PROCEEDINGS

The 49th Annual Convention of the National Association of Free Will Baptists met in the Municipal Auditorium, Nashville, Tennessee, July 21-24, 1985. "Focusing on Free Will Baptists" was the theme. Blaine Hughes served as music coordinator, Richard McDonald as organist, and Patsy Gwartney as pianist.

SUNDAY MORNING

Ralph Hampton, Jr., presided at the Sunday School and morning worship service. Harrold Harrison taught the adult Sunday School. Donnie Miles directed the congregation in singing "All Hail the Power" to open the worship service. The Worthington sisters sang "Great is the Lord." The congregation sang "Revive Us Again." Ralph Hampton led the offertory prayer. Howard Gwartney sang a medley of songs written by Free Will Baptists while the offering was received.

The congregation sang the chorus of "Tis so Sweet" and greeted each other with handshakes. Steve Johnson sang "Oh, What a Moment." Herman Hersey, director of the Board of Retirement, was introduced to speak. His subject was "Denominational Stewardship." He read from I Chronicles 29. The four-point message outlined that stewardship recognizes God's ownership of all things, requires absolute love for God, results in willing service, and realizes giving is unto the Lord.

At the close of the message, announcements were made and the service dismissed.

MONDAY EVENING

The Monday evening session opened with remarks by Milton Worthington who presided at the service.

A musical group from Free Will Baptist Bible College sang "We Shall Rise." Blaine Hughes led the congregation in singing "Tis the Old Time Religion." Milton Worthington led in prayer.

The Mass Adult Choir, under the direction of Doug Little, sang "The Travelin' Medley."

Clerk Waldo Young called the 49th annual convention of the National Association of Free Will Baptists into official session and introduced Moderator Bobby Jackson.

Following remarks to the congregation, the moderator announced the appointment of committees.

Nominating Committee: Malcolm Fry, Fred Hall, Billy Hanna, Lynn Wood and Ray Gwartney.

Resolutions Committee: Garnett Reid, David Sutton, Milton Fields, Duane Scott and Nathan Ruble.

Raymond Riggs, Tennessee executive secretary, brought the welcome address. Blaine Hughes led the congregation in singing "Victory in Jesus." As the offering was received, the congregation again sang "Victory in Jesus" and "Blest Be the Tie."

Soloist Bill Gardner sang "Does Jesus Care." Milton Worthington introduced L. C. Johnson to bring the message. His subject was "Remembering the Past." Announcements were made after the message. The Gospeliers Quartet closed the service by singing "Heartaches."

TUESDAY EVENING

Jack Richey presided at the Tuesday evening service. He called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. The Harvesters Quartet from Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College

sang "Brethren, We Have Met to Worship." I. L. Stanley led the congregation in singing "To God Be the Glory." Jack Richey led in prayer.

The congregation sang "At the Cross."

Rusty Russell played a trombone solo as the convention offering was received. The choir sang "King of Kings," directed by Doug Little. The congregation sang

"He Lives."

Carl Sullivan sang "The Little Boy from the Carpenter's Shop." Alton Loveless, promotional secretary for Ohio Free Will Baptists, was introduced to bring his message, "Reviewing the Present." He read Matthew 10:1-7. The service closed with announcements and prayer by Jack Richey.

WEDNESDAY MORNING

The moderator called the session to order at 9:00 a.m. He read Leviticus 25:8-17, brought devotional thoughts on the Year of Jubilee and led in prayer.

The clerk read the Credentials Committee report. A motion carried to adopt the

report and seat the delegates.

The clerk read Item 1 of the General Board recommending the reports of the various departments. A motion carried to receive the partial report of the General Board and hear the department reports.

Melvin Worthington gave the Executive Office report. A motion carried to receive

the report and adopt the budgets.

General Director Rolla Smith gave the Foreign Missions Department report. He presented plaques to Laura Belle Barnard, Mabel Willey and Raymond Riggs in recognition of their pioneer work and years of service to foreign missions. A historical review of the Foreign Missions Department was given. Jimmy Aldridge, overseas secretary, gave a brief report of Advance Celebration.

Rolla Smith announced his retirement effective April 1, 1986. Bill Jones, Board chairman, announced that Associate Director Eugene Waddell will succeed Rolla Smith as general director of the Foreign Missions Department. Eugene Waddell brought brief remarks. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

The congregation gave a standing vote of appreciation to Rolla Smith, Raymond Riggs, Laura Belle Barnard and Mabel Willey, and a vote of encouragement to the new director-elect, Eugene Waddell.

President Charles Thigpen gave the report of Free Will Baptist Bible College. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

A partial report of the Nominating Committee was heard to fill a Board of Trustees vacancy resulting from the resignation of J. D. O'Donnell. J. M. Creech was elected to fill the term which expires in 1990.

Roy Thomas gave the Home Missions Department report. Agnes Frazier, present for the meeting, was recognized as one of the first members of the Home Missions Board. George and Maurine Lee were recognized as some of the first home missionaries. Claudie Hames and J. E. Blanton, who could not be re-elected to the board, were recognized for their service to home missions.

A standing vote of appreciation was given for Mrs. Frazier, the Lees, J. E. Blanton and Claudie Hames. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget. Milburn Wilson (CA), Glen Thomas (GA) and Larry Russell (LA), were elected to

six-year terms on the Home Missions Board.

James Vallance gave the Master's Men report. W. C. Combs was recognized for his service on the Master's Men Board. Recognition was also given to Howard Gwartney and the Master's Hands Project, and to Charles Denman, national ushering chairman 1982-1985. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

Howard Gwartney (OK), Tim Jordan (GA) and Paul Moore (IL), were elected to

six-year terms on the Master's Men Board.

Herman Hersey gave the Board of Retirement report. A motion carried to receive

the report and adopt the budget.

Ron Barber (OK), Glen Wright (TN) and Milton Hollifield (NC) were elected to six-year terms on the Board of Retirement. Jack Daniel (GA) was elected to fill the unexpired term of Dennis Kern who resigned. This term expires in 1989.

Herman Hersey gave the Benevolent Committee report, including a recommendation to continue the committee for one year. A motion carried to receive the report

and continue the committee.

Leroy Forlines gave the Commission on Theological Liberalism report. A motion was made and seconded to receive the report and adopt the budget. Since constitutional changes were involved, a motion carried to postpone the recommendations for one day.

Edwin Wade (OK) was elected to serve a five-year term on the commission.

The meeting recessed for lunch.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

At 1:30 p.m. the Association was called to order by the Moderator.

Ralph Hampton, Jr., read II Timothy 3:1-17; 4:1-4 and led in prayer.

Roger Reeds gave the Sunday School and Church Training Department report which was accompanied by an audio-visual presentation. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

George Lee gave the Radio-Television Commission report. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget. Larry Hampton was elected to a five-year

term on the Radio-Television Commission.

The clerk read a partial report of the General Board, Item 2. Melvin Worthington gave the Hymn Book Study Committee report. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the recommendations.

Item 3. Melvin Worthington gave the report of the Target 90 Committee. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the recommendations.

Item 4. The placement (sites and dates) for National Conventions through 1995. A motion carried to adopt Item 4.

A motion carried to recess until 9:00 a.m. Thursday, one hour and five minutes ahead of schedule.

WEDNESDAY EVENING

Presider Tom Lilly called the service to order. Southeastern Free Will Baptist College ensemble gave the call to worship, singing "Come, Praise the Lord."

