PROCEEDINGS OF ANNUAL MEETING

The Forty-Ninth Annual Session of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists convened at the Norman Baptist Assembly, Norman Park, Georgia, on November 14-16, 1985. The theme of the meeting was "Biblical Stewardship in the Local Church," taken from 1 Corinthians 4:2. Music was provided by song leader, Ken Faison, and pianist, Mrs. Shirley Kimbrel.

THURSDAY EVENING

Rev. Jack Lysaker, the presiding officer, welcomed the audience to the meeting. Rev. Ken Faison led the congregation in singing "There Shall Be Showers Of Blessings." Prayer was led by Rev. Danny Ryalls. The Clerk, Rev. Ronald Wallace, declared the meeting opened for business with the reading of Psalms 19:14. The Officers of the State Association were introduced. Moderator, William Morris, recognized the visitors and delegates present. A total of 155 were attending the service.

The Moderator appointed the Committee on Committees made up of the following: Eugene Ross, Chairman, with Reuben Cason, Curtis Alligood, James Ursrey and Roger Russell serving.

A recommendation from the Executive Board proposing a constitutional change in Article III, Section 3, point A. was considered for adoption by reading the change and placing it on the table.

Rev. Ken Faison led the congregation in singing "Faith Is The Victory" and "He Keeps Me Singing." Prayer was rendered by Rev. Billy Sharpston. An offering of \$173.43 was received for expense of the meeting. Special music was provided by the Clenny Quartet from the Bellview Church. Rev. Billy Hanna brought the evening message using the theme "Stewardship Of Our Talent," taken from Matthew 25:14-30. The congregation sang "I Surrender All" as an invitational hymn.

Rev. Ricky Cason gave a partial report of the Credentials Committee revealing a voting delegation of 84 with a total registration of 121. A motion to recess was accepted. Rev. Glenn Thomas closed in prayer.

FRIDAY MORNING

The presiding officer, Rev. Mickey Broadway, welcomed the 182 delegates and visitors to the service. Rev. James Ursrey directed the congregation in singing "Leaning On The Everlasting Arms." Rev. Willie Sumner led in prayer. The special music was provided by Rev. Len Blanchard with the singing of "It Is Finished." Missionary to France, Rev. Allan Crowson, developed the devotional theme "The Stewardship Of Our Time," using the text Romans 13:11.

A partial report of the Credentials Committee stated a voting delegation of 109 with a total registration of 164. The Moderator recognized the standing delegates and entertained a motion to seat the elected delegates.

The Committee on Committees report was given by Rev. Eugene Ross. The following were elected to serve on the Nominating Committee: Rev. Mance Cason, Chairman, with Rev. Glenn Thomas, Rev. Ken Faison, Rev. Billy Hanna and Rev. Irvin Murphy serving. The following were elected to serve on the Resolutions Committee for the year 1986: Rev. Rex Lynn, Chairman, with Mrs. Janice Wallace, Mr. Herman Irvin, Rev. Willie Martin and Rev. Roger Spivey serving.

The Clerk gave the Executive Board report. A motion was adopted to receive the report and to act on selected items separately. All items recommended in the report were adopted. The full report is recorded in the minutes.

The Executive Secretary's report was given by Herbert Waid. The report was adopted and is recorded in its entirety in the minutes.

Rev. Irvin Hyman directed the congregation in singing "'Tis So Sweet To Trust In Jesus." Dr. Melvin Worthington led in prayer. An offering of

\$92.17 was received for expense of the meeting. Special music was provided by a volunteer Men's Choir. Rev. Ken Faison directed as the men sang "At The Cross." Rev. N. R. Smith, special guest from Hillsdale College, brought the message based on the theme "Stewardship Of Our Trust."

Mr. Howard Price led in prayer as the body recessed for lunch.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Rev. Jack Lysaker led the congregation in singing "Since Jesus Came Into My Heart." Prayer was led by Rev. Roger Russell. Special music was provided by Mr. Russell Brewton. The presiding officer, Rev. Johnny Beasley, introduced the speaker Mr. Bobby Roberts, who developed the theme "Stewardship Of Our Tithes."

