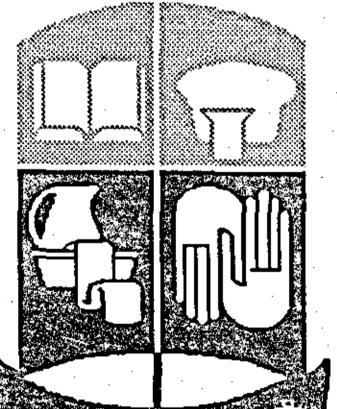

PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL MEETING:

The Sixty Third Annual Session of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists convened at Metter Free Will Baptist Church in Metter, Georgia, on November 18-20, 1999. The theme of the meeting was "Doing Business For God". Scripture was Matthew 13:44-48. Music was coordinated by Rev. Danny Thomas and provided by several different individuals, groups, and song leaders. Rev. Mike Crews served as pianist, and Mrs. Lucy Hyman served as organist.

THURSDAY EVENING WORSHIP SESSION

Prelude to the service was provided by the Savannah Quartet. Rev. Irvin Murphy welcomed everyone to Metter "where everything is better." Song leader, Rev. Eddie Vincent, opened the session and led the congregation in singing "I Am Resolved". Rev. Vincent then led the congregation in the pledges to the American Flag, Christian Flag, and to the Bible.

The 63rd Annual Session of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists was officially called into session by the State Clerk, Rev. Terry Pierce. He introduced the Moderator, Rev. Paul Smith, who extended a welcome to everyone.

Moderator Smith called the roll of district associations with the representatives from ten districts answering. Rev. Paul Smith then appointed the Committee on Committees members who were: Chairman Matt Pinson, Bill McCarty, Eddie Vincent, Henry Shellman, and Irvin Murphy. The congregation then sang "Heaven Came Down", followed by "O I Want To See Him". Rev. Murphy then introduced the Savannah Quartet who then sang "Beulah Land", and "Until Then".

Rev. Murphy asked for Rev. Ralph Lightsey to lead the congregation in prayer. Rev. Murphy then presented the keynote speaker, Rev. Burt Hall, pastor of the White Rock Free Will Baptist Church in Phenix City, Alabama. Rev. Hall challenged our hearts on the subject of "The Courage We Must Have" from the passage of Amos 2:11,12. An invitation hymn "Just As I Am" was then sung. A moving invitation followed with several decisions including a young man who was saved.

Moderator Smith shared some announcements. The service was then dismissed in prayer by Rev. Glenn Thomas.

FRIDAY MORNING SESSION

Rev. Danny Thomas led the congregation in singing "The Old Account Was Settled". Rev. John Amburgey opened the session with prayer. Rev. Thomas led the congregation in singing "God Is So Good" followed by an introduction of the speaker of the hour. The morning devotional was brought by Rev. Dale Bishop, Free Will Baptist foreign missionary to the country of Japan. He brought a stirring message from Philippians 3 on the subject of "The Confidence We Must Have".

Moderator Smith called for a partial report of the Credentials Committee. Rev. S.E. Newberry reported a voting delegation of 100, with a total registration of 169.

Moderator Smith recognized the standing delegates and entertained a motion to seat all elected delegates. The motion was adopted. The Moderator recognized all corresponding visitors.

Rev. Matt Pinson read the Committee on Committees report with the following nominations:

Motion was carried to receive this report and all nominees be elected.

Clerk Terry Pierce gave the report of the Executive Board as stated in the Digest of Reports with the following items to be voted on individually:

Item 1. A 1999 calendar year overall budget of \$500,000 is proposed. A Georgia State Cooperative Budget of \$200,000 is included in the overall budget. You will find the budget included with this report for your approval. Motion, seconded and carried.

Item 2: The State Association will meet at the First Albany Free Will Baptist Church in Albany, March 16-18, 2000. The State Association will meet at the Trinity Fellowship Free Will Baptist Church in Hampton, March 15-17, 2001. Motion, seconded and carried.

Georgia in 2011. Motion, seconded and carried.

Item 4: We as an Executive Board whole heartily support the Lunsfords in their missionary endeavors with the English Language Institute. We encourage our churches to open their doors to the Lunsfords as they raise their financial support. Motion, seconded and carried.

Item 5: That we reaffirm the original intent of the Acts 1:8 policy. Acts 1:8 disbursements will be qualified to those who are employed by the National Home and Foreign Missions Departments. Motion, seconded and carried.

Executive Secretary/ Treasurer William Smith gave the Executive Office report. He reported on a great year and thanked the people for letting him serve in this position. Motion, seconded and carried to receive this report.



Mrs. Gail Smith gave the Georgia Women Active for Christ report. Motion, seconded and carried to receive this report. Rev. Willie Martin gave the Christian Education Board report. He also asked for Mrs. Geraldine Waid to speak concerning the subject of the Historical Society. Motion, seconded and carried to accept this report. Rev. Jack Taylor reported from the Free Will Baptist Family Ministries in Tennessee. Rev. Tom Dooly reported for the National Master's Men Department. Motion, seconded and carried to receive these reports.

Meeting was adjourned for worship.

