MINUTES OF THE 53RD ANNUAL SESSION OF THE MISSOURI STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS When Convened with the Lebanon Free Will Baptist Church of Lebanon, Missouri August. 1966

TURSDAY, NIGHT, 7:30 P.M. - AUGUST 23, 1966

The Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists met in Lebanon, Missouri, on August 23, 1966, at 7:30 p.m. with the song director, Rev. Jack Stallings, presiding. The Association opened by singing "He Keeps Me Singing". Prayer by Rev. Grover Terry. The congregation sang "Have Faith In God", with Bro. Stallings leading, and Rev. Ernest Kennedy at the organ and Mrs. Anna Mae McFarland at the piano. Bro. Stallings introduced the Clerk, Rev. Frank Giunta.

Bro. Giunta called the 53rd session into order and introduced the host

pastor Rev. Dale Jones.

The Host Pastor gave a welcome to the group . . . He introduced the Chief

of Police, Mr. Bill Morley, who gave a warm welcome to the Body.

The Clerk then introduced Rev. Harry Asher, who gave the response. Bro. Stallings led in another song, "I Love To Tell The Story." The Clerk then introduced the Moderator, Rev. O. T. Dixon. Bro. Dixon made a few opening remarks and then read from Hebrews 12:22-23. We were challenged to live like children of God as we meet these days.

Bro. Jack Stallings asked the assembly to stand while an offering was

received.

The choir director of the Lebanon Church came forward and led the

choir in a special number, "Seeking the Lost".

The Moderator then introduced the speaker, Rev. Clarence Burton. He spoke on the subject, "That They May Know", reading from John 14:31, John 12:31, and Genesis 1. He then read from Acts 4:31 and I Cor. 12:13. He stated the need of being filled with the Spirit 365 days a year. That they may know there is a God because we live what we preach. We were encouraged to be united in purpose. He illustrated how the Christians of old were unselfish with their possessions (Acts 4:31. In reality, everything we have belongs to God.)

He requested that each one bow their heads for prayer. The organist

played softly as Bro. Burton extended an invitation.

The Moderator then called for a brief show of hands from various associations. There were approximately 18 from Mission Association, 18 from Niangua Assn., 18 from Northeast Mo. Assn., 12 from Northwest Mo. Assn., 10 from Cave Springs Assn., 8 from Central Western, 19 from Indian Creek, 40 from Liberty, 17 from Southeast Mo., 19 from Laclede County, a few visitors from the Church of God, Christian Church, Missionary Baptist Church and the Methodist Church.

Bro. Berry led the congregation in singing "His Way With Thee". Bro. E. M. Kennedy led in prayer. The congregation sang "A Wonderful Saviour". Devotional by Bro. James Barker. He read from Ephesians 3:13-15, 17 and concluded with prayer.

Bro. O. T. Dixon led the congregation in the chorus "There is a Name I Love to Hear." $_{-8-}$

The Moderator read the rules, regulating the business of the State Body. He had all the standing delegates to rise and give them the challenge. The Clerk read the names of individual delegates from churches. They were asked to stand. M-S-C to receive and seat the delegates.

The Yearly Associational Letters were read, along with their list of delegates. Delegates were asked to stand. M-S-C to receive partial report.

It was noted that no corresponding letters had been received.

Rev. Len Gardner was given the opportunity to name delegates from his area because no letter was received.

M-S-C made to adopt program with revisions.

The Niangua Association, Cave Springs Assoc., and Central Western

Assoc. reported without letters and named delegates.

The ministers in the State were asked to stand and identify themselves and their churches. They were welcomed by the Assistant Moderator, Bro. O. T. Allred.

Dr. J. D. O'Donnell from the Oklahoma Bible College was recognized.

He introduced his companions.

The Clerk read the report on the Committee on Committees. M-S-C to receive the report.

M-S-C to ask Rev. Alton Loveless to sit in counsel with State Association.

Dr. J. D. O'Donnell was asked to give an oral report of the work at the Oklahoma Bible College.

A telegram received from Rev. J. Reford Wilson, National Foreign Mis-

sions Director, was read by the clerk.

M-S-C to receive partial report of the General Board which was read by the clerk, and to vote on it item by item.

