PROCEEDINGS

MONDAY EVENING, JULY 15, 1968

The 32nd annual session of the National Association of Free Will Baptists opened in the Civic Center Music Hall, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, with prayer and Scripture reading (Eph. 1:15-18) by Rev. J. B. Fletcher, assistant moderator. Mr. I. L. Stanley, accompanied by Rev. Teddy Wilbanks and Rev. Herman Hersey at the organ and piano respectively, led the congregation in singing the theme song, "On Jordan's Stormy Banks," and other congregational numbers.

The clerk of the association, Rev. William E. Atkinson, called the session to order and introduced the officers. The moderator, Dr. Robert E. Picirilli, delivered his message to the body.

The Committee on Committees report was read by the moderator (See Reports). The appointment of WNAC committees was read by Mrs. Robert C. Hill.

The association was welcomed to Oklahoma by Rev. Lynn Wood, Moderator of Oklahoma State Association. Mr. Roe Cook, representing the Mayor of Oklahoma City, extended a warm welcome to the city.

Mr. I. L. Stanley led the congregation in singing, "Heavenly Sunshine." A time of "getting acquainted" followed. Attendance was noted from 33 states and five foreign countries.

Special music was rendered by the Rudy Sisters of Nashville, Tennessee. The evening offering was received. Rev. Malcolm C. Fry of Tuscon, Arizona sang "The Battle Hymn of the Republic." The keynote message was brought by Rev. Eustace Riggs of Memphis, Tennessee. His message was based on the first chapter of Joshua and the first chapter of Ephesians using as his theme, "Possessing our Spiritual Possessions."

Following the message, the convention adjourned until the following evening.

TUESDAY EVENING, JULY 16

The Tuesday evening session was opened with Mr. Ray Turnage presiding. Rev. Carl Vallance led the congregation in prayer. Mr. I. L. Stanley conducted congregational singing.

Mr. Samuel Johnson, Director of Church Training Service, presented awards to winners in all the competitive youth events. He also presented an award of recognition to Rev. Henry Melvin for faithful service to the Church Training Service Board.

The evening offering was received. The moderator read telegrams of greetings from the Stan Mooneyhams in Singapore and the Dan Merkh in France.

Special music was rendered by the "Master's Messengers," a youth choir from North Carolina under the direction of Rev. Fred Hall and piano accompanist Rev. Teddy Wilbanks. The message was brought by Rev. Gordon Sebastian of Wilson, North Carolina. His theme was "Possessing our Youth," and his text was Proverbs 22:6.

A large number of youth and adults responded to the speaker's concluding invitation. The convention adjourned until the following morning.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, JULY 17

The session opened with congregational singing led by Mr. I. L. Stanley. Prayer was offered by Rev. William E. Atkinson. Devotional thoughts and prayer were offered by Rev. James McAllister of Kansas City, Missouri. Special music

was rendered by the "Looper Trio."

The moderator called for the report of the Credentials Committee (See report). Rev. Tom Hamilton read the report. A *motion carried* to accept the report and seat the delegates with the exception of the groups from the state of New Mexico. A *motion carried* to seat delegates from both groups with a recommendation that they unite and form a state association.

The General Board report was read by the clerk (See reports). A *motion carried* to receive the report and adopt item by item. A *motion carried* to adopt Item 1. A *motion carried* to table Item 2 A and B. A motion was made to adopt Item 3 of the report. It was moved to amend the main motion by adding a requirement that the Executive Committee assemble a representative group of persons from across the denomination for consideration of the issue.

An amendment to the amendment was made stipulating that the group consist of two from each representative body of the National Association. A *motion carried* to adopt the amendment to the amendment. A subsequent *motion carried* to adopt the first amendment.

Discussion resumed on the main motion. A substitute motion was made that the National Association, while in present session, elect from its body a committee of ten to study these matters and that this committee also invite any others interested to attend the session. After a period of discussion, a *motion carried* calling for previous question. The substitute motion was *lost*.

Discussion continued on the main motion as previously amended. A motion was made and *seconded to table*. This motion was *lost*. A *motion carried* by the body calling for previous question. A vote was taken on the main motion as previously amended and the motion *carried*. A subsequent *motion carried* asking all groups desiring to represent at such a meeting to select their own delegates; and that such persons would have equal voting power as persons of the Executive Committee.

A motion to restrict Free Will Baptist Bible College from teaching certain things for one year was ruled out of order by the chair.

A *motion carried* to adopt all of Item 4 of the General Board report.

Rev. Ronald Creech gave the Historical Commission report (See reports). A *motion carried* to accept the report.

Rev. J. C. Lynn gave the Superannuation Board report (See reports). A *motion carried* to accept the report and adopt the budget.

Mr. Kimble Crossley gave the report of the Layman's Board (See reports). A *motion carried* to accept the report and adopt the proposed budget.

A *motion carried* to send a telegram to the Tom Willeys, Sr., in Miami, Florida, expressing the convention body's concern for Brother Willey's condition.

The moderator adjourned the meeting until the afternoon.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, JULY 17

The afternoon session opened with Mr. I. L. Stanley leading the congregational singing. Scripture thoughts and prayer were offered by Rev. Nuel Brown.

Dr. L. C. Johnson gave the report for Free Will Baptist Bible College (See reports). A *motion carried* to accept the report and adopt the proposed budget. Rev. Jack Paramore recognized several individuals and churches who have given to the Development Program of Free Will Baptist Bible College. Special awards were given those present.

Dr. Billy A. Melvin gave the report of the National Association of Evangelicals. A *motion carried* to accept the report as information.

