# PROCEEDINGS

## MONDAY EVENING, JULY 12, 1971

The thirty-fifth annual convention of the National Association of Free Will Baptists was held in the Municipal Auditorium, Nashville, Tennessee, July 12-15, 1971. "O Lord Revive Thy Work" was the theme.

The opening service on Monday evening began with the congregation reading in unison the theme verse, Habakkuk 3:2. Mr. David Randlett, the music director for the convention, directed the convention hymn, "A Mighty Revival" and congregational singing. Rev. Delbert Akin presided for this service.

Waldo Young, clerk, called the convention into official session, and introduced the moderator, Dr. Robert E. Picirilli.

The report of the Committee on Committees was given as follows:

Nominating Committee; Jack Paramore, Bill Jones, Lynn Wood, Galen Dunbar, and Roy Rikard; Resolutions Committee; Joe Ange, Harry Beatty, Kenneth Doggett, Don Pegram, and Lonnie Palmer; Placement Committee; Bob King, Robert Sharry, Paul Reid, Ralph Butler, and Allen Moore.

Mr. John Bragg, businessman and legislator from Tennessee, gave the welcome address.

The get-acquainted time was led by David Randlett, recognizing each state and each foreign country represented.

Whereas the first meeting of the National Association of Free Will Baptists was held in Nashville, and whereas this 35th convention was also in Nashville, those who were a part of the organizational meeting were recognized and presented a rose for the occasion. They were Mrs. Agnes Frazier, Mrs. James Miller, S. T. Shutes, M. L. Hollis, E. E. Morris, Ralph Staten, and J. L. Welch.

The convention offering was received as Mrs. Jane Randlett sang.

Robert Picirilli, the moderator, led in special prayer for Fred Warner who was to be the speaker for this service, but was hospitalized.

Delbert Akin introduced the speaker, Van Dale Hudson, who brought the message on "The Possibility of Revival," using Ezekiel 37:1-3, as his text.

Following announcements, the closing prayer was given by J. D. O'Donnell, assistant moderator.

## TUESDAY EVENING, JULY 13, 1971

The Tuesday evening service opened with the unisonous reading of Psalm 85:4, 6, and the congregation was led in prayer by Jerry Dudley. Gene Rogers presided at the service.

The convention hymn, "A Mighty Revival," opened the singing. Two other hymns were sung by the congregation. The national youth choir, composed of volunteer teens, sang.

Sam Johnson presented awards to the winners of the youth competitive activities.

The congregation sang "Spirit of the Living God."

The moderator urged special prayer for two who had to leave because of death messages, and for three who were present with real physical needs. He then led in this prayer.

An offering was received to go toward retiring the indebtedness for the National Office Land Fund.

Blaine Hughes sang a medley of songs.

Herman Hersey was introduced to bring the message on "Product of Revival." He read from 2 Chronicles 29.

The service was closed with prayer.

### WEDNESDAY MORNING, JULY 14, 1971

An early morning prayer service was conducted in the auditorium by Bobby Jackson.

The first business session of the convention was opened with the congregation singing, "He Keeps Me Singing." Jack Forlines, a layman from Garner, N.C., brought the morning devotion from Proverbs 29:1-27.

Robert Picirilli gave the moderator's message.

The report of the credentials committee was read. A motion carried to adopt the report.

A partial report of the nominating committee was read by Jack Paramore.

A motion carried to seat the delegates from Texas. This state was left out of the credentials committee report by oversight.

Samuel Johnson gave the report of the Church Training Service Department. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget. Charles Harris was elected as the seven-year member of the Church Training Service Board.

J. Reford Wilson gave the report of the Foreign Missions Department, assisted by Lonnie Palmer from Africa, Bobby Poole from Brazil, Fred Hersey from Japan, and Bill Fulcher from Uruguay. A motion carried to accept the report. Eugene Waddell was elected as the seven-year member of the Foreign Missions Board.

A motion carried to seat Mexico, which was left out of the Credentials Committee report by oversight.

The report of Free Will Baptist Bible College was given by L. C. Johnson, president. A motion carried to accept the report.

The report of the Home Missions and Church Extension Board was given by Homer Willis, director. He was assisted by Robert Francis, E. B. Ledlow, Gerald Mangham, and Roy Thomas. A motion carried to accept the report. Gordon Sebastian was elected as the seven-year member of the Home Missions and Church Extension Board. Robert Shockey was elected to the term expiring in 1975, and Don Pegram was elected to the term expiring in 1976.

The report of the Sunday School Department was given by Roger Reeds, Director. N. R. Smith presented the Sunday School Superintendent of the year award to Ralph Coffman of the West Tulsa Free Will Baptist Church, Tulsa, Oklahoma. J. B. Smith of South Carolina was given the award as pastor of the year in the Teacher Training Department. A special recommendation regarding the necessity of relocating the Sunday School Department was given as follows:

The Sunday School Department has had an exceptional growth over the past nine years. This growth has led them from a small carriage house to a larger area that was shared with other Departments at the National Office Building to the erection of its own 10,000 square foot Operations Building that was built and occupied in 1967. Now continued growth necessitates still an additional step to meet the building space needs of the Department.

To meet the immediate and future needs the Sunday School Board recommends that the National Association approve the purchase of six acres of land and a 40,000 square foot office and warehouse complex on Ezell Pike and Bush Road in Nashville, Tennessee. The purchase price is to be negotiated with the seller.

Upon approval of this recommendation the Sunday School Department will proceed to negotiate the purchase of this property and then vacate most of its present facilities at the National Office Building. This action will provide available space to alleviate some of the crowded conditions of the other Departments. This action has been discussed with and meets with the approval of all other Departments who occupy space at 1134 Murfreesboro Road.