Bro. Eddie Altis was asked to speak in regard to the Layman's Breakfast. The congregation then sang the chorus of "What A Friend". The Moderator concluded with prayer.

11:00 A.M. WORSHIP SERVICE

Rev. Andy Lay opened the service by leading the congregation in singing, "Love Lifted Me".

The congregation stood as Bro. A. L. McFarland led in prayer. We then sang "I Know Whom I Have Believed." Special music was given by JoAnn Filkins, "Jesus Use Me".

Bro. Woodrow Matthews introduced the speaker, Bro. Luther Gibson. He read from Acts 17:28-33, and then offered prayer. His topic: "That They May Know -- Men Must Repent". His text was taken from verse 30. He concluded the message with prayer. The congregation was asked to stand as the invitation was extended. The song "There is A Fountain" was used as an invitation.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COLLEGE COMMITTEE

At the 1965 meeting of the State Association, the following recommendation of the Resolutions Committee was adopted:

"Be . . . resolved that the General Board appoint a committee of five (5) to examine the feasibility of having a Bible-centered liberal arts

junior college in the State of Missouri."

Pursuant to this action of the delegates, the General Board appointed the following members to serve on a Special College Committee: O. T. Dixon, Chairman; Russell B. Spurgeon, member; Teddy Davis, member; Clarence

Burton, member: and Hubert L. Harral, secretary.

The committee has met twice during the pastyear, in Springfield on January 4th and in Rolla on March 15th. In these two meetings, the members have explored a variety of subjects related to the establishment of a junior college. A number of public officials and college administrators have been contacted for their opinions and advice. As a result, the committee has gained access to information that others have had to acquire through laborious experience over a period of many years. The committee has kept the Executive Board of the State Association informed of its activities and has published one article in the GEM to inform the members throughout the state of its work.

It is the belief of the committee members that there are a considerable number of young Free Will Baptists not now attending college who might do so if denominational college were open to them. In addition, there are several who attend public colleges, many of whom may be subsequently lost to the denomination, who would prefer attending a church-supported school. There are undoubtedly several adults, both pastors and laymen, who would avail themselves of the opportunity to attend a denominational college, at least on a part-time basis.

A number of members in various parts of the state have expressed favorable interest in such a college, and some have already promised their financial support. It is the opinion of the committee that a junior college is within the means of Missouri Free Will Baptists if they are convinced of the need and the hole that it would fill. Any worthwhile project and particularly one designed to be lasting will require dedicated and consistent support, both in its establishment and in its effective maintenance.

A liberal arts college offers courses in three general areas; natural sciences, social sciences, and the humanities. The committee would consider the following statements as preliminary objectives of a proposed two-year school owned and operated by the Missouri Association of Free Will Baptists:

(1) To provide a board liberal arts training for all students in a fully accredited, Bible-centered institution so that our denomination may have intelligent and capable leaders and lay members;

(2) To prepare for transfer to senior colleges and universities those students who desire to complete requirements for the baccalaureate degree;

(3) To provide terminal education for those students who do not plan further education of a formal nature:

(4) To provide special practical courses, both religious and secular, for part-time students and adults: and

(5) To provide limited technical courses for students who desire such training.

The committee further believes that a church-supported junior college should be equipped to offer academic opportunities that would compare favorably with any of the state-operated colleges. There is no need to establish a second-rate school. The immteidate goal of a college, therefore, must necessarily be full accreditation so that course work may be transferred to any senior college or university. Accreditation must come first through the University of Missouri and then from the North Central Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges. The North Central Association sets rigid standards in four areas: (1) buildings and grounds, (2) faculty, (3) library facilities.

The special College Committee submits, therefore, the following recommendations to the delegates of this State Association:

(1) That the committee be authorized to continue its work as a study commission on education, retaining the present members and appointing two laymen as additional members, and

(2) That the study commission be granted authority to perfect official plans to be presented for approval to the State Association in 1967.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTER'S RETREAT

The Minister's Retreat will be held April 24-25, 1967 at the Free Will Baptist Youth Camp. Announcement of the program will be forthcoming.

