MINUTES OF THE 51ST ANNUAL SESSION OF THE MISSOURI STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS When Convened with the Grant Avenue Free Will Baptist Church of Springfield, Missouri August, 1964

#### TUESDAY NIGHT, 7:30 P.M. - AUGUST 18, 1964

Rev. Albert McFarland, pastor of the South Side Free Will Baptist Church of St. Louis, led the congregation in singing, "Saved, Saved, Saved," and "He Included Me." Barbara Reeves sang a special song.

The 51st Annual session of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists was called to order by the Associational Clerk, Rev. Chesley (Bud) Hill. Rev. Hill read from Psalms 133:1; Psalms 127:1. Rev. Gene Rogers, pastor of the Mountain Grove Free Will Baptist Church of Mountain Grove led the Association in prayer. The congregation then sang another song, "He Is Able to Deliver Thee."

The welcome was given by the Rev. Dale Jones, pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church of Lebanon, Missouri. The response was by the Rev. Gene Norris, pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church of Flat River, Missouri. Rev. Norris read Jeremiah 33:3 to challenge the

State Association to expect great things for this Meeting. The clerk, Rev. Hill, then introduced our moderator, the Rev. O. T. Allred. Rev. Allred delivered the Moderator's Message and challenged those present with THE ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE PAST and THE CHALLENGE OF THE HOUR. Moderator Allred called all of the preachers into the altar for a season of prayer.

The Moderator appointed the Committee on Committees which were as follows: Rev. R. B. Spurgeon; Rev. Leland Horton; Rev. Glenn Rehkop;

Rev. Gene Rogers: Rev. Ted Davis.

Beth Harris of the Monett Free Will Baptist Church sang the "Evening Prayer." "How Great Thou Art" was sung by the Grant Avenue Free Will

Baptist Church Choir.

Moderator Alfred introduced the Kenote Speaker, the Rev. O. T. Dixon, pastor of the host church, Grant Avenue Free Will Baptist Church. His subject for the evening was "Forward With Christ In Evangelism." Preceding the message proper, Rev. Dixon led the congregation in singing two choruses, "Oh, How I Love Jesus," and "Tis The Old Time Religion." We were then challenged with the following statistics: 37 out of 100 persons are under the thumb of Communism: 25 out of 100 under Catholicism. 15 out of 100 are Moslems: 15 out of 100 are subject of Confucianism: 11 out of 100 are Hindu: 8 out of 100 are Christian. Rev. Dixon then stated, "There are too many dead preachers, preaching dead sermons to dead people in dead churches. We need to come alive." I Corinthians 15:51 was used to note the unction that is needed in the pulpit and the facts that we must preach. There also must be action in the pew. We need family altars and these families in the church need to be actively serving the Lord. There needs to be asking at the altar. If the unction is in the pulpit, if action is in the pew, there will be asking in the altar." The Invitation was extended by singing, "Lord, I'm Coming Home." This service was dismissed in prayer by Rev. Everett Hellard.

#### WEDNESDAY MORNING, AUGUST 19, 1964

Rev. Jesse Webb, pastor of the Parkview Free Will Baptist Church of Desloge led the congregation in singing "Sunlight" and "Since Jesus Came Into My Heart." Prayer was by Rev. Johnny Land, pastor of the Grace Free Will Baptist Church in Arnold. The devotional was by Rev. Leland Horton, pastor of the Free Will Baptist Church of Kirksville. Rev. Horton used I Kings 19:19 and one verse from Mark 16. Rev. Horton challenged us to do as Elisha and burn our bridges behind us in order to go forward with Christ. He stated that the reason we don't go forward with Christ is that we cross the bridges before we get to them. Rev. Horton led the congregation in prayer.

Moderator Allred took charge of the service. Correspondence letters were called for but there were none to be received. Visitors were recognized which were as follows: Rev. Rufus Coffey, National Director of

Missionary Conferences; Rev. Paul J. Ketteman, Public Relations Representative from the Free Will Baptist Bible College; Rev. Carlisle Hanna, Missionary to India, and Rev. Jim Lauthren, Representative from the National Sunday School Board. Greetings were extended to the Association.

A partial report of the Credentials Committee was given with the Clerk reading the names of delegates from the various yearly meetings.

MSC that we receive this partial report of the Credentials Committee.

