

#### Report on Education.

The preaching hour having arrived, the body adjourned to hear preaching by Rev. U. Bennett from Luke 2:28.

At 2 P:M., the body came together by singing "The life boat." After prayer by prof. Lucas, report of committee on Sabbath Shools was called for and submitted as follows:--

Report on Sunday Schools

We believe the Sunday School to be the great nursery of the church, for in it we can train our children for the great work of Christianizing the world, and, as early impressions are the most lasting, we should see that our children attend Sunday school. We find it easy to it terest children in Sunday schools, but not so easy to interest the older ones. We also find that some of our preachers do not seem to interest themselves in Sunday schools. We ask this body,—preachers and delegates, to give this subject more prayerful attention.

#### CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be con pered of delegates chosen and sent from each individual church.

ART. 2. The delegates chosen and sent shall be recommended in a letter from the church to which they belong and shall include the minister and some of the ablest members belonging to the church.

ART. 3. The Association shall elect annually a Moderator and Clerk.

ART. 4. The Rules of Decorum shall be read immediately af-

ter the body is organized.

ART. 5. This Association will encourage a sound ministry; such as present Christ as an all-sufficient Savior; having made salvation possible for every human being on the terms of the Gospel which is freely offered to all.

Any minister in good standing, whether a delegate or not, may be invited to a seat and take part in the deliberations,

and have his name enrolled in our minutes.

The Association may appoint such Committees as may be necessary for the expedition of business, and every committee appointed to any particular business, shall report their proceeding in writing to the Association while in session, and all reports made by committees may be adopted or rejected by the

ART. 8. The Association shall have a book in which shall be

recorded an accurate account of all its proceedings.

ART. 10 Any church may become a member of the Association, by making application by letter or by delegate, and adopting our articles of faith and church covenant.

The Association may withdraw from any church

that becomes disorderly or refuses to be represented.

There shall be an associational fund for defraying expenses and charges that may accrue, and for replenishing such, each church may contribute at pleasure

ART. 13. There shall be a treasurer appointed by the Association whose duty it shall be to have care and account for all money committed to his charge.

The Association shall use the Free Baptist Treatise ART. 14 in full.

ART. 15. Each church shall be allowed one vote for every ten members or fraction thereof.

ART. 16. The Association advises all its churches to commemorate the death and suffering of our Lord at least twice a year.

ART. 17. The Association shall pay its clerk at least \$5,00 for his services per annum.

RULES OF DECORUM,

ART. 1. Pais Association shall be opened and closed by prayer. Arr. 2. There shall be no conversation by the members, one with another, so as to interrupt business while in session.

Arr. 3. Every member wishing to speak, shall first rise to his feet and address the Moderator.

ART, 4. No member shall interrupt another while speaking. ART. 5. We will admit no other title but that of Brother while in session. ART 6. Every member speaking shall attend to the subject

under consideration.

ART 7 No member shall speak more than three times on one subject, 1.

Art 8 Every motion made and seconded shall be attended to, unless withdrawn by the person who made it.

ART. 9. No member shall absent himself from the body while in session without leave of the Moderator.

Arr. 10. On all motions made, where the vote of the body is taken, a majority shall prevail.

on ABT the Moderator shall have the same privelege to spend as any other member, provided the chair is filled. Any member transgressing the above rules shall be

admostified by the Moderator.

#### ARTICLES OF FAITH

ARTICLE 1. We believe that there is one and only one living and true (iod, who is in personality the Father, Son and Holy Affiort, equal and harmonious in every divine perfection.

There is one God and one mediator between God and man, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself, a ransom for all 10 be testified in due time. I Timothy, 2. being me

Arr. 2. \* Holy Scriptures - We believe that God is the author of the Holy Bible, and its teachings constitute the only infallible doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness. II Timothy, 3:16.

ART. 3. Original Apostacy--We believe that Adam was created holy, but by voluntary transgression fe l into depravity and

consequently involved his posterity in sin.

And when the woman saw that the tree was good for food and that it was pleasant to the eye, and a tree to be desired to make one wise, she took of the fruit thereof and did eat. Genesis, 3:6.

