# PROCEEDINGS

# Tuesday Evening, July 10

The 20th annual session of the National Association of Free Will Baptists was opened with singing under the direction of Mr. I. L. Stanley, Knoxville, Tenn. The accompanists at the organ and piano were Mrs. Raymond Riggs and the Rev. Herman Hersey. The opening hymn was "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" in keeping with the program theme, "Christ Shall Be Magnified." The Rev. Luther Gibson led the congregation in prayer.

The devotional thought was brought by the Rev. H. L. Knighton, Albany, Ga., who appealed to the delegates to give Christ the pre-eminence.

The Association was called into official session by the clerk, the Rev. Tom Hamilton, who also read the names of those appointed to the Committee on Committees. The Rev. W. S. Mooneyham, executive secretary and presiding officer for the evening, spoke briefly and introduced the Rev. Carl Vallance, pastor of Thomas Memorial Free Will Baptist church in Huntington and chairman of the Arrangements Committee. Mr. Vallance extended a very warm welcome to the convention and also recognized those who had served on the various planning committees for the convention.

Mr. Vallance then introduced the Honorable George Theurer, mayor of Huntington. Mr. Theurer welcomed the delegates in behalf of the city of Huntington and presented to the Rev. Charles A. Thigpen, moderator of the Association, a key to the city.

The Rev. Henry Melvin, chairman of the Credentials Committee, made an announcement concerning the listing of delegates. An all-night prayer meeting was conducted at the Thomas Memorial church beginning at 10:30 p.m. and continuing until 7 a.m. with a good attendance all during the night.

### Wednesday Morning, July 11

The session was opened with the congregation singing the Doxology. After other hymns, the Rev. James F. Miller brought the devotions using parts of Psalms 63 and 27 to present the thought, "We Seek Thy Face." Mr. Miller led the congregation in prayer asking God's guidance and blessing.

MSC that the program be adopted leaving the suggested time flexible at the discretion of the moderator. MSC to adopt the report of the Committee on Committees given by the Rev. John H. West, chairman. (See Committee Reports.)

MSC to receive the partial report of the General Board and lay on the table the recommendations requiring constitutional changes. MSC to adopt the report of the special committee on Laymen's Organizations given by the Rev. Robert Hill.

A partial report of the Credentials Committee was given by the chairman. MSC

\*Motion made, Seconded, Carried.

to adopt the report and seat the delegates from Virginia. The moderator called for representatives from other religious bodies, but none were present at the time.

The morning worship service was opened by singing, "Onward Christian Soldiers." Mrs. K. V. Shutes rendered the special music and the Rev. E. E. Morris led in prayer. A special service was conducted honoring all the former moderators of the National Association. Citations for service were given the following: Rev. J. L. Welch, Rev. James F. Miller, Dr. L. C. Johnson, Rev. N. Bruce Barrow, Rev. E. E. Morris, Rev. J. R. Davidson, and Rev. Floyd B. Cherry. All of the former moderators were present except Mr. Davidson and Mr. Cherry. The clerk led the congregation in a prayer of thanksgiving for the services of these men.

The original Gospeliers quartet sang after which the Rev. J. L. Welch, first moderator of the National Association, delivered the morning message. His subject was, "One in Hope and Doctrine," and he spoke from 1 Corinthians 12. He appealed to the denomination for close agreement on the "fundamentals of our doctrine" and urged that we not become too alarmed over minor differences.

The service was concluded by singing "Blest Be the Tie," with the benediction by the Rev. Walter Carter, assistant moderator.

# Wednesday Afternoon, July 11

The Rev. Rufus Coffey used Acts 19:1-20 as the Scripture thought for the afternoon session. He challenged the association to "seek revival" and led the congregation in prayer. The minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

The report of the Board of Trustees of Free Will Baptist Bible College was given by the Rev. James F. Miller, chairman. MSC to receive the report and adopt the recommendations. MSC to adopt the recommendation offered separately by the Bible College trustees. (See Reports.)

The Rev. Albert C. Johnson, American Bible Society representative, was introduced by the moderator. Mr. Johnson spoke briefly on the subject, "Christ Magnified in Bible Distribution."

A quartet sang "Onward Christian Soldiers" before the featured speaker of the afternoon was introduced. Dr. Ivan L. Bennett, Washington, D. C., then spoke on "Our Obligation to the Young People Who Serve in the Armed Forces." Dr. Bennett is secretary of the Washington office of the American Bible Society and former Chief of Chaplains, USA. At the conclusion of his message, the congregation was asked to join in singing "America."

The report of the executive secretary was given by the Rev. W. S. Mooneyham. MSC to receive the report and consider the recommendations singly. A partial report of the General Board was given at this time which dealt with recommendation No. 1 of the executive secretary's report. MSC to adopt the partial report of the General Board.

MSC that recommendations No. 2 and 3 of the executive secretary's report be adopted.

MSC that the proposed Constitutional amendment relative to Article VIII, Sections 2 and 7 be received and placed on the table.

MSC to receive the report and adopt the recommendations of the Foreign Mission Board as given by the Rev. Raymond Riggs, promotional secretary.

The moderator read a telegram of greetings from the Rev. Clate Risley, general secretary of the National Sunday School Association. He then declared the convention adjourned for the day.

# Wednesday Evening, July 11

After congregational singing, the Rev. George Dunbar gave the invocation. The Reverends Raymond Riggs and Damon Dodd, promotional secretaries for the two mission boards, directed the special missionary service.

Several missionaries working on the field in the United States were recognized:

and gave testimonies. They were the Rev. and Mrs. Johnnie Postlewaite and the Rev. and Mrs. Robert Wilfong.

The Rev. and Mrs. Lonnie Sparks, missionary appointees to Africa, were recognized and gave testimonies. A special offering was received to aid in caring for the expenses of the convention.

Special music for the service was furnished by the Ambassadors quartet, a trio, and a duet by Miss Lucy Wisehart and Benito Rodriguez. The Rev. Thomas H. Willey, director of Free Will Baptist missions in Cuba, was recognized. He introduced the Rev. Estenio Garcia, Cuban pastor, who brought the evening message while Mr. Willey interpreted for him. The service closed after several came forward offering themselves to God in response to the invitation.

### Thursday Morning, July 12

After an opening hymn, the Rev. Rupert Pixley read Psalm 138 and 1 John 5:14. From these scriptures they brought the devotional thought for the morning and concluded with prayer.

The minutes of the previous day's session were read and approved.

The moderator read a telegram of greetings from the Honorable M. G. Burnside, member of Congress.

The final report of the Credentials Committee was presented by the chairman and was adopted. The chairman then read a letter from the Free Will Baptist church in Linneus, Maine, requesting membership in the National Association. A motion was made to offer the Linneus church the fellowship of the Association. An amendment was offered recommending the formation of an association of churches in the state of Maine in order that they may become affiliated with the National Association of Free Will Baptists. The motion as amended was carried.

A partial report of the Nominating Committee was given by the Rev. N. Bruce Barrow, chairman. It was received and the various board members and other candidates were thereby nominated. In every instance, the committee's nominee was elected. (See Report of Nominating Committee.) During these elections the convention voted to sustain the moderator's ruling that any individual nominated, if already holding an office, must express a willingness to resign that office if elected.

MSC to adopt the report of the Home Mission Board as given by the Rev. Damon Dodd, promotional secretary.

MSC to adopt the report and recommendations of the Sunday School Board as given by the Rev. William Mishler, promotional secretary.

The moderator introduced the Rev. George L. Ford, Wheaton, Ill., executive director of the National Association of Evangelicals, who spoke on the subject, "Magnifying Christ Together." The convention was recessed until 11:20 a.m. Mr. Ford offered the closing prayer.