Rev. Jack Paramore gave the report of the Theological Liberalism Study Commission (See reports). A *motion carried* to accept the report with the exception of the request for 1% of Cooperative Funds. A subsequent *motion*

carried to grant the 1% of Cooperative Funds.

Rev. Homer Willis gave the Home Missions Department report (See reports). A *motion carried* to accept the report and adopt the proposed budget.

Mr. Samuel Johnson gave the Church Training Service report (See reports). A *motion carried* to accept the report and adopt the proposed budget.

Rev. Roger Reeds gave the Sunday School Department report. A *motion carried* to accept the report and adopt the proposed budget. Awards were given to the Sunday School superintendant-of-the-year and to the runner-up. Mr. Frank Dean of Homerville, Georgia was recognized as the superintendant-of-the-year; and Mr. Ralph Scarberry of Huntington, West Virginia was runner-up.

Rev. Reford Wilson gave the Foreign Missions Department report (See reports). A *motion carried* to accept the report and adopt the proposed budget.

Rev. Rufus Coffey gave the Executive Secretary report, including a special offer on *Contact* magazine for new subscribers (See reports). A *motion carried* to accept the report and adopt the proposed budget.

Rev. Francis Boyle gave the report of Executive Church Bonds (See reports). A *motion carried* to accept the report and adopt the proposed budget.

The moderator read Part 1 of the Nominating Committee's report. The following persons were nominated for places on the General Board: New Mexico, Warren J. Bell; North Carolina, Edwin Hill; Northeast, James Nason; Northwest, Lloyd Plunkett; Ohio, Homer Nelson; Oklahoma, Lonnie Davault; South Carolina, Dennis Wiggs; Tennessee, Donald Sexton; Texas, Rashie Kennedy, Sr.; Virginia, Robert Hill; West Virginia, Albert Halbrook; Mississippi, Van Dale Hudson; Maryland, Lester Horton; Arizona, Land of Enchantment District, Richard R. Meade. There were no nominations from the floor. The moderator reminded the convention that the constitution would not permit the election of both representatives for New Mexico and the Land of Enchantment District because both are from the same state. A *motion carried* to elect all but these two. A subsequent *motion carried* to table the election of New Mexico's representatives so that both parties could meet for conference with the nominating committee.

For trustees of Free Will Baptist Bible College, the committee nominated Randy Cox, Delmer Priest, and Bill Robinson. The moderator ruled that each must be elected according to term of office. Rev. Wade Jernigan was nominated to oppose Rev. Randy Cox. Mr. Cox was elected. Rev. Harold Harrison and Rev. Wade Jernigan was nominated opposing Mr. Delmer Priest. Mr. Priest was elected. Dr. Billy Melvin, Lt. Col. Oliver F. Goen, Rev. Wade Jernigan, and Mr. Newman were nominated opposing Rev. Bill Robinson. Mr. Robinson was elected.

Other nominations by the committee were as follows: Foreign Missions, Joseph Ange; Home Missions, Kenneth Walker; Superannuation Board, E. M. Kennedy; Sunday School Board, William Hill; Church Training Service Board, Milton Worthington and Charles Harris; Laymen's Board, Doyle Terry and Paul Kennedy; Headquarters Trustees, Garner Caldwell; Theological Liberalism Commission, Mark Vandivort; Historical Commission, E. E. Morris. All of these were elected by acclamation except Mr. Walker, Mr. Hill and Mr. Worthington. Rev. James Murray and Rev. James McAllister were nominated from the floor opposing Rev. Kenneth Walker. Mr. Walker was elected. Rev. Fred Evans was nominated in opposition to Rev. William Hill. Mr. Hill was elected. Rev. Charles Hollingshead was nominated opposing Rev. Milton Worthington. Mr. Worthington was elected.

WEDNESDAY EVENING, JULY 17

The Wednesday evening service opened with Mr. I. L. Stanley leading the congregation in singing "O Zion Haste" and "We've A Story To Tell To The

Nations." Rev. Robert Shockey presided during the annual missions service. Home missionaries present were introduced by Rev. Roy Thomas, Chairman of the Home Missions Board. Foreign Missionaries who were present for the service were introduced by Rev. Eugene Waddell, member of the Foreign Missions Board. The evening offering was received by Rev. Forrest Chamberlin. Special music was rendered by the Ledbetter's of Wichita, Kansas and a quartet from Monterrey, Mexico. Rev. Guy Ownes of Florence, South Carolina brought the message using as his text Psalms 2:8. His theme was "Possessing Our Unevangelized Possessions." Following the message many responded to the invitation for consecration. Rev. Robert Shockey led in receiving the missionary offering after which the meeting adjourned until the following morning.

THURSDAY MORNING, JULY 18

The Thursday session opened with Mr. I. L. Stanley leading congregational singing. Rev. Fred Evans led with Scripture thoughts and prayer.

Mrs. Robert C. Hill gave the report of the Woman's Auxiliary Convention (See reports). A *motion carried* to accept the report as information.

Mrs. Peggy Paramore gave the report of the National Youth Conference. A *motion carried* to accept the report as information.

The final part of the Credentials Committee Report was read by Rev. Tom Hamilton, Chairman (See reports). A *motion carried* to accept it.

Rev. Roy Thomas, chairman of the Resolutions Committee, read its report (see reports). Subsequent *motions carried* to adopt each of the items.

Rev. Rufus Coffey gave the report for the Budget Committee (see reports). Allowance was made in this report for the 1% grant to the Theological Liberalism Commission. All other allocations remained the same. A *motion carried* to accept the report.

