REPORT.

We your Committee on the Spirituality of Our Churches submit the following: We find the churches not as prosperous as they should be in general, although, we find some full of Spiritual vigor. We advise that pasters impress upon the churches, their duty in studying the Word closer, and to consecrate themselves to God, and to urge the members to attend monthly meetings, and that the pasters and official members visit the various members who fail to attend regularly, and if they then fail to attend, it becomes the duty of the church to appoint a committee to visit them, then if they fail to hear the committee, then bring them under decipling of the church and deal with them in love as the church may think best. Report on the General work of the Church read and adopted. Remarks by D. L. Howell, W. P. Nowling and others.

REPORT.

We find that much is being done by some of our very active ministers and members to make our churches permanent by the erection of good houses, and by urging all who are true believers in Christ to be of good conrage and contend carnestly for the faith once delivered to the Saints. We also find that there are to-day more Freewill Baptists in the South than ever before and that we are rapidly gaining in every respect. We are sure that the blessings of Almighty God our Father and Lord Jesus Christ in the person and power of the Holy Ghost is upon our Christian movement in every way. We rejoice in persecutions because if we go forward in our true Christiau work, we have the promise that the Holy Spirit will ever shield us from all harm. Now we are sorry to report that we find most of our loval ministers are really suffering in want of co-operation and suprort. Some of our · churches have a large membership and seldom have a quorum to transact business; some of our churches have no Sleward, while others have carelers backslidden ones who do not look after the interest of their pastors, therefore some of our pastors are forced to labor with their hands while they ought to be preaching.

Therefore, we advise all our churches, 1. To appoint at least two of the most consecrated members as Spiritual leaders to assist the pastor in visiting members, holding prayer and testimony meetings, and inquire after all members. 2. To appoint

two of the most active members, one of whom shall be a sister, to be associate Stowards to look after the interest of the pastor, collecting from all cheerful givers to apply pay for his services 3, We recommend that every Pastor hold his governor meeting on Saturday before every communion service. 4 We advise all our people to go ferward in building good caurch houses where it is advisable to organize churches, as we dont think it advisable to organize a church where there is no house to worship in.

RESOLUTION.

Whereas during the years 1902-1908 the Mountain Educational Commission and its successor, the General Conference of Free Baptists did solicit and collect from many Free Baptists of North Carolina and Tennessee, certain sums of money for the alleged purpose of establishing an industrial school of high grade for the said Free Baptists and

Whereas Mrs. C. C. H. Aldrich of Buffalo, N, Y., and many other people of the Northern States gave several thousand dollars to the General Conference of Free Baptists for the a-

foresaid purpose and

Whereas said General Conference placed the control of said school enterprise and the lands purchased for the establishment of such a school completely in the hands of one person viz: J. W. Lucas whom years of trial prove to be both unable and unwilling to establish a school and.

Whereas said General Conference deeded Nov. 1907 all the aforesaid land not then sold, except about three acres to the said J. W. Lucas and has given him control of the hotel and Block 7, thus diverting all the money from the purpose for which it was given, and,

Whereas we believe a radical change in the policy of our school enterprise is urgent, and

Whereas a corporation, styled the Unicol Collegiate Institute consisting of D. L. Howell, E. W. Akard, G. W. Laurence, W. P. Knowling and S. G. Street was formed and duly registered at Erwin and Nashville, Tenn, January 2 and 4, 1908, whose sole purpose is to foster said school enterprise, therefore

Resolved That we approve of the above corporation as our legal representative and sanction the efforts of said corporate body to secure posession of aforesaid property for school purposes as originally intended. We wish to place ourselves on record as being in favor of Christian Education and a better educated ministry. We earnestly urge our people to take forward steps in educational work.

Resolved. That we are thoroughly convinced from Professor Lineas' own statements and conduct that he did our cause an injustice in buying the Unicoi school property from the General Conference and thus diverting it from its original purpose,

Therefore we pledge our loyalty and support to the corportion at Unicoi, Tenn., styled the Unicoi Collegiate Institute, with the aforesaid persons as corporators, in securing possession of said property and trying to carry out the original purpose,

OBITUARIES.

We your Committee submit the following Obituary of Rev. John Honeycutt: Born Jan. 1844, died August 4. 1908, aged 64 years 6 months and 22 days. He joined the Freewill Baptist church 1862 at Ranceytown; ordained into the ministry in 1890, and remained a faithful member and minister till his death. He bore his sickness with patience, and expressed several times that he was only waiting the Lord's time, desiring only to live to visit his charches, but it was God's will to take him from his labors here below and he is gone to his reward.

