PROCEEDINGS OF THE MISSOURI STATE ASSOCIATION OF

FREE WILL BAPTISTS

When convened with the First Free Will Baptist Church of Flat River, Missouri.

Tuesday, 7:30 P.M. August 20, 1974

The sixty-first session of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists convened on Tuesday night at 7:30 p.m., August 20, 1974, at the First Free Will Baptist Church in Flat River, Missouri. The service was opened by Congregational singing led by Brother John Smith.

The session was convened by the clerk, Rev. A. B. Brown. The theme of the convention being: "I Must Work While It Is Day" John 9:4.

Rev. James McAllister gave the Moderator's Message from Hebrews 12:10.

II. ATTITUDES
III. ADORATION

Because

- 1. The terror of Lord
- 2. Shortness of time
- 3. Activities of enemy

Special music was then presented by a quartet from the local church. The congregation then sang after which Rev. Millard Sasser Chairman of the Sunday School and Christian Training Service Board, awarded placques to Brother and Sister Wilhite as outstanding Sunday School Superintendent and Sunday School Teacher of the year.

Rev. Al McFarland then sang a special followed by the Moderator, Rev. Jim McAllister, who introduced Rev. A. B. Brown to deliver the keynote message "Signs of the End Times".

At the conclusion of the message the Moderator had the clerk to read the appointment on Committees. The session was dismissed in prayer.

Wednesday, 9:00 A.M. August 21, 1974

Convention was convened by Congregational singing led by Rev. Al McFarland "We'll Work Till Jesus Comes". Brother Beatty led in prayer being followed by congregational singing "I Am Thine O Lord".

Brother Harry Beatty brought the devotion from the First Psalm. Brother John Rogers led in prayer.

Brother Billy Melvin, Executive Secretary of the National Association of Evangelicals gave a brief report of the work of NAE.

Brother James Earl Raper, from the Free Will Baptists Childrens Home in Greenville, Tennessee gave a report of the work there. He reported that several of the children had recently made decisions for Christ. He also thanked the people of Missouri for their support.

The report of the General Board was read. M/S/C to receive the report and consider it item by item.

Item I: Amended so that the question of monthly rent of \$50.00 for office space in the Headquarters Building in Lebanon be referred back to the General Board. M/S/C to adopt Item I as amended. Item 2: M/S/C to adopt. Item 3: M/S/C to adopt. Item 4: M/S/C to table Item 4 until Thursday morning. Item 5: M/S/C to adopt.

The report of the Credentials Committee was given with a recommendation that all of the Associations of the Missouri State Association be seated except the Missions and the Niangua Assn. which had not reported.

Brother Paramore from the Expansion Department of the Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, Tennessee gave a report of the progress of the Missouri State Association on it's goal of \$125,000.00 for the Library Wing of the Bible College. He commended the State Association for it's good fellowship and challenged every Missourian to do something in regards to the Development Program.

Brother Ketterman, Director of Public Relations for the Bible College, gave a report for the General Fund of the Bible College and commended Missouri for it's cooperation and contributions to the General Fund. He also reminded the State that it fell \$5000.00 short of it's General Fund goal for last year but commended them for adding \$5000.00 to the budget for next year.

Session was adjourned in prayer until the afternoon session.

Wednesday, 11:00 A.M. August 21, 1974

The session opened with congregational singing and prayer. Rev. Dale Skiles presiding, introduced the speaker, Rev. Max Courtney.

Rev. McAllister presented Rev. Clarence Burton, the out-going Moderator with a placque in honor of his outstanding work for the state as past Moderator.

Rev. Courtney delivered a moving sermon, "Coming to Grips With the Urgency of the Hour" and closed with an invitation of dedication.

Announcements were made and benedictory prayer.

Wednesday, 1:30 P.M. August 21, 1974

Session opened with Congregational singing of "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms".

Rev. Charles Miller, pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church of DeSoto, Missouri brought the devotion from Matthew 16:18.

The Promotional Secretary gave his report stating that Missouri had reached a goal of \$85,000.00 lacking \$125.00.

