PROCEEDINGS

The 47th Annual Convention of the National Association of Free Will Baptists met in the Ohio Center, Columbus, Ohio, July 17-21, 1983. "Considering The Covenant," was the convention theme. Blaine Hughes served as music coordinator, Keith Fletcher as organist, and Susan Forlines as pianist.

SUNDAY MORNING

Millard Sasser, pastor from Bridgeton, Missouri, presided over the morning service at the Hyatt Regency Columbus at 11:00 a.m. Worship service was preceded by Sunday School classes.

Jon Forlines led the congregation in singing "Brethren, We Have Met to Worship," "He Lives," and "Turn Your Eyes Upon Jesus." Millard Sasser led

the opening prayer.

John Blakely, Sr. from Dayton, Ohio, sang "It's My Desire." Elro Driggers, pastor of Bethany Free Will Baptist Church, Timmonsville, South Carolina, brought the morning message. His text was John 4:31-38. Following the message the congregation sang a hymn of commitment, "I Surrender All" and was dismissed in prayer by Millard Sasser.

MONDAY EVENING

Roger Childers, pastor from Urbana, Ohio, presided at the 7:00 p.m. Monday evening convention service. Danny Thomas directed the congregation in singing "Who Is On The Lord's Side." The presiding officer led in the opening prayer. Doug Little directed the mass adult choir in singing "What a Savior."

Clerk Waldo Young called the convention into official session and introduced Moderator Bobby Jackson. The moderator announced the committee members who would serve during the convention.

Nominating Committee: Floyd Wolfenbarger, Eugene Hales, Talmadge

Brown, Gene Helton, and Leroy Welch.

Resolutions Committee: Tom Lilly, Paul Kennedy, Archie Ratliff, Norwood Gibson, and Lonnie Da Voult.

Credentials Committee elected by the General Board: Doice McAlister, Billy Walker, Fred Hanson, Millard Sasser, and Jim Nason.

Alton Loveless, Promotional Secretary of the Ohio State Association, brought the welcome address.

The congregation sang, "There is a Name I Love to Hear."

A Free Will Baptist Bible College ensemble sang "How Majestic Is Your Name," "I Must Needs Go Home By the Way of the Cross," and "It Is Finished."

Roger Childers led in a roll call of the states, followed by the convention offering. The Free Will Baptist Bible College Ensemble sang during the offering.

The congregation sang "Jesus Is the Sweetest Name I Know." Rollie

Nagle sang "I Will Praise Him."

David Sutton, pastor of First Free Will Baptist Church, Ada, Oklahoma, was introduced to bring the message. He read paragraphs one and two from the Church Covenant, Romans 12:1-2, and brought the message on "Our Sacred Promise to God Personally." Executive Secretary Melvin Worthington led in prayer at the conclusion of the message. After announcements, the service closed with prayer by Waldo Young.

TUESDAY EVENING

J. M. Creech, pastor from Tupelo, Mississippi, presided at the Tuesday evening service and led in prayer to begin the service. Jerry Pilgrim led the congregation in singing "My Savior's Love."

Doug Little directed the mass adult choir as they sang "It Is Well With My Soul." After the congregational hymn "The Banner of the Cross," a quartet from Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College sang.

While the offering was being received, Martha Ramey played a medley

of songs on the piano.

Jerry Pilgrim led the congregation in singing the chorus of "How Great Thou Art." Ann Maines of Norfolk, Virginia, sang "Down From His Glory."

Harold Pitts, pastor of First Free Will Baptist Church in Tuscaloosa, Alabama, was introduced as the speaker. The theme for his message was "Our Sincere Pledge to God's People." He read paragraphs three, four, and five, from the Church Covenant. His text was II Timothy 2:19-21. At the conclusion of the message, several people came forward for prayer. Tom Malone led in prayer.

After announcements, J. M. Creech led in the benediction.

WEDNESDAY MORNING

Bobby Jackson read Galatians 6:1, brought the Moderator's Message from this passage, and led in prayer to open the business session of the convention. He also read the "Standing Rules of the National Association" from the *Treatise*.

The clerk read the report of the Credentials Committee. A motion carried to adopt the report and seat the delegates.

The clerk also read a partial report of the General Board, Item I. A motion carried to receive the General Board partial report.

Melvin Worthington gave the Executive Office report. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budgets.

Director Roger Reeds gave the Sunday School and Church Training Department report. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

Director Rolla Smith gave the Foreign Missions Department report. A

motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

President Charles Thigpen gave the Free Will Baptist Bible College report. A motion was made and seconded to receive the report and adopt the budget. After discussion, the previous question was moved and seconded. The body voted to close debate. The motion to receive the report and adopt the budget carried.

Sam Truett was elected to a one-year term on the Bible College Board of

Trustees, replacing Bobby Floars who resigned.

Ken Walker was elected to a five-year term on the Bible College Board of Trustees replacing Lewis Perry who resigned.

Chairman Leroy Forlines gave the Commission on Theological Liberal-

ism report. A motion carried to receive the report.

Fred Hall was elected to the Commission on Theological Liberalism for a term expiring in 1988.

Director Roy Thomas gave the Home Missions Department report. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

Gordon Sebastian, James Puckett, and William Johnson were elected to

the Home Missions Board for terms expiring in 1989.

Roy Thomas presented plaques to James McAllister and Delbert Akin who had served 12 and 11 years respectively on the Home Missions Board and were not eligible for re-election.

A motion carried to recess business until 1:30 p.m.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

The afternoon session was called to order at 1:30 p.m. Ralph Hampton, Jr., assistant moderator read Romans 12 and led in prayer.

Director Herman Hersey gave the Board of Retirement report. A motion

carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

Dennis Kern, Robert Picirilli, and Wilburn Beasley were elected to the

Board of Retirement with terms expiring in 1989.

The Free Will Baptist Foundation report was given by Herman Hersey.

A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

Board Member Wayne Spruill gave the Master's Men report. James Vallance, newly appointed director, was introduced to bring greetings. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

Paul Kennedy, James Orr, and Raymond Lee were elected to the

Master's Men Board for terms expiring in 1989.

Melvin Worthington gave the Budget Committee report. A motion

carried to adopt the budget.

The clerk read Item II of the General Board report pertaining to the Radio-Television Committee report. A motion was made and seconded to adopt Item II. A motion was made and seconded to amend by substituting the original report of the Radio-Television Committee. A motion carried to table Item II until copies of the committee's original report could be made available.