A charge was given by Moderator Allred to the delegates to conduct business as the Lord directs. The Clerk read from the minutes concerning the standing delegates (Article 34, By-Laws). Rev. Paul J. Ketteman spoke informatively in behalf of the Free Will Baptist Bible College. Rev. Ketteman spoke of the progress of the Bible College in the past twenty (20) years, the increase of the student body, building from one (1) to ten (10), but stressed the need for more buildings to house the enlarging student body. He told of the need for more trained full time men. This is where our Bible College is doing its greatest work. He commented on large donation the state of Missouri has made to the Bible College.

The Clerk read the names of the delegates.

MSC that report be received. MSC to receive the delegates whose names were read by the clerk. This session was dismissed in prayer by Rev. Lloyd Jeffreys.

#### WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 19, 1964 - 7:30 P.M.

Rev. Frank Giunta led the congregation in singing "Stand Up, Stand Up For Jesus."

Moderator Allred called for the clerk to read the Constitutional and By-Law changes. MSC that we receive the report for consideration and it be placed on the table until tomorrow.

Congregational Song: "When We All Get To Heaven." Rev. James Barker, pastor of the Hurryville Church of near Farmington was called to lead in prayer. Special music given by a quartet which was composed of Rev. Albert McFarland, Rev. Jesse Webb, Rev. Teddy Davis, and Rev. James Earl Raper with Rev. James McAllister at the piano.

An offering was received to be divided equally between the National Foreign Mission Department, the National Home Mission Department, and the Missouri State Association General Fund. The amount of the offering was \$137.17. Offeratory prayer by Rev. Raper who presided over the Wednesday evening service.

Congregational song: "He Lives." Special song by the Rev. Everett Hellard, pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church of Farmington: "Life's Railway to Heaven."

Rev. Raper introduced the speaker for the evening, the Rev. Homer Willis, General Director of the Home Mission Department of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. He used Jeremiah 7:1-7; 22-24. "They went backward and not forward." Rev. Willis made the following remarks and observations. We need something to happen in America and,

if we are dedicated to God, something will happen. We need to be praying, "God, give us America." We have depended upon groups to do things that individuals should be doing. We need to extend our branch of work in the matter of Home Missions and Church Extension. We need to advance with Jesus Christ and do something about the multitudes. If we advance with Jesus, we must have these following things: We must be what we ought to be; must have a devoted love for Jesus; must have a devoted love for our brethren; by loving the sinner, we have a life that is unusual. He mentioned six (6) different ways in which our life will be unusual which are as follows: Live a life of unusual peace; a life of unusual contentment; a life of unusual faith; a life of unusual power; a life of unusual victory; and a life of unusual joy. The sermon was concluded with this challenge: "Spend at least fifteen (15) minutes per day for a month in prayer and we will be what we ought to be." The song of invitation was "Have Thine Own Way."

With the desire to increase the total offering to \$150.00, another offering was received which brought the total to \$151.17. Closing prayer

was by the Rev. James Earl Raper.

#### THURSDAY MORNING, AUGUST 20, 1964

The congregation was led in singing "We're Marching To Zion" and "To God Be The Glory" by the Rev. Albert McFarland, pastor of the South Side Church in St. Louis. The morning devotional was by the Rev. Cletus Nichols, pastor of the Hazel Creek Union Church of Kirksville. He spoke concerning the need of obeying God's commandments if we are to go Forward with Christ. Rev. Nichols concluded with prayer.

Rev. Bud Hill read the final report of the Registration Committee. There were fifty-one (51) local church delegates. He also read the names of delegates of Southeast Missouri Yearly Meeting and the Mission Asso-

ciation. MSC to receive these delegates.

Mrs. Leona Thompson gave the statistical report. MSC to receive

this report.

Rev. Hill read the report of the General Board concerning the referring of budgets to the Budget Committee. MSC to receive this partial report and bring reports to the body immediately.

Report of the Youth Camp was given by Rev. Reeves. MSC to receive

the report and approve this budget for the coming year.

Report of the Home Mission Board was read. MSC to receive this report. Rev. Hill read the minutes of the General Board concerning the Home Home Mission Board as a means of explanation.