Brother Beatty read his resignation to the body expressing his gratitude for their cooperation during his years of service as Promotional Secretary of the State of Missouri. M/S/C to receive report also with standing vote of thanks for job well done.

M/S/C to elect the following as delegates to the National Association when it meets in Dayton, Ohio in 1975. Clayton Gibbs, Charles Hoover, John Smith, A. C. Kennedy, Marion Bailey. The following two were designated as alternates: Jack Keesling and Jim Hayes.

Brother Lawrence Thompson presented the State Home Missions report. M/S/C to adopt the report.

Brother Roy Thomas gave a report for the National Home Missions Department. He reported that the property in Mexico had been signed over to the National Home Missions Department as having the power of attorney. Brother Thomas reported that Missouri was number six in giving to the National Home Missions Department and thanked them for their cooperation.

Rev. Millard Sasser reported on the work of the S. S. and CTS Boards and emphasized their theme of establishing evangelistic Sunday Schools and sound Bible teaching CTS groups across the state of Missouri. M/S/C to adopt report.

Brother Bill Foster reported for the National Sunday School Department reminding the State of the short quarter and necessity of promptly ordering new literature from State Book Store. Brother Foster stated that the National S. S. Department was opened for any suggestions or constructional criticism.

Rev. Jonathan Thigpen presented the work of the National CTS Department emphasizing it's committment to training Christians. He asked that the State be much in prayer for the young people's activities at the National in 1975.

Brother Edwin Bowden presented the work of the State Book Store and spoke of the continued growth and ministry of the Book Store. He explained the opportunities of mini-stores across the state. Brother Bowden expressed his conviction of the Book Store being an important Christian Ministry and his dedication to serve the State in this area. M/S/C to adopt the report.

Rev. Bud Arnold reported for the State Youth Camp Board. He reported of increased attendance which demanded certain improvments. He also thanked tha churches for their support and urged every church to participate in the \$10.00 a month plan for supporting the Youth Camp. He also reported that \$2000.00 Fire and Storm Damage Insurance was available for the cabins at an annual premium of \$11.00. M/S/C to adopt report.

New pastors in the State work were recognized, they were: Rev. N. R. Smith, Rev. Southwell, Rev. Troy Burney, Rev. Dale Smith and Rev. Rolla Smith.

Brother John Smith reported on the availability of an insurance cancer plan and life insurance plan. Report received as information.

Rev. McAllister gave a report on the Missouri College Commission. He reported that two new institutes would be starting this semester in the State bringing the total to four. M/S/C to adopt report.

Brother Jerry Rhodes from the Hillsdale Bible College in Moore, Oklahoma reported to the State of a good year at the school. The enrollment of the school was reported to be fifty boys and thirty-eight girls for this year. Brother Rhodes reported that the school is now an accredited school. He expressed in behalf of the school their thanks for the support of Missouri to the school.

Brother Andy Lay, trustee, from the State of Missouri, requested more participation and support from the churches of the State of Missouri for Hillsdale. He also reported that there are fourteen students from Missouri attending the school.

The $\underline{\text{Gem}}$ report was given by Rev. Andy Lay, Editor. He reported that inflation had added greatly to the cost of production of the $\underline{\text{Gem}}$ which necessitated reducing the number of pages by four.

Rev. Herman Hersey reported for the Board of Retirement and Insurance urging the churches of Missouri to enroll their pastors in the retirement program. He expressed his thanks for the support of the Board through cooperative giving. Brother Hersey also added that the Board was beginning and investigating into the possibilities of a retirement home for Free Will Baptists.

The Free Will Baptist National Foreign Missions Department was represented by Lynn Miley who reported that Missouri exceeded its quota by \$12,000 and commended the State for a job well done. He also challenged Missourians by reminding them that they had not nearly approached their potential.

The Moderator in compliance with the desires of the body appointed a study commission on the possibilities of a Home for the Aged in Missouri. They were: Rev. Glen Rehkop, Rev. Bob Francis, Rev. Rolla Smith, Rev. Harvey Hill, Rev. N. R. Smith.

