PROCEEDINGS

Monday Evening, July 10

The 31st annual session of the National Association of Free Will Baptists opened with prayer under the leadership of Rev. Wayne Smith, assistant moderator. Mr. I. L. Stanley, accompanied by Rev. Teddy Wilbanks and Mrs. Billy Melvin at the organ and piano respectively, led the congregation in singing "America the Beautiful," and "Onward Christian Soldiers." Rev. Smith led in the pledging of allegiance to the American Flag and the Christian Flag, after which Mr. Stanley had the congregation sing "Glory to His Name," "Lord Speak to Me," and "How Great Thou Art."

The clerk of the association, Rev. Malcolm Fry, called the session to order and introduced the officers of the association. The moderator, Dr. Robert Picirilli, brought his opening message from John's Gospel, chapters thirteen and fifteen, with the theme "Let us Love One Another."

The report of the Committee on Committees was read by the clerk. The appoint-

ment of WNAC Committees was given by Mrs. Robert C. Hill. The association was welcomed to the city of Jacksonville by the Mayor, Mr. Hans Tansler. This was followed by a welcome to the state of Florida by Mr. Ernest

Owen, Treasurer of the Florida State Association of Free Will Baptists. Mr. I. L. Stanley led the congregation in singing "Heavenly Sunshine." He then recognized those in attendance from various states and countries. Attendance was

noted from 30 states and 5 countries.

After receiving of the convention offering, a male quartet from the Free Will Baptist Bible College, Nashville, Tennessee, sang "Heaven Came Down and Glory Filled My Soul," and "Harbored In Jesus." The keynote message was then brought by the Rev. Milton Worthington, pastor of the East Tupelo Free Will Baptist Church, Tupelo, Mississippi. His message was based on Matthew 28:20, using the theme "That Other Responsibility."

Following the message, several announcements were made. The convention then

adjourned until the following evening.

Tuesday Evening, July 11

The Tuesday evening session of the association opened with Mr. I. L. Stanley leading the congregation in singing "Praise Him! Praise Him!" "Blessed Assurance," and "Battle Hymn of the Republic." Rev. Milton Hollifield, presiding, read the Scripture text from John's Gospel, chapter seventeen, and then led the congregation in prayer. The quartet from the Free Will Baptist Bible College sang "There's Honey in the Rock," and "How Can I Help but Love Him?" Mr. Samuel Johnson, director of Church Training Service, made the presentation of awards to the various winners of the National Youth Contest.

The convention offering was received, after which the moderator called for the report of the Credentials Committee. A motion carried to adopt the report and seat the delegates (see reports). He then read greetings sent from the General

Association of General Baptists.

Mr. Hollifield introduced Dr. L. C. Johnson, president of the Free Will Baptist Bible College, and Rev. Jack Paramore, Director of the college's expansion program, who, in turn, presented their report on the "One Thousand Church Campaign." Churches that contributed, or were committed for, one thousand dollars to the development program were recognized by the presenting of a plaque to the pastor. or representative, of the various churches.

The speaker of the hour, Rev. Robert Shockey, former pastor of the Second Free Will Baptist Church, Ashland, Kentucky, and now serving as Field Secretary for the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension, was introduced. Just before he brought the evening message from John 17:17 on the theme "Thy Word is

Truth," Mr. Don Clark sang "Down From His Glory."

Following the message, the congregation sang "There Is A Fountain Filled With Blood." Announcements were made and the convention adjourned until the following morning.

Wednesday Morning, July 12

The Wednesday morning session of the association opened with Mr. I. L. Stanley leading the congregation in singing "Showers of Blessings," "Near the Cross," and "What A Friend." Rev. Lloyd Thomas, promotional secretary of the Arkansas State Association, led in a devotional reading from Deuteronomy 6, followed by prayer.

The business of the association began with the moderator calling for the report of the General Board from the clerk. A motion carried to accept the report. It was

moved, seconded, and carried to adopt the program as a flexible guide.

Dr. Billy A. Melvin presented his annual report as Executive Secretary. At this time the moderator asked the congregation to express their appreciation to Mr. Melvin (see Report of General Board). A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

Mr. Francis Boyle brought greetings as the new Director of Executive Church

Bonds, Incorporated, and gave information concerning the bond program.

The report of the Budget Committee was given by the Executive Secretary. A motion carried to accept the report. A motion carried to amend by insertion, reference II.2.c. (See Report of Budget Committee, II.2.c. would become II.2.b., etc...): "Laymen's Board to receive 3% of what remains after the Executive Department amount is subtracted." A motion carried to refer I.3 to a committee composed of the moderator, Executive Secretary, and the Commission on Theological Liberalism. (See Report of the Theological Liberalism Commission.)

Following a brief intermission, Mr. I. L. Stanley led the congregation in singing

"We're Marching to Zion."

The Executive Secretary introduced Rev. David J. Williams, regional representative of the American Bible Society, who brought the annual report of the American Bible Society. A motion carried to receive the report as information. A motion carried to refer to the Executive Committee and the Commission on Theological Liberalism a joint study relative to the apparent tendencies toward ecumenicalism of the American Bible Society, and report back to this session if possible. A motion carried to amend by striking "if possible." The motion's previous question was then carried on the original motion as amended and subject motion carried. A motion to amend by substitution "Foreign Missions Board" in place of "Executive Committee" was lost. A motion to amend by striking "substitution" and change to "adding Foreign Missions Board to the Executive Committee and the Commission on Theological Liberalism" was lost.