Rev. Danny Thomas led the congregation in singing "Jesus Saves". Rev. William Smith asked for Rev. Glenn Thomas to lead in prayer. Rev. Smith introduced the speaker of the hour. Rev. Eddie Vincent and Rev. Mike Crews ministered in music. Rev. Bobby Taylor, pastor of Deep Creek Free Will Baptist Church in Midville, gave a wonderful message on the subject of "The Cost We Must Shoulder" from the text of Luke 14:25. Rev. Danny Thomas led the congregation in an invitation hymn. Rev. Billy Bevan dismissed the session with prayer.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Rev. Dale Bishop led the congregation in singing "Wonderful Grace of Jesus". Rev. Rudy Woods led the congregation in prayer. Rev. Rod Goodman gave the Board of Camping report. He shared what God is doing in the lives of young people around the State and that we had over 700 campers in camps this past year. The Board of Camping recommended that based upon a detailed analysis of purchasing and maintaining our own camp facility, we the Camp Board recommend that we continue the present course of renting camp facilities around the state to serve our young people. We recognize the inconveniences and that renting is not a perfect solution. To be good stewards of God's resources we must seek His will in doing what in our opinion is best for the Georgia State Association. We feel that this course will provide our children with a great camping ministry at a considerable less cost both over-all and annually. We estimate that this would cost approximately \$80,300.00 every year just to maintain an owned facility in good condition. We also recommend that we take the Camp fire fund monies and place them in a savings account fund and let the yearly interest to help with the annual cost of camping in Georgia. We will keep the principle amount invested indefinitely.

Rev. Gene Cross gave a minority report concerning camping. A substitute motion was made by Rev. Cross that we purchase the property immediately in Green County and form a committee to see this accomplished. The substitute motion failed by a vote of 64 against and 21 for. A motion of call to question passed concerning the discussion of the acceptance of the Camp Board report and recommendation. The vote to accept the Camp Board report and recommendation was 60 in favor and 12 against.

Rev. Wayne Miracle gave the Trustee Board report. He reported on the plans for the future State Office. Motion, seconded, and carried to receive this report. Rev. David Crowe gave the National Home Missions Department report. Rev. Bill Evans reported on the Board of Retirement and he also reported on the Free Will Baptist Foundation. Motion, seconded, and carried to accept both of these reports.

Malcom Freeman gave the Board of Missions report. He reported on the progress in the missions work in Atlanta and Kingsland. Report was received and adopted.

Mrs. Marjoire Workman reported on the Women Nationally Active for Christ. Rev. Roy Harris gave the Free Will Baptist Bible College report. Rev. James Forlines gave the National Foreign Missions Department report. Rev. Billy Brown gave the Randall House Publications report. Motion, seconded and carried to receive these reports.

Rev. S. E. Newberry then gave the report of the Credentials Committee. He reported that there are 110 voting delegates and 196 total registered. Motion was seconded and approved to receive this report. A motion, seconded, and carried to lay on the table a constitutional change.

Nominating Committee Chairman Rev. Glenn Thomas gave a partial report. Motion, seconded, and carried to receive these nominations. Motion, seconded, and carried to adjourn.

FRIDAY EVENING WORSHIP SESSION

Prelude to the service was offered by *New Mercy* of Free Will Baptist Bible College. Rev. Arthur Smith welcomed everyone to the service. Rev. Willie Martin led the congregation in prayer. Rev. Freddie Lockwood led the congregation in singing "Higher Ground". The congregation then sang "He Touched Me" followed by "O How I Love Jesus". Rev. Benny Lariscy led the congregation in prayer for the blessing on the missions' offering. Offering total was \$697.00. Rev Lockwood introduced special singing by *New Mercy* who sang "Holy, Holy, Holy" and "The Name Of Jesus". Rev. Smith introduced the speaker of the hour. Rev. Gene Gilbert, pastor of Travelers Rest Free Will Baptist Church in Newton, who brought a stirring message on the subject of "Contacts We Must Make" from the text of Acts 3:1-9. Rev. William Smith shared some announcements. Rev. John Amburgy dismissed the service in prayer.

SATURDAY MORNING SESSION

Rev. Mark Walker opened the final service by leading the congregation in singing "I'll Fly Away". Rev. Eddie Vincent led in prayer. The congregation then sang "Great Is Thy

Faithfulness". Rev. Henry Shellman, pastor of the Trinity Free Will Baptist in Mauk, spoke on the subject of "The Convictions We Must Have" from the passage of Romans 12.

Moderator Paul Smith thanked the Program Committee, the speakers, and the Metter Church. Rev. Melvin Worthington gave the National Executive Office report. Rev. Steve Faison gave the Media Commission of Free Will Baptists report. Motion, seconded, and carried to receive both of these reports.

Motion, seconded, and carried to remove the constitutional changes from the table. Motion, seconded and carried to take these items one at a time. All three items failed in the votes.

Rev. James Wilhide gave the South Carolina Children's Home report. Rev. Steve Faison gave the Media Commission report. Rev. Matt Pinson gave the National Commission of Theological Integrity report. \$1,100.00 in pledges for the funding of a theological journal was given following Rev. Pinson's report. Motion, seconded, and carried to receive all of these reports.

The Resolutions Committee report was read by Rev. Tim Hutchinson. Two resolutions were submitted and adopted. (See Resolutions)

Motion, seconded, and carried to give a plaque to Mr. Bill Lofton and the body was led in a special time of prayer by Rev. Danny Thomas.

Rev. S. E. Newberry gave the Credentials Committee final report. He stated that we had a voting delegation of 110 with a total of 203 registered. Motion, seconded, and carried to give a rising vote of thanks to the Credentials Committee and to receive this report.

Motion, seconded, and carried to give \$1,000 out of the contingency fund and give it to the Lunsford missionary effort. Motion, seconded, and carried to elect delegates to the National Association at the State Meeting in March 2000.

Rev. Glenn Thomas read the Nominating Committee report. Motion, seconded and carried to elect all of the nominations of the various boards.

