Proceedings

The Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists met for their forty-seventh annual session at the First Free Will Baptist Church of Mt. Grove, Mo. Rev. Chesley R. Hill, pastor of Desologe, Mo. church led the congregation in singing hymns, No. 205 "Power in the Blood" and No. 115, "Praise Him, Praise Him."

Rev. Harry Beatty, pastor of the Thayer Church, led the devotional thought. He read Ps. 133, and made pertinent comments. He stressed the importance of unity in our State Associ-

ation and led the body in prayer.

The fifty-five voice choir of the Mt. Grove Church sang several special numbers under the direction of Mrs. Margaret Dixon. Lettia Franklin was at the organ. Neva Raney was

at the piano.

Rev. Roger Reeds, Associational Clerk, called the Association to order and introduced Mr. Omer Wade, Postmaster of Mt. Grove, Mo. and President of the local Master's Men Chapter, who gave the welcome address. Rev. Clarence Burton, paster of First Free Will Baptist Church of Fredericktown, gave the response.

Rev. Reeds introduced the Moderator of the Association, Rev. O. T. Allred of Monett, Mo. Rev. Allred has served as Moderator for the past fifteen years. He spoke of the dangers that face our world and church of today. He pointed out that these dangers are Catholicism, Communism, and Modernism. He challanged we Christians to action to combat these enemies.

Rev. William Buster was introduced as the key-note messenger. He had been selected for the responsibility by vote of the body last year. He used for the basis of his message, Job 16: 19-22. Mo. led the devotional. He read Gal. 6:1-5. He pointed out the fact that if we are going to be spiritual giants we must work at the task. He stressed the need of our praying one for another. He then led the body in prayer.

The Moderator assumed charge and asked the standing dele-

gates to stand.

Rev. James Barker, acting as reading Clerk, read the associational letters. Letters were received from the Central Western, North East, Indian Creek, Liberty, Niangua, Cave Springs, South East, North West Mo. and North East Kansas and Mission Association. The names of the delegates from the local churches were read.

It was motioned that we receive the letters and seat the delegates and inform the Associations concerning the proper amount of delegates in the future. Seconded and carried.

The Moderator gave the charge to the elected delegates. The Moderator recognized the guests of the Association.

A letter of greeting was read from Mr. Ray Turnage, Director of our National League Department.

The Moderator appointed a Committee on Committees. They were: Harry Beatty—Chairman, Harvey Hill, Glen Rehkop, Paul Williams, Wm. T. Turnbough.

The By-Laws of the Association were read.

The Association then adjourned for the Missouri State Woman's Auxiliary Convention.

Dismissal prayer was led by Dr. L. C. Johnson, President

of Free Will Baptist Bible College.

At the close of morning preaching service of the Woman's Auxiliary Convention the Moderator called for the report of the Committee on Committees. This report was read and approved by vote of the body. (See Reports.)

WEDNESDAY EVENING-7:30 P. M.

Rev. C. R. Hill led the congregation in the singing of hymns No. 47, "Since Jesus Came Into My Heart" and No. 235, "He's A Wonderful Saviour To Me."

Beth Smith sang "Tenderly He Watches Over You."

Rev. Paul Williams, pastor of Joplin, Mo. Church, led the devotional thought. He read Romans 15:4-13. Rev. Williams challenged us to present the gospel to the world in a united effort. He then led us in prayer.

The choir of the Mt. Grove Church sang, "Wonderful Grace

of Jesus" and "How Great Thou Art."

The Moderator assumed charge and made several announcements.

Dr. L. C. Johnson, President of the Bible College, was presented for the evening message. He read from John 4:28-36. He pointed out the evil of being occupied with lesser things and as a result missing many opportunities. He challenged the pastors to keep their churches in balance. He said, "The Church needs to feel the spirit of urgency." He pleaded with us to become concerned about the needs of the world. He warned us of the evils of worldliness and modernism that are gaining ground in Free Will Baptist ranks. At the close of the message the congregation sang, "Just As I Am."

Rev. Harry Beatty moved that Rev. Roger Reeds be commended for his work with the Gem and as State Treasurer. Seconded and carried.

A partial report of the Business Committee was given. It

was motioned to receive the report and adopt it item by item. (See Reports.)

titled, "Is Your All On The Altar."

