PROCEEDINGS

The 43rd annual convention of the National Association of Free Will Baptists met in the Civic Center at Charlotte, North Carolina, July 16-19, 1979.

The theme of the convention was "The Spirit-Controlled Life." Blaine Hughes served as music director with Rebecca Pugh as pianist and Doug Little as organist.

Bill Evans, presiding officer, called the Monday night service to order at 7:00 p.m. Floyd Cherry led in the opening prayer.

Doug Little taught the congregation the theme chorus, "Under the Spirit's Control," written by Mr. Little especially for the convention.

I. L. Stanley led "He Lives" as the opening hymn.

The mass choir sang "Shall We Gather at the River" and "At the Crossing." The volunteer choir was under the direction of Lindsay Terry, music composer from Charlotte, North Carolina.

Clerk Waldo Young called the convention into official session and introduced the moderator, Bobby Jackson. The moderator introduced the other convention officers and announced the members of the Nominating, Resolutions and Credentials Committees.

The Nominating Committee members appointed were Robert Picirilli, Lewis Perry, Johnnie Floyd, Jr., Hobart Ashby and Billy Bevan.

The Resolutions Committee members appointed were Douglas Simpson, Richard Cordell, Jerry Dudley, Gene Parrisher and George Lee.

Jack W. Stallings, Elzo Bevan, Don Elkins, Luther Gibson and Willie Justice were appointed as the Credentials Committee.

I. L. Stanley led the congregation in singing "How Great Thou Art" and "Power in the Blood."

Rufus Coffey introduced Mr. Henderson Belk, businessman from Charlotte, North Carolina, who brought the welcome address and gave a testimony of what Christ means to him.

Lindsay Terry presented special music. He sang "God Leads Us Along," "Follow Me" and "No One Ever Cared for Me Like Jesus."

An offering for convention expenses was received. Mr. Lindsay Terry sang "I Must Tell Jesus" as the offering was received.

Nan Fulcher from Bethany Free Will Baptist Church, Norfolk, Virginia, sang "I Walked Today Where Jesus Walked."

Charles Thigpen, president of Free Will Baptist Bible College, was introduced as the speaker. His subject was "Walking in the

Director Roy Thomas gave the Home Missions and Church Extension Department report. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

Claudie Hames, J. E. Blanton and Elzo Bevan were elected to the Home Missions Board with terms expiring in 1985.

Director Roger Reeds gave the Sunday School and Church Training Department report. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

President Charles Thigpen gave the report of Free Will Baptist Bible College. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

Director Rolla Smith gave the report of the Foreign Missions Department. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

Bob Trimble (Michigan) was elected to fill the unexpired term of Ronald Winkle who had resigned from the Foreign Missions Board. This term expired in 1982.

Director Herman Hersey gave the report of the Department of Retirement and Insurance. A motion carried that the report be received and the budget adopted.

Lawnie Coffman, Harold Critcher and Gene Outland were elected to the Retirement and Insurance Board with terms expiring in 1985.

Item VII of the 1978 General Board report, along with a motion to amend which was postponed until the 1979 session, was brought before the body. The amendment would add the words "and will not be permitted" to the fourth paragraph. It was interpreted that the "will not be permitted" statement referred to speaking in tongues and a second work of grace. The amendment was adopted.

Item VIII, postponed from the 1978 General Board report, was brought before the body and adopted.

Item X, also postponed from the 1978 session, was brought before the body and adopted.

The rest of the General Board report was read by the clerk. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt it item by item.

Item II was considered and adopted.

Item III was considered. A motion was made an seconded to amend by substitution, to substitute the following for Item III of the General Board report:

Whereas, the National Association has become more efficiently organized and each board and department is functioning effectively, and

in place of "deleted from that form."

The previous question was moved and carried. The amendment was adopted. A motion carried to amend the item by adding the words, "and this information be optional." Item IV was adopted as amended.

Item V was considered. A motion was made and seconded to amend the item by deleting the words "serve as nominating committee" and inserting the words "shall fill the office of Executive Secretary," and to delete the last sentence of the first proposal, which reads, "The Executive Committee shall serve as the nominating committee for the office of the Executive Secretary."

A motion carried to postpone items V, VI and VII until the Thursday session

Item VIII, dealing with the 1983 national convention site was considered. A motion was carried to adopt Item VIII.

Members of the General Board were elected as nominated by the nominating committee. (For a list see boards listed in the front of the minutes, or the report of the nominating committee.)