RECOMMENDATIONS CONCERNING YOUTH CAMP WORK AND FUTURE ACTIVITIES

Whereas the Missouri State Youth Camp of Free Will Baptists has proven to be a vital part of our State work, and has become a most effective means of evangelism, offering the Free Will Baptist youth of this state opportunity for Christian training, fellowship, and recreation; and whereas the camp facilities are constantly being expanded and the program updated to meet the need of our youth; and whereas the camp properties represent several thousands of dollars of investments of the affiliated churches and associations, we, as members of the General Board, therefore, go on record as urging:

1. That the affiliated churches, including pastors, and leaders, and officials of Quarterly Meetings and Associations give full support to the State Youth Camp by encouraging their young people to attend the camp sessions, erecting cabins to meet the need of their particular group, and cooperating fully with the overall program of the said camp.

2. That local groups endeavoring to conduct their own camp give prayerful consideration to the following:

a. The cost of operation,

b. The investment in the state camp. c. The potential of a state-wide camp.

d. The danger of division which could cause a serious setback to the entire program.

LETTER TO BE PRESENTED TO MISSOURI STATE LEGISLATURE STATING STAND OF MISSOURI FREE WILL BAPTISTS REGARDING LEGALIZED GAMBLING

To Whom It May Concer: (To be addressed to the proper committee later) Historically Free Will Baptists have always been for those things that build a strong community and state. We have voted for; we have promoted those endeavors that lend to state character and patriotism. We believe that "Righteousness exalteth a nation: but sin is a reproach to any people." We believe the words of Jesus, "Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness; for they shall be filled."

Inasmuch as we are for the things that build strong community and state character we are opposed to those things that tend to weaken and undermine

proper government.

We are opposed to legalized gambling in Missouri!

There are three basic reasons why we believe gambling is wrong. 1. As a means of transferring property values, gambling is different

from and completely contrary to all legitimate business.

2. Gambling, unlike all legitimate activities, undermines and debases the personality of the one gambling. 3. Gambling, by its very nature, is morally and financially debasing to

a community.

The advocates of legalized gambling cry loud and long that the profit derived from this will bring much additional money into the state. They say this additional income will help our school system and welfare program. Will it? Does the state of Nevada, with open gambling, have a more efficient school system than Missouri? Check the records and you will find it does not. Does the state of Illinois, with its horse-racing, have a more efficient school system than Missouri? Check the records and you will find it does not. The amount of money our state would receive from legalized gambling would be so small compared to the amount that it used it would not make any noticeable difference. Therefore, we cannot accept the theory that the income derived from gambling will enhance our school system and welfare program. What a shame that our children could look at the record and see that we voted for legalized gambling in order that they might have better schools which cannot be gained through this action. Bags with holes!

Another reason why we oppose this legalized gambling is because of the undesirable elements it draws and promotes. Virgil Peterson, Director of the Chicago Crime Commission said: "Those engaged in the gambling business have, with few exceptions, been identified with the criminal element. The ranks of gambling house proprietors have been largely filled with swindlers, confidence men, sharpers, notorious bandits of every description, and even a large number of bank robbers and murderers. The business of gambling has always been characterized by dishonesty. Wherever gambling has prospered there have been strong alliance between gamblers and politicians."

Gentlemen, what kind of value can we place on a few dollars in our state coffers that came from some father who took the last dollar to bet on a horse? Will our state be proud when the newspaper gives the account of a man murdered at the track by some hoodlum? What about the extra expense for more policemen? Nevada has a higher crime rate according to its population than any state. What kind of a double moral standard are we placing before our children?

One thing stands out clear in the history of this country, that professional gambling cannot flourish in any community with cooperation of dishonest law enforcement agencies and politicians. We feel that this temptation should never be placed before our Missouri law enforcement agencies and politicians. A man who cannot swim will never drown as long as he doesn't get near the

pool.

We believe that able people represent us in our state capitol. Many of you are personal friends. We have helped put you in office because we respect and appreciate you. The Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists is asking and urging you to vote against any form of legalized gambling in Missouri. May God help you to lead our wonderful state in the path of righteousness.