A motion carried to postpone action on the special recommendation until the afternoon session. Homer Young was elected as the 7-year member of the Sunday School Board.

A motion carried that a rising vote of commendation be given John West in appreciation of his 25 years of faithful service on the Sunday School Board, and that the clerk of the association write an appropriate letter to him.

### WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

The Wednesday afternoon session opened with the congregation singing "The Solid Rock." The devotion was brought by Allen W. Baxley, a layman from Florence, South Carolina.

The tabled item from the Sunday School Board was brought from the table and adopted.

The report of the Executive Department was given by Rufus Coffey. A motion and second was made to adopt the report. A motion was made to amend by substituting in place of a committee to be appointed to study our relationship with N.A.E., that it be a committee of those Free Will Baptist people who are currently serving on various committees or commissions of N.A.E. A motion was made to amend the amendment by setting in three of the thirteen Free Will Baptist members of the various committees and/or commissions. The amendment to the amendment lost. A motion was made to amend the amendment that the first seven members of the committee be Rufus Coffey, Joe Hurst, Jerry Rhoades, Sam Johnson, Homer Willis, Jerry Ballard, and J. D. O'Donnell, plus six members to be appointed. The amendment to the amendment carried. The amendment as amended carried. The original motion as amended carried. A motion carried that the Executive Department budget be adopted.

The report of Executive Church Bonds, Inc. was given by Francis Boyle, Director. A motion carried to adopt the report.

Herman Hersey gave the report of the Department of Retirement and Insurance. A motion carried to adopt the report. Harold Critcher was elected as seven-year member to the Board of Retirement and Insurance.

The report of the Layman's Board was given by Kimble Crosley. A motion carried to accept the report as recommended by the General Board. Ivan Van Winkle was elected as the seven-year member of the Layman's Board.

Herbert Peppers was elected as the seven-year member of the National Offices Building trustee.

The General Board report was given by Waldo Young. Items 1, 2, and 5 were adopted. Items 3 and 4 were tabled because a change in the By-laws would be

required.

The moderator read the report of the Budget Committee. A motion carried to adopt the report.

A partial report of the nominating committee was given, nominating General Board members of those states where terms expired or vacancies appeared. (See this board listed on page two.)

Van Dale Hudson was elected to the Theological Liberalism Study Commission.

E. E. Morris was elected to the Historical Commission.

A motion was made and seconded that in the future, speakers at the National Convention consist of two men with college degrees, and two without college education, and that all of them be Free Will Baptists. A motion was made to strike out the reference to education, leaving only that they be Free Will Baptists. This amendment carried.

A motion was made to postpone the motion indefinitely. This motion lost.

A substitute motion was made that all agencies and auxiliaries selecting speakers take special care to pay close attention to the doctrinal position of speakers chosen at all events of the National Convention, and that they be in close accord with our doctrinal position. A motion was made and seconded that the original motion be amended that all speakers at all events of the National Convention be Free Will Baptists. The previous question was moved and carried on all questions before the house.

The amendment to the original question lost. The substitute motion lost. The original motion lost.

The moderator closed the session with prayer.

### WEDNESDAY EVENING, JULY 14, 1971

The Wednesday evening Missionary service opened with the congregation reading in unison Acts 1:8. Eugene Waddell, who presided over the service, led in the opening prayer.

Mr. Randlett led the opening hymns, "A Mighty Revival," and "The Mission Fields are Calling." The Free Will Baptist Bible College Choir sang.

Gordon Sebastian, chairman of the Home Missions Board, introduced the following Home Mission families; the Powells and the Wennings from the Virgin Islands, the Billows from Mexico, the Francis family from Minnesota, the Hales from California, the Van Winkles from Tennessee, the Walkers from Alabama, the Duncans from Oklahoma, the Dunns from Idaho, Charles Francen from Puerto Rico, Pam Orr and Sandra Brazen, the Luther Sanders and the Olsens from Hawaii, the Jones family from Tennessee, and Gerald Mangham, Army Chaplain.

Eugene Waddell introduced the following Foreign Missions families; the Calverys and the Hersheys from Japan, The Mileys, Eddie Payne, and the Palmers from Africa, the Wilkinsons, the Hughes, the Aycocks, the Pooles, and the Sturgills from Brazil, the Tom Willey Jr. family and Mabel (Mom) Willey from Panama, the Fulchers from Uruguay going to Panama, and Joe Haas, Jr. and the Sextons from France.

The congregation sang "Send a Great Revival."

The Gleaners Trio from FWBBC sang a special number.

Larry Powell, missionary to the Virgin Islands, was introduced to bring the message on "The Power of Revival," using Acts 1:8 as the text.

At the close of the sermon Raymond Riggs extended the invitation and missionary challenge. More than 200 people responded to the invitation.

John Edwards was in charge of receiving the missionary offering. A record offering of \$5,490.00 was received.

After the announcements, the moderator prayed the benediction.

#### THURSDAY MORNING, JULY 15, 1971

The Thursday morning session opened with the congregation singing "He Keeps Me Singing," Kenneth Cade from Indiania brought the devotion from 2 Cor. 9:6-12 and led the congregation in prayer.

The report of the WNAC was given by Zetta Rose. A motion carried to receive the report as information.

An oral report of the Historical Commission was given by DeArthur Yandell. An appeal was made for any historical items that they might be preserved in a special place at Free Will Baptist Bible College. A motion carried to adopt the report.

The report of the Commission on Theological Liberalism was given by J. D. O'Donnell. A motion carried to adopt the report.

The report of the National Association of Evangelicals was given by Billy Melvin. A motion carried to receive the report as information.

The report of the National Youth Conference was given by Eugene Hales. A motion carried to receive the report.

A motion carried to take from the table the items from the General Board report.

