## REPORT OF EXECUTIVE BOARD

On March 13, 1942, the executive board and the publication committee met in joint session at the Gem Office in Monett, Missouri.

Meeting called to order by the chairman, Eld. B. F. Brown. Scripture was read from 2 Timothy 1 by Eld. Cecil Campbell. Prayer by Eld. Kenneth Turner.

Board members present: Eld. B. F. Brown, Eld. Cecil Campbell, Eld. Arlie Hoover, Eld. C. B. Dees.

Publication Committee present: Eld. J. F. Miller, Eld. Winford Davis, Eld. J. B. Rollins, Eld. B. F. Brown, Eld. O. T. Allred seated as proxy for Bro. M. H. White, Eld. Kenneth Turner seated as proxy for Bro. John Peterson, Bro. Ed Wade seated as proxy for Eld. D. S. Jones.

Statements were made by Eld. John B. Rollins giving his reasons for resigning as editor of the Gem. The greatest of his reasons was financial embarrassment.

After a lengthy discussion of this matter a motion was made and sustained by the body that we retain Bro. Rollins in his present position of responsibility and provide financial aid as now needed.

A motion was made and sustained by the body to transfer the money known as the Church Extension Fund from the Home Mission Treasury to the Executive Board Treasury, and that the money that comes in hereafter be given to the said Executive Board treasurer.

Erc. Rollins agreed to remain as editor of the "Gem" under these arrangements.

Motion made and sustained by the body that we make a loan to Bro. Rollins of \$450.00 from the Church Extension fund, and that it be secured by a note from Bro. Rollins.

Motion made and sustained by the body that this joint committee appoint a board of directors comprising three members to supervise the business activities of the "Gem" Board of Firectors: Eld. C. T. Allred, Chairman, Eld. Winford Davis, Eld. W. K. Weston, Secretary.

Motion made and sustained by the body that Bro. Miller make a report of this meeting in full detail through the "Gem".

Motion made and sustained by members of the Executive Board to declare a vacency on the board in the place of Bro. Henry Long.

Motion made and sustained by said board that Eld. O. T. Allred be elected to fill the vacancy.

Motion made and sustained to adjourn. Benediction by Eld. J. F. Miller.

On Friday night, March 13, 1942, after services in the Monett church, the members present met.

Motion was made and sustained that notice be given through the Gem paper that on and after May 1, 1942, the subcsription price of the Gem will be 75 cents per year.

A few months ago there came a request to us for aid in starting a mission in St. Louis. After prayer and consideration we deemed it unwise to venture until further investigation was made. It seems that some of our people have the idea that our church extension fund is for an evangelistic campaign, but it is not so. It is to revive and restore that which has already been started.

A number of letters have been written concerning the work of Free Will Baptist cause.

## EDITOR'S REPORT

The Great Commission given by our Lord to Christian disiples, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" cannot be obeyed by any one Christian. The co-operative engagement of large groups of Christians who will dare to crucify themselves is required. Even they must have a mind to work and a vision of a lost world to be won for Christ. Such enterprising cannot succeed without a firm understanding which is made possible only by a good system of communication.

The Free Will Baptist Gem is thus employed in the Service of Christ to make known the possibilities of obeying the Great Command of Christ by the flaming souls of our brotherhood throughout our entire connection. God has graciously given our demonination unusual privileges of rendering acceptable service in these days of crisis. Thank God, we are rising to the occasion.

As recent as five years ago, the circulation of the "Gem" was only 700. Two years later, when we moved into new quarters, the circle of readers was enlarged to 1088. Another year saw the advance to 1200. Last year we enjoyed a family circle of 1600 readers. Today we stand with 1900 paid subscribers in

thirty-three states and three foreign countries. Of these 1900, enly 578 are living in Missouri. This is a loss of 200 Missouri readers during the past 18 months. While we have lost ground in Missouri, we have more than regained it in other states.