Henry Van Kluyve led the convention in singing "The Banner of the Cross."

Tom Lilly led in prayer.

The Men's Chorale, directed by Vernon Whaley and featuring Bill Gardner, sang"I

Find No Fault in Him.'

Bill Jones, chairman of the Foreign Missions Board, presented a \$1,000 check to retiring Director Rolla Smith, a bouquet of red roses to Mrs. Smith, and a plaque for their years of service.

John Neal conducted the instrumental ensemble during the offertory. The offering

was designated for missions.

Henry Van Kluyve led the convention in singing "Wonderful Grace of Jesus."

Bobby Jackson was introduced to speak. John Gibbs sang a medley of songs before the message. Bobby Jackson then spoke on the subject, "Realizing Our Potential." Several people responded to the invitation and came forward for prayer.

The missions offering totaled \$17,977.40. After announcements, the service was dismissed.

THURSDAY MORNING

The moderator called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. Jerry Dudley read Philippians 4:1-8, brought devotional thoughts and led in prayer.

Cleo Pursell gave the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention report. A motion

carried to receive the report.

A partial report of the Resolutions Committee, Item 1, was read and adopted. A standing vote of appreciation was given for Mrs. Pursell, recognizing her 22 years of service as WNAC executive secretary-treasurer.

David Joslin gave the Historical Commission report. A motion carried to receive the report. Steve Hasty was elected as the five-year member of the Historical

Commission.

Since this was the 50th anniversary of the organization of the National Association, those who were present for the first meeting in 1935 were recognized. They included Ralph Staten, Mrs. Luther Reed, Agnes Frazier, Mary Elizabeth Griffith, Ethel Burroughs and Jessie Parsons. A motion carried to record these names in the minutes showing that they were present at both the organization in 1935 and present at the 50th anniversary meeting in 1985.

The moderator brought the postponed recommendations of the Commission On Theological Liberalism to the floor. A motion carried to adopt the recommendations

and change the by-laws of the constitution in the Treatise accordingly.

The report of the Registration Committee was given. A motion carried to receive the report.

The report of the Budget Committee was given by Melvin Worthington. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the percentage allocations.

The final report of the Resolutions Committee was given. Item 2 was read. A motion carried to amend this resolution by adding the words "to the major television networks." A motion carried to adopt Item 2 as amended.

Item 3 was read. A motion carried to adopt this resolution and give a standing vote of appreciation to the Tennessee State Association.

A motion carried to recommend that in planning future conventions the Executive Committee consider providing nursery services.

The final report of the Nominating Committee was given. Keith Burden was elected assistant clerk. Waldo Young was elected clerk. Ralph Hampton, Jr., was elected assistant moderator. Bobby Jackson was elected moderator.

Jerry Dudley was thanked for serving as assistant clerk during this session in the

absence of Keith Burden. A motion carried to give a standing vote of appreciation to the Executive Committee, all officers and those working behind the scenes, for this golden anniversary convention of the National Association.

A motion carried to adjourn.

Ralph Hampton, Jr., led in the dismissal prayer. Adjournment came at 10:10 a.m.

THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY'S REPORT 1985

The Review

The Executive Office mandate dates from 1941. The office functions under the General Board to implement directives and plans voted by the National Association. Eight men have served as Executive Secretary since 1941—

The ministry of the Executive Office has been primarily administrative and service-related in direct relationship to the ministries of the local church, the district and state associations, and the departments, commissions and auxiliaries of the National Association. All Executive Office functions are designed to assist these organizations in evangelism, education and edification.

The office publishes CONTACT, promotes the cooperative plan and plans the National Convention while coordinating and correlating the ministries of the National Association.

The Report

The Executive Office has functioned smoothly since the 1984 National Convention in Little Rock, Arkansas.

We commend the Executive Office staff—Bookkeeper Melody Hood, Editorial Assistant Marilyn Pritchard, Maintenance Chief Jack Trotter, CONTACT Circulation Manager Geneva Trotter, Executive Assistant and Editor Jack Williams, and part-time workers Nancy Smith and Anne Worthington.

The Executive Secretary attended 16 state associations during 1984. Each state recorded continued progress. A cooperative, congenial and compassionate spirit prevailed during the meetings.

Site inspections were made at seven convention cities—Charlotte, NC (1995), Charleston, WV (1991), Biloxi, MS (1991), Indianapolis, IN (1992), Tulsa, OK (1986), Nashville, TN (1985) and Houston, TX (1992). Other site inspections will be made as time permits.

A complimentary copy of the 1985 Free Will Baptist Yearbook, printed by Randall House, was mailed to each church in April. Additional copies may be ordered from Randall House.

The 1984 Leadership Conference, sponsored by the Executive Office, met December 5-7 in Nashville, Tennessee. More than 100 attendees from 21 states heard Robert Picirilli, Jim McAllister, David Sutton, Randy Cox and Earl Hendrix develop the theme "Guidelines for Growth." Evangelist Bobby Jackson, moderator of the National Association, presided.

The 1985 Leadership Conference will be sponsored by the national departments in conjunction with the Executive Office. We urge each state to send its promotional director/executive secretary, moderator, assistant moderator, clerk and General Board member to the December 4-6 meeting.

Executive Church Bonds continues to operate on a limited basis. We commend Harold Critcher who serves as trustee for Executive Church Bonds.

Contributions through the Cooperative Channel totaled \$940,490.77 for 1984. Of this amount \$380,000.33 were cooperative gifts and \$560,490.44 were designated gifts.

A growing number of individuals, churches and state associations are using the Cooperative Channel to support denominational ministries.

CONTACT subscribers totaled 7,228 on May 1, 1985. Complimentary copies are provided for students at Free Will Baptist Bible College, Hillsdale FWB College, California Christian College and Southeastern FWB College during the school year. Randall House continues to do an excellent job in printing the magazine.

These recommendations through 1995 should enable us to obtain better rates for convention facilities. This will also give host states longer to prepare, promote and provide funds for the scheduled conventions. Henceforth convention sites will be recommended ten years out.

FOREIGN MISSIONS BOARD REPORT

Taking the gospel to the ends of the earth is a clear Biblical mandate. The Foreign Missions Department provides an opportunity for churches and individual Christians to have a part in fulfilling the Great Commission. For the past 50 years foreign missions has been a strong motivating factor in bringing Free Will Baptists together and a cohesive force in holding us together in spite of many differences.

A retrospective look reveals that thousands have been won to Christ and many churches have been established by Free Will Baptist Missions since Miss Laura Belle Barnard was sent to India in 1935. She was the first Free Will Baptist missionary of the reconstruction. The earlier foreign missions work of Free Will Baptists was lost in 1910 in a major merger with the Northern Baptist Convention—now known as American Baptist Convention.

SPECIAL ASSIGNMENT: Don Allen, Don Dake, Howard Filkins, Harold Price and Jimmy Teague to Ivory Coast in December for five weeks to build two houses and a surgical block at Doropo. Carrol Poole and Don Wilbanks went to Brazil in March for three weeks to help build a dormitory at the camp property (Evangelandia).

PROMOTED IN 1984: John and Kay Metcalf, appointees to Brazil, to heavenly

reward in February from Jackson, Tennessee in auto-truck wreck.