A *motion carried* to take from the table Item 2 of the General Board report (see reports). A *motion carried* to accept section B. A *motion carried* to refer section A to the Executive Committee for further study.

A *motion carried* to take from the table that part of the Nominating Committee's report dealing with the election of a General Board member from New Mexico. The Nominating Committee nominated Rev. Warren J. Bell. No other nominations were offered. Mr. Bell was elected.

A motion was made and seconded that the National Association of Free Will Baptists restrict Free Will Baptist Bible College from teaching anything relative to the "position of the backslider" in any class room of said institution for the coming year. A period of discussion followed after which a *motion carried* calling for previous question. The *motion lost*.

During the worship hour Mr. I. L. Stanley led congregational singing. Rev. Charles Harris presided during the worship service. Special singing was rendered by the "Hillmont Engineers" and by Rev. Bill Gardner. Rev. Jerry Rhodes of Tulsa, Oklahoma brought the final message of the convention. His theme was "Possessing Our Heavenly Possessions."

Following the worship service, the Placement Committee report was read by Rev. Lincoln Varney, chairman (see reports). A *motion carried* to accept the report.

Part 2 of the Nominating Committee's report was read by the clerk. The committee nominated for moderator, Robert E. Picirilli; for assistant moderator, J. B. Fletcher; for clerk, William E. Atkinson; for assistant clerk, Forrest Chamberlin. There were no other nominations for moderator, clerk or assistant clerk. Mr. Picirilli, Mr. Atkinson, and Mr. Chamberlin were elected by acclamation. For assistant moderator, Rev. James Earl Raper and Rev. Malcolm Fry were nominated. Mr. Raper withdrew from the contest because he already serves on the Sunday School Board. In the ensuing vote, Mr. Fletcher was elected.

A *motion carried* to adjourn.

REPORT OF THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

We your Credentials Committee have examined the letters and find them in order as follows:

1. From the following states with the right of five (5) delegates each; Alabama, Arkansas, California, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, and West Virginia. We recommend that these delegates be seated.

2. From the following district associations with the right of three (3) delegates each; Arizona, Idaho, Indiana (Wabash Valley), New Mexico, Northeastern, and Northwestern. We recommend that these delegates be seated.

3. From the following local churches reporting directly to this body with the right of one (1) delegate each; First Free Will Baptist Church of Denver, Colorado, Waipahu Free Will Baptist Church of Waipahu, Hawaii, and Riverview Free Will Baptist Church of Bettendorf, Iowa. We recommend that these delegates be seated.

4. We recommend that all other delegates properly registered from local churches that are a part of this body be seated also.

5. We are in receipt of two petitionary letters, namely: Maryland State Association and Land of Enchantment District of the state of New Mexico. We recommend that these groups be accepted as a part of the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

6. Having checked with the registration officials we find that there has been a total of 257 delegates, 597 ministers, 1,550 visitors who have registered for the session. These represent 19 State Associations, 7 district associations, and 258

local churches. This committee wishes to express appreciation to Rev. Lonnie Davault and others who have worked so faithfully at the registration desks.

REPORT OF GENERAL BOARD

We submit to you the following report as a result of our meeting Monday, July 15, 1968.

1. We have heard the reports of the several departments and recommend them, along with their budgets for your hearing and adoption as each is presented to you.

In the case of the CTS Department Report, we further recommend that the Board of Church Training Service give study to their increasing liabilities.

2. (A) We recommend that all of Section 3 of Article 2 Membership be deleted from our constitution and that the words "local churches" in Section 4 Article 2 Membership of our constitution be deleted; thereby denying membership to local churches who are not members of some other Associational body.

(B) We recommend that the words "two years" be deleted in item D of Section 23 of By-Laws and that the words "at least three years" be inserted instead.

3. The General Board has considered a recommendation from the Oklahoma State Association for a change in our Treatise. The proposal reads as follows:

We recommend to the National Association that Article 3, Chapter 18 in the National Treatise, which deals with feetwashing, be changed by deleting the following:

"And reminds the believer of the necessity of a daily cleansing from all sin."

We recommend that the following statement be placed in the Treatise:

BACKSLIDING AND APOSTASY — A person who has been regenerated or born again and is living in unconfessed, unforgiven sin, is rebellious to the principles of the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and therefore is a backslider in a lost condition who must repent and be restored to the right relationship with God or be eternally lost.

We recognize, according to Hebrews 6:4-6, that it is possible for a person to get in the condition that he could never return to Christ. This, we believe, is Apostasy. However, we also recognize that a regenerate person can fall into sin, be in a lost condition and still not be an Apostate. This person, through repentance, can be reconciled to God.

We recommend this matter be given to the next Executive Committee for further study and report to you in next year's session.

4. (A) We urge each state to prepare an up to date list of all their ministers and to cooperate fully with the Executive Secretary in preparing a new directory.

(B) We urge each church to send at least ten percent of their CTS offerings to the CTS Department to help decrease the liabilities of this department.

(C) For some time the General Board has had under consideration the revision of the practice section of our Treatise. The General Board hereby promises give more careful study to this matter and submit it to you for your approval in next year's session.

REPORT OF SUPERANNUATION BOARD

The Board of Superannuation during the past year has given grave concern to its responsibility as a board to provide retirement for ministers, missionaries and other full-time workers. We have done some promotional work through visual education and literature. One of our board members conducted several itineraries and other meetings. We have purchased a projector for this educational work which we feel has been very effective in presenting this very important phase of our denominational work to the local churches.

