From the Editor

Frequently Asked Questions and Oft Given Answers.

It is frequent mistake on our part in the State Office to think that everyone understands what we do here and how we do it. Often questions arise about how to send funds, why funds do not appear in the financial pages of the Gem and how to get an article printed in the Gem. Let me see if I can muddy the waters a little. Funds:

All funds for either the Coop Plan, Show-Me Plan or designated can be sent to the same address. When they arrive in our office they are separated into specific funds. Usually on the last business day of the month, we disburse the funds we have received during that month. We send money to several different ministries, all our State Board Treasurers and the National Association in Nashville. Any money that has arrived during the month for the Coop Plan is divided as follows

- 19% State Home Missions
- 17% Executive Office and Gem Magazine
- 09% Missouri Retirement Plan
- 8.5% Youth Camp
- 03% General Fund
- 03% Show-Me Plan
- 2.5% Youth Ministries Board
- 2.5% Christian Education Board
- 2.5% Senior Adult Board
- 33% National Association (Executive Office, Inter national MIssions, Home MIssions, FWBBC, Masters Men, National Commissions)

All other monies are designated and are disbursed accordingly. At the close of the day we disburse, our account final balance is \$0.00, all monies having been sent to whomever they were given. We often receive calls from pastors and treasurers wondering why their check does not appear in the financial record in the Gem. Several factors determine when they might appear.

If we receive the check on the day of disbursement, it will appear on the following month as the books are actually closed the day before we disburse. We often receive checks that have been in the mail for several days. We would hope that your check would arrive shortly after you mail it, but that is not always the case.

It is confusing to remember that the financial report that you are reading in this issue (February) is actually the December 2007 report. Our books close at the end of December. We are already working on the February issue of the Gem. Information that we receive at the end of December and the First of January are what constitutes our February issue. It goes to the printers around the 10th of January to be mailed to you around the first of February.

The check you mailed the end of December, if it is late enough might not appear until the March issue. If you ever have a question, please call our toll-free number 1-866-532-6537. We will be happy to tell you when we received your check and when it will appear in the Gem Magazine:

We are very thankful for the kind feedback we receive concerning the Gem Magazine. Most of it is positive, but even the negative has been in a spirit of helping us to improve. The Gem Magazine has been in publication since 1929. There were a few months when no issue was produced due to the press being moved (the Gem at one time owned its presses and did printing for other customers) or there was no editor to produce the magazine. Otherwise the Gem has been in Missouri Free Will Baptist homes for 79 years. It is very gratifying to sit in the Archives at the State Office and read the back issues of the beginning days of the magazine.

We want to make sure that the Gem is informative and inspirational. That seems to be the purpose of the publication through the years and we want to continue that tradition.

There are a few guidelines we would like you to observe in sending information for publication. Please remember that you must have your article and photos in by the first of the month preceding the month of issue. But also remember that if you wait until the end of the month, that issue might already be full. Please be patient. We will get your article in a later issue.

There are some things we cannot run. While we have churches full of great people in Missouri, we cannot run their obituaries. Our policy is to only run articles about the death of Pastors and Pastors wives. While we respect the labor and faithfulness of the people in our churches who are promoted to Heaven, we could not possibly run articles about them all. Please help us in this area.

Construction Begins In Villalba

Merry Christmas or "Merry Construction"!? It's both! What a great Christmas present! At 8:00 am, on a frosty December 24, the bulldozing crew was at the church lot and ready to begin. Even though this was a long-awaited and much anticipated event, it was a bit of a surprise that they were willing to begin this day, since it is Christmas Eve, an important holiday in Spain. People were out doing their last-minute Christmas shopping, and there was actually a traffic jam of such people right in front of the construction site. So, this was the beginning of lots of "looks" from people passing by the church property, with many asking, "What are they building there?"

The owner of the excavation company, Domingo (pictured below), was the one who filled in the basement after it was dug the first time in 1992! Even more important, he said that he has known about the church for years, and he had lots of questions: "What's the difference between the FWB Church and the Catholic Church?" Felician (pictured on the phone), who is the owner and head of the construction company the church hired, is also a member of the Villalba congregation!

