator and editor, has been named Student and Children's Ministry Director at Randall

Mr. Hunter said, "We are delighted that a man of Danny Conn's experience in youth ministry, event management, pastoral leadership, and editorial skills is joining the Randall House team. We are moving into a more sophisticated era for children's and youth ministry, and he brings the perfect blend of warmth and professionalism to the position."

Danny's primary duties will focus on logistical coordination, rather than extensive direct contact with the children and students. He will secure and direct leaders for specific programs, as well as supervise promotions, budgetary matters, and general content.

His responsibilities will include directing the National Youth Conference (NYC), Truth and Peace, and the National YETeam. He will use youth leaders from the field as program coordinators for Truth and Peace as well as the National YETeam. Danny, in concert with the General Director of Randall House, will appoint a National Youth and Children's Advisory Council for incubation of fresh ideas and strategic planning.




Mick's wife, Rachel Donahue of Dickson (TN), graduated from FWBBC in 2005 with a degree in English.