Wednesday 7:30 P.M. August 21, 1974

Brother John Smith led the congregation in singing "Send the Light".

Brother Cliff Bowman, pastor of the Olivette Church in Marshall Missouri received an award in recognition of the Church's outstanding support of Home Missions and the Youth Camp. The Olivette Church was the leading church in the State in both areas.

The Durbin family was introduced and presented a moving presentation of Gospel in songs, which included "Hallelujah Square".

Rev. Clarence Burton, presiding, introduced Rev. Rolla Smith who delivered a very challenging Missionary Message "The Unfinished Task".

The services were dismissed in prayer.

Thursday 9:00 A.M. August 22, 1974

Session was opened with congregational singing of "I Am Resolved" led by Brother Albert McFarland. Rev. James Barker, pastor of the Leadington church brought the devotional from Rev. 3:1-6 concerning the church at Sardis.

The Resolutions Committee report was adopted item by item except item 4 which was the annual amount due to report as recommended in Resolutions Committee report.

M/S/C that State pay the fee for the closed circuit television used during the State Meeting. It is further recommended that the Clerk write a note of thanks to those responsible for furnishing the system.

The Obituary Committee report was submitted with the names of Rev. Leslie Logsdon and Dale Jones. They requested that Churches and Associations submit to the State a list of their deceased. The report was adopted and the congregation, after a moment of silent prayer was led in prayer by Rev. R. B. Spurgeon.

The Placement Committee report was submitted being M/S/C to adopt.

The items tabled in reference to a proposed change in the By-laws was amended to be changed from "Monday" to "Tuesday" the original motion concerning the changing of the date of the State Meeting was adopted.

Recommendations of committee were as follows:

- A. That by-law number 37 under "Meetings" on page 50 of the 1973 state minutes be changed to read, "The sessions of the Association shall convene on "Monday" (later changed to "Tuesday" according to the preceding amendment) evening at 7:30 p.m. following the first Sunday in June."
- B. That this change become effective in June 1976. Note: This item read Wednesday morning and tabled and dealt with Wed. according to rules of by-laws. Also note that the word "Monday" was later changed to "Tuesday" because the General Board cannot meet while the state body is in session.

Nominating Committee report was adopted in it's entirety with the following exception: Brother James Bundy resigned from the Sunday School - Christian Training Service Board because of being elected to the General Board.

Brother Rufus Coffey reported for the National Executive Office emphasizing his task of correlating the work of the National Association. He also spoke of our interdependency and the progress of the overall work of Free Will Baptists. He also explained the new forms for reporting to the State.

The Promotional Secretary from Oklahome, Rev. Lonnie Davoult, challenged Missouri in their cooperative giving and stressed the importance of the program.

The College Commission reported and it was M/S/C to retain the present College Commission members until the 1975 State Meeting.

Motion and seconded and adjourned until the body convenes in 1975.

GENERAL BOARD REPORT

The General Board of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists met twice during the past year: August 23, 1973 at Monet, Missouri and on November 8, 1973 in Lebanon, Missouri. In addition, the Executive Board met three times during the year at Lebanon, Missouri: October 5, 1973, January 15, 1974 and March 18, 1974. A quorum was present at each meeting and the following business was transacted by the Board and the Executive Committee.

- Elected following men to Executive Committee: Rev. Glen Rehkop, Rev. Roger Harwell, Rev. Melvin Knott, Rev. Max Courtney.
- 2. Divided offering of \$326.00 between Fulchers and McLains.
- Authorized the renovation of the book store in Lebanon and the purchase of new office equipment.
- 4. Reviewed Promotional Secretary's Contract.
- Appointed on Auditing Committee to audit all State Treasurer's books.
- 6. Accepted the resignation of Dale and Nancy Underwood and hired Donna Norris as temporary assistant manager. Brother Art Shannon was also hired as a full time employee.
- 7. Planned the program for the 1974 State Convention.
- 8. Authorized placque for outgoing moderator.
- Requested National Association to reconsider expansion of Boards from seven to nine members.
- 10. Hired Brother Edwin Bowden as manager of the State Book Store.
- 11. Heard the reports of all Boards and the Promotional Secretary, their financial reports and proposed budgets and forwarded them to the State Convention with the recommendation that they be approved.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Request that \$2000.00 be taken from the General Fund to help pay for remodeling and expansion of the Book Store. Also that the Promotional Department pay \$50.00 per month rent for office space in the headquarters building in Lebanon.
- Request that State Clerk's salary be raised from \$150.00 to \$500.00.