The clerk read Item III of the General Board report. A motion carried to

adopt Item III, which pertained to future National Convention sites.

Tom Lilly was elected to serve one year on the General Board, replacing Dennis Wiggs who moved from North Carolina.

Jack Stallings was elected to serve one year on the General Board,

replacing Sigbee Dilda who moved from Virginia.

Those elected to the General Board for two year terms were: John Edwards (AL), Charles Marshall (AZ), David Joslin, (AR), Fred Hanson (Canada), Doice McAlister (CA), Randy Bishop (CO), Robert Owen (FL), Herbert Waid (GA), Harley Bennett (ID), Wallace Malone (IL), Henry Patterson (IN), Nathan Eason (KS), Edward Hutchinson (KY), Lester Horton (MD), Jerry Barron (Mexico), Charles Cooper (MI), Al Hamm (MS), and Millard Sasser (MO).

David Joslin, Herbert Waid, and Wallace Malone were elected to serve

two-year terms on the Executive Committee of the General Board.

A motion carried to take Item II of the General Board from the table. After discussion, the previous question was moved and the body voted to close debate. The motion to substitute the Radio-Television Committee's original report for the report presented from the General Board was adopted. This report contained six recommendations which were considered item by item.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt Item I. A motion was made and seconded to amend Item I to read "That the present committee become a commission and that the members of the Commission be elected so as their terms will expire as follows: Larry Hampton, 1 year; Sandy Goodfellow, 2 years; Guy Owens, 3 years; George Lee, 4 years, and Raymond Riggs, 5 years."

A motion was made and seconded to postpone this report until Thursday morning. The motion to postpone was defeated. The motion to amend Item I was defeated.

A motion was made and seconded to amend Item I by substitution. The substitute statement would read, "That the National Association elect a fivemember commission to formulate and execute plans to bring into being television and radio programs commensurate to the needs and opportunities of our people." The substitute motion carried. Item I, as amended, was adopted.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt Item II. After discussion, the previous motion was made, seconded, and carried. Item II was adopted.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt Item III. After discussion, a motion was passed to stop debate. Item III was adopted.

A motion carried to adopt Item IV.

A motion was made and seconded that the remainder of the report be postponed until Thursday because of the time. The motion to postpone was defeated.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt Item V. A motion was made and seconded to amend the item by deleting the words "one percent of the Cooperative Receipts be allocated," and substituting the words, "\$2,000 be given by the Executive Office." After discussion, a motion for the previous question was adopted. The amendment was adopted. Item V, as amended, was adopted.

A motion and second were made to adopt Item VI. The motion carried. Five men were nominated by the Nominating Committee and were elected to the newly-formed Radio-Television Commission: George Lee, 5 years; Guy Owens, 4 years; Sandy Goodfellow, 3 years; Larry Hampton, 2 years; and James Vallance, 1 year.

A motion carried to recess until Thursday morning at 9:00 a.m.

WEDNESDAY EVENING

The Men's Chorale began the service by singing "We'll Soon Be Done With Troubles and Trials." The group was directed by Vernon Whaley. David Chamberlin led the congregation in singing "The Church's One Foundation," after which Roy Thomas led in prayer.

The congregation sang "Call for Reapers." David Joslin, promotional secretary for Arkansas, presided at the service. As the convention offering was received, the Men's Chorale sang "Sweet Beulah Land."

Don Robirds introduced the foreign missionaries who were present. Trymon Messer introduced the home missionaries present. The congregation sang "Wherever He Leads, I'll Go."

Carl Sullivan of Huntington, West Virginia, sang "He's Alive." Lester Horton, pastor of Fairwood Free Will Baptist Church in Fairfax Station, Virginia, was introduced as the speaker. His theme was "Our Sacrificial Promotion of God's Program." He read paragraphs seven and eight from the Church Covenant. His text was Numbers 32:6-7, 16-23. At the close of the message, Eugene Waddell led in a prayer of consecration.

A missions offering was received. Rolla Smith led in prayer. The quartet from Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College sang "Send Me." The missions offering was \$17,968.43, with the possibility of more being sent in by churches.

Carl Sullivan sang a solo for the benediction.

THURSDAY MORNING

Cleo Pursell, executive secretary-treasurer of the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention, gave the WNAC report. A motion carried to receive the report.

Chairman Alton Loveless gave the Historical Commission report. A

motion carried to receive the report.

Mary Wisehart was elected to serve on the Historical Commission with a

term expiring in 1988.

Wade Jernigan submitted his resignation from the Commission on Theological Liberalism. L. C. Johnson was elected to replace him. This term will expire in 1984.

As Carl Sullivan sang "I'd Do It All Over Again," offering was received

for the convention budget.

A motion carried to receive the report of the Resolutions Committee and

adopt it item by item.

A motion was made and seconded that Resolution I be adopted. A motion was made and seconded to amend Resolution I by adding the words, "Be it further resolved that this body go on record as deploring racial discrimination and segregation." A motion was made and seconded to amend the amendment by substituting, "Be it further resolved that this body go on record as favoring every school having an open-door policy as related to race and national origin."

A motion was made and seconded to table Resolution I. The motion to table was defeated. A motion was made and seconded to refer Resolution I to the Executive Committee for study and proper wording and to be brought

back in 1984.

A motion was made and seconded to amend the motion to refer by deleting the words "Executive Committee" and inserting "A committee of three men selected from the delegation who are informed individuals." The motion to amend was defeated. The motion to amend the amendment was defeated. The motion to amend Resolution I was defeated.

A motion was made and seconded to amend Resolution I by deleting the first "Be it therefore resolved" paragraph. After discussion, the previous question was moved and sustained. The motion to amend failed. Again, the previous question was moved and sustained. Resolution I was adopted.

Resolution II was presented. An objection to consideration was heard.

The body voted to not consider Resolution II.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt Resolution III. A motion was made and seconded to amend by deleting the fourth paragraph. A motion was made and seconded to table Resolution III. The motion to table was defeated. The motion to amend was adopted. A motion was made and seconded to amend Resolution III by deleting paragraph five. The motion to amend was defeated. By common consent the word "publicly" was inserted after the word "pray" in paragraph five. Resolution III was adopted as amended.

Resolution IV was presented. An objection to considering this resolution

was heard. The body voted to not consider it. A motion carried to adopt Resolution V.