The three two-year Executive Committee members were elected. They are John Edwards (Alabama), David Joslin (Arkansas) and Rue Dell Smith (Kansas).

Melvin Worthington led in prayer to close the Wednesday session.

WEDNESDAY EVENING

Dan Merkh, presiding officer, led in prayer to open the Wednesday evening missions service. The Men's Chorale, under the direction of Vernon Whaley, sang "Volunteers for Jesus" and "All in the Name of Jesus."

Blaine Hughes directed the congregation in singing, "Under the Spirit's Control," "Am I A Soldier of the Cross" and "Amazing Grace."

Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Coffey were honored for their seventeen years of service to the denomination, five with the Foreign Missions Department and twelve with the Executive Office. Mr. Coffey was presented with an appropriate plaque, and Mrs. Coffey received a dozen red roses. The moderator made the presentation. The Coffeys were given a standing ovation.

Don Robirds introduced the foreign missionaries who were present for the service.

Trymon Messer introduced the home missionaries who were

It was called to the attention of the body that Mr. G. W. Cloud, a long-time attender of the National Convention, had gone on to eternity during the past year, along with others. A time of prayer in remembrance of these was observed.

Robert Picirilli was elected to the Historical Commission for a term to expire in 1984.

The report of the Commission on Theological Liberalism was given by Leroy Forlines. A motion carried to receive this report.

Wade Jernigan was elected to the Commission on Theological Liberalism for a term expiring in 1984.

The report of the Registration Committee was read by the clerk.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was read by the clerk. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt it item by item.

Item I was adopted.

Item II was adopted.

Item III was adopted.

Item IV was considered. A motion carried to amend resolution IV by inserting the word "special" before "interest groups" in part 4 of the resolution. Item IV was adopted as amended.

Item V was adopted.

The items from the General Board report, postponed until the Thursday session, were brought before the body. These items, V, VI and VII, pertained to the election of the Executive Secretary.

A motion was made and seconded to amend the motion to amend item V by substituting the words "selected by the Executive Committee and ratified by the General Board" in place of "elected every two years" in Article IV of the Constitution.

A motion was made and seconded to table the three items referring to the election of the Executive Secretary. The moderator ruled that all three could be tabled under one motion. The moderator was challenged from the floor. A vote was taken, and the moderator was sustained in his ruling. The motion to table was adopted.

A motion was adopted that the Executive Committee study the issue concerning election of the Executive Secretary and report back with recommendations in the 1980 session.

A motion was made and seconded to remove from the table the items concerning the election of the Executive Secretary. The motion was defeated.

The following resolution was presented from a member of the body.

EXECUTIVE SECRETARY'S REPORT

God has always chosen earthen vessels as ambassadors of His grace. It has been my privilege to represent Free Will Baptists over the past 12 years as one of His vessels. Sincere gratitude is expressed for the opportunity of serving my beloved denomination. It is a delightful experience to recall these years of association with fellow believers who have helped and encouraged me along the way.

Fellowship with my brethren has been a source of inspiration and strength. It is impossible to tabulate the myriad instances in which Christian friends have refreshed my spirit by expressing love and confidence through the years. This has been done in many ways—by supporting the work, by assuring me of prayer and often with small but greatly valued tokens of regard. I will never be able to acknowledge the many personal expressions of love that have been shown. Nevertheless, I am humbly thankful for the outpouring of your affection.

God is to be praised for whatever accomplishments have been made. I am especially grateful to God for traveling mercies. Including five years of traveling for the Foreign Mission Board, I have logged almost 700,000 miles. This is the equivalent of 25 trips around the world. Having preached more than 2,500 sermons in associations, conference, revivals, and in hundreds of churches, it has been a joy to see hundreds of souls saved and thousands of Christians rededicate their lives. Numerous young people have committed their lives to Christ. Numbers of these have gone on to prepare themselves in one of our colleges for Christian service in our denomination.

It has been encouraging to see a measure of God's blessings upon our entire denomination. Numerically, our ranks have increased by 50,000 members and 343 congregations.

This fellowship of churches has been strengthened by a greater bond of unity on every level of our national work. We stand on the threshold of major new advances because of our unified spirit of cooperation. Diverse elements have been molded into one harmonious unit. Because we have built bridges of understanding we are able to span potentially divisive issues and seek solutions to our mutual problems in a mature manner.