Music for the morning worship service was provided by the congregation and the Ambassadors quartet. The Rev. E. M. French prayed the invocation.

The speaker for this service was the Rev. Willard C. Day, Tulsa, Okla. He used Revelation 3:11, Galatians 5:1, and 2 John 1:8 as the basis for his message on "Retaining Our Attainments." Following the message the congregation sang "The Solid Rock" and the Rev. Howard Y. Taylor prayed the benediction.

# Thursday Afternoon, July 12

After the opening hymns and prayer which was led by the Rev. Clyde Clearman, the clerk read the minutes of the previous session which were approved.

MSC that the partial report of the General Board recommending a Constitutional change concerning the term of office of the executive secretary be brought from the table. MSC to adopt the two resolutions.

MSC to bring from the table the proposed Constitutional change relative to Article VIII, Sections 2 and 7. A motion was sustained to adopt the proposed Constitutional changes. This was followed by a motion and second to postpone. A motion was then made and carried to table all motions before the house. After some question, the moderator ruled that the vote was so unanimous the decision to table would stand.

MSC to adopt the report and proposed budget of the Radio-Television Board which was given by the Rev. Ralph Staten, chairman.

The report of the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention was given by Mrs. LaVerne Miley, president. MSC to receive the report.

MSC to adopt the report of the Board of Publications and Literature as given by the Rev. J. C. Griffin, chairman.

The Budget Committee's report was adopted as read.

The Rev. Henry Melvin, chairman, gave the report of the Free Will Baptist League Board. MSC to adopt the report.

MSC to adopt the report of the Superannuation Board as given by the Rev. K. V. Shutes, promotional secretary.

An oral report was given by the Rev. J. L. Welch for the Polity Committee. The committee recommended that the discussion of Part 1 of the 1955 Polity Committee report be deferred until such a time as a book on theology could be published. MSC to adopt the report.

MSC to adopt the report of the Resolutions Committee. In keeping with a part of the report, the Rev. L. R. Ennis led the convention in prayer for the recovery of the Rev. J. R. Davidson. The delegates then stood in a vote of appreciation to those who had entertained the convention.

MSC that the General Board be instructed to provide material for a book on theology for Free Will Baptists.

MSC to receive the report of the Placement Committee and adopt the recommendations. After hearing brief statements from representatives of the various places inviting the 1957 session, the body voted to accept the invitation to hold the session in Birmingham, Ala.

The final report of the Nominating Committee was made by the chairman. MSC to receive the report and place the names in nomination. In every instance, except one, the nominee of the committee was elected. MSC to expunge from the record the report of the committee and all proceedings concerning the election of a moderator and to nominate and elect a moderator from the floor.

The Rev. Charles A. Thigpen was elected moderator by majority vote. MSC to make Mr. Thigpen's election unanimous.

The Placement Committee announced that St. Louis had been selected as the site for the 1958 session of the National Association.

MSC that the convention stand adjourned.

### REPORT OF TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE

We, the Temperance Committee, meeting at the National Association of Free Will Baptists in Huntington, W. Va., submit the following report:

1. Whereas the liquor industry no longer confines its activities in marketing alcoholic beverages to taverns, dives, road houses, etc., but have invaded our grocery stores, drug stores, restaurants, service stations, and other consumer establishments, we recommend that we continually remind ourselves of the covenant we made with our church in which we agreed to abstain from the sale of, sanction of, and consumption of alcoholic beverages.

2. Whereas the liquor industry has stated that its goal is to have liquor in every home in America, and

Whereas their advertising never reveals the end result of the consumption of their products, but glamorizes drink as being healthful, wholesome, and socially acceptable, and whereas it is scientifically affirmed to be harmful, degrading, and debauching, we recommend that the National Association direct the clerk to write broadcasting company officials, voicing our strong protest against commercial advertising of liquor by means of radio and television.

3. We further recommend that our pastors encourage their churches to cooperate with any of the organizations which oppose the liquor traffic in their locality.

4. Whereas there can be no reasonable justification for the serving of alcoholic beverages on commercial airlines in view of the potential safety hazards, and

Whereas a number of airlines have engaged in this affront to Christian decency by exposing all passengers, including children, in these "flying taverns" to liquor service by providing cocktails to those desiring them while the plane is in flight, and

Whereas spokesman for the airline pilots and stewardesses have consistently condemned this practice as being both hazardous and a public nuisance, and

Whereas the committees in both the House of Representatives and United States Senate are considering measures which would prohibit this dangerous and senseless practice.

Therefore, be it resolved:

1. That this National Association of Free Will Baptists register its strong disapproval of the practice described above and call upon the offending airlines to discontinue it in the interest of safety and public decency.

2. That this National Association of Free Will Baptists give its fullest endorsement to those measures now before congressional committees which would prohibit the serving of alcoholic beverages on commercial airlines.

3. That copies of this resolution be sent to all of the offending airlines and to the Honorable Percy Priest, chairman of the House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, and the Honorable Senators Warren Magnuson and Mike Monroney, chairmen of the Senate Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee and subcommittee, respectively.

4. We recommend that our members, and particularly the pastors and church leaders keep abreast of the subtle tactics of the liquor industry and of proposed legislation which would affect it. Two publications which would help in this are *The Union Signal*, a monthly magazine issued by the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, and *Clipsheet*, a bi-weekly newsletter issued by the Methodist Board of Temperance, and any publication issued by the United Dry Forces in each state in which we have churches.

Under a limited special arrangement, *The Union Signal* may be ordered for \$1.50 a year from 1730 Chicago Ave., Evanston, Ill. *Clipsheet* is \$2 per year from 100 Maryland Ave., N. E., Washington 2, D. C.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE FOR MEN'S ORGANIZATION

To the National Association of Free Will Baptists when convened at Huntington, West Virginia, July 11, 1956:

The committee appointed at the last convention to investigate the possibilities of setting up a uniform layman's organization within the Free Will Baptist Church, begs leave to submit the following report:

After much observation, consultation and prayer, we have arrived at the following conclusions:

1. That within the ranks of the Free Will Baptist Church, there are a considerable number of laymen whose abilities should be enlisted in the program of the church.

2. That there is a definite need for the layman's organizations within the Free Will Baptist Church to be uniform.

3. That this organization, if properly carried out, would be large enough in its scope, to advance the cause of Christ and would lend continual promotion to various church and denominational-centered projects.

The Committee further recommends the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. That the proposed constitution and by-laws, prepared by this Committee, be adopted for use within the Free Will Baptist Layman's organizations.

2. That this Committee be continued until the next National Association.

3. That this Committee be given the authority to promote all phases of the proposed organization.

# REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON CHAPLAINS

In 1949 a Commission on Chaplains was created within the national Association and three members were elected for five-year terms. These members were J. R. Davidson, Henry Melvin, and C. F. Bowen. In 1953, Mr. Melvin resigned and the Executive Committee named the executive secretary, W. S. Mooneyham, to fill the unexpired term.

Due to an oversight, no action regarding the membership of this commission has been taken since the commission was created. It will be necessary for the Nominating Committee to take care of this at this session.

This commission has also served as the Board of Ministerial Training, through which ministerial and missionary students have been cleared with their draft boards. The Selective Service System requires a statement from this board that the young men in question are preparing for Christian work under our direction before they are eligible for a student classification. We have handled numerous such cases.

We have also been able to save a number of young pastors from the draft when some misunderstanding of their work or unsympathetic draft boards were about to take them into the armed services.

At the present time we have no chaplains on active duty and only one in the reserves. We have had several inquiries, but none could meet the educational requirements of a service chaplain. Because we have not used the quotas assigned us by the various branches of the armed forces, those quotas have been taken from us and given to others who will use them.

There seems to be a new interest in the chaplaincy among our educationally qualified ministers, however, and we are now processing two applications that we believe will be approved.

