ing report:

Item No. 1. We wish to commend the people of our Free Will Baptist State Association who have been faithful to our Lord Jesus Christ in the things He taught.

Item No. 2. We recommend that as the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists go on record favoring

local option in our State.

Item No. 3. We recommend that as a State Association we abstain from the use of the New Version of the Bible. Committee: C. B. Dees, Will A. Gates, J. K. Stephens

Business Committee:

Item No. 1. We recommend that the Gem be published for at least another year to permit Missouri State Association to determine how adequately the National paper will meet our need before we consider cessation of publication.

Item No. 2. Inasmuch as Cecil H. Campbell states that he will no longer be in position to serve as business manager of the Gem, we recommend that the office of business manager be combined with that of editor, and that Lloyd T. Jeffreys be employed to serve in this capacity for one year.

Item No. 3. We recommend that Kenneth Turner and Lloyd T. Jeffreys prepare statistical report blanks and

Item No. 4. We recommend that the statistician omit the superannuation financial report from the statistical table this year.

Item No. 5. We recommend that a standing vote of thanks be given to the New Harmony Church and Northeast Missouri Association for their very fine entertainment of the State Association; also we further recommend that our clerk write a letter of appreciation to the Green-

top Lumber Company for their assistance.

Item No. 6. We recommend that the following article be added to our by-laws: The sessions of this Association shall convene on Tuesday night following the Third Sunday in August each year.

Item No. 7. We recommend that \$300.00 be paid from the State General Fund to the Gem to pay bills outstand-

Item No. 8. We recommend that \$350.00 be paid from the State General Fund to the Youth Camp to pay bills

outstanding.

Item No. 9. We recommend that Rev. O. T. Allred be elected as State Promotional man to promote all phases of the denominational work on the following basis: 1. His services are to be under the direction of the State Executive Board; 2. He shall be paid five cents per mile travel expense and seven dollars per day for time spent in this capacity. In the event he spends more than one day in succession he shall be paid at the rate of six dollars per day; 3. He shall be paid from the State General Fund.

Item No. 10. We recommend that the Youth Camp be closed for one year and that the Youth Camp Board be charged with the responsibility of renting a camp for next year's session. We further recommend that Bro. Reeves be permitted to live at the camp without remuner-

CONSTITUTION

1. This Association shall be called the Missouri State

Association of Free Will Baptists.

2. The object of this Association shall be for the bringing together of the Free Will Baptists of the State of Missouri in one great annual gathering, so they can get better acquainted with each other, and for the upbuilding of the Free Will Baptist Churches of Missouri for the salvation of souls.

3. The Association shall be composed of duly elected delegates, elected by the bodies holding membership in

this body.

4. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, an Assistant Moderator, and a Secretary-Treasurer, said officers shall be elected annually at the beginning of each session and hold their office until their successors are elected and qualified: a board of trustees of five members whose terms of office shall be as follows: One for one (1) year, one for two (2) years, one for three (3) years, one for four (4) years, and one for five (5) years; and at the expiration of these terms, one is to be elected for a term of five years who shall hold office until his successors are elected; and further, if any vacancy occur between sessions of the Association, the Board shall fill such vacancy or vacancies until the next Association; who shall perform the following duties: First, shall be the legal corporation of the Association with the corporate name of the Board of Trustees of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists; to be a board of Missions and Church Extension, to secure, hold, use and convey money, homes or lands for the propogation of the gospel in connection with the Free Will Baptist denomination. Second, to receive, hold, manage, use, control, or convey any property entrusted to the Association for and in accordance with the donor's purpose. Said Board of Trustees shall also compose the Home Mission Board. They may be chosen from ministers, deacons, or delegates.

5. This Association shall not usurp any authority over the Quarterly Meetings, or Associations that shall be under its supervision, but shall be an advisory body to help them.

6. Seven or more ordained ministers or deacons from two or more bodies, belonging to this Association shall

constitute a quorum to transact business.

7. The Clerk or Assistant Clerk, and in their absence, the senior minister in age, shall call the Association to order for business, and call the Moderator or Assistant Moderator to the chair, and if neither Moderator nor Assistant Moderator is present, then the senior minister in age shall act as Moderator. On taking his chair, the Moderator shall call for the reading of the letters from the different bodies composing this Association, and after letters are read he shall seat the delegates. After the delegates are seated, the election of officers shall be in order.

8. Any organized Quarterly Meeting, Yearly Meeting or Association of Free Will Baptists may unite with this body at any regular session, through a letter or delegates

by a two-thirds vote of all members present.

9. This Constitution may be added to, amended or changed at any regular session of this body by a two-thirds vote of all members present, after written notice of the contemplated change has been published in the official paper three months previous to the session at which such change is to take place.

BY-LAWS

- 1. All business meetings shall be opened by singing, reading a portion of God's Word and prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.
- 2. All business, except routine, shall be brought before the body by committees, but should any committee refuse or fail to present to this body any business given to it by any member of this Association, then such business may be presented to the body by any member, but cannot be discussed unless by a vote of this body.
- 3. No one shall speak more than five minutes or more than twice on the same subject without the consent of the Moderator.
- 4. Any member of this body can appeal from the decision of the Moderator to the Association, and by a majority vote thereon, the objection shall be sustained or rejected.

