

Historical Sketch.

he first Free Will Baptist Church in the United States of which have any authentic account, was organized by Elder Paul Palmin Perquimans, Camden county, N. C., in 1727, and the Denomition has had a continued existence in the State ever since and is w in a very prosperous condition. June 30th, 1780 Elder Benjan Randall organized a church of seven members in New Durham, w Hampshire, which is still in existence. From these centers the nomination spread in every direction until there are churches in irly every State and Territory and in several foreign countries. e first Quarterly or Union Meeting was founded in 1783, the Conence, Association or Yearly Meeting in 1792 and the General Conence in 1827. These are all advisory bodies for mutual consultan and the promotion of general interests. All ecclesiastical power n the individual, or local church. There are fifteen institutions earning under the control of the Denomination and a number in ich it has partial influence. The present condition is very encourng and a much more rapid growth under the Divine blessing is anpated in the future than in the past.

F. W. B. GENERAL CONFERENCE.

The delegates composing the Thirty-First Session of the Free Will Baptist General Conference met in Cofer's Chapel, Nashville, Tenn., Oct. 2, 1901, at 10 A. M. Elder D. J. Molloy, of the Hamburg, Arkansas, Association led a half hour's interesting prayer service. Conference was called to order by the Clerk and Elder P. T. Lucas, of the Western, N. C. Conference, was chosen Moderator, pro tem. Elders G. W. Binkley, G. V. Frey and Bro. W. H. Jackson were appointed a committee on credentials. The minutes of last session, were read and approved. The Constitution by request, was read for the information of visitors and delegates. The committee on credentials made a partial report showing that more than a quorum were already present. Adopted and committee continued. Adjourned until 1:30, P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Elder J. E. Hudgens, of the Cumberland Tenn. Association, led the half hour's prayer service. Letters were read from several Conferences, Yearly Meetings and Associations. One from North Dakota was laid on the table until next General Conference and Elders Samuel B. Stephens and Thos. E. Peden, of the Ohio River Yearly Meeting were a committee of correspondence to ascertain more definitely the status of the brethren in that State. Elected Elder P. T. Lucas, of N. C., Moderator; Elder Geo. V. Frey, of Tenn., Assistant Moderator; Elder J. E. Hudgens, of Tenn., Assistant Clerk; and Elder Thos. E. Peden, of N. C., Treasurer.

Accepted by unanimous vote, the Charter of incorporation, granted by the Secretary of State of Ohio and passed a vote of thanks to the committee for obtaining it. The chair announced the usual committees: On Printing Establishment—Elders T. E. Peden, J. E. Hudgens and G. W. Binkley; Education—Elder S. B. Stephens, Bro. W. H. Jackson and Bro. J. B. Patton; Sabbath Schools—Sisters Ella Armstrong, Fannie Isham and L. E. Frey; Temperance—Elders J. E. Hudgens, G. V. Frey and James Nicholson; Missions—Bro.

W. H. Jackson, Elders W. M. Rogers, D. J. Molloy and

Elder D. E. Dortch led the singing to the entire satis-

faction of the Conference and audience.

Adjourned until 7:80, P. M.

NIGHT SESSION.

Prof. T. E. Peden, A. M., Principal of the Free Will Baptist Theological Seminary, Ayden, N. C., preached the Conference sermon, theme, Principles and Influence of the Free Will Baptist denomination.

Adjourned until 9 A. M. tomorrow.

OCT. 3RD, 9 A. M.

Prayer service led by Elder S B. Stephens. Received Bro. T. J. Rogers as delegate from the Western Stone Association and Elder D. E. Dortch as fraternal messenger from the Baptist denomination. Elected Bro. David Lasley, of Cheshire, Ohio, and Elder G. V. Frey, of Ashland City, Tenn., trustees for five years from the close of their present term of service.

Adjourned until 1:30, P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

After kind but spirited remarks by several brethren, the report of the committee on Sabbath Observance was unanimously adopted as follows: Relolved, that our convictions on this great day of the Lord, are the same as given in the word of God, found in the Ten Commandments. Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy. Adjourned until 7:30, P. M.

NIGHT SESSION.

The Education Society held its anniversy and elected the usual officers. Elder S. B. Stephens preached a very interesting and instructive sermon. Adjourned until tomorrow 9 A. M.

Ост. 4тн, 1901.