Resolution VI was presented. An objection to considering this resolution was heard. The body sustained the objection, and it was not considered.

A motion carried to adopt Resolution VII.

The report of the Registration Committee was read. A motion carried to adopt the report.

A motion and second was introduced from the floor that this body adopt the statement that "Jesus did not make, drink, or give to others to drink, wine with alcoholic content." A motion to table carried.

A motion was made and seconded to reconsider the objection to consideration of Resolution II. An objection was made to reconsidering action on Resolution II. The objection was sustained by the body.

A motion was made and seconded that "employees of this association be forbidden to write or print any material on the wine issue." A motion was made and seconded to add the words "and board members," after "employees." A

motion carried to table the motion.

A motion was made and seconded "that a study committee consisting of Co-chairmen Leroy Forlines and Richard Cordell and eight men appointed by the chair from this National Association of Free Will Baptists study this issue and endeavor to develop a workable statement to be presented at the 1984 session, that will bring harmony to our fellowship."

A motion was made and seconded to amend the motion by substitution, "that we encourage the aggrieved parties to get together on their own and see if they can settle their differences on the wine issue." The motion to amend carried. After discussion, a motion and second for the previous question was sustained. The motion to amend carried. The motion, as amended, was adopted.

Someone commended the fairness of the moderator. The moderator was given a standing ovation for his fairness in this meeting.

Keith Burden was re-elected assistant clerk.

Waldo Young was re-elected clerk.

Ralph Hampton, Jr., was re-elected assistant moderator.

Bobby Jackson was re-elected moderator.

A motion carried to adjourn. The Assistant Moderator led in the closing prayer.

1983 EXECUTIVE SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Executive Office has functioned smoothly since the July 18-22, 1982 National Convention in Fort Worth, Texas. The office staff is commended for their effective and efficient work.

The Executive Secretary attended 17 state meetings during 1982. The growth of the Free Will Baptist work was not spectacular in 1982, but the recorded progress was encouraging.

Visits were made to the following prospective convention sites:

1987 Birmingham, Alabama 1988 St. Louis and Kansas City, Missouri 1989 Tampa, Orlando, and Jacksonville, Florida 1990 Phoenix, Arizona

The Alabama State Association voted to host the 1987 National Convention. The Missouri State Association voted to host the 1988 National Convention. The Florida State Association voted to host the 1989 National Convention, and the Arizona District Association voted to host the 1990 National Convention. We recommend these future sites for the National Convention:

Birmingham, Alabama	July 19-23, 1987
Kansas City, Missouri	July 17-21, 1988
Tampa, Florida	July 16-20, 1989
Phoenix, Arizona	July 15-19, 1990

The recommendations through 1990 should help us obtain better rates for convention facilities. This will also give the host state longer to prepare, promote and provide funds for the scheduled conventions.

We praise the Lord that the convention fund deficit has been erased. The

proposed 1983 convention budget is \$49,819.35.

The first edition of the Free Will Baptist Yearbook, which included 1982 Minutes and 1983 Church Directory, was released this spring. Randall House did an excellent job publishing this first edition of the Free Will Baptist Yearbook. Randall House has agreed to publish the 1984 Free Will Baptist Yearbook under the same arrangements as the 1983 edition.

The annual Leadership Conference sponsored by the Executive Office has proven to be a rewarding experience. The 1982 Conference was held December 8-10 at the Executive Inn, Nashville, Tennessee with 69 attendees from 16 states. The theme of the conference was "Looking at Leadership". The 1983 Leadership Conference is set for December 7-9 in Nashville. Each state association is encouraged to send its Moderator, Promotional or Executive Secretary and General Board member.

CONTACT subscriptions numbered 7,710 on June 1, 1983. Complimentary copies are provided for students at Hillsdale FWB College, California Christian College and Free Will Baptist Bible College during the school year.

Cooperative receipts totaled \$759,379 for 1982 compared to \$471,492 in 1981. New brochures on the Cooperative Channel are available and may be obtained by writing the Executive Office, P.O. Box 1088, Nashville, Tennessee 37202. The Alabama State Association, during its 1982 session, adopted the Cooperative Plan as the method to provide funds for denominational ministries. A number of local churches in states where the Cooperative Plan has not been implemented have voted to utilize this plan to enable our constituency to fully and fairly support systematically the national ministries. Gifts may be given to and through the Cooperative Channel.

Executive Church Bonds continues to operate on a limited basis. We help

those churches in states where we are permitted to operate.

The National Association of Free Will Baptists was incorporated on

August 17, 1982.

Conflict, controversy, and criticism have been a part of the Free Will Baptist heritage and history. At the present time some differences and dissatisfactions exist in our denomination. Let us continue to pray that God will work out His perfect will as we seek to resolve the difficulties, disagreements, and differences. When we consider our distinctiveness and diversity, it is natural and normal that differences, disagreements and difficulties should arise. Sometimes these are helpful and healthy rather than harmful, since they enable us to examine more closely our priorities, purposes, and programs.

We appreciate the systematic and sacrificial support you have given to the various offices, departments, and commissions of the National Association

during 1982.

A denomination is not to be measured by the presence or absence of problems, but how well it is able to resolve such problems in a manner which brings honor and glory to God. May God give us wisdom as we allow His Will to work out in His Way for His glory and our good.

Notes to Financial Statements

February 28, 1983 and 1982

The Board operates under the auspices of the National Association of Free Will Baptists and is governed by a board of directors.

(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost or market, with cost being determined by use of the first-in, first-out method.

Depreciation

Depreciation of property, plant and equipment is provided on the straightline method based on estimated useful lives (see note 3).

(6) Commitments

Leases

Under the provisions of Statements of Financial Accounting Standards No. 13, leases are classified as capital or operating leases. Capital leases are defined as those that meet one or more of the following criteria: a) transfers ownership of the property to the lessee by the end of the lease term; b) contains a bargain purchase option; c) the lease term is equal to 75% or more of the economic life of the leased property; d) the present value at the beginning of the lease term of the minimum lease payments equals or exceeds 90% of the fair value of the leased property to the lessor at the inception of the lease over investment tax credits retained by the lessor. All other leases are classified as operating leases.

(a) Capital Leases:

The Board leases certain autmotive and office and administrative equipment under capital leases. These assets are being amortized over their estimated useful lives. The obligations are being amortized by that portion of annual rentals in excess of interest.

