Proceedings

TUESDAY 7:30 P. M.

The Missouri State Association met in its 45th annual session at the Youth Camp Grounds, Niangua, Missouri, August 18-21, 1958.

The meeting was called to order with congregational singing led by Rev. Glenn Rehkop with Miss Louise Underwood as pianist.

Devotional period was led by Rev. Henry Long, pastor of First Church, Springfield, Mo. Prayer by Rev. Arthur Billows. A duet "There is Power in the Blood" was sung by Rev. & Mrs. Billows. Scripture reading was read by Rev. Long from Isaiah 54:1-5.

The association was called into session by the clerk, Rev. Albert Halbrook. The welcome address was given by Rev. Wm. Reeves, and the response by Rev. Woodrow Matthews. The clerk then presented the moderator, Rev. O. T. Allred, Monett, Mo.

Following the moderator's message, Rev. Dale Jones, Lebanon, Mo., pastor of the Liberty Church, was presented. Rev. Jones delivered the introductory message, reading for the scripture text Hebrews 4:12; with subject, "Power of the Gospel". Rev. Jones spoke of four things we should do the Bible way.

At the close of the Message, the moderator called the congregation to prayer with the ministers gathering around the altar, and Rev. James Davis leading in prayer. A special prayer was offered for Sister Archer who was in a Springfield hospital.

Words of greeting were expressed by Rev. & Sis. Carlisle Hanna, missionaries on furlough from India, and Rev. W. S. Mooneyham, National Executive Secretary, Nashville, Tennessee.

WEDNESDAY 9:00 A. M.

Services were called to order by the moderator with congregational singing led by Rev. Glenn Rehkop.

Devotion were conducted by Rev. Ben Scott, pastor of the Fredericktown Church, Fredericktown, Mo., with scripture reading from Romans 13:7-14 followed with prayer.

Motion was made and sustained that all the letters be read

and considered collectively unless otherwise requested. Letters from Mission, Cave Spring, Northeast, Southeast, Central Western, Northwest Mo., and Northeast Kans., Liberty, Indian Creek and Niangua.

Motion was sustained that letters be received, delegates seated, and recommendations included in letters be referred to the proper committees.

Motion was sustained that each association appoint delegates to fill vacanices of absentee delegates from their respective association.

The following visitors were recognized: Rev. Wm. Mishler, promotional secretary of National Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn., Rev. W. S. Mooneyham, executive secretary, Nashville, Tenn., Rev. and Mrs. Arthur Billows, home missionaries to Mexico, Mrs. Eunice Edwards, executive secretary of W. N. A. C., and Rev. and Mrs. Carlisle Hanna, missionaries on furlough from India.

The By-Laws of the Missouri State Association were read by the assistant clerk, Rev. Paul Williams.

The moderator called for the election of officers. Prayer was led by Rev. John Rogers in behalf of the election.

Rev. W. S. Mooneyham was requested to moderate the election of the following officers:

Moderator—Rev. O. T. Allred, Monett, Mo. Assistant moderator—Rev. O. T. Dixon, Mtn. Grove, Mo. Clerk-treasurer—Rev. Albert Halbrook, Mine La Motte, Mo.

The moderator appointed the following as a committee on committees to assist him in appointing other committees: Revs. Woodrow Matthews, James Davis, Keith Johnson, R. B. Spurgeon, and Harvey Hill.

A letter of appreciation from the National Association to the Missouri State Association for the entertainment of the 1958 session of the National Association which met in St. Louis, July 7-10, was read.

Letters of greeting were read from the National Home Mission Board and the Foreign Mission Board.

A financial report from the Steering Committee of the Missouri State Association to provide for the 1958 session of the National Association was read by the secretary, Rev. John Rogers. This report was accepted and a standing vote of appreciation was given to the committee for their splendid service.

A recess was declared. Benediction by Rev. James Barker.

WEDNESDAY 11 O'CLOCK

This service was conducted by the Misouri State Women's Auxiliary Convention. (see report of Auxiliary Convention in these minutes)

Following the morning message by Rev. Hanna, the moderator called for the reading of the report of the committee on committees. Motion sustained to receive report. (see committee reports)

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

The Missouri State Women's Auxiliary Convention was in charge of this session. (see report of Auxiliary Convention)

WEDNESDAY 7:30 P. M.

Congregational singing was led by Rev. Bud Hill with Janice Roller as pianist. Prayer by Rev. Elmer Turnbough.

Rev. W. S. Mooneyham expressed commendation to the Steering Committee and the Missouri State Association for their entertainment of the National Association.

The pulpit committee reported Rev. W. S. Mooneyham to preach at 11 o'clock, Thursday morning and Rev. Wm. Mishler to preach Thursday evening.

Item no. 1 of the Missions Committee report was read and received by motion. (see reports) In compliance with this item an offering was received for the Hannas and the Billows to be divided equally. The amount of offering was (\$164.00) one hundred and sixty-four dollars.

Rev. Leland Horton from the Union Association was recognized.

The Frances quartet from Mtn. Grove, Mo. sang two numbers.