Bro. Allred led in prayer. Scripture quoted by members of committee. State Moderator, O. T. Dixon presented bits of information concerning the proposed suggestions and the work at hand. Discussions, pro and con were engaged in, and after much deliberation the following motion was presented:

Motion made and seconded that we as a committee present the following to the General Board of the State Association when it convenes on Tuesday, November 16th, for the purpose of obtaining information and opinions of the

General Board concerning the subject;

1. The committee considers the only available date completely free and not conflicting with other scheduled activities of our state the Tuesday after the second Sunday in June as a possible new date for the annual sessions of our State Association.

Furthermore, we present two other alternatives for brief consideration; A. Should we petition the National Association to set up a proposed program correlating the work of our denomination to follow thusly; annual district meetings, state meetings, and finally the National Association timewise?

B. Should the State Sunday School and CTS Board establish an early date for a separate convention of their own, and solve the urgent problem that confronts us concerning qualifying our young people for National competition? NOTE: The General Board recommends that the date of the Missouri State Association remain the same, since the CTS is meeting its obligation to qualify its youth for National competition.

STATEMENT REGARDING FREE WILL BAPTIST VIEW OF "SECURITY OF THE BELIEVER"

Because of a current theory (Theory: That Apostasy is the only way that

Because of a current theory (Theory: That Apostasy is the only way that a person can be eternally lost after the experience of the New Birth.) that is circulating among Free Will Baptists at many levels concerning the security of the believer, the backslider, and the apostate, we ministers of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists feel it necessary to reaffirm and define our position as stated in the 13th chapter of our Free Will Baptist Treatise.

We do believe that an apostate is one who has had a "born-again experience" (1), and then willfully and openly denies that experience (2, 3, 4, 5, & 6).

We do believe in the conditional <u>security of the believer</u> (7, 8 & 9). We do not believe that a person can be <u>born into God's family spiritually more than once</u> (10), (the doctrine of repeated regeneration).

We believe the position of the backslider is scripturally established as follows: That the backslider is a <u>disobedient</u> and <u>unfaithful</u> <u>servant</u> (11, 12

& 13), and that he is in danger of being eternally lost.

Because of the threat of this erroneous theory, we feel compelled to insist that all officers and board members of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists agree with this statement of faith as stated herein.

unto thee, except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdon of God."

John 3:5 "Jesus answered, Verily, verily I say unto thee, Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." John 3:7 "Marvel not that I said unto thee, Ye must be born again."

2. Heb. 6:6 "If they shall fall away, to renew them again unto repentance, seeing they crucify to themselves the Son of God afresh, and put him to

an open shame."

- 3. Matt. 12:31-32 "Wherefore I say unto you, all manner of sin and blasphemy shall be forgiven unto men. And whosoever speaketh a word against the Son of man, it shall be forgiven him; but whosoever speaketh against the Holy Ghost, it shall not be forgiven him, neither in this world, neither in the world to come."
- 4. I John 5:16 "If any man see his brother sin a sin which is not unto death, he shall ask, and he shall give him life for them that sin not unto death. There is a sin unto death: I do not say that he shall pray for it."

Name

1. This Association shall be called the Missouri State Association for Free Will Baptists.

Purpose

2. The object of this Association shall be for the bringing together of the Free Will Baptists of the State of Missouri in one annual gathering, that we may become better acquainted with one another, the upholding of the Free Will Baptist Churches of Missouri, and a world-wide outreach for souls.

Membership

- 3. The Association shall be composed of the members of the various local affiliated Associations.
- 4. Any organized Quarterly Meeting, Yearly Meeting or Association of Free Will Baptists, may unite with this body at any regular session, through a letter or delegates by a two-thirds vote of all delegates present.

Officers

5. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, and Clerk, who shall be elected annually at the close of each session and hold their office until their successors are elected and qualified.

6. The officers of this body shall submit, at every annual session, a

report of the work done for this Association.

7. The Moderator shall be the principal executive officer of the Association and he shall sign, with the Clerk or any other proper officer or agent of the Association thereunto authorized by the General Board, any deeds, mortgages, bonds, contracts, or other instruments which the General Board has authorized to be executed, except in cases where the signing and execution thereof shall be expressly delegated by the General Board or by these By-Laws to some other officer or agent of the Association, or shall be required by law to be otherwise signed or executed; and in general, shall perform all duties incident to the office of Moderator and such other duties as may be prescribed by the General Board from time to time.