Item No. 3, of the General Board report was discussed. A motion carried to adopt this recommendation. Item No. 4, of the General Board report was discussed. A motion carried to adopt this item.

The moderator inquired of the delegates concerning the procedure required to amend the "Faith" section of the *Treatise*. In an almost unanimous decision it was determined that this section should be amended only by a two-thirds majority vote of the association.

A motion carried that the Executive Committee study the matter of procedures for changing the "Faith" section of the *Treatise*, and report to this body a recommendation of defined procedure.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was given by Lonnie Palmer. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt it item by item. All items, 1 through 7, carried.

A motion carried that in the future, resolutions be prepared and printed for distribution no later than Wednesday evening.

The following resolution was presented from the floor: "Whereas, abortion is a moral issue and we as Free Will Baptists are a part of this society; therefore, be it resolved that our denomination go on record as being opposed to abortion, with the one exception being when, according to her physician, the mother's life would probably be lost." A motion to amend by striking the exception clause was lost. A motion carried that the original resolution be amended by deletion to correct terminology. The original motion carried as amended.

A motion was made to instruct the Commission on Theological Liberalism to keep a watchful eye on all organizations with which our denomination may be affiliated. A motion carried to postpone this until after the worship service.

## THURSDAY MORNING WORSHIP SERVICE

Jakie Creech presided at the morning worship service. The congregation read 2 Chronicles 7:14 in unison. Waldo Young led in the opening prayer.

The congregation sang "A Mighty Revival," "His Way With Thee," and "I Know Whom I Have Believed."

Malcolm Fry sang "I Cannot Fail the Lord."

Richard Cordell was introduced to bring the message on "The Prescription for Revival."

The worship service being completed, the postponed motion was brought from the table. The previous question was moved and carried. The motion lost.

The final report of the nominating committee was given by Jack Paramore.

Jerry Dudley was elected assistant clerk.

Waldo Young was elected clerk.

J. D. O'Donnell was elected assistant moderator.

J. D. O'Donnell was elected moderator, thus leaving a vacancy in the assistant moderator position.

Bobby Jackson was elected assistant moderator.

Rufus Coffey was elected Executive Secretary.

The Placement Committee report, recommending that the 1974 session of the National Association be held in Wichita, Kansas, was adopted.

The moderator appointed the remaining six members of the committee to study the denomination's relationship with N.A.E. Malcolm Fry, Lonnie Palmer, Randy Cox, Clarence Phillips, Norwood Gibson, and Dale Burden were appointed.

The moderator expressed for the association our deep appreciation to the people of Tennessee for their splendid facilities and provisions for this session.

A motion carried that in the future an offering be received at each service of the national convention.

A standing vote of thanks to Robert Picirilli was given for six years of faithful service as moderator.

A motion carried to adjourn.

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## REPORT OF THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

We, the Credentials Committee, have examined the letters from the various state associations, district associations, and local churches, and we find the letters in order as follows;

1. From the following state associations having the right to five (5) delegates each: Alabama, Arkansas, California, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Maryland, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, New Mexico, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, and West Virginia.
2. From the following district associations having the right to three (3) delegates each: Arizona, Mexico, Northeastern, Northwest, Idaho.
3. From the following local churches reporting directly to this body having the right to one (1) delegate each: Waipahu, Hawaii; Riverview Church, Bettendorf, Iowa; First Church, Denver, Colorado; First Church, St. Croix, Virgin Islands.
4. This committee recommends that the First Free Will Baptist Church of St. Paul, Minnesota, having been duly organized, be received as a local church representing directly to this National Association.
5. We recommend that the delegates from these bodies be seated. We further recommend that all other delegates, properly registered from local churches comprising the above associations, be seated also.

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## THE GENERAL BOARD REPORT

The General Board of the National Association met July 12, and as a result of this meeting we offer the following report:

1. We have heard the reports of the CTS Department, the Executive Department, the Executive Church Bonds, the Foreign Missions Department, Home Missions and Church Extension Department, Free Will Baptist Bible College, and the Retirement and Insurance Board, and recommend them, along with their budgets, for your hearing and adoption as each is presented.
2. We heard the report of the Layman's Board. The General Board recommends that the recommendation of the Layman's Board which deals with dissolving this board, be rejected, and that we encourage them to promote the original aims of this board and to present a budget to the association in session. We

- recommend their financial report to the association.
3. We recommend that the by-laws be ammended so as to eliminate the placement committee of the annual convention with the provision that the Executive Committee serve the same function in the future.
  4. We recommend that the Treatise be ammended as follows: That the word "Sabbath" be changed to "Lord's Day" both in title and text in Chapter XIV, Page 32 and also in Item 15 of the Articles of Faith, page 44.
  5. We have completed our examination of a proposed booklet containing suggested ordination guidelines, and we recommend it's approval for publication by the Executive Department.
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### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

The onward march of time brings us to another milestone in the history of Free Will Baptists. As we meet here in Nashville, Tennessee, where the National Association of Free Will Baptists was organized in 1935, it is marvelous to see what God has wrought since then. The growth and development of our denomination is a thrilling story — one of vision, faith, sacrifice and labor. Above all, it is the story of God's blessings upon faithful men who have earnestly sought to do His will.

From a small, struggling beginning with no schools, no youth program, no national organization and no missionary outreach, a body of evangelical believers has been welded together by God. Numbering almost 200,000 in approximately 2,200 churches our fellowship now extends into 40 states. Cooperating together in more than 150 district associations and 22 state associations, the energies and resources of these churches are combined on the national level to carry out the Great Commission. Through the ministry of 74 foreign missionaries in ten countries, our world outreach extends to every continent of the world. Eight national departments function as service agencies to provide help, leadership, materials and direction for our churches. These national ministries work together to strengthen the believers and to help facilitate a more effective world-wide witness.