We make the following recommendations:

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(1) That those ministers who can meet the educational qualifications prayerfully consider serving a period as a "shepherd to servicemen." The educational requirements are 120 hours of undergraduate study in a recognized school and 90 hours of graduate study performed in a recognized theological school.

(2) That young men who may not now be educationally qualified consider planning their course of study in the direction of the chaplaincy. All branches of the service have a seminary training program under which future chaplains may train and receive a commission upon graduation. Further information about either a full-time appointment or a seminary appointment may be secured by writing to denominational headquarters.

(3) That the Commission on Chaplains of the National Association of Evangelicals, with offices in Washington, D. C., serve as the endorsing agency for Free Will Baptist chaplains and that we make an annual contribution to this agency from the budget of the Executive Department.

1. We therefore recommend either one of the following cities for the 1957 Convention: Birmingham, Alabama; Tulare, California; Savannah, Georgia.

The committee feels that due to the enormous growth of the convention that we should select the convention site two years ahead to allow ample time for the necessary planning for same.

### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGES

We recommend the changing of the Constitution, Article VIII, Section 2, to be amended as follows:

- 3. Resolved, That recommendation number one of the executive secretary's report concerning the denominational educational program and relative to Education

Commission, be referred to a committee of five for further study and clarification of the area of activity of such a Commission, which shall report to the 1957 session of the National Association.

There is one phase of the enrollment report that should be discussed and understood by all Free Will Baptists. That has to do with the non-high school graduates. Out of the total enrollment of 182, 38 had not finished high school. This gives an enrollment of non-high school students of 20.9%. The highest per cent that any accrediting agency will even tolerate is 5 per cent of non-high school graduates. Even that small per cent is frowned upon by accrediting agencies. This fact has been little understood by many who have wondered why Free Will Baptist Bible College has not been accredited.

The easiest and simplest solution to this problem would be for Free Will Baptist

Bible College to adopt a policy of not accepting non-high school students. Such a policy having been followed in the past would have denied training to some of the finest Christian workers that have gone out from the College. It has been the policy of Free Will Baptist Bible College to be of service to the youth of our denomination before accreditation. If these non-high school students who are called of the Lord into Christian service cannot receive training at the only Bible training center their denomination maintains, then they must be turned away from our door to look elsewhere for their training or either enter into Christian service untrained. Free Will Baptist Bible College has felt that the lack of a high school diploma should not bar a dedicated young man or woman from the field of Christian usefulness.

Another possible solution would be to set up a separate school for non-high school students with separate records and classes. This could be done if facilities and teaching personnel were available. To do this would practically double our teaching load and demand many more classrooms than have been available. Under present conditions this cannot be done. Our present teaching staff is now overloaded and could not take on added responsibilities. Had we the teaching personnel the lack of classroom facilities would prohibit the set up of a separate school for these students.

The approach the Bible College has made to reducing this problem to its minimum has been to have the non-high school students to take General Education Development tests. This test is given at Vanderbilt University at a nominal cost and anyone 21 years of age is eligible to take it. The State Department of Education of Tennessee has agreed that any student passing this test is considered to have high school equivalency and is eligible to enter any state owned institution as a high school graduate. Some, if not all, accrediting agencies also consider the passing of this test the equivalent to high school graduation. By having students take this test we have reduced our percentage of non-high school students from 20.9 per cent to 7 per cent this past year. The coming year we believe this per cent can be reduced to a point where at least the first two years of our work will be accepted by the University of Tennessee. Also this will enable us to become more nearly eligible for admission into the Accrediting Association of Bible Institutes and Bible Colleges.

While on this point of accreditation we are happy to inform you that the State Department of Georgia has recently certified one of our students for a two year provisional teachers certificate for that state. The student attended Free Will Baptist Bible College for three years and our very fine relationship with Peabody College enabled us to gain certification for this former student. Also one of our students is entering the University of Tennessee and receiving credit for his work taken at Free Will Baptist Bible College. Also one of our former students is attending a fine teachers' college in the state of Mississippi and received junior college classification on the basis of her two years study at Free Will Baptist Bible College. Of course Peabody College has been accepting two years or more of our work for a number of years. In this connection I quote from a letter received from Dr. Thomason, Dean of Records and Admissions from the University of Tennessee.

I regret very much that it has been impossible for me to get a committee together to visit Free Will Baptist Bible College this spring. . . . We will schedule a visit to your institution early in the fall. I will communicate with you around the first of October about a suitable date.

Dr. Thomason has been most helpful to us in working toward University approval of our institution. Free Will Baptist Bible College is on its way toward overcoming many of the problems that has beset it all along the way without sacrificing service to the youth of our denomination. The road is not an easy one but the education practices of the institution have been declared sound by many educational experts and the technicalities that we have not been able to overcome in every instance have not greatly hindered in attaining our educational objectives.

The report on the library is brief but important. The number of books acquired during the last year is substantial when we consider that the average cost is above \$3 per volume. However, again we face an accreditation problem from the standpoint of number of volumes in our library. We must acquire an additional 3,000 volumes before accreditation by an accrediting agency. However, I do believe we can meet the state's requirement for approval on the junior college level. In the matter of building a library, we have followed a policy of taking only those volumes which were standard and would be an asset to our institution. We might have made a general appeal and have occupied our space with hundreds of volumes of no value to the institution. The policy the school has followed is slower, but sounder. I believe there are hundreds of worthwhile volumes on the shelves of our private libraries that could be given to the school, which would greatly aid in attaining our library goal.

Total income to the Bible College this year was \$115,458.69. Of this amount \$43,597.96 was received as gifts to the general fund, building fund, and library fund. This total gift income is \$1,472.30 less than for the previous fiscal year. Operating expenses amounted to \$109,640.63, an increase of \$2,302.93 over the previous

year. The net income over expenses was \$5,818.06, of which amount \$4,572.68 was invested in fixed assets, leaving \$1,245.38 income over total expenditures.

We wish to point out that our gift income was \$15,000 less than our proposed budget; also that total expenditures were \$40,000 less than proposed. This means we had to operate on \$15,000 less than proposed for the year, and that our over-all operation had to be curtailed \$40,000.

A close analysis of gifts from states reveals the states that held their own in giving to the Bible College were states in which itineraries were made by representatives from the Bible College. This suggests the fact that it is still necessary for the Bible College to carry on its field work and have the privilege of making financial appeals. The Board of Trustees of the Bible College appeals to the National Association and to our people everywhere to keep the doors open to the Bible College so that it may be free to present its needs. Let all of us beware lest our proposed programs create sentiments that make it difficult and unprofitable to the College or any other department to present its special needs.

In spite of some phases of our financial report that are not as bright as we would like, we do have cause for being pleased that we have operated with all our bills paid. We appeal to every pastor, to every church, and to every interested individual in our midst to analyse carefully the service Free Will Baptist Bible College is rendering to our cause and to see that its needs are adequately cared for.

### A GREATER BIBLE COLLEGE PROGRAM

Whereas, the purpose of Free Will Baptist Bible College has remained from its inception the training of ministers, missionaries, and Christian workers and this purpose has been enthusiastically accepted by Free Will Baptists generally as may be recognized from the fact that the facilities of the college have been crowded beyond capacity from its beginning and its graduates received as a gracious answer to a deeply felt need among Free Will Baptists everywhere; and,

Whereas, Free Will Baptist Bible College has been compelled to operate at the maximum of its capacity while faced with an increasing demand to extend its educational services beyond all reasonable bounds of efficient administrations; and,

Whereas, the pre-eminent responsibility of the college and the denomination at large is that of offering adequate educational advantages to prospective ministers, missionaries, and Christian workers; therefore,

Resolved: 1. That this Board of Trustees now in session this July 10, 1956, does hereby authorize and direct the administrative officers of the college and the executive committee of the board to launch and prosecute a consistent improvement program that shall answer the universally accepted need of Free Will Baptists in that of a greater Bible College.

