PROCEEDINGS

TUESDAY EVENING, JULY 11

The fourteenth annual session of the National Association of Original Free Will Baptist of the United States of America convened with the Free Will Baptists of California in the Richmond Church, Richmond, California, on July 11-13, 1950.

The Tuesday evening session of the association was opened by I. J. Stanley, Superintendent of the Free Will Baptist Children's Home, Greenville, Tennessee, who led the vast audience in the songs "To the Work" and "Love Lifted Me." Rev. Dean Moore, California, conducted the devotions, using the third chapter of I John as a basis for his remarks. After these timely remarks, Rev. Henry Melvin, business manager of the Free Will Baptist Bible College, Nashville, Tennessee, led the congregation in prayer. The devotions were continued by the congregation singing the hymn, "He's a Wonderful Saviour."

Following this period of praise and devotion, the clerk called the Association to order, presenting the moderator, Rev. N. Bruce Barrow, Bryan, Texas, who presented the program. A motion was made to adopt the program with the amendment that the vacancies of the various boards of the National Association be elected immediately after the report of the boards in order that these boards might assemble and perfect their organizations before the close of the Association. The program thus adopted became the order of procedure during this meeting.

The moderator presented the assistant moderator, Rev. Homer Willis, Detroit, Michigan, who read the appointment of the members of the Committee on Committees. They were as follows: Rev. L. C. Johnson, Tennessee, Chairman; Rev. Luther Gibson, Mississippi; Rev. James A. Evans, North Carolina; Rev. O. H. Doss, California; and Rev. Wayne Tucker, Arkansas.

Rev. George McLain, host pastor, extended to the assemblage a cordial welcome giving a picture of the work in California, stating that all classes, groups, and nationalities are to be found hungering for the Gospel. Before the close of his brief welcome, he challenged us as Free Will Baptists to strive harder than ever before to present Christ to the world.

Mrs. Mary Moore, California, gave a beautiful rendition of the song, "Victory in Jesus."

The keynote address: "Every Free Will Baptist a Good Steward" was delivered by our moderator, who used I Peter 4:10 as the text for his message. Some of the things he stressed were as follows:

- Stewardship is the acceptance from God of personal responsibility of all affairs of life.
- 2. Fear kills an aggressive spirit in us as christians.
- 3. Faith plus nothing makes a christian.
- 4. Faithful living proves our Christianity.

- 5. Faithful dying crowns our Christianity.
- 6. Jesus said more about earthly serving than heavenly bliss.

Following this inspiring and challenging message the song, "Footprints of Jesus" was sung by the congregation. Rev. F. C. Zinn, Missouri, spoke the benediction.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 12

The proceedings of the day were begun by congregational singing directed by the convention music director, I. L. Stanley. Rev. Homer Willis, using Mark 12:41-44 brought a short devotional message on the topic, "The Mite with Might." Mrs. J. L. Welch, Tennessee, led the congregation in prayer.

The report of the committee on committees was read and received. A motion was made that we elect as a group the committees named in the report. (See the report elsewhere in the minutes.)

Rev. James A. Evans, North Carolina, was appointed by the moderator as Parliamentarian for the session.

The report of the General Board was read and received for consideration to be adopted item by item. (This report, item by item, will be found in the section of the minutes reserved for reports.)

At this point business was suspended in adherence to the program adopted in the opening of the session.

Rev. George McLain, host pastor, introduced to the audience the Vice-President of the local ministerial association and pastor of the Central Avenue Baptist Church, Richmond, California, Rev. Henry B. Hiatt, who heartily welcomed the association into the fellowship of the Richmond churches, and to the city of Richmond.

Returning to the consideration of the report of the General Board the assembly upon motion adopted item 9.

Motion made to adopt item 10.

Motion made that a committee be appointed by moderator to study item 4 to see if a constitutional change would be necessary for its adoption. The appointed committee was: Rev. J. R. Davidson, Chairman, North Carolina; Rev. Seldon Bullard, South Carolina, and Rev. E. E. Morris, Oklahoma.

Upon motion the report of the National Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary was accepted as information. (This report may be seen in the section of the minutes reserved for reports.)

Rev. Henry Melvin gave a glowing report of the Nationwide Christ-Controlled Free Will Baptist League Conference held at Norfolk, Virginia, June 13-15, 1950. He gave a carefully stated, brief resume of the history of our League Conference's growth, climaxing the report with the heart-touching account of the consecration service at the close of the conference and flinging a challenge to the National Association as the parent organization to give our youth a place in the vineyard of service.