8. In the absence of the Moderator, or in the event of his death, inability or refusal to act, the Assistant Moderator shall perform the duties of the Moderator, and when so acting, shall have all the powers of and be subject to all the restrictions upon the Moderator. The Assistant Moderator shall perform such duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the

Moderator or by the General Board.

9. The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of all business transactions; shall superintend the printing of the Minutes and shall receive an honorarium

of an amount agreed upon by this body.

10. The Clerk shall: (a) keep the Minutes of the Association and of the General Board meetings in one or more books provided for the purpose; (b) see that all notices are duly given in accordance with the provisions of these By-Laws or as required by law; (c) be custodian of the Association records and of the seal of the Association and see that the seal of the Association is affixed to all documents the execution of which on behalf of the Association under its seal is duly authorized; (d) have general charge of the books of the Association; and (e) in general, perform all duties incident to the office of Clerk and such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the Moderator or by the General Board.

11. No officer shall serve the same office more than three consecutive years.

Boards

12. All standing boards shall be composed of five members, exclusive of the General Board. Standing Boards include the Home Missions Board, the Sunday School and Church Training Service Board, the Youth Camp Board, the Superannuation Board, and the General Board.

13. The duties of the various standing boards shall be to plan a program and supervise its operation in their respective fields, and to receive, hold, manage, use or convey any funds and property entrusted to said Boards.

Election

14. The personnel of each of the foregoing, exclusive of the General Board, shall be elected as follows: The first named for a term of one year, the second for a term of two years, and third for a term of three years, the fourth for a term of four years, and the fifth for a term of five years, and

thereafter each shall be elected for a term of five years.

15. The personnel of the General Board shall be composed of the officers of the State Association; the chairmen of all standing boards and one member from each affiliated Association to be elected by the State Body whose term of office shall be two years and so constituted that the expiration date of the term of office of half of these shall expire one year and the other half the following year. This shall be determined by alphabetical order of the name of the affiliated Association.

16. No person shall fill more than one office at the same time except as he may become a member of the General Board by virtue of being Chairman

of the Board of which he is an elected member.

17. Any vacancy occurring in the General Board may be filled by the affirmative vote of a majority of the remaining Board members though less than a quorum of the General Board, unless otherwise provided by law.

18. All Board members elected to fill a vacancy shall be elected for

the unexpired term of his predecessor in office.

<u>Duties</u>

19. The General Board shall have power to act in behalf of, and for the State Association from one regular session to another, and shall have power to elect such officers as may be necessary to carry out the plans and undertakings of the State Association. The General Board shall have the right to employ a Promotional Secretary who shall serve as Treasurer of the Association and be responsible for handling all monies of the Association. He shall be bonded for an amount in excess of the monies he shall be handling. In addition, the Promotional Secretary shall manage the Association's Book Store and in general promote the work of the Association and the Cause of Christ. He shall make an annual financial report to the Association.

20. The General Board shall have power to fill any irregular vacancies that may occur in its own body and shall also have power to fill any irregular vacancies that may occur in any department of work between sessions of the State Association. It shall be the duty of this Board to make written reports of

all its works to each session of the Association.

21. An Executive Committee consisting of seven members shall be elected by the General Board from among its membership, whose duty it shall be to act on all matters coming within the scope of the work of the Board when said Board is not in session. It shall also plan and execute the program for the annual sessions of the Missouri State Association.

22. A majority of the number of General Board members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the General Board, but if less than such majority is present at a meeting, a majority of the Board members present may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice.

23. An act of the majority of the Board members present at a meeting at

which a quorum is present, shall be an act of the General Board.

24. A Board member of the Association who is present at a meeting of the General Board at which action on any Association matter is taken shall be presumed to have assented to the action taken unless his dissent shall be entered in the Minutes of the meeting.

25. The General Board may authorize any officer or officers, agent or agents, to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of and on behalf of the Association, and such authority may be

general or confined to specific instances.