Motion, seconded, and carried to elect the following as the general officers of the State Association. Rev. Terry Hennecke as Assistant Clerk, Rev. Terry Pierce as Clerk, Rev. Russell Horne as Assistant Moderator, and Rev. Paul Smith as Moderator.

A motion, seconded, and carried that we adjourn. Announcements were made and Rev. Russell Horne was asked to close the business session in prayer.

EXECUTIVE SECRETARY/TREASURER REPORT

November 1998 - November 1999

This has been a busy year for Georgia Free Will Baptists. Hosting the 1999 National Association was a tremendous task. The people of Georgia united together and done a wonderful job in hosting the Convention. From September of 1998 until July of 1999 many long hours of preparation went into making the National Association a great success. I want to thank all the Steering Committee members for their many hours of volunteer labor. Thank you to all the volunteers who worked during the week of the Convention. The Women of Georgia Active for Christ are to be commended for the wonderful banquet and all the gifts given to those who attended the banquet. And most of all, a special thank you to everyone who prayed for the meeting.

The financial reports in this digest are for the 1998 calendar year. The State Office received a total of \$876,928.51. Of this amount \$183,731.19 was *Cooperative receipts*, \$27,195.85 was *Georgia Acts 1:8 receipts*, and \$666,001.47 was *designated receipts*. Thank you to each church and each individual who gave to make 1998 a record year for Georgia Free Will Baptists. I am glad to report that 1999 giving for the *Cooperative Budget* and the *Georgia Acts 1:8 Budget* will surpass the figures you have in this report.

There are some changes in the purposed 2000 budget. The budget for the Christian Education Board has been increased by 50%. This is necessary because of the increase in enrollment of Georgia students at Free Will Baptist Bible College. We send \$35.00 each month to nineteen students. The *Cooperative Budget* has been raised by \$10,000.00 for the second straight year. This is made possible because of your faithfulness to give. We now have 95 churches who participate in the *Cooperative Plan*.

Last year was the first year for the *Georgia Acts 1:8 plan.* It took a few months to get the program off the ground, but by the end of the year support was increasing each month. We have already seen over a 350% increase in giving for 1999. We now have over 40 churches who participate in this program. It is important that we continue to see this program of support grow. Through the *Georgia Acts 1:8 Plan* we can be better stewards of our mission money. God has blessed our state work in 1999. We have seen record attendance at the State Teen Camp, and many of the local Junior Camps. The Christian Education board set new records for the Couples Retreat (88), Ministers Retreat (46), and the Senior Citizens Retreat (50). The State Youth Conference was a success. Because of the hurricane we had to cancel the Minister Wives Retreat. Thank you for all the information that is sent in for the *Promotional Bulletin*.

The mission work in south Atlanta is in the process of building their new building. The completion of the new building is scheduled for April of 2000. Brother Billy Bevan has moved to Kingsland to serve as our missionary at the Camden work.

I am glad to report that our four National Foreign Missionaries and our National Home Missionary accounts are all in the black. Thank you for your faithfulness to support our missionaries from Georgia. This was made possible because of the continuing growth of the *Georgia Acts 1:8 Plan*. It is good to have Dale and Sandra Bishop with us this year for our State Meeting. Please continue to pray for Paul and Rhoda Creech as they seek the Lords Will on when they should to return to the mission field.

Free Will Baptist Bible College is in the process of raising funds to relocate the campus. I encourage you to give to this cause, and please don't forget to continue to give to their regular operating budget. Praise the Lord for the large increase of Georgia students this year. There are reports that we may have even more students for the Spring 2000 semester.

Thank you for the hospitality you have shown during my travels these past two years. I have made many new friends and I think Georgia Free Will Baptists are the greatest. This past year we have laughed together, cried together, rejoiced together. prayed together, and ate together (a little too much). For this I give God all the praise and glory. God has been good to Georgia Free Will Baptists.

Serving you in this office is a great joy. Thank you for your prayers, encouragement, support, and hospitality. Please continue to pray for me and my family. I am here to serve you. Please feel free to call, if I can be of any service to you.

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Board of Camping Report for

November 1998 – November 1999

This year has provided us with some difficult challenges, but in the middle of those challenges, God has provided spiritual victories in the lives of our young people across the state. Teen Camp 1999 was held June 27-July 2 at FFA/FHA Camp in Covington, GA. The theme for this year's camp was *PowerHouse*. The theme was based on Acts 1:8, "But you shall receive power." And a *PowerHouse* it was. We had a record number of campers with 112 in attendance, with 28 staff members.

Rev. Joey Wilson did a fantastic job of preaching each day, as well as, Bro. Mark Walker with the music. We saw many young people make decisions for Christ, including salvation, rededication and those answering the call to the ministry. A special thanks to Rev. Terry Pierce for directing a great camp. He put together a great staff and spent many hours of hard work pulling the whole program together, as well as, mobilizing our churches to pray that God would work in this camp.

Plans are already being made for Teen Camp 2000. It will be held at Camp John Hope in Perry, GA from June 25-30. Begin praying for it now.

Bro. Mark Walker, the retreat director, has made plans for the winter retreat. It will be held December 27-28 at Camp John Hope in Perry, GA. Rev. Jeff Goodman will be our evangelist.

This year, we were also able to continue to assist all 10 associations with their Jr. Camps. We gave each association \$250.00 and paid for their campers insurance. With localized Jr. Camps, we have been able to see the total number of camper's increase across the state to record numbers. The total number of those attending camps across the state this year was 719. The breakdown of those numbers is as follows.