The Executive Secretary, Herbert Waid, recognized the leading givers through the Cooperative Plan. A plaque was given to the church giving the most overall, and the leading church in each district association.

The Moderator called for reports from the State Ministries. The Georgia Woman's Auxiliary report was given by Mrs. Martha Everson. A recommendation was adopted granting permission for the State Auditing Committee to audit the books of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The following reports were adopted: The State Master's Men report given by Mr. Richard Hays; The Board of Christian Education report given by Rev. Mance Cason; The Board of Camping report given by Rev. Luther Burns; The Board of Trustees report given by Mr. Emmett Dunaway; and The Board of Missions report given by Mr. Malcolm Freeman.

The following reports were received as information from the National Ministries: The National Executive Office report given by Dr. Melvin Worthington; The Free Will Baptist Bible College report given by Dr. L. C. Johnson; The Sunday School and C.T.S. Department report given by latter read

Rev. Billy Sharpston; The National Master's Men report given by Mr. Jim Vallance; and The Foreign Missions Board report given by Rev. Jimmy Aldridge.

Rev. Ricky Cason gave a partial report of the Credentials Committee stating a voting delegation of 122 and a total of 182 registering.

The Nominating Committee gave a partial report. The nominees were elected to the following State Boards: Board of Trustees; Board of Missions; Board of Camping; and Board of Christian Education. (The newly elected Board members and Board members elected to serve unexpired terms are listed in the section of the Minutes containing Officers, Board and Committee Members.)

A motion to recess was accepted. Rev. Bill Robinson closed in prayer.

FRIDAY EVENING

Mr. Malcolm Freeman, representing the State Missions Board, was the presiding officer. Rev. Ken Faison directed the congregation in singing "The Light Of The World Is Jesus" and "Redeemed." Mr. Troy Dykes opened in prayer. Georgia State Missionary Jack Lysaker rendered the special music.

Georgia missionaries addressed the audience with brief reports. Miss Debbie Griffin, appointee to Japan; Rev. Luther Burns serving in South Atlanta, Riverdale; and Rev. Ronald Wallace serving in North Atlanta, Marietta each gave words of appreciation for prayers and support. A missions offering of \$284.00 was received.

The Missions Service message on the theme "Stewardship Of Our Teaching" was delivered by Rev. Jimmy Aldridge. A time of prayer was called for at the end of the service. The Georgia missionaries gathered at the altar. The pastors of the state knelt around them for prayer. Rev. C. B. Dowdney led the prayer.

After announcements, Rev. Leroy Lowery closed in prayer.

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SATURDAY MORNING

Mr. Russell Brewton led the congregation in singing "When We All Get To Heaven." Prayer was offered by Rev. Ken Faison. Special music was provided by Miss Paige Jordan and Miss Susie Moore from the Albany Church. A devotional message on the theme "Stewardship Of Our Truth" was brought by Rev. Amos McMillan.

A report from the State Ministers Fellowship was given by Rev. Billy Sharpston. The report was received as information.

Rev. Carlton Lambert gave a report for the Alabama Children's Home. The report was received as information.

A report from the National Home Missions Board was by letter read by Rev. Ronald Wallace. The report was received as information.

Rev. N. R. Smith gave a report for the National Board of Retirement and Insurance. The report was received as information. Rev. Smith also reported on the number of appointments made with him concerning Wills and Estate Planning during the State Meeting.

The Resolutions Committee report was given by Rev. Jack Lysaker. A motion passed to receive the report and act on each item separately. The resolutions adopted are recorded in the minutes.

The final report of the Credentials Committee revealed a voting delegation of 130 with a total of 204 registering. The complete report is included in the minutes.

Mrs. Marian James gave the report of the Auditing Committee. The report was adopted.

A motion passed granting the State Master's Men permission to establish a State Master's Men Board. The Board will be made up of one elected representative from each district association. This board is to report to the State Meeting.

The following were elected as delegates to the National Association Convention meeting in July in Tulsa, Oklahoma: Mr. Gleason Fowler, Mrs. Mary Lee Fowler, Mrs. Debbie Lynn, Mr. James Horne, and Mr.