ART. 4. Free Grace-We believe that the grace of God comprehinds all spiritual blessings; that the gospel is the lower of God unto salvation; that the Holy Spirit not only reproves the world of sin, but is the means whereby sinners are converted and

made wise unto salvation. For there is no difference between the Jew and the Greek, for the same Loro over all is rich unto all that call upon him. Romans, 1:12

ART. 5. Christian Faith—We believe that Christian Faith is belief in Jesus Christ as the Sou of God and Redeemer of the world and in the divinity of the H. I. Scriptures, that faith comes by hearing and hearing by the word of God.

He that believeth in the Son hath everlasting life, but he that believeth not the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of

God bideth on him. John, 3:36.

Repentance—We believe that repentance is sorrow for sin, and the kind of sorrow which produces godly repentance must be preceded by effectual convintion of sin.

Now I rejoice not that ye were made sorrow, but that ye sorrowed to repentance, for ye were made sorrow after a godly manner, that ye might receave damage by us in nothing. For godly sorrow worketh repentance to salvation not to be reported of, but the sorrow of the world worketh death. II Corinthia. 7:9-10.

ART. 7. Free Agency-We believe that the human will is free, and that men have the ability to accept or reject the conditions of salvation as they are revealed in the Holy Scriptures.

He hath showed thee, O man, what is good, and what doth the Lord require of thee but to do justly and love mercy, and to walk

humbly with thy God. Micah, 6:8.

ART. 8. Perseverence-We do not believe, under the Gospel dispensation, any soul is elected to eternal life unconditionally, but that those who by faith persevere to the end will be saved; that it is possible for men who have been converted to make ship wreck of the faith, turn again to sin and be lost.

And Jesus said unto him: No man having put his hands to the plough, and looking back is fit for the kinguom of God. Luke 9:62

Good Works-We believe that good works is the sult of faith, and not of necessity; that those who have faith will do works of righteousness, while those who have not faith cannot do anything pleasing or acceptable to God.

Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down and cast into the fire; wherefore, by their fruits ye shall know them.

Matthew. 7:19-20.

Christian Baptism-We believe that Christian Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water, in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost; that baptism cannot be scripturally administered without faith in the subject who receives it.

Therefore we are buried with him by baptism unto death; that like as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. Romans 6:4.

ART. 11 The Lord's Supper--- We believe the Supper was instituted by our Savior as a commemorative ordinance; that the bread and wine represents his body and blood; that it was instituted for Christians, and that all Christians should unite in service regardless of name or denominational distinction.

But let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread and drink of that cup, For he that eateth and drinketh

unworthily eateth and drinketh damnation to himself, not dis-

erning the Lord's body. I Cor. 11.28-29.

ART. 12. Feet Washing---We believe that washing the saint's feet is a command of our Savior, and that his followers ought to practice the same.

If I your Lord and master have washed your feet, ye ought

also to wash one another's feet. John 13:14.

ART. 13. The Gospel---we believe it is the duty of all churches to support the Gospel.

Even so hath the Lord ordained that they which preach the Gospel should live of the Gospel. I Corinthians 9:14.

CHURCH COVENANT.

I. Having given ourselves to the Lord through Jesus Christ, we agree to adopt the Freewill Baptist Faith, we now give

ourselves to each other by the help of God.

II. we solemnly covenant before God that we will carefully observe the commandments implied in a Confession of Faith, and in the spirit of meekness rebuke and admonish those who have gone astray, and watch over each other, being careful of each other's reputation, and use our influence to the upbuilding of the church and for the advancement of the cause of Christ, endeavoring to seek the unity of the spirit in the bonds of peace, and to confess our faults one to another, and to strenthen those those that are weak.

III. we promise that by the help of God that we will faithfully practice family and secret prayer, and strive to cultivate the doctrine of God's revealed word in the minds of those un-

der our care.

IV. we also agree to use our influence for the support of the Gospel and to contribute liberally to aid the ministry according to our several abilities. Also we agree to be liberal with those that are afflicted and needy, and especially those of

V. we also agree to attend the monthly meetings regurely if not providentially hindered, and submit to all ordinances im-

plied in a Profession of Faith.

VI. we also agree to abstain from all sinful and vain a-

musements.

VII, we also agree to abstain from all intoxicating liquors and not to use it as a heverage, nor to aid or assist in the man-

ufacture of such nor furnish it to others,

VIII. we also agree to encourage Home and Foreign Missions, Education. Sabbath-schools, good morals, and everything that is to the glory of God and to the welfare of men. And may the God of peace sanctify us wholly anp preserve us blameless until the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, that we may be happily admitted into the kingdom of God, where we may ascribe honor unto the Lamb forever. Amen,