- Request that the State fund the committee appointed by the General Board with \$500.00 expense for investigation of possibilities of a retirement home for Free Will Baptist of Missouri.
- 4. Request that State by-law Number 37 under (meetings) page 50 of the 1973 State Minutes be changed to read "the sessions of the Associations shall convene on Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. following the first Sunday in June". It is further requested that this change take effect in June 1976.
- 5. That the following budget and allocations for the Cooperative Fund be adopted:

MISSOURI STATE FREE WILL BAPTIST YOUTH CAMP.

The Missouri State Youth Camp Board is most grateful and appreciative of the fact that this past Camp session broke all records. It can be said without reservation that this was an outstanding year in every respect. The Board was a little apprehensive about dividing the Camp into three weeks, but it proved to be very successful.

Looking forward to next year we are anticipating an even greater year. We sincerely hope and pray that we will see a substantial increase of support from the churches over the State. As you know, food is continuing to rise at an alarming rate. Also, we have been advised that the subsidies which we have been receiving from the State will be withheld from us. That means we will have to supply more food for ourselves. In consideration of these facts, in all probability we will have to raise the Camp fee again next year.

Some of the improvements this past year are as follows: The Dining Hall was tiled and painted. All new stoves were purchased, as well as a commercial range hood, a new grill, cabinet tops, a commercial mixer, and a commercial slaw cutter for the kitchen. We received from Camp Arrowhead numerous articles for the kitchen, plus bedding, without charge. The Camp purchased a Ford tractor and brush hog. An overhead projector was purchased for varied uses.

In the way of improvements for next year's session: The swimming pool will definitely have to be renovated and enlarged. More classrooms will have to be added. There will be a small lake, approximately four acres in size, strictly supervised for fishing only. The strictest care will be taken to insure the safety of every camper. It will be off limits for swimming and will be fenced in and guarded at night. A man from Conway, Missouri, will build a two hundred foot dam; and all of the work will be done in exchange for some of the timber on the property.

There are many more improvements needed in the future, and we pray that everyone will respond.

The Camp Board humbly welcomes any constructive suggestions in way of improving the Youth Camp.

AUDITING COMMITTEE REPORT

We, the Auditing Committee, have examined the Treasurer's Books of the following: Youth Camp Board, Sunday School and Church Training Service Board, Home Mission Board, College Commission, GEM, Bookstore and State Treasurer. Our audit shows the following:

- The Youth Camp Board, Sunday School and Church Training Service Board and Bookstore books are correct and in good order.
- 2. The College Commission and GEM books are correct in content but need to take the following steps to meet the bookkeeping procedures adopted by the State Association.
 - a) College Commission receipts need to be itemized as to their source and a separate record of all accounts.
 - b) GFM -- there needs to be a journal with three columns titled receipts, debits and balance. We also recommend keeping a daily total of receipts and debits.
- The State Treasurer's books show a number of errors which we were unable to resolve.
- 4. After examining the State Home Mission books we submit the following report:
 - a) No balance sheet was submitted which itemized credits and debits, but Book A (Accounts book) showed total credits of \$43,903.76 with no total given for debits.
 - b) Our examination of credits listed in Book A indicated total credits of \$43,939.76.
 - c) Total credits shown in Book B (Journal) was \$46,709.95.

- d) Bank deposits showed a total of \$49,746.18 credits.
- e) After an item by item check of all credits and debits we found transfers from savings account to checking account which had not been entered in Book A. We also found some entries which had been made twice. Taking these findings into account we were able to bring the books into balance.
- f) We have recommended that the Books and including each individual account, be balanced at the end of each month.