SELECTED 1984 NEWSBRIEFS: The Free Will Baptist church in Uberlandia, Brazil was officially organized in September. Tom and Nancy Hughes began the work in 1977. The Kita Hiroshima church in Japan purchased a house and renovated it for their church building. The Alcala church in Spain under the leadership of Lonnie and Anita Sparks celebrated its eighth anniversary in September. An unusual door of opportunity opened for Jeff and Susan Turnbough in Villalba, Spain. One hundred fifty people were present for the dedication of a rented church building. Sixty people came from the Alcala church and ten from Mostoles where Ron and Linda Callaway work.

During the annual conference in India attendance reached 500. Three hundred sixteen registered delegates and visitors were present for the annual convention of Free Will Baptist churches in Ivory Coast. Many walked—some over 30 miles. Over 100 were present at the annual Panamanian Association of Free Will Baptists to hear reports from churches and conduct business.

Two pastors were ordained in Japan: Reverend Kurosaki, pastor of the Abashiri church and Reverend Sugitani Sensei, pastor of the Bihoro church. The Tokyo church welcomed a new pastor, Reverend Matsumoto.

Reverend Raul Sanes, a 1983 graduate of Rio Grande Bible Institute in Texas, became pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church in Panama City, Panama.

Earnie Deeds completed a decade of continuous airing of the Word of God on the radio in Conselheiro Lafaiete, Brazil.

Several churches responded to the need for emergency relief funds for Ivory Coast and Ethiopia. Defying the Gods, a new film made in the Ivory Coast, was released in December.

ADVANCE CELEBRATION: Foreign missions has designed the Advance Celebration to stimulate an outburst of praise to God for what He has done through Free Will Baptists in nine countries of the world since 1935. Thank God for His abiding presence and protection of our missionaries during these years! Thank Him, above all, for the thousands who have been saved as a result of the Word of God being faithfully proclaimed.

Fundamental churches are coming into existence in many foreign countries today! They are ministering to their own people in a special way! They minister in spite of the organized opposition of Hindus, Muslims, animists, Communists, witch doctors, etc. Praise God for His power to transform the vilest of sinners into saints and give them victory over every obstacle!

These emerging churches offer tremendous opportunities at this moment. Our sacrificial giving over the next three years is the key to strengthening them for greater outreach and growth.

Through the Advance Celebration we seek to raise one million dollars above regular designated monthly support. This money will be invested in evangelistic tools, training programs for national leaders, loan funds and grants for church buildings and in helping 30 new missionaries get to the field over the next five years.

This strategic development will help our young, emerging churches to send this message to their pagan cultures: "The missionaries may leave, but the church of Jesus

Christ is here to stay!"

INTERNSHIP: Experience has taught us the value of some type of internship for our candidates. They need special preparation to learn new languages and adjust to new cultures. The prospective missionary needs experience as well as information to prepare himself to tackle the task of cross-cultural church planting. To meet the needs we are establishing our own internship and orientation program.

Staff members will monitor the progress of candidates during the two years prior to appointment. We will be available to counsel them as often as needed. Candidates will be required to read helpful materials while engaged in practical Christian service.

The training will culminate in a 10-week candidate school. Experienced missionaries and pastors will assist our staff in providing this training. The first session is scheduled for May 27-August 8, 1986.

APPRECIATION: The ministries of Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions are made possible through the faithful prayers and gifts of many churches and individuals.

We appreciate the cooperation and help received from state and national denominational agencies. Special tribute is due the Woman's Auxiliary for continuing to maintain a strong missions emphasis through prayer, offerings, special projects, missionary programs and the provision closet.

Cooperative giving provided \$51,900.33. The Master's Men gave \$8,850 for materials used in building the boys' dormitory in Brazil. Foreign Missions Fellowship at Free Will Baptist Bible College gave \$10,103.00 on Project India. On behalf of the entire department, I express sincere thanks for these and all other gifts and prayers. BUDGET: Income totaled \$2,488,075 in 1984, an increase of \$64,382 over 1983. The U.S. dollar continued stronger in 1984 than expected against foreign currencies. Thus foreign field funds stretched further than projected. This, coupled with some resignations, kept expenses in line with income even though the approved budget was not met.

The 1985 budget is \$2,895,498. The proposed regular budget for 1986 is \$2,976,884. In addition, \$201,526 is included which we hoped to have available in 1986 from the Advance Celebration Project. The combined budget is \$3,178,410.

LOOKING AHEAD: As we praise God for His blessings upon Free Will Baptists over the past 50 years, let us look to the future with courage, eagerness and expectation. God has entrusted Free Will Baptists with material resources and manpower to make significant changes in this sinful world through the faithful proclamation of the gospel of Jesus Christ. Let us give ourselves anew to this task. In doing this, we shall realize our highest destiny as a people of God.

Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 1984

Board of Foreign Missions is operated under the auspices of the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The major accounting principles and practices followed by the Board of Foreign Missions of the National Association of Free Will Baptists are presented below to assist the reader in evaluating the financial statements. The financial statements are presented in accordance with standards recommended in Audits of Certain Nonprofit Organizations, Audit and Accounting Guide (American Institute of Certified Public Accountants).

Fund Accounting

In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Board of Foreign Missions, the accounts of the Board are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified.

The assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Board are reported in self-balancing fund groups as follows:

- (a) Operating Funds Such funds include unrestricted funds available for support of Board operations and restricted funds for support of missions. Unrestricted funds are reported as revenue in the year received or accrued. Restricted funds are recorded as additions to deferred revenue. Such restricted operating funds are recorded as revenues during the period they are expended.
- (b) Plant Funds Such funds represent resources restricted for plant acquisitions and funds expended for plant.

Plant Assets and Depreciation

Uses of operating funds for plant acquisitions are accounted for as transfers to plant funds. Depreciation of equipment is provided over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets on a straight-line basis.

Income Taxes

The Board of Foreign Missions is exempt from income taxes; accordingly, no provision for income taxes has been made in the accompanying financial

(4) Maintenance Fees

The Board charges a fee against the foreign field accounts to reimburse the unrestricted operating fund for information service production expenses. These fees are presented as transfers from the restricted operating fund to the unrestricted operating fund.

(5) Pension

The Board participates in the master pension plan of the Board of Retirement and Insurance of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. The plan is contributory. The policy is to fund pension cost accrued. Pension expenses amounted to \$42,340 in 1984. The net assets of such master plan amount to approximately \$3,520,382 as of December 31, 1984, the latest report date. The plan has not been actuarially evaluated; therefore, information as to the amount required to fund actuarially computed prior service costs, and the amounts of actuarial present value of vested and nonvested benefits have been omitted.

FREE WILL BAPTIST BIBLE COLLEGE REPORT

There is no educational thrust that will place as many trained, qualified workers in local churches than Bible college education. Every student is trained for a definite ministry to the Lord. Those who graduate must earn a major in Bible. There are a goodly number of hours of study of a practical nature which are required of all students. The added dimension of systematic Christian service opportunities is required. Each student is assigned to a regular Christian service responsibility so that he may receive practical learning as well as the theoretical learning in his educational program.

A significant number of pastors in our denomintion have been trained by the college. A very high percentage of foreign and home missionaries have received all, or at least part, of their formal training here at the college. The college takes just as seriously its task to train those who will work at a "secular" job and serve God through local churches as layworkers. Our denomination still needs more workers in each of these categories.

The Lord has sent hundreds of choice students to the college over the years. With very few exceptions they have been truly fine people. These have come from across the length and breadth of the denomination and even from our churches on foreign soil. Year by year these young people have made one of the finest, most joyful student bodies to be found anywhere.