The plan has not been actuarially evaluated; therefore, information as to the amount required to fund actuarially computed prior service costs, and the amounts of actuarial present value of vested and non-vested benefits have been omitted.

We are grateful to the many faithful pastors and lay people who do take seriously our Lord's command: "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15).

We acknowledge with gratitude that the various state and national denominational agencies and colleges have made significant contributions to foreign missions through services, gifts and training of missionaries.

The Woman's Auxiliary continues to maintain a strong missions thrust. Special projects, the provision closet, missions programs and special emphasis on prayer for missionaries are evidences of a worldwide vision and commitment. Thank you, ladies.

These were officially appointed to missionary service in 1982: Ken and Judy Bailey (Japan); Cathy Crawford (France); Terry and Jamie Eagleton (Brazil) and Robert and Pam West (Ivory Coast).

The following were approved for Missionary Internship: Stan and Brenda Bunch, Mark and Donna Daniel, John and Kay Metcalf, Lynn Midgett, Darrel and Lila Nichols and Steve and Becky Riggs.

Some resignations were submitted in 1982: Bobby and Sue Aycock after 22 years in Brazil accepted a teaching post at Free Will Baptist Bible College; June Arnold, who was in her first term in Panama, got married; Harold Critcher, after 15 years as director of finance, opened a family business; Howard and Joan Filkins, after eight years in Ivory Coast, returned to meet family responsibilities and Joe and Barbara Haas, after 16 years in France accepted positions with Southeastern Free Will Baptist College.

We appreciate the contributions each of these has made to the cause of Christ in foreign missions during their years with the department and wish them God's best in their new endeavors.

Thirteen students served as summer missionaries on various fields.

Selected News Briefs From 1982 Reports

FROM BRAZIL—Dave and Pat Franks resumed their ministry in Belo Horizonte in August. Dave also assumed supervision of the churches in Lafaiete (Deeds on furlough) and Barbacena (church Aycocks left).

January and July youth camps were fruitful—56 decisions, at least 18 for salvation.

Two missionaries led congregations in building programs—Earnie Deeds in Lafaiete and Jim Sturgill in Campinas.

Antonio Silva received a diploma in Bible and theology. Several others graduated from the Bible institute program which Bobby Poole heads in Ribeirao Preto.

The church in Uberlandia continued to make solid growth during the Tom Hugheses' furlough under the leadership of National Pastor Luiz Ferreira.

FROM CUBA—The Cuban Association of Free Will Baptists celebrated their 40th anniversary. Mrs. Mabel Willey was there to speak. Almost 400 people gathered for the convention to praise God for what He had done in the past 40 years. They voted to raise \$10,000 to reconstruct Cedars of Lebanon, the institute property. "I sat on the platform and wept," said Mrs. Willey, "That out of their poverty, they gave!"

FROM FRANCE—The church in Rennes is completely indigenous. Gerard Tynevez is giving capable pastoral leadership. Lynn Miley reported record attendance in Lorient (in the 30's).

Allan Crowson and Tom McCullough assumed pastoral responsibilities in Nantes and St. Nazaire respectively while Murrays and Gibbses were on furlough.

France reported 19 new converts in 1982.

FROM INDIA—According to a May report from Carlisle Hanna, five men were ordained to the ministry on March 28 at the church in Sonapurhat.

Carlisle wrote, "This was, I believe, the most precious service I have ever attended."

FROM IVORY COAST—The 14th annual conference of Free Will Baptist churches in Ivory Coast was held in July at Bouna. Seven regional associations of churches brought reports and every session was conducted in French, Lobi and Koulango. A national youth organization was formed.

Anany Victor was officially installed as pastor of the Bondoukou church

on February 28, 1982. The church built a parsonage.

Eddie Payne reported in March that about 30 young people had been saved in the past three or four months in Bouna, most of them through the witness of the young men students.

Jimmy Aldridge was involved almost totally in developing Christian leaders. He taught seminars at Doropo, Nassian and Bouake and conducted a training program in the Bondoukou area.

Ivory Coast reported 196 new converts in 1982.

FROM JAPAN—The Kita Hiroshima Chapel called Uemori San, layman moderator of the Hokkaido Association of Free Will Baptists, as their lay pastor in the absence of Jerry Banks. Janice Banks was advised to take a medical furlough which began in July of 1982.

Fred Hersey reported growth in the Iriso church and the need to build. FROM PANAMA—Larry Inscoe reported 14 conversions in the Las Tablas area of Panama during the first half of 1982. There were 32 baptisms in Panama during the year.

Steve Lytle's congregation in Panama City averaged 50 in preaching services. First Free Will Baptist Church in Panama City is under national leadership.

FROM SPAIN—The Ron Callaways and Dennis Owens launched a new work

in the city of Mostoles, suburb of Madrid.

The Free Will Baptist Church of Alcala de Henares celebrated their sixth anniversary on October 3 with 79 people present. Special speaker for the occasion was Robert Owen, pastor of First Free Will Baptist Church in Winter Haven, Florida who is the father of Missionary Dennis Owen.

We praise the Lord for at least 21 conversions in 1982.

FROM URUGUAY—June 18th was a historic day in that the Walter Ellison family departed for Montevideo to begin a work for Free Will Baptists in that capital city.

Paul Robinson reported solid growth and a stabilizing of the work on the frontier.

Total income for 1982 was \$2,143,518 which was \$53,630 under the approved budget. This was, however, an increase of \$88,302 over 1981 income. In view of the recession and the record gain over a previous year in 1981 (\$291,707), the increase was significant. A special "Thank you" to each one who helped make this possible.

The 1983 budget is \$2,527,807. The proposed budget approved by the board for 1984 is \$2,714,688. We recommend its approval and ask for the

prayers and gifts of Free Will Baptists to help us reach the goal.

Regarding the dollars needed for a growing missions thrust, I quote from Brother Eugene Waddell's annual report to me: "From time to time we hear people discuss the risks of becoming 'over extended.' Some think our churches are doing all they can. Some say this is not the time for advancement. I believe the command of our Master, the condition of the whitened harvest fields and the candidates preparing for missions compel us to explore every option and seize every opportunity for spreading the gospel. I believe our existing sources are capable of doubling our missions team in a decade."

Short of the return of our Lord, there is no expiration date on the Great Commission. The spiritual needs of mankind will continue to grow. Opportunities for gospel witness will always abound. The prospect for future missionaries

is bright. We must match these factors with needed resources.