Upon motion, the financial report of the Free Will Baptist League Board was adopted. (Report may be seen in the report section of the minutes.)

Rev. Damon C. Dodd, Promotional Secretary of the Association, Nashville, Tennessee, gave his report which was entitled, "Good Stewards Through Our Denominational Program." Motion to receive the report. (Report may be seen in Report section of the minutes.)

At this time the moderator discontinued the business for the morning and song leader, I. L. Stanley, led the congregation in the singing of praises to our God.

Rev. Luther Gibson, Tupelo, Mississippi, used I John 1 as a basis for his remarks in the devotional service. Following these remarks, Rev. L. C. Johnson, Nashville, Tennessee, led in prayer.

Special music was rendered by Mrs. J. Reford Wilson, Oklahoma, and Mrs. Fern Ray. They sang "Wonderful Jesus."

Rev. E. E. Morris, of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, spoke a soul-stirring message on "The Stewardship of Life," using as his text II Corinthians 8:5, ". . But first gave their ownselves to the Lord." He stressed that before we can become good stewards we must surrender our all to God. He stated that a man's success or failure as a steward depends, to a great degree, upon his thinking. He concluded his message with the profound truth that if we are to be good stewards we must give ourselves to one another.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, JULY 12

The afternoon session opened with singing led by I. J. Stanley. Prayer was offered by Rev. J. A. Evans, Wilson, North Carolina. A duet, "They are Nailed to the Cross," sung by Mrs. Loy Ballard and Mr. Stanley, preceded devotional thoughts on "Radiant Leadership" by Rev. Evans, Exodus 34:29.

The committee appointed to find the status of the Sunday School Board in regards to the constitution, gave its report as follows:

"We recomment that Article 8 of the constitution of the National Association of the Free Will Baptists be changed so as to provide a Sunday School Board of five members."

The report was received by the body.

The report of the Credentials Committee was received and the delegates seated. (This report will be found in the section of the minutes reserved for reports.)

Mr. I. L. Stanley led the congregation in singing a hymn of praise.

A partial report of the Resolutions Committee was read and adopted. (See report in section reserved.)

The report of the Board of Publications and Literature, entitled "Stewardship Through the Printed Page," was given by the chairman, Rev. J. C. Griffin. The report was adopted. (This report may be seen in section of minutes reserved for reports.)

A partial report of the Nominating Committee was given. The committee nominated for the vacancies on the General Board the following:

Texas-Noah Cole

Missouri-Rev. Ben Scott

Oklahoma-Rev. E. E. Morris

Arkansas-Rev. Homer Parker

California-Rev. O. H. Doss

Motion was made that this report be accepted and elect by acclamation. The Nominating Committee in another partial report, offered the name of Mr. L. E. Duncan to succeed himself on the Board of Publications and Literature. Mr. Duncan was duly elected by the body.

Rev. J. B. Bloss, chairman of the Home Mission Board, gave the report of the Board. The report was adopted.

The Nominating Committee offered the name of Rev. George McLain, California, to fill the vacancy on the Board of Home Missions.

Motion was made to adopt the partial report and elect by acclamation.

The report of the Foreign Mission Board, given by the chairman, Rev. Raymond Riggs, was adopted.

Rev. Winford Davis was nominated by the Nominating Committee to succeed himself in office. This part of the report of the committee was also adopted.

At this time a motion was made that we extend the time for business twenty minutes for the purpose of taking care of the business before the body.

The Resolutions Committee offered their completed report to the body for its adoption. Motion was made that the report of the committee be accepted and acted upon item by item. (Report, item by item, may be seen in section reserved for reports.)

Item 5 was adopted.

After some discussion on Item 6, a motion that we table the remaining items and adjourn for the day, was sustained.

WEDNESDAY EVENING, JULY 12

The evening session was opened by singing the hymns, "Revive Us Again" and "Since Jesus Came Into My Heart."

Rev. Raymond Riggs, Chairman of the Foreign Mission Board, brought the evening message, using as a basis for his thoughts, I Corinthians 4:2, "Moreover it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful." Brother Riggs pointed out that if Free Will Baptists choose to carry out Christ's commission "to go into all the world and preach the Gospel" as God expects us to carry it out, we must, as stewards of His:

- 1. Be faithful in Prayer.
- 2. Be faithful in Preaching.
- 3. Be faithful in Promoting the Mission Program.

