Motion, seconded, carried to adopt the financial report of the Camp Board.


Motion, seconded, carried to adopt the amendment to the recommendation to add to the Camp facilities, i. e. bathroom facilities and the water supply.


Motion, seconded, carried to nominate a reporter for the next session for the Association. Rev. G. C. Lee nominated and elected.


V. The Promotional Secretary offered the services of the Promotional office for the various Boards.





All Distric⁺s seemed ⁺o have a very progressive and harmonious meeting without dissent or influence from any outsde interference contrary to our cooperative efforts on the local. state, or National level.

CONSTITUTION PREAMBLE

We, the Original Free Will Baptists of the State of Georgia, do ordain this Constitution for the purpose of advancing, promoting and increasing all phases of the cause of Christ.

ARTICLE I

Section 1. The assembly shall be known as the Georgia State Association of the Original Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, an Assistant Moderator, a Secretary, an assitant Secretary and a promotional Secretary-Treasurer.

Section 2. All regular officers and the chairman of each standing board shall compose the Executive Board.

Section 3. This Association shall be composed of all active Ministers,

Deacons and Missionaries who are members of any affiliated bodies. One delegate for every 500 members, or a fraction thereof of each district Association or Union Meeting, and one delegate for every 100 members or a fraction thereof of all local affiliated churches.

Section 4. All delegates from Associations, Union Meeting_s and local churches shall be elected from the laity of the body sending them.


Section 5. Funds to meet current needs of the body shall be paid in on a voluntary basis to the Treasurer of the Association, however, it is suggested that each Association give as shall be allocated to them each year by a committee, and that each Union meeting give five dollars and each local church give five cents per capita for their respective membership.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. It shall be the privilege of each affiliated Association to furnish a member of each standing board with terms of office rotating which will necessitate the election of four members every two years giving each member a term of office of four years each. The exception will be the board of auditors which shall consist of two members who shall be elected at the same time as the general officers.

Section 2. There shall be a board of missions composed of members who are noted for missionary zeal and they shall have the supervision of all mission interest sponsored by this body. All undesignated mission funds shall be equally divided between home and foreign.

Section 3. There shall be a board of Christian education whose duty it shall be to keep the body informed of all Christian education sponsored by the body and make such recommendations as they shall deem proper



to the body from time to time.

Section 4. There shall be a board of superannuation whose duty it shall be to make plans and rules which shall be in harmony with the National Suptrannuation Board And shall be authorized to formulate plans whereby necessary funds for superannuation may be raised.

Section 5. There shall be a board of trustees whose duty it shall be to hold titles of all property belonging to this body.

Section 6. A board of auditors, whose duties it shall be to audit the books of the Association Treasurer and the Treasurers of all boards.

Section 7. There shall be a camp board arranging the time of sessions, electing all faculty members, forming all the study courses, especially those leading to a completion with the issue of certificates.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. All officers, except board members, shall be elected to serve a term of two years.

Section 2. Any officer may be re-elected as the body shall see fit. Section 3. When vacancies occur for any cause they shall be filled by the Executive Board, or by any of the standing boards, subject to the approval of the Executive Board, until the convening of the annual session of the body.

Section 4. Election years shall take place on the odd years of the calendar.


Section 5. A member of any board who fails in the function of his or her duties without a reason, the board to which the delinquent members has been elected, shall declare the office vacant. Further, the body shall have and does reserve the right to deal with any officer or board member who does not conduct his or her office in a Christian and businesslike manner according to the rules of Christian conduct laid down in the New Testament. Should such board fail to have sufficient number of its members present to constitute a quorum, it shall become the duty of the Executive Board to deal with any delinquent member. Also, a charge against a member of this body and a member of a local church shall constitute a charge against said member in this body and the body abide accordingly.

Section 6. The duties of officers defined shall be the same as these for any deliberative assembly.

Section 7. All boards may be called in session only by the chairman of the Executive Board and any standing board may be called in session only by the chairman of said board, unless said chairman becomes incapacitated. in which case the assistant assumes the authority of said incapacitated chairman.

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution shall not be changed or altered except by a majority of all members present to regular session. All amendments shall lie on the table from the morning session until evening session or from evening session until morning prior to adoption and shall during the time be read



at least twice in open session. Additions of board or officers may be add-

ed as there is need.