Financially, we have gained. The last report that our former editor submitted to the Missouri State Association showed the annual income to be \$800.00 at that time which was the best report ever submitted. In 1940, another "best" report revealed an annual income of \$1775.00. Last year, the very finest report thrilled all of us in the matter of \$2500.00 income. Today, we are privileged to speak in terms of 3016.76 annual income.

These blessings, as roses, have not been picked without the resultant effect of the "thorns". We suffered one serious set-back during the year just past. Providence thrust upon us the responsibility of installing modern equipment in the time of the very climax of our busiest season. The result was a loss of shocking propertions. Within the next few days, the war clouds swooped over our nation and national regulations stiffened, and we are content to know that all things work together for good to those that love the Lord.

Today we are equipped and have already more than regained cur lost prestige and are moving out into the almost unlimited possibilities of serving Christ for the benefits and blessing of His people.

### COMMITTEE REPORTS

#### BUSINESS —

No. 1—Be it Resolved, That we take cash and pledges sufficient to pay the indebtedness on our equipment and insurance on the equipment and property at Monett, Missouri.

- No. 2—Be it Resolved, That beginning with this setting of the State Association, the local association entertaining the State Association be responsible for cleaning and forwarding the equipment of the Association to the next entertaining church.
- No. 3—Be it Resolved, That this Association instruct our clerk to prepare and send cards to each local church clerk in the state, at the expense of the State Association, asking them to announce and take at least one offering for the entertainment of the State Association. These cards are to be mailed Jnue 1st. We suggest a goal of \$5.00 for each church.
- No. 4 In as much as the National Association requires \$10.00 for the state and \$5.00 for each local association, be it resolved, that each local association be responsible for their \$5.00 to be paid to the state treasurer by June 30th.
- No. 5—Be it resolved that the Missouri State Association in session this 17th day of September go on record as unamiously approving and uniting our efforts with other Christians and fraternal organizations in prohibiting the sale of intoxicating-liquors, beers and wines around our army camps or to our armed forces.
- No. 6—Be it Resolved, That the next setting of the Missouri State Association be held with the Monett Church in Indian Creek Association.
- No. 7—Inasmuch as the Cave Spring Association and the Mill Creek church and community have so wonderfully enter tained this the twenty-ninth session of the Missouri State Association, Be it Resolved, That we give them a standing vote of thanks for their splendid hospitality and entertainment.

FOREICN MISSIONS — We, your Committee on Foreign Missions beg to submit the following report:

We are glad to note the marked increase in foreign mission interest in our denomination. We are gratified to notice that Missouri has given more the past year for foreign missions than any year previous—the total amount being \$1,565.98. This is to be appreciated; but yet we can do even more if we will. The way the Lord is opening doors for us in Cuba spells increased responsibility for us as a people. God is giving us the missionaries and the fields therefore may we not fail to arise to the challenge.

We wish to recommend the following:

1. That one evening service during the setting of this association be given to the foreign mission program; in which service we have a stirring message on missions, and invite Rev. Kenneth Turner to show his motion pictures of the tour

of the deputation party in Cuba

- 2. That each church, which does not already have such, institute some plan of weekly or monthly giving to foreign missions. We suggest the drill offering, a designated Sunday school offering, or some other plan which will mean a regular systematic giving to this worthy work.
- 3. That each church avail themselves of the opportunity to purchase the missionary pictures of India and Cuba to place on bulletin boards in the church so as to create interest in foreign missions. The pictures are to be ordered from Rev. Marie Thomas at two cents per print.
- 4. Noticing that the quota for foreign missions for this state was set at the National Association to the amount of \$1200.00, and taking notice that this state has given nearly \$1600.00 during the past twelve months therefore we recommend that our quota be raised to \$2,000.00.
- 5. We present the following as prayer needs, for which may we pray daily: Rev. and Mrs. Willey who are laboring so tire-lessly in Cuba, Rev. Paul Woolsey, who at this time is endeavoring to get passage to India for Miss Laura Belle Barnard and Rev. and Mrs. Damon Dodd, for Rev. and Mrs. Dodd who have entered school at Nashville looking forward to entering the field in India, for more workers on the field in Cuba especially for a man and wife and a teacher for the Willey children, for our native workers in Cuba who are leading out and organizing Free Will Baptist churches there, for our National Foreign Mission Board who have such great responsibility resting on them, and that our home people may get a greater and broader vision of our opportunity and responsibility to carry the gospel around the world.
- 6. As touching Home Missions may we bear in mind that we cannot have and support a foreign work unless we have a lively and established home work. Since there is a plan outlined by our National Home Mission Board we recommend that the recommendations of this board be read to this body for consideration and adoption.