26. Any person or agent elected or appointed by the General Board may be removed by the General Board whenever in its judgment the best interests of the Association would be served thereby, but such removal shall be without prejudice to the contract rights, if any, of the persons so removed.

27. By resolution of the General Board the Board members may be paid their expenses, if any, of attendance at each meeting of the General Board. No such payment shall preclude any Board member from serving the Assoc-

iation in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefor.

28. The General Board shall provide an Association seal which shall be circular in form and shall have inscribed thereon the same of the corporation and the state of incorporation and the words, "Corporate Seal".

Committees

29. The Moderator shall appoint a committee on committees consisting

of five members who shall appoint all committees.

30. All resolutions and reports shall bear the names of all the members of the committee who favor them; and if the names be not a majority of all members of such committee, then the clerk shall not read the resolutions or report.

Representation

31. The standing delegates of this Association shall be all ordained Free Will Baptist ministers and their companions, all ordained deacons, and Associational Clerks, provided they are members in good standing in some Free Will Baptist church belonging to this State Association.

32. The number of elected delegates to the State Association shall be seven delegates from each affiliated local association or yearly meeting; one delegate from each church, plus one delegate for each fifty members or larger fraction thereof. Each church which represents must be a member of a local association or yearly meeting holding membership in this body.

33. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with

other religious bodies.

Voting

34. Those entitled to vote at any annual or special meeting of this State Association, shall be the elected delegates and standing delegates as defined in By-Laws 31 and 32, and each elected delegate or standing delegate shall be entitled to one vote.

35. A majority vote shall be final upon all subjects except to amend the By-Laws receive Quarterly Meetings or Associations, and the changing of the members of the committees appointed by the Moderator, then it shall re-

quire a two-thirds majority.

Meetings

36. The sessions of this Association shall convene on Tuesday evening

at 7:30 p.m. following the third Sunday in August each year.

37. The membership of the State Association may designate any place, either within or without the State of Missouri for any annual meeting. Any special meeting may be called by the General Board. A waiver of notice signed by all members entitled to vote at a meeting may designate any place, either within or without the State of Missouri, unless otherwise prescribed by statue, as the place for the holding of such meeting. If no designation is made, or if a special meeting be otherwise called, the place of meeting shall be the principal office of the corporation in the State of Missouri.

38. In the event the necessity arises from war, or pestilence, or any cause which prevents a regular meeting of the State Association, whether such a condition is of a local or general condition, then the General Board shall be privileged to call and act with full authority in all matters pertaining to the general welfare of the State Association, providing whatever transaction passed shall be by two-thirds vote of the members present, and providing that such transactions shall not conflict with the purpose and edicts of the

By-Laws of the State Association.

39. Special meetings of the Association, for any purpose or purposes, unless otherwise prescribed by statute, may be called by the General Board, and shall be called by the Moderator at the request of not less than fifty percent of all the delegate members duly elected by local Associations, Quarterly Meetings and local churches affiliated with the Association.

40. Seven or more ordained ministers or deacons from two or more affiliated Associations belonging to the State Association, shall constitute a

quorum to transact business.

41. All business meetings shall be opened by singing, reading a portion

from God's Word, and prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.

42. Special meetings of the General Board may be called by or at the request of the Moderator or any two Board members. The person or persons authorized to call special meetings of the General Board may fix the place for holding any special meeting of the General Board called by them.

43. Notice of any special meeting shall be given at least fifteen days previously thereto by written notice delivered personally or mailed to each Board member at his business address, or by telegram. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States mail so addressed, with postage thereon prepaid. If notice be given by telegram, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when the telegram is delivered to the telegraph company. Any Board member may waive notice of any meeting. The attendance of a Board member at a meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except where a Board member attends a meeting for the express purpose of objecting to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened.

44. Unless otherwise provided by law, whenever any notice is required to be given to any member or Board member of the Association under the provisions of these By-Laws or under the provisions of the articles of incorporation, a waiver thereof in writing, signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice whether before or after the time stated therein, shall be deemed

equivalent to the giving of such notice.

Discipline

45. The State Association shall not usurp any authority over the Quarterly Meetings, or Associations that shall be under its supervision, but shall be an advisory body to help them.

