#### DEEPER DEVOTION

Devotion is the giving of one's self to the Lord in consecration or dedication. Therefore, to be devoted is to be fully yeilded to God in the highest sense of worship and adoration. We believe that deeper devotion is to let the Holv Spirit have full dominion over our lives, that we may aspire to higher Christ-like lives.

#### CHURCHES AND PASTORS

#### **MISSIONS**

We, your committee on missions, respectfully submit the following recommendations to the churches of the Jack's Creek Association: We would like to ask them to pay their pledges for missions more promptly than they have been and that we make a greater effort to help sponsor and care for our mission work.

We would like to give just a brief report of the work of Rev. and Mrs. Willey, our missionaries to Cuba. In six years (1941-47) the work in Cuba has covered several thousand miles with forty preaching places, nine organized F.W.B. churches, with around one thousand members. Compare this with the work of our own association. In our 56th year, we have thirty-one churches with around 2500 members.

Our hearts should be stirred to make us do more for our Lord because

we know we will meet all we do again.

Then for our home missions we have a number of children in each community that needs help in clothing to be able to go to school. We have time for idleness. God needs people that will work for him, may we all wake up and get busy for our Lord.

#### **TEMPERANCE**

We, your committee on temparance offer the following to be considered in the light of the Scriptures, and to be in harmony with sound doctrine and godliness:

Temperance: Moderation—self control—and restraint from over-in-dulgence of any kind.

Temperate: moderate-mild-calm.

Man can be temperate in things that are lawful; but things that are unlawful, he should abstain from indulgence in eating and drinking. We can not drink strong drink or do anything that is imoral. We ought to be mild and calm in our talking, moderate in our eating. We think that modesty is very much related to being temperate. Scripture references: Gal. 5: 13, 26, 2 Peter 1: 6, Acts 24: 25, 1 Timothy 2: 8, 11, Titus 2: 1, 3.

#### SPIRITUAL PROMOTION

We, your committee named to suggest means of practical spiritual progress, do very prayerfully and humbly submit our convictions and recommendations as follows:

In this day, when so much emphasis is being placed on financial and material things, even in the church, we feel that our strongest efforts should be directed toward the development of the spiritual life of our churches. We are also strongly persuaded that all real spiritual progress is the natural result of a deeper personal devotion to the Lord Jesus Christ. It logically follows that the total of our spiritual power can be no greater than theindividual spiritual experience of our members as a whole. Our greatest problem, therefore is to develop the spiritual life of every member of our churches, as practical means to this end, we submit the following propositions for your prayerful consideration:

- (1) That each church appoint a Council of at least three of its ablest and most spiritual members to work together for the spiritual advancement of the cause of Christ; to stir an interest within the church, and to work together with the church for the growth and expansion of the church, which is the body of Christ; and to make any recommendation to the church that would be helpful in our church work.
- (2) We recommend, too, that the first project of this committee be to work with the pastor to get under way at least one service each week devoted to the study of the Word of God. Since this Holy Word is the sword of the Spirit and our only defensive weapon against satan, it is a poor soldier who is unaquainted with it and unskilled in its use. We further urge that every Christian set apart some time every day for personal Bible study and Prayer.
- (3) Our next recommendation concerning the financial reshonsibility of individual Christians and may on first thought appear to have no bearing on our spiritual condition, but we feel that slothfulness in business will hinder fervency of spirit. We therefore urge that every

Christian prayerfully consider these Scriptures: "Upon the first day of the week, let everyone of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." 1 Cor. 16: 2 and "Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver." 2 Cor. 9:7. We recommend that we each one individually consider the tithe of our income as an offering of love and gratitude unto the Lord; not of force of necesity (we would by no means recommend that it be a rule of force in any of our churches)—but we do believe the New Testament teaches a regular and systematic plan of giving to be the natural expression of gratitude from a heart continually satisfied by the love of God.