These students have gone forth to live for God, to preach and teach His Word, to evangelize people, to plant churches and to help make the Free Will Baptist denomination all that God wants it to be. These have done their part in extending God's kingdom at home and to the regions beyond.

No school could ever have a moral loyal, faithful, dedicated faculty and staff than Free Will Baptist Bible College. The Lord is to be praised for selecting outstanding people, both spiritually and academically, for service at the college. We thank God for honoring the college with these great Christians who make up the faculty and staff of the college.

Another group must be acknowledged and that is the supporters of the college. These are the faithful prayer warriors, the loyal and generous givers and those who promote the college. These are a great part of the family of friends who make the ministry of the college a reality. The current expenses of the college are not met by governmental support but are supplied by the gracious gifts of God's people. By prayer, financial gifts and kind words of promotion, these supporters have a vital part in teaching and shaping lives for the Lord's service here at the college.

SUNDAY SCHOOL AND CHURCH TRAINING REPORT

REFLECTIONS

The National Association of Free Will Baptists is now fifty years old. I am older. I was nearly seven years old when the historical meeting of organization took place at Cofer's Chapel Free Will Baptist Church. I was not there. I did not attend my first convention of the National Association of Free Will Baptists until 1952. The National Association was only seventeen years old then. I have not missed a convention of the National Association of Free Will Baptists since that time. I have now completed thirty-three years of continuous attendance.

I have observed a lot of things happen over the years. I was there when the Cooperative Plan was adopted in 1953. Our stronger states in the National Association are those that have had a strong Cooperative program over the years.

I was there each time that we elected our last four executive secretaries, Dr. Stan Mooneyham, Dr. Billy Melvin, Rev. Rufus Coffey, and Dr. Melvin Worthington. I was there when we elected each of the following moderators, Rev. E. E. Morris, Dr. Charles Thigpen, Rev. Ralph Staten, Dr. Stan Mooneyham, Dr. Robert Picirilli, Dr. J. D. O'Donnell, and our present moderator, Rev. Bobby Jackson.

I was there in 1953 when the Reverend William Mishler was chosen as the first full time director of the Sunday School Department. I remember his eager anticipation when the Department began to publish their own Sunday school curriculum. I saw all of his dreams crushed when the National Association closed down the Sunday School Department in 1959. That was the year that I was elected to the Sunday School Board of the National Association.

When the newly elected Sunday School Board met to organize in 1959 I was chosen as Secretary-Treasurer of the Board. One of my first responsibilities was to close the office at Nashville. I stood in that office on that warm day in July of 1959 and promised the Lord that some day things would be different. How thankful I am that God has helped me to honor that promise.

I was there in 1961 when the National Association of Free Will Baptists had its first major division. This led to a severance of relations with the Free Will Baptist Press at Ayden, North Carolina. The curriculum business was re-established at Nashville. The office was reopened. I was employed as the full-time director of the Sunday School Department in June of 1962.

At this point I would like to take my eyes off the meetings of the National Association in order that I might scrutinize the work of the Sunday School Department. We have come a long distance since we began again in 1962. Our sales have increased from the thousands to the millions. We have moved four times since we began again. We now occupy our lovely 55,000 square feet building at 114 Bush Road. It is located on $9\frac{1}{2}$ acres of land. It is almost paid for!

I have tried to be unselfish over the years. Immediately after our start again in 1962 I asked that our department be removed from receiving monies from the Cooperative Fund. It was not because I was opposed to the Cooperative Plan. I just felt that we could sustain ourselves from our sales. The 5% of Cooperative funds that we were receiving was divided up among the other departments of the National Association. This has meant thousands of dollars has been sent to the other departments instead of to the Sunday School Department.

Let me move ahead quickly to 1978 because several other things happened then that would affect the other departments of the National Association. In 1978 the

Sunday School Department and the Church Training Service Department was merged. This came about because of the sweet spirit of Dr. Malcolm Fry, the General Director of the Church Training Service Department, and the men who served on his board at that time. The newly created department was called the Sunday School and board at that time. The newly created department was called the Sunday School and Church Training Department of the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

We gave our building at 1134 Murfreesboro Road to the National Association of Free Will Baptists. It is located directly behind the National Office Building. This building is now leased and brings in a revenue excessive of \$2,900.00 monthly. This money is used to help operate the National Office building.

In 1978 the Church Training Department was receiving 15% of the Cooperative Pie. After the merger this percentage was divided among the other departments and

has created additional dollars for them.

In 1971 we began to distribute our literature through bookstores. We share our monies with these bookstores. They receive a 25% discount on all curriculum items and a 40% discount on all non-curriculum items. The following chart will give you some idea of what this profit-sharing means to some states. It shows curriculum discounts for a recent quarter:

A few quick strokes on the calculator will reveal that we share more than \$227,611.96 with these states in one year's time.

In addition we have contractual arrangements with privately-owned bookstores that share some of their profits with the states that they serve. The following chart shows our curriculum profit sharing with them:

This amounts to \$74,660.04 of profit sharing with these stores in one year's time. The above figures do not reflect items that we sell at a 40% discount to state and private stores.

Many of our states would have to close their bookstores if it were not for the curriculum business. We are pleased that we have been able to share with these states

I wish there were some means by which we could measure the main purpose for our existence. We produce Bible-based materials that can be used in evangelization and edification. I wonder how many souls have been won to Christ through our curriculum, tracts, and books? I wonder how many Christians can attribute their

discipleship growth to our curriculum, tracts, and books.

I know that much of my report sounds like the reflections of an old man. I will not admit to being old but I will admit to being older. I trust that I am wiser.

I want to return to my reflections about the number of conventions of the National Association of Free Will Baptists that I have attended. I regret that not all of these meetings could be counted as being peaceable and profitable. I honestly believe that our lack of harmony has hindered our soul-winning and growth.

If Free Will Baptists are to be used of God in the next fifty years we must do some of the following:

- 1. We must lay aside our petty bickering.
- 2. We must strive for spiritual maturity.
- 3. We must evangelize and edify.
- 4. We must strive for a spiritual fervor.
- 5. We must be zealous for the Lord.

If Jesus tarries what will the centennial record have to say about Free Will Baptists? There is the possibility that we might not even exist 50 years from now. Let's go on to be the blessing to America and the world that we should be. If the 100 year record is ever written, I'll be in heaven. I want to thank Free Will Baptists for winning me to Christ. I want to thank you for giving me your pulpits to preach the gospel. I want to thank you for letting me serve Christ by serving you. God Bless you. I love you!

RESPONSES

For the past twenty-three years I have conducted workshops and institutes all across our denomination. I have preached from one ocean to the other and from Mexico to Canada. On two different occasions I have ministered overseas. I must admit that some of my most enjoyable work has come in the past several years. Since the fall of 1982 I have conducted 60 Sunday School Revivals.

These 60 Sunday School Revivals have been conducted as far west as Guymon, Oklahoma and as far east as Morehead City, N.C. I have been to Canada and to the Mexican border. The most frequent question that I am asked is, "What is a Sunday school Revival?" It is simply a series of services that I conduct from Friday night through Sunday morning. Usually I preach on Friday night, conduct two workshops during the day on Saturday, preach again on Saturday night, and then twice on Sunday morning. By closing out at noon on Sunday I can return home in time to be in my office on Monday.