The annual report of the Board of Foreign Missions was presented by General Director Reford Wilson. A motion carried to adopt the report and its budget. Special prayer was requested for open doors in India, the child of the Walter Ellisons, and the General Director's Secretary. A prayer session followed.

The annual report of the Sunday School Department was presented by Director Roger Reeds. A motion carried to receive the report. Presentation of a trophy was made to the Sunday School Superintendent of the year, Mr. Charles Mathis from the First Free Will Baptist Church, Dothan, Alabama, and a plaque to the runner-up, Mr. Robert L. Dreher, First Free Will Baptist Church, Tucson, Arizona. (Mr. Dreher was not at the convention, and his pastor, Rev. Malcolm Fry, accepted the plaque for him.)

The session adjourned until the evening service.

Wednesday Evening, July 12

The annual missionary service opened with Mr. I. L. Stanley leading the congregation in singing "Saved, Saved," "Lord, Speak to Me," and "Jesus Saves." Rev. Elro Driggers led in prayer.

Rev. Roy Thomas, chairman of the Home Missions Board, introduced the home missionaries attending this session, and Rev. Eugene Waddell introduced the foreign missionaries. Following this, a dramatic presentation through the use of film strip and live acting entitled "A Teenage Thinks Missions" was conducted. It showed the contrast between the privileges and blessings of people at home compared to our missionaries serving in their area of responsibility.

The regular convention offering was received under the direction of Mr. Driggers. Special music was then rendered by the Free Will Baptist Bible College quartet singing "Wonderful" and "Wonderful, Wonderful Jesus." Mr. Driggers then introduced Mr. Wilson and Mr. Ballard of the Foreign Missions Department, and Mr. Willis and Mr. Vandivort of the Home Missions Department. Mr. Stanley led the

congregation in singing "So Send I You."

Mr. Bill Gardner sang "Win the Lost At Any Cost," after which Rev. Lonnie Sparks, missionary to the Ivory Coast of Africa, brought the missionary challenge "Our Mission High Fulfilling." Many responded to the invitation for consecration and service. Rev. Raymond Riggs led in the receiving of the missionary offering. Prayer was offered and the session adjourned until the following morning.

Thursday Morning, July 13

The Thursday morning session opened with Mr. I. L. Stanley leading the congregation in singing "How Firm a Foundation," "I Love to Tell the Story," and "Amazing Grace." The morning devotional thought and prayer were given by Rev. Donald Sexton, pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church, Chattanooga, Tennessee.

The annual report of the Church Training Service Board was presented by Director Samuel Johnson. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

The report of the Stewardship Commission was presented by Chairman Malcolm

Fry. A motion carried to receive the report.

Rev. Homer E. Willis, General Director of the Home Missions Board, gave their annual report. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

The report of the Commission on Theological Liberalism was given by Rev. Jack Paramore. A motion to receive the report was made. It was moved, seconded, and carried to amend by striking that part dealing with dissolution of the Commission. (See Report.) A motion to refer the amendment and entire report for study to the Executive Committee, and subject report to be returned next year, was lost. The original motion carried as amended.

The moderator adjourned the session for a short recess prior to the morning

worship hour.

The Thursday morning worship service opened with the singing of "I Am Thine, O Lord," and "So Send I You," under the leadership of Mr. I. L. Stanley.

The annual Layman of the Year award was presented by the moderator to Mr. Samuel Johnson, General Director of the Church Training Service Department. Special music was presented by Miss Jerry Howard of Richmond, Virginia. Rev. Luther Gibson, pastor of Mountain Grove Free Will Baptist Church, Mountain Grove, Missouri, brought the message on the theme "Strength Through Maturity," based upon Ephesians 4:14.

The session was adjourned with prayer until the afternoon.

Thursday Afternoon, July 13

The Thursday afternoon session began with the congregation singing "At the Cross," and "Blest Be the Tie." Scripture reading and prayer was brought by Rev. John M. Henson, promotional secretary of the State Association of West Virginia.

The annual report of the National Association of Evangelicals was presented by our Executive Secretary, and the new Executive Director of the National Association of Evangelicals, Dr. Billy A. Melvin. A motion carried to receive the

report as information.

Rev. J. T. Hurst gave the annual report of the Chaplain's Commission. A motion carried to receive the report. Mr. Hurst introduced our only Free Will Baptist chaplain, Chaplain (Captain) Gerald Mangrum, serving in the United States Army. Chaplain Mangrum shared his testimony with the congregation.

Mr. Kimble Crossley presented the report of the Layman's Board. A motion

carried to receive the report.

The annual report of the Woman's Auxiliary Convention was given by Mrs. Robert C. Hill, President. A motion carried to receive the report as information.

Dr. L. C. Johnson, President of the Free Will Baptist Bible College, gave their annual report. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

The annual report of the Superannuation Board was given by Chairman Chester Huckaby. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

Rev. Ronald Creech gave the report of the Historical Commission. A motion carried to receive the report.