The purpose of the National Association, as stated in the Treatise, is to establish "a bond of union and fellowship — to preserve and maintain correspondence and coordination — to unify the work of the various bodies — and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the kingdom of God in cooperation with the various bodies." To God be the glory for enabling us to witness today the reality of these worthy objectives.

God has been pleased to honor the work of Free Will Baptists because of loyal adherence to the fundamentals of the faith, a Christ-centered educational program, a church-centered program of literature and training aids, a fervent, evangelistic spirit and a concern for world missions.

Having a vital part in the administration, guidance and expansion of the denomination is the Executive Office. From the very beginning when the first executive secretary worked and pushed hard to establish a college, the executive office has fulfilled a significant role in presenting and promoting those plans that



would improve and advance our denominational work for God.

Among the varied activities during the past year we have been involved in administering denominational affairs, promoting the total departmental ministries, representing individuals and churches in governmental matters relating to the Selective Service System and the Internal Revenue Service. The encroachment of the government in church affairs is becoming more and more evident. I foresee that present pressure tactics will lead to a continued erosion of past religious freedoms. We also represented the denomination at the annual meeting of the National Association of Evangelicals.

In addition to numerous administrative details, publishing CONTACT magazine and convention planning, approximately forty per cent of my time has been spent on the field in various phases of promotional and public relations work. Communications is a key to better understanding. Therefore, an effort has been made to relate the work of the National Association to pastors and other church leaders, to the various state and district organizations, to Free Will Baptist state papers and other news media. In order to keep in touch with the local church we have ministered in pastors' conferences, associational meetings, area itineraries and individual church services.

The COOPERATIVE PLAN continues to provide consistent, undergirding support to the various denominational agencies. While a large percentage of the cooperative gifts are being retained to finance district and state programs, there has been a measure of increased giving to the National Ministries. The inadequacy of the Cooperative Plan to meet the denominational budget necessitates repeated appeals for direct gifts to support the various agencies. The Executive Office especially needs more direct gifts to offset the imbalance of support. Churches not using the cooperative plan are reminded of the need for including this department in your budget.

The balance of payment on the land adjacent to the national office is \$3,000.00. This indebtedness is expected to be retired by February of next year. The amount still owed on the mortgage loan for the National Office Building is \$143,600.00. A concerted effort to pay off this remaining indebtedness would save the department approximately \$67,293.00 in interest over the next fourteen years.

The Free Will Baptist Church Directory is being updated. Your cooperation is needed in order to complete this project in the shortest time possible so that it will be current when it goes to press in September. This is also needed in order to file the annual Internal Revenue Service report. It is recommended that each district association include in its minutes all their member churches with the name and address of the clerk; the name and address and if possible the telephone number of the pastor. Do not forget to include the zip code!

New report forms will be prepared this year and a concerted effort will be made to orientate our people concerning the importance of keeping accurate records and reporting from the local church to the district, state and national levels.

CONTACT is available for a short time at a special two-year subscription rate of \$5.00. Reduced production costs and the elimination of annual billing expenses will make possible a savings of \$1.00 over the regular annual subscription price of \$3.00. Our present files have been double checked in recent months in order to insure the accuracy of our mailing list.

It is evident from the meager gains that a greater emphasis must be placed upon evangelism, discipleship and urban church-extension in the decade ahead if we are to move forward for Christ. I propose that greater priority be given to making disciples and preserving the fruits of evangelism. In order to give impetus to an evangelistic thrust within our denomination the following resolution is offered:

WHEREAS, the task of evangelism is foremost in the mission of the church and WHEREAS, the growth of the church largely depends on the evangelistic zeal of its members and

WHEREAS, the growing population of our nation increases the numbers to be converted and

WHEREAS, evangelism has historically characterized the emphasis of our Free Will Baptist churches and

WHEREAS, God has given us evangelists who are known for their Biblical preaching and soul winning compassion and

WHEREAS, there are evident signs of a revival spirit in many areas of our denomination and

WHEREAS, a renewed evangelistic emphasis is urgently needed to make a Christian impact upon the life of our nation,

Be it resolved that the Executive Office plan and direct a special emphasis on evangelism for the Free Will Baptist denomination during 1972.

Churches must be associated on a district level before becoming a member of the national body. I recommend that each district or state association take the initiative in contacting non-affiliated bodies "of like faith and practice" in order to encourage them to unite with us.

We notice with concern that many churches are losing their identity, and others are being overshadowed by a false ecumenical movement. Underground movements are also undermining the institutional church. I recommend that our churches join in observing a Free Will Baptist Heritage Week, January 16-23, 1972. It is proposed that either January 16th or 23rd be designated as "HONOR THE CHURCH!" day. Plans for paying tribute to the Lord of the Church and the cause of Free Will Baptists will be outlined in forthcoming issues of CONTACT.

The response to "Denominational Bible Day" last January was gratifying. To give further emphasis to the Word of God in our life and home during the coming year it is recommended that pastors and Sunday School teachers promote daily Bible reading among our people by encouraging every member to

join with evangelicals across America in a Bible reading program to "Read It Through in '72."

In order to better publicize our churches and make it easier to locate them, it is proposed that we promote a "Church Sign Campaign" to identify and give direction to our churches.

Because of changing conditions in the religious world today, and because of divided opinions concerning any ties with another religious organization that would speak for us, and because of an embarrassing failure to pay the required financial support, (which is a denominational contribution of not less than 5¢ per member, or a denominational gift and a recommended amount of ½ of one per cent from each local church budget), it is recommended that a committee be appointed to restudy our relationship with N.A.E. in the light of the services offered, the benefits derived, and our failure to support this organization financially other than by a token gift. This committee, next year, will make recommendations concerning our future relationship with N.A.E., with various alternatives having been considered, such as:

1. continuing our membership and assuming the responsibility to raise the required financial support;
2. terminating denominational membership;
3. terminating only National Association membership, with the several denominational agencies left free to be affiliated with N.A.E. service affiliates;
4. some other possibility devised by the committee.