At the conclusion of his message, Brother Riggs introduced our missionary to India, Miss Laura Belle Barnard, who spoke briefly concerning the work there. At the close of her address, pictures of the Indian Mission work were shown.

THURSDAY, JULY 13

The morning devotions consisted of the singing of hymns, led by the Convention song leader, I. L. Stanley. A devotional message from II Timothy 4:1-8 was given by Rev. Homer Willis, Michigan.

Rev. D. W. Alexander, North Carolina, led the Convention in prayer.

Motion carried to elect a member to fill the vacancy occurring on the Free Will Baptist League Board. Rev. W. S. Mooneyham, Oklahoma, was elected by acclamation to succeed himself on the Board.

Rev. L. C. Johnson, Tennessee, gave an inspiring and glowing report of the Stewardship Commission.

Discussion was resumed on Item 6 of the report of Resolutions Committee.

A motion was duly sustained that Item 6 be tabled for at least twelve months.

Item 7 of the Report of Resolutions Committee was adopted.

The Nominating Committee was excused in order to nominate the committee requireed in the adoption of Item 7. The committee recommended as follows: Rev. Henry Melvin and Rev. F. C. Zinn, to work with Rev. D. C. Dodd, the Promotional Secretary. They were elected.

Motion was made that articles tabled during Wednesday's session be removed from the table.

Item 7 of the Report of the General Board was adopted. (The Moderator ruled that Article X of the Constitution be changed to comply with Item 7 as this was implied by the 24-hours tabling of the item.)

Amended Item 8 of the report of the General Board was adopted.

The report of the committee appointed to find the status of the Sunday School Board in regards to the Constitution was made and adopted.

The report of the Board of Trustees of the Free Will Baptist Bible College was given by Rev. J. L. Welch, chairman. His report was entitled, "The Stewardship of Preparation." (See this report in section of minutes reserved for reports.)

The report was adopted.

A period of special prayer was observed in behalf of a denominationwide revival that would in turn spread over the world.

Business was suspended for a period of worship.

The congregation sang "In the Vineyard of the Lord," after which Mrs. Fannie Polston, Tennessee, led in prayer.

Rev. Seldon Bullard, Darlington, South Carolina, used Psalm 42:4, "No man cared for my soul," as a text for his devotional message. Mr. Bullard stated that the condition of the world today is due to the failure of the church to express the love of Christ to the world.

A quartette, composed of former graduates of the Free Will Baptist Bible College, sang "Rescue the Perishing."

Rev. J. L. Welch began his message on the subject of "The Stewardship of Evangelism" with the statement, "To be entrusted with evangelizing the world is the most tremendous responsibility that has ever been laid upon the shoulders of man." Brother Welch used as his text Romans 1:14, "I am debtor both to the Greeks, and to the Barbarians; both to the wise and the unwise."

THURSDAY AFTERNOON, JULY 13

The congregation sang "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms," opening the afternoon session.

Rev. E. C. Morris, Tifton, Georgia, used Psalms 119:151 and Matthew 28:19 as text verses for his message, "Comfort to the Laborers."

The Nominating Committee made another partial report, nominating Revs. Melvin Bingham, J. F. Miller, and J. R. Davidson to succeed themselves on the Board of Trustees of the Bible College. The report of the committee was adopted.

Revs. D. C. Dodd, Henry Melvin, and Harry Staires were also nominated by the committee to secure a place for the National meetings next year. The report was adopted.

The report of the National Board of Superannuation was made by the chairman of the Board, Rev. F. C. Zinn, Missouri. (This report may be seen in the section of minutes reserved for reports.)

Motion was made to adopt the report with the recommendation provided that it be made a yearly report rather than two six months reports.

The Nominating Committee nominated Rev. F. C. Zinn to succeed himself on the Board of Superannuation. Motion made and sustained that we adopt the recommendation of the nominating committee.

The report of the Sunday School Board was made to the Association and upon motion was received as information.

The Nominating Committee nominated Rev. John West to succeed himself on the Sunday School Board. Motion made and sustained to adopt the recommendation of the committee.

Rev. Wade Jernigan, Oklahoma, gave the report of the Temperance Committee. (The report may be seen in the report section of the minutes.) Upon motion the report was adopted.

The National Treasurer, Rev. D. C. Dodd, gave his report. The report was adopted. (This report may be seen in the report section of the minutes.)

