# From the Editor

I was listening to an interviewer on talk radio who had the audacity to ask his listeners to call in with their thanksgiving lists. Their views ranged from "this is the greatest nation on earth and we have a great deal to be thankful for" to the guy who said the show host was crazy. "This is a warmongering, imperialistic, religious-right controlled country and there is nothing to be thankful for!" he said. As I drove down the road, I actually felt sorry for that guy. Wouldn't it be terrible to live your life with nothing for which to be thankful?

Someone else postulated that he was thankful for turkey and football in that order. Then he quickly added that he was also thankful for his family, most of the time.

Then a guy called in to set the record straight. He said that Thanksgiving was really just the pilgrims thanking the Indians for helping them over the winter and had nothing to do with God at all. He said he was sick and tired of everyone trying the make "all these holidays all spiritual and everything." Of course this guy was probably just a good student in school....some texts actually teach his view as historical fact.

In reality, thanksgiving in our part of the world didn't really begin with the

really begin with the pilgrims.. There is good (genuine) historical evidence that the first known thanksgiving feast or festival in North America was celebrated by Francisco V ásquez de Coronado and the people he called "Tejas" (members of the Hasinai group of Caddo-speaking Native Americans) on May 23, 1541 in Palo Duro Canyon, Texas, to celebrate his expedition's discovery of food supplies. In the sense of a feast in gratitude to God celebrated by Europeans in North America,

this has a claim to be the true first North American Thanksgiving. The next was apparently celebrated a quarter-century later on September 8, 1565 in St. Augustine, Florida. When Pedro Menéndez de Avilés landed, he and his men shared a feast with the indians. Another candidate for the first true Thanksgiving in territory now part of the United States is the feast that the party of Don Juan de Oñate celebrated April 30, 1598 near the site of San Elizario, Texas with the Manso Indians. (Wikipedia) Interestingly enough, all these thanksgiving celebrations were for the purpose of thanking God.

How and with whom it started is immaterial. Man had been thanking God for as long as he has existed on the earth. It just comes naturally. Especially for those of us who know God.

But don't you just cringe when some empty-headed, glassy-eyes starlet gets up to receive her award for a film about sleeping with someone else's husband and wants to thank God for her little statue? Or when Billy-Joe-Bob-Big Hat thanks his Mom and his savior Jesus Christ for helping him win singer of the decade for the song he wrote and sang about how much fun he and his buddies have drinking and running around.

Aren't you glad we know what real thanksgiving is. We do not have to depend on good times to generate our thanksgiving. Even if everything about our lives is going sour at the moment, we still have our eternal destiny and destination for which to thank the Lord.

That is why Jonah could offer thanksgiving to the Lord from the belly of the whale (Jonah 2:9.)

That is why Paul and Silas could sing and give thanks and praise to the Lord at midnight from the jail in Philippi.

That is why David, for all his self inflicted misery and woe could say in Ps 100:4-5 "Enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise: be thankful unto him, and bless his name. For the LORD is good; his mercy is everlasting; and his truth endureth to all generations."

So thanksgiving really isn't about whether you have enough turkey or if your football team wins the afternoon game or any of the other thousands of things we think we need to make us happy. It is about having a heart that belongs to God and is in tune with Him. When that is the case, you cannot help but be thankful.

God is good. The last few months have been very eventful for us. The Church in Chitre continues to grow steadily. Since January we have seen over 35 adults, teens and children make professions of faith in Jesus Christ. July 16 was a great day for the Good News FWB Church. Pastor Doug Earls participated in the first baptismal service for this church which was about to celebrate their first year of Sunday worship services. 15 people were baptized that day. Among them was an 85 year old grandmother of a new convert as well as a pre-teen who began attending our Bible Club as a 5 year old girl.

On July 12-15, Pastor Doug Earls and his wife Betsy taught a leadership conference for our Panamanian leaders and their wives. Their teaching and presence was a very much needed time of refreshment and blessing. We appreciate deeply when folks take time from their busy

During the month of September nine children prayed to receive Christ during Children's Church. We have Christian teens who are teaching follow up lessons to all of these new converts.

On October 12<sup>th</sup> we launched four new small groups which meet in homes. Each group has a leader, a trainee and is responsible to evangelize, teach and disciple those who attend the group.