We recommend the following items to the General Board:

- That each treasurer balance his books at the end of each month, showing total credits, debit and balance in accounts as well as credits, debits and balance in each individual account.
- That each treasurer submit a balance sheet with his books when they are presented to the auditors. This balance sheet would include a listing of assets, liabilities and fund balances.
- That a rough draft of the treasurer's report which will be submitted to the State Association also be given to the auditors.
- 4. That the Youth Camp Board's books be maintained on a calendar year. At present they are closed at the end of camp and the problems of presenting an accurate report are immense.

Resolution Number Four

Resolution Number Five

Student enrollment at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College from the state of Missouri for the 1973-74 academic year have brought back many fine reports. I personally am grateful for the ministry of our institution to our people. I am proud to report the following Missouri student enrollment on campus: Tim Eaton, Joplin; Nancy Fogerson, Mt. Grove; Barbara Prock, Mt. Grove; Richard Robinson, West Plains; Charolette Tallent, St. Louis; Linda Bigelow, Kansas City; Brenda Selvey, Liberal; Keith Tallent, St. Louis; and Terry Wood, Mt. Grove.

Financially, Missouri has played an important part in the growth and development of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. past year, \$9,435.01 has been contributed for the growth and development of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. There is a greater need presently on campus for the elimination of the indebtedness on Project IV. Before more campus housing can be produced, the indebtedness must be eliminated. In conjunction with the surrounding states, Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College is attempting to eliminate the indebtedness of Project IV very soon. We are asking the state of Missouri to contribute \$50,000 toward the elimination of indebtedness this fiscal year. Listed below are those gifts for the past five years. This will enable you to see your state's progress and also observe any decrease in overall giving.

Your quota for 1973 was \$70,500.00. Total receipts for that year amounted to \$86,749.06 and you exceeded your quota by \$16,249.06. Your state quota for 1974 is \$88,000.00. Missouri still needs \$51,258.87 to meet this year's quota.

Four new missionary couples graduated from Missionary Internship in May. They are Dale and Sandra Bishop (Japan), Lynn and Ramona Miley (Ivory Coast), Dennis and Carol Teague (France) and Jerry and Janice Webb (France).

In addition to these, several more missionary candidates have been approved for Missionary Internship beginning in September of this year. These include Allan and LaRue Crowson (Ivory Coast) Patrick and Susan Dickens (France), Steve and Judy Lytle (unassigned) Sharon Roberts (Ivory Coast), Alice Smith (Ivory Coast), Judy Smith (Japan) and Arilla Wode (France). Also, 9 summer missionaries will serve five different countries. God continues to call out laborers for the harvest fields of the world.

My dear pastor -- you are still the KEY!

Some time ago I was reading an article in the Baptist Bible Tribune (Oct. 1973), by G.B. Vick, pastor, Temple Baptist church, Detroit, Michigan. "God uses men," stated Dr. Vick as he spoke to the annual session of the Baptist Bible Fellowship, at which meeting \$677,884 was received for the Christmas missions offering.

Dr. Vick listed three reasons why their churches (and others) do not give more for overseas outreach.

- Indifference the lack of concern for the lost in foreign fields.
- Spiritual shortsightedness -- the failure to realize the spiritual returns from the investment of missions money.
- 3. Use of foreign missions money -- to build local churches.

He stressed point three when he said, "Your members have as much right to tell you that they can't afford to tithe because they have a big house payment as you have to tell God that your church has too many local obligations to give to worldwide missions."

My heart was stirred anew as I read Dr. Vick's remarks.

Beyond the North American continent are 3.5 billion souls. The National Association minutes, 1973, listed some interesting statistics concerning this giving of our churches for 1972. Part of the breakdown reads as follows.