In order to further assist Jr. Camps, the board has decided to increase the amount of assistance from \$250.00 an association, to \$1000.00 an association. The following restrictions apply:

- Each association is to submit a request, in writing, for the grant by April 15 each year proceeding the camp session. Failure to meet the deadline will result in the forfeiture of the grant.
- Camping, with a deadline of October 1st of the year of your camp. A form will be furnished by the board to be filled out with two signatures. Failure to meet the deadline will result in the forfeiture of the grant for the following year.

Our hope is that these funds can be used to help each of the local associations camping ministries to grow both in quantity and quality.

This year the board has also finished a lengthy study on the future of camping in the state of Georgia. The results of the study and boards recommendation are included in the digest.

We look forward to serving you in the coming year.

CAMP BOARD PROPOSAL

We have examined property locations in or around cities including Ashburn, Cordele, Hawkinsville, Dublin, Rochelle, McRae, Metter, Thomaston, Shellman, Reidsville, Junction City, and Moultrie. Several outdated schools and both private and public property have been researched. Each suggested site was either investigated or an onsite examination took place by various board members.

We the Camp Board have taken the lessons learned from our own experiences, other campsites, and our needs for the future and designed a campsite that we feel will modestly meet our need for the future. We understand that any future property sites, or building considerations should be at least guided by the following information. Again, a great deal of time, prayer, and effort has went into the following information:

A. MAJOR CONSIDERATIONS:

1. To build a camp facility that will accommodate both our current and future needs for camping.

2. That we look at a cost analysis for building, operating, and maintaining our own camping facilities.

THE LAND: Β.

- 1. We need at least 25 acres for property.
- 2. We acquire land that is centrally located as soon as possible.

C. THE FACILITIES:

- 1. Dining facility that would seat about 250 people.
- 2. Kitchen facility that would meet All State codes.
- 3. Multi-Purpose Metal Building
 - A. This building would house the kitchen, dining facility, sleeping quarters for the kitchen staff and an auditorium. (See above for kitchen and dining sizes). The auditorium would need to seat about 250 people. Bathroom facilities to be included.
- 4. Dormitories that would be able to sleep about 250 people.
 - A. We would like five dorm buildings that consist of room for 50 people in each dorm to sleep in.
 - B. These dorms would need to have at least 5 showers, sinks, and commodes. The would need to have one central bathroom that is, of course, handicap accessible to each building.
- 5. Classroom- Office Metal Building that students could study in.
 - A. This building would need four rooms that would seat approximately 60 people in each room.
 - B. One other room for a caretaker's office would need to be included. A standard size office with a small copy room. Restrooms would also need to be included in this building.
 - C. This building would also need to have a room that would serve as a small canteen area for refreshments to be sold.
- 6. An outdoor Recreation area.
 - A. This would include a basketball court slab under option 2. This slab would have a top only covering it.

 - B. Softball field with backstop.
 - C. Two volleyball sand pits.
 - D. Small pond or lake for fishing and canoes, if possible.
- 7. Swimming Pool with a modesty fence that would accommodate at least 125 people. There would also need to be a small building for a changing area.
- 8. Utility Garage that would be large enough for a small tractor, bushhog, and small equipment.
- 9. Of course, a State approved septic system for the entire facility.

Please note the following drawings and designs based upon the preceding information.

The dimensions and a possible cost analysis are as follows on the buildings and furnishings for a campsite.

Total Building square feet is 37,250. At a moderate rate of only \$65.00 per square foot of construction cost the total will be \$2,421,250.00.

Metal Bunk Beds and mattresses – (120) at \$36,000.00 (\$300 bed & 2 mattresses)

Auditorium Zone:

Chairs – (250) at \$3,000 (12.00) Tables – (10) at \$400 (40.00) Overheads – (2) at \$200.00 TV & VCR - \$350.00Marker Boards – (3) \$100.00

Sports Zone:

Basketballs, volleyballs, canoes, softball equip., ping pong tables, etc. \$1,500.00 Pool Chemicals & Supplies - \$1,000.00 (annually)

Maintenance Equipment & Supplies Zone: Tractor and mower (used) - \$8,000.00 Tools, parts, grass equipment, etc. - \$1,500.00 (annually)

Insurance & Utilities Zone: Insurance - \$12,000.00 (annually) Utilities - \$20,000.00 (annually)

Part-time Camp Director & Grounds Keeper Zone:

Salary - \$20,000.00 (annually)

Summary of the proceeding cost estimates are for a total of: Building Cost - \$2,421,250.00 Property Purchase - \$20,000.00 Set Up & Furnishings Cost - \$114,300.00 Cost for Speakers fees, Camp coordinator, teachers, and other miscellaneous items \$4,000.00 (annually)

TOTAL - \$2,551,550.00 FOR NEW CAMP

Based upon a detailed cost analysis of purchasing and maintaining our own camp facility we the Camp Board recommend that we continue the present course of renting camp facilities around the state to serve our young people.

We recognize the inconveniences and that renting is not a perfect solution. To be good stewards of God's resources we must seek His will in doing what in our opinion is best for the Georgia State Association. We feel that this course will provide our children with a great camping ministry at a considerable less cost both over-all and annually. We estimate that is would cost approximately \$80,300.00 every year just to maintain an owned facility in good condition.

We also recommend that we take the Camp fire fund money and place it in a savings account fund and let the yearly interest help with the annual cost of camping in Georgia. We will keep the principle amount invested indefinitely.