The report of the Mission Board in regards to the status of the work in Cuba was given by Rev. Rashie Kennedy, North Carolina. The report was received as information. (Report is included in the report section of the minutes.)

Motion was made and sustained that we extend the time of the business period long enough to elect the officers of the Association.

The Nominating Committee completed their report with the following nominations: (Completed report may be seen in the report section of the minutes.)

Associate Moderatos-Rev. Homes Willis, Michigan.

Clerk-Rev. Paul J. Ketteman, South Carolina.

Promotional Secretary—Rev. Damon C. Dodd, Tennessee.

Motion made to elect officers separately, giving opportunity for nominations from the floor.

Officers were duly elected as they were nominated by the Nominating Committee.

The business of the fourteenth annual session of the National Association of Original Free Will Baptists having been completed, a motion was sustained that this body adjourn until the next annual session would be held.

Those who remained for the Thursday Evening services received a real blessing from the beginning of the service to the end. Brother Stanley led the singing in the opening part of the service. Mr. Grady Henly, a deacon

of the host church led the congregation in prayer. Rev. J. Reford Wilson, Oklahoma, was in charge of the devotions. Brother Wilson used I John 1:9 as the text around which he wove his message. Mrs. Mary Moore sang, "I Won't Have to Cross Jordan Alone."

Rev. Damon C. Dodd, Promotional Secretary of the denomination, brought the closing message entitled, "The Steward's Personal Experience in Salvation." I John 5:18-21 was used as text for the message. He emphasized the following truths in the message:

- 1. The Steward knows that he is saved.
- 2. The Steward knows that he can be kept saved.
- 3. The Steward knows the secret of joy in service.

Report of General Board

- No. 7. That a committee be appointed by the National Association to locate as quickly as possible a place where these meetings can be held.
- No. 8. That Article 5, Section 2 of the Constitution of the National Association be changed to read as follows: The moderator and clerk shall receive an honorarium of \$50.00 annually plus 5c per mile travel expense to and from sessions of the National Association.
- No. 9. That Rev. Damon C. Dodd serve as the denominational representative for the National Association of Evangelicals.
- No. 10. That the chairman of all boards be designated as delegates to the National Association of Evangelicals and that the clerks of each of these boards act as alternates.

Report of Board of Publication and Literature

To the General Board and the National Association of Free Will Baptists—Greetings:

There have been no new publications during the past year. However we have been at work on manuscript for a "History of the Free Will Baptist" of the United States, a history suitable for the using as a text book in our Bible College, or by any one who might want to speak with authority. We are asking for \$1,200 for this work.

We have had one meeting during the year, namely, at the Bible College in Nashville, during April of this year, at which time after much discussion we decided to continue, bringing up to date historical facts. At this time Rev. Damon Dodd was added as a special member of the committee to search for facts, as he is on the field much and has a good opportunity to find much valuable truth for the work.

We are selling our booklets rather slowly, yet one agent has sold 200 copies this year of "Personal Soul Winning" by Mrs. Edwards. We have approximately two thousand copies of this helpful book on hand, or in the hands of the Publisher—The F. W. B. Gem, Monett, Missouri.

A number of the Auxiliaries of the East are using this book in their study courses and thus getting the benefits, and at the same time helping the denominational program.

We have several hundred copies of the "Why the Atonement Necessary" by Mrs. Marie Hyatt and also "The One Foundation" by your servant, which are being distributed through the F. W. B. Press at Ayden, North Carolina.

Recently, your chairman has received some manuscript from Rev. Paul Woolsey titled "THE QUACK DOCTOR," which we are considering the feasibility of printing into a small booklet.

We have a sample of a system of Sunday School records which may replace the old system as prepared many years ago and has being distributed through the Monett Press. This system is known as the "Seven Point Record System," which system was prepared by Rev. Sherman H. Oakes of Bessemer City, North Carolina. The Board has not had the time to analyze the System thoroughly, but we hope to do so in the near future.

We now present the minutes as passed upon in April for your consideration.

