


I must confess that I derive a bit of misplaced pleasure in railing against all this bahhumbuggery. And while we try to put Him back in His rightful place, we need to remember what suddenly dawned on me recently. I was driving down the highway and saw a billboard that said, "Keep Christ In Christmas." I was struck by the fact that there is no way we can really take Him out. Thanks to all of you for your prayers and support.





Leticia was so timid she backed away almost to the edge of the church and only through persuasion would allow Abraham to kiss her in front of the congregation.

Men are making more blocks for the church building. The frame with a piece of wire on it sifts the sand..making blocks is a long, hard process.

The smaller building out back will be Pastor Samuel's study. Sunday School rooms will be built on the wall behind where Jerry stood taking the photo.

Christmas greetings from our home in Tokyo to yours there in Missouri. Isn't it nice to know that the birth of Christ was for ALL of our neighbors and friends? Unfortunately, most of our Japanese friends don't know that.

Christmas is not a holiday in Japan. Kids go to school. Men and women go to work. Stores, businesses and factories are all business as usual. The everyday noises of the world's largest city sound very lonely to us on Christmas Day. The birthday of the King of Kings goes by each year unnoticed. This is made especially obvious by the fact that the emporer's birthday, Dec. 23, is a national holiday. Like many things in Japan, though, Christmas is full of contradictions. The trappings of Christmas are easy enough to find. Santa makes his appearance, bringing each child one gift (only one-- wouldn't that be a welcome relief on the budget?) on Christmas Eve. Also, most families have adopted the European custom of eating a Christmas cake after supper on Christmas Eve.

Christians in Japan take every opportunity during the Christmas season to share the message of Christ's birth. This year, the church in which we serve, Good News Chapel, will be having several Christmas activities. These will include a special Sunday School outreach, a Gospel Choir workshop and concert, and parties for the children and adults attending English conversation classes. Please pray with us that the Holy Spirit will use these efforts to bring people to Christ.

Soon, however, the joke got a little more attention when several others announced they were pregnant, including one in her forties that had pretty much given up on the prospect of ever being able to have a child. When all was said and done, ten babies were born in a relatively short period of time.

Many were reluctant to drink from the water fountain for fear of what might happen 9 months later. It seemed like baby showers had just become part of our regular Sunday service.

For now, it seems the epidemic is over, but the impact of that outbreak is still being felt. Our services at Victory are now much livelier. There's crying, raising of hands, shouting, and even some dancing...and that's just from the babies. A Children's Dedication service was held on August 20, 2006. A total of 11 children were dedicated that day. I began the service with a reference to 1 Samuel, chapter 1, where the Bible says that Hannah recognized an answered prayer for a child and kept her promise to give the child back to God. We too are blessed when God "gives us a child" and we should commit to bringing them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

Of all the things that we can give our children, nothing is as important as teaching them about Jesus Christ. The greatest gift we can offer them is the gift of salvation. We can't save them, but we can show them the way.

Lessons from the Bristlecone Pine

One of the bristlecone pines of California's White Mountains is over 4,000 years old. The tree's age was determined by counting the number of growth rings in a bore sample taken from the tree's trunk (according to an internet article). While hiking in those mountains you might take little notice of a small scraggly tree with a few whorls of short, green needles on some of its branches.


Bristlecone pines can be found at 9,500 to 11,500 feet elevations where the annual precipitation is less than 12 inches. Their habitat of thin, limestone, dolomite soil provides very few nutrients. In a very harsh environment they grow with a strategy of survival.

The bristlecone pine's extraordinary resilience reminds me that the Bible provides a strategy of survival for people who decide to follow Jesus Christ.

Lesson one: The highly resinous wood of the bristlecone presents a formidable barrier to insects, bacteria and fungi. The Apostle Paul wrote, "Put on God's whole armor — the armor of a heavy-armed soldier, which God supplies — that you may be able successfully to stand up against [all] the strategies and deceits of the devil." (Ephesians 6:11, Amplified Bible) It will serve you well to thoroughly study this subject in Ephesians chapter 6.