With another 19 percent increase last year, cooperative giving has reached its highest level. Overall coop giving has increased 175 percent during the past 12 years. This is an average annual increase of 14.6 percent.

Since greater emphasis is given to direct giving, it is no surprise to learn that less than six percent of our national giving is through the Cooperative Plan. There are two reasons for this trend. Our denomination is not in accord concerning the basic philosophy of direct giving versus cooperative giving. Progress has been made in educating our people to adopt the Cooperative Plan, but opposition continues even though it is muted. Originally the Cooperative Plan was designed as a means to support our various national ministries. But in actuality the Coop Plan has become the major support of state programs. The percentage kept in the states has greatly escalated. This has forced the national departments to actively vie for more direct support instead of eliminating the multiplicity of appeals.

In turn, this creates a psychological barrier. It is difficult to promote the Cooperative Plan when 150 missionaries are making direct appeals to our churches. Also, an additional 10 full-time department representatives are directly appealing for support. Furthermore, several state representatives are seeking direct support for various causes.

This realistic picture is not intended to minimize the value of coop. It does help us put the picture in proper perspective. Theoretically, the Cooperative Plan is a practical and ideal way to support a total denominational program if all giving were channeled through the program, and if our congregations were taught to give beyond the arbitrary 10 percent limit that most churches have set. But as the results indicate, cooperative giving benefits the

The audit reflects a growing concern for and involvement in foreign missions on the part of many Free Will Baptists. The budget for 1978 was \$1,685,600.00. Income totaled \$1,656,206.00, an increase of \$224,227.00 over 1977.

The 1979 budget is \$1,848,687.00, an increase of \$192,481.00 over the 1978 income. In view of inflation, this is a minimal increase. However, accelerated giving is needed in the remaining months of the year if the budget is to be met.

The proposed budget for 1980 as approved by the board in May and recommended for adoption is \$1,908,316.00.

On behalf of the board, the missionaries and the home staff, I express grateful appreciation for the continued prayers and gifts of our entire constituency.

We also thank the various state and national denominational schools and agencies for vital roles in missionary outreach.

We express our gratitude to the Woman's Auxiliary for the provision closet and other special projects. Projects "Book Shelf" and "Tool Shed," thanks to the Master's Men, are also meeting special needs of missionaries.

Today the missionary enterprise faces its greatest challenge. Tragedy or triumph lies ahead, depending on what believers do with the command to "Go... into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." The times call for sincere dedication and spiritual boldness to declare to the whole world that, "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved" (Acts 4:12).

GRADUATE PROGRAM REPORT

FREE WILL BAPTIST BIBLE COLLEGE July, 1979

The graduate program which the National Association asked the college to study and prepare for continues to be under review, in the light of current-and-changing conditions. At the moment, we are very doubtful that the program can be begun as soon as the original target date in the fall of 1980, but we will continue to take positive steps toward implementing the program as soon thereafter as possible. The two greatest uncertainties are the provision of the proper personnel (at least three men with regular doctorates in the field) and the new sense of financial "straitening" created—at least in part—by the unstable inflationary rate.

However, we will take the next logical—and required—step during the coming (1979-80) term. Our accrediting association requires that the staff of the association visit and make a survey of the institution at least a full year before the announcement of the opening of a graduate program. Now that administrative changes at the college are complete, we will ask the AABC office to make that visit this fall.

Following the AABC evaluation of our readiness for a graduate program, we will be able to report more specifically what further preparations for readiness will be required of us, and to begin laying specific plans and schedules for meeting those requirements and defining the detailed curriculum of the program.

Notes to Financial Statements May 31, 1979

Free Will Baptist Bible College is operated under the auspices of the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Fund Accounting

In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the College, the accounts of the College are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group.

Current Funds

Current fund balances are separated into those which are restricted by donors or grantors and those which are unrestricted. Restricted funds may only be expended for the purpose indicated by the donor or grantor, whereas unrestricted funds are under the control of the College to use in achieving its educational purposes.

Endowment Funds

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring that the principal be invested in perpetuity, and only the income be utilized. While quasiendowment funds have been established by the College for the same purposes as endowment funds, any portion of quasi-endowment funds may be expended.

Inventories

Inventories, consisting of books and supply items, are valued at cost with cost being determined on first-in, first-out method.

Investments

Investments in stocks and bonds are stated at cost, except those received by gift, which are stated at market at date of gift.