Rev. Arthur Billows, missionary appointee to Mexico, delivered the evening message, reading I Cor. 1:18-25 for the scripture lesson and using "We Preach Christ" as the subjecttext.

At the close of the message seven came forward dedicating their lives to the service of the Master. The ordained ministers gathered in the altar and a prayer of dedication was prayed by Rev. O. T. Dixon, followed by testimonies from those who dedicated their lives.

THURSDAY 9:00 A. M.

Congregational singing led by Rev. H. C. Beasley with Louise Underwood as pianist.

Devotions were conducted by Rev. O. D. Matthews with

scripture reading from I Cor. 13, followed with prayer.

The report of the Executive Board was read and accepted and recommendation referred to the Business Committee. (see reports)

The report of the Youth Camp Board read and accepted.

The clerk-treasurer's report was read and accepted and the clerk commended for his work. (see treasurer's financial report)

The report of the promotional secretary of Youth Camp

was received as information.

A partial report of the Business Committee was read with motion made and sustained to consider item by item. (see reports for items)

R. B. Spurgeon tendered his resignation on the Youth Camp Board. His resignation was received by motion and a standing vote of appreciation was given to him for his service.

Rev. W. S. Mooneyham delivered the message with Rev. 2:1-7 as the text, and "The Churches' Need" as the subject. At the close of the message a portion of the congregation assem-

bled in the altar for prayer led by Rev. Harry Beatty.

BUSINESS COMMITTEE

We, your Business Committee, submit the following report:

1. We recommend that Article 4 of the Constitution be changed to read as follows:

The officers of this Association shall be a moderator, an assistant moderator, and a clerk-treasurer, said officers shall

be elected at the close of each session and hold office until their successors are elected and qualified.

2. We recommend that Article 9 of the Constitution be

changed to read as follows:

This constitution may be amended at any regular body by a two thirds majority vote of all the members present, after the proposed amendment has laid on the table for one day.

- 3. We recommend that the money received from the entertainment committee for the National Association be turned into the General Fund with the understanding that should late bills be received by that committee that they be paid out of same fund.
- 4. We recommend that no person serve simultaneously on two standing boards.
- 5. In compliance with the request from the Southeast Yearly Meeting, we recommend that By-Law Number 16 be changed to read as follows: Five delegates from each affiliated local association, or yearly meeting; one delegate from each church plus one delegate for each fifty members or larger fraction there-of. Each church which represents must be a member of a local association or yearly meeting holding membership in this body.

6. We recommend that each church give a minimum of 10% of its total income to the State Co-operative Fund to be allo-

cated the same as last year.

- 7. Inasmuch as it has become increasingly difficult to secure a suitable place for the meeting of the State Association, we recommend that entertainment of the State Association be placed on a basis similar to that of the National Association, in that all who attend would be responsible for their meals, but the church or association entertaining the State Association furnish bedding facilities as far as possible.
- 8. We recommend that a standing vote of thanks be given to the Youth Camp Board for their efforts in entertaining this session of the State Association; also to Bro. Ray Turnage for services as dietician, to the cooks and kitchen help, and to the State Executive Board.
- 9. We recommend that the following recommendation from the Missions Board be adopted as we have at the present time numerous opportunities to organize new churches in the State of Missouri: We recommend that instead of electing one home mission team each year that the board of Home Missions be granted the permission to operate on a similar basis to that of the National Missions Boards in selecting men for given fields, supervising their work, and getting their support underwritten.

10. We recommend that the present editor of the Gem be

retained for one year under the same terms as last year.

We further recommend that the contract with the General Baptist Press be renewed for the coming year.

CONSTITUTION

- 1. This Association shall be called the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists.
- 2. The object of this Association shall be for the bringing together of the Free Will Baptists of the State of Missorui in one great annual gathering, so they can get better acquainted with each other, and for the upbuilding of the Free Will Baptist Churches of Missouri for the salvation of souls.
- 3. The Association shall be composed of duly elected delegates elected by the bodies holding membership in this body.
- 4. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, an Assistant Moderator, and a Secretary, Treasurer, said officers shall be elected annually at the beginning of each session and hold their office until their successors are elected and qualified; a board of trustees of five members whose terms of office shall be as follows: One for one (1) year, one for two (2) years, one for three (3) years, one for four (4) years, and one for five (5) years; and at the expiration of these terms, one is to be elected for a term of five years who shall hold office until his successors are elected; and further, if any vacancy occur between sessions of the Association, the Board shall fill such vacancy or vacancies until the next Association; who shall perform the following duties: First, shall be the legal corporation of the Association with the corporate name of the Board of Trustees of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists; to be a Board of Missions and Church Extension, to secure, hold, use and convey money, homes or lands for the propagation of the gospel in connection with the Free Will Baptist denomination. Second, to receive, hold, manage, use, control, or convey any property entrusted to the Association for and in accordance with the donor's purpose. Said Board of Trustees shall also compose the Home Mission Board. They may be chosen from ministers, deacons, or delegates.
- 5. This Association shall not usurp any authority over the Quarterly Meetings, or Associations that shall be under its supervision, but shall be an advisory body to help them.
- 6. Seven or more ordained ministers or deacons from two or more bodies, belonging to this Association shall constitute a quorum to transact business.
- 7. The Clerk or Assistant Clerk, and in their absence the senior minister in age, shall call the Association to order for business, and call the Moderator or Assistant Moderator to the chair, and if neither Moderator nor Assistant Moderator is

present, then the senior minister in age shall act as Moderator. On taking his chair, the Moderator shall call for the reading of the letters from the different bodies composing this Association, and after letters are read he shall seat the delegates. After the delegates are seated, the election of officers shall be in order.