Lesson two: The bristlecone lets most of itself die so that a small part of it can live. Paul advised Christians to "put to death" in one's personal life such things as sexual vice, sensual appetites, covetousness, anger, filthy language, and lying.

Let the new person created within you through faith in Jesus Christ be ever renewed and remoulded. Jesus' Holy Spirit can enable your behavior to be marked by tenderness and patience. Such a heart



will **also** be controlled by an attitude of forgiveness, love, **and** peace. (see Colossians chapter 3)

Lesson three: The very old, or hoary, bristlecone can generate cones with seeds that have the possibility of reproducing. That reminds me of Paul's mandate, "And the things that you have heard from me among many witnesses, commit these to faithful men who will be able to teach others also" (2 Timothy 2:2, NKJ).

Lesson four: Not all bristlecones are old. Some are young seedlings struggling to survive. My youth group leader taught me as a young boy: "Let no one despise your youth, but be an example to the believers in word, in conduct, in love, in spirit, in faith, in purity." (1 Timothy 4:12, NKJ) That Bible verse continues to be a very helpful, moral compass. And I am thankful.

Lessons from the bristlecone pine can help you persevere in your faith. And God's Holy Spirit will enable you to influence others to follow Jesus Christ.

The dedication message focused on three ways that we, as parents, can influence our children for the cause of Christ:

1) <u>Live it ourselves</u>. The average child spends 83% of his/her time in the home, 16% in school, and only 1%


in church. What children see at home, they see often, and it influences their lives. We can't expect the church, with only 1% of a child's time, to do for us what we are responsible to do. We must consistently set a good example for our children.

2) <u>Start when they are young</u>. Studies show that 1/2 of all that your child knows at age 18, they learned by age 3. We must start early before bad habits and false teachings get imbedded. If a child doesn't accept the Lord by age 14, the chances of him/her doing so drop drastically. Barna research polls report that children ages 5 -13 have a 32% probability of being saved. That drops to just 4% for teens age 14-18. We only have one shot at raising our children, let's do it right. Teach them about Jesus...and start early.

3) <u>Be consistent</u>. Whether by words or actions, we can't just teach something once and expect it to be remembered years later. We learn by repetition. Continue to teach and live it...over and over.

The service was closed with vows taken by the parents and a prayer of dedication. We ask that you pray for these young families and for all parents faithfully trying to raise their children in a Christian home. Oh, and if you are looking for ideas for church growth, you may want to try a new drinking fountain.

"There was a man sent from God...." These are the words that the Holy Spirit used to introduce us to John the Baptist. John would be the forerunner for the soon coming Messiah; as recorded in John 1:7,8 "The same came for a witness, to bear witness of the Light, that all men through him might believe. 8. He was not that Light, but was sent to bear witness of that Light." John did his job and did it well as the forerunner for Jesus,

Since that time, there have been many that this same verse 6 of John 1 can be ascribed to as "...a man sent from God" Men who have been faithful to the work; men who kept their garments clean; men who "preached the word in season and out of season."; men whose life shined bright as a reflection of the true "Light".

Such a one has come and is now gone in Truman Huffman. Bro. Truman was born on February 2, 1922 in Mine-La-Motte, MO. And passed away on October 26, 2006 at his home in Fredericktown, MO. He was a faithful husband to his loving wife, Amylee, who passed away just a few months earlier on July 18. Truman and Amylee had six children, 18 grandchildren, 21 great grandchildren and 1 great great grandchild.

This man who was "sent from God" pastored five different churches in Madison County over a fifty eight year span. Most of his ministry was spent at Twin Oak FWB Church; where as pastor; the church grew and expanded as souls were added to the church. He was a Pastor, Evangelist of many revival campaigns of which the term "An Old Fashioned Preacher" applied. Thirteen other men God called to preach who directly or indirectly were affected by this man's ministry. The hundreds of souls saved — thousands of messages preached — many funerals conducted — visits made can only be added up by the God of heaven as to the affect this "man sent from God" had on people.

