CIRCULAR LETTER

To the Churches Composing the Middle Georgia Association of United Baptists-Greeting :

DECORUM OF THE ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE 1. We, the churches hereafter mentioned, resolve ourselves into a body to be known as the Middle Georgia Association of United Baptists, which shall rest annually at such times and places as may be agreed upon by the body at its annual meeting.

ART. 2. This Association shall not have any right or authority whatever to lord it over the churches, but only act as advisory counsel.

ART. 3. The Association when assembled shall be composed of all ministers of the Association, both ordained and licentiates, and of delegates chosen by the several churches from time to time for that purpose.

ART. 4. The number of delegates to be determined by the membership of the respective churches. Any church to be entitled to two after it has obtained fifty members. It shall be entitled to one delegate for every twenty-five or fractional part thereof.

ART. 5. That when any church fails to be represented by delegates or by letter for two years in succession it shall be the duty of the Association to appoint a committee to ascertain the cause of failure and report the same to the next session of the Association,

ART. 6. The officers of the Association shall consist of a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, to be chosen annually from the members present in any way the body may see fit.

ART. 7. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the body during the session at which he is elected, call the next succeeding session, to preside until a re-organization is effected by the election and installation of his successor. It shall be his duty to keep order, enforce the rules of decorum, decide all questions of discipline, and in case of a tie to cast a deciding vote. He shall have the privilege of speaking, but must call upon some brother to preside in his stead while speaking.

ART. S. It shall be the daty of the Clerk to keep a minute of the proceedings, read the same when called upon, to be corrected at the discretion of the body, and shall prepare the minutes for publication, unless the Association shall appoint some one for that purpose.

ART. 9. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to keep all money committed to him by the Association, and an account of receipts and expenditures, make a report at each Association if called upon, pay out money whenever ordered to do so by the Association.

ART. 10. When the Association is assembled a majority of the members enrolled shall be required to form a quorum for the transaction of business,

ART. 11. The majority of the members present shall rule in all cases except upon admission of new churches, which shall require a unanimous vote.

ART. 12. No member shall absent himself from the house without leave from the Moderator, and no member shall leave the Association without the consent of the body.

ART. 13. All business shall be brought before the body by move and second and shall be disposed of according to good usage.

ART. 14. K. Trson shall be allowed to speak more than twice on the same subject, nor more than fifteen minutes each time without permission from the body.

ART. 15. No person shall be disturbed while speaking, unless he departs from the subject and it be necessary to call him to order.

ART. 16. Only one person will be allowed to speak at a time and he must rise to his feet and address the Moderator, and must not use abusive language or personal reflection on any one without being subject to a call to order by the Moderator.

ART. 17. This decorum may be altered, amended or abridged at any session of the Association by a majority of the members present.