2. That the immediate goal shall be the erection of two essential buildings providing for a library, dining hall, classrooms, and offices, thus releasing present buildings for readaptation to dormitory use.

Resolved, that this National Association now in session this July 11, 1956, does hereby endorse and commond the Board of Trustees and the administrative officers of Free Will Baptist Bible College for the proposed program of improvement and enlargement of the college and recommends hereby that Free Will Baptist general organizations, churches, and subordinate church organizations, together with Free Will Baptist members and friends be called upon and encouraged to provide the necessary means with which to finance this most worthy phase of our common cause.

# REPORT OF THE FOREIGN MISSION BOARD

# July 1, 1955 — December 31, 1955

II Cor. 5:10, "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad." We would not dare say that every little thing we have done during the past year was absolutely good, but we have endeavored to direct the Department of Foreign Missions with the thought in mind of some day giving an account to God for every transaction. We have also tried to keep our people informed and up-todate on the condition and activities of the Department. We are sending out each month over ten thousand letters containing a current copy of our financial report. We would like to enroll every Free Will Baptist family for our mailing list to receive this information.

#### **BOARD MEETINGS:**

During the Annual Missionary Conference at the Bible College last November the Board of Foreign Missions held their semi-annual meeting with all members present. The annual meeting was held this year on April 26, 27 in the First Free Will Baptist Church of Hazel Park, Michigan. During this session the attached budget and suggested state quotas for 1957 were approved and is hereby presented to you for adoption.

#### AFRICA:

Also, at this meeting the Board authorized Rev. and Mrs. Harold Stevens to make a personal survey of two fields in Africa which have been offered to Free Will Baptists. One field in particular (Ivory Coast) has been officially assigned to us and offers a tremendous challenge. The other proposed area is Portuguese Cabinda in Belgian Congo. Bro. and Sis. Stevens will leave their station on July 18 to begin this survey. They hope to have it completed by the last of August and then will send their report and recommendations to the Foreign Mission Board. Please remember them in definite prayer during this time. Rev. and Mrs. Lonnie Sparks are the first approved missionary team to be sent to Africa. They are now in the process of raising their support and hope to leave for language school within a few months. The work in Africa will require several more missionaries, so please pray the Lord of the harvest to send forth laborers.

#### CUBA:

We are glad to have at this Convention, Rev. Thomas H. Willey, director of our work in Cuba and three (3) of our Cuban pastors. We are now able to see the "finished product" in these servants of the Lord who are what they are by God's grace, and our prayers and finance. Also, at this Convention is Miss Lucy Wisehart, missionary on furlough from Cuba.

Our latest missionaries to Cuba are Mr. and Mrs. Thomas H. Willey, Jr. who are being sent to Cuba this month. This will give us seven (7) American missionaries in Cuba plus the many National workers, who compose a wonderful staff that keeps advancing for the Lord.

We wish to express our thanks to the National League Board, to every leaguer and to all others who have helped in the Chapels for Cuba project. We believe within a few months that our goal of \$10,000 will be reached.

#### INDIA: (South)

The work in South India continues to move forward through the new church and the Christian Day School. Miss Volena Wilson who is stationed in South India will be coming home in July for furlough. Miss Barnard will remain an extra year before her furlough in order to carry on with the work. She has asked the Board to make every effort possible to replace her on the field when she returns home the next time. This is a very urgent prayer request since visas to India have been refused. We intend, however to make application for a couple to replace her in South India. Please pray that visa may be granted.

The Cronks have returned to North India after a year's furlough in the States. We are grateful for every courtesy extended them and especially do we wish to thank the National Woman's Auxiliary Convention for their support to the Visual Aid Project.

The Hannas did an excellent job in carrying on the work in the absence of the Cronks. Our most recent news comes from a letter dated June 16, 1956:

"We have closed our Bible School, and I feel it was the best one we have had in our time. In a very quiet way the Spirit seemed to do His work in all of our hearts, and give each of us new desires to learn more of Him and His precious Word. Pray now that as each one has returned to his own village, that the desire to witness and work for Christ may be even more keen as the days go by."

India is still one of the world's largest mission fields and we must continue to pray for her millions, and strive to get others in with the Message of Salvation!

#### JAPAN:

We now have four (4) missionaries in Japan but there is a need and room for many more according to reports from Rev. Wesley Calvery. The Calverys have finished their term of language school and are now in the process of determining just where in Japan the Lord would have us establish our first Free Will Baptist work. Bro. Calvery's reports indicates that even in cities and villages where missionaries reside they are unable to reach all the people. Rev. and Mrs. Fred Hersey and son, Philip, have safely arrived in Japan and have already engaged in their language study.

Japan lies in the North Pacific Ocean, separated from the coast of China and Korea by the Sea of Japan. The terms which ended World War II forced Japan to surrender Manchuria, Korea, and other seized lands leaving her four islands: Honshu, Hokkaido, Kyushu and Shikoku. These four islands now constituting Japan have an area of 147,690 square miles. The fast growing population numbers approximately 85 million, more than half of the United States, yet Japan's population is crowded into an area about the size of California. Many feel as does General Douglas MacArthur, that Japan is one of the most strategic centers for missionary service at the present time.

#### MISSIONARY FILMS:

The Board of Foreign Missions has recognized the value of visual aid in its promotional work. Thus each year the Board appropriates funds to expand our film library. As of this date the following films are available through the Foreign Mission office:

Letter to Melitino, (Cuba); Regions Beyond, (Africa);

Uncle Mel Visits India; Uncle Mel Visits Africa;

Passion for Souls, (Missionary message); Sun and Shadow, (Japan).

#### ANNUAL MISSIONARY CONFERENCE:

As per arrangement with the Free Will Baptist Bible College, we hope to have the Annual Missionary Conference this year beginning Tuesday night, October 16, and closing Wednesday night, October 17.

#### APPRECIATION:

We are deeply grateful for every remembrance to the Board of Foreign Missions and to the many in our denomination who support this work with your prayers and finance. It is only as you pray and give will we be able to continue to expand our borders and take our rightful place in "preaching the gospel to every creature." If the Lord tarries the time is at hand when we shall have missionaries on furlough every year. We certainly hope and pray that all of our churches will have an open door to receive them in itinerate work and share the blessing of their ministry as well as their financial support.

#### FINANCIAL REPORT:

Herewith is submitted the auditor's report of our finances for the last six months

of 1955. Also we submit to you a proposed budget of \$103,215, for the calendar year of 1957, along with the suggested quota for each state. We recommend the adoption of each.

We also submit for information a summary of our finances during the first five months of 1956, along with the amounts paid on state quotas.

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# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS

The members of the Home Mission Board, along with the promotional secretary send you greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

As we give this report of our home mission activities, we do so with a deep sense of gratitude to our Lord Jesus for His evident and manifold blessings on our work. While these have been trying and difficult months in some respects, they have also been times of victory and progress. I shall try to point out some instances of each experience in this brief report.

Financially, we have been "pressed out of measure." Perhaps we over-extended ourselves when we sent out additional mission teams last July, but we did so on the strength of a proposed budget that had been raised the year before. However, this year the story is different. Our income is off approximately 17% over last year in spite if the fact that we have spent 50% more time on the field on itineraries. In December, 1955, we were forced to negotiate a loan from our bank for \$2,500, which was secured by note, signed by each member of the Home Mission Board and the promotional secretary. This loan has been repaid in full, however.

There is only one other sizable account which is unpaid to date and that is on the station wagon. This account, however, is secured in itself, inasmuch as a lien on the station wagon is collateral. We owe approximately \$1,000 on it as yet.