The report of the Placement Committee was read by the clerk. A motion car-

ried to accept the report. Rev. Herman Hersey gave the report of the Resolutions Committee. A motion

carried to receive the report.

The report of the Human Relations Committee (see page 17, 1966 Minutes) was given by Rev. Henry Melvin. A motion carried to adopt the report.

The special committee of the Executive Committee and Commission on Theological Liberalism, set aside by this session of the body for a joint study concerning the American Bible Society, presented their recommendations. (See Joint Study Report.) It was moved to accept the recommendations. A motion was made to amend by addition to insert notice of this action in Contact. It was moved to substitute for the present motion the following motion: "1. To sever all relations with the American Bible Society. 2. To give them notification as to our reasons. 3. To contact other groups of like faith and notify them of our action and see if they might be interested in some type of joint effort in the area of Bible publication and distribution." A motion carried to amend the substitute motion by addition: "4. To notify all denominations affiliated with the American Bible Society of our action and reasons therefore." After some discussion the motion's previous question was carried and the motion to amend by substitution was carried. The motion's previous question was then carried on the original motion to accept the recommendations of the committee and subject motion, as amended, was carried.

A motion was made that the Commission on Theological Liberalism investigate any other service organization that we have affiliation with and report back at the next session. A motion was made to amend by insertion: "the liberal tendencies of the National Association of Evangelicals." A motion was made to amend the amendment by adding "Bob Jones University, John R. Rice movement." (Ruled out of order by the chair.) A motion carried to lay on the table the original

motion and amendment thereto.

The moderator called for the reading of Part I of the Nominating Committee's report. The following persons were nominated for vacancies on the General Board: Alabama, John Edwards; Arizona, Gene Norris; Arkansas, Lloyd Thomas; California, Carl Young; Florida, Elro Driggers; Georgia, Tom Hamilton; Idaho, Lewis Perry; Illinois, Wallace Malone; Indiana, William Patterson; Kansas, J. R. Shade; Kentucky, Vernon Barker; Mexico, Arthur Billows; Michigan, Robert Wood; Mississippi, Tom Johnson; Missouri, Harry Beatty; Northwest, Lloyd Plunkett; and Texas, R. J. Kennedy, Jr. Opportunity for nominations from the floor was given, there were no such nominations except that Joe Haas, missionary appointee to India, requested that Kenneth Elledge be nominated to take his place as General Board member for the state of Oklahoma. A motion carried to elect the members to the General Board from the states.

The committee nominated the following for terms on various boards and commissions: Foreign Missions Board, Guy Owens; Home Missions Board, J. E. Blanton; Superannuation Board, Leroy Scudder; Sunday School Board, Herman Hersey; Church Training Service Board, Eugene Hales; Laymen's Board, Kimble Crossley and Travis Carter; Headquarters Trustees, G. W. Hunt; Theological Liberalism Commission, Leroy Forlines; and Historical Commission, Bill Davidson. A motion carried to elect the board and commission members, except for the Church Training Service Board member. Mr. Cliff Jones was nominated from the floor. Mr. Hales was elected.

The final report of the Nominating Committee was presented, making nomina-

tions for offices of the convention.

For assistant clerk, Forest Chamberlin was nominated by the committee. There were no other nominations from the floor and Mr. Chamberlin was elected.

For clerk, the committee nominated William Atkinson. Mr. Paul Reed was nominated from the floor. A motion carried that nominations cease and election proceed. Mr. Atkinson was elected.

For assistant moderator, Rev. J. B. Fletcher was nominated by the committee. There were no other nominations from the floor and Mr. Fletcher was elected.

For moderator, the committee nominated Dr. Robert Picirilli. Mr. Wade Jernigan was nominated from the floor. A motion carried that nominations cease and election

proceed. Dr. Picirilli was elected.

The nominating committee nominated Rev. Malcolm C. Fry for Executive Secretary. Mr. Harold Critcher, Rev. James Earl Raper, and Rev. Rufus Coffey were nominated from the floor. A motion carried that nominations cease and election proceed. The first vote eliminated Mr. Raper. The second vote eliminated Mr. Critcher. The third vote revealed it difficult for the chair to validate and a fourth vote was taken. Mr. Coffey was elected.

A motion carried to make the election unanimous.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the 31st annual session of the National Association of Free Will Baptists be adjourned.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

God's blessing has been upon our denomination in the past year and it has been a joy to share in our witness and outreach through the activities of the Executive Department. We are grateful for each of you who has felt the burden of this work and shared that it might be effective.

My contacts in this year reveal that there is an ever-growing interest in the work of the National Association. Pastors and churches are better informed and are finding a more meaningful response and participation. However, hundreds of churches still remain which give only a token response to our world-wide responsibilities. We must seek by every means possible to enlist them in our total effort. IMPORTANT ITEMS: Several items of importance need to be called to your attention. If further explanation is needed, please write or speak to me personally.

(1) A revised list of member churches has to be submitted to Internal Revenue Service each year. State Association clerks must establish and maintain accurate membership lists. Member churches of the association are qualified to receive gifts from individuals which, in turn, are tax deductible to the individual.