Since there have been some changes in the Social Security program during the past year, we decided in our last board meeting to offer the following recommendations:

RECOMMENDATIONS from the BOARD OF SUPERANNUATION

The Board of Superannuation of Free Will Baptists, realizing the existing need of a program promoting the provision of retirement and protection for ministers,

missionaries, and other Christian workers in our denomination, offers the following recommendations:

I. PROGRAM. That we provide insurance protection of a minimum of \$2,500.00 in the beginning with the option to increase each two years to reach a maximum of \$15,000.00, which may be converted to cash at age 65 to supplement retirement. In this program, the local church would be encouraged to supplement retirement. In this program, the local church would be encouraged to support the premiums of the insured. In the graduated face value program, the insured would not be required to prove guaranteed insurability. One may be graduated to any face value amount after any two-year period.

II. PROMOTION. When this plan is approved, an immediate campaign of promotional materials in the form of brochures for distribution and articles for publication in the denominational literature would be launched. After this, a designated date would be set for the plan to become effective.

III. PROVISION. The administrative and financial involvement would come from contributions received on services rendered through the policies; also, from which a full time director would be employed by the Board. His duties would include counseling on insurance and overall promotion of the program.

This meeting is under the direction of Dr. Clyde Taylor of the National Association of Evangelicals.

A full-time Director is still in the planning. This should be accomplished by 1970. The amounts received from this cooperative funds is being placed in a savings account for this purpose. It is also hoped that donations will also be received for this purpose, through the local churches.

Pray for our work; also, when you and your churches are challenged to give, meet the challenge. There is much to be accomplished for the Lord through the Laymen of your church.

REPORT OF THEOLOGICAL LIBERALISM STUDY COMMISSION

The Commission on Theological Liberalism has spent an active year in preparing two booklets on vital issues facing the religious world today. Dr. J. D. O'Donnell and Professor Leroy Forlines have done an exceptional job in preparation of these papers dealing with the ecumenical movement and issues among evangelicals. This task has been especially burdensome in that no funds are provided by the National Association for the work of this commission.

The Commission is open to deal with questions concerning Theological Liberalism. We propose a special annual meeting of the Commission to discuss issues of vital interest. Thus the Commission could deal with specific matters of importance as they arise and confront our denomination.

Having become more familiar with the problems incurred by trying to operate the Commission without finances provided by the National Association, we recommend to this Association a budget of at least \$1,000.00 for 1969. Since we cannot be engaged in both raising the funds and studying issues, we recommend the Commission on Theological Liberalism be granted 1% of the receipts from the Cooperative Plan of Support. With financing thus secured, the Commission could give itself to a more thorough program of research and writing.

With permission from the moderator, we request the privilege of securing commitments from the present Association to underwrite the work of the Commission for the past year.

Dr. J. D. O'Donnell's book, *The Scandal of Christianity*, is an excellent statement on the development of the ecumenical movement and is written in such fashion as to be understood by ordinary people.

Professor Leroy Forlines' paper on *Issues Among Evangelicals* is a documented statement dealing with four main issues that confront us today: inspiration, evolution, social gospel, cooperative evangelism.

We believe these booklets will provide a documented foundation for other papers. They are equally valuable, informing pastors and people about these satanic strategies that confront our generation.

BOARD OF CHURCH TRAINING SERVICE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

"... Seek ye first the kingdom of God ..." a phrase from Matthew 6:33. It appears that man, whether young or old, is seeking everything else. This is the purpose of our denomination's youth and training department to encourage each member to put Christ first and to do His will in all things. It is to this end that the various programs and activities of the Board of Church Training Service are planned and promoted.

LOCAL LEADERSHIP

We are keenly conscious of the major role of each CTS leader in the local church. It is the degree of dedication of these workers that determines in large measure the failure or success of the local training program. The National CTS Department recognizes its role as a service agent to provide basic guidelines and supplies. A further responsibility of the National CTS Department is the provided at a distinct savings. Only two of the CTS publications are of sufficient

LEADERSHIP TRAINING

The Board of Church Training Service is moving forward in the development of a National Leadership Training Program for CTS leaders and camp workers. A site was purchased from the Cumberland Association of Free Will Baptists to serve as a National Center. Facilities are being prepared for use in leadership training for boys, training for leaders in CTS and camp, and for weekend retreats and conferences.

Future plans for the National Leadership Training Program include conferences to be held at the site near Nashville and at other strategic locations where interest warrants. The special program for teenage boys is to be held each summer. In order to move the leadership program forward each CTS is asked to share in a special offering during the MEASURE UP campaign in September. The goal for each CTS is twenty-five dollars. Most CTS groups can meet this challenge. We trust that those who can do more will do so.

MEASURE UP

MEASURE UP is the theme of the CTS emphasis for September. A special attendance campaign is planned for four consecutive Sundays beginning with September 8. To measure up in attendance there must be an average increase for the four Sundays of twenty-five percent above the average attendance for July and August.

An attractive award will be presented to each CTS which measures up plus a gift for the general director. An official report form is available from the National CTS Office. Attendance kits with promotional materials for each of the four weeks is available.

COMPETITIVE ACTIVITIES

New competitive materials for the 1968-69 CTS year are now ready and may be ordered from the National CTS Office. The Bible Tic Tac Toe Kit contains six hundred question and answer cards, two booklets containing the same questions and answers as the cards, and the booklet, *Genesis and Archaeology*. The Bible Bowl Kit is the same except the booklet, *Is the Bible the Word of God?* is included instead of *Genesis and Archaeology*.