We, your Committee on Temperance, wish to make the following report: We, as Free Will Baptist Church members, should be temperate in all activities. Some of these things such as the TV and Radio Program we see and listen to in our homes, and some kinds of magazines should be abstained from reading. Bible reading should take first place in our homes. We shouldn't go to places that would hurt our influence. We should be temperate in our sports activities, not letting them hinder our church work. We should not let any of our habits hurt our influence especially around our churches.

REV. EMMETT McDUFFIE REV. HUBERT HENDERSON LOUIS GRIMER RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

We, your Resolutions Committee, beg leave to submit the following recommendations and resolutions:

1. It shall be the privilege of each affiliated Association to furnish a member of each standing Board with terms of office rotating, which will necessitate the election of 4 members at each election session, giving each member a term of office of 4 years. The exception will be the Board of Auditors which shall consists of 2 members who shall be elected at the same time a_s the General Officers.

Inasmuch as more funds are needed for the operation of the Camp program, and, inasmuch as the required registration is quite a bit too low, be it therefore resolved that the fee for each camper be raised from the present requirement to \$10.00 a week for each camper.

2. Be it further resolved that we authorize our clerks to correspond with our representatives of our legislative bodies in Washington, D. C. urging them to suport legislation approving Bible reading and prayer in our Public Schools on a voluntary basis.



We recommend that \$15.00 and \$25.00 be appropriated out of the General fund as an honorariam for our Moderator and Clerk respectively.

We further recommend that 1500 minutes of this session of our State Association printed.

3. We recommend that this body stand in a moment of prayer as a Memorial to the 91 Brethren and Sisters who are reported to have gone to be with the Lord since our 1963 session of our Association.

Inasmuch as the Martin Association has done such a commendable job in their manner of entertainment during the siting of the 1964 session of the Georgia State Association, be it therefore resolved, that we extend a rising vote of thanks to all persons who have had to do with this wonderful service.

The Ministers shall have served one or more Churches for a reaosnable period of time, and during his Ministry, he must have shown good faith in the Welfare of his Chruches and the denomination, and a willingness in all denominational Enterprises.

Also the widow of a deceased Superannuate shall receive the same consideration as that of her husband, so long as she remains a widow and in good standing with the denomination.

The applicant should be recommended by the church where he holds membership, and the Association of which he is affiliated, and further, his local church must be in good fellowship with an Affiliated Association which is a member of the State Association.

We also recommend that each local Association or church that has applicant in mind, that they send a letter to the State Superannuates Board (as to his standing with said Association or Church.



CONSTITUTION

OF THE ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTISTS PREAMBLE

We, the Board of Missions of the State of Georgia of the Original Free Will Baptists, do ordain this Constitution and By-Laws for the purpose of promoting all missions endeavors of the Georgia State Association.

ARTICLE I

Name: This organization shall be known as the Georgia State Board of Missions of the Original Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE II

Members: This board shall be composed of one member from each district Association composing the Georgia Stale Association. If any member is employed by the board or is called to work with or pastor a mission or mission-church supported by the board, he will make known to his district association and relinquish his position on the mission board. ARTICLE III

Officers: Officers of this board shall be chairman, vice-chairman,

secretary and treasurer elected annually.

ARTICLE IV

Meetings: This board shall hold two regular meetings a year, to be decided by the board and meetings when necessary to be called by the chairman.

ARTICLE V

Committees: Committees shall be appointed by the board or its chair-Man as needs arise which would demand the work of a committee.

ARTICLE VI

Reports: Section 1. This board should report annually to the State Association, giving account of all funds received and disbursed, and activities of the board during the year and state objectves for the following year or any future plans.


Section II. The secretary and treasurer serving the mission board shall submit written reports to the board members as often as the board may deem it necessary. Also, that supports be submitted through our state publication as often as may be deemed necessary by the board.

ARTICLE VII

Finance: This board shall be supported by the quota of finances allotted to them by the State Association and any other raised by special offering in promoting missions and personal gifts.

ARTICLE VIII

Section 1. Missions: Missions receiving help from this board must ether be established or accepted by the board, and the board reserves the right to determine how much and how long financial assistance be granted to any mission. All missions will be under the supervision of the board as long as financial aid is given.

BY-LAWS

Duties of the Officers: Section 1. Chairman. He shall preside over each session, preserve order, govern the body accordingly to established parliamentary usage and appoint all temporary committees. He shall have the right to call meetings when it is necessary and where.

Section II. Vice Chairman: It shall be the duty of the vice-chairman to serve in the full capacity of the chairman when the chairman is absent.