He was dependable in the Southeast District Association to lead or lend a helping hand. He never sought the glory or fame. Although his body had worn down you would find him at Youth Camp or any other work of God doing what he could.


Bro. Truman had a personality that the old song "Brighten The Corner Where You Are" would have been a living testimony. He could be has hard on sin as any preacher who ever preached; yet so gentle and kind that the young and the old loved to be around him.

His children and grandchildren gathered around his bedside as he was breathing his last breaths of life. They prayed for him and with him — a final favorite song was sung "I'm Going Home" Then Truman gave his family one last smile as he took his last earthly breath and went home to be with the Lord.

At his funeral service, many came to bid farewell and remember this "man sent from God." The testimonies were as many as the tears that were shed. Bro. Raymond Michaels brought the message that needed to be preached. Then, Truman's son-in-law, Bob Thebeau, gave a poem that ended with a final line "But for the most encouraging words you can get today to comfort your hearts on just how Truman would feel — here he is to sing for us one more time the old hymn "Zion's

600-Plus Attend 'Night to Remember'

NASHVILLE, TN — More than 600 Free Will Baptist Bible College alumni gathered at The Factory in Franklin, Tennessee, on Saturday night, November 4, for a first-of-its-kind unscripted evening called A Night to Remember.

Event organizer Bob Bass told attendees, "Tonight is about one thing – relationships. We came here tonight because back through the years we all were at a place where relationships mattered."

The casual, laughter-filled alumni represented students from every decade from the 1940s to the 2000s. Silver-haired alumni in their 80s rubbed shoulders with energetic alumni in their mid-20s for four hours Saturday evening.

President Matt Pinson said, "A Night to Remember was a great evening of reconnecting with friends I hadn't seen in years and alumni from different generations — and connecting for the first time with many alumni from years gone by. The food was fabulous. The fellowship with old friends was even better."

The event came across exactly as advertised online and in ONE Magazine — no appeals for money, no pressure by officials for support during upcoming relocation efforts, no formal program, and everything was free.

Tom Sass, vice president for financial affairs at FWBBC, said, "This may have been the largest gathering of Free Will Baptist Bible College alumni in the history of the school."

The evening began with attendees arriving in waves between 4:30 p.m. and 6:00 p.m., slapping stickon name tags to lapels, and getting reacquainted with the people who had influenced their lives the most. After a 6:00 p.m. meal, the happy crowd sitting at rounds of eight in the mega-structure that was at one time a stove manufacturing company, began raising the noise level, swapping stories, and catching up on what had happened since graduation. Dr. Neil Gilliland, director of member care at Free Will Baptist International Missions and one of numerous alumni present, thanked the alumni for coming, recognized the sponsors, and said, "The rest of the program is you. No sermons. No offerings. This is all about you. Enjoy the evening with your friends."

Alumni from 16 states were on hand. They came from as far away as Florida and New Jersey, from Virginia and Oklahoma, from Michigan and Alabama. Everybody was at ease, and nobody brought an agenda.

Maurilio Amorim, alumni sponsor and founder of the A-Group in Nashville, praised Board of Trustee member Bob Bass for his vision to make the Night to Remember possible. "I have the gift of encouragement," Maurilio said with a straight face, "so when Bob told me his plans for this evening, I told him 'Don't do it! It will never work!' But it did work, and we are all here."

One unexpected highlight involved dozens of eight-foot tables surrounding the tri-level dining areas, and covered with pictures of every freshman class at FWBBC since 1942. As alumni arrived and picked up name tags, they invariably spent time browsing the tables searching for that special class they started with at FWBBC back in....

The Night to Remember became what Bob Bass envisioned three years earlier when he began making plans — an extended homecoming for FWBBC.

Bass said, "I rented this place over a year ago, long before there was land for sale or a relocation plan on the table. I wanted it to be a time of healing and reconnecting with friends."

A Night to Remember was sponsored entirely by interested alumni. It was open to alumni, faculty, staff, and Board of Trustee members who have been affiliated with FWBBC since 1942.

Russell Cooper, assistant director for institutional advancement at FWBBC said, "This is the event of the year."