Caffery Harris. Alternates for the meeting are: Mrs. Linda Blanchard, Mr. Edward Kimbrel, Mrs. Patricia Tilley, Mrs. LaDohnna Freeman, and Mrs. Shirley Sharpston.

The Nominating Committee gave a final report which was adopted as follows: Elected to the Credentials Committee were Rev. Ricky Cason, Mrs. Dorcas Scarborough, and Mrs. Edith Shiver; Elected to the Auditing Committee were Mrs. Marian James and Mrs. Louvenia Kleedehn, with a third member to be appointed by the Executive Board.

The following General Officers were elected: Moderator, Rev. Ronald Wallace; Assistant Moderator, Rev. Bill Robinson; Clerk, Rev. James Ursrey; and Assistant Clerk, Rev. Eugene Ross.

A rising vote of appreciation was given to the Moderator and out-going General Board members.

A rising vote of appreciation was given to the Executive Secretary, Herbert Waid, and Mrs. Geraldine Waid for a job well done.

A motion to adjourn was adopted. Prayer was led by Rev. Billy Sharpston.

EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

NEW FORMAT APPROVED FOR PROMOTIONAL BULLETIN

The Executive Secretary was given leeway in expanding the size of the Promotional Bulletin. The new size features larger paper, more pages and opportunity for larger type.

A COMMISSION ON MORAL AND CIVIC CONCERNS APPOINTED

In accordance with a resolution adopted at the State Meeting, a Commission on Moral and Civic Concerns was appointed. The members serving are Billy Sharpston, Willie Martin, and Leroy Lowery. Mileage and expenses incurred by the Commission will be provided by the State Office.

FORM LETTER FOR GEORGIA CHURCHES APPROVED

In light of the need to have complete information as far as possible from our churches, a new Church Letter was approved. The information gathered from this letter will aid the State Office in serving our churches more completely.

FINANCIAL STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT

A motion adopted at the State Meeting retained the Pastor Tenure Study Committee and directed it to pursue a study concerning the financial condition of ministers in Georgia. The Financial Study Committee report is printed for distribution at the 1985 Annual Meeting. The report is recommended for your approval. GEORGIA PARTICIPATES IN THE FOREIGN MISSIONS ADVANCE PROGRAM

At a joint meeting of the Executive Board and the Foreign Missions Department, the Advance Foreign Missions project was presented and then adopted by the Executive Board. The project is to raise one million dollars over a period of three years to support special projects at the different Foreign Mission works around the world. Rev. Billy Hanna, pastor of the First Church, Albany, will serve as the State Advance Chairman.

CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGE AFFECTING CAMP BOARD

At a joint meeting of the Board of Trustees and the Board of Camping, a decision was reached setting a spending limit for new construction by the Board of Camping at \$2,500 without having to consult the Board of Trustees. Any project over \$2,500 must be approved by the Board of Trustees. This action requires a change in the Constitution.

GEORGIA TO INVITE THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION CONVENTION IN THE '90'S

The Georgie State Association will submit a request to the National planning committee for the National Association Convention to be held in Georgia during the decade of the '90's.

PERSONNEL SALARIES INCREASED

The salary of the Executive Secretary was increased from \$1,200 monthly to \$1,340 monthly. The salary of the Office Secretary was increased from \$400 monthly to \$450 monthly. Along with the salary increases goes our heart-felt appreciation for a job well done from these servants.

COMPUTER PURCHASED FOR STATE OFFICE

After several months of careful consideration and study of the needs for a computer for the State Office, the purchase of an IBM Computer System with the Printer Accessories and needed Software was approved at a total cost not to exceed \$7,000.

STATE BUDGET PROPOSED FOR 1986-87 FISCAL YEAR

A proposed State Budget of \$400,000 with a 50%/50% breakdown between the State and National ministries is submitted for your approval.

PROGRAM COMMITTEE REPORT

The Program Committee for the State Meeting developed the program theme of "Biblical Stewardship in the Local Church," taken from 1 Corinthians 4:2. The Committee members are Herbert Waid, Billy Sharpston and Mance Cason.

SITE FOR STATE MEETING 1986-1987

The meeting site for 1986 and 1987 will be Norman Baptist Assembly, Norman Park, Georgia.