A partial report of the Nominating Committee regarding nominations for all standing Boards was given by Rev. Albert McFarland. MSC to receive this report which was as follows: Home Mission Board - Rev. Leland Horton for a five (5) year term; Rev. Bob Jones for a three (3) year term; and Rev. James McAllister for a four (4) year term. These were elected

by acclamation. Rev. Bud Hill was nominated to the Youth Camp Board for a five (5) year term. MSC to elect Rev. Hill by acclamation. Rev. Cletus Nichols was nominated for a five (5) year term on the Board of Superannuation. MSC to elect Rev. Nichols by acclamation. Rev. Lloyd Jeffreys was nominated to serve an unexpired term on the Board of Superannuation. Rev. Gene Norris was also nominated. MSC to close nominations and proceed to elect. Rev. Jeffreys was elected to this Board. Rev. Frank Giunta gave his resignation to the Association to be relieved of his duties as a member of the Board of Superannuation. MSC to accept his resignation. Sunday School and Church Training Service Board - Hubert Harral for a five year term; Rev. Eddie Altis for a three (3) year term. Bros. Harral and Altis were elected by acclamation.

Rev. Harry Asher submitted his resignation from the Home Mission Board. MSC that his resignation be accepted and that we extend our ap-

preciation for services rendered.

Editor Bud Hill gave the report from the Free Will Baptist GEM. MSC that report be received and we extend our appreciation for a job well done.

Time was given on the program to Rev. Rufus Coffey, Director of Conference Ministries, to speak concerning the National Foreign Mission Department. He expressed gratitude to the State of Missouri for their contributions of prayers, monies, and personnel; and, because of this, God has given many blessings. He related the needs of the missionaries and the need of the denomination for a good training program for the local natives. He also stated that our Foreign Mission Department is undergirded by our Home Mission Department and our educational front at the Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, Tennessee.

Mr. Hubert Harral related information regarding the Master's Men and the National Laymen's Board. This Board consists of seven (7) members. 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#### THE GENERAL BOARD REPORT

We, the General Board, recommend the following Constitutional changes:

Item 1: No. 4, Section 1, Officers changed to read: "The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, and Clerk, who shall be elected annually at the close of each session and hold their office until their successors are elected."

Item 2: Section 2, Boards A. We recommend the following changes: "All standing boards shall be composed of five members, exclusive of the General Board. Standing Boards include the Home Missions Board, the Sunday School and Church Training Board, the Youth Camp Board, the Superannuation Board, and the General Board."

(In the By-Laws)

No. 5: "All standing boards shall be composed of five members, exclusive of the General Board. Standing Boards include the Home Missions Board, the Sunday School and Church Training Board, the Youth Camp Board, the Superannuation Board, and the General Board."

Item 3: The last part of Section 7 shall be as follows: "On taking his chair, the Moderator shall call for the reading of the report of the Credential Committee and after hearing the report he shall seat the delegates."

Item 4: Section 33 of the By-Laws shall be changed to read, "the number of delegates to the State Association shall be 7 delegates for each affiliated local association or yearly meeting."

Item 5: Section 59 shall be changed as follows: "No officer shall serve the same office more than 3 consecutive years. (However, this does not apply to those elected officers at the dating of these By-Laws, August 23, 1962.)

#### REPORT OF PUBLICATIONS AND LITERATURE COMMITTEE

- 1. Whereas the sale of literature is the only means of support for our Sunday School Department, we recommend that all our Sunday Schools use Free Will Baptist Sunday School Literature published by the National Sunday School Board.
- 2. We recommend that each pastor stress loyalty to true Free Will Baptist Literature in every phase of our work.
- 3. We recommend that our churches and people patronize our Missouri State Free Will Baptist Bookstore, 3100 Mt. Pleasant, St. Louis, Missouri, to secure proper books that are true to the Bible and Free Will Baptist doctrine. We further recommend that our bookstore make provisions whereby Bible School supplies, etc. may be purchased.
- 4. We recommend that each pastor send a list of his members names and addresses to the Foreign and Home Mission Boards in order to insure their receiving "Heartbeat" and "Mission-grams."

- 5. We recommend that every church adopt the Church Family Plan for the Free Will Baptist GEM and Contact and that a special effort be made by every church and pastor to have the GEM in every Free Will Baptist Home in Missouri.
- 6. We recommend that the Missouri State Association encourage the publication of Study Course books, written by Free Will Baptists, on such subjects as: Duties of Ushers, Church Clerk, Treasurer, Deacons, Trustees, etc., and for the new convert to faith in Christ.
- 7. We recommend that all yearly associations be encouraged to promote local church libraries to make better informed people.

#### REPORT OF THE STATE HOME MISSION BOARD

The State Home Mission Board met three times during the past year. One of the meetings was for the purpose of investigating the possibility of beginning a new work in Sedalia, Missouri. Another time the board met to organize a new church in Conway, Missouri.