The new study booklet for Sword Drill is ready. A list of declamation speeches is available. Essay themes for 1969 will be sent upon request. Each

church is urged to provide an opportunity for its young people to participate in all of the competitive activities.

PRINTING SERVICE

At the end of October, 1967, the inter-office operation of the Sunday School and CTS departments became the full responsibility of CTS. The change was made in order to provide coordination and supervision of printing for the benefit of each department that wishes to utilize the service.

Additional equipment has been added to the printing operation by CTS thus increasing the total service. It is now possible to process a manuscript to a finished product within the walls of the National Office Building. Substantial savings in printing have been realized by CTS and other departments.

It should be noted that not all of the printing for the various departments is handled through the printing service. It is more economical on large volume items to use the services of commercial printers. It is low volume publications, letterheads, prayer cards, order blanks, and similar items that a quality service is provided at a distinct savings. Only two of the CTS publications are of sufficient volume to merit printing commercially, thus the importance of the printing service to CTS is magnified.

SPECIAL SERVICES

The National Church Training Service provides many services to the denomination and to local CTS groups. New churches are given their first quarter's literature free up to twenty-five dollars, free samples are sent upon request to all churches interested in organizing a CTS, and other free samples are given under various circumstances. Workshops and informational meetings are held by members of the CTS staff without specific charge, however, participating church or group usually shares in meeting a portion of the expenses. Other services include assisting district and state associations in the general promotion of CTS, attending associational meetings, and the planning and preparation of the National Youth Conference.

Services such as those listed above are in part made possible through the regular support of the National CTS Department by the local Church Training Service. The needs continue to grow as our total ministry is expanded. We suggest that your CTS share in this broad ministry by receiving an offering once each month for the National work.

FOR THE GENERAL DIRECTOR

A new lapel pin has been manufactured for general CTS directors only. This attractive pin is made in the design of the scalloped CTS emblem. It is beautifully blue and gold in color. This pin is available only to the general director and each purchase will be registered. The price is \$2.50 each.

The provision of the special CTS lapel pin is one of the many things planned for the purpose of giving proper recognition to the office of the local CTS director. It would be very proper for a church to order this pin for their director and present it at a special time.

MAILING LIST

A request for the names and addresses of the general director and all other CTS leaders has been made by the National CTS Office. Form sheets on which to write the necessary information has been sent to each church having a CTS.

The purpose of developing a mailing list of CTS leaders is to make possible more direct communication between local workers and the National CTS Office.

You are urged to send the information in as soon as possible if you have not already done so.

PROJECTS FOR CTS

Are you looking for a special project for your CTS group that would be directly related to the Church Training Service program? There are many needs which you are welcomed to share in as a group. The National CTS Office will be glad to make available to you a list of possible projects. If a project is chose, suggestions and ideas for accomplishing the task will be available.

AUDITOR'S STATEMENT

I have examined the balance sheet of the Board of Church Training Service of the National Association of Free will Baptists as of December 31, 1967, and the related statement of income and fund balance for the year then ended. My examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as I considered necessary in the circumstances.

During the year the Board acquired the assets and assumed the liabilities of Teach and Train Publications, an organization which, prior to the acquisition, had been operated as a separate entity. I was unable to determine the results of operations of Teach and Train Publications for the partial year prior to the acquisition because inventories and accounts payable were not determined.

In my opinion, the accompanying balance sheet and statement of income and fund balance present fairly the financial position of the Board of Church Training Service of the National Association of Free Will Baptists at December 31, 1967, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, except for the undetermined results of operations of Teach and Train Publications prior to its merger with the Board of Church Training Service, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

SUNDAY SCHOOL DEPARTMENT REPORT

I. Review:

It is a sign of aging when one spends a great deal of time reflecting over the past years. I must confess that I find myself doing this more often than in times past.

I prepared a brief history of the Sunday school movement for the dedication service of the new operations building. This history revealed some dark days in the history of the Sunday school movement. There were those who trumpeted the cause of the Sabbath schools (as they were called in those early days), but most of the trumpeting fell on deaf ears.

In those early days a Sunday school paper called the "Myrtle" was published. Its highest peak of circulation reached 10,000 when denominational membership was listed as 48,974. This paper and all other assets of the previous century's Sunday School Board disappeared in the merger of 1911.

More than 100 years later a different situation is revealed about the Sunday school movement in our denomination. Little was done until the Sunday School Board opened an office and put a full time Promotional Secretary on the field in 1954. The real thrust coincided with the beginning of our present literature ministry which began in 1962. Today, I believe I can honestly say that there is a renewal of interest in the Sunday school ministry of our denomination. A sizable portion of this interest can be credited to the promotional effort of this department.

I believe this interest is reflected in the growth of our literature ministry. Sales of our literature in 1967 increased by \$32,035.88 over the previous year. A look at the graph elsewhere in this report shows how our growth has continued.

Further interest is reflected in the growth of our Teacher Training ministry. Sales in this area increased from \$6964.36 to \$12,053.65. This is an increase of \$5089.29. Certificates issued totaled 991. This is in contrast to the 886 that were issued last year (1966).

Let me call your attention to our annual audit.

You will notice that there is a small deficit. However, when the expenditures for our new operations building are deducted you will arrive at profit figures of approximately \$16,000.00. This is not as great as in 1966 although we had an increase in sales in 1967. Costs have risen in 1967 and continue to rise in 1968. Labor, printing, and postage costs pushed upwards and ate into our net profit.