- . 8.. Any organized Quarterly Meeting, Yearly Meeting or Association of Free Will Baptists may unite with this body at any regular session, through a letter or delegates by a two-thirds vote of all members present.
- 9. This Constitution may be added to, amended or changed at any regular session of this body by a two-thirds vote of all members present, after written notice of the contemplated change has been published in the official paper three months previous to the session at which such change is to take place.

BY-LAWS

- 1. All business meetings shall be opened by singing, reading a portion of God's Word and prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.
- 2. All business, except routine, shall be brought before the body by committees, but should any committee refuse or fail to present to this body any business given it by any member of this Association, then such business may be presented to the body by any member, but cannot be discussed unless by a vote of this body.
- 3. No one shall speak more than five minutes or more than twice on the same subject without the consent of the Moderator.
- 4. Any member of this body can appeal from the decision of the Moderator to the Association, and by a majority vote thereon, the objection shall be sustained or rejected.
- 5. No one shall leave the Association without the consent of the Moderator.
- 6. Anyone desiring to speak shall arise and say, "Brother Moderator," but shall speak no further until he or she is recognized by the Moderator.
- 7. The Moderator shall stop all discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit, or when he thinks it is likely to lead to discord or division.
- 8. The officers of this body shall submit, at every annual session, a report of the work done for this Association.

- 9. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all business transactions; be responsible for all funds received and disbursed; shall superintend the printing of the minutes and shall receive an honorarium of one hundred twenty (120.00) dollars per year.
- 10. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.
- 11. All officers of this Association shall be nominated from the floor and elected by standing vote unless otherwise requested or ordered by the body.
- 12. All resolutions and reports shall bear the names of all the members of the committee who favor them; and if the names be not a majority of all members of such committee, then the Clerk shall not read the resolution or report.
- 13. All committees shall be appointed by the Moderator, with the assistance of a committee on committees, which shall be appointed by the Moderator.
- 14. All business coming before this Association shall be decided by secret ballot when there is any opposition or objection.
- 15. A majority of all votes shall be final upon all subjects except to amend the Constitution, receive Quarterly Meetings or Associations, and the changing of the members of the committees appointed by the Moderator, then it shall require a two-thirds majority.
- 16. The number of delegates to the State Association shall be one delegate for the Association and in addition, one delegate for every fifty resident members or major fraction thereof.
- 17. The standing delegates to this Association shall be all ordained ministers and their companions, provided the companion is a member in good standing in some Free Will Baptist Church belonging to this State Association, all ordained deacons; and Associational Clerks.
- 18. The sessions of this Association shall convene on Tuesday night following the third Sunday in August each year.
- 19. These By-Laws may be amended or changed at any regular session of this Association.

PROPOSED CHANGES OF CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS MISSOURI STATE ASSOCIATION

1. We recommend that Article 4 of the Constitution be changed to read as follows:

The officers of this Association shall be a moderator, an assistant moderator, and a clerk-treasurer, said officers shall be elected at the close of each session and hold office until their successors are elected and qualified:

Note: The phrase "at the close" replaces the phrase "in the beginning" as it now reads in the Constitution.

2. We recommend that Article 9 of the Constitution be changed to read as follows:

This Constitution may be amended at any regular body by a two-thirds majority vote of all the members present, after the proposed amendment has laid on the table for one day.

Note: The article now reads: This Constitution may be added to, amended or changed at any regular session of this body by a two-thirds vote of all members present, after written notice of the contemplated change has been published in the official paper three months previous to the session at which such chane is to take place.

3. In compliance with the request from the Southeast Yearly Meeting, we recommend that By-Law Number 16 be changed to read as follows:

The number of delegates to the State Association shall be five delegates from each affiliated local association or yearly meeting; one delegate from each church plus one delegate for each fifty members or larger fraction thereof. Each church which represents must be a member of a local association or yearly Meeting holding membership in this body.

Note: The Constitution now reads: The number of delegates to the State Association shall be one delegate for the Association and in addition, one delegate for every fifty resident members or major fraction thereof.

This proposed change was made and sustained on the floor: That last sentence of Article 7 of Constitution be deleted.

Note: The sentence reads: After the delegates are seated, the election of officers shall be in order. This proposed change was made necessary in view of the fact that proposed change of Article 4 calls for the election of officers at the close of the session instead of at the beginning.