Equipment Purchases

Certain equipment purchases are funded from the current operating budget and are presented under the appropriate functional classification of expenditures. Such expenditures for new equipment are capitalized as investment in plant.

Depreciation

Plant assets consisting of land, buildings and equipment are stated at cost or fair value at date of gift. Library books are valued at \$2.00 per book No provision is made in the accounts for depreciation of plant assets.

Taxes

The College is exempt from income taxes; accordingly, no provision for taxes has been made in the accompanying financial statements.

(2) Lease Obligations

The College has long-term leases for men's dormitory, a women's dormitory and dining building. The women's dormitory and dining building was financed by bonds aggregating \$750,000.00 with interest rates between 7%% to 8%. Revenues from the dormitories are

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1—Summary of Significant Accouting Policies

The accounting policies that affect the more significant elements of the Board's financial statements are summarized below. They have been followed on a consistent basis.

<u>ACCOUNTING BASIS</u>—The Board generally uses the accrual basis of accounting, except on receipts, which are taken into income as received.

During the year 1978 the Board combined all books into a single accounting entity which change we approve. Prior year amounts have been restated for comparison.

NOTE 2 INVESTMENTS

Investments consist of certain trust funds on deposit with the Board of Retirement and Insurance. These funds draw interest and are subject to withdrawal.

<u>FUND BALANCE</u>—Fund balance is divided into the amount designated for mission use, amount designated as savings bonus, net equity in fixed assets, and amount available for general use.

SUPPLEMENTARY FINANCIAL INFORMATION

The financial statements of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension of The National Association of Free Will Baptists as at and for the years ended December 31, 1978 and 1977, and our report thereon, are presented in the preceding section of this report. The accompanying supplementary information is not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position and results of operations and is presented for analytical purposes only. Georgia has a state Layman's Committee. A North Georgia Master's Men Conference was hosted by the Decatur Master's Men on June 8. Chuck Snow, Georgia Master's Men State Senator, arranged the conference. Guest speaker was Ernest Winchester, Birmingham, Alabama, who is the Alabama Master's Men State Senator. The Midway District Master's Men had their annual Master's Men Dinner at Albany Free Will Baptist Church, Albany, Georgia, June 9. The first Georgia State Layman's Breakfast was held at the Georgia State Meeting in 1978, with 72 present. Guest speaker was Don Elkins, Jacksonville, Arkansas, Chairman of the Master's Men Board.

<u>Alabama</u> and <u>North Carolina</u> both have district Master's Men organizations within their state. The district organizations are proving helpful in developing new chapters and strengthening existing chapters.

SPECIAL DAYS

The Master's Men Department now sponsors two special days:

<u>Armed Forces Sunday</u> which is the last Sunday in May each year. This is an ideal time to remember our Free Will Baptist men and women who are serving our country in the Armed Forces.

Layman's Day which is the second Sunday in October each year. Layman's Day will be October 14, 1979. We encourage every church to have a special Layman's Day, even if you have it at a time other than October 14. This year we will be sending a letter out to all Free Will Baptist Churches encouraging them to take a special offering for our Master's Men Department's general fund. The church sending the largest Layman's Day offering will be given free membership in Master's Men for 1981. Last year Unity Free Will Baptist Church, Smithfield, North Carolina, gave the largest offering, \$500. They will receive free membership for 1980.

LAYMAN OF THE YEAR

We appreciate your support of our Layman of the Year Award Program. This program is open for all laymen. You do not have to have a Master's Men chapter in order to nominate a layman from your church.

PROJECT REPORT

Our projects are funded by special offerings from our Master's Men chapters. Some chapters have underwritten specific projects on a monthly or quarterly basis. These projects are clear-cut examples of strength in unity. By joining together we have been able to accomplish the following:

<u>Project Book Shelf</u>—Eight \$15 certificates were presented to missionaries returning to the foreign field. In 1978, 206 books were sent to home and foreign missionaries and 113 have been sent thus far in 1979.

Project Tool Shed—Missionaries benefiting from this project in 1978 were: Bill Fulcher, Panama; Jim Cowart, Brazil; and Mike Cousineau, Ivory Coast. Over \$740 worth of tools and equipment were purchased this year. Plus, a generator was donated to Mike Cousineau by the Locust Grove Master's Men Chapter, Locust Grove, Oklahoma.

<u>Uganda</u> Project—This is a joint venture with Woman's Auxiliary to provide educational funds for a Ugandan student. We have received \$480 in cash and have some pledges—one pledge for \$1,000.