We plan to have a baby dedication and an evangelistic outreach using the Bible Club and teens. All parents who dedicate a child will be required to attend a family life class which will be instructional as well as evangelistic. We also plan to celebrate an evangelistic Christmas program.

September 30 was a very special day for the Good News Church. Along with three sister churches we celebrated our first "Music Festival". All songs were taken from Bible passages and set to original music. A trio from our church won first place for a song taken from Psalm 27. Missionary Steve Torrison sang and played for the group and Lori served as one of the judges. (She was impartial)

One very exciting godsend was the opportunity to purchase the former New Tribes Mission Missionary Boarding School property. Our vision for the school property is to transition our 25+ year old Bible Institute into a full fledged seminary training center. We envision training pastors and workers through full time Christian Education. New Tribes Mission sold the property to FWB at a greatly reduced price. We must make annual payments of \$50,000 for five years. Please pray that God would supply the funds for making the payments.



Susan has already interacted with several new people in the village where we live. She has met and made good friends with our new next-door neighbors. There are three specific areas in which you can see that good things are going on and going up at camp:




As when we raised funds for the new tabernacle a plaque will be made to note those who have given to the new boy's dorm.



# COUNTRY CHAPLAIN

Alfalfa

A field of alfalfa on our family farm remained green during the summer months of drought. The alfalfa plants sent their roots deep into the soil where they found lifesustaining moisture. (In certain soil conditions alfalfa roots can go down 10 feet or more.) That field lay in a little valley adjacent to Possum Creek.

Sometimes surrounding fields became brown and crisp due to lack of rain. However, the field of alfalfa remained green and growing. This provided assurance that our dairy cows would be well fed through the winter. Our barn loft would be filled with bails of hay. (Alfalfa hay is an excellent source of digestible protein and many other essential nutrients.)

Green and growing. That is God's wish for your life—a life vibrant with love for God and for people. That was the kind of prayer the Apostle Paul prayed: "And I pray that Christ will be more and more at home in your hearts as you trust in him. May your roots go down deep into the soil of God's marvelous love." (Ephesians 3:17, NLT) Would you consider praying that prayer for yourself and for others?

Pray for Christians in certain countries where freedom of religious expression is suppressed. For example, Christians in North Korea are reported to be experiencing severe hardships including persecution, imprisonment, and death.

Paul was praying that people's love for God would be on such a firm foundation (or deeply rooted) that difficult experiences would not uproot their faith. He wrote, "We are hard pressed on every side, yet not crushed; we are perplexed, but not in despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed" (2 Corinthians 4:8-9, NKJ).



How can you be sure that you love God? Jesus said, "If you love me, obey my commandments" (John 14:15, NLT). You need help obeying Jesus' commandments. He promised: "And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Counselor, who will never leave you. He is the Holy Spirit, who leads into all truth...." (John 14:16-17, NLT) I loved looking at that green field of alfalfa. I still remember the sweet aroma of the hav when I later fed it to our cows.

Put your roots of faith down deep so that your life can remain green and productive—a sweet aroma for God. You can draw deeply from the water source that only God can

provide. Jesus said, "But the water I give them takes away thirst altogether. It becomes a perpetual spring within them, giving them eternal life" (John 4:14, NLT).

Drink deeply, stay green and keep growing. (2 Peter 3:18)

Since our last update we have both been on the road-a lot. Ruth: flew to St. Louis; attended the annual Missouri WAC retreat; traveled by van with a group from MO to attend the WNAC annual retreat at Ridgcrest in Asheville NC; traveled back to St. Louis with the group; gratefully accepted a ride from there to Springfield MO with Robert and Shirley Jackson; met Bud in Springfield.

Bud drove up from the Bible Institute in Altamira to Springfield to speak in the Liberty District annual mission conference, Sept. 24 thru Oct. 1. From there we drove back to Pryor, OK; spent the night with Ruth's mother; then headed for the border. Reached "home" Tuesday afternoon the 3rd.

We have taken some time here to retreat and regroup, do laundry and catch up on the yard work and the mail. Bud will fly out on Monday for the Oklahoma state meeting. If all goes well, he will be back in Pharr Wednesday night.

We will be picking up Candace Blanchard on Thursday and head out for the Bible Institute in Altamira again and pick up our jobs there again.