Any expenses incurred will be paid from the "Special Projects Fund."

"Seize the hour" is an old Latin proverb. It incites us to lay hold on the opportunities we have. Let us Free Will Baptists use all the tools, resources and time available to us to advance His kingdom. Let us be up and doing! The day is shortening — the night is at hand. Soon we will have the joy of seeing Him Who said, "I do always my Fathers' will." So let it be with us.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF RETIREMENT AND INSURANCE

Here is a summary of the ministry of your Board of Retirement and Insurance:

1. Investment Retirement Plan. There are 170 participants in the plan from 12 states. The growth is seen in the following figures:

January 1, 1969 . . . . .	\$ 680.18
January 1, 1970 . . . . .	11,760.24
July 1, 1970 . . . . .	40,682.15
January 1, 1971 . . . . .	54,579.80

2. Special Trust Funds. These are for the benefit of churches or denominational agencies that have money set aside for specific purposes. Funds for a building program is an example. This money will be invested in our denomination until needed and will provide a greater return than ordinary savings.

3. Plan for Purchasing Church Bonds. To date we have sold bonds totaling \$33,250 on a time payment plan.

4. Life Insurance. We are paying one-half the premiums on the Minister's Life and Casualty Union policies. However, more and more of the policy holders and their churches are assuming the responsibility of paying for the whole amount. Our new life insurance went into effect on January 1, 1971 providing \$10,000 for those 45 years and younger and \$5,000 for others to age 65.

5. Cancer Care Plan. This excellent plan provides protection for any family in our denomination.

6. Hospitalization Insurance We are working on this and hope to have something to offer soon. We have provided major medical for our foreign missionaries. We are also studying various types of accident and income protection coverage.

REPORT OF CHURCH TRAINING SERVICE

The Church Training Service Department made several changes in 1970. Major changes were the sales of the printing operation and Hillmont. Both of these operations were costing more than financial support would permit. Other services provided by the National CTS Department were curtailed in order to bring the total operation in line with the actual financial support received. As a result of the steps taken, the audit for 1970 reflects a significant gain over the 1969 financial report. The financial statement for the first six months of 1971 reveals that the department has advanced to the point that now programs and services may be upgraded and expanded.

The National CTS Department has employed Malcolm C. Fry to be its new director of research and curriculum development. He will serve as editor of publications and assist in leadership training programs. This will enable the General Director to give additional time to overall planning and supervision as well as more time for direct contact with district and state CTS leaders.

It is anticipated that the next major personnel position to be filled will be a director of youth activities. Such activities as Project Life and regional youth conferences will move ahead when this position is staffed. Such a move can be made when 200 additional churches are enlisted in regular monthly support. Efforts will be made to enlist the churches needed to provide the financial support necessary for this operation.

Growth of the National Youth Conference has been tremendous. Pre-registrations for the 1971 conference indicate that a new high in attendance will be set. An outstanding program is planned and includes such well known speakers as David Wilkerson and Don Lonie. The National Youth Conference has grown significantly in recent years and has been an important factor in making our annual National Association meeting a family affair.

Heading the list of outstanding young people at the National will be the 1971 Hillmont Engineers. The Engineers is a special leadership program for young men of high school age provided by the National CTS Department. The unique program has attracted some of our denomination's finest. The 1971 session is the fourth year of operation and a fifth year is already in the planning stage. Other leadership programs will be provided as demand and support are apparent.

Surveys made of local churches indicate the need for a vastly improved program of training. The Church Training Service Department is committed to a

vigorous program of Christian Education. Working under the leadership of the Holy Spirit CTS can meet the extensive needs which are evident. It is essential that the CTS staff, district and state CTS leaders, and the local CTS work together for maximum achievement.

The Board of Church Training Service is presently composed of the following members: Eugene Hales, Chairman; Milton Worthington, Vice-Chairman; Russel Spurgeon, Secretary; Ken Riggs; Charles Harris; Dale Burden; and Ted Wilkbanks. Members of the National CTS Office staff on a full time basis are Samuel Johnson, General Director; Fred Green, Supervisor of Production and Distribution; Edith Phenicie, Bookkeeper; Virginia Van Kluyve, Secretary. Malcolm Fry, Director of Curriculum and Research joins the staff on August 2.

Report of Commission on Theological Liberalism

The Commission in its annual session voted to present as its report the following:

I. Interpretation of Purpose

When this commission was originally appointed, its purpose was stated "to study the menaces of theological liberalism, secularism, and worldliness" and "to write informative articles in our publications to warn our people of these evils" (theological liberalism and other enroachments, infidelity to the Bible, the social gospel, non-Christian philosophies in schools). When the original temporary Committee made its report, it suggested that a permanent committee be elected and this was done. The permanent committee since that time has encouraged the publication of articles in various publications and had issued pamphlets dealing with certain questions.

As seen by the Commission its purpose is to continue the study of liberal trends in the denomination and Christianity in general.

Liberalism is sometimes used as distinguished from Neo-orthodoxy. As it is used by the Commission, it embraces Neo-orthodoxy and any other movement that is heretical to the fundamentals of the faith. Thus, the purpose is to keep

alert not only to Liberalism as already developed but also to any trends which might lead to liberalism.

II. Scope of Responsibility

With this purpose in mind the responsibility of the Commission to the denomination is as follows:

- 1. To be alert to trends heretical to the fundamentals of the faith.
- 2. To define and expose trends that may develop in our denomination. This is not an investigative commission with the purpose of accusing individuals. The Commission will strictly deal with issues.
- 3. To keep Free Will Baptists abreast of developments in Christianity in general which might be detrimental to our faith.