Section III. Secretary and Treasurer: The secretary shall keep an accurate record of all transactions and the board meetings and preserve the same, keep all valuable documents and surrender same to his successor in office. Send out a report of the work of the board as often as the board requires. All funds shall be held and disbursed by the treasurer at the approval of the board.

Section IV. Ex-Officio Member: The chairman shall be ex-officio member of all committees.

Article 1. Voting is restricted to members or their proxies. Quorum: Four members will compose a quorum.

Article II. Amendments: This constitution and by-laws may be amended by two-thirds of the membership of the board voting favorable for the amendment.

The power of faith, the hope of heaven and the joy of salvation and service are in the hearts of Missionaries and converts because you have prayed and given to their ministry.


We have 65 Missionaries on the field or already appointed. This includes one Cuban pastor and his family now serving in Panama. There are also 63 children in our missionary family.

EDUCATION BOARD REPORT

The Christian Education Board of Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists in the past has placed emphasis upon giving financial aid to students to go to the Bible College for the purpose of mainly becoming ministers and missionary workers.

The Board still feels this is a worthy and needed plan, however it is felt that most will agree that the returns for the financial aid given has been very small. The number of ministers in our state having received aid from this plan has been small.

In view of this, the Education Board has charged itself with the duty of trying to draw up a program to present to the people of Georgia, which will beter train our people for Christian service in our denomination over the state. In other words we are planning to shift some of our emphasis from financial aid to students to the programs which will train our people throughout the state for better Christian service. We feel there is a need for such programs, and the objective of this board is to present ways to meet these needs.

There is no intention the boards part to eliminate financial aid to students as we feel the need of conlinuing this service, on a limited basis, but in view of the fact that much of the money loaned out has never been paid back and many apparently have no intentions to pay it back. It is the board's feeling that some of the funds channeled to this board should result in fruitful returns as soon as possible, and for this reason, our channels of hinking have been turned to an educational program to train our people to be better ministers, betler teachers and better laymen, thereby serving the Lord in a better and greater way.


We would like to get a plan approved to offer an Extension Study Course program from the Bible College, ,which would be held at Camp Mt. Bethel during the week from Jan. 11 through Jan. 16, 1965. We plan to offer courses in three fields of study.

1. In fields of practical study or studies. This course consists of sermon preparing, personal witnessing and teaching.

2. Doctrine course. This course would offer study on salvation, trinity or maybe the Free Will Baptist doctrine.

Bible study, study in books of the Bible such as Galatians, Ephesians and so on.

We plan to work out a cost for such courses during this week of study. It would probably cost \$3.00 per person or if a person attending the entire week and took all three, the cost would be \$9.00 per person, plus food. For the program to be a success, we feel there would be a need to have 15 in attendance, although it would be hoped that there would be more for the night course than the day course. The week's study would probably work like this. Two courses would be studied in the morning. The afternoons would be free for study and research and then another course would be studied at night.

offer towards such a program and who can teach these courses.

The week of January 11 through 16 is picked for two reasons. First: this is between semesters at the Bible College and the only time a teacher from the College is available. Two: this is a slow period for revivals and we would hope that many pastors could be able to go for study during the week, also farmers would not be too busy and some might be able to go at that time.

We have contacted Rev. Charles Thigpen of the College and find that Professor Leroy Forlines can come the week of Jan. 11, 1965 and be the instructor. We find that he can teach in fields of practical study, a course on personal evangelism, this course is designed to aid people to do personal work, discussing the problems encountered, along with putting emphasis on the use of certain scriptures in witnessing.

In the field of doctrine, he can teach Free Will Baptist doctrine, a study of the major beliefs of the Free Will Baptists and views of Free Will Baptists. In the field of Bible, he can teach the books of Galatians, with attention given to authorship, historical background of the book and interpretation of the text of the book.

The course on personal evangelism would probably be offered at night since more would probably come at this time.

In working out this course, we will have to work out with the Camp Board, some loopholes, but as previously stated, we feel that with as many as fifteen in attendance for the full week, will be enough to pay the instructor and pay our obligations to the Camp Board.

In the future we also hope to work out a program where we can offer three or four 1/2 day workshops over the state, giving information on vacation Bible Schools.

We hope to work out some program where we can present a 1 day workshop in each association throughout the state, to offer studies for beachers of our Sunday Schools church training service.