Our missionaries have received their salaries each month and guaged by the present rate of income, no immediate crisis is forthcoming, so we are fairly certain that we will be able to maintain our present program. We will not be able to enlarge or expand in any field until our income is greater and more stable.

Our missionaries on the field are doing a good job. Rev. J. J. Postlewaite is preparing for 3 new organizations in Washington state. These will be the first Free Will Baptist churches ever to be organized in this state. Rev. and Mrs. G. C. Lee Jr. have done and are continuing to do a commendable work in Nebraska. Their two churches are growing and prospects are good for additional churches in that area as soon as we can send additional help. The Central church in Tampa, Florida, is growing and Rev. and Mrs. Wilfong are beginning to attract some of the Cuban people to the services.

Mexico is our great opportunity at the present time. We have Rev. and Mrs. James Timmons and Miss Bessie Yeley there now. They are living in the border towns of Pearsall and Eagle Pass, Texas, respectively and are working in Monterrey, Jiminez, and Piedras Negras, Mexico. There are two national preachers working with us—Juan Lopez and German Rodriguez—both of whom are receiving no pay from the Board for their services.

We have opportunities in Alaska and on the Indian reservations to send teachers and nurses at government expense. In Alaska there are many schools available in interior regions where teachers could be used of the Lord to preach as well as teach. The same is true on the Indian reservations in our country. Employees are given Civil Service rating and have free use of their leisure time to carry on any activity that they like. Other denominations have taken advantage of this offer by the governments of our country and Alaska and your Home Mission Board only awaits volunteers for these fields in order to take advantage of it also.

The Home Mission Board has conducted itineraries in the following states: Missouri, Illinois, Ohio, Alabama, western North Carolina and Arkansas. In each place we met with a warm welcome and hearty response. Many of the states will not allow itineraries on a church-to-church basis since they have adopted the Cooperative Plan of Support and this has hindered us to a certain extent in raising our budget this year.

This is a brief resume of what we have been doing in our department. In addition to all of this, many new churches have been organized and numerous new members have been received into our churches through the efforts of the Home Mission Board. We now have Free Will Baptist churches and/or missions in 42 of the 48 states and we can be safe in saying that our total membership, including those unaffiliated with the National Association, is one-half million.

We covet earnestly your sincere and faithful prayers in behalf of our Home Mission program.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERANNUATION BOARD

I have attended some kind of national meeting since 1927, and have watched, with joy, the Free Will Baptist church grow.

This is my first report as promotional secretary of the Superannuation Board, and my part of the report only covers four months.

We moved to Nashville in September 1955 to set up an office in the national headquarters building. By the kind consent of Rev. C. F. Bowen, we used the Free Will Baptist League office until we could get one ready for use. No investigation had been made as to what it would cost to set up and operate an office, and we found the expenses more than this board was able to meet with its limited income. We were advised by the board to use our home for an office and stay on the field, and this is what we have done since October.

From September to December 31 I traveled 10,023 miles to promote this phase of our denominational work. I have spoken in 5 state associations, 1 quarterly meeting, 35 churches and 3 local associations.

I was instructed by my board, in the beginning, to give one-half of the funds I collected, on my itineraries, back to the state superannuation boards. This we did for the first few months, but we found that this would not work. We could not give the states half of the offerings and operate an office, keep a secretary on the field, and pay half of the minister's premiums.

I was asked by the board to try to get every church, whose pastor was endowed, or wanted to be endowed, to pay to this board one-half of their pastor's premium. This is a workable plan. We have over 1700 ministers and only 63 were endowed when I took this office. Since I have been presenting this plan, I have found 14 churches, whose pastors were already endowed, willing to pay one-half of their premiums. I also have been successful in getting 14 churches, whose pastors were not endowed but wanted to be, willing to pay one-half of their pastor's premiums.

The income to this board is not sufficient to pay one-half of all the minister's premiums and keep a secretary on the field. We are appealing to the churches to help us make it possible for' the pastors to be endowed by paying to this board an amount equal to one-half of their yearly premiums.

We can endow ministers from the age of 21 to the age of 55, if their health will permit. Those over 55 who need help will secure it from their state superannuation board. A number of the states have a cooperative fund and part of this fund should be allocated for state superannuation.

Each state should have a superannuation board in operation. Of the funds that come in to the state boards, 75% should be kept in the state treasury to take care of the aged ministers, and 25% should be sent to the national superannuation treasurer to help pay the premiums on those who are eligible for insurance, and help maintain an office.

We spent much time and energy trying to get set-up to handle insurance on church properties, but we ran into so many complications with state laws that we dropped the idea for the time being.

The purpose of the National Superannuation Board is to make possible for every active minister and full-time Christian worker the following benefits:

1. Protection for loved ones in case of the untimely death of the insured to the extent of the face value of the policy plus all accumulated dividends.

2. A regular income in case of total and permanent disability by their receiving \$10 per month per thousand dollars of insurance if disabled before the age of 56.

3. Income from retirement age until death through receiving the face value of the policy or a monthly income.

# REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

Lloyd George, once Premier of Great Britian, said, "What I am today I owe to the Sunday school." The work of the Sunday School Department during the past year has been most encouraging. The primary work of the department has been with the local Sunday school.

Our churches are becoming more and more aware of the importance of the Sunday school to the local church, as the organization that contributes more through its teaching ministry, the salvation of souls, and membership to the church than any other organization of the church.

According to the last year's statistical report of the churches of the National Association of Free Will Baptists, there were 1947 churches reporting, with 1743 Sunday schools. This leaves 204 churches without Sunday schools. These churches had a total membership of 159,841, with 134,596 enrolled in Sunday school making a total of 25,245 church members not enrolled in Sunday School. If these figures represent a true picture of our Sunday schools and churches, someone is failing.

This failure could be listed under the following headings:

First, the lack of consecrated Sunday school workers. It seems something has sapped the spiritual life of the average Sunday school worker. They have  $n\Theta$  initiative to attain higher heights.

Second, lack of proper organization. If business was conducted as the average Sunday school it would soon become bankrupt.

Third, lack of belief in Sunday school worth. This comes about mostly on the part of church leadership, nationally as well as locally.

Fourth, lack of conquest in Sunday school effort. Someone has said, "It is a crime for any Sunday school to be smaller than it could be."

Last, but by no means the least, the lack of Sunday school evangelism. The Sunday school should have but one objective—the saving of its pupils. Any school that does not evangelize its pupils will soon lose them. We have endeavored to deal with these problems in the Sunday school workers' conferences, conducted through this department, held on the local church level. These conferences are conducted in cooperation with the local Sunday school work of the various state and district Sunday school conventions and conferences. This has proved to be the most stimulating way to give our local Sunday schools information, inspiration, and instructions.

This department, through its promotional work, has sponsored 15 Sunday school workers' conferences, two regional conventions, and worked in cooperation this year with the Oklahoma State Sunday School Convention.

The promotional secretary has traveled 45,000 miles in Sunday school work, attending state associations, Sunday school conventions (state and local, the National Sunday School Convention in Providence, Rhode Island, and the National Association of Evangelicals in Cleveland, Ohio), and has served the past three years on the general council of the NSSA and this year on the program planning committee. I would like to urge our people to attend the National Sunday School Convention which meets in Moody Church, Chicago, Illinois, October 10-12 of this year.

The sale of Sunday school materials through this department has more than doubled during this past year. If finances would allow, this department could easily gross an approximate \$25,000 per year and in the very near future could be contributing to our cooperative program a sizable amount and at the same time launch a Sunday school program that would make a real contribution to the denomination, both spiritually and financially.

We have two great needs in the department. First, the need of more workers on the field and one full-time worker in the office. At present we could use six more field workers. It is an utter impossibility for one person with a part-time helper to meet the demands from the field, and keep the work in the office up to par.

