the Sunday School as a source of Biblical interpretation; and in the Leagues, many of us obtained our first experiences of practical Christian living.

Through organization, Free Will Baptists have furthered this same endeavor by providing for us several Youth Camps and the Free Will Baptist Bible College. However, a comparatively small number of us are privileged to attend the Youth Camps and still less are ever able to attend our Free Will Baptist Bible College. This fact makes it extremely important that much effort be made to make of our Sunday Schools and Leagues the very best that is possible. For our local Sunday Schools and Leagues, under these circumstances, will be the only source of Christian training that the great majority of our future church leaders will have.

Therefore, we strongly recommend, first, that our churches provide adequate buildings and other material facilities for a better learning situation that the best possible results may be obtained from our educational effort in our Sunday Schools and Leagues, and, second, that much prayer and effort be made toward securing adequate, spiritual leadership both as teachers in our Sunday Schools and leaders in our Leagues which can be had by taking a greater interest in our teachers and leaders and by aiding them to take advantage of opportunities afforded for them in our Youth Camps and the Free Will Baptist Bible College.

STATE OF CHURCHES AND CHARACTER OF MINISTERS

First, the churches should become more concerned about spiritual things. Let us leave off worldly amusements and entertainments to "draw the crowds." Nothing can draw the crowd better than the pure, undefiled Word of God.

Then let us stop sponsoring suppers and lottery to support the churches. God does not approve of such. His plan for the financial support of the church is through tithes and offerings.

Next, let us strive to get every church in our association on half-time, at least.

Finally, the deacons and lay members are responsible for selecting pastors that are qualified for the churches.

Now we recommend that the ministers of this association devote full-time to their pastoral duties, preach the word, and do not take on too many churches. We do not believe it to be fair to the preacher or the church for the preacher to have more than one appointment on each Sunday.

We further recommend that each minister of this association correspond with this body, and bring or send a written report to the annual session explaining his work through that year.

We recommend that Brother Scottie Driggers be accepted as a member of this association.

IN MEMORIAM

REV. W. T. WILEY

Rev. W. T. Wiley, a beloved saint of God, was born September 6, 1868, in Early County, Georgia. He was a citizen of his native county continuously until the time of his death on June 26, 1952.

Rev. Wiley was married to Miss Ella Alston on February 11, 1892. To this union was born four sons and three daughters, all of which survive except one daughter. Rev. and Mrs. Wiley observed their golden wedding anniversary on February 11, 1952.

Brother Wiley, as he was called by his many friends, was converted after his marriage and was ordained to the gospel ministry by authority of the Midway Association of Georgia during his thirtieth year of life. He had already been serving churches as a licentiate minister before his ordination. Of interest in his ministeral life was an unbroken career of service at New Light Church, Morgan, Georgia, which services consisted continuously for approximately for fifty-three years. He was also pastor at Bethlehem Church for approximately fifty years. With these, he pastored other churches at different intervals. He pastored one of the leading churches in west Florida for several years—Hickory Grove Church, Bascom, Florida. He served as moderator of his association at different intervals for a number of years and was honored by his association for his saintly life and unstinted service.

His funeral was one of the largest ever attended a minister in Southwest Georgia. In addition to an estimated crowd of more than one thousand persons

who attended the services, 22 ministers were present to testify to his life and service. This service was conducted in the home church, Zion, in the community where he was born and reared by Rev. T. B. Mellette.

Rev. Wiley was beloved by adherents of all denominations and his service was welcomed by all. Too, may we say that he served as chaplain of the masonic lodge in Blakely, Georgia, for the last years of his life, which benevolent craft took charge of the body and held the last rites when it was committed back to the earth.

His father was a minister of long faithful service in the Free Will Baptist. Church. Brother Wiley followed in the line of his father and became an outstanding example of holy living.

Of the many things that could be said of him, his death sickness lasted only about eighteen hours. He was stricken while in the home of a friend while in revival services at Bethlehem Church in Randolph County, Georgia.

As was said of the patriarchs of old, he fell asleep on the date given above: and his remains await the resurrection of the righteous dead in Christ.

PRINCIPLES OF FAITH AND PRACTICE

OF THE

MIDWAY ASSOCIATION

OF

FREE WILL BAPTISTS

Inasmuch as the Midway Association of the Original Free Will Baptist Church was organized fifty-four years ago on the two principles of missions and education for the Christian ministry. The Midway Association in this 1952 session do hereby reaffirm these same principles for which the association was founded, and we hereby proclaim that these principles be posted in every church and printed in the 1952 minutes of the association, and published in our Free Will Baptist paper.

We therefore affirm that we stand for the following principles:

We endorse the missionary program as being sponsored by the National Association of Free Will Baptists, both home and foreign.

We endorse the educational program as now endorsed and sponsored by the National Association, and all other orthodox schools that may become the property of Free Will Baptist bodies that are members of bodies to which we belong, provided these institutions are proven to be fundamental on the teachings of the Bible and the Second Coming of Christ.

We stand four-square for the youth movement of our denomination, and especially our own Mount Bethel Camp at Ashburn, Georgia.

We endorse and stand for the aims and purposes of the Georgia State Association; including its program of superannuation, education, missions, and its promotional program.

We purpose to be progressive and admonish and pray that local churches look

well to the calling of pastors who are in sympathy with our denominational work both at home and abroad.

We oppose any minister pastoring our churches or evangelizing in our midst who is not orthodox in the faith and practice of the Original Free Will Baptists.

We urge that all ministers doing pastoral work in our association encourage at least twice monthly service, commonly known as half-time services, and that all churches go on half time services beginning the pastoral year 1953.

We endorse the holding of two revivals in each church during the year.

We recommend that the ministers preach tithing as a means of supporting the church, and that the church support the pastor in such a manner that he can live on the same plane with his membership.

We discourage any minister doing double service on the same Sunday unless it be as a means of missions in neglected communities.

Therefore, we stand for missions, both home and foreign, Christian education in school and church, and youth camp activities of Bible Institute work. We are for the superannuation of the aged and worn-out ministers—locally, statewide, and nationally.

We stand for the old-fashioned family altar and call upon our laiety and ministers to practice and set examples of holy living, being emperate in all things.