Last year I conducted twenty-one of these Sunday School Revivals. In addition to these meetings I participated in three growth conferences that our department sponsored. We held growth conferences at Goldsboro, N.C.; Dayton, Ohio; and Bryan, Texas. The featured speaker in each of these conferences was Dr. Elmer Towns.

At the time that this report was prepared this year is only three months old and I have already conducted eight Sunday School Revivals. During the weekend of January 11-13, I was with Rev. Mike Russell and the Mascoutah, IL church. The other meetings have been as follows:

Notes to Financial Statements

February 28, 1985 and February 29, 1984

The Board operates under the auspices of the National Association of Free Will Baptists and is governed by a board of directors.

(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost or market, with cost being determined by use of the first-in, first-out method.

Depreciation

Depreciation of property, plant and equipment is provided on the straightline method based on estimated useful lives (see note 3).

The estimated useful lives are as follows:

Building Office and printing equipment 5 - 15 years Automotive equipment 3 - 4 years

Income Taxes

The Board is exempt from Federal and State income taxes; accordingly, no provisions for income taxes is made in the accounts.

(2) Restricted Cash and Bonds Payable

Cash includes \$16,446.76 in 1985 and \$16,383.77 in 1984, which represents deposits with the paying agent for retirement of matured bonds and accrued interest on outstanding bonds. Required annual deposits are as follows

(3) Property, Plant and Equipment

Depreciation and amortization charged to operations computed on the straightline method was \$95,531.57 in 1985 and \$95,320.74 in 1984.

Interdepartmental Transactions

The accompanying financial statements include interdepartmental revenues and expenses of \$651,218.05 in 1985 and \$734,572.26 in 1984, which result from transfers of publications from production to sales departments.

Leases

Under the provision of Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 13, leases are classified as capital or operating leases. Capital leases are defined as those that meet one or more of the following criteria: (a) transfers ownership of the property to the lessee by the end of the lease term; (b) contains a bargain purchase option; (c) the lease term is equal to 75% or more of the economic life of the leased property; (d) the present value at the beginning of the lease term of the minimum lease payments equal or exceeds 90% of the fair value of the leased property to the lessor at the inception of the lease over investment tax credits retained by the lessor. All other leases are classified as operating leases.

The net assets of such master plan amount to approximately \$3,520,382.32 as of December 31, 1984, the latest report date. The plan has not been actuarially evaluated; therefore, information as to the amount required to fund actuarially computed prior service costs, and the amounts of actuarial present value of vested and nonvested benefits have been omitted.

HOME MISSIONS BOARD REPORT

The year 1985 is a "Jubilee Year" for Free Will Baptists as we celebrate 50 years of service, not only in the United States of America, but in several countries around the world. The Free Will Baptist denomination has always had a pioneering spirit and an awareness of the need for planting Free Will Baptist churches in the cities of the North American continent. Since the 1930's men and women with pioneering spirits have blazed trails into virgin territories, carrying with them the saving gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ, and "digging out" Free Will Baptist churches throughout this great nation.

The first Home Missions Board in modern Free Will Baptist history was elected in 1938. Its work was limited to helping "tentmakers" in establishing churches by giving them small honorariums. The first National Home Missionaries were sent out with pay in 1954. Since that time over 200 families have gone out as National Home Missionaries establishing Free Will Baptist churches in the United States, Canada,

Mexico, the Virgin Islands, and Puerto Rico. Twenty five states have been opened by National Home Missionaries beginning churches there. National Home Missionaries have organized churches in 22 capital cities and in scores of other large metropolitan

Eight Home Missionary families were approved in 1984. These were: Cliff Donoho, Salem, Illinois; Kevin Francis, Greeneville, Mississippi; Danny Hester, Bartlesville, Oklahoma; Fred Jones, Mexico; Bob White, Paducah, Kentucky; Bill Reagan, Windsor, Ontario, Canada; Luther Burns, Atlanta, Georgia; and Roy Roach, Zanesville, Ohio.

Two missionaries led their churches to become self supporting in 1984. They were: Bob Shockey, Cannonsburg, Kentucky, and Bill Reagan, Montreal, Quebec, Canada.

Seven national workers in Mexico received support from the National Home Missions Board in 1984. These were: Jesus (Chuy) de la Rosa who serves at the Free Will Baptist Bible Institute, Monterrey, N.L., Mexico; Gonzalo Medina, Cutberto Herrera, Agustine Ollervides, Ruben Munoz, Simon Nieves, and Javier Gallegos are Mexican pastors who are beginning Free Will Baptist Churches in the needy cities of Mexico.

Eight Free Will Baptist chaplains in the armed forces served under the endorsement of the National Home Missions Board. They are Capt. James Bishop, U.S. Army; LTJG David Burgess, U.S. Navy; Lt. Robert Cooper, U.S. Navy; Major Larry Cusick, U.S. Air Force; Major Walter Golding, U.S. Air Force; Capt. Larry Langford, U.S. Army; LTC Gerald Mangham, U.S. Army; and Capt. Kerry Steedley, U.S. Army. Robert Wiant, LTJG, was accepted into the Navy chaplaincy in 1984.

Board of Home Missions is operated under the auspicies of The National Association of Free Will Baptists.

(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The major accounting principles and practices followed by the Board of Home Missions of the National Association of Free Will Baptists are presented below to assist the reader in evaluating the financial statements. The financial statements are presented in accordance with standards recommended in Audits of Certain Nonprofit Organizations an Audit and Accounting Guide (American Institute of Certified Public Accountants).

Fund Accounting

In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Board, the accounts of the Board are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting". This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified.

The assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Board are reported in selfbalancing fund groups as follows:

- a. Operating funds such funds include unrestricted funds available for support of Board operations and restricted funds for support of missions. Unrestricted funds are reported as revenue in the year received or accrued. Restricted funds are recorded as additions to deferred revenue. Such restricted operating funds are recorded as revenues during the period they are expended.
- b. Plant funds such funds represent resources restricted for plant acquisitions and funds expended for plant.

Plant Assets and Depreciation

Uses of operating funds for plant acquisitions are accounted for as transfers to plant funds. Depreciation of equipment is provided over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets on a straight-line basis.

Income Taxes

The Board of Home Missions is exempt from income taxes; accordingly, no provision for income taxes has been made in the accompanying financial statements.

(2) Investments

Investments, consisting of corporate stock, are presented in the financial statements at cost. The market value of the investments at December 31, 1984 was \$10,000.

(3) Note Receivable

Note receivable is as follows:

8% note receivable in monthly installments of principal and interest of \$516.05 from Free Will Baptist Church, Albuquerque, New Mexico, until May 1, 1999, secured by a first mortgage on the property.

(7) Other Asset and Notes Payable

The Board received title to the church buildings and property of the Mosinee, Wisconsin Free Will Baptist Church by assuming debt relating to the property amounting to \$20,910. Such debt is due currently and bears interest at 13,5%.

The Board has contingent liabilities in the amount of approximately \$150,000 for the guarantee of debt relating to certain churches.

(9) Related Party Transaction

The Church Extension Loan Fund, Inc., an affiliated organization, shares the office facilities and administrative staff of the Board of Home Mission at no cost.

The Church Extension Loan Fund, Inc. is operated under the auspices of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. The fund is administered under the direction of the Board of Home Missions. This fund was established primarily to assist churches in their building projects.

(I) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The major accounting principles and practices followed by the Church Extension Loan Fund, Inc. are presented below to assist the reader in evaluating the financial statements. The financial statements are presented in accordance with standards recommended in Audits of Certain Nonprofit Organizations, an Audit and Accounting Guide (American Institute of Certified Public Accountants).