The Mission Board is glad to report that the process of relocating the South Atlanta mission work is now in its final stages. Construction has begun on the new church building on a sixteen acre sight in Hampton. This project is scheduled to be completed in April of 2000. This has been a trying time for Brother Paul Smith and the people of the Trinity Fellowship Church. We are thankful for their patience.

The property at Riverdale was sold to the Community Fellowship Church, Inc. for a total of \$500,000.00. They made their final payment to the Mission Board in September of 1999. All funds from this sale have been received by the Mission Board. The contract required the Community Fellowship Church to pay all legal fees. Because of this, the net proceeds from the sale was \$500,000.00.

The South Georgia Association approached the Mission Board concerning the mission work in Kingsland. This church was started by the South Georgia Association nine years ago. The Mission Board met with representatives from the South Georgia Association in August. At this meeting it was agreed upon for the State Mission Board would manage this work until December 31, 2004.

Brother Billy Bevan, Jr. was hired by the Mission Board to serve as our state missionary in Kingsland. The mission work has a beautiful building that is completely paid for, and about 15 people. The area is experiencing rapid growth because of the Kings Bay Nuclear Submarine Base which is located at St. Marys. The people at the Camden mission are excited to have Brother Bevan as their new pastor.

As we enter the new millennium we do not know what the future will bring. We are experiencing tremendous change in our world, our country and our state. Please pray for our board to have the proper vision for the future, that we may be able to plant and establish Free Will Baptist Churches in the State of Georgia.

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CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

GEORGIA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

PREAMBLE

We, the Free Will Baptist of the State of Georgia, do ordain this Constitution for the purpose of advocating, promoting and increasing all phases of the cause of Christ.

ARTICLE I

This assembly shall be known as the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.

ARTICLE II

SECTION 1. The officers of this association shall be Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Executive Secretary/Treasurer.

SECTION 2. The Executive Board shall be composed of the regular officers; the chairman of each of the standing boards; and the previous moderator, as an *ex officio* member for a period of two years following his term of office.

SECTION 3. This Association shall be composed of ordained Ministers, ordained Deacons, Missionaries, and Board Members who are members of affiliated bodies; one (1) delegate for every three hundred (300) members or fraction thereof from District Associations; one (1) delegate for every one hundred (100) members or fraction thereof from thereof from each local affiliated church.

SECTION 4. All delegates from District Associations and local churches shall be elected from the laity of the body sending them.

SECTION 5. Funds to meet current needs of this body shall be paid to the treasurer of this association. Each District Association will give a minimum of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) per delegate authorized, and each local church will give ten cents (\$.10) per capita of their respective memberships.

SECTION 6. In order to pay our Georgia State Association's annual representation fee to the National Association, each local association is to be responsible to promote, receive and forward the amount designated by the National Association per

church per year to the State Office, along with their annual State Association representation fee, on or before our annual State Association session.

ARTICLE III

SECTION 1. It shall be the privilege of each affiliated District Association to recommend a member for each standing board. Terms of office on these boards shall be on a rotating basis which will necessitate the election by the State Association of five (5) members every two (2) years, thus giving each member a four (4) year term of office.

SECTION 2. There shall be a Board of Missions composed of members who are noted for their missionary zeal.

- A. The Board of Missions shall employ missionaries as needed to establish Free Will Baptist mission/churches in the State of Georgia. These missionaries may be employed exclusively or jointly with other Free Will Baptist agencies.
- B. A mission/church sponsored by the Georgia State Association and its missionary are under the authority of the State Association and the supervision of the Georgia State Board of Missions.
- C. A mission/church does not have autonomous church status. As long as the mission/church is unable to provide for its own business, it is in a dependent relationship to the State Association and its Board of Missions.
- D. When the mission/church is self-sustaining, self-governing, selfdiscipling, and self-propagating. It should be organized into an autonomous Free Will Baptist church following the procedures adopted by the Georgia State Association.
- E. After proper procedures are satisfied and the church is duly organized into an autonomous Free Will Baptist church it shall have all normal rights, privileges and responsibilities of any other Free Will Baptist Church.
- SECTION 3. There shall be a Board of Camping whose duties shall be to

schedule and arrange all camp sessions, and to appoint the Camp Director each year.

SECTION 4. There shall be a Board of Christian Education whose duties shall be:

- A. To provide educational services for the members of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptist.
- **B.** To set policy and supervise the functions of the State Youth Committee. This Board shall appoint this Committee to carry out Board policy.
- C. To organize sponsor and promote educational and inspirational retreats for our members.
- **D.** To organize, sponsor and promote Sunday School and Church Training seminars.
- E. To set policy and supervise the Historical Committee. This Board shall appoint the Historical Committee to gather and set forth for public knowledge and posterity the history of Georgia Free Will Baptists.

SECTION 5. There shall be a **Board of Trustees** whose duties shall be: maintenance, upkeep and insuring of all State Association properties; the planning and supervision of all future developments and expansion of these properties as directed by the State Association except otherwise provided in this Constitution.

SECTION 6. There shall be a Credentials Committee, which shall consist of three (3) members of three-year terms. And the term of one expiring each year thereafter according to seniority of service, who shall be in charge of the registration and examination of delegates and the receiving of all dues.

SECTION 7. There shall be a member of the Board of Trustees of the Free Will Baptist Children's Home, Eldridge, Alabama, elected during the 1971 session for a term of four (4) years. Election thereafter shall be for a four (4) year term.

SECTION 8. There shall be a Georgia State Master's Men. They shall select their own officers and conduct their own business.

SECTION 9. There shall be a Georgia State Woman's Auxiliary Convention (GWAC). They shall elect their officers, conduct their business and maintain their treasury.