The second need is the need of finance. (And of course this would solve the first, if provided.) The Sunday School Department is not a fund-raising agency. It is a service agency to the Sunday schools of the denomination. The department's finance comes from the sale of Sunday school literature  $(7\frac{1}{2}\%)$ , materials, and contributions from churches, Sunday schools, conventions, etc.

With the present limited finance received, no really large scale denominational Sunday school program can be launched. However, there has been an increase in the sale of Sunday school literature and also the amount received from the cooperative program has helped to alleviate to a degree this financial pressure.

The six-point record system has been completed and is now advertised for sale. It was to have been completed last year but finances did not permit. Pamphlets explaining the same can be obtained at the Sunday school booth. Sunday school literature for the lower classes has been published and can be obtained from the Free Will Baptist Press.

This department is recommending that a year-round Sunday school training program be conducted in the local Sunday school. Study course books, materials, and certificates can be obtained through this department. (See display of materials at Sunday school booth.)

#### CHANGE IN BY-LAWS:

A motion has been passed by the Sunday School Board to change Section V and VI of the by-laws of the Sunday School Board to read as follows:

Section V. This Board shall receive its income from the sale of its literature (Sunday School and daily vacation Bible school literature, books, leaflets, pamphlets, etc.) printed or otherwise by the press of its choice, and from the contributions made to it by individuals, churches and organizations such as state and local Sunday school conventions. However, in case of emergency, this Board may borrow money to maintain its operation until such a time as its income is sufficient to supply for the same.

Section VI. The Board shall sponsor through its Sunday School Department, regional Sunday school conventions, working in cooperation with state or local Sunday School Boards. It shall also, as it deems wise, conduct a National Sunday School Convention and shall formulate other such programs that will give to the School Convention and shall formulate other such programs that will give to the needed to carry on an aggressive Sunday school program, both locally and

The Sunday School Board asks that these changes be ratified along with the adoption of this report.

# REPORT OF THE NATIONAL LEAGUE BOARD

About one month ago the seventh nationwide League Conference met at Greenville, North Carolina, with nearly two thousand people attending. It was a wonderful experience to see scores of young people attend various sessions of the Conference hoping to glean new ideas for their leagues at home.

The methods of organization were reviewed and discussed in the simultaneous conferences. The speakers each presented a new challenge to those who listened. One of the highlights, a religious drama, "The Rock", was presented by students of the Free Will Baptist Bible College, Nashville, Tennessee. Thursday morning of the Conference emphasis was placed on missions. In this session \$303.35 was added to the Chapels for Cuba fund, making the total \$6,333.23. The goal is \$10,000; therefore, this league project continues until the goal is reached.

Many of the leaguers at the Conference expressed their desire for the League Board to plan an annual League Conference.

There is a need for the Free Will Baptist League to be encouraged in most of our churches. Every church needs trained leadership and the league is designed to help meet this need. Our young people are the church leaders of tomorrow and they can receive training in a properly functioning Free Will Baptist League, the "training service of the church."

The League Board waits to help those who request its services. Each day information, free literature and supplies are sent out by the office. The *Free Will Baptist League Monthly*, (with subscription price at \$1.00 per year, published at the League office) contains program ideas for each department. Plans and progress on a national scale are given.

During the past year several new leagues were organized. Many of the leagues are planning for study courses. Write to the League Board if we can be of service to you.

There are needs in this phase of our denominational work and each league can help greatly by sending their quarterly report along with 10% of league offerings to the office. Your 10% offerings are its main source of income.

# REPORT OF RADIO-TELEVISION BOARD

"With all boldness . . . Christ shall be magnified" in radio and television. "Thou makest the outgoings of the morning and evening to rejoice (Ps. 65:8). Literally, this reads: "Thou makest the radiations of the morning and evening to sing." Some scientists have devised an apparatus which converts the light of the star automatically into an electric signal, electric energy, and then into the radio wave. "When the morning stars sang together (Job 38:7). "But I say, Have they had not heard? Yes verily, their sound went into all the earth, and their words unto the ends of the world" (Rom. 10:18). "Canst thou send lightnings or electric-ity."

We have been hearing much in recent years about the impact of radio and television in moulding public opinion. It is a powerful medium of communication with vast possibilities for Christian forces if used advantageously. To properly appreciate television we must realize that it is a new medium of communication. Some have emphasized its competition to newspapers, movies, the theater, magazines, church services. I would emphasize that it is not a substitute for any of these, but can combine effectively many of the most effective features of them all. Both radio and television as well as newspapers, magazines, automobiles have their unhappy features for consecrated Christians. This accounts for the need of utilizing the radio and television media for reaching unsaved masses with the gospel of Christ.

Christ did not command the world to come to Christians to be taught His will; he told Christians to go to the world with this gospel. Television even affords an opportunity of entering many homes for teaching and preaching that might not allow a gospel preacher or missionary the privilege in person.

An executive chairman of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America recently stated: "When a local preacher appears on television he will preach to more people than the aggregate of all the people who attend the church he serves for the entire year." Recently this modernistic organization through its Broadcasting and Film Commission sought to eliminate the privilege of purchasing radio and television time for religious programs as they objected specifically to programs such as Billy Graham and Oral Roberts and asked the broadcasting industry to limit all religious broadcasting to programs on a sustaining basis and has recommended that the Council of Churches, national and local, be given special consideration in the allotment of time.

Oral Roberts broadcasts each Sunday over a nation-wide network of more than 200 radio stations, and his program is heard around the world on such great short wave stations as Radio Luxembourg, Radio Lourenco Marques, and others. A nation-wide TV series was begun over 63 outlets on February 6, and is now scheduled on 98 stations. His desire is to expand his radio ministry to 1,000 outlets by radio, and his TV programs to 200 television stations. The 1956 World Almanac states that in 1955 there were 52,000,000 homes with radios and secondary sets in these same homes were 40,500,000. Radios in business places, institutions, etc., were 10,000,000. There are 35,700,000 automobile radios, and 38,700,000 television sets in the U.S. This makes the total sets in the United States 176,900,000. About 7.-800,000 TV sets were purchased in 1955. About 70% of all homes have TV receivers and 96% of all dwelling units are within signal range.

"The Baptist Hour," official radio broadcast of the Southern Baptist Convention, celebrated its fifteenth anniversary and 100,000th broadcast this year. It is carried on 400 radio stations in thirty-three states and several foreign countries, including behind the Iron Curtain. This denomination is spending \$200,000 on a radio and television center in Fort Worth, Texas and has a budget of about \$700, 000 this year for radio and television. They will distribute "pre-tested" television packages—scripts and formats—to its 30,000 churches for use on local stations.

In 1953 over 300 TV stations began their cry for religious material. The Catholics supplied them films and time—\$3 million worth; Lutherans, \$750,000 worth; Seventh-Day Adventists, \$500,000 worth.

The Lutherans, for instance, spend some \$2,500,000 per year on their radio and television programs. Their TV program, called "This Is the Life," draws at least 1,000 letters every day. Another example is the Churches of Christ who have a telecast conducted in California appearing ninety-two times with a total of 26,901 cards and letters in response to it. Further, they enrolled 4,579 families in a Bible correspondence

Bishop Fulton J. Sheen draws millions to his commercially-sponsored show every week. The National Council of Churches, which last year produced almost 500 radio and television programs, added a quarter of a million to its budget.

This information has been given to encourage our people to see what an "open door" we have set before us. Definitely a challenge has been given our people to see a new and vast field of unreached masses who so badly need the gospel of Christ. It remains for us to choose in the field of missions the "oxcart" or the "overdrive."