Mother of Invention

In desperation I cried out to God, as I knelt at a homemade altar in our temporary chapel. "Show us the way to obtain the money to build a church!" I prayed. Our beginning congregation had sought a building loan from every possible known source, for several years, to no avail. Meanwhile, we had been making payments on the parsonage, a temporary chapel and 5 acres of property.

While on my knees in prayer a plan for raising money took shape in my mind, a perpetual loan fund that would be owned by our denomination's State Missions Board. I quickly arose to my feet and rushed into our nearby parsonage's tiny kitchen and excitedly announced to my wife, "I am going to visit our (denominations) churches and raise the money to build a building even if I have to raise it \$10 at a time!" Returning to the makeshift office I sat down to my manual Underwood typewriter and wrote out a fundraising and perpetual loan plan.

While still charged with faith and excitement, I called Cliff, our State Missions Director, and dictated my newly typed plan over the phone. He said that he too had been thinking about a perpetual loan fund. About two weeks later, hearing the gravel crunch in our driveway, I opened the chapel door to see Bro. Cliff step out of his car with a huge grin on his face and a bundle of newly printed red brochures in his hand. The brochures were worded nearly the same as the manuscript from my typewriter. (The Missions Board had approved the proposal.)

The first time I presented the perpetual loan plan I was given an offering of \$15. I wished I had set my goal a little higher. Meanwhile, Bro. Cliff and his wife, Frances, worked tirelessly in fund raising along with many other people. Jim and Juanita, former members of our church, took a set of slides and raised some of the first thousands. Several people contributed a thousand dollars or more.

At this writing (nearly 40 years later), that fund is valued at several hundred thousand dollars and money has been loaned to help build many new churches.

On the phone I urged my friend Bob, then the General Director of our denominations National Home Missions Department, to also initiate a perpetual loan fund. He and his staff soon launched their own fundraising plan that has achieved astonishing success.

However, there is another chapter to this story. Before sufficient money was raised to help us build, a Christian business woman (and Gospel preacher), Sister Alta, drove into our driveway. As she sat in our living room, she asked, "How much money do you need to build your church?" She loaned us the money, at low interest, to build a beautiful red-brick church. (And the loan was eventually paid in full.)

This new year of 2008 will bring different challenges. God's power and faithfulness is for all generations. And He often accomplishes His purpose through teams of faithful people working together. *Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen* (Hebrews 11:1, NKJ).

I grew up hearing that "necessity is the mother of invention." Do you have a "necessity" that you can trust God to help you with?

We had one rededication at the close of the morning service. I made the altar out of a bookcase (I now have something in common with Abraham). 

Being Free Will Baptist In the 21st Century

This article is part two of a multi part examination of our post-modern culture and our response to their unique ways of thinking.



Far from it! I look at this information and believe this should be the most exciting time in Free Will Baptist history. We all have the same opportunity and the same choice to make. You can look at the above information and form one of two conclusions. You might see postmoderns as a flaky, irrational, tree-hugging generation that rejects truth, can't stand on their own, can't stay in one place, and don't have any concept of how a decent person should act in church. Or you can look at the same information and see something different.

Because of their value of experience and their openness to accepting what you believe as "truth" and what they believe as "truth", postmoderns leave the door wide open for you to have a genuine conversation with them about the Gospel. You might be thinking, "But they can't just accept everything as true, because Jesus is the only way!" You're exactly right. But the cool thing is they will listen and value what you have to say. They may not immediately accept the exclusivity of the Gospel, but that's where you have to do something hard: trust the Holy Spirit to do what the Holy Spirit does! It is your job to share the truth; it is the Holy Spirit's job to change the life. After all, he did it in you didn't he?

Look back over those modern values that you've been exposed to your whole life. Did you buy into them all? No, you let God transform you into something that was neither modern nor postmodern. I believe it's called a "new creation"! He'll do the same with this new generation to, but it's our responsibility to speak the truth.