CHANGE IN FISCAL YEAR FOR STATE ASSOCIATION

The present fiscal year is July-June for our State ministries. The change would be to a calendar year (January-December) for all State Boards, Committees, etc., and for the State Office. This will give a different time for bookkeeping and accounting.

EXECUTIVE SECRETARY/TREASURER REPORT

What a joy it is to know and serve our Wonderful Lord. God is good to Georgia Free Will Baptists.

As a whole our churches have good men in their pulpits. Men who love God, know His Word, serve their congregations well and seek to lead the lost to Christ.

Generally speaking our deacons are not lazy either. They are the best helpers their pastor has.

By and large, our Sunday School people are doing a progressively better job.

Our State boards are fine tuning their ministries. Greater efficiency and quality are goals being achieved. More is in the planning stage.

The next praise item is both the cause and the effect of the above. More and more we are seeing progress in our homogeneity. We are relating better and better to each other. Call it family, call it togetherness, call it cooperation, or we may call it behaving as "Christ's Body." No part is dispensable, unworthy nor unnecessary. Every part has his unique value to the whole. Together we foster, encourage

and promote progress. Progress is dependent upon togetherness.

You will see from our reports that we have good reason to commend our people and to praise the Lord. But, as always, we could do better.

The following is simply an effort to illustrate with current facts the effect of disproportionate designated giving in relationship to our COOPerative giving. There is no open or veiled intention to discredit any of our State or National ministries. We are "for" every one of them. That is why they are in the budget in the first place. We could have gone to some National ministries to bear out this truth but to have done so would have bogged us down in even more details that would have led us even farther from the point we are trying to make. This point is, if all of our churches were to become actively involved in giving 10% of their church's undesignated receipts into the Georgia State Budget COOPeratively, what a blessing it would be to our total State and National ministries.

The only ministry in the Georgia State Budget's half set aside for Georgia State ministries that reached its 1984-1985 budget goal is the Alabama Children's Home. The Alabama Children's Home received a greater percentage of the State Budget than the combined percentage of (1) The Board of Camp Mt. Bethel, (2) The Board of Christian Education (Georgia Bible Institute, State Youth Committee, Historical Society, Minister's Retreat, Pastor/Pastor's Wife Retreat), (3) The Board of Trustees, and (4) The Executive Board.

In dollars and cents this means, due to designated giving, the Alabama Children's Home received \$705.36 more than the combined budget receipts of the four (we have only five boards in all) above Georgia State boards with their multiple ministries.

Every Georgia State ministry, in keeping with the Georgia State Association's directive, is financially dependent on COOPerative Giving receipts. No Georgia State ministry encourages designated giving to their needs. To illustrate this point, when your Executive Secretary receives speaking honorariums this money is not channeled into "his" department, the State Office, but rather into the COOPerative receipts account. The State Office only receives its proportionate part as voted by the State Association when adopting the State Budget.

Projected ministries' needs are reflected in the Georgia State Budget goals. This budget is the means whereby Georgia State Constitutionally mandated ministries are funded.

The Alabama Children's Home is worthy of our support. However, no other State ministry even came close to their annual budget goal. The Alabama Children's Home well over doubled theirs. No other State ministry has a "drive" to boost its income. All of the rest of the State ministries, willingly, have their financial destiny interrelated with every other State ministry. Georgia State ministries depend upon receiving their proportionate part of our Georgia State churches' COOPerative giving.

Thankfully, more and more of our churches are catching the vision of a State whose individual parts freely interrelate with each other: churches cooperating with churches, boards cooperating with boards, and consequently, churches cooperating with boards through the Georgia State Budget COOPeratively.

Designated giving is always honored. Designated giving is never discouraged. However, COOPerative giving is always encouraged. If we as a State ever come close to realizing our potential of ministering to our own and reaching out to others, we have to do it together. Not one of us is large enough to be independent, nor is there one of us too small to help. Everyone is important. Everyone counts. Everyone may have a share in the blessing.