With this in mind the following methods will be used:

- 1. Produce articles which alert to and define liberalism to our people.
- 2. Encourage pastors through preaching and other means to educate our people in regard to liberal doctrines and trends.
- 3. Stay in touch with educational institutions and solicit materials from the faculty related to theological issues.
- 4. Appoint men to study and report on certain areas of immediate concern.

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REPORT OF BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS

Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions is the extended arm of evangelism of local Free Will Baptist churches across America. Our report reveals the blessings of God on our ministries.

Last year we announced to you our program of advance for the '70's. Our plans call for 100 new missionaries, two new fields and a budget of two million dollars by the end of this decade. God is answering prayer and confirming these plans.

The Jim Sturgills and the Don Sextons are presently under appointment and four more will appear before our board in August for appointment. In our recent annual board meeting, the country of Spain was added to our list of fields. One survey of this country states that only 200 of the 9,000 towns and villages in Spain have a gospel testimony with regular meetings. Mr. and Mrs. Loriet Hernandez, son-in-law and daughter of the Reverend Rafael Joshue, our senior pastor in Cuba, live in Madrid. They have urged our board to send missionaries to join them in their witnessing.

We acknowledge the blessings of God on the labors of our dedicated staff of missionaries:

**BRAZIL — 24 missionaries and 32 children**

There are eight church groups in the state of Sao Paulo with three pastors and eight lay preachers. The work has expanded into the states of Minas Gerais and Santa Caterina.

**CUBA —**

The Cuban Association of Free Will Baptist churches has become completely self-sustaining. Twelve pastors serve 14 Free Will Baptist congregations. They had more than 400 attending their annual convention in February.

**FRANCE — 6 missionaries and 10 children**

The Dan Merkh and Joe Haases serve growing congregations at Nantes and Rennes. Opportunities abound in the country of 50 million people.

**INDIA — 4 missionaries and 4 children.**

Government restrictions prevent the addition of new missionaries. National leaders have been trained to assume greater responsibility of the work. There are four ordained pastors in North India and two in South India.

**IVORY COAST — 22 missionaries and 18 children**

Missionaries continue to emphasize evangelism, church planting and training national leaders. New villages have been entered with the gospel. The growth of the church is seen in the developing of young Africans for leadership.

A special national celebration in Bondoukou, August 27, offers a unique opportunity for an evangelistic emphasis. Literature has been published for this event and 1,000 prayer partners enlisted.

A doctor and two nurses are needed for the hospital. A special project to publish the New Testament in Koulango is in the budget for next year.

**JAPAN — 8 missionaries and 15 children**

Pastor Osawa San and his church group bought property in Tokyo. Our thanks to those who gave to Project 5000 for this purpose.

Sapporo, capital of Hokkaido, will be host to the Winter Olympics in February 1972. The Larry Condit of California have been given a short-term assignment as youth evangelist for special evangelistic services in Sapporo. They will join the Calverys and McLains in September. A team of ten students will saturate the area with literature, conduct conversational English classes, present musical concerts and give testimonies in a concerted effort to evangelize more than 30,000 homes in our church area of Sapporo. They will be on a six month assignment during which time they will share their ministry in other areas where Free Will Baptists witness.

**PANAMA — 5 missionaries and six children**

When the Tom Willeys, Jr., came home last year for an overdue furlough, lay leaders became responsible for the work. Tom Willey, Bill Fulcher and Benito Rodriguez have made periodic visits to the field. The Bill Fulchers have been transferred from Uruguay to Panama and will establish their residence in Panama

City in September. The Willeys will return to their work in August.

Mrs. Mabel Willey has been given an assignment to Panama. This was the place where she and her late husband, The Reverend Tom Willey, Sr., began their missionary ministry for Free Will Baptists.

**URUGUAY — 5 missionaries and 6 children**

Free Will Baptists have had an unusual response in the border area of Livramento-Rivera. Five established groups form the fellowship of Free Will Baptist churches. A national pastor, Ubertil de los Santos, serves the churches in Rivera and Santa Theresa.

A special evangelistic crusade in January 1971 resulted in more than 230 decisions. The meeting hall in Livramento has become inadequate to accomodate the crowds. They are in the process of buying property.

Our annual audit shows progress in our financial reports. Our total receipts were \$662,334.40 and total disbursements were \$627,380.96. The states of California, Kentucky, Missouri, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina and Tennessee exceeded their 1970 quotas. Our fund balance deficit was reduced from \$29,619 in 1969 to \$6,331.18 in 1970. Several of our churches are moving into the list of giving \$10,000 or more to foreign missions. We encourage local churches to have annual missionary conferences with faith promises. Our enlistment to Project 5000 continues to increase. Our Call-A-Thon offerings helped to eliminate several deficit accounts. We are announcing this year a tribute to our missionary statesman, the Reverend Thomas H. Willey, Sr., by establishing the annual Christmas Willey Missions Offering. We want our Free Will Baptists to have the opportunity to express their love for Christ in a tangible way. This is a tribute to a man who pioneered for foreign missions not only the mission fields of Peru, Panama and Cuba but also in many areas of our denomination. To many of our Free Will Baptists, he was the first missionary they had ever heard or seen. The Christmas offering will be allocated by the board according to needs.

Your faithfulness to give, to pray and to send will be rewarded by Him who said, "Go ye . . ."

2. Appreciation to the other agencies of our denomination for their assistance in our sending missionaries to these nations.
3. Confidence in our notable staff of missionaries to accomplish the work which God has given them.

5. Desire for your prayers and support of our ministries.

### REPORT OF HOME MISSION BOARD

Delegates and Friends,

"O magnify the Lord with me and let us exalt His name together" (Psalm 34:3).