Basis of Financial Statements

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Income Taxes

The Church Extension Loan Fund, Inc. is exempt from income taxes; accordingly, no provision for income taxes has been made in the accompanying financial statements.

(2) Notes Receivable

Notes receivable are as follows:

(3) Revocable Trust

The Fund is recipient of a revocable trust in the amount of \$75,000. The Fund is required to make payments to the beneficiary for 75% of interest earned on the trust funds within certain limitations. Interest paid to the trust beneficiary during 1983 amounted to \$1,096.

(4) Notes Payable

Notes payable, amounting to \$242,075, consist of 7% to 10% demand notes to individuals and churches. Such funds will be loaned to qualifying churches to finance building projects.

(5) Designated Fund Balance

The loan fund received as a contribution additional proceeds, amounting to \$14,895, from the sale of church real property in Anchorage, Alaska. This held in trust to such time that new facilities are acquired.

(6) Related Party Transaction

The Church Extension Loan Fund, Inc. shares office facilities and administrative staff with the Board of Home Missions at no cost.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF RETIREMENT AND INSURANCE

Our motto, "Serving Those Who Serve Us" summarizes our Board's purpose and task. To this end we labor to administer retirement and insurance plans to meet the needs of our ministers, missionaries and employees of our churches, denominational agencies and institutions.

Our pension plan now has over 700 members with deposits to members' accounts averaging \$6,000 a week. Total assets increased \$400,000 or almost thirteen percent during 1984. There are 295 employers who send regular deposits to their pastor's and employees' accounts.

This plan is flexible to meet the changing needs of our pastors. The member may now deposit before-tax dollars with us through a salary reduction agreement. In 1984, the first year these salary reduction agreements were offered, there were 62 in force. There are now 72 agreements. Under the SRA, no taxes are paid now and in retirement our ministers may receive a tax-free housing allowance if they elect an annuity payment.

On June 30th a bonus (good experience) dividend of $1\frac{1}{2}$ % was given to all retirement accounts. This brings the earnings to participants in plan one to 11% for the year. Plan two earns $10\frac{3}{4}\%$ and plan three earns $10\frac{1}{2}\%$. This is the third consecutive year a bonus had been given.

There is a strong demand for church loans. Since the plan was started we have loaned \$3,838,027.15 to our churches. In addition we have purchased church bonds totaling one and one-half million dollars.

As of May 1, 1985 our hospitalization and dental insurance is with American Heritage Life Insurance Company. We are glad that finally we are not part of a trust but are covered with a traditional insurance company.

Some features of this plan include:

- 1. It is with a company rated "A Excellent" in Best's Insurance Guide.
- 2. Dental insurance is available as optional coverage.
- Members pay only \$2.00 per prescription with a special card they show their pharmacists.
- 4. Members may choose either a \$100 or \$250 deductible.

It is important that we have a National hospitalization plan because our pastors need a portable plan. If a pastor or a member of his family develops serious health problems, their coverage continues uninterrupted as they move from state to state. Not all policies are portable. For example, insurance provided by the spouse's employer usually ends if they leave employment or if they move.

Thank you for your support through the Cooperative Plan and direct giving. Our future is bright. We are looking forward to "serving those who serve us" in the coming year.

SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of the Board's major accounting policies which have been consistently applied and are presented in order to assist in evaluating the Board's financial statements and other data contained in this report.

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The Board generally uses the accrual basis of accounting.

The Board also uses fund accounting which accounts for assets, liabilities, income and expense by specific purposes.

CAPITALIZATION POLICIES

Purchase of capital items are expensed in the Operating Fund. Major items are recorded in the Property Fund as an increase in the fund balance. When an item is retired, its cost is removed from the assets and the fund balance. No depreciation is computed on the properties.

MARKETABLE SECURITIES

Marketable securities are carried at par or face value. The discount or premiums is taken into income at the time of purchase.

REPORT OF THE FREE WILL BAPTIST FOUNDATION

For a long time I believed only large corporations or wealthy families like the Fords or Rockfellers could set up endowments. I thought it required millions to fund them.

Obviously an endowment with several million dollars is better than one with several thousand dollars. But the truth of the matter is, an endowment can be started with any amount.

An endowment is aptly called "a gift that keeps on giving." For that's exactly what happens. Endowment funds are continually invested and only the earnings distributed from year to year.

Suppose you establish an endowment trust with \$1,000. And for easy figuring, let's suppose it earns 10 percent a year. (Foundation endowments earned over 13 percent last year.) Your thousand-dollar endowment provides \$100 a year to whomever you designate.

At the end of ten years you will have given \$1,000, yet the original \$1,000 remains. In fact, your original gift will give every year during your lifetime and after your death until the Lord comes.

I think you'll agree that's good stewardship.

Several years ago our Foundation received its first endowment trust from a church that disbanded in Missouri. When the property was sold, they voted to set up an endowment with us. We hold the first mortgage deed and the new owners, a church group, make monthly payments to us.

Twice a year at the Missouri church's direction, we disperse the earnings equally to Hillsdale College, the Foreign Missions Department and the Tennessee Home for Children.

The Foundation administers three other endowment trusts. One benefits the Cooperative Plan of Support; another, the Foundation operating fund, and; a third, the Master's Men. All of these endowments are open-ended. Anyone can contribute to them.

Why don't you consider contributing to one of these established endowments or setting up your own. Some families unite to fund one. The possibilities are limitless.

REPORT OF BENEVOLENT FUND

The Benevolent Fund Committee consists of two members from the Executive Committee, appointed by the moderator; two members from the Board of Retirement and Insurance, appointed by the chairman; the Executive Secretary and the Director of the Board of Retirement and Insurance. The members are: Ralph Hampton, Tom Lilly, Wilburn Beasley, Robert Picirilli, Melvin Worthington and Herman Hersey.

Brother Norwood Gibson was asked to be an advisor to the committee representing those with unpaid claims from Garrett-Street/REA.

The committee met in Nashville on July 30, 1984 and made the following decisions: 1. The details of the fund-raising effort were discussed and approved.

2. Authorization will be sought from claimants allowing us to negotiate a settlement

3. It was agreed to attempt to settle claims at 50%.

The fund-raising effort realized \$39,602.14 as of May 10th.

In November the Nashville members of the committee met and agreed to:

1. Pay the members what we would have paid the doctor or hospital had they

2. Borrow funds, if necessary, to complete this. This out-of-town members of the committee agreed to this action by telephone.

There are several who had unpaid claims who did not apply to us for assistance. Recently an appeal was sent to our pastors asking for another gift.

We recommend the Benevolent Fund become a permanent fund to take care of future emergencies. At times our Free Will Baptist people are in the midst of a disaster such as tornado, flood or hurricane. Others are victims of a fire or catastrophic illness and their expenses go beyond insurance coverage. Each church is encouraged to include the Benevolent Fund in their annual budget.

MASTER'S MEN DEPARTMENT REPORT

"Ye call me Master and Lord: and ye say well; for so I am." John 13:13

Master's Men Department is 29 years old at this 1985 National Association of Free Will Baptists. For that period of time, the purposes of Master's Men has remained the same: To aid every Free Will Baptist layman to become all he can be for his Master.