ARTICLE IV

SECTION 1. All officers except board members and the Executive Secretary/Treasurer shall be elected to serve a term of two (2) years. The Executive Secretary/Treasurer shall be employed by the Executive Board of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists, subject to the ratification of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists at its next regular session, for an indefinite period, with an agreement of sixty (60) day notice of termination by either the Executive Secretary or the Executive Board.

SECTION 2. Standing Boards of the State Association have no power or final authority to hire, full-time employees until the matter has been presented to and acted on by the State Association in session except where otherwise provided.

SECTION 3. Vacancies on any of the boards or committees, which occur between regular sessions of this State Association, may be filled by the Executive Board until the convening of the annual session of said association.

SECTION 4. Election of all General Officers shall take place on the odd years of the calendar.

SECTION 5. If a member of any board fails in the function of his or her duty without good and sufficient reasons, the board of which the delinquent is a member may declare that particular office vacant. Further, this body shall have and does reserve the right to deal with the officer or board member who does not conduct his or her office in a Christian, business like manner according to the rules of Christian conduct as set forth in the New Testament.

Any standing board of this State Association may appoint proxies to serve in lieu of the absent members.

At the pleasure of the boards, and subsequent to the meeting from which the regular member is absent, the boards have the right to deal with the delinquent member in the manner stated in this section.

SECTION 6. Boards may be called into session by the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of said board, or by the Moderator or Assistant Moderator of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists, upon the request of the majority of the members of said boards.

SECTION 7. An auditing Committee of three (3) members will be elected annually.

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be changed, altered, or amended by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all delegates present and voting at any regular session of the State Association. Prior to a final vote on any amendment, change or alteration, said amendment, change or alteration shall be submitted in writing to the Clerk of this association and shall lie on the table from one (1) business meeting to the next during the same session, during which time it shall be read at least two (2) times in open session. Officers, standing boards, and/or standing committees may be added or deleted as the need arises.

BY-LAWS

SECTION 1.

- A. All real property, checking and savings account or any other assets of this Association shall be in the name of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.
- B. One or more of the corporate officers of the Association shall be the legal signers for all Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists business. These officers are: the Moderator as the corporate President; the Clerk as the corporate Vice-President; the Executive Secretary/Treasurer as the Secretary/Treasurer.

- C. The State Office shall be responsible for the safekeeping of the corporate seal and all official documents of the State Association.
- **D.** No State Board may borrow money or financially obligate the State Association without the approval of the Executive Board.
- E. The fixed assets (building, land) of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists shall not be liquidated except by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the delegates present and voting at any regular session of the Association.
- F. The records of all financial transactions shall be open to all members of the Georgia State Association. The financial transactions of the State Office and State Boards shall be audited annually.
- G. Annual financial reports of the State Office and State Boards and the auditor's report shall be made to the State Association in session and be entered in the Annual State Minutes.

- H. The State Treasurer shall be bonded in amount stipulated by the State Executive Board.
- I. This Association shall meet for its regular session annually on Thursday following the second Sunday in March and shall adjourn on the Saturday immediately following.

SECTION 2.

- A. When the State Association is not in session, the State Executive Board shall be duly authorized to do business in the name of the State Association.
- B. The State Association has full authority to direct the State Executive Board in all business conducted on its behalf.
- C. The State Executive Board shall report to the State Association in session concerning the business conducted for the State Association since its last convening.
- D. The State Executive Board has the prerogative of deferring any matter to the State Association as a whole but is not under obligation to do so.
- E. The State Executive Board shall meet quarterly in the following months: March, June, September, and December. The March meeting shall be held just prior to the regular meeting of the State Association.

SECTION 3.

- A. The Moderator shall preside at the Annual Session of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists and the meetings of the Executive Board. The Moderator shall be the President of the Corporation known as the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.
- B. The Assistant Moderator shall preside in the absence of the Moderator and/or when appointed by the Moderator as the need arises.
- .C. The Clerk shall keep records of the proceedings of the Annual Associational meetings and of the Executive Board meetings. It shall also be his responsibility to have the minutes of these sessions printed and distributed. The Clerk shall be the Vice-President of the Corporation known as *Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.*
- D. The Assistant Clerk in the absence of the Clerk, shall fulfill the functions and duties of the Clerk as stated in paragraph C of this document.

SECTION 4.

- A. The Executive Secretary shall be responsible and accountable to the Executive Board in the fulfillment of the duties of his office as determined by the Executive Board.
- B. The Executive Secretary shall be allowed four (4) weeks vacation per year with pay.
- C. Funds received by the Executive Secretary for revivals, special speaking engagements and promotional meetings shall go into the Cooperative Fund. The exception to this regulation relates to remuneration received by the Executive Secretary during his four (4) weeks vacation, which shall be his personally and need not be accounted for to this State Association.
- D. Salary, mileage and operational expenses of the Executive Secretary shall be determined by the Executive Board.

- Ε. The Executive Secretary shall be the Secretary/Treasurer of the Corporation known as the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.
- E. General Promotion. He is to be present, or cause to be represented, the association at all affairs of interest to the association and he is to promote the work of the association as well promote both the state and national works, missionaries, mission conferences, etc. Through personal communication he shall keep close contact with pastors, churches, and district associations.
- Administration. He shall administer the affairs of the executive office G. and carry out the responsibilities delegated to him by the State Association and the Executive Board. He is to serve with all standing boards and committees of the association in an ex-officio capacity. He is to report to the association during each annual session.
- Stewardship. He shall serve as treasurer of this association. An accurate H. and complete record of all funds received and disbursed shall be kept and a written report shall be included in his report to this association in its annual session. He shall receive, hold and disburse money as is made available by the State Association to the various boards. Disbursements to the various boards will be made available when requested.
- Publications. It shall be his duty to edit and publish the state paper. He I. shall direct the production of general promotional materials, pamphlets, audiovisuals, and books as approved by the Executive Board.
- Arranging State Association. He shall expedite the planning of the State J. Association program, enroll all ministers and delegates, print and distribute minutes, and investigate future sites for the annual sessions.