Fiscal Policy

46. The fiscal year of the Association shall begin on the first (1st) day of

August and end on the thirty-first (31st) day of July in each year.

47. All checks, drafts or other orders for the payment of money, notes or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the Association, shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents, of the Association and in such manner as shall from time to time be determined by resolution of the General Board.

48. No loans shall be contracted on behalf of the Association and no evidences of indebtedness shall be issued in its name unless authorized by a

resolution.

49. The General Board by a majority vote of the voting delegates of the State Association, shall be authorized to create or to increase any bonded

indebtedness of the Association.

50. The General Board of the Association shall be authorized by a majority vote of the voting delegates of the State Association, to sell, lease, exchange, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of all, or substantially all, of the property and assets of the Association.

51. All funds of the corporation not otherwise employed shall be deposited from time to time to the credit of the Association in such banks, trust companies, or other depositories as the General Board may select.

52. The salaries of employees shall be fixed from time to time by the

General Board.

Standing Rules

53. The meetings of the State Association and General Board shall be governed by the rules of parliamentary law as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order, except in the case of those rules which are superseded by some rule

of this organization.

54. The Clerk, and in his absence the senior minister in age, shall call the Association to order for business, and call the Moderator or Assistant Moderator to the chair, and if neither Moderator nor Assistant Moderator is present, then the senior minister in age shall act as chairman to open the floor for nominations and carry out the election of a Moderator Pro Tem.

55. All business, except routine, shall be brought before the body by committee, but shall any committee refuse or fail to present to this body any business given it by any delegate of this Association, then such business may be presented to the body by any delegate, but cannot be discussed unless by a majority vote of this body.

56. Anyone desiring to speak shall arise and say "Brother Moderator", but shall speak no further until he or she is recognized by the Moderator.

57. No one shall speak more than five minutes, or more than twice, on

the same subject without the consent of the Moderator.

58. Any delegate of this body can appeal from the decision of the Moderator of the Association, and by a majority vote thereon, the objection shall be sustained or rejected.

59. No one shall leave the Association when in a business session

without the consent of the Moderator.

60. The Moderator shall stop all discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit, or when he thinks it is likely to lead to discord or division.

61. All business coming before this Association shall be decided by secret ballot when there is any opposition or objection to open vote.

Amendments

62. These By-Laws may be amended at any regular session by a twothirds majority vote after the proposed amendment has laid on the table one day.

Mrs. Beatty introduced Mrs. Cleo Pursell, WNAC Executive Secretary-Treasurer, for "Bits of Information" for the Woman's Auxiliary. Mrs. Pursell used our theme "Such as I have, give I" in giving a brief summary of the 31 years history of WNAC. In 1934 five states organized WNAC. Mrs. Frazier wrote the first Manual for WNAC in 1940. We now have a new Manual and a Co-Laborer magazine. The resolutions were read and adopted item by item as presented. Delegates to the WNAC Convention in 1967, to be held in Jacksonville, Florida, were elected as follows; Geralding Plummer, Braxine Evans, Elizabeth Gibson, Margaret Dixon, Farin Jones, Mrs. E. M. Kennedy, Joanne King, Loraine Moore, Lucille Beatty, Mrs. Loveless. These delegates were elected with the provision for the president to replace any who can not go to the WNAC Convention.

Mrs. Elizabeth Gibson was elected to serve as nominee on the WNAC

nominating committee in 1967.

A letter of petition was read from the Mission District Woman's Auxiliary Convention for acceptance into the Missouri State Woman's Auxiliary Convention. Petition accepted. The ladies of the Mission District Woman's Auxiliary Convention came forward for a right hand of fellowship extended from the State Auxiliary officers.

The Mission District presented a request for changing the date for closing the convention year to May 31, 1966, and May 31st each year thereafter, in order for our annual reports to be current. (Information to be printed

in the GEM now and in April.) The request was approved.

Resolutions

1. We recommend that we comply with the following resolutions that were adopted by WNAC at the convention in 1966. Number 3, 4, 6, 8, 9, 10. (Memo: The Missouri quoto in regard to # 6 is 456.) (See below for explaination of above WNAC resolutions.)