The denomination seems to have a greater awareness of the potential of its men than ever before. Every pastor needs men of strength, courage, vision and energy to aid in his ministry to the local church. Without the men the work is crippled. Every pastor should desire to disciple men to be like the Master.

APPRECIATION

Master's Men Department is guided by the Master's Men Board, laymen and preachers chosen from the ranks of the member churches. They diligently seek to lead the men into greater areas of service for the Lord. Their task has not been easy. But, they have continued to labor for an established, well-grounded, well-financed ministry.

Three Board member positions will be filled this year. It is appropriate to express appreciation for the work performed by those men whose time of service has expired.

Reverend W. C. Combs (WV) has fulfilled his duties to the Master's Men Board for two periods of service. His twelve years of duty have seen the Department rise from bare existence to the present period of heightened service. Pastor Combs was elected to the board in 1973. That year the proposed budget totaled \$5,400. In 1985, as he leaves the Board, the proposed budget totals \$83,821.

Brother Combs is commended for his wisdom and leadership as a pastor. He has helped steady the work. Master's Men Department gives thanks for W. C. Combs, and more than a decade of dedicated and able service.

Mr. Don Elkins (OK) served as a Board member since 1975. He served as Chairman four years. Board by-laws prevented further service in that capacity. His quiet competence guided the work through an exciting, turbulent period of expansion. He has declined to accept renomination to the Board for further service.

Mr. Paul Moore (IL) was elected in 1982 to fill an unexpired term. He has worked with dedication in that time.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

1984 proved to be exciting for Master's Men. "Sharing the Load" became the watchword as men studied ways to do more for the Master. Every involved layman and pastor are responsible for the work accomplished.

Master's Men, Woman's Auxiliaries, youth groups, churches and individuals responded to a plea from our missionaries in Brazil. The Metcalf Memorial Dormitory was built by funds given through Master's Men Department and Foreign Missions Department. Master's Men Department received \$8,113.65, with a total of \$8,849.80

The 52 bed dormitory was named to honor the desire of John and Kay Metcalf to serve in Brazil. Their work was ended by a fatal car accident on February 27, 1984. Their desire to serve remains as a testimony in the structure used to house men, women and children who want to learn about the Savior.

Through Project Tool Shed, funds were given to purchase a \$900 memory typewriter for use in Ivory Coast, Africa. Mike Cousineau requested the equipment. Two funds are available for aiding missionaries: Project Tool Shed and Project Book Shelf.

Twenty-seven new groups joined the National Master's Men Department as active chapters. Only God knows what could be accomplished if every Free Will Baptist layman belonged to Master's Men.

Countless thousands of dollars were given through local chapters to fund the work of their churches. Men are highly involved in meeting the needs of their churches. As local chapters, they are free to work in each church as needs dictate.

MONIES

Faithful Free Will Baptists have given of their income to help Master's Men Department record the best financial year in its history. 1984 receipts totaled \$75,407. Undesignated and designated Cooperative giving totaled \$31,376.81. That's a one year increase of over \$7,000. Master's Men needed those funds for survival. Thank

Cooperative giving is the only feasible way to meet the needs of each Department. All denominational agencies should support and promote this method of giving as adopted by the National Association. As a denomination, we need to learn to give to the ministry, not to the moment.

Master's Men Department ended the year with a Fund Balance Deficit of \$708, noted in the 1984 audit. If the National Association had voted to close this Department, the total deficit would have been that figure. Careful financial management made the debt reduction possible. Curtailment of outreach was one sacrifice in reaching this figure.

The December 28, 1984 purchase of an IBM Personal Computer with accessories has enhanced the work capabilities of the office. A greater amount of work is now accomplished in less time. With a trade-in of an IBM Memory Typewriter, the new equipment cost \$3,722. Monthly payments of \$125 is \$50 more than maintenance costs of the former typewriter.

FUTURE

1985 brought new possibilities of service. January began the first year of the DECADE OF DISCIPLESHIP. "Committed to Christ's Commission" is the theme. Study programs analyze the characteristics of a disciple.

Project Tool Shed assistance requests include three missionaries; Dale Bishop (Japan) needs a drill, Fred Hersey (Japan) needs a memory typewriter, and Jerry Pinkerton (Africa) needs welding hoses. At the time this report was written, all requests had received approval.

A new area of ministry is the Master's Hands Project. This ongoing project will enable both Home Missions Department and Foreign Missions Department to save on building construction costs.

Last month Oklahoma Master's Men traveled to Colorado to help construct a church for the congregation of Home Missionary Bob Lewis. This activity could be repeated across our denomination. A dozen Home Missions churches have plans to begin construction this year. Thousands of dollars could be saved if men will take time to go help build churches. Master's Men Department hopes to become a clearing house for matching men to materials, and tasks to times of service.

Free Will Baptist Master's Men are committed to Christ's Commission. There is a desire to accomplish great things for the Master. Every Free Will Baptist layman should be part of the work. Come with us as we follow and serve the Master.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Following is a summary of the insignificant accounting policies of the Master's Men, a Department of the National Association of Free Will Baptists, hereafter referred to as the Department.

GOVERNMENT - The Department operates under the auspices of the National Association of Free Will Baptists and is governed by a Board of Directors.

RECEIVABLES AND ALLOWANCE FOR DOUBTFUL ACCOUNTS - Accounts receivable are presented in the financial statements at the amount deemed collectible by management. Any provision for doubtful accounts is recognized using the allowance method.

INVENTORIES - The inventories are valued at the lower of cost or market, with cost being determined by using the first-in, first-out method.

PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT AND DEPRECIATION - Property and equipment are presented in the financial statements at cost and are depreciated by the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets of 3-10 years.

INCOME TAXES - The Department is exempt from Federal and State income taxes; accordingly, no provision for income taxes is made in the financial statements.

WOMAN'S NATIONAL AUXILIARY REPORT

The 50th annual session of the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention was held July 23, 1985, in this auditorium.

Total registration was 1,237. Present enrollment is 9,924 representing 23 state conventions, 2 districts, and 4 locals. Missionaries were present from 7 countries.

Speakers were Agnes B. Frazier, charter member of WNAC and Laura Belle Barnard, veteran missionary to India. Our theme was "A Past to Remember . . . A Future to Mold."

Pre-convention activities Monday included a seminar and a meeting of presidents and field workers which were well attended.

On Monday evening, the Foreign Missions Department and WNAC jointly sponsored a banquet celebrating 50 years of missions advance. Nine hundred thirty people attended and viewed the film produced by the Foreign Missions Department, "From Victory Unto Victory."

Looking Back

One of our theme Scriptures was 1 Samuel 7:12. Samuel urged the Israelis to look back to a particular time when God miraculously delivered them from their enemies. He took a stone and set it up and called it Ebenezer ("the Stone of Help"), saying, "Hitherto has the Lord helped us."

It is fitting in this anniversary year, for us to look back to the beginning of our Auxiliary work and give praise to our "Stone of Help." "We've come this far by faith, leaning on the Lord. Trusting in His holy Word, He's never failed us yet."

Also we pay tribute to the early leaders of WNAC, who brought together women from the East, the West, the North and the South, and united the Home Mission Circles, the Ladies Aids, and the Female Missionary Societies, under one name and for one purpose.

Looking Around

We not only have a rich past but we have a rewarding present.

Woman's Auxiliary work has spread from the seven original states into 34 states and seven foreign countries.

One year after WNAC's organization, 2000 women were reported participating in Auxiliary work. Today we have approximately 18,000.