COMMENTS

One of the most effective mediums for spreading righteousness is through the printed page. We have been woefully lacking in this field of sending forth Gospel truth. Not because we do not have the talent, but due to the fact that we have been content to use that which was and is prepared by writers of other denominations, too willing to support the institutions of other denominations and let ours suffer, but we are praying that the time will come, when even I shall see the desire of my soul in publications and literature. This can be, providing we will work together and pull for better things, with less destructive and more constructive criticism and a united heart and mind for the spreading of the Gospel of Our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

Annual Report National Foreign Mission Board

FOR THE YEAR 1949-1950

To the National Association of Free Will Baptists-Greetings:

We, the Board of Foreign Missions, beg to submit the following report:

We come to the close of another national year with a full realization that the Lord has again wonderfully blessed in our foreign missions department during another year. While we have experienced our reverses, yet we can claim great victory. We have had our financial emergencies during the year, yet at the same time we have handled more money than in any previous year; having handled a total of \$46,005.52 since July 1, 1949. Our financial emergencies have not been the result of a letting up in giving on the part of our people, but they have rather been the result of our undertaking to do more than in any year before. Due to our expansion in the work we have been compelled to operate during the past year on an extremely narrow margin, but we have great faith the picture will be an agreeably different one the coming year.

The work in both India and Cuba is going forward with great blessing. We have much on each field for which to be thankful. We have great open doors and our workers are moving into them just as fast as our people will make it possible.

The Board has held only one meeting during the past year, which was held at the college in April. In the meantime, business has been taken care of by correspondence.

During the meeting in April the following motions were passed: A form for an endowment check, designed to encourage and promote a continued support of Foreign Missions, to be used by our workers, was presented by Bro. Riggs. On motion we endorse the use of the card for the above stated purpose.

The Board discussed a revision of the Standard Requirements for missionaries under the head of "Practical Experience," and on motion Brother Riggs was instructed to prepare the revision, and submit the same by mail for approval.

It was decided to discontinue publication of the Missionary Review for the sake of economy, and on motion, Brother Winford Davis was instructed to prepare the material used in the Review and supply the same to the Free Will Baptist Gem, Monett, Missouri, and to The Free Will Baptist, Ayden, North Carolina, and any other Free Will Baptist publications, and ask them to give space for the same.

At the request, by cablegram, of Miss Zalene Lloyd, by motion, she was released by the Board as a Missionary to India. The Chairman, Brother

Riggs, was requested to publish the cablegram from Miss Lloyd, also copy of our reply to her.

Brother Damon C. Dodd came before the Board and made a report of his meeting with the National Evangelical Foreign Mission Association, held at Indianapolis, Indiana, April 18th-21st, 1950, which was highly informative. On motion, we gave Brother Dodd a vote of thanks for his splendid report.

Motion carried that Brother Riggs be our representative to the next session of the National Evangelical Foreign Mission Association.

Motion carried that the chairman be appointed to arrange the introduction and conclusion of the film showing our activities on the field in Cuba, and also the purchase of the film, with one duplicate copy—To explain, we might say that this is the film made of our Cuban work by Missions Visualized, Inc., of Portland, Oregon, which is an arm of E. F. M. A.

Motion carried that Brother Dodd be appointed to arrange a Missionary Conference to be held at the Bible College in Nashville during the week after the first Sunday in September of this year.

Motion carried that Brother Davis write to our church publications reminding our people that the Board is held responsible for the allocation of all funds, therefore the funds earmarked for special purposes will be used where, in the judgment of the Board, it is most needed.

Applications for appointment to foreign fields were presented by Miss Volene Wilson, Marion, North Carolina, and Mr. and Mrs. Donald Carlile Hanan.

Motion carried to approve the application of Miss Wilson for some foreign field, conditioned on her meeting the requirements, and securing the people's pledge for her support on the field.

Motion carried the matters concerning itinerate work be left wholly in the hands of the State Directors, including the selection of the itinerate workers.

Motion carried the applications of Mr. and Mrs. Carlisle Hanna and Miss Wanda Edwards be held under consideration until they have had time to meet the requirements of the Board.

- (1) Motion carried *First* that we promote and operate in field of Evangelism. *Second* that we promote and operate in the field of Church extension.
- (2) Whereas the Home Mission Board proposes to operate in the field of church extension, and whereas we, the Home Mission Board, feel that a merger between the Foreign Mission and the Home Mission Board would not be advisable at this time, be resolved that we go on record as requesting the General Board of National Association to use its influence against this proposed merger and the setting up of a Church Extension Board. Motion carried.
- (3) Motion carried that we send Rev. J. B. Bloss as representative to the NEA Convention at Indianapolis, Indiana.