There is no such thing as support of missions, either home or foreign, without vision. God said, "where there is no vision the people perish." Therefore may we, His people, catch a greater vision of a world dying without God, and, in turn, make a far greater effort than ever before to get the gospel to them.

### CONSTITUTION

- 1. This association shall be called the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists.
- 2. The object of this association shall be for the bringing together of the Free Will Baptists of the State of Missouri in one great annual gathering, so they can get better acquainted with each other, and for the upbuilding of the Free Will Baptist

churches of Missouri, and for the salvation of souls.

- 3. This association shall be composed of duly elected delegates, elected by the bodies holding membership in this body
- The officers of this Association shall be a moderator, an assistant moderator, a clerk who shall be treasurer and shall superintend the printing of the minutes at \$5.00 per annum, and shall hold their offices until their successors shall be elected, a board of trustees of five members whose term of office shall be as follows: One for one year, one for two years, one for three years, one for four years, and one for five years, and at the expiration of these terms, one is to be elected for a term of five years, and who shall hold their offices until their successors are elected; and further, if any vacancies occur between sessions of the Association, the Board shall fill such vacancy or vacancies until the next session of the Association, who shall perform the following duties: First—Shall be the legal corporation of the Association with the corporate name of the Board of Trustees of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists, to be a board of Missions and Church Extension, to secure, hold, use and convey money, homes or lands for the propagation of the gospel in connection with the Free Will denomination. Second—To receive, hold, manage. use, control or convey any property intrusted to the Association for and in accordance with the donor's purpose. Said Board of Trustees shall also compose the Home Mission Board. They may be chosen from ministers, deacons or delegates.
- 5. This association shall not usurp any authority over the Quarterly Meetings, Yearly Meetings, or Associations that shall be under its supervision, but shall be an advisory body to help them.
- 6. Seven or more ordained ministers or deacons from two or more bodies belonging to this association shall constitute a quorum to transact business.
- 7. The clerk or assistant clerk, and in their absence, the senior minister in age, shall call the association to order for business, and call the moderator or his assistant to the chair, and if neither the moderator nor his assistant are present, then the senior minister in age shall act as moderator. On taking his chair, the moderator shall call for the reading of the letters from the different bodies composing this association, and after the letters are read he shall seat the delegates. After the delegates are seated, the election of officers shall be in order.
- 8. Any organized Quarterly Meeting, Yearly Meeting or Association of Free Will Baptists may unite with this body at any regular session through a letter or delegates by a two-thirds vote of all members present.
- 9. This constitution may be added to, amended or changed at any regular session of this body by a two-thirds vote of all the members present, after written notice of the contemplated change has been published in the official paper three months previous to the session at which such change is to take place.