You prayed and gave, and God blessed our work in 1970 abundantly. Also, the first six months of 1971 have been very fruitful, more than we could ask or think.

Since my last report to you, the following have been employed as missionary and church extension workers through one of our programs.

9. Miss Pam Orr and Miss Sandra Bazen, Short Term
10. Reverend Roy Thomas, Deputational Missionary

The other divisions of work have continued to develop — chaplains, loans, evangelism and literature.

The next Evangelism Conference will be at Woodbine Free Will Baptist Church, Nashville, November 10-12, 1971.

At the present time there are approximately 205 million people in the United States with 55 million households. This will increase to 350 million by the year 2000, just 29 short years from now, and at that time it is projected that there will be 100 million households in the United States. Utility companies, real estate companies and government agencies have their plans on the drawing board to feed, house and employ this great increase in population. As a department of our church charged with home missions and church extension, we must be abreast of this growth and again re-emphasize the building of churches in the *large cities* where the people are and will be, that they may have their spiritual needs met.

I may or may not be living in the year 2000, but I want to have a part in providing Free Will Baptist churches for those who will be here. (If the Lord comes and takes us home — oh blessed thought — missionary work will no longer be needed, but we must work at the job until He comes.)

In addition to our responsibility in the United States and the Islands of the Seas, we also must not forget the multitudes in Old Mexico and in Canada. They too are our responsibility.

This is a team effort and every member of a team either strengthens or weakens the other members of the team. May we strengthen each other through prayer, cooperation and fellowship.

I serve the Lord with gladness, the Board and our people with thanksgiving and am grateful for all that is done to make our work successful and rewarding.

Being often asked, "What is the greatest need of the Home Missions Department?" My sincere answer is:

The greatest need is God called, dedicated preachers, who will go into the large population centers, preach the Word of God, *stick with it* and build Bible-believing, New Testament Free Will Baptist churches. I saw the first man sent out as a home missionary and have watched each one go since, and I can say with assurance that money is no problem when you have a man who will *work* and who will *stick*. Our material provisions are good — it is men that we need. YES, MEN. Thank God for those we now have and those who have worked with us in other years — *they are our greatest asset!*

The theme for 1972 is: "Our world-wide witness will only be *lengthened* when our home base is *strengthened*."

#### Recommendations:

1. That this Association designate November, 1972, as National Home Missions Month and that Sunday, November 19, 1972, be designated National Home Missions Sunday.
2. That the proposed budget of \$225,000 be adopted for 1972.

## REPORT OF FREE WILL BAPTIST BIBLE COLLEGE

In evaluating the past school year, the thing that stands out most as a contributing factor to a wonderful year is the student body of Free Will Baptist Bible College. We have one of the most refined, contented, clean-living student bodies to be found on any campus in America.

The thing that makes the difference between our students and what is generally found on the average college campus is that our students know Jesus Christ as a personal saviour and have submitted themselves to Divine authority, and are not only at peace with God, but at peace with themselves. The rebellion that we see and hear about in our colleges and universities is a rebellion against the depravity of the human heart which is at war with God. Instead of Free Will Baptist Bible College lowering its standards to accommodate the low morals of our day, we are seeking rather to raise our standards of Christian living because we believe that the more nearly we are living according to Bible standards, the happier we are as Christians. Free Will Baptist Bible College feels that this is no day to seek relevance with those who are not willing to live separated, consecrated Christian lives.

In the last two years the Lord has been pleased to visit our student body with a soul-moving revival that has changed the lives of many students. It is very

evident that revival is as essential to a Christian college as it is to an individual Christian. Should the Lord not visit Free Will Baptist Bible College with these revival fires, it would be impossible for us to have more than a dead orthodoxy which would eventually give way to more serious spiritual problems.

From time to time it seems wise for Free Will Baptist Bible College to re-committ itself to the principles that have guided it through its history.

In a day of outright rejection of the Bible as the very word of God by liberals; in a day when the fad of dialoguing with liberals is practiced by neo-evangelicals; in a day of sickening tolerance practiced by pseudo-intellectuals; in a day of compromise by opportunists; in a day when the doctrine of salvation is still preached but the doctrine of Christian separation is almost totally ignored, Free Will Baptist Bible College reaffirms its belief in the Bible as the inerrant word of God; its opposition to entering into dialogue with liberals; its belief that Christian doctrine and Christian living are inseparable.

Since certain expansions are being made in the curriculum of Free Will Baptist Bible College in order to meet the needs of our growing denomination, your Board of Trustees wishes to make it clear that these enlargements in no way changes the purpose or direction of the institution. It should be made clear to all that the Bible College principle of education still guides the institution. It is believed that this kind of institution was in the minds of the founding fathers and has served our denomination well.

## REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

Free Will Baptists are a miracle denomination. It is a miracle that we are one of the oldest denominations in the United States that has remained true to the Word of God. If it is possible to be more positive in our Scriptural position than were our forefathers then I believe we are. Of course it can rightly be said that we are what we are today because of what our forefathers were yesterday. Our position does not represent a return or a rediscovery of the Bible as the Word of God but rather continuance in this position. Our denomination is rooted in the Bible and I do not see any evidence of these roots deteriorating. This does not mean that we should relax and relent; we must always remain awake and alert. If we fall asleep the enemy will most certainly come into our midst and sow tares.

Let's reflect further. Ours is a miracle denomination in many other ways. Every other area of ministry in our denomination is on the upsurge. Budgets have been exceeded in the past several years in both of the mission departments. State programs continue to grow.

Our own ministry is a miracle ministry. We have just completed a highly

successful enlargement campaign. Great gains were reported to Free Will Baptist Sunday schools across our nation. It is becoming common for many of our Sunday schools to exceed 500-700 in attendance.

