From the Editor

As I stood on the corner waiting, I watched the people around me. We had all gathered to watch the 4th leg of the Tour of Missouri bicycle race take off from Lebanon. Around two hundred cyclists and their support teams had prepared earlier that morning at the Civic Center for the 133 mile race from Lebanon to Columbia.

As I watched the watchers, it struck me what an ironic scene it was. There were several hundred people lining the route, waving flags ready to cheer the cyclists when they appeared. They would come streaking past us, ready to fight for position up and down the hills that

stretched from here to where they were going. It would take over 4 and one half hours for the last of them to finally roll into Columbia, exhausted, legs burning from the exertion. Those of us who watched would casually go back to our offices and shops in a few minutes and only give the race a passing thought later.

Me, I just walked the block back to my office and charted their struggle on the computer as the race progressed. At one point in my walk back I did remember that I owned a

bicycle too, a shiny Wal-Mart special. It is still shiny because it rarely sees the outside of my garage. But, inspired by the spectacle I had just witnessed, I vowed to ride that evening. Until I remembered that my bicycle had two flat tires and I did not know (nor really care) where the tire pump was.

How easy it was to get excited and inspired for a few minutes, watching the dedication and energy of those riders. I have discovered that it is not difficult to find inspiration. It is all around us! Read a good book, hear a great sermon, or talk to someone with a stirring story. We have no lack of inspiration to do good or achieve great things. In fact, our world is full of people who are being paid rather well to inspire us. Inspiration is not the problem, motivation is.

I have also discovered that inspiration has a shelf life of about 30 minutes. It seems that about the time I am inspired by some great thing, life conspires against me and comes rushing back with full force. The mundane

slaughters the inspiring. I might think back later to the story or picture that moved me, but that first blush of inspiration is gone and I am able to file that moment away with the thousand or so others I have amassed through my life time. I truly admire those who are inspired and then carry though. It is a rare quality today.

How many pastors preach some great truth of God's Word that ought to move his congregation and himself to action, only to know that the inspiration might last



till after lunch. More likely it will be lost in the major decision of where to eat lunch. The prayer of his heart is that some of what he said will remain past the afternoon and serve to motivate someone to action.

I recently heard a pastor leaving a motivating session in a conference say, "That was great, but I don't need someone else to tell me how to do it, I need someone to motivate me to do what I already know!"

Most of us who are a part of the church do not need any more inspiration; we just need that motivation to do. You would think that the distance between inspiration and motivation would be small, but in truth, it almost seems to be an uncrossable chasm.

So, what can motivate us to get up and get moving? Will it be another inspiring story, a challenging sermon, or a picture that is worth a thousand words? Wherever you find your inspiration, you must find your motivation to go with it from your desire to serve the Lord and be pleasing to him. Paul already knew that when he said that whatever we did must be done to the glory of God. If we get caught in the living of life and forget that we are supposed to be living our lives unto Him, motivation will never match inspiration.

I'm still thinking about those cyclists. I suppose you could ride your bike to the glory of God. He knows I certainly need the exercise. Wonder where I put that tire pump.

Report from the Turnboughs

Dear Friends in Missouri,

We thank the Lord for safety of travel during our trip to Russia (September 16-26), for Mike and Cathy Corley who served as our hosts and guides, and for the opportunity to visit three cities and meet believers there.

Thanks for your prayers for Susan. There were three "guard" dogs outside the hotel where we stayed for the Pastor's Conference (close to Krasnodar). On the second day of our visit, Susan was returning from a walk with several of the Russian couples, going through the gate alone, when the dogs began to bark and the smallest of them bit her twice on the calf of her leg, sinking his teeth into the muscle. When our Russian hosts learned of the bite, they rushed her off to the hospital. There they cleaned the wound, bandaged it, and gave her a tetanus shot. From what our hosts and the local hospital personnel told us, since most dogs in that area do not receive rabbi shots, just to be safe, when anyone receives a dog bite, they administer a series of eight anti rabbi shots in the back. That is a little different than the procedure in Spain or the USA, but that is all

We are also thankful to report that our mission account is out of the deficit! In addition to your support, this is due in large part to the distribution of the Tennessee Walk-a-thon funds from last year and to a subsidization from the Fellow Helper's Fund (monies from within the mission itself). God's Blessings at Troy



f vou have been active in your Christianity very long you know that sometimes great things happen in unexpected ways. We Christians realize that God shows us Himself in those unexpected ways when we remember the great Bible Truths like when Daniel walked out of the Lion's den and King Nebuchadnezzar gave Jehovah the praise for it, or when Jesus stopped in to talk to a Samaritan woman who had been divorced 5 times and the end result was that many of the town praised Him as the Christ. (John 4:42) I believe He is still in the business of showing Himself in those unexpected or mysterious ways.

Take for instance what has been happening in our state work in Troy. You start with an association made up of churches that either are, or were, mission projects. Then add the fact that the Association targeted a particular area because it is in one of the fastest growing areas of our state. Then, they, having been on the missionary side of things, knew that we should get ahead of the rising property values so they felt led to choose Troy, MO, which is a town of about 7 thousand, to start a church in.

Then more unexpected things came into play; like the hiring of a man whom the board felt had a heart for the Lord and for the work there in Troy but at the same time was inexperienced in Pastoral leadership. The "inexperienced in Pastoral leadership" was a big issue for us at that time so for Terry to be the Missionary to Troy was an "unexpected way". All these "unexpected" ways seems to have been fertile ground for God to show Himself in because it wasn't long before some great things began to happen.