- (4) Motion carried that we order 2500 emblems for license plates to retail at \$1.00 each, together with the expense of mailing.
- (5) Motion carried that the secretary and Rev. Dodd work together by correspondence relative to the revival of the work in Nebraska and the several other places under consideration. Rev. H. E. Staires appointed to investigate the Indian work in Oklahoma and Rev. J. A. Evans appointed to investigate the Indian work in North Carolina.
- (6) Motion carried that Chairman and Rev. Dodd try to work out a plan whereby Miss Bessie Yeley be sent to El Paso, Texas to try and establish a work with the Spanish speaking Mexicans, Maximum time one month, Maximum expense, \$250.00.
- (7) Motion carried that we adopt the proposed plan of advertising to be carried out by the Chairman and the promotional secretary.
- (8) Motion carried that the budget for the National Home Mission Board for 1950-51 be set at \$6,000.00, the allocations for each state to be made by the Secretary and the promotional Secretary.
- (9) Motion carried that we extend a rising vote of thanks to the South Side Free Will Baptist Church and pastor and the Third Free Will Baptist Church and pastor for the splendid hospitality shown during this board meeting.

Report of Special Committees of Home Mission Board

The reports of the special committees were as follows:

Rev. Harry Staires reports that the Home Missions Board sponsored a revival at Hobbs, New Mexico, which resulted in the organization of a Free Will Baptist Church with 18 charter members and a Sunday School of 45 members. Property has been purchased and a building program is under way.

Contact has been made by the Board among 2,000 Choctaw Indians of Oklahoma. Plans are now in making to start a work among them to be sponsored by the National Home Missions Board.

Rev. James A. Evans reports that two trips have been made into the

Cherokee Indian Reservation in Western North Carolina. The population is 3,300 and some churches are at work among them. We can get help from the school officials there for holding services. A pageant is now being given which draws large crowds to the village. If the Board could match the State Fund of \$150.00, a meeting could be conducted this summer.

Realizing that we must make plans to participate in the revival which is now sweeping America, your Home Missions Board recommends:

- 1. That September 1, 1950, February 14, 1951, and May 1, 1951 be cesignated as special prayer days for revival and sufficient advertising and publicity be given that they will be generally observed.
- 2. That a series of simultaneous revivals be planned. For this purpose we should define our borders as follows:

Eastern—Tennessee, West Virginia, Virginia, Kentucky, Ohio, Michigan, North Carolina.

Central—Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Texas, Louisiana.

South Eastern—Mississippi, Florida, Alabama, South Carolina, Georgia.

Western-Arizona, California, New Mexico.

3. Each of these regions shall be organized for the campaigns with a regional director appointed by the Home Mission Board to work out the date, advertising, reports, and a list of co-operating churches. Careful records should be kept by the regional director of each revival in his area and reported to the Home Mission Board. A goal of 12,000 new members should be set for another year.

It is to be noted from the above financial report that the income of the institution from all sources of the church actually amounted to \$20,224.22, while the receipts from the students for tuition, room and board, and various fees, amounted to \$27,334.37. Thus it is revealed that the denomination has invested \$1 to every \$1.50 that each student has put into his education.

We would like to offer this explanatory note relative to income and expenses, namely: The report reveals that our expenditures exceeded the in-

come by \$1,112.18. However, the report reveals that this was caused by the enlargement of one building and the complete renovation of two buildings on the campus, which is reported under the items of "Labor", and "Maintenance and Repairs." This is no cause for alarm as our balance sheet shows a wholesome balance and that our total assets and inventories which include the total worth of the institution to be \$66,136.11. This is an all-time high.

Stewardship Commission Report

Expenditure for this purpose was \$178.10.

Report of the Resolutions Committee

The Resolution Committee submits the following report:

1—We recommend that this body extend a standing vote of thanks to the local church, the California state Association, and the Ministerial Association of the City of Richmond for their fine hospitality while we have been in session.

2—We recommend that this body extend a vote of thanks to those appearing on our program for their fine inspirational messages in word and

song which we have heard during this session, to the committee who prepared the program, and, also, to everyone who has had a part in making our stay here in California so enjoyable, especially those who have donated the very beautiful flowers each day.

3-We recommend that the clerk of this body be authorized to write a letter of appreciation and thanks to the ministerial association of Richmond,

California for their splendid co-operation during this session.