We have continued our sales growth. Our budget for 1970 was \$473,032.00. Our sales totaled \$573,471.25. This is in excess of our 1971 budget which is \$528,480.00. We should exceed \$625,000.00 in total sales this year and I am forecasting a budget of \$738,360.00 for 1972. We should reach the million dollar level in the next few years. Here is a list of our sales growth through the years.

## NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 — Investment in plant is carried at cost. Consistent with generally accepted accounting principles for non-profit institutions, no depreciation of office equipment, printing service equipment and warehouse has been provided during the year.

Printing service equipment with a cost of \$4,058.87 is pledged to secure equipment obligations of \$5,692.50 at December 31, 1970.

NOTE 2 — The Sunday School Board purchased the Printing Service Division from the Church Training Service Department as of May 1, 1970. The purchase price was \$15,883.67 of which \$4,912.59 was in cash and \$10,971.08 was an assumption of equipment obligations on printing service equipment. Operations of the Printing Service Division from May 1, 1970 (date of purchase) are included in the accompanying financial statements.

The 36th annual meeting of the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention met on July 13, 1971. Total registration was 1,020 with 19 states, 3 districts and 4 local auxiliaries sending in Recording Secretary Reports.

The enrollment at the beginning of the convention year was 6,320.

## REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

1. Whereas, there are many satanic forces that tend to destroy moral principles of decency and propriety in our society, and  
Whereas, some of these satanic forces operate through degrading literature, R and X rated films, contemporary rock music, immorality, etc., and  
Whereas, the textbooks in many public school systems contain blasphemous, profane and offensive language, and  
Whereas, our young people in particular are targets of these destructive forces, and  
Whereas, the apathy, indifference, and unconcern of decent people creates a spirit of toleration which contributes to the spread and growth of lewd films, off color TV programs and licentious literature, and  
Whereas, the church has a God-given responsibility to take a strong, Biblical, militant stand against destructive and wicked influences in our society,  
Be it therefore resolved that:
  - a. This 35th annual session of the National Association of Free Will Baptists express its grave concern over the degrading, lewd, and even pornographic films and literature and the offensive and profane statements that are finding their way into the public school textbooks.
  - b. That we strongly urge our people to conscientiously scrutinize the books used in their public school systems, and that the concerned citizens be urged to take the proper steps to get offensive books removed from the school systems.
  - c. That we encourage our pastors and churches to request their local newspapers to refuse ads for R and X rated films and liquor ads.
  - d. That we urge our local, state and national legislators to take positive action to improve the moral and spiritual climate of our country through passing laws and ordinances that will protect our children from exploitation by the filth purveyors, sex merchants, dope pushers and socialists of our day.
2. Whereas it has been difficult to get Bible believing fundamental, Bible preaching preachers and churches to cooperate in great city and county campaigns, and  
Whereas, there is a great need to cooperate wherever we can to make the claims of Christ known in great campaigns to reach individuals and the masses when that campaign is sponsored only by those who believe and practice the great fundamentals of the faith,  
Be it resolved that:  
This association encourage our preachers and churches to initiate and cooperate in the great campaigns sponsored *only* by out and out fundamentalists in order to reach the masses for Christ.
3. Whereas, fundamentalists, including our own denomination, are sometimes very slow to use the various news media to get the message of the Word to the multitudes, to announce various meetings, and to report their work,  
Be It Resolved that;  
We encourage greater use of all legitimate news media for the preaching of the gospel and the promoting of the work.
4. Whereas, there has been a general loosening of convictions and practices

among us, and in society in general, concerning proper dress, Christ honoring entertainment and moral standards, and

Whereas this loosening of convictions and practices is robbing the church of much of her power and testimony,

Be It Resolved that:

We strongly urge our preachers to preach more on Bible separation from sin and dedication unto Christ so that God's standards of practical righteousness might be held high in a day of spiritual declension.

5. Whereas some are using unscriptural methods, and some are entering into unholy alliances with modernists, neo-orthodox, new evangelicals and others in an attempt to promote revival, and

Whereas such attempts cloud the issue, confuse the minds of the people and sometimes leads to general acceptance of "revival" and "evangelistic" counterfeits,

Be It Resolved that:

This association reaffirm its belief in and encouragement of evangelism in the local church and cooperative evangelism that refuses to give Christian recognition to those who deny the fundamentals of the faith, and that we go on record as opposing all inclusive evangelism that yokes believers and unbelievers together as sponsors of evangelistic crusades and revival efforts.

6. Be it further resolved that copies of these resolutions be sent to all of our state and national publications and to all the wire services of the newspapers.

7. Whereas the problem of drug abuse has reached such alarming proportions that some of our government officials now say it is "the greatest crisis facing society in 1000 years," and

Whereas these same leaders, while alerting us to the seriousness of this situation, confess that its remedy is beyond the reach of government because it is a "Crisis of the Spirit," and

Whereas it is plainly a part of the Christian's prescribed duty, while trying to be the preserving salt in his society, to speak out against the sins which are destroying that society,

Be It Therefore Resolved that this association go on record stating

- a. That we lament the seriousness of the drug-abuse problem and declare that we believe the practice to be sinful.
- b. That we decry the use of, and urge our constituency to be on guard against any medium such as rock music, "pop" art, educational philosophies, and uninhibited and immodest styles of dress which either overtly or covertly contribute to conveying the idea or producing an atmosphere in which the illicit use of drugs is considered either desirable or considerable.
- c. That we prayerfully support the efforts of our nation and its president to curb the flow of these drugs and have the clerk of this association inform him of this resolve.
- d. That we emphatically declare our faith in the Lord Jesus Christ's willingness and ability to save the drug addict from the power and penalty of this sin and all others.
- e. That we readily pledge all our Christian resources to endeavor to reach, rather than reject, those individuals involved in this evil.