Announcements were made by the Moderator who then introduced the speaker of the hour, Rev. Rolla Smith, General Director of our Foreign Missions Department. He read Ps. 115: 12-18. Beth Smith sang, "Is It Nothing To You." Rev. Smith then proceeded to speak on the subject of "The Field Is The World." He used verse 16 of Psalms 115, for a text in conjunction with Matt. 13:38. Rev. Smith pointed out that man is trying to reach the moon when to date he has failed to reach the world. He described this world as being a populous field. He listed today's population as being near three hundred million souls. He said today's world is a perilous field. He quoted Paul's warning that perilous times would come in the latter days. Rev. Smith said that today's world is a pathetic field. He said that there are a few islands of freedom and prosperity but that as a whole the world is destitute and enslaved. He added that the needs of the world are more than physical; they are spiritual.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend that the Missouri State Association give \$500.00 from the general fund to the National Sunday School Board indebtedness.

2. We recommend that the item from the South East

Missouri Yearly Meeting be adoted.

Whereas the separation of church and state has always been a Baptistic principle, and whereas the Catholic church has always taken a position to the opposite extreme, and whereas the Catholic Church demands the complete loyalty of its members, and whereas the Pope is not only the supreme ruler over the Catholic Church and its membership, but also rules over a foreign power, we recommend that Free Will Baptists every where and especially those in the Missouri State Association prayerfully consider the person for whom they cast their ballot for presidency this fall. We have no ill feeling towards the candidate of the Democratic Party, but since he is a Roman Catholic we fear that his allegience to the Roman Catholic Church will take precedence over his position as president. Knowing this fact every Free Will Baptist ought to carefully screen all of the other candidates and select their man from them.

3. Whereas our Missouri State Youth Camp is a vital part of the State Association, and whereas there is a \$1,000.00

note due and payable October 1st, and whereas the funds in our Youth Camp Treasury are insufficient to pay this note, we recommend that the Missouri State Association pay this note from the Home Missions Treasury. (This item was amended to read "or General Fund" after the words "Home Missions Treasury.')

4. Whereas the Missouri State Association has grown in numbers and whereas the financial status has been strengthened through the Cooperative Plan of Support, and whereas the potential is unlimited and whereas the great commission of our Lord is "Go Ye," we, your Business Committee, feel that the time has come when the Missouri State Association should make a great effort to fulfill our Lord's commission. Therefore, we recommend that this body elect a study committee to study the feasibility of a full time promotional worker, whose duty would be to promote the entire State Program of our denomination.

a. We further recommend that this committee complete their study within 90 days and report to the Executive Board. This committee is then to work in conjunction with the Executive

Board in completing final plans.

b. We further recommend that this committee be reimbursed for their traveling expenses from the State Treasury.

5. We recommend that the co-operative fund be allocated as follows:

60% National Co-operative Fund

17% State Home Missions Treasury

10% Free Will Baptist Gem Fund

5% Free Will Baptist Youth Camp

5% State General Fund

3% State Superanuation Board

6. We recommend that the contract with the General Bap-

tist Press be renewed for the coming year.

7. We recommend that the Missouri State Association program for the 1961 session be made up by the officers and the Executive Board of our Association, with speakers to be selected and notified in advance.

8. We recommend that all Associations use Form G-100 report blanks in reporting to the Missouri State Association.

(These may be obtained from the Gem office.)

9. We recommend that the Missouri State Association give Rev. Harry Beatty a standing vote of thanks for his faithful and efficient service in our state work and a letter of recommendation to the Oklahoma State Association. (Rev. Beatty has accepted a call to work in Oklahoma.)

10. Whereas it is reported that the National League Board is facing a financial crisis at this time, we recommend that our churches and District League Conventions receive a special offer-

ing as soon as possible and send it to the National League Department.

11. We recommend that each standing board prepare their report in advance and have their report in the hands of the Clerk of the Association in time for a digest of reports to be

printed.

12. We recommend that a standing vote of thanks be given the host pastor, the First Free Will Baptist Church of Mt. Grove, and the Mission Association for their outstanding hospitality during this session of our Association.

a. We further recommend that the Associational Clerk write a letter of thanks to the city officials of Mt. Grove for

every courtesy rendered.

Constitution and By-Laws

CONSTITUTION

1. This Association shall be called the Missouri State

Association of Free Will Baptists.

2. The object of this Association shall be for the bringing together of the Free Will Baptists of the State of Missouri in one great annual gathering, so they can get better acquainted with each other, and for the upbuilding of the Free Will Baptist Churches of Missouri for the salvation of souls.