Sister Jane Taylor—Born March 15 1858, died April 20 1608, age 54 years 5 months, 2 days; joined the Freewill Baptist church 1883 and lived a consecrated Christian life until her death. Before death she sang "Jesus lover of my soul" and pointed toward heaven and said Jesus is there and requested all to meet her in Heaven.

Sister Margeret Riddle,—She joined the Freewill Baptist church at North Bend 1865; died June 12 1908 and lived a devoted Christian 4 years.

Sister Lina Presne'l.—Died June 1908; lived a Christian life 54 years. She was about 80 years of age.

Bro. Nathan Bryant,—was born March 13 1821, died August 18 1908; j ined the Freewill Baptist church at Ramseytown April 1814, was a devoted member and is greatly missed from the settlement and church.

Sister Jane Howell, -Bern March 10 1818; joined the Freewill Bap ist church at Ramseytown Documber 1844 and lived a Christian life 64 years; died November 1907 age 89 yrs 7 m.

Sister H. C. McMahan,—Was 54 years old, a member of the Freewill Baptist church 35 years; died June 17 1908 in full faith after living a true Christian life.

Bro. Henry Melton,—Was borned March 10 1800, died April 29 1908; joined the church 1888 and lived an humble Christian life in Prices Creek church.

Bro. Cornelius Phillips, - Died June 1 1908. He lad been a member of the Freewill Baptist church at Higgi's Chapel for several years and told his mother often before le deid not to grieve after him, for he was going to rest. We praise God for this evidence.

Sister Polly Roberson,—Was a member of Charity church, and had been a member of the Freewill Baptist about 8 years. She died May 13 1908 and was about 80 years old.

And we find Bros. J. M. Burlison, Robt., Wyatt and T. E. Woody recommended for Ordination, after private inquiry after their past success in preaching, also their faithfulness to study. The Conference places them before the Board for examination, and recommend the Board to omit the educational clause. After a very careful examination and a Sacred vow by the applicants to study the Bible, to show themselves approved by God, they were ordained by prayer and by laying on of the hands of the Presbyter.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be composed of delegates chosen and sent from each individual church.

Anr. 2. The delegates chosen and sent shall be recommended in a letter from the church to which they belong and shall include the minister and some of the ablest members belonging to the church.

- Anr. 3. The Association shall elect annually a Moderator and Clerk.
- ART. 4. The Rules of Decorum shall be read immediately after the body is organized.
- Art. 5. This Association will encourage a sound ministry; such as present Christ as an all-sufficient Savior; having made salvation possible for every human being on the terms of the Gospel, which is freely offered to all.
- ART. 6 Any minister in good standing, whether a delegate or not, may be invited to a seat and take part in the deliberations, and have his name enrolled in our minutes.
- ART, 7. The Association may appoint such Committees as may be necessary for the expedition of business, and every committee appointed to any particular business, shall report their proceedings in writing to the Association while in session, and all reports made by committees may be adopted or rejected by the body.
- ART. 8. The Association shall have a book in which shall be recorded an accurate account of all its proceedings.

Anv. 9. Any church may become a member of the Association, by making application by letter or by delegate, and adopting our articles of faith and church covenant.

ART. 10. The Association may withdraw from any church

that becomes disorderly or refuses to be represented.

ART. 11. There shall be an associational fund for detraying expenses and charges that may accure, and for replenishing such, each church may contribute at pleasure

- Ant. 12. There shall be a treasurer appointed by the Association whose duty it shall be to have care and account for all money committed to his charge.
- ART. 13. The Association shall use the Free Baptist Treatize in full.
- ART. 14. Each church shall be allowed one vote for every ten members or fraction thereof.
- Arr. 15. The Association advises all its churches to commemorate the death and suffering of our Lord at least twice a year.
- Arr. 16. The Association shall pay its clerk at least \$5,00 for his services per annum.

RULES OF DECORUM.

- Aur. 1. This Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.
- Aur. 2. There shall be no conversation by the members, one with another, so as to interrupt hasiness while in session.
- ART. 3. Every member wishing to speak, shall first rise to his feet and address the Moderator.
 - Aut 4. No member shall interrupt another while speaking.
- Arr. 5. We will admit no other title but that of Brother while in session.
- ART 6. Every member speaking shall attend to the subject under consideration.
- Arr 7 No member shall speak more than three times on one subject.
- Arr 8 Every inction made and seconded shall be attended: to, unless withdrawn by the person who made it.
- ART. 9. No member shall absent himself from the body while in sersion without leave of the Moderator.
- ART 10. On all motions made, where the vote of the body is taken, a majority shall prevail.
- Ant 11. The Moderator shall have the same privelege to speak as any other member, provided the chair is filled.
- Aur. 12. Any member transgressing the above rules shall be admonished by the Moderator.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

ARTICLE 1. We believe that there is one and only one living. and true God, who is in personality the Father. Son and Holy Ghost, equal and harmonious in every divine perfection.