You can see from the following reports that we are experiencing a healthy increase in our COOPerative receipts. For this we praise the Lord and thank our faithful churches. Niggardliness is not becoming to any person or church. Take heart faithful ones, "...be ye...always abounding in the work of the Lord,

BOARD OF CAMPING REPORT

The statistical report included covers a time period beginning July 1, 1984 and ending with June 30, 1985. This is due to our present associational year format. In this time, we had 7 weeks of camp (Georgia 6, Alabama 1) with 432 campers and 93 staff. There were 45 salvation decisions, 111 rededications, and 3 felt the call to a special service or ministry.

A more up-to-date report (June-August) of this year shows a total of 8 weeks of camp (Georgia 7, Alabama 1) with 429 campers and 94 staff One camp session, Martin/Midway, reported 13 saved and 17 rededications.

One of the negatives of our year was that under our system of associations having and directing their week of camp, we have some associations that were understaffed. Some felt the pinch in the area of teaching, some in dormitory supervisors/counselors, while others lacked in people available for the kitchen and general overall help. We are undertaking a program that we feel will help to correct this problem and will help our camping program to be more efficient in its use of time, talents of the people involved and the money invested.

The main features of the program will be a summer-time director who will work with the associations, using as many of their people as are available plus others from across the state who can help in special areas. He will be in touch with our associations and those from within the associations who can help in their week of camp as well as soliciting help for the associations who might not be able to provide all their staff.

Brother Roger Spivey, Pastor of the Corinth Free Will Baptist Church near Tifton will be our director. Associational Camp Boards or Camp Committees will need to contact him and meet with him as soon as possible so as to lay the groundwork for next summer's camping program. Please note that associations will still need to reserve their week of camp.

We did a study of the cost of camp as it relates to the weekly sessions. From the available figures, it cost our associations approximately \$32.50 per camper to cover the cost of the week. This takes into account the fact that the director and staff did not pay but were included in the total cost of the week. The camping fee under our new system will be \$35.00 per camper. This will cover the camp rental fee heretofore paid by the association. The fee for reserving the week of camp will remain the same (\$50) and the association will be liable for this.

We want to thank the Master's Men for the excellent job they did in their work day. Many of our needs were met through their efforts.

Please pray for your Board of Camping and particularly our new program.

treasurers of the various boards have been diligent in their record keeping and have done a good job. Since the Auditing Committee is not independent of the "State Association" there is no attempt on its part to certify the statements.

The statements of the Executive Office were found to be in order and properly documented by signed receipts, canceled checks and well-kept records. The same was true for the Mission Board, Georgia Bible Institute, Trustee Board and Camp Board. The statements for the Board of Christian Education and the Christian Supply Store had to be developed by the Auditing Committee from the information provided.

The statements for the Christian Supply Store were developed by the Auditing Committee after examining the records. The manager and personnel inventoried the store on July 1, 1985, and the value of the inventory was determined by the calculations of Mrs. Charlene Neuenschwander and Mrs. Louvenia Kleedehn. In general, the records of the store were in good order and were adequate for developing the financial statements. A few minor errors were found which resulted solely from a lack of understanding of some accounting procedures.

As a whole the record keeping of the various boards is more than adequate.

The State Office is to be commended for the professional record keeping system they have established. The Auditing Committee would like to express their thanks to Rev. and Mrs. Herbert Waid for the assistance they gave in obtaining the records from the various boards and for providing a place for the Committee to meet to perform their duties.

Again, we would like to stress the importance of each Board preparing their financial statements before presenting their records for audit.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

GEORGIA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

PREAMBLE

We, the Original Free Will Baptists of the State of Georgia, do ordain this Constitution for the purpose of advocating, promoting and increasing all phases of the Cause of Christ.

ARTICLE I

This assembly shall be known as the Georgia State Association of the Original Free Will Baptists, Inc.

ARTICLE II

SECTION 1. The officers of this association shall be a Moderator, an Assistant Moderator, a Clerk, an Assistant Clerk, and an Executive Secretary-Treasurer.

SECTION 2. The Executive Board shall be composed of the regular officers; the chairman of each of the standing boards; and the previous moderator, as an ex-officio member for a period of two years following his term of office.