- 3. We promise that by the help of God we will faithfully practice family and secret prayer, and strive to cultivate the doctrine of God's revealed word in the minds of those under our care.
- 4. We also agree to use our influence for the support of the Gospel and to contribute liberally to aid the ministry according to our severly abilities. Also we agree to be liberal with those that are afflicted and needy, and especially those of the household of faith.
- 5. We also agree to attend the monthly meetings regularly if not providentially hindered, and submit to all ordinances implied in a Profession of Faith.
  - 6. We also agree to abstain from all sinful and vain amusements.
- 7. We also agree to abstain from all intoxicating liquors and not  $\sim$  use it as a beverage, nor to aid or assist in the manufacture of such nor furnish it to others.
- 8. We also agree to encourage home and foreign missions, education, Sabbath schools, good morals, and everything that is to the glory of God and to the welfare of men. And may the God of peace sanctify us wholly and preserve us blameless until the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, that we may be happily admitted into the Kingdom of God, where we may ascribe honor unto the Lamb forever. Amen.

#### CONSTITUTION OF JACKS CREEK F. W. B. ASSOCIATION

- 1. This Association shall be composed of delegates chosen and sent from each church.
- 2. The delegates chosen and sent shall be recommended in a letter from the church to which they belong and shall include the minister and some of the ablest members belonging to the church.
  - 3. The Association shall elect annually a moderator and clerk.
- 4. The Rules of Decorum shall be read immediately after the body is organized.
- 5. The Association will encourage a sound ministry; such as present Christ as an all-sufficient Savior; having made salvation possible for every human being on the terms of the gospel, which is freely offered to all.
- 6. Any minister in good standing, whether a delegate or not, may be invited to a seat and take part in the deliberations, and have his name enrolled in our minutes.
- 7. The Association may appoint such committees as may be necessary to the expedition of business, and every committee appointed to any particular business shall report their proceedings in writing to the Association while in session, and all reports made be adopted or rejected by the body.
- 8. The Association shall have a book in which shall be kept an accurate account of all its proceedings.
- 9. Any church may become a member of the Association by making application by letter or by delegate and adopting our articles of faith and church convenant.
- 10. The Association may withdraw from any church that becomes disorderly or refuses to be represented.
- 11. There shall be an associational fund for defraying expenses and charges that may accrue, and for replenishing such; each church may contribute at pleasure.
- 12. There shall be a treasuer appointed by the Association, whose duty it shall be to have care of and account for the money committed to his charge.
- 13. The Association shall use the Free Will Baptist Treatise in full.
- 14. Each church shall be allowed one vote for every ten members or fraction thereof.
- 15. The Association advises all its churches to commemorate the death and suffering of our Lord at least twice a year.
- 16. The Association shall pay its clerk at least \$5.00 for his services per annum.

## MINUTES OF THE JACKS CREEK F.W.B. ASSOCIATION ARTICLES OF FAITH

Article 1—The True God. We believe that there is one and only one living and true God who is in personality the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, equal and harmonious in every divine perfection.—"There is one God and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself a ransom for all to be testified in due time."—1 Tim. 2:6.

Art. 2.—Holy Scriptures. We believe that God is the author of the Holy Bible, and its teachings constitute the only intamble doctrine for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness. If Tim. 3:16.

Art. 3.—Original Apostasy We believe that Adam was created holy, but by voluntary transgression fell into depravity and consequently involved his posterity in sin.—And when the woman saw that the tree was good for food and that it was pleosant to the eye, and a tree to be desired to make one wise, sho took of the fruit thereof and did eat. Gen. 3:6.

Art. 4.—Free Grace. We believe that the grace of God comprehends all spiritual biessings; that the Gospel is the power of God unto salvation; that the Holy Spirit not only reproves the world of sin, but is the means whereby sinners are converted and made wise unto salvation.....For there is no difference between the Jew and the Greek, for the same Lord is rich unto all that call upon Him. Rom. 10:12.

Art. 5.....Christian Faith, We believe that Christian faith is belief in Jesus Christ as the Son of God and Redeemer of the world and in the divinity of the Holy Scriptures, that faith comes by hearing the word of God.—He that believeth in the Son hath everlasting life, but he that believeth not the Son shall not see life; but the wrath of God abideth on him. John 3:36.

