

#### -:- CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT -:-

We, your Committee on Christian Education, submit the following report.

We suggest a reprint of our present Christian Education report, except in 3rd paragraph, line 4 which reads "Three young people's" be changed to read "Four young people's" this year.

A Christian education is education for Christian living. It is centered around the love of Christ. The Christian home is the fundamental base for its beginning and promulgation. Many institutions are temporary, but the family was conceived in the mind of God and brought into being as a permanent institution. The responsibility for the Christian upbringing of our children is clearly set forth in the Bible. When from early childhood one is taught the Word of God around the family altar and by earnest Sunday School teachers and ministers of the Gospel, he draws from it impressions that mold his habits and principles of life and will not depart from such teaching.

We have many active Christian teachers in our public schools, but we also have too many who are counteracting what we are trying to do by taking the attitude that the Church is unimportant, and are thus creating and nourishing a spirit of indifferent aloofness to the church among school children everywhere. We can do something about this by a more careful

selection of our public school teachers. We differ with those who believe that the Bible should not be taught in our public schools. Few people realize that such an idea had its origin in the Catholic Church. They have always consistently opposed and will continue to oppose the free access of the laity to the open Bible and especially its being taught publicly. If there is anything the Catholic Church has hated, it is private judgment. Therefore, they exclude it from the schools where they have influence and from the homes of those who belong to their Church.

During this year one pastors institute was conducted at the Bethel Youth Camp. It is believed that far-reaching results will come from such meetings. We encourage all pastors, if possible, to make a special effort to attend next year. We also believe that each church should back the pastor financially who desires to attend the Camp next year. Three young people's sessions were held there and one Woman's-Auxiliary session. As this interest continues, we are sure that great good will be reaped in the state as a whole. We urge the churches to send your children to the camp next year.

For our young people and young ministers, we have the Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, Tennessee, where you can get a full four-year course in Christian Education. If you plan to go into the work of a full time Christian Worker or a full time house-wife and mother, we can think of no better place for you to go for your training, as a Free Will Baptist, than our school in Nashville. We also urge that all churches and ministers give full support to our college with regular financial contributions.

# QUARTERLY SESSIONS IN 53RD ASSOCIATION YEAR

# -:- FIRST QUARTERLY SESSION -:-

The First Quarterly Session of the Midway Association in the 53rd Association year convened with Pine View Church in Miller County, Georgia on January 26, 1951. Fourteen churches were represented by delegations and most of our ministers were present. There was a large number present from other Associations.

The fourteen churches present had very good reports and offerings in the amount of \$157.50 was received by the Finance Committee.

Rev. C. J. Harvey very ably gave the morning sermon. Scripture: Rev. 10:2, subject, "Faithfulness."

Brother Jordon asked permission to take an offering for Rev. K. V. Shutes' radio program; \$51.25 was received.

Everyone enjoyed a bountiful noonday meal prepared by the ladies of Pine View Church and community.

Lunch by the local church was greatly enjoyed by all.