SECTION 3. This association shall be composed of all active Ministers, Deacons, Missionaries, and Board Members who are members of affiliated bodies: one (1) delegate for every three hundred (300) members or fraction thereof from District Associations; one (1) delegate for every one hundred (100) members or fraction thereof from each local affiliated church.

SECTION 4. All delegates from District Associations and local churches shall be elected from the laity of the body sending them.

SECTION 5. Funds to meet current needs of this body shall be paid to the treasurer of this

association. Each District Association will give a minimum of fifteen dollars (\$15) per delegate authorized, and each local church will give ten cents (\$.10) per capita of their respective memberships.

SECTION 6. In order to pay our Georgia State Association's annual representation fee to the National Association, each local association is to be responsible to promote, receive and forward the amount designated by the National Association per church per year to the State Office, along with their annual State Association representation fee, on or before our annual State Association session.

ARTICLE III

SECTION 1. It shall be the privilege of each affiliated District Association to recommend a member for each standing board. Terms of office on these boards shall be on a rotating basis which will necessitate the election by the State Association of five (5) members every two (2) years, thus giving each member a four (4) year term of office.

SECTION 2. There shall be a Board of Missions composed of members who are noted for their mission-ary zeal. This board shall have supervision of all missions interests sponsored by this body.

SECTION 3. There shall be a Board of Camping whose duties shall be:

- A. To be responsible for maintenance, upkeep and insurance of Camp Mt. Bethel. This Board is to repair, modify or alter any building at Camp Mt. Bethel at their discretion with the provision that the Board of Trustees shall be considered if the cost of a project is to exceed \$2,500. The above "shall be considered" here means that the Board of Camping and the Board of Trustees shall function as a single joint board with co-equal authority and responsibility.
- B. To schedule and arrange all camp sessions to be held at Camp Mt. Bethel, and to appoint the Camp Director each year. It is understood and agreed in this connection that the Camp Director shall be in

authority in matters of faculty, curriculum, administration, food service, and recreation during camp sessions.

SECTION 4. There shall be a Board of Christian Education whose duties shall be:

- A. To set policy and supervise the operation of Georgia Bible Institute. This Board shall appoint a President and a Dean to carry out Board policy. Also, the faculty, curriculum, materials, tuition, salaries and benefits are subject to the approval of this Board.
- B. To set policy and supervise the functions of a State Youth Committee. This Board shall appoint this Committee to carry out Board policy.
- C. To set policy and supervise the functions of a Historical Committee. This Board shall appoint this Committee to gather and set forth for public knowledge and posterity the history of Georgia Free Will Baptists.
- D. To set policy and supervise the functions of the Ministerial Fellowship. The Ministerial Fellowship shall elect its own officers.

All educational services sponsored by the Georgia State Association shall be under the sponsorship of this Board. Such things as annual Sunday School and Church Training Service seminars shall be the responsibility of this Board to plan, promote and supervise.

SECTION 5. There shall be a Board of Trustees whose duties shall be to hold titles to all real property belonging to this body; the maintenance and upkeep of all such properties; the planning and supervision of all future developments; and expansion of these properties as directed by this association except as otherwise provided in this Constitution.

SECTION 6. There shall be a Credentials Committee which shall consist of three (3) members who shall be in charge of the registration and examination of delegates and the receiving of all dues. These members are to be elected at the time of the General Officers.

SECTION 7. There shall be a member of the Board of Trustees of the Free Will Baptist Children's Home, Eldridge, Alabama, elected during the 1971 session for a term of four (4) years. Election thereafter shall be for a four (4) year term.

SECTION 8. The treasurer of each board shall be bonded through the State Office in an amount stipulated by the board of which he is treasurer. The bonding fee shall be paid from the treasury of said boards.

ARTICLE IV

SECTION 1. All officers except board members and the Executive Secretary-Treasurer shall be elected to serve a term of two (2) years. The Executive Secretary-Treasurer shall be employed by the Executive Board of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists, subject to the ratification of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists at its next regular session, for an indefinite period, with an agreement of a sixty (60) day notice of termination by both the employee and the Executive Board as the employer.

SECTION 2. Standing boards of this Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists have no power or final authority to hire full-time employees until the matter has been presented to and acted on by this association in regular session. This does not apply to full-time Missionaries sent out under the Mission Board.