(2) An outstanding balance of \$17,700 exists on the two acres of land adjacent to the National Office Building property which was purchased last year. Gifts to retire this balance are urgently needed. This property has been ruled tax exempt by the city of Nashville.

(3) Projections for operational expense on the National Office Building continue to be adequate and there has been no difficulty in making mortgage payments and

meeting operational costs.

RELATED ACTIVITIES: Randall Book Store had gross sales of \$65,041.72 last year. Gross profit on sales was \$2,036.28 above the previous year. The store is managed by Darrell Fulton with some assistance from part-time help. More people and churches are learning of our store so our walk-in trade is increasing.

Executive Church Bonds, Inc., now has the services of a full-time director. Rev. Francis Boyle, former West Coast representative, has moved to Nashville and is making a significant contribution to our churches as he assists them in arranging

financing for their building or remodeling programs.

Contact has apparently enjoyed a good ministry, but circulation still remains at about 7,500. The WNAC has given valuable assistance in our circulation efforts, but larger circulation awaits concerned pastors who will see the job done in their congregations. To meet rising costs the subscription price will probably be increased from \$2.00 to \$2.50 per year in November.

DENOMINATIONAL GIVING: Denominational giving last year by churches and individuals was \$882,406.85 for all national causes. (This does not include income from sales.) Using our statistical table in the 1966 Minutes, which shows a membership of 178,450, this means as average annual gift of \$4.39 per person for all

national ministries combined.

A six-year comparison follows: 1961—\$413,127.00 1962—\$432,451.85 1963—\$507,094.14 1964—\$592,797.35 1965—\$713,218.36 1966—\$882,406.85

The Cooperative Plan of Support enjoyed another year of increase in 1966 with a total of \$88,288.51. More and more churches are finding this plan to be a satisfactory answer for systematic support to all departments of ministry. Hopefully, 1967 will be our first year with \$100,000.00 being given through the Cooperative Plan of Support.

DEPARTMENT SUPPORT: Last year in my report to you I called attention to the need for increased support from the churches for the Executive Department. Almost since its formation, the Department has had to engage in activities which hopefully would produce enough revenue to balance the budget. In a sense, much of what has been accomplished has been financed as a result of these efforts. However, over this period of time we have learned that such an arrangement is unfair both to the so-called "business activities" and the Department: unfair to the "business activities" because it drained away much needed funds with which to build and expand services; unfair to the Department because time was taken from priority activities, and churches assumed the Department was well fixed financially.

Last fall the Executive Committee made a decision to separate areas of activity. Randall Book Store and Executive Church Bonds, Inc., are still under the supervision of the Executive Committee, but they no longer are contributing to the support of the Executive Department. Any surplus funds which might accumulate

will be turned back into the operation to build and expand the services.

This means that the Executive Department has been, and continues to be, dependent upon the gifts received from churches for its support. As a result, we now carry a large deficit. We feel that our hope for adequate support lies in a proposal to come to this association from the budget committee. I trust you will

Lord willing, I expect to see you in Oklahoma City next year.

REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE

As instructed last year, the Budget Committee has undertaken a study of two areas relating to our financial operation. Our recommendations are as follows:

I. The Financing of Commissions.

Several Commissions have been asking for money. In relation to this, we recommend:

1. The Stewardship Commission can be replaced by designating a permanent Stewardship Committee which will consist of the Executive Secretary, heads of C.T.S. and Sunday School Departments, and heads of the W.N.A.C. and Layman's Departments. These can best implement stewardship education within the denomination and bear the expenses thereof. Further, they will always be easily convened because of their physical proximity.

2. The Historical Commission ought not need funds of its own. They should meet at regular denominational functions when their expenses need not be underwritten. It was provided from the beginning that this commission work in close harmony with the Bible College, which will purchase worthy historical materials and serve as a repository for these materials. The college is providing room for a his-

torical collection in the new library facilities.

3. The Study Commission on Theological Liberalism should not pursue any type of work that demands funds. It is not expected to do other than encourage preparation of papers dealing with the subject. A study-paper presented to the National, and deemed by the body worthy of publication would then be published and

and deemed by the body worthy of publication, would then be published and expenses provided by the Association.

4. The responsibilities previously exercised by the Chaplains Commission can become the responsibility of the National Home Missions and Church Extension Department. Funds would therefore be provided through their budget.

In general, it is our feeling that no commission should be established in the future without proper provision for financing at the time of its establishment.

II. The Allocation of Cooperative Plan Receipts.

We have, in the main, two recommendations.

1. We recommend that the budget of the Executive Department be underwritten by a guaranteed amount from the Cooperative Plan, rather than a percentage. This recommendation comes jointly from the Executive Committee and Budget Committee. This method will stabilize the income to the Department and should solve the present financial problems of that Department. It would work as follows: the annual budget of the Department would be divided into twelve equal amounts, and this monthly amount would be taken from the Cooperative Plan before the remainder is allocated to the other Departments. The exception to this would arise when the Department received income from any other source. In that case, the amount to be taken from Cooperative Plan would be reduced by whatever amount was received from other sources.