Increased sales means the addition of more employees. Additional employees means additional equipment. It seems we never have enough typewriters or adding machines although we still have every one we have purchased since 1962. We still have an old R. C. Allen that was here when I came that I have refused to part company with. Perhaps we can donate it to the Historical Commission.

When we started our literature business six years ago, we shipped from a revamped carriage house. We built a pulling table by remodeling an old desk. We packed and wrapped orders on old make-shift benches. Storage shelves were built out of old lumber.

When we moved to 1134 Murfreesboro Road working conditions improved some. It was not long until we were overcrowded once more. Four men wrapped packages at two tables.

Now we have our own operations building. Wooden shelves have been replaced with metal bins. We have four new wrapping tables with room to add more as needed. Each wrapper now has his own work area. Efficiency has increased tremendously. Praise the Lord for being so good to us.

This past year has been a busy one. The erection of our operations building occupied a great deal of my time. Work on the building was slow getting started but progressed nicely once it was begun. Curriculum has also taken my time. It will consume a great deal more time before it is finished.

1967 was also another busy year of travel. I visited many State Associations and conducted several Institutes. I also filled several speaking engagements. It was a thrilling year of ministry for our Lord. I was privileged to serve as Chairman of the Denominational Sunday School Secretaries Commission. This body brings together some thirty-five Denominational Sunday School Secretaries for fellowship and sharing of ideas. I also served on the Board of Directors of the National Sunday School Association. Our denomination is not a member of the National Sunday School Association but we have received some benefit from this organization through the past years.

II. Preview:

1969 will find us beginning our new curriculum. We will begin a seven-year permanent cycle that will cover the Scriptures in a Bible survey type of study. We will begin at Genesis and go through the Word book by book. This permanent cycle will be used by all ages from Junior High through the Adult level. In order to meet the need of the teacher the *Free Will Baptist Teacher* will be upgraded and contain almost 40% more materials. The teacher should have ample material to cover the lesson period.

I must say that I tackled the responsibility of curriculum with fear and trembling. However, the more I have worked on this project the more convinced I became that we are going in the right direction. I have learned that curriculum development will consume many man hours.

I hope you will note and approve our 1969 budget.

There are other areas of service that I hope we can render in the not too distant future. We must prepare our own Nursery materials (we currently used David C. Cook's). We must also look to the production of our own Vacation Bible School materials. Another growing need is for some materials to assist Christian Day Schools.

III. OVERVIEW

A man can get some idea of the height of a mountain by standing at the foot and looking up. He can get a better idea of the depth of the valley by climbing the mountain and looking down. When I pause to survey the work that God has wrought in these past years I am amazed.

We started six years ago with nothing. Some of our present Sunday School Board members will pre-date 1962 when the office reopened. Reverend John West, our beloved Chairman, can recall some lean years as he has been a member of this Board since 1947. I sat at his feet in a Sunday School Institute in 1949. I came on the Sunday School Board myself in 1959.

As we climb the mountain let us pause and look down every now and then. When we do we can thank God for many things. I can thank Him for fitting together all of the little pieces in the development of our curriculum and literature program. God has always been right there with the right telephone call or business contact whenever necessary. I could not begin to relate the many wonders He has worked.

I can thank God for the finest staff of workers He has helped to assemble. Four years ago He brought Brother Harrison to us. In our four years of laboring together Brother Harrison and I have not had one note of disagreement. Over a

year ago the Lord brought Mrs. Lora Shutes to us. What a precious person she is! What an asset to the Department she is! One by one the Lord has brought the others. Our turnover of employees has been heavy but the Lord always seems to have someone else to step into the vacancy.

I can thank the Lord for our Sunday School Board. I have always been impressed by the psychology of a Board meeting. It is amazing to me that seven men can come from so many areas and backgrounds and meet together as one mind. A Sunday School Board is transitional. Men come and go from this Board. The transition has always been smooth and the work continues. Our Board has always met in harmony. Everyone has not always agreed on everything but where there has been disagreement it has been in the spirit of brotherly love.

For a final statement I would like to quote from a real Sunday school authority in our denomination who says, "Sunday School Is A Big Business."

The Communists say, "There is no God." The Bible says, "The fool hath said in his heart, There is no God" (Psalm 14:1). We know, "In the beginning, God." And "I know in whom I have believed, and am persuaded that he is able to keep that which I have committed unto Him against that day" (II Timothy 1:12b). We are not blind to prevailing world conditions. The urgency of the hour enhances our ministry. While the sinister forces of the adversary outnumber us, we like "Gideon's 300" must stand together, proclaim in unison God's message and march obediently against the enemy. Our theme, "Give Them At Least One Chance," could well be our prelude for the returning of our Lord.

I am convinced that God has honored the work of Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions. He has given us a staff of dedicated missionaries whose primary concern is winning the lost. They are qualified in many areas of Christian service, which though being a small mission, we are involved in using a variety of means for making Christ known.

This ministry of world evangelism and establishing congregations of believers wherever converts are won is God's business. He has commanded Free Will Baptist congregations to herald forth the message of redemption to all men. And along with every command is the fully commensurate promise of fulfillment. As Free Will Baptist churches accept their share of "great commission" responsibility, and as God calls forth from these churches young men and women who are first approved by God and then by God's people, and as concerned men and women pray and give to send these approved ones to the regions beyond, the great promise of the Lord to build His church reaches new proportions of fulfillment.

Together, the board, home staff and missionary look to the Lord for His provision of funds necessary to meet annual budgets. It is a relationship of faith in which each member must have an abiding trust in the Lord, or corporate spiritual power is affected. With such abiding faith, each member of the missionary team obligates himself to continual, daily, fervent prayer that God will glorify Himself as material and spiritual needs are faithfully met.