The usual half hour's prayer service was conducted by Elder James Nicholson. Adopted the following report of the committee on Missions. The Book of all books commissions us to go and teach all nations. The sacred pages are freighted with the spirit of missions. This spirit is seen in the Father for he so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son that whosoever believeth in him should not perish but have everlasting life. It was also manifested in the Son for while we were yet sinners Christ died in this far away mission field to save the lost sons and daughters of our fallen race. The Holy Spirit is a missionary among us, reproving the world of sin, of righteousness and of a judgment to come. The Spirit of the triune God is manifestly missionary. God's children baying his nature and spirit are missionaries. We read in the Book that if any man have not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of his. The anti-mission spirit that is often seen in our own ranks, is not the Spirit of God but the spirit of selfishness, narrowness and ignorance. The spirit of the whole Christian religion is missionary, for when one finds Christ like Andrew of old he goes to find his brother that he may bring him to Jesus. That the missionary work in the churches is at a very low ebb is certainly evident. Therefore, Resolved that we urge the ministers to preach on missions whenever and wherever in their Judgment they may deem it expedient. That we ask the churches to take this matter into prayerful consideration and that they talk missions, sing missions, pray missions and live missions. That we entreat the deacons to see to it that collections are taken in their respective churches for missions at least once a quarter. That the Associations take steps to send out missionaries as soon as in the providence of God they can possibly do so. And last but not least that we as a people invoke the blessing of Almighty God to be showered copiously upon the missionaries who are toiling and undergoing hardships that they may sow the precious seeds of the Gospel in the hearts of dying men that they may be saved everlastingly in the haven of rest beyond. Adopted the following report of the committee on the Printing Establishment. We are grateful for the cheering increase of the circulation of the Free Will Baptist within the past three years and advise our brethren everywhere to continue their efforts until every Free Will Baptist family takes, reads and pays for it. We advise the Establishment as rapidly as possible, without financial loss, to publish all the books, pamphlets and periodicals needed for the religious instruction of our people and to keep in stock for sale all the books used in the Theological course of our Seminary and we repeat the request of the last Conference for the publication of a Year Book. Adjourned until 1:30, P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Elder W. F. Pressley, pastor of the Nashville Free Will Baptist church, led the prayer service. Passed a vote of thanks to Elder D. E. Dortch for leading the singing. Appointed Elders T. E. Peden, J. M. Nicholson and G. W. Binkley committee on Necrology. Adopted following report of Com. on Education: Whereas, there is a demand for a more thorough preparation for the ministry and we believe the Bible is our only safe guide in faith and practice and as Paul instructed Timothy to study to show himself approved unto God a workman that need not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth and we teach the doctrines of the Bible as taught by our fathers and urge more thorough preparation for the work of life. Therefore, Resolved, that we most heartily commend to all our young people preparing for the ministry or any other profession, the Theological Seminary, at Ayden, N. C., believing that it is second to none in our beloved denomination. Resolved that we recommend our church organ, the FREE WILL BAPTIST as so worthy of patronage that it ought to be in every member's home and we advise all our churches to adopt and use our new hymn book, Zion's Free Will Baptist Gospel Voices. The committee on Sunday Schools made the following report which was adopted. Realizing the fact that the Sunday School is the right arm of power in the church and the germ from which many of our most successful churches have sprung, and the mold in which moral and Christian character is cast, we therefore deplore the great

falling off in attendance of our young people and especially of young men. We recommend that all our schools be superintended, taught and officered by Godly men and women who are apt to teach. That we request our ministers to use their influence and as much of their time as practicable in the interest of Sunday Schools. We urge our schools to use Free Will Baptist Literature. A decline in the Sunday School indicates a decline in the church of God. The children and young people, are the hope of the church and State. The Christian religion is the basis of all respectable society and this potent factor for its promulgation ought to be encouraged and attended by both old and young. Appointed Elders G. V. Frey, S. B. Stephens and E. T. Phillips committee on the location of the next General Conference. Voted that the Sunday collection be given to the General Conference for incidental expenses. Adjourned until 7:30, P. M.

NIGHT SESSION.

The Home and Foreign Missionary Societies held their anniversaries and an able sermon was preached by Elder G. V. Frey, of Ashland City, Tenn.

Elder J. M. Nicholson conducted the prayer meeting. Voted to request the Conferences, Associations and Yearly Meetings that have not sent in one cent per resident member for the triennial period ending with this session to do so at once so we can have the minutes published in pamphlet form and we request them to do the same for the next General Conference. Passed a vote of thanks to the members and friends of Cofer's Chapel Free Will Baptist church, in Nashville, Tenn., for the very satisfactory manner in which they have entertained this session of the General Conference. Per report of committee on correspondence, voted that any of our ministers in good standing who can do so without expense to this Conference, are authorized to represent us in the general meetings of other evangelical bodies. Per report of committee on Necrology adopted the following resolutions: Whereas within the Triennial Period just closed, at least, seventy of our ministers have died, all so far as we are informed, leaving a good record of piety, religion, spirituality and sound-

ness in the faith. Therefore we extend to their families and the churches of which they were pastors our sincere sympathy and condolence. Resolved, that in the death of Prof. Ransom Dunn, D. D., we recognize one of the greatest losses the Denomination has ever sustained and bow with his children and other surviving relatives in the deepest sorrow over this great bereavement. Per report of the committee on the State of the Denomination, appointed Elders Thos. E. Peden, E. T. Phillips and W. H. Frost a committee to revise and republish the Treatise. Received Elder L. W. Spann, of Indiania, as Fraternal Messenger from the General Baptists. Appointed Elder S. B. Stephens and wife Corresponding Messengers to the General Association of General Baptists to meet at Dexter, Missouri. Adjourned until 1:30, P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Prayer service led by Elder L. W. Spann. Elder S. B. Stephens read an able essay on Baptism for which a vote of thanks was tendered and request to have it published in the Free Will Baptist. Per further report on the State of the Denomination adopted the following resolution: We recognize the Free will Baptists of North Dakota, represented by Prof. H. F. Wogan, D. D., as a legitimate part of the Denomination, and endorse so far as we are informed the North Lakota University. Resolved that we are greatly cheered by the favorable reports, including revivals, church building, organization of new churches, and the better support of our schools in many parts of our country, and enter upon the new triennial period with greater hope and thankfulness than ever before. Adjourned till 7:30.

NIGHT SESSION.

The Advocates of Christian Fidelity held their anniversary and the Moderator, Elder P. T. Lucas, preached a sermon of much more than ordinary merit.

A very interesting Children's day exercises began at ten o'clock, under the direction of Elder G. W. Binkley and continued until twelve.

AFTERNOON SERVICES.

Elder S. B. Stephens preached a very instructive sermon on the Atonemert at 2 P. M., followed by the Lord's Supper and washing the Saint's feet.

NIGHT SERVICE.

Elder S. B. Stephens preached again at night with his usual fervency and power. The brethren sang a hymn and reluctantly gave each other the parting hand. The Conference adjourned to meet in three years at the place selected by the committee on location.