This is the most lengthy report I've given since being general director. You can rejoice with us in the progress that is being made. We realize we have just begun. If we can accomplish the above with less than <u>one percent</u> of our men, just imagine what can be done with 50-75 percent!!

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost or market, with cost being determined by use of the first-in, first-out method.

Depreciation

Depreciation of property and equipment is provided on the straight-line method based on estimated useful lives (see note 2).

Income Taxes

The Department is exempt from Federal Income taxes; accordingly, no provision for income taxes is made in the accounts.

(2) Accounting Change

In accordance with the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants' "Statement of Position on Accounting Principles and Reporting Practices for Nonprofit Organizations not Covered by Existing Audit Guides," the Department has adopted the practice of capitalizing its exhaustible fixed assets and provides depreciation over their estimated useful lives. Accordingly, the beginning fund balances have been restated for additions to property and equipment and for accumulated depreciation thereon.

The Department has adopted the accrual method of accounting in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, whereas in prior years, the Department reported on the cash receipts and disbursements method. The effects of the change as of December 31, 1977, have not been determined.

(3) Property and Equipment

Depreciation charged to operations, computed on the straight-line method, amounted to \$226.79.

Over the past 10 years, the Board invested \$1,684,347.96 within our denomination. We purchased \$1,018,850.00 in church bonds from 108 different churches. In addition, we loaned \$655,497.96 to 23 churches and denominational agencies in 12 states.

Numerous churches are starting ministries with older adults. During the past year, Missouri Free Will Baptists purchased land for a Retirement Village near Lebanon, MO. North Carolina Free Will Baptists constructed the Western NC Rest Home at Chandler. Other states are considering similar ministries.

CAPITALIZATION POLICIES

Purchase of capital items are expensed in the Operating Fund. Major items are recorded in the Property Fund as an increase in the fund balance. When an item is retired its cost is removed from the assets and the fund balance. No depreciation is computed on the properties.

MARKETABLE SECURITIES

Marketable securities are carried at par or face value. The discount or premiums is taken into income at the time of purchase.

SUNDAY SCHOOL AND CHURCH TRAINING DEPARTMENT REPORT

There is an excellent outline on "The Tenses in the Believer's Life" in the footnotes of Scofield's Bible. This is found on page 1,267 and is based upon First Thessalonians 1:3 and 1:9-10. In a comparison of these verses Scofield mentions that the "work of faith" is to "turn to God from idols."

John 6:28-29. "Then said they unto him, What shall we do, that we might work the works of God? Jesus answered and said unto them, This is the work of God, that ye believe on him whom he hath sent."

The "labor of love" in verse 3 is to "serve the living and true God." The "patience of hope" is to "wait for his Son from heaven."

Matthew 24:42. "Watch therefore: for ye know not what hour your Lord doth come."

Paul repeats this threefold sequence in Titus 2:11-13.

"For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men. Teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world; Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ."

THE WORK OF FAITH

No better words can best describe the ministry of the Sunday School and Church Training Department than that of a "work of faith." We do not exist upon gifts solicited from our people so we are unlike any other department of the work of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. Ours is a "work of faith" however, in that we produce a set of products and base our budget upon the expectation of the sale of our products. The Lord has greatly rewarded our faith over these years and He has continued to do so this past year.

Our fiscal year runs from March 1 through February 28 (29). This report covers that time period. Since 1978 was the year of the merger of the Sunday School and Church Training Service Departments, this report is the culmination of that merger. The merger was finalized in September of 1978. *

PUBLISHING


During this past year we have continued to publish curriculum. We now produce nearly 400,000 pieces or units of curriculum each quarter. In addition we published four new books, five new booklets, and two new tracts. We reprinted a number of our products. In addition to this production we have printed minutes, letterheads and envelopes, revival posters, in addition to various items for the National Departments. We also print *Mission Grams, The Missouri Gem, The Ohio Ambassador,* and the *CO-Laborer* of the Woman's Auxiliary. We do *Attack* magazine for the Master's Men.

Notes to Financial Statements February 28, 1979 and 1978

The Board operates under the auspices of the National Association of Free Will Baptists and is governed by a board of directors.

(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Acquisition

Effective August 31, 1978, an affiliated organization, the Board of Church Training Services, Inc., was merged into the Sunday School Board. The transaction has been accounted for as a pooling of interests; accordingly, the 1978 financial statements have been restated to include the accounts of the Board of Church Training Service, Inc.