It is in this perspective that Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions is a *faith mission*. All budget appropriations are totally dependent on God's provision through His people. And as budgets are met by God's grace and power, the missionary family must forever give God — and Him alone — the praise for His marvelous provision.

The success of Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions is directly related to the willingness of Free Will Baptist churches to accept their biblical responsibility in world missions. The foreign missions department is nothing more than an extension of local church witness. It is a channeling agency for missionary fire kindled by concerned hearts at the grassroots level. Mr. Van Kluyve, director of deputational ministries, has seen an increasing interest in scheduling local and area missionary conferences.

Free Will Baptist churches administrate their foreign ministry through elected representatives who are chartered with the responsibility of effectively overseeing all aspects of the denomination's foreign missionary operation in the leadership of the Holy Spirit and to the satisfaction of supporting congregations at home.

As duly elected representatives of Free Will Baptist churches throughout the country, the board of foreign missions assumes responsibility for fulfilling the desires of the supporting constituency for strategic use of Free Will Baptist

missionary personnel and efficient and effective distribution of missionary funds. The board is always open to the direct counsel of the supporting body because it is through communication from concerned pastors and laymen that the board clearly understands the wishes of those whom they represent.

It is the board's responsibility as representatives of churches at home to find the Lord's will in selection of those who will be sent forth. Once sent forth, each missionary's ministry is continually reviewed by the board to assure the effective accomplishment of the denomination's foreign missionary objectives. All policies affecting the overseas ministry of the denomination are determined by the board.

The board represents the supporting constituency in preparing annual budgets through careful analysis of essential needs and strategic allocation of funds. This is a sacred responsibility. Every dollar given to missions is considered a gift to the Lord Jesus Christ. And diligence is exerted in determining to the best of men's abilities the direction of the Holy Spirit in every appropriation.

The rapidly changing conditions of our world makes our problems more complex. We are constantly aware of the hand of the Lord upon the details of our ministry. It is a wonderful thing to see the power of the Gospel at work in our various ministries. From the Ivory Coast come reports of souls won in village evangelism; from France and Japan souls won in Bible study groups; from India converts through the ministry of national pastors and evangelists; from Panama, Uruguay and Brazil young men and women answering God's call to proclaim the message. Our two missionaries in Ecuador will survey an area in late August as a possibility of establishing a Free Will Baptist work in that country. Though greatly restricted, our Association of Free Will Baptist churches in Cuba continue their ministry. Mr. Jerry Ballard, director of communications, keeps our constituency informed of missionary activities through *Heartbeat* (now printing 45,800), filmstrips and other promotional materials.

Our "hold the line" policy has been lifted regarding appointing of new missionaries. The appointments will be highly selective and priority give to areas of need where appointed personnel can meet these needs.

The revision of our handbook affecting policy changes is being given further study. We hope to publish and release the new handbook early next year.

We thank you for every gift large or small. Our increase in receipts in 1967 was \$82,976 more than received in 1966. An enlarging missionary program and rising cost will necessitate consistent increases. Several missionary deficits have been eliminated but operational and audio-visual accounts need greater support. The fact sheet in this report will provide pertinent financial information.

A recent emphasis has been given to our "Project 5000." Please come by our booth and make your commitment. Our emphasis for foreign missions month, April 1969, will be "Day of Prayer for Missions," April 6; "Personal Commitment," April 13; "Gifts for Missions," — Missions Call-A-Thon, April 20. Your cooperation in these special days can greatly strengthen our Free Will Baptist ministries around the world.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

This has been an eventful year of transition. The change necessitated a period of orientation and personal readjustment after becoming Executive Secretary August 28th. It has not been a picnic, but this joyful experience has been gratifying and rewarding. Amid the manifold activities involved in fulfilling the responsibilities of the office, I have seen the Lord at work as never before. For God's grace, added strength and many answers to prayer, I give praise. Surveying the progress of this past ten months, I can say with the Psalmist, "The Lord hath done great things for us; whereof we are glad."

In assuming present duties, I have gained a greater insight into the pressures and problems confronting each department. I recognize more fully the tremendous obligations placed upon each director. Too often it is easier to criticize these devoted men rather than pray for them as they carry a heavy work load. Our department administrators are worthy of our confidence and loyal support. It has been a privilege to work with these brethren. Their cooperative spirit, mutual understanding and counsel have been most helpful. On several occasions the department directors have met for prayer, fellowship and discussion of our work. A more effective correlation of our various departments has been attained. Greater solidarity has been brought about. The unity manifested is most encouraging. It is evident that we can be united in purpose without having unanimity of opinions.

A very fine staff in the Executive Office has performed an admirable job. I want to especially express appreciation to Mr. Darrell Fulton for seven years of commendable service to the department. He has resigned as manager of Randall Bookstore to become Administrative Assistant to Dr. Billy Melvin.

I would like also to acknowledge the valuable help of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Critcher. After Mr. Critcher's transfer to the Foreign Missions Office last summer, he very graciously consented to assist with the publication of CONTACT during evening hours and weekends. He has also served as the coordinator for this National Association. In January, Mrs. June Critcher became Assistant Editor of CONTACT. The favorable comments and increased response to our National magazine can be ascribed in a large measure to her ingenuity. In recognizing the efficient efforts of this dedicated couple, I feel we sometimes overlook the faithful labors of the several scores of secretaries, bookkeepers, teachers and workers who serve behind the scene, but nevertheless fill an important role in the effective operation of each department.