Art. 6.—Repentance. We believe that repentance is serrow for sin, and the kind of sorrow which produces Godly repentance must be effectual conviction of sin.—Now I rejoice not that ye were made sorry, but that ye sorrowed to repentance: for ye were made sorrow after a godly manner, that ye might receive damage by us in nothing. For Godly sorrow worketh repentance to salvation not to be repented of: but the sorrow of the world worketh death. III Cor. 7:9-19.

Art. 7.—Free Agency. We believe that the human will is free, and that men have the ability to accept or reject the conditions of salvation as they are revealed in the Holy Scriptures. He hath showed thee, O man, what is good; and what doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God? Micah 6:8.

Art. 8.—Perseverance. We do not believe, under the Gospel dispensation, any soul is elected to eternal life unconditionally, but that those who by faith persevere to the end will be saved; that it is possible for men, who have been converted, to make shipwreck of the faith, turn again to sin and be lost. And Jesus said unto him: No man having put his hands to the plough, and looking back, is fit for the kingdom of God. Luke 9:62.

Art. 9.—Good Works.We believe that good works are the result of faith, and not of necessity; that those who have faith will do works of righteousness, while those who have not faith cannot do anything pleasing or acceptable to God.—Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down, and cast into the fire: wherefore, by their fruits ye shall know them. Matthew 7:19-29.

Art. 10.—Christian Baptism. We believe that Christian Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water, in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost; that baptism cannot be scripturally administered without faith in the subject who receives it. Therefore we arburied with him by baptism unto death: that like as Christ was raised from the de. by the glory of the Father, even so also we should walk in news, so of life. Romans 6:4.

Art. 11.—The Lord's Supper. We believe that the supper was instituted by our Saviour as a commemorative ordinance: that the bread and wine represent His body and blood: that it was instituted for Christians and that all Christians should unite in service regardless of name or denominational distinction.—But let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread, and drink of that cup For he that eateth and drinketh unworthily, eateth and drinketh damnation to himself, not discerning the Lord's body. I Cor. 11:28-29.

Art. 12.—Feet Washing. We believe that washing the saint's feet is a command of our Saviour, and that his followers ought to practice the same.—If I then, your Lord and Master, have washed your feet; ye ought to wash one another's feet. John 13:14.

Art. 13.—The Gospel. We believe it is the duty of all churches to support the Gospel.—Even so hath the Lord ordained that they which preach the Gospel should live of the Gospel. I Cor. 9:14.

#### RULES OF DECORUM.

Article 1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

Art. 2. There shall be no conversation by members, one with another so as to interrupt business, while in session.

Art. 3. Every member wishing to speak shall first rise to his ceet and address the moderator.

Art. 4. No member shall interrupt another while speaking.

Art. 5. We will admit of no other title but that of Brother, while in session.

Art., 6. Every member speaking shall attend to the subject under consideration.

Art. 7. No member shall speak more than three times on one subject.

Art. 8. Every motion made and seconded shall be attended to, unless withdrawn by those who made it.

Art. 9. No member shall absent himself from the body while in session without leave of the Moderator.

Art. 10. On all motions when the vote of the body is taken, a majority shall prevail.

Art. 11. The Moderator shall have the same privilege to speak as any other member, provided the chair is filled.

Art. 12. Any member transgressing the above rules shall be admonished by the Moderator

#### CONSTITUTION OF THE MINISTERS CONFERENCE Of Jacks Creek Free Will Baptist Association Ministers' Conference

ARTICLE 1. This body shall be known as The Ministers' Conference of Jacks Creek Association of Free-Will Baptists; and shall be composed of

all licensed and ordained ministers of said Association. ARTICLE 2. This Conference may receive any Christian minister, as a viting member, and when thus received, he may enjoy all rights and

privileges of the regular members not in conflict with Article 3. ARTICLE 3. This body shall elect annually a president or moderator and a clerk, both ordained ministers of one year or more membership in this

Conference, after his ordination.

ARTICLE 4. Each church may send two of its members as delegates to this Conference, and when thus sent, they are entitled to a seat in the Conference with all privileges of visiting brethren, as provided by Article 2.

ARTICLE 5. The Conference shall meet on Friday before each fifth Sun-

day, with some church in the Association, previously agreed upon, or at the call of the president: provided that more than one session may not be held with any church during the same conference year.