2. We recommend that a new formula be adopted for determining the alloca-

tion of Cooperative Plan receipts. This formula to work as follows:

a. Superannuation to receive 5% of what remains after the Executive Department amount is subtracted. This will be approximately the same income as presently received.

b. C.T.S. will receive 10% of what remains after the Executive Department amount is subtracted. This will be a slight cut in actual income from what is

presently received.

c. The Layman's Board will receive 3% of what remains after the Executive

Department budget is subtracted.

d. Of that which remains (82%), the three other Departments, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, and Bible College, will receive percentages adjusted annually by a mathematical formula as follows:

(1) The actual expenditures (excluding College expenditures from the building fund) of the previous complete year will be compared for one set of percentages.

(2) The set of percentages yielded by the above will be averaged with a set that would give each an equal amount, thus 331/3% each. The purpose of these two steps is to arrive at final percentages about half-way between what would be realized if each received equal shares or if each received amounts exactly related to the size of their operations. The figures below show how this will work by the 1968 budget year if adopted. (Note: the percentages for all three Departments will change each January even though the college uses a budget year beginning in June.)

BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS

Report for 1966

"The Lord is . . . not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance." Christ has commanded "that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem."

Through your Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions Department you have a witness to the perishing multitudes. Free Will Baptists believe that only in Jesus Christ is there salvation (Acts 4:12), and he who does not believe in Jesus Christ is condemned already (John 3:18). Therefore, a Bible believing Christian is missionary in thought, in word, and in deed. His attitude, testimony, and work are prompted, anointed and guided by the Holy Spirit. This Bible basis of missions is the reason Free Will Baptists are responding more and more to our ministry of foreign missions.

On the behalf of our 77 missionaries, their 82 children, our board of foreign missions and our home office staff, I express thanks to you at this 1967 session of the National Association of Free Will Baptists for your gifts and prayers. Humbly, I submit to you one of the most important reports ever given to a Free Will Baptist assembly.

First, I present individual field reports:

BRAZIL: 22 missionaries; five churches; four preaching points; one Bible institute with eight students; three radio broadcasts; "Carnival of Pretense" now in premiere showings, and a pilot issue of an evangelistic magazine scheduled for later this year.

Many more missionaries can be used effectively in Brazil, and plans are made to enter other states in the country.

CUBA-MIAMI: Our Christians in Cuba have continued their faithful witness under the restrictions of a communist-controlled government. In spite of the limitations, sanctuaries often are filled with worshippers. Pastors are harassed and intimidated, but they suffer for Jesus Christ. Thousands of refugees continue to come to the United States. The Reverend and Mrs. Benito Rodriguez have operated the Cuban Refugee Center (CERF) in Miami. However, clothing and money have not been adequate to provide the needs, and serious consideration is being given to closing the center as an operation of the Foreign Missions Department.

Cuban Free Will Baptist pastors who have come to the States have continued their Christian service. One is pastoring in Texas, another in Florida, one in California, one is with the American Sunday School Union in Texas, another with the American Bible Society in New York, one is manager of a Christian Book Store in Miami, one is a missionary to Panama, and another has made application for appointment to Panama.

The Reverend and Mrs. Thomas H. Willey, Sr., are deputational missionaries and have traveled extensively this year in missionary services.

ECUADOR: Two missionary nurses are assigned to World Radio Missionary Fellowship. Ella Rae Jones is ministering at the hospital in Quito and Patsy Tyson is stationed at the Shell Mera Hospital, both operated by WRMF.

FRANCE: Two missionaries. The Reverend and Mrs. Dan Merkh have made a survey of west-central France and have uncovered a desperately needy area.

Mr. Merkh has requested five more couples to come immediately to this field. In one area of his survey, there are four cities of 10,000 to 20,000 with no Protestant church and six cities of 5,000 to 10,000 with no Protestant church.

INDIA: Four resident missionaries; one missionary on medical leave; four missionaries under appointment; nine churches; 46 preaching points; two hostels; two kindergartens; two elementary schools.

Miss Volena Wilson returned last September on medical leave and is now well and doing deputational work. A request has been made for the Reverend and Mrs. Joe Haas to enter South India as a replacement for Miss Wilson. The Reverend and Mrs. Dan Cronk are returning to the States in late August for furlough. A request has been filed with the government of India for the Reverend and Mrs. Sherwood Lee to enter North India as replacements for the Cronks. Pray that visas for these missionaries will be granted.

IVORY COAST: 19 missionaries; 35 preaching points; one Bible institute; two dispensaries; one medical clinic. The Reverend and Mrs. Howard Gage are on special assignment to supervise the building program in the Ivory Coast. The medical clinic is being enlarged to provide hospital facilities. Lonnie Sparks and Bill Jones have continued translation ministries. The field council has requested more workers. It is encouraging to receive the reports of many new converts, including village chiefs, and to learn of their faithful witness among the villagers.

JAPAN: Eight missionaries; six churches; one radio broadcast. Literally millions are perishing in Japan with no knowledge of Jesus Christ. I urgently issue a strong and passionate plea for missionaries for the islands of Japan. Herbert Waid writes of the overwhelming task in Tokyo. Wesley Calvery writes of the thrilling response in Sapporo. The Fred Herseys and Jim McLains will leave in late August for this field. Pray that others will soon join them.