Last year the Budget Committee proposed the sum of \$1,500 or 1% of the denominational budget of \$324,300, for the period of 18 months. Our financial report follows:

As it requires thousands of dollars to carry on a gospel ministry in the radio and TV outlets for any appreciable time, you see from our receipts we shall not be able for some time to conduct any extensive program in this field. We can only deal primarily now in the field of tape and disc recordings for radio use. We do not have our own equipment to do this.

The chairman of the board has been authorized to make recordings of music and messages to supply the demand as they are requested from time to time. Each member has been asked to be ready to present rules for governing the Board preparatory to this session.

As the radio TV ministry presents such a great challenge in the field of a new approach to missions, it becomes very urgent that our percentage of budget be somewhat increased. It has been so profitable to other church groups in the field of evangelism that we must do something to meet our financial emergency.

Let us pray that our people shall rise up in greater strength with all resources possible to meet the needs of this hour for our radio-TV ministry.

# REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

Aristotle once wrote: "Where there are things to be done, the end is not to survey and recognize the various things, but rather to do them."

These words written by a pagan philosopher are both applicable to and descriptive of our work today. This has been a year of doing things in every department of our national association. We have lifted our eyes and looked on the fields and have directed our unprecedented activity into channels that would meet the world needs we have seen.

It has been our greatest year in practically every field. The Superannuation department put a secretary on the field this year giving us full-time secretaries in five of the departments. I am sure that in large part the success of the program this year is due to the untiring efforts of these men in informing and enlisting the local churches. The Church has always moved forward by sacrifice and these men have made many, particularly in the realm of family and finance, which have gone by unnoticed and unsung.

The slow response to our home mission program has given us some concern this year and we hope our people will be more faithful in their support in the coming year. This is the only department which has had any serious difficulty during the year.

The departmental reports given at this session will point up their part of our denominational program so we will not discuss it here.

### STATE OF THE DENOMINATION:

This seems to have been a year of "coming together." We are learning better among the various departments how to work together and yet keep the distinct emphasis on the particular phases of denominational effort. A spirit of Christian love has characterized our relationships this year.

We have also seen a "coming together" among the churches, districts, and state organizations. I think we may rightly say that our joint efforts through the Cooperative Plan of Support have done much to cement our relationships. I have found that the greatest unifying factor is to get people working together. This is

true for several reasons. First, working people are too busy to find fault and criticize. Secondly, working together brings about a close understanding of the other person. Finally, God's Spirit welds into a mighty force the people who join in this kind of cooperative effort.

We still have quite a number of unaffiliated churches and district associations whose strength we need. One of the major activities of this department in the coming year will be to seek to enlist these Free Will Baptist groups who are still outside the national association.

## THE COOPERATIVE PLAN OF SUPPORT:

Having mentioned the Cooperative Plan earlier, let us look at it for the sixmonth period of July 1-December 31, 1955, which is the period covered by the financial part of this report. Our receipts for that period were nearly \$14,000, which is 64% above the previous six months. This \$14,000 represented 161/2% of the total denominational giving for that period.

When these figures are considered with the fact that our Cooperative receipts for the first six months of this year are approximately 30% above the last six months of 1955, we can see the growing and enthusiastic response of our people to this program.

While we are greatly encouraged, it would be well to point out (as may be seen from the financial report) that a few states are carrying the load of this program which helps sustain the work of every department. If so few can do so much, it is hard to even imagine what a great victory could be ours if a majority of the churches would join with the few in supporting the world-wide ministry of our denomination with just 10% of their church offerings.

We appeal to you, as delegates and church leaders, to lead your churches into this broad vision of total, regular support of the denomination rather than the uncertain and inadequate way of limited, sporadic giving.

#### **DEPARTMENTAL PROJECTS:**

It is impossible to describe within the confines of a written report all the work which this department has done. In fact, probably the most important and greater part of the work cannot be put down on paper since it consists of promotion, coordination of the entire program, public relations, counseling, etc. I feel, personally, that the results in this scope of our work have been very gratifying. Most of them are intangible, of course, and cannot be measured in numbers.

Three of the more tangible projects of this department have been as follows:

(1) Contact, our official publication, has enjoyed a good year. The circulation has climbed 50% above what it was last year. With 4,600 copies mailed in June, the circulation is at the highest level since the magazine was started in November, 1953. This increase in circulation is accounted for almost entirely by the "Every Church Famly" plan which quite a number of churches are using. We strongly urge many more churches to adopt the plan and help get the circulation to a respectable figure, since 97% of our reported membership still does not get the paper.

The circulation by states for the month of June might prove interesting to you: Alabama, 163; Arizona, 34; Arkansas, 477; California, 251; Florida, 152; Georgia, 231; Illinois, 245; Kentucky, 121; Michigan, 189; Mississippi, 91; Missouri, 436; North Carolina, 361; Ohio, 124; Oklahoma, 674; South Carolina, 122; Tennessee, 418; Texas, 168; Virginia, 57; West Virginia, 140; Others, 146.

(2) Circulation of the Free Will Baptist Bulletin Service is increasing. This service to our churches begins its third year this month with 116 churches using a total of 60,000 bulletins a month. This gives us an annual circulation of nearly threequarters of a million!

(3) Our church supply business nearly doubled during the last six months of 1955 and 1956 will be a record year. An indication of how our churches are ordering their supplies from headquarters may be seen in the fact that our vacation Bible school orders totalled nearly \$1,000 this year.

We are constantly adding to our stock and will have a 125-page catalog of church supplies ready for distribution in the late summer. You can order all of your church needs from headquarters, and the profits from every order go back into the denominational program.

# **RECOMMENDATIONS:**

# 1. Concerning Denominational Educational Program

In recent years we have come to see the need for some long-range and broad planning in connection with our denominational educational program. Our total educational need both now and in the years to come should be determined, some goals established, and our direction charted. With the beginning of one state institution and the possibility of others, we have also seen the need for a definite link between our national and state-operated institutions. The work of the nowexisting and future institutions needs to be coordinated so that each can play its

part in the total program. Because of these needs, and since we have no agency now charged with the responsibilities outlined below, I make the following recommendation:

That an Education Commission be elected by this national association to be composed of one member from each state convention affiliated with the national association. The term of office for each member would be two years, with the terms of those representing states east of the Mississippi river expiring alternately with these representing states west of the Mississippi river. The Education Commission shall elect from its membership a steering committee of five who will act in behalf of and for the commission when the full commission is not in session.

The area of responsibility of the Education Commission would be as follows: (1) Survey both the educational need and potential of the denomination as a

whole and its various geographic areas. (2) Make specific recommendations regarding the broadening of the educa-

tional efforts within the denomination. (3) Work in an advisory capacity with all educational institutions controlled by the national association or state conventions to coordinate their work.

(4) Give advisory assistance in the establishment of new institutions.

(5) Serve as the agency through which institutions controlled by state conventions may be recognized and given possible assistance by the national association. (6) Report at each annual session of the national association regarding the

overall work of both national and state institutions. (7) Serve in any other educational capacity which is not in conflict with or repugnant to any other department of the national association or the constitution of

the national association.

# II. Concerning Publishing of Yearbook

We request permission for this department to begin work on compiling statistical information for the publication of a new yearbook of Free Will Baptist churches to be issued by March 15, 1957. Besides much denominational information, this yearbook would contain the name and location of all Free Will Baptist churches, the pastor, church clerk, and membership.

# III. Concerning Headquarters Building

Because there is still an indebtedness on the headquarters building of \$4,901.49, which is the only denominational debt on any property, we request permission to begin an appeal immediately to meet this need. Our plan would be to ask 100 churches to give \$50 each by October 15 to clear the headquarters property.

### CONSTITUTION OF THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION

From experience we, the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ and realizing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship among us as a church; and to preserve and maintain correspondence and coordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denominational government.