SECTION 3. Vacancies on any of the boards or committees which occur between regular sessions of this State Association, may be filled by the Executive Board until the convening of the annual session of said association.

SECTION 4. Election of all General Officers shall take place on the odd years of the calendar.

SECTION 5. If a member of any board fails in the function of his or her duty without good and sufficient reasons, the board of which the delinquent is a member may declare that particular office vacant. Further, this body shall have and does reserve the right to deal with any officer or board member who does not conduct his or her office in a Christian, business-like manner according to the rules of Christian conduct as set forth in the New Testament.

Any standing board of this State Association may appoint proxies to serve in lieu of the absent members.

At the pleasure of the boards, and subsequent to the meeting from which the regular member absented himself, the boards have the right to deal with the delinquent member in the manner stated in the previous paragraph.

SECTION 6. Boards may be called into session by the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of said board, or by the Moderator or Assistant Moderator of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists, upon the request of the majority of the members of said boards.

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be changed, altered, or amended by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all delegates present and voting at any regular session of the State Association. Prior to a final vote on any amendment, change or alteration, said amendment, change or alteration shall be submitted in writing to the Clerk of this association and shall lie on the table from one (1) business meeting to the next during the same session, during which time it shall be read at least two (2) times in open session. Officers, standing boards, and/or standing committees may be added or deleted as the need arises.

BY-LAWS

SECTION 1.

A. The Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists shall meet for its regular session annually on Thursday following the second Sunday in November

and shall adjourn on the Saturday immediately follow-ing.

B. The Executive Board shall meet quarterly on Saturday before the second Sunday of the following months: February, May, August. The November meeting of said board shall be held just prior to regular meeting of the State Association.

The Executive Board of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists shall act for and in behalf of said association on matters which by their nature require immediate attention. All such actions by the Executive Board shall be subject to the final action by the State Association.

SECTION 2.

- A. The Moderator shall preside at the Annual Sessions of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists and the meetings of the Executive Board. The Moderator shall be the President of the Corporation known as the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.
- B. The Assistant Moderator shall preside in the absence of the Moderator and/or when appointed by the Moderator as the need arises.
- C. The Clerk shall keep records of the proceedings of the Annual Associational meetings and of the Executive Board meetings. It shall also be his responsibility to have the minutes of these sessions printed and distributed. The Clerk shall be the Vice-President of the Corporation known as the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.
- D. The Assistant Clerk, in the absence of the Clerk, shall fulfill the functions and duties of the Clerk as stated in paragraph C of this document.

SECTION 3.

- A. The Executive Secretary shall be responsible and accountable to the Executive Board in the fulfillment of the duties of his office as determined by said board.
- B. The Executive Secretary shall be allowed four (4) weeks vacation per year with pay.
- C. Funds received by the Executive Secretary for revivals, special speaking engagements and

promotional meetings, shall go into the Cooperative Fund. The exception to this regulation relates to any remuneration received by the Executive Secretary during his four (4) weeks vacation, which funds shall be his personally and need not be accounted for before said association.

- D. Salary, mileage, and operational expenses of the Executive Secretary shall be determined by the Executive Board.
- E. The Executive Secretary shall be Secretary-Treasurer of the Corporation known as the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.

SECTION 4.

- A. The Executive Board shall serve as the Placement Committee for the State Association. In this capacity the board shall investigate places suitable for this meeting and make recommendations to said State Association. Meeting places shall be determined two (2) years in advance.
- B. The Executive Board shall plan the program for the annual meetings of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists and the annual meetings shall follow the programs as closely as possible. Business sessions shall be conducted according to the commonly accepted rules of Parliamentary Procedure.
- C. The Executive Board shall formulate the budget for the State Association annually and recommend to the body in session the allocations to be observed in the Cooperative Plan of Giving. This board shall in addition to the above stated duties, also recommend a mileage rate for travel by the members of all of the standing boards of said association.

SECTION 5.

Necessary committees shall be appointed by the Moderator unless otherwise provided for by the body. SECTION 6.

These By-Laws may be altered, changed, or amended at any regular session of this association by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of delegates present and voting.