PANAMA: Six missionaries; two churches; several preaching points. Bill and Barbara Phipps came home in February on medical leave. Estenio and Anita Garcia have been on a leave of absence but are now reappointed to Panama. We could easily use five more couples in this country immediately. Tom and Ruth Willey, Jr., have assumed tremendous work responsibilities. Pray for others to soon join them in this work.

URUGUAY-SOUTH BRAZIL: Seven missionaries; two churches; three preaching points; four students attending Brazil Bible institute. Walter and Marcia Ellison have been given an early furlough to provide medical treatment for their son John. Your prayers are requested for his healing. A commendable work has been done in this area, evidenced by the number of students now in training and the fact that some of the work is already under the ministry of national workers.

Your Board of Foreign Missions and home office staff are conscious of their stewardship responsibilities. A special committee consisting of three board members and the general director made a special study of job responsibilities and a survey of policies and practices of other mission boards. As a result of this study, the Reverend Rufus Coffey was named director of missions education to conduct mission seminars for pastors and students in addition to preaching in missionary conferences. The Reverend Henry Van Kluyve was brought to the department as director of deputation. He is responsible for scheduling itinerary and conference services and will assist in representing the department at district and state associations.

I am proposing a special study of our financial structure for changes which I believe must be made. Our major problem lies in the fact that we have an uncontrolled income by designating giving with a controlled outgo by budget appropriations or by board direction. To illustrate, we may receive a designated gift of \$10,000 for one field which may not need but \$6,000 while the budget allows \$10,000 for a need in another field which receives only \$6,000. This creates deficits in some accounts while accumulating balances in others.

To be consistent with a policy in allocating gifts according to designations, many missionaries in deficit would have to be brought home for lack of funds.

What can be done to correct this problem? At the present we are endeavoring to eliminate deficits by your special gifts to these accounts; we are securing monthly support for these accounts from new support and by requesting donors to rechannel their gifts from those who have more than enough support to those missionaries whose support is not adequate to sustain their ministry; we are not permitting any missionaries to go to their fields until adequate support is underwritten; the board has adopted a "hold the line" policy by not appointing any additional missionaries until deficit accounts are cleared and all present missionaries are adequately underwritten.

I do not propose to deny the donor his privilege of designating his gift. However, your Board of Foreign Missions and its executive staff are charged by the National Association to supervise this world-wide ministry of evangelism. Latitude and sympathetic understanding must be given if we are to wisely distribute funds according to budget appropriations approved by this association.

I would also point out that gifts to the operational fund have not increased over the years proportionately to our growth. Though we have greatly increased services and work loads, receipts per month to the operational fund have stayed in a range from \$112,943.09 to \$114,731.13 for the past five years while designations to other accounts have increased several times. This has not been sufficient to meet the needs of our expanding ministries. You can see from allocation percentages given earlier that we have maintained a wholesome ratio in disbursements of our funds.

The *Project 5000* plan of special support has received commendation by many friends. A mailing was made to all pastors after annual meeting of the National Association last year requesting their support in securing commitments from their members. The response was disappointing. A direct mailing was made to our complete mailing list in the Western Zone, of 7,500, and as of June 10, 1967, we had 307 commitment cards in our file. We have a total of 343 commitments from the other four zones combined, zones which have not been contacted by direct mail.

Letters were sent in June to Zone One requesting gifts to return the Lonnie Palmers to the Ivory Coast, and letters were sent to the other zones for the Fred Herseys. I believe this is an excellent plan to meet special needs but more people must be enlisted to make it effective. This is an effective means of support by which we can send missionaries to reach the perishing millions.

"For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not *perish*, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). Dare I ask the question, What have you given?

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

THE PAST

The Lord has blessed the ministry of the Sunday School Department throughout 1966. We have continued to grow. One wonders if the growth will ever cease. Let's pray that it will not. Our growth is indicated by the following:

- 1. Our sales totaled \$242,697.12. This is \$35,203.58 above 1965 sales. It represents a 14 per cent increase.
- 2. We have added 174 new customers during 1966. Our greatest geographical area of growth has been North Carolina.
- 3. We issued 884 Teacher Training Certificates during 1966. This is a marked increase over the certificates that were issued in 1965.
- 4. We have enjoyed an increase in sales in all levels of our own curriculum.
- 5. Our operational costs only reveal a marginal increase. Cost of production rose in parallel to our increase in sales.
- · 6. We netted a total of nine per cent over and above all expenses.
- 7. We circulated our new Sunday School Standard as widely as possible.
- 8. The Promotional Secretary, Reverend Harrold Harrison, and I travelled approximately 75,000 miles promoting our work.

THE PRESENT

Our six months' report for the first half of 1967 reflects a continued growth in sales. We can anticipate another increase in sales throughout 1967.

We began our Teen curriculum this year. The response has been mixed. Further time will tell if this has been a step in the right direction.

Our new warehouse building is presently under construction. This will relieve the crowded condition that has existed ever since we began our operation five years ago. This should help to improve our service tremendously.