- 5. No one shall leave the Association without the consent of the Moderator.
- 6. Anyone desiring to speak shall arise and say, "Brother Moderator," but shall speak no further until he or she is recognized by the Moderator.
- 7. The Moderator shall stop all discussion when not carried on in a Christian spirit, or when he thinks it is likely to lead to discord and division.
- 8. The officers of this body shall submit, at every annual session, a report of the work done for this Association.
- 9. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all business transactions: be responsible for all funds received and disbursed; shall superintend the printing of the Minutes and shall receive an honorarium of one hundred twenty (\$120.00) dollars per year.
- 10. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.
- 11. All officers of this Association shall be nominated from the floor and elected by standing vote unless otherwise requested or ordered by the body.
- 12. All resolutions and reports shall bear the names of all the members of the committee who favor them; and if the names be not a majority of all members of such committee, then the Clerk shall not read the resolution or report.
- 13. All committees shall be appointed by the Moderator, but any appointment may be changed by a two-thirds vote of this body.
- 14. All business coming before this Association shall be decided by secret ballot when there is any opposition or objection.
- 15. A majority of all votes shall be final upon all subjects except to amend the Constitution, receive Quarterly Meetings or Associations, and the changing of the members of the committees appointed by the Moderator, then it shall require a two-thirds majority.
- 16. The number of delegates to the State Association shall be one delegate for the Association and in addition, one delegate for every fifty resident members or major fraction thereof.
- 17. The standing delegates to this Association shall be all ordained ministers and their companions, provided the

companion is a member in good standing in some Free Will Baptist Church belonging to this State Association; all ordained deacons; and Associational Clerks.

- 18. The sessions of this Association shall convene on Tuesday night following the Third Sunday in August each year.
- 19. These By-Laws may be amended or changed at any regular session of this Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

- 1. The Bible. The Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments were given by inspiration of God, and are our infallible rule of faith and practice. II Timothy 3:16.
- 2. God. There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver, and Righteous Governor of the universe; and in the Scriptures as Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore, and obey. I Cor. 8:6; Matt. 28:19.
- 3. Christ. Christ is God manifest in the flesh; in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified, He is now risen and glorified, and is our ever present Saviour and Lord. John 1:1-12.
- 4. The Holy Spirit. The Scriptures assign to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. John 16:7,8; Acts 2:4; Eph. 4:4-6.
- 5. The Government of God. God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts, not otherwise provided for, as the highest welfare of men requires. Psalms 22:28; 97:2.
- 6. The Sinfulness of man. Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore, inherit a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability sin, and become guilty before God. Gen. 2:17; 3:19.
- 7. The Work of Christ. The Son of God by His incarnation, life, suffering, death and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith. I John 2:2.
- 8. The Terms of Salvation. The conditions of salvation are: 1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and hearty

renunciation of it. 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit, freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death. II Cor. 7:10; Pro. 28:13.

- 9. Election. God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ men become His elect. I Tim. 2:4.
- 10. Freedom of the Will. The human will is free and self-controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit, or to resist them and perish. Joshua 24:15.
- 11. Salvation Free. God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take of the water of life freely. Rev. 22:17.
- 12. Perseverance. All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have promise of eternal salvation. John 15:6; II Peter 2:20-22.
- 13. Gospel Ordinances. Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel; Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be ministered to all true believers. Mark 16:15; II Cor. 4:5; John 13:14.
- 14. Tithing. God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament; Jesus Christ indorsed it in the Gospel (Matt. 23:23), and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." (I Cor.16:2).

15. The Christian Sabbath. The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from secular employments and amusements, for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God. Gen 2:3: Exod. 20:8-11.

16. Resurrection, Judgment and Final Retribution. The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation; then the wicked will "go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life." John 5:29; Matt. 25:46.

CHURCH COVENANT

Having given ourselves to God, by faith in Christ, and adopted the Word of God as our rule of faith and practice, we now give ourselves to one another by the will of God in this solemn covenant.

We promise by His grace to love and obey Him in all things, to avoid all appearance of evil, to abstain from all sinful amusements and unholy conformity to the world, from all sanction of the use and sale of intoxicating beverages, and to "provide things honest in the sight of all men."

We agree faithfully to discharge our obligations in reference to the study of the Scriptures, secret prayer, family devotions, and social worship; and by self-denial, faith, and good works endeavor to "grow in grace and the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jasus Christ."

We will not forsake the assembling of ourselves together for church conferences; public worship, and the observance of the ordinances of the Gospel, nor fail to pay according to our ability for the support of the church, of its poor, and all its benevolent work.

We agree to accept Christian admonition and reproof with meekness, and to watch over one another in love, endeavoring to "keep the unity of the Spirit" in the bonds of peace, to be careful of one another's happiness and reputation, and seek to strengthen the weak, encourage the afflicted, admonish the erring, and as far as we are able promote the success of the church and of the Gospel.

We will everywhere hold Christian principle sacred and Christian obligations and enterprises supreme; counting it our chief business in life to extend the influence of Christ in society; constantly praying and toiling that the Kingdom of God may come, and His will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

To this end we agree to labor for the promotion of educational and denominational enterprises, the support of Missions, the success of Sunday schools, and evangelistic efforts for the salvation of the World. And may the God of peace sanctify us wholly, and preserve us blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.