SECTION 5.

The Executive Board shall serve as the Placement Committee for the State Α. Association. In this capacity the board shall investigate places suitable for this meeting and make recommendations to said State Association. Meetings places shall be determined two (2) years in advance.

- The Executive Board shall plan the program for the annual meetings of the B. Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists and the annual meetings shall follow the programs as closely as possible. Business sessions shall be conducted according to the commonly accepted rules of Parliamentary Procedure.
- The Executive Board shall formulate the budget for the State Association С. annually and recommend to the body in the session the allocations to be observed in the Cooperative Plan for Giving. This board shall, in addition to the above state duties, also recommend a mileage rate for travel by the members of all standing boards of said association.

SECTION 6.

Necessary committees shall be appointed by the Moderator unless otherwise provided for by the body.

SECTION 7.

These By-Laws may be altered, changed, or amended at any regular session of this association by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of delegates present and voting.

Melissa Lunsford gave the Registration Committee Report. There were 10 districts represented, 7 state officers, 5 district presidents, 31 delegates, 2 missionaries, 24 ministers, 5 national officers and 50 visitors, for a total of 124 registered. M/S/C to accept.

4. That WGAC pay the expenses for the WGAC president and one executive committee member to attend the National Association of Free Will Baptists Annual Leadership Conference. That the executive committee member be selected from the following hierarchical order: Vice President, Field Worker, Secretary, Treasurer, Historian or Member-at-Large. M/S/C to accept after clarification.

5. M/S/C to accept the following delegates for Anaheim:

6. Terra Smith gave the Nominating Committee Report and the following Officers were elected by acclamation:

Vice President - Belyn Pierce Treasurer - Christine Daniel Field Worker - Sherrie Bailey

Gail Smith then gave an emotional thank-you to everyone for their hard work and support for the National Convention. She was overwhelmed by the coming together of everyone. Gail was given a rising vote of thanks for her leadership over the past two years and for making Georgia stand out.

Announcements were given and a special prayer request was made for Marie Glover.

Wynette Carver installed the new officers.

The minutes were read for this session.

The meeting was adjourned and Diane Martin dismissed in prayer.

WOMEN OF GEORGIA ACTIVE FOR CHRIST Of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists **Constitution and By-Laws** 1995

Article I

<u>Name</u>

This organization shall be known as Women of Georgia Active for Christ of the Georgia Association of Free Will Baptists, commonly known by its initials, WGAC. Its members shall elect their officers, conduct their business and maintain their treasury.

Article II

Purpose

The purpose of this organization shall be to assist the various women composing the WGAC in providing opportunities for them to understand and fulfill the Great Commission through their responsibilities in the family, in the church, in the community and around the world.

It shall bring the women of each district together for fellowship sharing information and encouraging one another in the work of the Lord and furthering the purpose and goals of the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists.

Article III

Officers

The officers of this convention shall be a president, a vice president, a recording 1. secretary, a treasurer, a field worker, a historian, and three members at large, all of which are elected by the convention. These shall serve as the State Executive Committee. Five of these shall be a quorum for transacting business.

Any officer or elected committee member of this convention must be an active 2. member of a local Free Will Baptist Church and an active member of the WGAC group of a local church.

Article IV

Membership

This convention shall be composed of the officers of the convention together with 1. the district coordinators, the district field workers, ten delegates (duly accredited by the credentials committee) from each district convention, four delegates and the coordinator form each local WGAC in good standing with its district convention.

Local groups in an area where there is no district convention may represent with 2. five delegates by payment of their membership fees. All delegates as well as the officers of the convention should be in good standing with a church that is in good standing with the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists and shall perform the duties as set forth for them in the present manual.

Article V

<u>Meetings</u>

- 1. The annual meeting shall be held each year the day before the Georgia State Association of Free Will Baptists is held, being in the same place or at such a time and place as may be determined at the previous annual meeting or by the executive committee.
- 2. A prayer retreat shall be held in the spring, time and place to be planned by the executive committee.

Article VI

Amendments

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

By Laws

Article 1

Duties of Officers

Section 1. President - The president shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed; call the executive committee together when necessary- be ex-officio member of all committees, except the nominating committee; see that reports are made promptly to the National WNAC secretary; and perform all duties usually pertaining to such an office. She should see that the WGAC is represented in the State Promotional Bulletin in the WGAC news section. Articles should be sent to the state executive office by the 7th of each month. She may either write the articles or ask someone to write them for her. (rev. 98)

Section 2. Vice President - The vice president shall preside in the absence of the president or by her request and otherwise assist her in the oversight of the work in general. She shall serve as chairman of the credentials committee.

Section 3. Recording Secretary - The secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings of the convention and executive committee meetings, preserve all valuable papers and turn same over to her successor in office. She shall make an annual report to the national secretary of WNAC on a form available from WNAC office within 15 days after the State WGAC Convention. She shall compile the districts' slates of officers and addresses immediately after the convention and send all state officers a list of district officers. She shall send a slate of state officers to the National Executive Secretary and to each state officer. She is responsible for getting the minutes prepared and to the state associational office in time to included in the state minutes each year.

