

The noon repast was served by the host church. Just another South Georgia styled meal which was very good.


WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Never before has the task of the church been so great and urgent in the field of Christian education. We are rapidly approaching the day when if it were possible the very elect will be deceived. No one would dare argue that it is not important that the faith of the redeemed be preserved; and, the stronger the faith, the safer will be the soul.

One must know something about Christ before He can be accepted as Saviour. "... how shall they believe in Him of whom they have not heard?" (Romans 10:14). Since this is true, it stands to reason that the greater the knowledge of Christ, the greater will be the faith in Christ.

In the face of these needs, and in the light of these facts, we would recommend the following:

1. That each church endeavor to establish and maintain the best teaching staff possible in the Sunday school.

2. That each church conduct study courses and Bible study as regular as might be possible.

3. That each pastor bear in mind his personal responsibility as the shepherd of his flock. Let him not forget that he is to educate his people in the Word of God as thoroughly as possible. Two things should be kept in mind every time he stands to deliver a message to his people: (1) The need to develop the mind. Solomon said "For as he thinketh in his heart, so is he." We need to keep the minds of our people active and alert, and keep before them the proper material on which to think. (2) Let us never forget the importance of the proper emotions for the proper spiritual development of our people. Just as the person who depends entirely on emotions is in danger of drifting into the realm of the fanatic. So those who depend on



reason alone are in danger of drifting into liberalism. God grant that we might be able to develop our people into strong and able Christians. If this is to be done, there must be a constant effort to co-ordinate the reason and the emotions.

4. We further recommend that each church be liberal in supporting our fundamental institutions of higher education.

We urgently insist that the entire association keep every fundamental means of education before the minds of our people, and before our Father in prayer.



Motion made and carried that the new church at Albany be seated in this convention.