Meeting at the State Association in Kirksville on August 20, 1963, we discussed possible plans of action for our Board. The discussion centered around the methods we need to use to make our work most effective and the various towns in Missouri that would be opportunities for new churches.

On September 16, 1963, we met in Sedalia, Missouri. After talking with several families who are Free Will Baptist, looking at several possible buildings, we authorized Rev. Lester Jones to work part time in laying the groundwork. He was to use newspaper ads, spots on radio and any other way to get the word out about the services. A group is now holding regular services in Sedalia and looking forward to the time for organization.

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We were invited to Conway to take part in the organizational services of a new church there. Organized with eighteen (18) members the church elected Rev. Cliff Bowman as pastor; clerk is Bro. Dwight Cunningham; treasurer is May Dinwiddie; one deacon was also elected, Bro. Merle Miller

#### REPORT OF THE TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE

3. It is our opinion that many of our young people who purchase records of rock and roll singers do not realize that they are being indoctrinated with atheistic and immoral tendencies. We give as example a recent article in Saturday Evening Post, which stated that the Beatles openly professed that they were anti-Christ and boasted of their vulgarity and profanity. We suggest that our young people screen the artist in all record purchases as to their character and content of the music.

#### BY-LAWS OF THE MISSOURI FREE WILL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

#### Name

This Association shall be called the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists.

#### Purpose

The object of this Association shall be for the bringing together of the Free Will Baptist of the State of Missouri in one annual gathering, that we may become better acquainted with one another, the upholding of the Free Will Baptist churches of Missouri, and a world-wide outreach for souls.

#### Membership

- 1. The Association shall be composed of the members of the various local affiliated Associations.
- 2. Any organized Quarterly Meeting, Yearly Meeting or Association of Free Will Baptists, may unite with this body at any regular session, through a letter or delegates by a two-thirds vote of all delegates present.

- 1. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Assistant Moderator and Clerk, who shall be elected annually at the close of each session and hold their office until their successors are elected.
- 2. The officers of this body shall submit, at every annual session, a report of the work done for this Association.
- 3. The Moderator shall be the principal executive officer of the Association and he shall sign, with the Clerk or any other proper officer or agent of the Association thereunto authorized by the General Board, any deeds, mortgages, bonds, contracts, or other instruments which the General Board has authorized to be executed, except in cases where the signing and execution thereof shall be expressly delegated by the General Board or by these By-Laws to some other officer or agent of the Association, or shall be required by law to be otherwise signed or executed; and in general, shall perform all duties incident to the office of Moderator and such other duties as may be prescribed by the General Board from time to time.
- 4. In the absence of the Moderator or in the event of his death, inability or refusal to act, the Assistant Moderator shall perform the duties of the Moderator, and when so acting, shall have all powers of and be subject to all the restrictions upon the Moderator. The Assistant Moderator shall perform such duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the Moderator or by the General Board.
- 5. The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of all business transactions; shall superintend the printing of the minutes and shall receive an honorarium of an amount agreed upon by this body.
- 6. The Clerk shall: (a) keep the minutes of the Association and of the General Board meetings in one or more books provided for the purpose; (b) see that all notices are duly given in accordance with the provisions of these By-Laws or as required by law; (c) be custodian of the Association records and of the seal of the Association and see that the seal of the Association is affixed to all documents the execution of which on behalf of the Association; and (e) in general, perform all duties incident to the office of Clerk and such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the Moderator or by the General Board.
- 7. No officer shall serve the same office more than three consecutive years. (Omitted However, this does not apply to those officers who are serving at dating of these By-Laws. 8/23/62)

#### Boards

- 1. All standing boards shall be composed of five members, exclusive of the General Board. Standing Boards include the Home Missions Board, the Sunday School and Church Training Service Board, the Youth Camp Board, the Superannuation Board and the General Board.
- 2. The duties of the various standing boards shall be to plan a program and supervise its operation in their respective fields, and to receive, hold, manage, use or convey any funds and property entrusted to said Boards.

Election: 3. The personnel of each of the foregoing, exclusive of the General Board, shall be elected as follows: The first named for a term of one year, the second for a term of two years, the third for a term of three years, and fourth for a term of four years, and the fifth for a term of five years, and thereafter each shall be elected for a term of five years.