How many churches would send 10 of their active and supportive congregation to start a work in







another town knowing that there would be a good possibility they would never return to their church as members again? It happened in Troy when the O'Fallon FWB church sent their own.

Did you ever hear of a Southern Baptist pastor sending his 18 yr old, very talented, son to help the Free Will Baptist church in town with their music? How about after he left for college that he sent his

> other, even more talented, son to fill the gap? It happened in Troy.

How about finding a Contractor who not only put together a building plan but a five year land plot/plan and then donated his time and his profits on the building project? You guessed it, it happened in Troy.

> How about starting a two-story, wood and brick, building project from scratch in late August and getting into the building by Thanksgiving? It's going to happen in Troy.

> > The old saying is that "God works in mysterious ways."Well, whether it's mysterious or unexpected the main point is - He is working beyond my expectations. God is doing

great things in Troy and I can't wait to see what "unexpected way" He is planning next.

ere I am in Pharr with Bud, enjoying a few days away from the school and working like crazy to make every minute here count. Actually, I have been away from the school for several days. I came up to the border on the bus the 12th, had some lab studies done with my doctor, then flew up to Oklahoma City to travel to Missouri for the state retreat with my dear friend Sister Tommie Sharry. We had a sweet time there and the Missouri State WAC gave me a gift of \$2,265 for our library at the Bible Institute. Our director, Brother Jaime Perez is excited about that.

With our new teaching schedule we are able spend a little more time here, travel and tend to things a little better on both ends of the map. Hopefully this will help us last a little longer in the process. Last year's schedule nearly did me in. We planned this time on the border to coincide with our grand-daughter's 10th birthday on the 23rd. Since we miss most of the major events in her life, this was a real treat.

Monday we loaded up the large sofa from "our" living room furniture and hauled it up to John and Paulina.

They have been living in Morelos at the orphanage for a little over two weeks now and were sitting on folding chairs. The large three piece sectional sofa with end tables is actually furniture that John bought soon after they married. It has been here at our house since right after they went to work in Piedras



Negras some eight years ago. Since it is so large I had been wanting to get rid of it and get a smaller sofa bed. I had threatened to haul it out into the yard and sell it several times. Fortunately I didn't, because it is just what they needed. We will get the rest of it moved up to them in a few weeks.

They are doing well at the orphanage. Of course we got a kick out of playing with nine month old Selena. Her four year old sister Monserat was proud to proclaim that we are really her grand-parents. Pray for them as John and Paulina work through the process of legally adopting these two little ones. In all there are 17 children there at Getsemani Children's home now. Bud got to go with the fellows to deliver mealson-wheels to 35 elderly people in the community. They are delivering meals three days a week now, and would like to increase it to Monday-Friday as soon as consistent funds are available. Jorge and Andrea will be moving away in the next few days to dedicate full time to a church where he is pastoring and to start a seniors ministry. Pray for them all, and for us, for wisdom and Divine direction in the coming days.


Established March 28, 1957, Beacon Free Will Baptist Church of Raytown, Missouri, pastored by Rev. Ken Simpson, celebrates the Year of Jubilee. The 50th Anniversary celebration has been commemorated in three services throughout the year, starting with the kick-off service on March 25, 2007.

Beacon began this service with a ceremony recognizing its remaining Charter Members, Mrs. Greta Carter, Mrs. Carmen Smith, Mrs. LaRue (Horn) Maxwell, and Mrs. Betty Jones (representing our founding pastor and family, Rev. Lester Jones). Honorary Charter Member status was bestowed upon Mrs. Jean Williams, who joined the church within weeks of its original charter.

Following the recognition, three presentations were made in honor of Beacon's golden anniversary; Rev. Gary Fry, Executive Director of Missouri State Association of FWB, Will Kraus, of the Missouri House of Representatives, and Raytown Mayoral representative and Alderman, Mrs. Sandy Hartwell.

Rev. Woodrow Matthews, Beacon's former pastor from 1965 to 1973, opened the services via video, as he was unable to attend due to health concerns. His touching words of encouragement and admonition for perseverance were a blessing. His son, Bro. Garry Matthews, delivered the main message. His sermon was delivered with humor and dotted with stories of a childhood lived in a loving church family. Services were concluded following a ceremony held to commission Ms. Krystal Coatney as Beacon's first Missionary to Brazil.

Beacon's second Jubilee service, with an underlying patriotic theme,



was held on July 1, 2007. The morning message, scheduled during the Sunday school hour, began with greetings from Rev. Jim Bundy, pastor to Beacon from 1973 to 1977. Again, the seasoned preacher admonished the church to continue in its perseverance, and lovingly reminisced with the congregation. The main message was delivered by Rev. Bundy's grandson, Bro. Caleb Duvall. Caleb issued a passionate sermon encouraging Beacon to look to the future and what the Lord has planned for her next 50 years.

Following a short intermission, the congregation welcomed its

fourth pastor, Rev. **Ernest Harrison** (1987-1993). Rev. Harrison delivered a beautiful discourse, urging the church not to look back but to continue looking ahead, focused on God's will for His people. Upon the conclusion of the service the congregation enjoyed an indoor/outdoor picnic and fellowship.