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost or market, with cost being determined by use of the first-in, first-out method.

Depreciation

Depreciation of property, plant and equipment is provided on the straight-line method based on estimated useful lives. (See note 3)

Pension


The Board participates in the pension plan of the Board of Retirement and Insurance of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. The plan is contributory and employees with two years of service are covered. The policy is to fund pension cost accrued. Pension expense amounted to \$4,697.25 in 1979 and \$4,866.48 in 1978.

(7) Extraordinary Item

During the year, the Board of Directors donated the building previously used by the merged affiliated organization (see note 1) to the Executive Board of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. The National Association cancelled the Sunday School Board's operating lease obligation on its bookstore, which was closed during the year.

The building had a net book value of \$51,336.73 and future rentals under the operating lease amounted to approximately \$73,200.00. The net book value of the building is shown as an extraordinary item in the accompanying statements of activity and fund balance.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

I. REAFFIRMATION OF STAND

Whereas,

The spread of liberal thinking has influenced many church people across America; and

Whereas,

The constituency of this denomination is a grass roots people across America; and

Whereas,

The spiritual well-being of our people is threatened by the spread of a humanistic philosophy as propagated by a dominantly liberal media, a humanistic educational system and many governmental agencies; therefore,

Be it resolved:

That the National Association of Free Will Baptists reaffirm its position opposing the following:

1) abortion on demand, 2) homosexuality, 3) religious cults, 4) the charismatic movement, and 5) the Equal Rights Amendment.

Be it further resolved:

That the pastors and leaders of our denomination be urged to inform their people through teaching and preaching on these important issues and to avail themselves of the materials available through the Commission of Theological Liberalism. (Adopted)

II. SEPARATION OF CHURCH AND STATE

Whereas,

There is an increasing threat to the historic and constitutional principle of separation of church and state; and

Whereas,

This threat is becoming more and more evident by the pressures being exerted on churches in their various ministries, such as the Christian day school ministry, through local, state, and federal governments; and

Whereas,

Legal decisions related to this principle are being considered at the present time and at varying levels and in the courts of our land; therefore,

Be it resolved:

That the National Association of Free Will Baptists go on record as supporting the constitutional principle of separation of church and state and the biblical principle of rendering unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's and encourage our churches and pastors to continue to stand against the intrusion of the government in the affairs of the church. (Adopted)

III. SUPPORT OF RELIGIOUS ENTERPRISES

Whereas,

An increasing number of religious programs, personalities and institutions are drawing the support of Free Will Baptists; and

V. EXPRESSION OF APPRECIATION

Whereas,

The North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists has hosted the 1979 session of the National Association of Free Will Baptists in a gracious and efficient manner; therefore,

Be it resolved:

That the National Association express its gratitude to the officers and members of the North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists by a rising vote of thanks.

Whereas,

Brother Rufus Coffey has served effectively as Executive Secretary of the National Association of Free Will Baptists for the past twelve years; therefore,

Be it resolved:

That the National Association express its gratitude to him by a rising vote of appreciation and extend to him our best wishes as he assumes his pastorate. (Adopted)

BUSINESS ITEMS FROM 1978

The following items from the 1978 General Board Report were postponed until this session.

- The following resolution was adpoted as the position of this body. The possibility of including it in the Treatise as an appendix was discussed.
 - <u>Glossalalia</u>

Free Will Baptists understand the Bible teaches the following facts: On the Day of Pentecost believers spoke in distinct foreign languages which were readily understood by the nationalities present.¹

Tongues were given as a special gift to the early church as only one sign which confirmed the witness of the Gospel to unbelievers.²

While tongues were bestowed by the sovereign will of God on some believers, all did not speak with tongues.³ When this gift was abused, it became a source of disturbance in the congregational meetings. To eliminate confusion and correct the error, Paul set particular guidelines for the Christian church to follow.⁴ The gift of tongues was neither an evidence of the baptism of the Holy Spirit, nor does it bring about sanctification.⁵

We believe that speaking in tongues as a visible sign of the baptism of the Holy Spirit is an erroneous doctrine to be rejected. Any implication of a "second work of grace" has never been tolerated in our fellowship of churches, and will not be permitted.

We teach and preach the fulness of the Holy Spirit and heed the scriptural admonition, "Be filled with the Spirit; Speaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord; Giving thanks always for all things unto God and the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ."⁶ (Adopted)