THE FUTURE

The Sunday School Board is still projecting a curriculum change on the Adult levels in the future. Listed below are some of the modern curriculum plans.

"And the heavens shall praise thy wonders, O Lord: thy faithfulness also in the congregation of the saints." As the psalmist has spoken so well in the fifth verse of Psalm 89, we know from personal experience during the past year that God is faithful. This expression of recognition of God's goodness is not intended as pseudopiety, but is an attempt to acknowledge the fact that all that has been accomplished through the CTS Department is a result of God's faithfulness to His Word.

The Church Training Service Department has been the benefactor of God's blessings. There have been growth and expansion in its opportunities to minister. We have seen a greater responsiveness in many aspects of our work during the last twelve months than previously. We have also been made more keenly aware of what a tremendous task is yet to be done should the Lord tarry His coming for another year.

In particular, one of the largest increases in the CTS program has been more participation in competitive activities. This has been especially noticeable in the two quizzes, Bible Bowl and Bible Tic Tac Toe. We believe that through the competitive activities our teens will increase their general knowledge of the Bible and

of our denominational ministries.

A new publication, TEEN ACTION, made its debute in July of this year. This quarterly magazine replaces two older publications, TEEN MESSENGER and TEEN VOICE. It is our intent to produce a magazine that will provide top quality program material and also relate what Free Will Baptist teens are doing. There will be several pages of pictures and articles about our teenagers in each issue of TEEN ACTION.

As a denomination we face the greatest challenge that we have ever faced on all fronts. This is certainly true as we think of our children, our youth, and our total training ministry. As a Department with responsibilities in each of these areas we recognize many needs. The needs we see seem greater than we can hope to meet, but where God reveals a need we know that He is able to supply.

We recognize very keenly the need for personnel on the field who can help organize and maintain an effective program of leadership training. We need men who can help the local church, the district, and the state develop a vigorous program that will reach our youth for Christ and challenge them for service in His kingdom.

Plans are developing for a pilot project of intensive concentration in a limited area geographically. The project will provide leadership in organizing CTS programs in local churches, strengthening existing programs, assisting in the planning of district CTS rallies, and promoting camping and other phases of the total CTS ministry. Careful study and research will be done in connection with the project in order

Careful study and research will be done in connection with the project in order that valid recommendations may be shared with CTS leaders throughout the denomination. It is hoped that such a project will be only the beginning of a larger and more effective ministry for training and channeling the energies of our youth and

adult leadership.

In order to help our churches reach the rising tide of young people, we must move forward to enlarge the ministry of CTS. To help meet the cost we must enlist the financial support of every local CTS group. We are planning a special day for September 17, 1967 to help put the National CTS Department on solid footing. Following this initial thrust we are trusting that each CTS will want to share with us in making possible a larger ministry to our youth.

REPORT OF STEWARDSHIP COMMISSION

RECOMMENDATION:

- (2) That a stewardship committee be established to provide a stewardship devolopment program for the denomination with membership as follows:
 - (a) The association's Executive Secretary as coordinator.
 - (b) Directors of the Sunday School and Church Training Service Departments for production and distribution assistance.
 - (c) Heads of the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention and Master's Men for counsel and lay liason.
- (3) That records, material stock and funds of the Stewardship Commission be transferred to the Executive Department to be channeled for stewardship development purposes.

REPORT OF CHAPLAIN'S COMMISSION

It has been our privilege to represent the National Association of Free Will Baptists at two chaplains meetings this year. One was conducted by the National Association of Evangelical Chaplains Commission in Washington, D.C., and the other was the United States Army Commands Chaplains Meeting at Fort Myer, Virginia. Rev. Billy Melvin represented the denomination at a third meeting held in Los Angeles, California, by the National Association of Evangelicals.

First, let us report on the task assigned the Chaplains Commission by this body at last year's annual session. The assignment was: "That the Chaplains Commission make a list of all Free Will Baptist Churches located near military installations." This commission early set about accomplishing the task under the leadership of Rev. Kenneth Walker. However, upon examining the U.S. Post Office Directory, it was found that the Army and Air Force installations alone would require approximately 36 printed pages. By adding the Navy, Coast Guard and Marine bases, the list would indeed be voluminous. All of these would then have to be broken down into areas where Free Will Baptist churches are situated. Such a report did not appear feasible to the Commission and this information was transmitted to the moderator who agreed that it would be impractical.

The Commission suggests that local pastors use the Free Will Baptist Church Directory to refer their members in the Armed Forces to the nearest church. Since the military installations usually have their own post office, it is not always easy to determine by the address which Free Will Baptist Church is located in that area. We, therefore, suggest that pastors whose churches are situated near service installations send their church name and address to the Chaplains Commission, addressed to the national offices in Nashville, Tennessee. The Commission could then compile a listing by state and request its publication occasionally in *Contact*. The list would also be available to those requesting this information.

Here is a brief report of Free Will Baptists' participation in the Chaplains Service of our Armed Forces: currently, the National Association of Free Will

Baptist has only one chaplain on active duty.

Of the total chaplains on active duty at this time, 30% are serving in Vietnam. Of this total, 25% of the chaplains in Vietnam are Protestant chaplains, affiliated with The National Association of Evangelicals, and approximately 10% of all

chaplains are affiliated with the NAE.