4—We recommend that the Mission Boards in the respective states composing this National body cooperate in selecting a state missionary who will, with the assistance of the Promotional Secretary of the National Association, visit, work with, and teach the unaffiliated churches within the state until they are fully enlisted in the National program of Free Will Baptists. In those states where there is no state mission board, we recommend that the Promotional Secretary of the National Association, survey the situation and assist in setting up a workable program in these states.

5—We recommend that in the interest of unity and cooperation the following special days be recognized in all Free Will Baptist churches: the first Sunday in October, 1950, be set aside as Bible College Sunday; the first Sunday in February, 1951, as Foreign Mission Sunday; and the fourth Sunday in April as Home Mission Sunday.

6—We recommend that no change be made in our treatise, at the session in which the resolution is presented; but that the resolution be read in that session, then carried over to the next regular association for final

reading and vote.

7—We recommend that a committee of two be appointed by this body to study the possibility of designing a symbol which could be used to identify a Free Will Baptist Church in any and all communities throughout the United States.

CONSTITUTION OF THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION

As Revised by the 1950 Session at Richmond, California

From experience we, the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and revealing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship among us as a church; and to preserve and maintain correspondence and coordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denominational government.

ARTICLE I

Name—This organization shall be known as the National Association of Free Will Baptists of the United States of America.

ARTICLE II

Purpose—The object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing the National Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may be hereafter represented therein.

ARTICLE III

Composition—This National Association shall be composed of its general officers, the members of all standing boards, or committees, the duly appointed delegates of Free Will Baptist organizations which actively promote and support the work of the Association and all ordained ministers and missionaries who belong to general bodies which are affiliated with this National Association.

ARTICLE IV

Representation—Representation in the National Association is to be by states. Each state association shall be entitled to five delegates to be elected from the laity, regardless of the number of district associations in the state; but in addition to the five delegates, each state shall be entitled to one delegate for each district association within the bounds of District Association. Districts in the state which have no state association, and those whose state organizations may not be affiliated with this body, shall elect and send their delegates directly to the National Association.

ARTICLE V

Finance—Each State Association representing in this body shall send the sum of \$10.00 with \$5.00 extra for each District Association composing the said State Association or Convention. The district or subordinate associations representing directly shall send the sum of \$5.00 with their reports.

Section 2. The Moderator and Clerk shall receive an honorarium of \$50.00 annually plus 5c per mile travel expense to and from sessions of the National Association. Assistant Moderator and Assistant Clerk shall re-

ceive the same benefits as Moderator or Clerk in the absence of either the Moderator or the Clerk.

ARTICLE VI

Discipline—This National Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practice that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing said organization of the National Association of the Free Will Baptist Church, or act upon any appeal that may be made by any body belonging to the National Association. Said appeal shall have been written and properly signed by the constituent body or bodies, and its decision shall be final. Such appeals are to come before the National Association, after having been appealed from the lower to the next higher body.

Section 2. All appeals coming before the National Association may be settled in either of the following ways: (1) By the National Association when sitting in a committee as a whole. (2) By a special committee whose report shall be voted on without discussion.

ARTICLE VII

Officers—The Officers of this National Association shall consist of a Moderator, an assistant moderator, a clerk, an assistant clerk, promotional secretary who shall serve as treasurer, each of whom shall be elected at the close of each regular session.

Section 2. Committees, as necessary, shall be appointed by the Chairman unless otherwise provided for, and shall hold office until their work is completed, or until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE VIII

Boards—All standing Boards shall be composed of five members, exclusive of the General Board and the Board of Trustees of the Free Will Baptist Bible College. Standing Boards include the General Board, the Board of Trustees of the Free Will Baptist Bible College, the Foreign Mission Board, the Home Mission Board, the Free Will Baptist League Board, the Sunday School Board, the Board of Superannuation, and the Board of Literature and Publications. The personnel of each of the foregone, exclusive of the General Board and the Board of Trustees of the Free Will Baptist Bible College, shall be elected as follows, the first named for a term of one year, the second for a term of two years, the third for a term of three years, the fourth for a term of four years, and the fifth for a term of five years. Succession to office thereafter shall be determined as order requires.

Section 2. The personnel of the General Board shall be composed of the general officers of the National Association and the chairman of each of the following Boards; The Foreign Mission Board, the Home Mission Board, the Free Will Baptist League Board, the Sunday School Board, the Board of Superannuation, and the Board of Literature and Publications. There shall also be elected by the National Body one member from each

affiliated State Association and one member from each affiliated association comprising one or more than one state. The President of the National Woman's Auxiliary Convention and the President of the National Sunday School Convention shall be ex-officio members of the Board.