Let us never forget the source of our help and victory. We need to pray the prayer and claim the assurance expressed by David: "Give us help from trouble; for vain is the help of man. Through God we shall do valiantly: for he it is that shall tread down our enemies" (Psalm 60:11, 12).

F. B. Meyer succinctly expressed the substance of these two verses when he wrote, "'Vanity of vanities' is written on all human aid, and on our resolutions and endeavors: but if only we will follow where God leads the way, we shall go from victory to victory. He will fight for us and tread down our foes; as when a strong man tramples down the forest undergrowth, and the little children have but to follow in his steps."

FREE WILL BAPTIST BIBLE COLLEGE REPORT

We have concluded the forty-first year of operation here at the college. This is a time for rejoicing, a time for thanksgiving and a time for reflection. We rejoice in God's mercy and grace. His providence has been evident as He has shown His love and faithfulness. We are thankful for all of His provisions and His special care. Every need has been met and we express our gratitude to the Lord.

As we reflect on the history of the college, we recall many years when the journey has not been easy. However, God has preserved the college, protected it, provided for it and continued to assure us of His love. Someone has said that "the more clearly we see the sovereignty of God, the less perplexed we are by the calamities of men."

Free Will Baptist Bible College belongs to our people. It was established to serve our people's educational needs. It has served by equipping hundreds of young people to effectively give out and exemplify the Gospel through their daily living. The college's service must never be minimized in the minds of our people. The administration, faculty and staff are here to serve you.

There is nothing more thrilling than to see Christian young people develop into strong, mature leaders. This year 569 students enrolled at Free Will Baptist Bible College. They came from 32 states and seven foreign countries. Of this number, 73 graduated from the college on May 12, 1983. We also enrolled 11 in the Graduate School this year. Paul Ketteman and his staff continue to do a fine job in presenting the college to churches and associations across the denomination.

The Development Office, under the direction of Ronald Creech, continues to raise support for buildings and land. This has been another very good year. Our people continue to stand with us so that every need of the college will be met.

Gifts, checkbooks and commitments to the Graduate School total \$166,262.98. Many of you yet need to assist in this new program of study. The Founders' Club remains open until September 1, 1983. (This is for those who give \$1,000 to the Graduate School.) Give what you can, please. Our goal is \$250,000.

The alumni have completed the goal of \$50,000, in gifts and checkbooks, for the Dr. and Mrs. L. C. Johnson Student Loan Fund. Many have given both generously and sacrificially. We are thankful to each loyal alumnus who gave. A new project has been adopted by the Alumni Association: to pay for the 3519

Richland Avenue property. We are grateful for this new project and are happy to state that \$6,400 has already been raised in gifts, checkbooks and

The college's most valuable resource is its faculty and staff. I wish it were possible for me to name and commend each one individually. This is a hard-working team, but one that continues through the years to get along working team, but one that continues through the years to get along harmoniously. My personal thanks is hereby given to each employee of the college. I have never known a finer group of Christian workers than these.

Free Will Baptist Bible College is owned and controlled by the National Association of Free Will Baptists. Special thanks to you who are a part of this body for your prayer, promotion and provision. HOME MISSIONS BOARD REPORT

God gave the National Home Missions Department a good year in 1982. Eleven Home Missionary families were approved to begin new Free Will Baptist churches. They were David Archer, Glenpool, Oklahoma; Steve Cannon, Richmond, Virginia; Mike Criswell, Eugene, Oregon; Gary Elder, Great Bend, Kansas; Hughes Ellis, Paris, Tennessee; Mickey Kirkland, Montgomery, Alabama; Bob Lewis, Colorado Springs, Colorado; Jim Nason, New Durham, New Hampshire; William Reagan, Montreal, Canada; Paul Thompson, Phoenix, Arizona, and Steve Trail, Alexandria, Louisiana. Bob Lewis had completed a previous project in Williamsburg, Virginia.

Nine Home Missionaries led their churches to become self supporting in 1982. The Free Will Baptist Church of Baton Rouge, Louisiana has property, building, bus ministry and a Christian school under the leadership of missionary, Larry Russell. Harley Bennett has a nice building and good congregation in Pocatello, Idaho, where the majority of the population is Mormon. Robert Helms has a good church, a nice building and a Christian school in Evansville, Indiana. Steve Nichols has a new building and some nice people in Greenwood, Mississippi. Buddy Bell has a new building in Lebanon, Tennessee. Glenn Poston went self supporting four years after moving to Millington, Tennessee. Vergel Nolen remodeled the building in Miriam, Kansas. David Bigger built a new church and congregation in Ponca City, Oklahoma. Richard Kennedy led the church in Stockton, California to become self supporting in two years.

Five native workers in Mexico received support during 1982. Jesus De La Rosa operates our school, The Institute of Gold. Apolinar Gomez Mendoza, Gonzalo Medina, Cutberto Herrera, and Augustin Ollervides are native missionary pastors beginning new Free Will Baptist churches in Mexico.

Rev. Bill Fulcher began a Spanish speaking Free Will Baptist church using the facilities of the First Free Will Baptist Church of Houston, Texas.

Eight Free Will Baptist chaplains in the Armed Forces served under the endorsement of the Home Missions Board. They are: LCDR Lee Caudill, Navy; Lt. Robert Cooper, Navy; Major Larry Cusick, Air Force; Captain Walter Golding, Air Force; Captain Larry Lankford; LTC Gerald Mangham, Captain

James Bishop, and Captain Kerry Steedley, all of the Army. Rev. Don R. Pegram resigned as the Home Missions Boards first fulltime director of its Division of Evangelism and Church Growth. In addition to the many tracts, new convert packets, follow up lessons for new converts, and other evangelism materials which were mailed from the office, the Department sponsored fifteen Evangelism Conferences. These were held in Whitney Free Will Baptist Church, Spartanburg, South Carolina; Route 60 Free Will Baptist Church, Kenova, West Virginia; Free Will Baptist Church; Glenwood, Arkansas; Heritage Temple Free Will Baptist Church, Columbus, Ohio; West Tulsa Free Will Baptist Church, Tulsa, Oklahoma; Burdine Free Will Baptist Church, Jenkins, Kentucky; Loudendale Free Will Baptist Church, Charleston, West Virginia; Peace Free Will Baptist Church, Wilson, North Carolina; Free Will Baptist Church, Thayer, Missouri; First Free Will Baptist Church, Emporia, Kansas; Vista Free Will Baptist Church, Van Buren, Arkansas; Grant Avenue Free Will Baptist Church, Springfield, Missouri; Pleasant Acres Free Will Baptist Church, New Bern, North Carolina; First Free Will Baptist Church, Farmington, Missouri, and First Free Will Baptist Church, Bakersfield, California. Good crowds of pastors and laymen attended each conference.