"There is one God and one mediator between God and man, the man Christ Jesus who gave himself a ransom for all to be testified in due time." I Timothy, 2:5.

Aur. 2. * Holy Scriptures-We believe that God is the author of the Holy Bible, and its teachings constitute the only infallible doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteous ness. II Timothy, 3:16.

ART. 3. Original Apostacy-We believe that Adam was created holy, but by roluntary transgression fe'l into depravity and

consequently involved his posterity in sin,

And when the woman saw that the tree was good for food and that it was pleasant to the eye, and a tree to be desired to make one wise, she took of the fruit thereof and did eat. Genesis, 3:6.

Aur. 4. Free Grace-We believe that the grace of God comprelinds all spiritual blessings; that the gospel is the power of God unto salvation; that the Holy Spirit not only reproves the world of sin but is the means whereby sinners are converted and

made who unto saivation. For there is no difference between the Jew and the Greek, for the same Lord over all is righ unto all that call upon him. - Remans 10:12.

- 5. Christian Faith,—We believe that Christian faith is belief in Jesus Christ of the Son of God and Redeemer of the world and in the divinity of the Holy Scriptures, that faith comes by hearing and hearing by the word of God. He that believeth in the Son hath everlasting life, but he that believeth not the Son shall not see life; but the wrath of God abideth on him.— John 3:36.
- 6. REPRITANCE.—We believe that repentance is sorrow for sin, and the kind of sorrow, which produces godly repentance must be preceded by effectual conviction of sin. Now 1 rejoice not that yo were made sorrow, but that ye sorrowed to repentance, for ye were made sorrow after a godly manner, that yo might receive damage by us in nothing. For godly sorrow worketh repentance to salvation not to be repented of, but the sorrow of the world worketh death.—II Corinthians 7:1-10.
- 7. Fire Agency.—We believe that the human will is free, and that men have the ability to accept or reject the conditions of salvation as they are revealed in the Holy Scriptures. He hath showed thee, O man, what is good, and what doth the Lud require of thee but to do justice and love mercy, and walk humbly with thy God.—Micah, 6; 8.
- Arr. 8. Perseverence—We do not believe under the Gospel dispensation, any soul is elicited to eternal life unconditionally, but that those who by faith persevere to the end will be exved; that it is possible for men who have been converted to make ship-wreek of the faith, turn again to sin and be lost.

At d. Jesus said unto him: No man having but his hands to the plough, and looking back is fit for the kingu m of God. Luke9:62

Aur 9, Good Works—We believe that good works is the result of faith, and not of necessity; that those who have faith will do works of righteousness, while those who have not faith cannot do anything pleasing or acceptable to God.

Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down and cast into the fire; wherefore, by their fruits ye shall know them.

Matthew, 7:19-20.

Agt. 10. Christian Baptism—We believe that Christian Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water, in the name of the Father. Son and Holy Ghost; that baptism cannot be scripturally administered without faith in the subject who repeives it

Therefore we are buried with him by baptism unto death; that like as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. Romans 6:4.

11. The Lour's Surpen.—We bolieve the Supper was instituted by our Savior as a commemorative ordinance; that the bread and wine represents his body and blood; that it was instituted for Christians, and that all Christians should unite in revice regardless of name or denominational distinction. But let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread and drink of that cup. For he that eateth and drinketh unworthily eateth and drinketh damnation to himself not diserning the Lord's body. I, Corinthians, 11:28-29.

- 12. Feer Washing,—We believe that washing the saint's leet is a command of our Savier, and that his followers ought to practice the same. If I your Lord and Master have was ed your feet, ye ought also to wash one another's feet. John 13:14,
- 13 THE GOSPEL,—We believe it is the duty of all Churches to support the Gospel. Even so hath the Lord ordained that they which presch the Gospel should live of the Gospel. I, Cor. 9:14.

usacture of such nor surnish it to others.

VIII. we also agree to encourage Home and Foreign Missions, Education, Sabbath-schools, good morals, and everything that is to the glory of God and to the welfare of men. And may the God of peace sanctify us wholly and preserve us blameless until the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, that we may be happily admitted into the kingdom of God, where we may ascribe honor unto the Lamb forever, Amen,