#### BY-LAWS

- 1. All business meetings shall be opened by singing, reading a portion of God's word, and prayer; and shall be closed with prayer.
- 2. All business, except routine, shall be brought before the body by committees, but should any committee refuse or fail to present to this body any business given to it by any member of this Association, then such business may be presented to the body by any member, but cannot be discussed, unless by a vote of this body.
- 3. No one shall speak more than five minutes or more than twice on the same subject without consent of the moderator,
- 4. Any member of this body can appeal from the decision of the moderator to the association, and by a majority vote thereon, the objection shall be sustained or rejected.
- 5. No one shall leave the association without the consent of the moderator.
- 6. Anyone desiring to speak shall arise and say, "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until he or she is recognized by the modertor.
- 7. The moderator shall stop all discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit, or when he thinks it is likely to lead to discord and division.
- 8. The officers of this body shall submit, at every annual session, a report of the work done for this association
- 9. This association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.
- 10. All officers of this association shall be nominated from the floor and elected by ballot, except when the rules are suspended, then election may be by acclamation.
- 11. All resolutions and reports shall bear the names of all the members of the committee who favor them; and if the names be not a majority of all members of such committee, then the clerk shall not read the resolution or report.
- 12. All committees shall be appointed by the moderator, but any appointment may be changed by a two-thirds vote of this body.
- 13. All business coming before this association shall be decided by secret ballot when there is any opposition or objection.
- 14. A majority of all votes cast shall be final upon all subjects except to amend the constitution, receive quarterly meetings or associations, and the changing of the members of the committees appointed by the moderator, then it shall require a two-thirds majority.
- 15. The number of delegates to the State Association shall be one delegate for the association and in addition, one delegate for every fifty resident members or major fraction thereof.
- 16. These by-laws may be amended or changed at any regular session of this association.

#### FREE WILL BAPTIST ARTICLES OF FAITH

- 1. THE BIBLE.— The Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments were given by inspiration of God, and are our infallible rule of faith and practice.
- 2. GOD There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver, and Righteous Governor of the universe, and in the Scriptures as the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.
- 3. CHRIST.—Christ is God manifest in the flesh; in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified, He is now risen and glorified and is our ever present Savior and Lord.
- 4. THE HOLY SPIRIT.—The Scriptures assign to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of men.
- 5. THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD.—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of grace, not otherwise provided for, as the highest welfare of man requires.
- 6. THE SINFULNESS OF MAN.— Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore, inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability sin, and become guilty before God.
- 7. THE WORK OF CHRIST.—The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, sufferings, death and ressurrection affected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.
- 8. THE TERMS OF SALVATION—The conditions of salvation are: 1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renunctation of it. 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Savior and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit, freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.
- 9. ELECTION.—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ men become His elect.
- 10. FREEDOM OF WILL.—The human will is free and self-controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.
- 11. SALVATION FREE.—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take of the water of Life freely.

- 12. PERSEVERANCE.—All believers in Christ, who through grace, persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.
- 13. GOSPEL ORDINANCES—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel: Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.
- 14. THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH. The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from secular employments and amusements, for rest, worship, holy works, and activities, and for personal communion with God.
- 15. RESURRECTION, JUDGEMENT, AND FINAL RETRIBUTION.— The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation; then the wicked shall "go away into eternal punishmen" but the righteous into eternal life."

## FREE WILL BAPTIST CHURCH COVENANT

Having given ourselves to God by faith in Christ, and adopted the Word of God as our rule of faith and practice, we now give ourselves to one another by the will of God in this solemn covenant. We promise by His grace to love and obey Him in all things, to avoid the appearance of evil, to abstain from all sinful amusements and unholy conformity to the world; from all sanction of the use and sale of intoxicating beverages, and to "provide things honest in the sight of all men."

We agree to accept Christian admonition and reproof with meekness, and to watch over one another in love, endeavoring to "keep the unity of the Spirit," in the bonds of peace, to be careful of one another's happiness and reputation, and seek to strengthen the weak, encourage the afflicted, admonish the erring, and as far as we are able, promote the success of the church and of the Gospel.

We will everywhere hold Christian principle sacred and Christian obligations and enterprises supreme; counting it our chief business in life to extend the influence of Christ in society; constantly praying and toiling that the kingdom of God may come, and His will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

We agree faithfully to discharge our obligations in reference to the study of the Scriptures, secret prayer, family devotions, and social worship; and by self-denial, faith, and good works endeavor to "grow in grace and the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ." We will not forget the assembling of ourselves together for church conferences, public worship, and the observance of the ordinances of the Gospel, nor fail to pay according to our ability for the support of the church of its poor, and all its benevolent work.

To this end we agree to labor for the promotion of educational and denominational enterprises, the support of missions, the success of Sunday schools, and evangelistic efforts for the salvation of souls, and the conversion of the world. And may the God of peace sanctify us wholly, and preserve us blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.