3. The Association shall be composed of duly elected delegates elected by the bodies holding membership in this body.

The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, and Assistant Moderator, and a Secretary-Treasurer, said officers shall be elected annually at the close of each session and hold their office until their successors are elected and qualified: a board of trustees of five members whose terms of office shall be as follows: One for one (1) year, one for two (2) years, one for three (3) years, one for four (4) years, and one for five (5) years; and at the expiration of these terms, one is to be elected for a term of five years who shall hold office until his successors are elected; and further, if any vacancy occur between sessions of the Association, the Board shall fill such vacancy or vacancies until the next Association; who shall perform the following duties: First, shall be the legal corporation of the Association with the corporate name of the Board of Trustees of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists: to be a Board of Missions and Church Extension, to secure, hold, use and convey money, homes or lands for the propagation of the gospel in connection with the Free Will Baptist Second, to receive, hold, manage, use, control, denomination. or convey any property entrusted to the Association for and in accordance with the donor's purpose. Said Board of Trustees shall also compose the Home Mission Board. They may be chosen from ministers, deacons, or delegates.

5. This Association shall not usurp any authority over the Quarterly Meetings, or Associations that shall be under its supervision, but shall be an advisory body to help them.

- 6. Seven or more ordained ministers or deacons from two or more bodies, belonging to this Association shall constitute a quorum to transact business.
- 7. The Clerk or Assistant Clerk, and in their absence the senior minister in age, shall call the Association to order for business, and call the Moderator or Assistant Moderator to the chair, and if neither Moderator nor Assistant Moderator is

37

present, then the senior minister in age shall act as Moderator. On taking his chair, the Moderator shall call for the reading of the letters from the different bodies composing this Association, and after letters are read he shall seat the delegates.

8. Any organized Quarterly Meeting, Yearly Meeting or Association of Free Will Baptists may unite with this body at any regular session, through a letter or delegates by a two-

thirds vote of all members present.

9. This Constitution may be amended at any regular body by a two-thirds majority vote of all the members present, after the proposed amendment has laid on the table for one day.

BY-LAWS

- 1. All business meetings shall be opened by singing, reading a portion of God's Word and prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.
- 2. All business, except routine, shall be brought before the body by committees, but should any committee refuse or fail to present to this body any business given it by any member of this Association, then such business may be presented to the body by any member, but cannot be discussed unless by a vote of this body.
- 3. No one shall speak more than five minutes or more than twice on the same subject without the consent of the Moderator.
- 4. Any member of this body can appeal from the decision of the Moderator to the Association, and by a majority vote thereon, the objection shall be sustained or rejected.
- 5. No one shall leave the Association without the consent of the Moderator.
- 6. Anyone desiring to speak shall arise and say "Brother Moderator," but shall speak no further until he or she is recognized by the Moderator.
- 7. The Moderator shall stop all discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit, or when he thinks it is likely to lead to discord or division.
- 8. The officers of this body shall submit, at every annual session, a report of the work done for this Association.

- 9. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all business transactions; be responsible for all funds received and disbursed; shall superintend the printing of the minutes and shall receive an honorarium of three hundred (300.00) dollars per year.
- 10. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.
- 11. All resolutions and reports shall bear the names of all the members of the committee who favor them; and if the names be not a majority of all members of such committee, then the Clerk shall not read the resolutions or report.
- 12. All committees shall be appointed by the Moderator, with the assistance of a committee on committees, which shall be appointed by the Moderator.
- 13. All business coming before this Association shall be decided by secret ballot when there is any opposition or objection.
- 14. A majority of all votes shall be final upon all subjects except to amend the Constitution, receive Quarterly Meetings or Associations, and the changing of the members of the committees appointed by the Moderator, then it shall require a two-thirds majority.
- 15. The number of delegates to the State Association shall be five delegates from each affiliated local association or yearly meeting; one delegate from each church plus one delegate for each fifty members or larger fraction thereof. Each church which represents must be a member of a local association or yearly meeting holding membership in this body.
- 16. The standing delegates to this Association shall be all ordained ministers and their companions, provided the companion is a member in good standing in some Free Will Baptist Church belonging to this State Association, all ordained deacons; and Associational Clerks.
- 17. The sessions of this Association shall convene on Tuesday night following the third Sunday in August each year.
- 18. These By-Laws may be amended or changed at any regular session of this Association.