The requirements for entering the services in the capacity of chaplain are substantially the same as in previous years with one possible exception. Previously, the applicant must not have passed the age of 33½ years at the time he would report for duty. Due to the current situation, however, in some cases a waiver of age may be obtained up to age 39 years. The applicant must hold a B.A. or B.S. degree, plus 90 hours credit from a recognized seminary. The candidate would enter the service with the rank of Captain.

The NAE Chaplains Commission, which serves as a sponsoring agent for our Free Will Baptist candidates, advises that at the present time, based upon our denominational membership, Free Will Baptists would possibly be permitted to place four chaplains on duty—1 in the Army, 2 in the Navy, and 1 in the Air Force.

In this closing statement may we say that we, like you, believe that the coming of the Lord is very near. We cannot believe that there will ever again be a lasting peace among nations; therefore, our military forces will be held in great strength. The opportunity for our fundamental, dedicated, Bible preaching ministers, finds a very great challenge in the chaplaincy. Young men answering the call to the ministry should seek to know if God would have them serve as missionary to the uniformed Americans, both in the homeland and upon the foreign soils that I believe will be their duty stations from now on. We would encourage our Free Will Baptist Colleges and Bible institutes to make our young ministers aware of the great need for spiritual witnesses among our military people.

This Commission offers its services to our denomination in any capacity it can be

of assistance.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S NATIONAL AUXILIARY CONVENTION

The 32nd annual meeting of the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention met on July 11, 1967. Total registration was 606 with 15 states, 5 districts and 3 local auxiliaries sending in Recording Secretary Reports.

The enrolment at the beginning of the convention year was 6,175, and the present enrolment is 6,623; an increase of 448 members.

There were 1,072 study courses conducted and 3,245 daily Bible readers reported. During the year 671 special programs were conducted, 922 seasons of prayer, and 2,404 participating in the Prayer Fellowship Hour.

The reports conclude that 610 souls were won to the LORD through efforts of the Personal Service Department.

Contact subscribers number 2,661; Heartbeat 2,890; and Mission-Gram 2,544. The amount contributed through channels other than WNAC was \$45,757.09; total financial receipts in General Fund amounted to \$77,556.25; and total disbursements for operating expense were \$24,486.48.

REPORT OF SUPERANNUATION BOARD

The members of the Board of Superannuation have a very grave sense of responsibility as we consider that we have been charged with the task of planning retirement for the ministers, missionaries, and other full-time workers in our denomination. We are aware of the fact that we may be able to persuade them to plan and prepare for that inevitable fact—old age. We, therefore, offer the following recommendations:

(1) That we conduct a program of promotion to educate and assist each minister, missionary, and others to subscribe to a retirement plan which will be adequate.

(2) That we familiarize ourselves with different retirement plans, social security,

and laws concerning tax exemptions toward contribution for retirement.

(3) That we sponsor a booth at the National Association to make it convenient for our people to obtain this information from the Board of Superannuation and a representative of the Federal Social Security Administration.

(4) That we receive offerings on Father's Day, and other times, to help sponsor

this program of education and retirement.

(5) That each church throughout the denomination inquire about the matter of retirement and discuss it with their pastor, to make every effort possible to see that he has some kind of retirement plan which will be adequate for his need.

(6) That we impress upon our mission boards this matter of grave concern since

it is possible that Social Security will not be sufficient for our missionaries.

(7) That each minister, missionary, or other worker either apply for Social Security or an annuity and, if possible, both.

One of everything that is printed with the name "Free Will Baptist" on it, we want in the National Collection.

Everyone, please help us preserve the history of our beloved denomination. We have not been as diligent as we should have been in preserving these historical materials. Your Commission is determined to do what it can to collect these valuable items. We have found them in old trunks, laying on open shelves, in drawers, and some even in barns. If it has "Free Will Baptist" on it—no matter where or what it is—it is VALUABLE. Please help us get these things into the National Collection for safe keeping.

Our experience this year has convinced us of the urgency of obtaining these materials from some of our older Free Will Baptist people before they pass away. Often their families destroy them, not knowing their value.

In the study of Human Relations, we offer the following principles to our people for sincere study and considerations:

- 1. Any individual or group cannot have ideal relationship with any other individual or group until he has first come in right relationship with his Creator.
- 2. One's relationship with himself is based on his right relationship with the Lord.
- 3. It is only after these first two steps have been achieved that correct relationship with others come.
- 4. Relationship with those of different economic, social, religious, racial, or educational status, are for more difficult than among those of like ideas.

There are many obstacles to proper relationships, particularly, between peoples of other races and cultures; we mention these three,

- 1. It is easier to expect more of others than we are willing to grant to others.
- 2. The give and take in the fields of human relations should be mutual.
- 3. Every God-given freedom and right carries responsibilities and should be mutual.

We are not making a brief for the civil rights movement, but our relationships with all men should be based on a relationship through Jesus Christ, and not on the merits of educational attainments, social standing, race, creed, or color.

As a National Association, may we through our agencies seek to make the above the basis of our human relations.