ARTICLE 6. The president is empowered and it is his duty, to call an extra session of the Conference upon the petition of the members of this Conference; provided however, that said petition is properly signed by seven members three of whom shall be ordained ministers.

ARTICLE 7. The Conference, upon being organized each year, shall proceed to elect an ordaining council, composed of three regularly ordained ministers; all having been ordained at least two years; and one or more shall have served one or more years on ordaining council, and one of the senior members shall be the chairman of council thus constituted.

ARTICLE 8. The ordaining council, when properly organized, shall have charge of all examinations and ordinations of candidates for the ministry

who have been ordained before it by the Conference.

ARTICLE 9. All applicants for license to preach, shall be recommended by the pastor and deacons of his church; and if the Conference, after due inquiry and prayerful consideration; and after examination by the ordaining council, as to gifts, qualifications, and the divine call; said applicant shall be granted a license to preach the gospel for the period of one year; provided however, he may have said license renewed at the expiration of the year, from time to time. All applicants for license and ordination shall first be passed upon by the Committee of Investigation, as to their character and moral standards. If satisfactory, they are then to be examined by the ordaining council openly before the house.

ARTICLE 10. All licensed preachers are required to preach twenty-four sermons each year; and at least fifty sermons before he can succeed to ordination; proviled however, he cannot be ordained until he has proved himself faithful and successful in the gospel ministry for a period of at least one year, and if any shall fail to do so, because of negligence, he shall be entitled to a seat in the Conference only as a visiting minister, as in Article 2; provided, however, the above requirements shall not apply to ministers who has passed sixty years of age, or to any minister who is rendered unable to conform to the above rules by disease or continued

sickness of himself or family.

ARTICLE 11. Any minister being absent from two sessions of conference, in succession, shall stand charged with delinquency, and shall be deprived of his vote on any question until his disability is removed by a vote of the Conference. However, if the delinquent brother offer satisfactory excuse for his absence, his disability may be removed by a majority vote of the Conference.

ARTICLE 12. All applicants for ordination shall present to the Conference a letter of recommendation from his church, properly signed by both pastor and clerk.

ARTICLE 13. The Conference may withdraw fellowship from any member who becomes disorderly.

ARTICLE 14. No session of Conference will be considered legal, if three or more ordained ministers are not present.

ARTICLE 15. This constitution and by-laws, or any article thereof, may be suspended or amended, by a two-thirds vote of the Conference. ARTICLE 16. The president or moderator may have power to appoint any and all committees to carry on the work of the Conference. ARTICLE 17. A session of conference, shall be held in connection with the yearly Association.

The above constitution and by-laws, duly adopted by conference in regular session at North Bend Church, June 1919. Re-adopted in conference September, 1944.

# BY-LAWS OF MINISTERS' CONFERENCE Jacks Creek F.W.B. Association

- 1. The regular meeting of this conference shall be held quarterly and in connection with the meeting of the association.
- 2. Each member shall report at each regular meeting either in person or by letter.
- 3. Five members shall constitute a quorum at all regular or legal meetings.
- 4. Chairman may call a special session at any time on request of three members.
- 5. At each yearly meeting there shall be elected an ordaining council whose duty it shall be to examine candidates, grant license, conduct ordinations, and to report at the next regular meeting.
- 6. Licentiates shall pursue a definite course of study under the direction of the ordaining council.
- 7. Necessary expenses of this organization shall be met by voluntary contribution or by assessment of its members.
- 8. No member shall serve as a pastor of a church which does not enforce discipline, care for its pastor, and contribute to other benevolent enterprises according to its ability.
- 9. No member shall meddle with the work of another, or injure his reputation for unefulness, but watch over each other in love, and thus promote harmony and love among the membership. All ministers received from sister F.W.B. conferences shall be issued a certificate of ordination from our conference bearing the signatures of our council with original council's name on margin. All ministers seeking license or membership shall be received under watchcare for three months.
- 10. Each member, not excused from age or infirmities is expected to do something to advance the cause of Christ and make a full report at each regular meeting.
- 11. Membership in this body shall be proof of good standing in the ministry.

  12. These by-laws may be amended by vote of two thirds at any regular meeting.
