Obituaries: Read by clerk. Motion made and carried for adoption and carrying out recommendations. Prayer by Rev. J. B. Lovering. (See report.)

Auxiliaries: Read by Rev. H. L. Knighton. Motion made and carried for adoption. (See report.)

Those who know Dr. Johnson know we were the recipients of God's heavenly refreshings. A called meeting of the executive board and the home mission board was held at Pine View Church to decide the course of the meeting and the church. It was agreed to stop the meeting and keep the church under the watch care of the association.

EDUCATIONAL REPORT

There has never been a greater opportunity for people to get an education than today. In the past, it has been thought that educational training was for the young, but today the opportunity for adults to learn is almost as good as it is for the young. Today 35 million of the 81 million people who are taking some form of educational training are adults.

This fact leads us to believe that it is no longer necessary for the Sunday school and league to be without properly trained teachers and leaders. Unfortunately this is one of our great needs today. We see this unfortunate condition in almost every church. Why should it be? Is it because our denomination does not stress Christian education? Or is it because we do not use the opportunities available to us? If this be true, we are missing a great opportunity for Christ. It is estimated that by 1975 America will have reached a population of 225,000,000 people; these people are going to learn something, somewhere; so why not make it possible for them to learn about Christ through a planned educational program?

The field is surely white unto harvest, and we recommend that we, as a denomination, use every possible means to have properly educated teachers and leaders to guide us in the paths of righteousness.

We recommend that both young and old make a thorough study of the Book of Life so that we may be able to prove ourselves living witnesses for Christ, both in word and in deed, a workman not ashamed; and in simple trust follow our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

We recommend that all Christians support our Bible colleges: namely, the Free Will Baptist Bible College, Nashville, Tennessee, and Mount Olive Junior College, Mount Olive, North Carolina, with our material blessings and to encourage our people that are interested in higher learning to attend them, realizing that the colleges, the giver, the student and the churches in which they serve will be blessed for the Christian education that we are able to make possible.

We further recommend a further study of the Treatise of the Free Will Baptist denomination so that we may know more about what we believe.

We believe that, in so doing, we will become better servants of the Master, Christ.

2. The convention furnish receipt cards for the district treasurer.

3. Each local auxiliary send a complete slate of officers to district corresponding secretary immediately.

4. Each local chairman send a quarterly report to her respective district chairman. (This is not to be a personal report but rather a report of the entire local auxiliary's work in her particular department.)

5. We co-operate with our state and national auxiliary with our means and efforts and also co-operate with our district in whatever project comes up.

6. Each auxiliary support the W. N. A. C. co-laborer plan.

7. The Midway Woman's Auxiliary sponsor a vacation Bible school clinic before April 15, 1960.

8. All local youth chairmen or presidents send names of all high school seniors to district youth chairmen by December of each convention year.

9. The Midway District recommend to state that departmental report blanks be drawn up, printed and distributed annually to local, district and state chairmen to help promote better working relationship.