Seventy eight missionary families received salary checks from the National Home Missions Department during 1982. Income reached a record high of \$1,441,076.39. Income for the last 10 years was:

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1—SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies that effect the more significant elements of the Board's financial statements are summarized below. They have been followed on a consistent basis, except as noted in Note 4.

ACCOUNTING BASIS—The Board generally uses the accrual basis of accounting, except on receipts, which are taken into income as received.

NOTE 2-FUND BALANCE

Fund balance is divided into the amount designated for mission use, evangelism, amount designated as savings bonus, church extension loan, net equity in fixed assets, and amount available for general use. Because of the commingling of assets, we were unable to verify the details of the fund balances at December 31, 1982.

NOTE 3—CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

The Board is contingently liable as endorser of note to First American National Bank from Albuquerque FWB Church in the amount of \$3,957.80.

NOTE 4-RELATED ORGANIZATION

During 1982, the Board paid certain expenses for the benefit of Church Extension Loan Fund, Inc., which is related through control. In our opinion, this violates generally accepted accounting principles. The amount is undetermined, but it is felt that it would be rather immaterial when considered in relation to the total expenditures of the Board.

EXPLANATION OF NOTE 4.

The auditor is referring to the fact that no salaries or office expenses were charged to the Church Extension Loan Fund which is a separate account from the regular account of the Department. These expenses were absorbed through the General Fund of the Home Missions Department to keep the expenses at a minimum for the Church Extension Loan Fund so the fund can grow more rapidly.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 1982

NOTE 1—ORGANIZATION

The Free Will Baptist Foundation, Inc., was incorporated under the laws of the State of Tennessee on September 19, 1980 as a non-profit organization. It is a branch of and serves the National Association of Free Will Baptists. It is expected to be exempt from income taxes under the exempt status of the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

NOTE 2—BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The Foundation's policy is to keep its books and prepare its financial statements on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements. Under this basis, certain revenues and the related assets are taken into accounts when collected rather than when earned. Likewise, certain expenses and the related liability is taken into accounts when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred.

NOTE 3-NOTES PAYABLE

The Foundation owes the Board of Retirement and Insurance \$14,800.00 for money borrowed from them as of December 31, 1982.

REPORT OF BOARD OF RETIREMENT AND INSURANCE

One way to appreciate where you are is to consider where you have been. Looking back to our beginnings in 1969, I see how far we have come in 13 years.

Every year we experienced a good increase in assets. Year 1982 was no exception. Total assets increased over \$9,000.00 weekly, a 21% increase over year 1981.

We reached two milestones since we met last year. Participant pension accounts topped \$2 million, and benefits in excess of \$100,000 were disbursed to retired and disabled pastors and widows.

As the needs of our constituency grow and retirement needs vary, our pension plan must be upgraded. Some significant changes will be made effective January 1, 1984. Changes anticipated include:

- -liberalization of the vesting schedule
- -development of a plan for member contributions of before-tax dollars
- —deferral of taxes on earnings from member contributions deposited before December 31, 1983

As these changes are made, details will be mailed to every member.

We continue to invest our funds in loans to churches and denominational agencies, especially mission boards for building mission churches.

Life insurance, health insurance and travel protection are available for every pastor. We presently carry \$5.5 million in life insurance coverage. The Board has spent much time looking into a better hospitalization and major medical plan. At the time I write this report, we are still searching.

We are grateful for your gifts. Your support is vital for the continued success of this ministry.

SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of the Board's major accounting policies which have been consistently applied and are presented in order to assist in evaluating the Board's financial statements and other data contained in this report.

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The Board uses generally accrual basis of accounting.

The Board also uses fund accounting which accounts for assets, liabilities, income and expense by specific purposes.

CAPITALIZATION POLICIES

Purchase of capital items are expensed in the Operating Fund. Major items are recorded in the Property Fund as an increase in the fund balance. When an item is retired, its cost is removed from the assets and the fund balance. No depreciation is computed on the properties.

MARKETABLE SECURITIES

Marketable securities are carried at par or face value. The discount or premiums is taken into income at the time of purchase.

MASTER'S MEN REPORT

The National Master's Men Board is praising the Lord for the exciting changes in laymen's lives that is visible throughout the denomination. All of 1982 through Spring of 1983 have been months of encouragement through various state sponsored conferences/retreats and the Fifth National Master's Men Conference. With acknowledgement of the Lord's leadership we present the following information:

* SUCCESSFUL FIFTH CONFERENCE

Camp Linden located in Linden, Tennessee is where over 200 Free Will Baptist laymen and pastors from over 19 states met on April 14-16, 1983. A time of relaxation and recommitment was enjoyed by all. Under the theme of "Faithful in Service" each man attended 3 to 12 workshops led by a layman. They also shared in group devotions and took part in recreational state competition. Notes to Financial Statements December 31, 1982 and 1981

The Department operates under the auspicies of the National Association of Free Will Baptists and is governed by a Board of Directors.

(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost or market, with cost being determined by use of the first-in, first-out method.

Depreciation

Depreciation of property and equipment is provided on the straight-line method, based on estimated useful lives (see note 2).

Income Taxes

The Department is exempt from Federal income taxes; accordingly, no provision for in rome taxes is made in the accounts.

(2) Property and Equipment

Depreciation charged to operations, computed on the straight-line method amounted to \$1,047.73 in 1982 and \$695.03 in 1981.

The Organization had a deficit in unrestricted fund balance of \$14,211.26 and \$10,870.05 at December 31, 1982 and 1981, respectively. Management states the following actions have been taken to meet future cash needs and to rebuild unrestricted fund balance:

- (1) Budgetary revisions will be made to reduce expenditures for the year ending December 31, 1983, and
- (2) The Organization will receive an increase in the monthly allocation from the Cooperative Program of the National Association of Free Will Baptists for the year ending December 31, 1983.