4. The personnel of the General Board shall be composed of the officers of the State Association; the chairman of all standing Boards and one member from each affiliated Association to be elected by the State Body whose term of office shall be two years and so constituted that the expiration date of the term of office of half of these, shall expire one year and the other half the following year. This shall be determined by alphabetical order of the name of the affiliated Association.

5. No person shall fill more than one office at the same time except as he may become a member of the General Board by virtue of his office. No person shall serve on more than one standing board at the same time, except as he may become a member of the General Board by virtue of being Chairman of the Board of which he is an elected member.

6. Any vacancy occurring in the General Board may be filled by the affirmative vote of a majority of the remaining Board members though less than a quorum of the General Board, unless otherwise provided by law.

7. All Board members elected to fill a vacancy shall be elected for

the unexpired term of his predecessor in office.

<u>Duties:</u> 8. The General Board shall have power to act in behalf of, and for the State Association from one regular session to another, and shall have power to elect such officers as may be necessary to carry out the plans and undertakings of the State Association. The General Board shall have the right to employ a Promotional Secretary who shall serve as Treasurer of the Association and be responsible for handling all monies of the Association. He shall be bonded for an amount in excess of the monies he shall be handling. In addition, the Promotional Secretary shall manage the Association's Book Store and in general promote the work of the Association and the Cause of Christ. He shall make an annual financial report to the Association.

9. The General Board shall have power to fill irregular vacancies that may occur in its own body and shall also have power to fill any irregular vacancies that may occur in any department of work between sessions of the State Association. It shall be the duty of this Board to make written reports of all its works to each annual session of the Association.

10. An Executive Committee consisting of seven members shall be elected by the General Board from among its membership, whose duty it shall be to act on all matters coming within the scope of the work of the Board when said Board is not in session. It shall also plan and execute

the program for the Missouri State Association.

11. A majority of the number of General Board members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the General Board, but if less than such majority is present at a meeting, a majority of the Board members present may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice.

-35-

12. The act of the majority of the Board members present at a meeting at which a quorum is present, shall be the act of the General Board.

13. A Board member of the Association who is present at a meeting of the General Board at which action on any Association matter is taken, shall be presumed to have assented to the action taken unless his dissent shall be entered in the minutes of the meeting.

14. The General Board may authorize any officer or officers, agent or agents, to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of and on behalf of the Association, and such authority may be

general or confined to specific instances.

15. Any persons or agent elected or appointed by the General Board may be removed by the General Board whenever in its judgment the best interests of the Association would be served thereby, but such removal shall be without prejudice to the contract rights, if any, of the person so removed.

16. By resolution of the General Board the Board members may be paid their expenses, if any, of attendance at each meeting of the General Board. No such payment shall preclude any Board Member from serving the Association in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefor.

17. The General Board shall provide an Association seal which shall be circular in form and shall have inscribed thereon the name of the corporation and the state of incorporation and the words, "Corporate Seal."

#### Committees

1. The Moderator shall appoint a committee on committees consisting of five members who shall appoint all Committees.

2. All resolutions and reports shall bear the names of all the members of the committee who favor them; and if the names be not a majority of all members of such committee, then the clerk shall not read the resolutions or report.

Representation

1. The standing delegates to this Association shall be all ordained ministers and their companions, provided the companion is a member in good standing in some Free Will Baptist Church belonging to this State Association; all ordained deacons; and Associational Clerks.

2. The number of elected delegates to the State Association shall be seven delegates from each affiliated local association or yearly meeting; one delegate from each church plus one delegate for each fifty members or larger fraction thereof. Each church which represents must be a member of a local association or yearly meeting holding membership in this body.

3. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with

other religious bodies.

#### Voting

1. Those entitled to vote at any annual or special meeting of this State Association, shall be the elected delegates and standing delegates

as defined in By-Laws 31 and 32, and each elected delegate or standing delegate shall be entitled to one vote.

35. A majority vote shall be final upon all subjects except to amend the By-Laws, receive Quarterly Meeting or Associations, and the changing of the members of the committees appointed by the Moderator, then it shall require a two-thirds majority.

#### Meetings

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36. The sessions of this Association shall convene on Tuesday evening at 7:30 P.M. following the third Sunday in August each year.