We would like to say that these types of Christian Education programs are not new in the Free Will Baptist organization, as other states are offering such programs in Christian Education.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION GEORGIA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 1. NAME: The name of this Board shall be the Board of Christian Education of the Georgia State Association of the Original Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE 2. PURPOSE: The purpose of this Board shall be to organize and have the general supervision of such Christian Educational programs as delegated to it by the Georgia State Association of the Original Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE 3. MEMBERSHIP: Each district association affiliated with the State Association shall be entitled to one member on the Board. Thus necessitating eight members elected by the State Association with terms of office rotating, so four members will be elected at one election year and four members at the next election year; giving each member a term of office of four years each.

ARTICLE 4. OFFICERS: The officers of this Board shall be a chairman, vice-chairman and a secretary-treasurer.

ARTICLE 5. MEETINGS: This Board shall hold two regular meetings a year, time and place of meetings to be decided by the Board. When necessary the chairman shall have the right to call a meeting or a meeting may be called by a quorum of members.

ARTICLE 6. COMMITTEES: Committees shall be appointed by the Board or its chairman as needs arise which would demand the work of a committee.

ARTICLE 7. REPORTS: This Board shall report annually to the State Association, giving account of all funds received and disbursed, and functions of the Board during the year. The report should include objectives for the following year and any future plans being considered by the Board.

ARTICLE 8. FINANCE: This Board shall be supported by the quota of finances allocated to it from the Cooperative Plan by the Georgia State Association and special offerings which might be received in promoting Christian Education.

ARTICLE 9. AMENDMENTS: This Constitution may be amended at any regular or special meeting of this Board by a quorum of the members provided said amendment shall have been presented in the preceeding Board meeting. Thus bringing any proposed amendment before the Board in two separate meetings.

BY-LAWS

Section 1. MEMBERS: Members belonging to this Board should posses a natural aptitude for leadership in the field of Christian Education.

Delinquent members shall be dealt with as provided for in Article IV,

Section 5, of the Constitution of the Georgia State Association of the Origi-

Section 2. OFFICERS: The officers, chairman, vice-chairman and secre.ary- treasurer shall be elected ouring or immediately following the annual session of the Georgia State Association. These officers shall be elected for a period of one year. It is provided, however, that should said Board, for any cause, fail to convene at this time, all officers shall be re-tained until their successors have been elected.

Section 3. CHAIRMAN: The Chairman shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall have the right to call meetings when necessary and serve in whatever capacity assigned to him by the Board.

Section 4. Vice-Chairman: It shall be the duty of the Vice-chairman to serve in the full capaci.y of the chairman when the chairman is absent. If both the Chairman and Vice-Chairman should be absent and there is a quorum of regular members present, a temporary chairman may be chosen to serve during the meeting.

Section 5. SECRETARY-TREASURER: The Secretary - Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all transactions of the Board meetings and preserve the same, keep all valuable documents and surrender same to his successor in office. All funds shall be held and disbursed by the treasurer at the approval of the Board. The Secretary-Treasurer of this Board shall submit written reports to the board members as often as the Board may deem it necessary. Also, reports should be submitted through

our State Publication as often as the Board may deem it wise.

Section 6. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall be made up of the Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Secretary-Treasurer.

Section 7. DUTIES: Consider and act on all questions affecting the interest of the Board which must have immediate attention but would not justify the calling of a board meeting when a quorum is not present.

Section 8. QUORUM: A majority of the members of this Board in attendance at any called or regular meeting of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

Section 9. AMENDMENTS: These By-Laws may be amended at any regular or special meeting of a quorum of the members provided said amendment shall have been presented in the preceeding Board meeting. Thus bringing any proposed amendment before the Board in two separate meetings.



REPORT OF THE PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

"The Lord hath done great things for us: whereof we are glad." (Psalms 126:3) With rejoicing and thanksgiving to God, we give this annual report to the 28th session of the Georgia State Association of the Original Free Will Baptists. Truly the Lord has done great things for us. His blessings will be very evident as this report reflects the accomplishments of the past year. To be sure He is due all the praise, the glory and the honor.

PRCMOTION: Your Promotional Secretary has traveled extensively during the past year in the interest of our State Association. Thirty-seven churches were visited with preaching assignments filled. Attended all State meetings. As much as possible I attended the various meetings of each of the district associations. In addition, I attended a meeting for State Promotional Secretaries and Directors of the different departments of the National Association that was held in Nashville, Tenn.; the Christian Camp and Conference Association held in Clinton, S. C. and the National Association which met in Kansas City, Missouri. Other areas of promotion included itinerates for the Free Will Baptist Bible College, C. T. S. Department, National Executive Department, one Foreign Missionary and one National Home Missionary with services held in each of the district associations, which I believe was very profitable to all concerned. Two weeks were spent as an instructor in Youth Camp work. Several workshops were conducted in which every ministry of the State Association was represented in a very specific way. The State Promotional Bullentin is now going into more than eight hundred homes each month.