WOMAN'S NATIONAL AUXILIARY REPORT

The 48th annual session of the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention was held July 19, 1983, in the Union Room, Hyatt Regency Hotel, Columbus,

Total registration was 774. Present enrollment is 10,420 representing 23

state conventions, 3 districts, and 4 locals.

Speakers were Delilah Scott, West Virginia, and Mike Cousineau, Ivory Coast. Dr. Dorothy Sample spoke at the fellowship dinner with 700 present.

The convention theme, "Enriched By Knowledge," and our watchword, "...in everything ye are enriched by him ... in all knowledge," emphasizes the fact that our lives can be richer through a study of the Word and of other good literature.

In keeping with the presidential proclamation making 1983 "The Year of the Bible," we are encouraging our women to read the Word through this

year, applying its teachings to their lives.

For the first time we are offering Bible Correspondence Courses written by one of our own-Mrs. Mildred Daniel. Mrs. Daniel is well qualified. She is a Free Will Baptist, has an E.T.T.A. Teacher's certificate, has completed leadership/training courses offered by the International Sunday School Association, has completed the Institute in Basic Youth Conflicts course, taught Bible clubs in Michigan public schools, taught Bible studies for over 30 years and graduated from the Birmingham Bible Institute with a diploma in Bible.

Other New Literature

There are new study course books, plays, installations, tracts, theme bulletin covers, catalogs, and a lovely new book of poetry, "Tapestry," which was compiled from this years creative arts contest.

Creative Arts Contest

There were 250 entries from 82 women from 19 states and one foreign country. There were 23 winners (14 first time).

Publications

"The Minister's Wife" (a newsletter) is published biannually and is sent without charge to 2500 minister's wives.

Co-Laborer magazine circulation is approximately 18,000. Mrs. Lorene

Miley is editor.

Retreats

Last September 1,085 women from 22 states registered for the WNAC retreat held in Hot Springs, Arkansas. It was a glorious time of worship,

prayer, praise and fellowship! Our speakers and seminar leaders were the best.

September 6-8, 1984 are the dates of the next WNAC national retreat. It will be held at the Ridgecrest Baptist Conference Center, situated in the heart of the picturesque Blue Ridge Mountains, 18 miles east of Asheville, NC. We are expecting at least 1,200 women.

Prices, which will include hotel, meals, and registration will be released within a few weeks. Reservations may be sent as early as January, 1984 by writing Ridgecrest Baptist Conference Center, P.O. Box 128, Ridgecrest, NC 28770.

WNAC Emphasis Observance

I would like to thank those pastors who so willingly allow time in their church program for the women to present our WNAC Emphasis program.

Since WNAC is supported entirely by our women, we are dependent on this annual observance.

Betty Reeves is the author of our very interesting program this year. It is entitled "Down by the Riverside."

Contributions

We had a record-breaking year. Cash gifts to missions, missionary objectives, and Bible Colleges were \$271,932.26. Non-cash gifts were \$51,844.77 including \$38,802.54 in gifts to the missionary provision closet. Total cash and non-cash gifts were \$323,777.03. An increase over last year of \$38,906.75.

Total cash receipts were \$306,069.32. Disbursements \$294,227.87. Cash

balance May 31, 1983, \$89,928.05.

Student Loan receipts were \$9,738.58. Disbursed \$10,000 in 18 student loans.

RADIO-TELEVISION COMMISSION REPORT

The Radio-Television Study Commission has had two meetings since our assignment, and we make the following report regarding our findings, as to the feasibility of our National Association sponsoring radio and television programs:

First of all we believe there is a need, as well as an opportunity to proclaim the message of salvation, as interpreted by Free Will Baptists. through the medium of radio and television. We believe that such an outreach

is possible.

We discovered that there are several personalities in our ranks with technical expertise that could be used as resource personnel. And even though we have no professional quality TV cameras, such facilities and equipment

could be rented rather than investing in either.

The committee agrees that Nashville, Tennessee, would be a good location for production purposes. We also learned that Free Will Baptist Bible College could make available their facilities and talent to aid in such a project. The Committee feels that this effort or program should in no way be an appendage of any existing department.

The availability of cable TV was pointed out to us. Such time is inexpensive, often free. Reusable video cassettes and radio cassettes would help keep production costs at a low level. A lending library could be provided, with both video and radio cassettes, with the program format allowing time for a local church to add its message targeted to the local situation.

It is our opinion that in order to present an effective image to the listening public, a permanent speaker or host should be designated. However, it was mentioned that rotating speakers could be appointed on a quarterly

basis.

We would also suggest that programs be aired on non-christian stations. Seasonal radio and television specials as well as brief radio spots have been used successfully by man, and perhaps should be considered by us.

In view of our findings and opinions, we, your temporary Study Committee, take the liberty to present the following recommendations:

- 1. That the National Association elect a five (5) member commission to formulate and execute plans to bring into being television and radio programs commensurate to the needs and opportunities of our people.
- 2. That 'pilot' programs (one radio, one television) be prepared to present to the 1984 and 1985 sessions of the National Association respectively.
- 3. That a budget of \$10,000 be approved for the expense of committee meetings, production costs, etc., of the pilot programs.
- 4. That the Secretary Treasurer of the committee be authorized to receive funds for this project and to disburse them at the discretion of the committee.
- 5. That \$2,000 be given by the Executive Department to the Radio-Television Commission and that we invite churches, Sunday School classes, and individuals to give to this fund so that our budget may be raised soon, and work could begin on the pilot programs.

6. That the Radio-Television Commission be authorized to form a Free Will Baptist Broadcasters Fellowship, with the idea of having periodical seminars on media ministry.

- 3. From the following local churches reporting directly to this body with the right to one delegate each: Waipahu Free Will Baptist in Hawaii; Riverview Free Will Baptist in Bettendorf, Iowa; First Free Will Baptist in Billings, Montana.
- 4. We recommend that the delegates from the three above mentioned categories be seated. We further recommend that all other delegates properly registered from local churches comprising the above association be seated.
- We recommend that all legally appointed lay delegates of standing boards be seated, if properly registered.

HISTORICAL COMMISSION REPORT

The Commission's 1983 project was to boost support for Dr. William Davidson in his effort to prepare an expanded Free Will Baptist history and to finalize preparation for publishing the 50-Year Record, Volumes I, II.

