The next annual session will convene with Travelers' Rest Church, October 31, 1962; program to be arranged by the host church.

The second day of this session will convene with Albany Church, November 1, 1962.

First Quarterly Session

The first quarterly session of the Midway Association of Free Will Baptists convened with the First Free Will Baptist Church in Albany, Georgia, on January 20, 1961, at 10:00 a. m.

Devotional was conducted by the moderator, using Psalm 1.

Singing was led by Rev. S. T. Shutes; followed with prayer by Bro. Louis Williams of Bainbridge, Georgia.

Church letters were called for with 21 responding with 64 delegates.

The message was delivered by Rev. J. B. Lovering, using as a text, "The Salt of the Earth" (Matthew 5:13). It was a real good message.

Reassembled at 1:30 p. m. with the clerk leading the singing.

The Midway Mission Board reported in part. Motion made, seconded and carried that the report be adopted as read. (See report.)

Report of the executive board to the Midway Association on our assignment from the July session; that is, the working out a new budget for the new associational year. We thus make our recommendation. Motion made, seconded and carried that the report be adopted in full. (See report.)

Motion made, seconded and carried that we grant Bro. H. L. Knighton a letter in good standing and that his name be dropped from our ministerial roll.

Motion made, seconded and carried that we recess until 9:30 a. m. Thursday, November 2, 1961, to meet with Live Oak Church. Bro. C. A. Gilbert pronounced the benediction.

Motion made, seconded and carried that we set aside 50% of the money sent in by the different churches on their budget, as recommended in this session, to do mission work in the bounds of the Midway Association. Motion made, seconded and carried to table this until the afternoon session.

The resolution that was to come from the Midway District Sunday School Convention was not brought in in writing, but the clerk of the association stated the resolution and the president of the Sunday School Convention and others who were present at the convention agreed that we had the substance of the resolution. Motion made, seconded and carried that this be tabled until the afternoon session.

Motion made, seconded and carried to recess for the preaching service and the noon repast.

The Rev. S. T. Shutes brought the message taken from Ezekiel 5:5, with the subject, "Our Place in God's Time Clock." The clock hands of prophecy turns regardless of what we do. If we expect to do much, we better stop this fussing and preach the gospel.

The noon meal was just fine. Many thanks to the Live Oak people.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The devotions were conducted by Bro. Louis Williams, taken from Luke 3:3; 2:52. Bro. Williams is very young in the ministry, but we believe God will do many works through him.

The singing was led by Bro. Mellette.

At this time business was resumed. All was well and in order for the report of the executive committee on churches and ministers. Motion made, seconded and carried to adopt the report.

The report of Christian education was given. Motion made, seconded and carried to adopt the report. (See report.)

The temperance report was given. Motion made, seconded and carried to adopt report. (See report.)

The mission board gave its report. Motion made, seconded and carried to adopt report. (See report.)

Motion made, seconded and carried to give a rising vote of thanks to this church and community for the splendid entertainment during the day.

Motion made, seconded and carried to take from the table the resolution asking the Midway Association to assume the sole responsibility for the operating of the Sunday School Rally each fifth Sunday afternoon. The Sunday School Convention voted to abolish the said Sunday School Convention and leave it to the association to pay the bills of the rally and elect the officers of said rally each year except this year for they had just been elected. Further, that these officers be vested with the power and instructions to run a good rally, and that these officers report to the Midway Association in its annual session each year as to their work and accomplishment. Carried by a standing vote.

Obituary report was given by Bro. Watson. Motion made, seconded and carried to adopt report. (See report.)

The amended motion was passed by a standing vote that the 50 per cent of the budget money sent to the association by the various churches be given to the mission board of the Midway Association to be spent in the bounds of this association.

Motion made, seconded and carried that the finance committee's report be adopted. (See report.) Motion made, seconded and carried to amend this report to read: "That any deficiency in the treasury between now and the January session be paid out of the mission treasury, but to be replaced after the January session."

Motion made, seconded and carried that the body go on record as favoring the election of Bro. Mance Casin to the office of promotional secretary for the Georgia State Free Will Baptist Association. Carried by a rising vote. No opposition.