OUR STEWARDSHIP: Denominational giving for the year 1963-64 (October through September) was \$49,229.25 for all State and National causes. A three year comparison follows:

1961-62-\$12,356.81; 1962-63-\$12,171.92; 1963-64-\$12,872.68

Of the 121 churches affiliated with the State Association, 106 gave support to a world-wide ministry through the Unified Program. 17 churches gave their suggested quota or above, 49 churches gave more this year than last, 7 churches gave the same, and 33 others shared by giving cooperatively to denominational ministries through the State Office.

APPRECIATION: I would like to express my sincere appreciation to each individual, pastor and church who has shared with us in this ministry. I trust that we will be encouraged in our total effort by the accomplishments of this past year and that we will make an even greater investment in the Cause of Christ through our State Promotional Office in the coming year.



Bro. Russell Horne led in singing the opening hymns, "Standing On The Promises" and "He Keeps Me Singing."


The president, Bro. Goorge Lee called the convenion to order.

Bro. Houston, from the Midway Associaton, invited the State Sunday School Convention to meet in the Midway Association next year. The invitation was accepted.







CONSTITUTION OF THE GEORGIA STATE SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION OF THE ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTISTS

The Sunday School of the Free Will Baptist Churches of Georgia do hereby ordain this constitution for the purpose of advancing every phase of the Sunday School endeavors set forth herein.

Article 1. The name of this convention shall be known as the State Sunday School Convention of Georgia Free Will Baptists.

Article 2. The purpose of this convention shall be to secure cooperation and unity of action and to promote every phase of the Sunday School work as represented by the Sunday School cause of the denomination.

Article III. The convention shall be composed by delegates and ministers from the district and local Sunday Schools. Delegates to be worked out may be provided for in the By-Laws which may be drafted by this body.

Article IV. The officers of this body shall be a president, vice-president, recording secretary, and treasurer and such other officers as may be provided for from time to time. Standing, temporary or session committee may be considered officers of the body which is serving.

Article V. The executive committee may consist of all the standing officers with the addition of others as the body may deem wise and proper.

Article VI. The convention may be financed by means which may be worked out from time to time and included in the By-Laws.

Article VII. All standing officers shall be elected annually at the close of the convention session, and the installation of newly elected officers to be the last item on the program each year.

Article VIII. The convention shall convene on second Saturday in June each year, unless otherwise arranged.

Article IX. The program of the convention will consist of items as may be arranged by a program committee, and the usual order of business as of any deliberate body.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE 1-DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. President: It shall be the duty of the president to preside over each session, preserve order, govern the body according to established parliamentary usage, and appoint all temporary committees and substitute officers. The president shall also be a member of any chairman of the executive committee.

Section 2. Vice-President: It shall be the duty of the vice-president to serve in the full capacity of the president when the president is absent. The vice-president shall be a member of the executive committee.

Section 3. Secretary-Treasurer: It shall be the duty of the secretarytreasurer to take minutes of all proceedings, and read them for approval, and to record and keep all money and pay for what ever the convention elects to pay; also the secretary-treasurer shall deliver his or her successsor all records and money. The secretary-treasurer shall be a member of the executive committee and shall serve as clerk of the executivie committee.

Sec ion 4. Assistant Secretary-Treasurer: It shall be the duty of the assistant treasurer to take the place of the secretary-treasurer when he or she is absent. The assistant secretary shall be a member of the executive committee.

Section 5. Ex-Officio Members: The president shall be an ex-officio member of all committees of the convention.

ARTICLE 2-VOTING

Section 1. All questions coming before the convention shall be decided by a majority vote, in case of a tie, the president shall vote.

Section 2. Voting shall be restricted to all officers of the convention— Ministers, superintendents and delegates from each district convention. also each Sunday School.

Section 3. Each district convention shall be entitled to five delegates. Each Sunday School two delegates.

ARTICLE 3—DUES

Each distict convention shall send \$5.00 to the convention. Each Sunday School shall send \$1.00 to the convention.

ARTICLE 4—AMENDMENTS

Any amendments to this constitution and by-laws may be secured by two-'hirds majority vote, provided such an amendment has been presented to the executive committee 90 days before the date of the convention, and has been approved by the executive committee.