- 37. The membership of the State Association may designate any place, either within or without the State of meeting for any annual meeting. Any special meeting may be called by the General Board. A waiver of notice signed by all members entitled to vote at a meeting may designate any place, either within or without the State of Missouri, unless otherwise prescribed by statue, as the place for the holding of such meeting. If no designation is made or if a special meeting be otherwise called, the place of meeting shall be the principal office of the corporation in the State of Missouri.
- 38. In the event the necessity arises from war, or pestilence, or any cause which prevents a regular meeting of the State Association, whether such a condition is of a local or general condition, then the General Board shall be privileged to call and act with full authority in all matters pertaining to the general welfare of the State Association, providing whatever transaction passes shall be by two-thirds vote of the members present, and providing that such transactions shall not conflict with the purpose and edicts of the By-Laws of the State Association.
- 39. Special meetings of the Association, for any purpose or purposes, unless otherwise prescribed by Statute, may be called by the General Board, and shall be called by the Moderator at the request of not less than fifty percent of all the delegate members duly elected by local Associations, Quarterly Meetings and local Churches affiliated with the Association.
- 40. Seven or more ordained ministers or deacons from two or more affiliated Associations belonging to the State Association, shall constitute a quorum to transact business.
- 41. All business meetings shall be opened by singing, reading a portion from God's Word and prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.
- 42. Special meetings of the General Board may be called by or at the request of the Moderator or any two Board members. The person or persons authorized to call special meetings of the General Board may fix the place for holding any special meeting of the General Board called by them.
- 43. Notice of any special meeting shall be given at least fifteen days previously thereto by written notice delivered personally or mailed to each Board member at his business address, or by telegram. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States mail so addressed, with postage thereon prepaid. If notice be

given by telegram, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when the telegram is delivered to the telegraph company. Any Board member may waive notice of any meeting. The attendance of a Board member at a meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except where a Board member attends a meeting for the express purpose of objecting to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened.

44. Unless otherwise provided by law, whenever any notice is required to be given to any member or Board member of the Association under the provisions of these By-Laws or under the provisions of the articles of incorporation, a waiver thereof in writing, signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice whether before or after the time stated therein, shall be deemed equivalent to the giving of such notice.

Discipline

45. The State Association shall not usurp any authority over the Quarterly Meetings, or Associations that shall be under its supervision, but shall be an advisory body to help them.

Fiscal Policy

46. The fiscal year of the Association shall begin on the first (1st) day of August and end on the thirty-first (31st) day of July in each year.

47. All checks, drafts or other orders for the payment of money, notes or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the Association, shall be signed by such officer, or officers, agent or agents, of the Association and in such manner as shall from time to time be determined by resolution of the General Board.

48. No loans shall be contracted on behalf of the Association and no evidences of indebtedness shall be issued in its name unless authorized by a resolution.

49. The General Board by a majority vote of the voting delegates of the State Association, shall be authorized to create or to increase any bonded indebtedness of the Association.

50. The General Board of the Association shall be authorized by a majority vote of the voting delegates of the State Association, to sell, lease, exchange, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of all, or substantially all of the property and assets of the Association.

51. All funds of the corporation not otherwise employed shall be deposited from time to time to the credit of the Association in such banks, trust companies or other depositaries as the General Board may select.

52. The salaries of employees shall be fixed from time to time by the General Board.

Standing Rules

53. The meetings of the State Association and General Board shall be governed by the rules of parliamentary law as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order, except in the case of those rules which are superceded by some rule of this organization.

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- 54. The Clerk, and in his absence the senior minister in age, shall call the Association to order for business, and call the Moderator or Assistant Moderator to the chair, and if neither Moderator nor Assistant Moderator is present, then the senior minister in age shall act as Moderator.
- 55. All business, except routine, shall be brought before the body by committee, but should any committee refuse or fail to present to this body, any business given it by any delegate of this Association, then such business may be presented to the body by any delegate, but cannot be discussed unless a majority vote of this body.
- 56. Anyone desiring to speak shall arise and say "Brother Moderator", but shall speak no further until he or she is recognized by the Moderator.
- 57. No one shall speak more than five minutes or more than twice, on the same subject without the consent of the Moderator.
- 58. Any delegate of this body can appeal from the decision of the Moderator to the Association, and by a majority vote thereon, the objection shall be sustained or rejected.
- 59. No one shall leave the Association when in a business session without the consent of the Moderator.
- 60. The Moderator shall stop all discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit, or when he thinks it is likely to lead to discord or division.
- 61. All business coming before this Association shall be decided by secret ballot when there is any opposition or objection to open vote.

#### Amendments

62. These By-Laws may be amended at any regular body by a twothirds majority vote of all the delegates present, after the proposed amendment has laid on the table one day.