By the way, "seeker-driven" services are so over. For the last 20 years the church has been trying to hide anything spiritual from seekers and sort of sneak up on them with the gospel. Many churches have removed crosses, only play secular music, and try to look like everything except a church. The postmodern response to this has been overwhelmingly negative. Because they are so open to all things spiritual, they want to experience "the sacred" if they come to church. They are expecting to hear and see spiritual things and if they don't experience that, they leave disappointed and disillusioned. Think about it...we work so hard to get these people to walk through our doors. Why would we hide or water down the truth once they get there?

Part 2

Postmoderns desire to experience community. They don't like being "lone rangers". Can you think of any communities we could point them to? Of course, you can! The church is all about community. We've known for centuries what this generation is just now figuring out. We're not meant to go through life or faith alone. The challenge for the Free Will Baptist church is to make sure we create an environment in our churches where the postmodern feels welcome, accepted, and loved. It's a bit embarrassing to admit that this is a challenge. This should come as naturally to the Christian as

breathing, but unfortunately all too often it doesn't. We need to welcome younger adults into our communities without expecting them to change first. Remember, change is the Holy Spirit's job and He will do it if we trust Him. Change comes quickly for some, but we may have to be more patient with others. If you start doubting this process, ask yourself this: Were the twelve disciples mighty men of God when Jesus first appointed them as disciples?

Because postmoderns value creativity and the arts, they can greatly improve our worship experiences. For too long worship has been defined only by music. This should just be a small piece of worship in your church. You can also worship through painting, sculpture, writing, praying, giving, speaking, poetry, and much more. Many churches are hiring Pastors of Worship & Art to help their congregants experience the many different facets of worship.

Did you know that not all environmentalists are flaky liberals? The postmodern push to protect the environment should be great news to Christians. But most Christians flatly reject this as a waste of time and money. One popular Christian personality recently referred to environmentalism as Satan's attempt to distract Christians from their true mission. In Genesis 1:26, God gives humans the responsibility of ruling over "the fish of the sea and the birds of the air, over the livestock, over all the earth and over all the creatures that move along the ground." It sounds to me like taking care of our planet IS part of our true mission. Try to imagine a group of lay-leaders in your church ministering to your community by trying to keep your little corner of the world beautiful, safe, and healthy. They're not doing it because they value the life of an owl more than that of a human or because they worship nature, but because one way they can worship God is to

care for his beautiful creation. Now that may not be your cup of tea, but do you have any idea how excited many postmoderns would be to hear about something like that?

Because postmoderns have more of a global outlook, they tend to have a great heart for missions once they're introduced to Christ. This is why we are hearing more about youth groups going on mission trips and less about them going to Six Flags.

The most exciting thing for me about ministering to postmoderns is their high value of authentic people. For years Christians have put on their "Sunday best" for church and it was more than just a dress or a tie. I grew up believing that the church wasn't interested in who I really was. They had certain expectations of me and as long as I lived up to those expectations we could stay on speaking terms. But if I ever showed weakness or failure, I received a lot more judgment than compassion. This is not the kind of church that postmoderns are interested in attending.

If we are to reach this new generation, we must leave all of our costumes at home and come as we truly are. By the way, this is what the Gospel calls us to do as well. Church should be the one place in our lives where we have no fear of admitting weakness or defeat. The postmodern seeker is looking for a pastor who will be his spiritual guide but also be human. She is not looking for the perfect Christian – she is looking for the Christian with a "victorious limp"4.


This is by no means a comprehensive look at postmodernism. There are many other aspects of it that better writers have written about (and you should search them out and read them). The fact that we all need to start dealing with is it doesn't matter whether you want to embrace or reject postmodernism. Postmodernism IS! Just like we can't choose to live in water instead of on land, we can't choose to not live in The Postmodern Era. However, I believe God has put Free Will Baptists here "for such a time as this".