Section 4. Treasurer - The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention and shall pay out same only when authorized by the convention. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account, and give a written report of all fund received and disbursed at each annual meeting of the convention. She shall send an annual report to the WNAC Executive Secretary-Treasurer within 15 days after the convention. She is

required to deposit and distribute all checks in her possession by the 30th of each month. She shall be bonded through the state office and audited annually.

Field Worker - The field worker shall promote the WGAC program -of Section 5. work through personal contact and the distribution of literature. She shall assist the state officers in organizing state conventions. (rev. 98)

Section 6. Historian - The historian shall keep a historical record and have a display at the state meeting. She shall send historical information to the National Executive Secretary annually.

Section 7. Members at Large - The members at large shall help promote the work in general, meet with the executive committee and serve wherever needed.

Article II

Elections

The general officers and members at large shall be nominated by a nominating committee. Following the nominating committee's report opportunity shall be given for nominations from the floor. In case of more than one nominee for any particular office, a vote will be taken each; other wise they may be elected by acclamation. The officers shall be elected every two years on odd number years. Not more than one-half of the elected officers shall be changed in any regular election. All elections shall be held at the closing session of the annual convention.

Article III

Expenses

An appropriation toward the expense of the secretary's postage and stationary shall be made by the convention. Expenses for postage and telephone calls made by the president shall be reimbursed. All field promotional work is subject to the state executive committee, who should approve all work done by state officers in the interest of state work as well as expense of same.

Article IV

Committees

Section 1. - Executive Committee - This committee shall be composed of the six officers and three members at large elected by the convention. Five of these shall compose a quorum. They shall hold meetings for the transaction of business as often as necessary. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to maintain an oversight of the work at large. The committee shall act for the convention when necessary. It shall prepare the program for the regular meeting of the convention, and fill any vacancy between elections.

Section 2. - Resolutions Committee - A resolutions committee shall be appointed by the president. A member of the executive committee shall chair this committee.

Section 3. - Nominating Committee The nominating committee shall be composed of one member from each district convention and shall be elected one year prior to making

their report. The name of the member from each district shall be submitted with the convention annual report. This committee shall serve for two (2) years.

Section 4. - Credentials Committee - The vice president shall be the chairman of the credentials committee and the president shall appoint two other members.

Section 5. - Finance Committee -The treasurer shall be chairman of the finance committee and four other members may be appointed by the coordinator. This committee reviews the financial records of the year, reports on same to the convention, and makes recommendations of disbursements of the funds of the convention.

Section 6. - Registration Committee - The president shall appoint members as needed to serve on this committee. This committee registers those in attendance and gives a report to the convention.

Article V

Fees and Reports

Active members shall pay dues yearly as required by the WGAC Convention for membership fee. These fees should come through the district treasurers. In 1995 the dues are \$10.50 per member. Georgia will retain \$.50 per member and the WNAC receives dues of \$10 per member.

Article VI

<u>Gifts</u>

1 - Season of Prayer Offerings

- Pre-Easter Week of Prayer offering is used for Foreign Missions in memory of **(a)** Laura Bell Barnard, our first foreign missionary.
- Pre-Thanksgiving Week of Prayer offering is used for Home Missions in **(b)** memory of Mrs. Lizzie McAdams, a great writer of our literature and a first National officer.
- The December Week of Prayer offering is used for State Missions in memory of (c) Mrs. Alice E. Lupton, our first National president.
 - Co-Laborer Offering is the financial plan of support of the WNAC. Each local WGAC is encouraged to support the VVNAC office with a monthly offering.
- Provision Closet This project helps missionaries as they return home to pick up 3 household items, etc., from the closet in/at the National Office. Each local WGAC is encouraged to keep abreast of the items and supplies needed as they are listed in the Co-Laborer periodically and give to this project at least once a year.
- -WNAC Emphasis A special offering to supplement the Co-Laborer offerings for 4 WNAC expenses of operation, literature, etc. This offering is received during August when locals present a special program to enlist others in the work.
- Remembrance Fund This is a fund established by WNAC and a distinct way to 5 honor any occasion the donor wishes to note: anniversaries, birthdays, or as a memorial at the time of death. A remembrance card notifying the family of the person being honored and the donor will be entered in the Book of Remembrance permanently kept in the WNAC office. These gifts will be recorded and used to

advance the Kingdom of God through WNAC. A Remembrance Service is to be conducted at our state WGAC convention each year.

- 6 Foreign Student Scholarship Fund Any WGAC group who wishes to may contribute to the special fund set up by WNAC to train Nationals from our foreign fields. February is designated as Foreign Student month.
- 7 Dot Harvey Loan Fund A revolving loan fund set up by the Georgia Woman's Auxiliary Convention in 1954 to aid worthy Georgia Students who need financial assistance to attend Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, Tennessee. This fund was planned in honor of Miss Dot Harvey who was a forerunner of the youth work in Georgia. She died in 1993. Each local WGAC group is asked to send one dollar per month toward this project. Annual offerings are received in September to add to this fund.
- 8 Westfied Church Fund This fund is used to assist the church in Kotogiri, South India in memory of Miss Laura Bell Barnard. All groups are encouraged to give to this Georgia project \$1 monthly.
- 9 Other Gifts The State WGAC may decide upon and promote other projects for funds at its discretion.
- 10 Lora Shutes Mission Project This is a statewide project with the goal set each year at the annual meeting. Funds are disbursed to missionaries through the State Acts 1:8 Program.