### ARTICLE I

Name—This organization shall be known as the National Association of Free Will Baptists of the United States of America.

#### ARTICLE II

*Purpose*—The object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing the National Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may be hereafter represented therein.

### ARTICLE III

*Composition*—This National Association shall be composed of its general officers, the members of all standing boards, or committees, the duly appointed delegates of Free Will Baptist organizations which actively promote and support the work of the Association and all ordained ministers and missionaries who belong to general bodies which are affiliated with this National Association.

#### ARTICLE IV

Representation—Representation in the National Association is to be by states. Each state association shall be entitled to ten delegates to be elected from the laity, regardless of the number of district associations or yearly meetings in the state; and in addition to the ten delegates, each district association or yearly meeting in the state shall be entitled to five delegates; and in addition each local association, union, or quarterly meeting in the state shall be entitled to three delegates. Associations in the state which have no higher organization in that state and those whose higher organization is not affiliated with the National Association shall elect and send their delegates directly to the National Association.

#### ARTICLE V

*Financing*—Each State Association representing in this body shall send the sum of \$10.00 with \$5.00 extra for each District Association composing the said State Association or Convention. The district or subordinate associations representing directly shall send the sum of \$5.00 with their reports.

Section 2. The Moderator and Clerk shall receive an honorarium of \$50.00 annually plus 5c per mile travel expense to and from sessions of the National Association. Assistant Moderator and Assistant Clerk shall receive the same bene-fits as Moderator or Clerk in the absence of either the Moderator or the Clerk.

### ARTICLE VI

Discipline—This National Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practice that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing said organization of the National Association of the Free Will Baptist Church, or act upon any appeal that may be made by any body belonging to the National Association. Said appeal shall have been written and properly signed by the constituent body or bodies, and its decision shall be final. Such appeals are to come before the National Association, after having been appealed from the lower to the next higher body. Section 2. All appeals coming before the National Association may be settled in either of the following ways: (1) By the National Association when sitting in a committee as a whole. (2) By a special committee whose report shall be voted on without discussion.

### ARTICLE VII

Officers—The officers of this National Association shall consist of a moderator, an assistant moderator, a clerk, an assistant clerk, executive secretary who shall serve as treasurer, each of whom shall be elected at the close of each regular session, except the executive secretary who shall be elected every two years. Section 2. Committees, as necessary, shall be appointed by the chairman unless

otherwise provide for, and shall hold office until their work is completed, or until their successors are elected.

### ARTICLE VIII

Boards—All standing boards shall be composed of five members, exclusive of the General Board and the Board of Trustees of the Free Will Baptist Bible College. Standing boards include the General Board, the Board of Trustees of the Bible College, the Foreign Mission Board, the Home Mission Board, the Free Will Baptist League Board, the Board of Superannuation, the Board of Publications and Literature, the Sunday School Board, the Board of Radio and Television, and a Board of Trustees who shall be legal custodians of all property belonging to the National Association except in the case of those boards of the Association which are now incorporated. The personnel of each of the foregoing, exclusive of the General Board and the Board of Trustees of the Bible College, shall be elected as follows: the first named for a term of one year, the second for a term of two years, the third for a term of three years, the fourth for a term of four years, and the fifth for a term of five years. Succession to office thereafter shall be determined as order requires.

Section 2. The personnel of the General Board shall be composed of the general officers of the National Association and the chairman of all standing boards. There shall also be elected by the national body one member from each affiliated state association and one member from each affiliated association comprising one or more than one state. The president of the National Woman's Auxiliary Convention shall be an ex-officio member of the board.

The term of office of those chosen within given state associations shall be two years; and so constituted that the expiration of the term of office of those residing east of the Mississippi River shall alternate with those residing west of the Mississippi.

Section 3. The General Board shall have power to act in behalf of, and for the National Association from one regular session to another, and shall also have power to elect such officers as may be necessary for its own government, and to carry out the plans and undertakings of the National Association.

Section 4. The General Board shall have power to fill irregular vacancies that may occur in its own body, and shall also have the power to fill any irregular vacancies that may occur in any department of the work between sessions of the National Association. It shall be the duty of this board to make written reports of all its work to each annual session of the association.

Section 5. The General Board shall organize at its own discretion for the promotion of the work set forth in sections three and four of this article. It is understood that an Executive Committee consisting of seven members shall be elected by the General Board from among its membership, whose duty it shall be to act on all matters coming within the scope of the work of the board when said General Board is not in session.

Section 6. The duties of the various standing boards shall be to plan a program and supervise its operation in their respective fields. They shall organize themselves and regulate their work as may become necessary and as may be found in harmony with the principles and tenets of the National Association.

Each standing board shall prepare a budget of its proposed financial expenditures at the beginning of each fiscal year, and present same for approval of the National Association before any expenditures are made for the year.

Section 7. No person shall fill more than one office at the same time, or any office and a place on any standing board, except as he may become a member of the General Board by virture of his office. No person shall serve on more than one standing board at the same time, except as he may become a member of the General Board by virture of being chairman of the board of which he is an elected member.

## ARTICLE IX

A Board of Trustees of not less than nine members nor more than fifteen shall be elected by the National Association and charged with the responsibility of establishing, organizing, controlling, and operating a Free Will Baptist Bible College in the city of Nashville, of the state of Tennessee. It is provided, however, that the first Board of Trustees shall be composed of nine members, who shall be classified and elected in groups of 3's as follows: The terms of office of the first three named shall expire July 15, 1946; the terms of office of the second three named shall expire July 15, 1948; and the terms of office of the last three named shall expire July 15, 1950. Successors in office thereafter shall be elected biennially in groups of 3's, each for a term of six years, and they shall continue in service until their successors have been chosen. Any trustee may be re-elected to office at the option of the National Association.

In addition to the original nine trustees prescribed for the Bible College, the National Association may, at its option, elect six others to membership on the board; but they shall be elected, two biennially, until six members have been added to the board. These elections shall coincide with the respective biennial elections of the original groups of 3's, and shall, in actual practice, effect or result in a reclassification and biennial election of all trustees in groups of 5's. Under this option, if elected, trustees shall be chosen by the National Association biennially in groups of 5's, each for a term of six years.

The trustees of the Bible College shall have power to apply for and receive a charter of incorporation under the name and style of FREE WILL BAPTIST BIBLE COLLEGE of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. It is provided, however, that the charter of incorporation, as proposed, shall be approved and authorized by the National Association previous to its submission for registration, and that no revision or amendment thereafter shall be sought without the specific direction of the National Association.

The Board of Trustees of the Bible College shall also have power to organize at will and to create such by-laws as may be deemed essential for their government and for the control, administration, and promotion of the College, consistent with the provisions of its charter of incorporation and the constitution and regulations of the National Association.

#### ARTICLE X

The National Association shall hold its regular meetings annually, at the time and place announced by the committee appointed by the association while in session.

### ARTICLE XI

Auxiliaries—The National Woman's Auxiliary Convention shall be recognized as a subordinate organization to the National Association. They shall organize at their own discretion, and have power to create and adopt their respective constitution and by-laws, and maintain complete management of the work for which they are constituted. The scope and character of the work of these organizations shall conform to the general program and promotional plans of the association. They shall report their accomplishments annually to the National Association.

#### ARTICLE XII

Should necessity arise, from war, or pestilence, or any cause which prevents a regular meeting whether such a condition is of a local or general condition, then the General Board shall be privileged to call and act with full authority in all matters pertaining to the general welfare of the National Association and the Church as a whole, providing whatever transactions passed shall be by a twothirds vote, of the full membership of the said General Board, providing that such transactions shall not conflict with the purpose, and edicts of the constitution as set forth in the preceding articles.

#### ARTICLE XIII

This Constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the National Association by a two-thirds vote of members present, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one day in advance.