Thank the Lord for the wonderful support team we have there at the school who have been covering for us while we made these important trips. Ruth really needed the retreats. The mission conference put us in touch with dear old friends, and lots of new ones, who now know more about the needs in Mexico

Brother Pacheco had planned to travel part of the way with Bud to lessen the danger of his falling asleep, but he was stopped at the border. He ran into one of our famous border officials who has some kind of agenda. She took his valid, unexpired immigration visa; kept him in her office for two hours accusing him of coming to the states to work; then wrote a deportation order forbidding him to re-apply for five years!

We are devastated by this turn of events. Brother Pacheco has been Bud's traveling companion when Ruth was not up to the trip. His presence at the conventions has also served to help promote the work in Mexico. Please make this a matter of prayer. Bud has written a letter of protest, but there is little hope of a change in the deportation order, no matter how unjust, once it is in the Homeland Security computer.

Several have asked about the upcoming changes in necessary travel documents for travel into Mexico. The problem is not going into Mexico but returning to the US. Congress passed a bill last Friday that is awaiting the President's signature: US Passports will be required for US citizens returning by air from Mexico on Jan. 8. 2007. Passports will be required for re-entry by land effective June 1, 2009.

We are heading back to work next week. Please pray for us as we set our faces to our jobs again.

We cannot make it without your prayer and support. God bless you richly there in your field of labor.

# FWBBC Enrollment Hits 22-Year High

NASHVILLE, TN — Free Will Baptist Bible College enrolled 383 students from 24 states and five foreign countries for the 2006 fall semester, the highest number of enrollees at the college since 1984, according to Dr. Greg Ketteman, Provost.

At press time on September 8, the college had enrolled 241 dormitory students, 81 commuter students, 31 Adult Degree Program students, and 30 LifeTime Learning students. Officials set the full-time student equivalency at 341, including 17 from Missouri.

# FWBBC Introduces New Trustees

NASHVILLE, TN — Delegates to the 70th annual Free Will Baptist national convention elected three new members to the Free Will Baptist Bible College Board of Trustees and elected a fourth member to a second term, according to President J. Matthew Pinson. The elections took place in Birmingham (AL) during the July 16-19, 2006, convention.

President Pinson said, "We're delighted to welcome these new Board members to the college family. They are good men with personal commitments to FWBBC. We will need their collective knowledge and skills as we move forward with plans to relocate the campus."

Nashville layman Bob Bass was elected to fill the unexpired term (2008) of Dr. Greg Ketteman who resigned to become Provost at the college. Mr. Bass, an entrepreneur and builder with a B.S. degree in engineering from Tennessee State University, graduated from FWBBC with a B.A. degree in Bible.

Mr. A.C. Allen, a South Carolina businessman, was elected to his second six-year term on the Board of Trustees. His term expires in 2012.

By classes, they number 93 seniors, 78 juniors, 84 sophomores, 94 freshmen, 33 non-degree/part-time students, and one special student. The college's enrollment has grown 35 percent since the fall of 2001. There are 171 women and 212 men in the student body.

Dr. Ketteman said, "LifeTime Learning registration remains open until September 15, while the Adult Degree Program includes two additional registrations in late September and early November. By the time all registrations close next spring and we get a final count, we anticipate registering more than 400 for the 2006-2007 academic year."

President J. Matthew Pinson said, "We've had a wonderful beginning to a promising new academic year. I am excited about our students this year. This marks our largest enrollment in 22 years. We are also delighted with the response to our growing Online/Lifetime Learning program as well as our Adult Studies Program."

He graduated from FWBBC in 1992 with a B.A. degree in pastoral training and subsequently earned the M.A. degree in theological studies at Covenant Theological Seminary.

Arkansas pastor Mark Stripling has led the growing First Free Will Baptist Church in North Little Rock since 2001. He serves on the Executive Boards of both the Arkansas State Association and the Central Association. Mark graduated from FWBBC in 1986 with a B.S. degree in church music and is pursuing a master's degree in biblical studies at Trinity Theological Seminary.

Veteran Illinois pastor and long-time Board member Gene Outland (2008) was elected chairman of the Board of Trustees this summer. Outland pastors Hazel Dell Free Will Baptist Church in Sesser. He succeeds outgoing chairman Gary Fry (M0) who completed two full six-year terms on the Board and was not eligible for re-election. A second Board member, Pastor Richard Barnes of Virginia, also completed 12 years on the Board and was not eligible for re-election.
