God is Good

Psalms 107:1 O give thanks unto the LORD, for he is good: for his mercy endureth for ever.


The kids were all cute as they stood at the front of the church. Since it was Thanksgiving Sunday, their teacher had them in a line, allowing them to recite the things for which they were thankful. They were saying the usual. God, Mommy and Daddy, and Jesus pretty well topped the list. I was watching the little guy on the end of the line as it grew closer to his turn. His eyes were red and his nose was runny. He had obviously been in trouble in class again.

When his turn finally arrived he took a great, sobbing breath and blurted out "I am thankful for my Mommy so maybe I won't get a spanking when I get home!" Snickers turned into full-blown laughter as the kids filed back to sit with their parents for the rest of the service. An embarrassed mother received her little petitioner into her arms with the assurance that at least this one time, he would probably be spared what he justly deserved.

When David wrote Psalm 107 he was much like that little lad. He was thankful for the Lord and his goodness. But it was the fact that his mercy was everlasting that had David more excited. David had been the recipient of God's mercy many times. So often, in fact, that it makes the assertion that David was a man after God's own heart a bit hard to understand. You would think that a man like David, hand selected to be king by God himself, giant

slayer, psalmist extraordinaire, yet adulterer and murderer would have learned his lesson eventually. I mean, we learned early on, right?

No, most of us are more like David than we like to admit. We are called of the Lord to be his children and we know what it feels like to worship him, even using the very psalms that David wrote. Yet we



are capable and sometimes guilty of sins equally heinous. David has nothing on us. But amazingly and thankfully David was right in his praise of the Lord in this psalm.

God is good. And while we like to look at his blessings on us and list them in the positive column, we are often most thankful that he is merciful and does not give us what we deserve. He rather responds to our cry of forgiveness and offers not only pardon but power. Help not to commit those sins again. His great desire is to hear a prayer for



sustaining assistance rather than sobbing admission of failure. A "help me Lord" is sweeter to his ears than a "forgive me Lord."

I am not saying God is stingy with his forgiveness; He is not. David said it best, "...His mercy endureth forever!" But I am sure God would love to see us progress to the place as His followers that we are winning victories. It is His goal for us to be conquerors through Him. He knows the battle far better than do we. He knows our enemy intimately; after all, he created him. We just fight him. His weapons are supernatural, ours are carnal. It's great to know that help is just a breath away, as long as that breath carries a petition to Him who loves us supremely.

It's a great occupation to seek ways to let those we love know how much we appreciate them and how thankful we are for their very existence. No one is more worthy of our praise and thanksgiving than the Lord. As we look for ways to express our hearts to Him, remember that He already knows what is there. The greatest thanks we can offer is to fulfill the verse that follows in this passage. Let the redeemed of the LORD say so, whom he hath redeemed from the hand of the enemy;

God loves to come to the aid of his children. Sometimes that redemption is a daily process, as should be our praise of Him.

New Roof for Springbrook

John D. Rockefeller, Jr. once said, "Think of giving not as a duty, but as a privilege." Within my circle of experience, going back to my first pastorate in St. Peters during the mid-90's, I can think of very few churches that epitomize that quote like Pastor Rick Dement and the First Free Will Baptist Church of O'Fallon. They have built a reputation for their selfless giving of time, energy, talent and money. This selflessness starts at home, has touched many churches throughout the state, and extends around the globe. As Paul said of the church at Rome, "your faith is being reported all over the world."

Our new mission work in Blue Springs, MO - Springbrook FWB Church (formerly Blue Springs FWB) - was the privileged recipient of this selflessness during the first weekend of October. The roof on the church parsonage was in severe need of replacement. Hearing of this need, I was contacted in early September by Roger Drennan, a member at O'Fallon, who said he was putting together a group of men from his church and possibly a couple of others to come and perform the work on our roof. I actually called him back the next day intending to talk him out of it. I knew the damage on the roof went beyond just replacing shingles. We had two layers to be torn off, and most likely a lot



of wood to be replaced as well. Roger simply said, "This is our ministry." Soon after, Bro. Drennan and Jerry Pogue, owner of Arrowhead Building Supply, came to visit our property and look at the roof. Before leaving, they said that they would not only have a crew to do the work, but would also be providing the materials at no cost to our church!

The crew arrived on Friday, October 3 with several men from the O'Fallon church as well as the Nettle's family from Stonebridge the mission work in Troy. Behind them was a boom truck from Arrowhead Building Supply, all the way from St. Peters, with the materials. I cannot remember a nicer weekend weather-wise in recent months. One of the men said, "It's obvious God is behind us on this." There was one small cloud that went over late on Saturday with a few raindrops, just to remind us Who was in control. Thank God for the beautiful weekend!