The term of office of those chosen within given State Associations shall be two years; and so constituted that the expiration of the term of office of those residing east of the Mississippi River shall alternate with those residing west of the Mississippi.

Section 3. The General Board shall have power to act in behalf of, and for the National Association from one regular session to another, and shall also have power to elect such officers as may be necessary for its own government, and to carry out the plans and undertakings of the National Association.

Section 4. The General Board shall have power to fill irregular vacancies that may occur in its own body, and shall also have power to fill any irregular vacancies that may occur in any department of the work between sessions of the National Association. It shall be the duty of this Board to make written reports of all its work to each annual session of the Association.

Section 5. The General Board shall organize at its own discretion for the promotion of the work set forth in sections three and four of this article. It is understood that an Executive Committee consisting of seven members shall be elected by the General Board from among its membership, whose duty it shall be to act on all matters coming within the scope of the work of the Board when said General Board is not in session.

Section 6. The duties of the various standing Boards shall be to plan a program and supervise its operation in their respective fields. They shall organize themselves and regulate their work as may become necessary, and as may be found in harmony with the principles and tenets of the National Association.

Each standing board shall prepare a budget of its proposed financial expenditures at the beginning of each fiscal year, and present same for approval of the National Association before any expenditures are made for the year.

Section 7—No person shall fill more than one office at the same time, or any office and a place on any standing board, except as he may become a member of the General Board by virtue of his office. No person shall serve on more than one standing board at the same time, except as he may become a member of the General Board by virtue of being chairman of the board of which he is an elected member.

ARTICLE IX

A Board of Trustees of not less than nine members nor more than fifteen shall be elected by the National Association and charged with the responsibility of establishing, organizing, controlling, and operating a Free

Will Baptist Bible College in the city of Nashville, of the state of Tennessee. It is provided, however, that the first Board of Trustees shall be composed of nine members, who shall be classified and elected in groups of 3's as follows: The terms of office of the first three named shall expire July 15, 1946; the terms of office of the second three named shall expire July 15, 1948; and the terms of office of the last three named shall expire July 15, 1950. Successors in office thereafter shall be elected biennially in groups of 3's, each for a term of six years, and they shall continue in service until their successors have been chosen. Any trustee may be re-elected to office at the option of the National Association.

In addition to the original nine trustees prescribed for the Bible College, the National Association may, at its option, elect six others to membership on the Board; but they shall be elected, two biennially, until six members have been added to the board. These elections shall coincide with the respective biennial elections of the original groups of 3's, and shall, in actual practice, effect or result in a reclassification and biennial election of all trustees in groups of 5's. Under this option, if elected, trustees shall be chosen by the National Association biennially in groups of 5s, each for a term of six years.

The trustees of the Bible College shall have power to apply for and receive a charter of incorporation under the name and style of FREE WILL BAPTIST BIBLE COLLEGE of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. It is provided, however, that the charter of incorporation, as proposed, shall be approved and authorized by the National Association previous to its submission for registration, and that no revision or amendment thereafter shall be sought without the specific direction of the National Association.

The Board of Trustees of the Bible College shall also have power to organize at will and to create such by-laws as may be deemed essential for their government and for the control, administration, and promotion of the college, consistent with the provisions of its charter of incorporation and the constitution and regulations of the National Association.

ARTICLE X

The National Association shall hold its regular meetings annually, at the time and place announced by the committee appointed by the Association while in session.

ARTICLE XI

Auxiliaries—The National Woman's Auxiliary Convention and the National Sunday School Convention shall be recognized as subordinate organizations to the National Association. They shall organize at their own discretion, and have power to create and adopt their respective constitution and by-laws, and maintain complete management of the work for which they are constituted. The scope and character of the work of these organizations shall conform to the general program and promotional plans of the

Association. They shall report their accomplishments annually to the National Association.

ARTICLE XII

Should necessity arise, from war, or pestilence, or any cause which prevents a regular meeting whether such a condition is of a local or general condition, then the General Board shall be privileged to call and act with full authority in all matters pertaining to the general welfare of the National Association and the Church as a whole, providing whatever transactions passed shall be by a two-third vote, of the full membership of the said General Board, providing that such transactions shall not conflict with the purpose, and edicts of the Constitution as set forth in the preceding articles.

ARTICLE XIII

This Constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the National Association by a two-thirds vote of members present, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one day in advance.
