## PROCEEDINGS.

The First Annual session of the Jasper Freewill Baptist Association was held with Beech Grove church, Walker county, Ala., on the 1st and 3rd days of October, 1887. The introductory sermon was preached by Rev. G. C. Elliott. Text: Act. 10th chapter, 34 and 35 verses. After recess and refreshments the Association was called to order by the Rev. W. H. Nelson, Moderator pro tem. After singing by the congregation and prayer by the Moderator, business was transacted in the following order, viz:

- 1. Robert Franks was appointed Clerk pro tem.
- 2. Letters from the churches were called for, handed in and read, and names of delegates enrolled as per statistical table.
- 3. Proceeded to elect a Moderator and Clerk; whereupon, Rev. W. A. Nelson, was elected Moderator, and Robert Franks, Clerk.
- 4. Opened the door for the reception of new churches, and petitionary letters were presented as follows: Pleasant Hill and Cedar Grove. The delegates were received, the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.
- 5. Called for correspondence from sister Associations; Vernon Association was represented by Rev. T. J. Springfield and Rev. R. H. Tomlin.
- 6. Invited visiting ministers to seats with us. Father Tidwell, of the Missionary order takes a seat.
- 7. On motion, that the Moderator appoint all the committees.

- 8. Committee on preaching appointed as follows: James A. Burlason, James Wood and V. T. Davis, with the deacons of this church.
- 9. On Finance—J. E. Kendrick, W. F. Burlason and W. T. Keeton.
- 10. On Documents—G. C. Elliott, J. J. Wesley and G. P. Baughn with the Moderator and Clerk.
  - 11. On Sabbath Schools-J. F. Files and T. P. Swindle.
- 12. On Literature—J. J. Wesley, G. W. Moore and G. C. Elliott.

Committee on preaching report that Rev. John Baughn is appointed to preach at 3 o'clock, p. m., Rev. W. A. Nelson preach to-night.

Sunday morning Prayer meeting at 9 o'clock, conducted by Bro. C. M. King. Rev. R. H. Tomlin preach at 11 o'clock, a. m., Rev. W. A. Nelson, preach at 3 o'clock, p. m., and Rev. J. J. Wesley, preach at night.

On motion, the Association adjourned to meet Monday morning at 8 o'clock. Prayer by Rev. James J. Wesley.

#### SERVICE ON SABBATH.

SUNDAY MORNING, 9 O'CLOCK, A. M.

Prayer meeting conducted by C. M. King.

At 11 o'clock, Rev. R. H. Tomlin, preached to a large and attentive congregation. Text: Matthew, 10th chapter, 34th verse. After which the Lord's Supper was administered to a large number of communicants, and a revival feast was enjoyed. Rev. W. A. Nelson preached at 3 o'clock. Text: First Timothy, 4th chapter, last verse. Rev. James J. Wesley preached Sunday night to a large and attentive congregation. Text: Matthew, 22 chapter, 12th verse.

## CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be known as the Vernon Freewill Baptist Association, of Ala., and be composed of delegates from different churches forming the same. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates.

ART. 2. This body shall be considered an advisory council; but having no authority over the local affairs of the

churches.

ART. 3. Each church in this Association shall be considered an advisory body, and shall control her own internal affairs, in matters of discipline, &c. She may, however, in extreme cases call aid from sister churches.

ART. 4. All questions of doctrine and matters of general interest shall be settled by a two-thirds vote of the Associa-

tion, and this decision shall be final.

ART. 5. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen at each session by a majority vote.

ART. 6. This Association shall meet annually, at such time and place as shall be most convenient, and shall not adjourn finally until all the business is transacted.

ART. 7. Churches wishing to become members of the Association must adopt its Articles of Faith and conform to its

usages.

ART. 8. We agree as churches composing this Association to use our best interest to promote the interest of all moral and benevolent institutions such as the Temperance cause, Sabbath Schools, Missionary operation, &c., &c.

ART. 9. That no member of this Association shall be elligible to the office of Moderator more than two successive years, unless no other member be competent.

## ARTICLES OF FAITH.

OF GOD.—ARTICLE 1. We believe there is one, and but one living and true God. Who is in personality the Father, Son and Holy Ghost. Equal and harmonious in every Divine perfection.

OF THE HOLY SCRIPTURES—ART. 2. We believe that God is the author of the Holy Bible; and that its teachings constitute the only infallible doctrine for the government of His Church.

OF ORIGINAL APOSTASY.—ART. 3. We believe that Adam was created holy, but by voluntary transgression fell into depravity, and consequently involved his posterity in sin.

OF FREE AGENCY.—Art. 4, We believe that the grace of God comprehends all spiritual blessings. That the Gospel is the power of "God unto Salvation. That the Holy Spirit not only reproves the world of sin, but is the means whereby sinners are converted and made wise unto Salvation.

OF CHRISTIAN FAITH.—ART. 5. We believe that Christian Faith is belief in Jesus Christ as the Son of God and Redeemer of the world, and the divinity of the Holy Scriptures. That "Faith comes by hearing and hearing by the Word of God."

OF REPENTANCE.—ART. 6. We believe that repentance is sorrow for sin; and the kind of sorrow which constitutes godly repentance, must be preceded by effectual conviction for sin.

OF FREE AGENCY.—ART, 7. We believe that the human will is free.
And that men have ability to accept or reject the conditions of salvation as
they are revealed in the Holy Scriptures.

PERSEVERANCE.—ART. 8. We do not believe under the Gospel dispensation, that any soul is elected to eternal life, unconditionally. But that those who by faith persevere to the end will be saved. That it is possible for those who have been converted, to "Make ship wreck of the Faith," turn again to sin and be finally lost.

OF GOOD WORKS. ART. 9. We believe that good work is the result of faith, and not of necessity. That those who have faith will do works of righteousness; while those who have no faith, cannot do anything pleasing or acceptable unto God

OF CHRISTIAN BAPTISM. ART. 10. We believe that Christian Baptism of the immersion in water of a believer in the names of the Father, Son and is the immersion in water of a believer in the names of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost. That Baptism cannot be Scripturally administered without falth in the subject who receives it.

OF THE LORD'S SUPPER. ART, 11. We believe the Supper was instituted by our Saviour as a commemorative ordinance. That the bread and tuted by our Saviour as a commemorative ordinance. OF THE SOUL. ART. 12. We believe that man is a living soul. That the body will die, but that the soul is immortal. That death is the separation of the mortal and immortal parts.

OF THE RESURRECTION. ART. I3. We believe in the resurrection of the dead. When the resurrection shall take place the soul and body will reunite and form an immortal being. That the righteous will be received reunite and form an immortal being. That the righteous will be received into a state of everlasting happiness, to reign with God forever and ever, into a state of everlasting happiness, to reign with God forever and ever.