The question is often asked, "What does the Executive Secretary do?" Some of the varied duties include answering correspondence, supervising the National Office, serving as Editor of CONTACT, planning for several successive National Associations, coordinating the National ministries, greeting the many visitors who pass through the National Office and attending to the numerous office details. These various phases of the work are very time consuming. In addition to the multiplicity of administrative affairs, about 40 percent of my time has been spent away from the office. Except for attending the National Association of Evangelicals and two special seminars, I have spent this time promoting and representing the National Association in state and district meetings, area itineraries, revivals and pastors conferences.

Continued communication with our people at the grass roots is very essential. Area conferences involving laymen, pastors and representatives from each National department is planned. These meetings will be inspirational and instructive. It is hoped that greater interest and support for our overall work can be stimulated. A better understanding of how each department functions and the inter-relationship of all departments will help maintain a balanced emphasis. When any phase of work is lagging, we should all feel the need to assist and strengthen that area of need.

Attention is called to several specific ministries of the Executive Office:

RANDALL BOOKSTORE had another very profitable year, with gross sales of \$71,506.58. You will notice in the financial report that fiscal stability has been achieved while increasing the inventory assets. Several ways of expanding this Christian literature ministry are being considered.

CONTACT now goes to approximately 7,000 homes. Subscriptions have increased several hundred this past year without a concerted promotional effort. A full-scale subscription campaign will be launched in October. To get maximum denominational saturation, the missions mailing list will be utilized. We ask your cooperation in this effort to get more people receiving CONTACT, either by the Church Family Plan or by an individual subscription. Detailed information for increasing the number of subscribers will be given in future issues.

COOPERATION GIFTS reached a record total of \$101,886.46 in 1967. This 15 percent increase over 1966 is an encouraging sign. We appreciate those who have shared by giving to the overall work. States and churches who have not adopted a systematic plan to share in the total National ministries ought to consider some effective way to do so. We all believe every member should give to the local churches as he is able. Is it not reasonable to expect every church to give proportionately and regularly to our state and national work?

The present plan for allocating cooperative gifts appears to be working satisfactory. A continued increase in cooperative giving is reflected in the first six months of this year. Also direct giving has increased to the Executive Department. A consistent income eliminates financial instability that has long plagued the office. The past indebtedness has now been reduced to \$7,000.00.

THE LAND FUND deficit of \$15,000.00 is the balance owed on the property purchased for future expansion. Payments are shared by all departments. If we could raise this amount to retire the indebtedness, it would relieve the strain on budgets. Rising interest costs could also be saved. I recommend we attempt once more an effort to eliminate this obligation.

EXECUTIVE CHURCH BONDS is a separate incorporation of the Executive Department. This report will be given by the director.

In conclusion, I would like to share several concerns out of my heart. First, our denominational giving is far from adequate. Current needs are not being met without even considering plans for future growth. In an era of unparalleled economic growth, this is very disconcerting. The urgency for stressing our stewardship obligation is evident. A revival in this area of Christian responsibility would alleviate the financial pressures placed upon those departments who are not meeting their budgets. It is my prayer that the "Pastor's Stewardship Seminar" at this annual meeting will help to bring a renewed conscientiousness of our spiritual obligation to become more faithful stewards.

Secondly, it is my earnest desire that we discern God's will for our denomination in this crisis hour of history. If we are to fulfill our mission as Free Will Baptists, we must have a proper perspective of our role in these perilous times. A revolutionary age demands a dynamic church, giving forth an effective witness. Our fundamental, evangelistic heritage compels us to come out of the grandstands and actively engage in the conflict on the playing field where the impact of our testimony can be felt. The preservation of our faith does not mean a withdrawal from involvement in a secular world. Our best defense is a good offense. The challenge we face is communicating and relating our message to man's need. While charting our proper course, we must keep in mind that we are not an island unto ourselves. Cooperation with other evangelical groups can be maintained without getting on the ecumenical bandwagon.

Last of all, I appeal to our National Association to display a greater spirit of unity. Jesus teaches us, "a house divided against itself cannot stand." Our fellowship is based upon a flexible spirit and a tolerant attitude. There is room for diversity without division. Differences can be discussed without disputation. We stand on the threshold of a great opportunity of advancement. Through

God's continued blessings we can expect greater accomplishments. We must beware lest we allow dissension to thwart the work of the Holy Spirit through us.

Your understanding and prayers are needed to sustain me in my sincere effort to serve you and our Lord.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S NATIONAL AUXILIARY CONVENTION

The 33rd. annual meeting of the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention met on July 16, 1968. Total registration was 946 with 17 states, 5 districts and 4 local auxiliaries sending in Recording Secretary Reports. We received 2 new state conventions, 1 new district convention and 2 new local auxiliaries this year.

The enrollment at the beginning of the convention year was 6,724 and the present enrollment is 7,038; an increase of 314 members.

There were 1,123 study courses conducted and 3,684 daily Bible readers reported.

During the year 606 special programs were conducted, 961 seasons of prayer and 1,799 participating in the Prayer Fellowship Hour.

The reports conclude that 918 souls were won to the LORD through efforts of the Personal Service Department.

Contact subscribers number 3,123; Heartbeat 3,571; and Mission-Grams 3,109.

The amount contributed through our churches and other channels that WNAC was \$63,873.18; total financial receipts in General Fund amounted to \$82,537.60; and total disbursements for operating expense were \$29,615.58. Gifts and supplies to stock the Missionary Provision Closet valued approximately \$8,000.00