The crew brought twenty sheets of new plywood sheathing with them. But, by mid-morning on Friday, we were already estimating how many more might be needed to get the roof in shape to hold the new shingles. I believe it was a much bigger job than anticipated! The men must have been stepping on the backs of angels for none to have fallen through to the ceiling below. Imagine a dozen men walking on a tight trampoline...that's close to how it felt moving around on the roof. Amazingly, by the end of the first

Thieves Break Into Bivens' House On IBLAC Campus

....Cash Stolen

Altamira, Tamps. Mexico.

Sunday, July 20th, Bud & Ruth Bivens returned to their house on the IBLAC Bible Institute campus to find that thieves had broken in through the front door while they had been away on a trip. Maintenance man Brother Efrain Segura and his wife Juana met them at the gate with the news.

Segura had turned on the exterior security lights at dusk on the 17th. That night, as he made a late night check of the campus he noticed the lights were off. Thinking the bulbs had burned out he went to check and found the light near the back door smashed. He quickly went to the front porch where he found the light bulb laying on a chair and the wooden door standing open. He rushed inside to the stairway to the Bivens' bedroom. That door, which is usually secured with a pad lock, was also standing open.

He quickly left the house and ran to the main building to get reinforcements. With Julio and Vicki Garcia they checked the house and could find nothing out of place except a disarray of papers near the dresser upstairs.



Ruth Bivens hurried upstairs to check the dresser. There she found papers scattered all over, including an empty envelope on the floor that had contained \$1,200 for the Bible Institute. She immediately checked the little pot where they kept their petty cash. It was also empty. The Bivens had exchanged money for the E-TEAM right before they left so the little pot held more than usual, probably around \$300.

Upon investigation the men found that someone had cut the chainlink fence behind the tabernacle to enter the property. Armed with some kind of strong, metal bar, they had smashed the light then tried to break into the metal back door. Failing there they went to the front porch, removed that light and the little sleigh bells from the screen door, then broke the wooden, entry door loose from the lock. Segura believes he may have interrupted the thieves since nothing was missing but the money. He elected not to call the police, fearing they would only case the house and a worse theft would be in the making. "You cannot trust the police here," he said. "This is not the United States."

The Bivens always leave a lamp on a timer in the living room. It is set to come on before dusk and go off about 11 p.m. And, they usually leave a vehicle in the drive to give the appearance of someone in the house. However, leaving on their trip in a hurry, they did not think to pull the school into their drive.

Because of storms in the area the electricity had been off and the clock re-set so it did not come on as planned. The house where the Bivens live is right beside the Pan American Highway, and a small road runs immediately behind their back door. Dozens of people walk by the house at all hours of the day and night and certainly notice that Americans live there, and that they sleep upstairs.

Bivens has installed motion sensor lights that come on if someone walks near and they now lock the door with the deadbolt lock. The deadbolt would not have stopped these thieves, but might have slowed them down a bit. The school funds have been replaced with money from the Bivens' account.

Derbys Request Leave of Absence

Antioch, TN – On Tuesday, September 9, 2008, the Board of Free Will Baptist International Missions voted to accept Micah and Becky Derby's request for a one-year leave of absence from the Mission. Their leave of absence begins October 1, 2008, and extends to September 30, 2009. Their situation's uniqueness led to two unusual provisions. The family will remain on the Mission's health insurance for 18 months, due to the generosity of Missouri Free Will Baptists who are underwriting the expense. The Board also approved a visit to France in 2010 to maintain contact and unity with their ministry team.

The Derbys married in January 2003 and departed for France in December of that year. While home on stateside assignment in

April 2007, Becky received a diagnosis of breast cancer. Although surgery and treatments led to doctors declaring her cancer free in September 2007, her physicians felt they could not give her a five-year medical clearance.

In his e-mail requesting the leave of absence, Micah expressed the couple's appreciation for the "graciousness and provision for us during this past year...We are so incredibly thankful that we work for such a godly organization."

The Derbys expressed a desire to "continue a significant relationship with our team ...even though we may not be able to participate in the daily activities, we will be doing what we can stateside to continue to promote this work." Micah and Becky expect to serve as liaisons for



the Mediterranean Team in the States while looking forward to returning to full-time service.

Deputy Director of Field Operations Jeff Turnbough indicated, "The Derbys have demonstrated remarkable trust in God as they have journeyed through this difficult time. God is using them in special ways to impact lives for His Kingdom, and we look forward to the time when they can do that once again through international missions."