Dr. Davidson is in the final manuscript preparation stage of his book. Officials expect the new book to be available for purchase no later than the

1984 National Convention.

Commission Chairman Alton Loveless made two mailings concerning the oral history project and received several responses suggesting names of older Free Will Baptists who should be interviewed.

The Commission has an instrument prepared by Dr. Mary Wisehart to aid researchers in gathering Free Will Baptist oral history. Copies of the pre-interview questionnaire and instructions on how to conduct an interview

are available on request.

All national departments have agreed to cooperate in publishing a twovolume project in 1985, the 50-Year Record. Deadline for gathering data to be included in Volume I is July 1, 1984. The material goes to press January 1, 1985.

Volume I will be available when the 1985 National Convention meets in Nashville. This volume will include a general history of the National Association since 1935, department histories, and appropriate photographs. It will be

approximately 150 pages in length.

Volume II will be available after the convention. It will basically be expanded minutes of the 1985 National Convention and will include the usual account of proceedings and digest of report materials. In addition, Volume II will list the names of all registrants, including delegates and visitors, as well as major addresses and photographs of the convention.

The Commission's 1984 project is to continue preparations for publishing the 50-Year Record, including writing a general history of the National

Association since 1935 for publication in the 50-Year Record.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

I. WHEREAS, the Supreme Court of the United States in its decision of May 24, 1983, denied tax exemption for Bob Jones University and Goldsboro Christian School, and

WHEREAS, this decision was in blatant opposition to the First Amendment of the Constitution of the United States of America which guarantees the free exercise of religion for all, and

WHEREAS, the court's decision was based on such arbitrary and nebulous principles as "public policy," "public benefit" and "Overriding government interest," and

WHEREAS, this basis of opinion cuts to the heart of our Constitution and denies the absoluteness of our religious freedom,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we agree to stand with these two institutions in prayer and send them a letter stating our support of their right to exercise religious freedom, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we petition the Congress of the United States to enact legislation that will reverse the Supreme Court's decision, and that we petition all those in political high places both national and state to support the passage of such legislation that will reestablish for us our long held convictions of "religious freedom" and "free exercise." Adopted

II. WHEREAS, at the 1982 meeting of the National Association of Free Will Baptists in Fort Worth, Texas, the following resolution was passed:

Whereas in recent months there have been deep concerns among us over the wine issue, and

Whereas these concerns have evoked various states and/or local groups to pass resolutions of concerns sent to this body, and

Whereas all of the parties involved in the wine issue have declared their belief in teetotalism and wholly condemn the use of any form of alcoholic beverages, and

Whereas to attempt to agree on the interpretation of all scriptural references to wine would only lead to divisiveness, and

Whereas, all parties involved in the wine issue believe that Jesus Christ was absolutely sinless;

Be it therefore resolved that this body re-commit itself to the statement on alcoholic beverages found in our church covenant, and that such statements be accepted as an adequate answer to our concerns on the wine issue.

Be it further resolved that since the drinking of alcoholic beverages is one of our nation's greatest problems and since it is a most sensitive issue among Free Will Baptists, that any and all who speak and/or teach on the subject take such sensitivity into account and be cautious accordingly.

WHEREAS, there continues to be those in our fellowship who are unhappy with that decision, and there continues to be division and dissension in our denomination,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that a study committee consisting of ten men be appointed by the National Association of Free Will Baptists to study this issue and endeavor to develop a workable statement to be presented at the 1984 session of the Convention that will bring harmony to our fellowship. An objection to considering this item was sustained.

III. WHEREAS, the National Association of Original Free Will Baptists, being comprised of about 2,500 churches throughout the United States of America, with approximately 5,409 ordained and 700 licensed ministers;

WHEREAS, this Association with its delegates and ministers wish to endorse President Reagan's peace efforts in his attempt to thwart Communist aggression; and

WHEREAS, it is our conviction and belief that President Reagan is correct in building the "B-1 Bomber," the "Cruise," and the "MX-Missile;" and

WHEREAS, it is our further belief that if some immediate action is not taken, those of the Christian faith will not be allowed to pray publicly anywhere in the world, much less public schools.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Original Free Will Baptists at the National Association, hereby fully give their support to President Reagan's "Peace through strength" movement and urge other denominations across the United States to take this stand.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution be sent to President Reagan and each member of the United States Congress. Adopted

IV. WHEREAS, there is a doctrine that is believed by some Free Will Baptists that; Jesus made/drank/gave to others wine which had alcohol content, and (Ref. John 2:1-12; Matthew 26:27; Mark 14:23; Luke 22:27).

WHEREAS, it is not the intent of this resolution to attack those who believe this doctrine or his or her conviction on this subject since it is their right to believe what they wish, and

WHEREAS, this doctrine does do violence to the doctrine of the principles of the Holiness of God and also violates the scripture that forbids the use of wine with alcohol content, and

WHEREAS, it has not been established which doctrine that the majority of Free Will Baptists believe, namely; Jesus DID or DID NOT make/drink/or give to others wine with alcohol content,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this body vote to establish which doctrine they will hold to be Biblical.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that if this body by majority vote established that it DOES NOT believe the doctrine to be Biblical that Jesus made/drank/or gave to others wine with alcohol content, then those that believe that he did who hold positions as teachers in our college or are board members resign or be dismissed. Objection to Consideration was sustained by the body.

V. WHEREAS, the Tax Reform Act of President Reagan has brought a direct tax on the churches of America effective January 1, 1984, by charging social security taxes on church employees other than the ordained ministers, and

WHEREAS, the power to tax is the power to control and own the church,

WHEREAS, this nation was founded with a respect for and appreciation of the church expressed by tax-exemption due to the church's contribution to the moral well-being of society.

BE IT RESOLVED that our churches express our dissatisfaction to various legislators regarding this tax being levied against churches. Adopted

VI. WHEREAS, the National Association in its 1982 session failed to reaffirm its withdrawal from the National Association of Evangelicals, and

WHEREAS, the Department of Foreign Missions continues to use the services of NAE in placing missionaries on the field,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Executive Committee of the National Association consider a recommendation of renewed affiliation with the National Association of Evangelicals, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that such a recommendation be brought to the body for consideration in the 1984 session. Objection to Consideration was sustained by the body.

VII. BE IT RESOLVED that this body give a standing vote of appreciation to the Ohio State Association of Free Will Baptists for their hosting the 47th Annual Session of the National Association of Free Will Baptists.