Growth in literature and supplies has been phenomenal. From a meager beginning, sufficient only in its day, the WNAC has extended the printed page into every possible area of endeavor.

A history of WNAC, written by Dr. Mary R. Wisehart, entitled "Sparks Into Flame," has just been released.

One year after WNAC's organization, approximately 2000 women were reported participating in Woman's Auxiliary work. Today we have approximately 18,000.

Cash gifts to missions, Christian education, youth work, childrens' homes and retired ministers have increased from \$1,009 in 1936 to \$291,317 this past fiscal year.

Non-cash gifts, including approximately \$40,000 in gifts to the missionary provision closet, make total cash and non-cash gifts to missions and missionary objectives, a record \$358,000.

In recent years, WNAC has sponsored an annual creative arts contest which develops the talents of Free Will Baptist women in the fields of art and journalism and enables them to contribute to the literature ministry of WNAC.

Our third national retreat was held September 6-8, 1984, at Ridgecrest, NC. It was a glorious occasion with 1405 registering. The theme, "To Know Him and to Make Him Known," was carried out in the services and nine seminars. Our missionary offering of almost \$4,000 was divided equally among the accounts of the missionaries present.

The 1986 retreat is scheduled for August 27-29, at Ridgecrest, beginning Wednesday evening and concluding Friday noon. Rates will be released this fall.

A Time for Looking Ahead

We not only have a rich past and a rewarding present, but a radiant future. It is a time for looking ahead. The past and the present inspire and challenge us but we must move on to greater victories.

Rose and Clarence Bowen wrote (W.A. Manual, 1955), "Only God actually knows what lies in store for the women of our church . . . But we may well surmise that with the illustrious beginning we have had, and with the gratifying growth we have seen, we may be assured that the best is yet to be."

I appreciate the fine staff with whom I have been privileged to work—Lorene Miley, editor, Evelyn Jones, bookkeeper, Peggy Outland, general office worker, and Dr. Mary Ruth Wisehart, field worker, who will assume the office of executive secretary-treasurer, August 1st. Also the various, dedicated executive committees.

My heartfelt thanks and appreciation to all of you with whom I have labored these 22 years. Your love, fellowship and hospitality, have meant much to me. You are my family. Thanks for everything.

Last, but certainly not least, my sincere thanks to the management committee and directors of the national departments who have always been helpful and considerate of the only woman among them.

RADIO AND TELEVISION COMMISSION

The Radio and Television Commission has held several meetings since our last convention. We are happy to report that progress is being made in several areas of this ministry but not as quickly as we would like to see it.

We are sorry that we were unable to present the television pilot program at this convention. However, you will recall that we made it very clear at Little Rock last year that should insufficient funds come in, we would not proceed with the project; it was determined by the Commission that it would be unwise to go into debt to fund it. We are grateful to all those who helped with the proposed project and should the association wish this pilot to be pursued in the future, we shall be happy to do so,

providing funding is made possible.

You must understand that the Commission was created and given a job to perform with no funds to operate on. It could be likened to a farmer being instructed by his landlord to plow, fertilize and plant a field, doing it all by hand, using no equipment. This past year we have tried to operate like this and it has been very difficult, if not almost impossible. Therefore, we have used some of our funds to purchase some first grade, professional quality sound equipment for this ministry. With funds we had we have purchased the following pieces of radio production equipment: A Tascam mixer, two Tascam reel-to-reel recorders, three Sharp cassette decks, two Technics turntables, and two AKG microphones.

The purchase of this equipment was absolutely essential if we are serious about being in radio and continuing this work. Our goal is to add to this equipment each year until we have what we need to give the best quality program for our Lord's work.

We are thankful that several areas are now broadcasting "Victorious Faith." The program is being aired in Perry, Florida (WGKR), Farmington, Missouri (KFMO), Fredericktown, Missouri (KFTW), Holdenville, Oklahoma (KVYI), and Ashland City, Tennessee (WJAN). We would like to see it reach into all parts of our land. Perhaps several churches could work together to place the program in their areas. Please contact the Commission for information regarding this.

We sincerely urge all our pastors to include the work of "Victorious Faith" in their church budgets. Send a gift each month, please. We have only two churches doing this. They are Cofer's Chapel in Nashville, Tennessee, and Victory in Goldsboro, North Carolina. Good Springs church in Pleasant View, Tennessee, sends us a gift each quarter.

If 500 churches, Sunday school classes, or individuals gave a \$10 gift each month, we would receive \$60,000 a year to broadcast the gospel. Won't you give \$5, \$10, \$25 or more each month to help underwrite this ministry?

We feel that the messages of Rev. Tom Malone will be very helpful to our listeners. The theme song for "Victorious Faith," which is "Faith Is The Victory," was arranged and recorded for us by Doug Little. Jim Vallance gives us good sound as he announces and puts our programs together each week.

The members of the Commission want to express their sincere appreciation to all the churches and individuals who have supported this young ministry thus far. We ask for your continued and broadened support as we seek to move forward as the Lord leads and provides. Our budget for 1986 and our financial report follow.

COMMISSION ON THEOLOGICAL LIBERALISM REPORT

The Commission on Theological Liberalism came into existence in 1959 by a vote of the National Association. The first report was given in 1960. At this time a vote was taken which made this Commission a permanent commission.

In 1959 the theological climate was such that it created a concern among our people. By that time most of the large denominations had already suffered from the inroads of liberalism and neo-orthodoxy. While we had been spared from liberalism and neo-orthodoxy, it was felt that in the best interest of the continued preservation of our commitment to the fundamentals of the faith a commission should be elected. It was to be the responsibility of this Commission to address any concerns which may threaten our historic commitment to orthodox doctrine.

It has always been understood that this Commission had no investigative powers. We have defined the scope of our concern as extending to any area of thought that either denies or endangers the basic doctrines of our faith or any error which may be termed heresy. We have sought to fulfill our responsibility by providing educational materials that would contribute to the preservation of orthodox doctrine within our denomination. We have also conducted seminars to help us achieve our goals.

Our basic approach has been to employ the services of qualified men in our denomination to prepare booklets for distribution at minimal cost to our people. At last year's National Association we made available a book entitled Contending For the Faith. This book is composed of 14 booklets on issues of current concern.

Over the years many people have wondered about the meaning of the name "Commission on Theological Liberalism." It did not convey a clear message concerning the purpose and responsibility of the Commission. In fact, it does not tell an outsider whether we are for or against liberalism.

At our meeting in December 1984, we discussed the possibility of a name change. We voted to recommend that the name be changed from the Commission on Theological Liberalism to the Commission for Theological Integrity. We recommend that this name along with the purpose and scope of this Commission's responsibility be placed in the by laws of the National Association to read as follows:

Name Commission For Theological Integrity Purpose and Scope

The purpose of this Commission shall be: (1) To alert our people of theological trends that could threaten our theological integrity as a denomination. (2) To prepare materials that will contribute to the continued preservation of the theological integrity of our denomination. (3) As the need and opportunity arises to conduct seminars on subjects which are pertinent to the purpose of this Commission.

The scope of the responsibility of this Commission shall be to address significant theological concerns such as: (1) Trends and influences that would threaten orthodox doctrine. (2) That which would threaten our theological distinctives as a denomination.

It shall not be within the scope of this Commission's responsibility: (1) To investigate the theological integrity of any individual, organization or institution in the denomination, or (2) To address points of theology upon which difference of opinion has been permitted in the denomination.