2. We recommend that we elect a new officer known as Historian. Due to the fact we have not kept a history of our auxiliary, we further recommend that she do research from the beginning of the auxiliary to date

as much as is possible.

3. We recommend that we have a Retreat for the women of the auxiliary in the coming year instead of the state Workshop. The retreat to be held at the State Youth Camp.

4. We recommend that the names and addresses of the State Woman's

Auxiliary officers be printed in the GEM each month.

5. We recommend that we give an honorarium of \$50.00 to our guest speaker, Mrs. Thomas Willey, Sr., and an honorarium of \$50.00 to Mrs. Cleo Pursell, WNAC Executive Secretary-Treasurer.

6. We recommend that we give an honorarium of \$25.00 each to Mrs. Teddy Davis, Editor of Woman's Page in the GEM, and Miss Hazel Hutsell,

Secretary-Treasurer.

WNAC Resolutions adopted by Mo. Auxiliary Convention

III. Whereas costs of materials, including mailing supplies, printing, and literature have greatly increased, and whereas WNAC's growth and expansion demand a more adequate plan of support, and Whereas our present methods of support are ineffective and obsolete, Be it resolved, (1), That WNAC membership fees be increased from ten cent (10¢) to Seventy-five cents (75¢) per active member per year, and that Article VI of the By-Laws be amended to read as follows:

Page 60 - Fees and Reports

Section 1, Fees - Seventy-five cents per active member shall be paid yearly to the WNAC by the state convention (and/or other eligible organizations) for membership.

Page 53 Article VI - The State Convention Fees and Reports

Seventy-five cents (75¢) per active member shall be paid yearly to the

WNAC for membership fee.

IV. Whereas, for similar reasons, active district and state auxiliary organizations also need additional funds to maintain their operations, we recommend that local fees per active member be increased from 30¢ to \$1.25 per year. We further recommend the following changes in the manual:

p. 12 The Outline of the Standard

5. Membership fees and Reports to Officers - Once a year all active members should pay \$1.25 membership fee to be used for promotional work. This money is sent to the district treasurer. Twenty-five cents is kept there, while the remainder is sent to the state convention. The state treasurer keeps twenty-five cents and sends the remaining 75¢ to the Woman's National Auxiliary treasurer.

p. 16. Article II - Representation

Each local auxiliary shall represent in the district convention according to the convention plans and its proportionate part of money required for district, state, and national work, which is \$1.25 per active member per year.

p. 43 - District Convention Fees and Reports

One dollar per active member shall be paid yearly to the Woman's

State Auxiliary Convention for membership fee.

VI. Whereas the increase in Co-Laborer subscription rates will not become effective until January 1967, and in membership fees until July 1967, recommend a greater thrust be given WNAC Emphasis Month by the allocation of suggested state quotos according to membership.

VII. That auxiliaries send articles to the Missionary Provision Closet send

an evaluation of the same to WNAC.

IX. Whereas the National Association plans to project the project of "Everyone Who Has a Bible Buy a Bible" or Bible For the Bibleless on Bible Sunday, December 4th, and, As we feel it can best be promoted through the Missions Boards, the Master's Men, and the Woman's Auxiliary, we hereby recommend that we cooperate in this project in the following ways:

1. Assist the pastor in planning for Bible Sunday.

2. If the church is cooperating in this project, send the offering through the church to the National Association earmarked American Bible Society. Otherwise send earmarked offerings through WNAC.

X. That local, district, and state auxiliaries elect a historian whose responsibility is to record the history of the auxiliary of her church.

Duties

1. Prepares history of the women of the auxiliary. Assembles the facts and writes the history of the auxiliary in the local church from the beginning, if this has not already been done. Include sketches of Honorary and Memorial members.

2. Writes the supplementary history of the auxiliary.

3. Submits a history for calendar year, January 1 - December 31. Sends a copy (Preferably typewritten) with pictures, to the district historian who complies a history of the district convention and sends a copy to the state historian. The state historian complies a history of the state auxiliary convention and sends (with pictures) to the National office where a permanent record will be kept.

If there is a general historian appointed by the church, the historian of the auxiliary will submit a copy of the auxiliary history to that person.
