F. W. B. GENERAL CONFERENCE.

The Triennial General Conference of the Free Will Baptist Denomination, met for its Thirty-Second Session, in Dunn, N. C., Oct. 5, 1904, at 10 a. m. A half hour's prayer service was conducted by Mrs. L. M. Peden of Ayden, N. C., in which great interest was manifested. Eld. R. C. Jackson of Cape Fear Conference, was chosen temporary moderator. In behalf of the Free Will Baptist Church and citizens of Dunn, he delivered a very appropriate address of welcome, to which Eld. J. W. Fuquay of the Western, N. C. Conference, responded in behalf of the assembled delegates. Appointed brethren, J. H. Pope of the Cape Fear Conference, W. R. Sawyer of the Eastern Conference and Eld. W. P. Gause of the South Carolina Conference, committee to select a minister to preach the conference sermon. 'Adjourned until 2 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Prayer service was led by Eld. S. L. Bodiford of the South Carolina Conference. Letters were read from Western, N. C. Conference, Horry, S. C. Conference, Mt. Moriah Conference, Peedee Conference, Chattahoochee Association, South Carolina Conference and Ohio River Yearly Meeting. Appointed a committee on each of the following subjects: education, home missions, foreign missions, temperance, ministry, state of denomination and Sabbath schools. Voted that the committee to select a preacher for the conference sermon fill all vacancies that may occur in the program throughout the session. Per selection of committee, Eld. R. C. Jackson preached the conference sermon at 7:30 p. m. Adjourned until 9 a. m. tomorrow.

The usual half hour's prayer service was conducted by Eld. J. E. Sawyer of the Eastern, N. C. Conference. A letter from Eld. E. L. St. Claire of Georgia was read announcing that on account of the dangerous sickness of his wife, he could not attend. A special prayer was offered for her speedy recovery and for God's blessings upon the necessarily absent brother. A letter from

Eld. G. W. Cherry of the State Line Association, Alabama, announced that he could not attend as he had not received money to pay his expenses.

Eld. A. B. Peavy preached at 11 ic. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The usual half hour's prayer service was led by Eld. S. L. Bodiford. Elected Eld. W. P. Gause Moderator, Eld. H. F. Wogan of North Dakota Yearly Meeting and Eld. J. J. Baggett, Assistants; Eld. T. E. Peden of the Ohio River Yearly Meeting, treasurer. Treasurer reported \$20.00 from all sources within the past three years. All paid out for printing minutes. This conference to the present time. Cape Fear \$5.00, Eastern \$5.00, South Carolina \$5.00, Midway \$2.50, Mt. Moriah \$2.00, B. H. Pate 25c, Morehead City 25c, Peedee \$2.00, total \$22.00. More is reported in the hands of brethren which will be credited as soon as received. Voted to have three thousand minutes of this conference printed and allow the clerk five dollars for preparing them. Prayer by Eld. C. A. Jackson.

7:30 P. M. ANNIVERSARY OF THE EDUCATION SOCIETY.

Opened with prayer. Moderator of Conference presiding. Adopted a constitution and voted to become incorporated. Addresses were delivered by Eld. P. T. Lucas of the Western, Conference, Eld. W. T. Wiley, Midway Association, Eld. W. P. Gause of S. C. Conference. Chose Eld. Thos. E. Peden, W. T. Wiley, W. H. Frost, A. B. Peavy and Dea. D. Lasley, Executive Committee.

Ост. 7, 9 а. м.

Prayer service conducted by Eld. J. B. Oliver of S. C. Authorized the executive committee to appoint a corresponding messenger to the General Baptist General Association and also to the General Eldership of the Church of God.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

2, p. m., Eld. W. T. Wiley of Georgia, led the usual prayer service. Committee on temperance made the following report which was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, the great evil of intemperance has and is effecting the morals of the church of God and our belov-

ed country. Therefore, Resolved, That temperance means total abstinence from all evil things and moderation in all things good and lawful. Resolved, That this triennial conference strongly impress upon the entire brotherhood within the United States the suppressing this degrading evil. We request each pastor to organize a temperance society in all his churches, to meet at least once per month, to advance the cause of total abstinence from all forms of intoxicating drinks. We advise our Theological Schools to receive no one as a ministerial student who smokes cigaretts.

7:30 P. M., HOME AND FOREIGN MISSION SOCIETY.

Prayer by Eld. A. B. Peavy. Lectures: on missions, by Elds. J. A. Blalock, J. J. Baggett, A. B. Peavy, J. W. Fuquay and Thos. E. Peden. Eld. E. L. Hutchison reported that he had kept up the regular appointments at Prattsville, Oh'o, raised a considerable sum for the meeting house, received one into the church. Eld. H. F. Wogan, that he had visited the mission points, in North Dakata, had interesting meeting and kept up the visibility of the cause in that State and is willing to continue his work as National Evangelist. T. E. Peden visited the West Va. Q. M., secured delegates to the Ohio River Y. M., preached at Wilson, Grafton and Crow Summit, in that State. Attended the Gallia, Jackson, Vinton, Portsmouth and Athens Q. M's., in Ohio, set things in order as far as possible and attended the Ohio River Yearly Meeting. Eld. S. B. Stephens, National Evangelist, preached in Ohio, Penn., W. Va., and N. C. The report of the committee on necrology adopted as follows: By the best information, we can obtain ninety-four Free Will Baptist ministers have died within the past three years, most of them in advanced age, like a shock of corn fully ripe, a few in comparative youth, when their usefulness had seemingly just commenced, a mystery that we cannot solve, but we rejoice that they all died in the faith, having lived lives of purity, sacrifice, industry and perseverance, thereby setting a Godly example worthy of imitation by those who are left behind, therefore we condole withtheir families and their friends in their sad bereavement and exhort them to comfort their hearts with the reflection that their husbands, fathers, brothers or other friends as the case may be, are now immersed in the joy and felicity of heaven, where they will continue praising God forever and ever. Whereas, Eld. G. W. Brinkly, of Nashville, Tenu, a very active member of the last General Conference, has been called from labor to reward. Therefore, Resolved, That in his death, we recognize the loss of an able minister, upright Christian and a true friend of the doctrine, usages and spirit of the denomination.

We ask the trustees of the Seminary to secure a suitable agent and send him to all our churches to secure funds for the completion of the Paul Palmer endowment of a Theological Professorship in the Seminary. We instruct our trustees to secure sites and found schools in W. Va., Ky., S. C., Ga., Texas, Ala., Ark., Ind. Ty., Mo., and other States and Territories as the Lord opens the way. Having what we consider credible evidence that Hillsdale College will be conducted in accordance with its charter and constitution, giving the Free Will Baptist a good majority of the faculty and trustees.