Spent for local causes	\$14,784,577.04
Spent for outside causes (all agencies) Difference	\$ 2,040,638.08 \$12,743,938.96
Dillerence	\$13,910,763,38

This means that \$13,910,763.38 more was spent on local causes (North American continent with approximately 300 million souls). More startling than ever is the fact that only \$873,813.66 was given for the remaining 3.5 billion souls beyond North America.

Free Will Baptists of Missouri, we have only "scratched the surface" as it relates to our overseas ministries. There is much to be done! What place does overseas evangelism have in your church? In light of the above stated facts- should it not head the list of priorities?

When Jesus fed 5000 men besides women and children, He blessed, brake and gave the bread to everyone. They were all filled. How far does your church's bread line extend?

GREETINGS TO MISSOURI STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS:

Thank you for your prayers and support of our national ministries during the past 12 months. God has continually proven Himself faithful in giving us direction and strength to implement the objectives set forth by our National Association. And we praise the Lord for His blessings and for your participation in our national outreach.

A new level of spiritual maturity among Free Will Baptists is cause for rejoicing. It is a privilege to participate in God's kingdom work with maturing Christians whose main objective is to glorify Jesus Christ. I believe this was apparent at the National Association this year as each of our speakers developed the theme "Growing Toward Maturity." MISSOURI STATE ASSOCIATION General Fund Report from Free Will Baptist Bible College

Dear Missouri Friends:

"While other liberal arts institutions cut the ties of moral restraint, encouraging students to develope their own concepts of right and wrong behavior, Bible colleges reinforce the Biblical fact of man's accountability to God to live according to the moral code given in the Scriptures and natural conscience. . . It boils down to a question of which philosophy you want to learn.

This statement from the 1974-75 catalog of your Free Will Baptist Bible College indicates that it still stands firmly for the teaching of God's Word and the principles upon which it was founded. It offers the kind of training that is needed more now than at any other time in America's history. This kind of training is a necessity for your denomination's future growth.

TO REPORT to the people of Missouri is always looked upon as a privilege. Some of your churches have given consistently month after month. A number of individuals have sacrificially given to keep their college going. With God's blessings upon this and that which was given by other states, there has been enough to meet the Bible College's needs for the year.

There were 25 faculty members, 33 staff members and more than 150 students who worked at your Bible College during the 1973-74 year. Among these were the first full-time physical education instructors in your Bible College's history. This physical education program proved to be a real blessing to the students.

General Fund gifts during this year reached some \$9,000.00 beyond last year's gifts. Total gifts for the year were \$257,167. In spite of the fact that the Bible College received \$21,431.00 per month, we Free Will Baptists still lacked approximately \$17,800.00 reaching the \$275,000.00 quota that had been adopted for the year.

MISSOURI'S GIFTS DECREASED DURING THIS YEAR. Your previous year's gifts were \$16,883.14, while gifts June 1973 through May 1974 amounted to only \$11,753.13. Your new quota is based upon your past giving records and your numerical strength. Your Bible College is counting on \$15,000.00 from Missouri during the 1974-75 year. It is our hope that you will adopt this figure as your goal for gifts to the General Fund.

LIBRARY VOLUMES have increased in number during the year. Some churches have sent cash gifts in honor of deceased members instead of sending flowers to the funeral. With these gifts needed books are purchased and are placed in the library with an appropriate memorial message. Our library now includes 22,400 volumes.

The names of Missouri's students are listed along with many other vital statistics of interest to you.

WE JOIN you in prayer for God's hand to continue to control Free Will Baptist Bible College. Thank you so much as a people for your faithful concern through this past year.

Name

1.) This Association shall be called the Missouri State Association for Free Will Baptists.

Purpose

2.) The Object of this Association shall be the bringing together of the Free Will Baptists of the State of Missouri in one annual gathering that we may become better acquainted with one another, the upholding of the Free Will Baptists Churches of Missouri, and a world-wide outreach of souls.

Membership

- 3.) The Association shall be composed of the members of the various local affiliated Associations
- 4.) Any organized Quarterly Meeting, Yearly Meeting, or Ass. of Free Will Baptists, may unite with this body at any regular session, through a letter or delegates by a two-thirds vote of all delegates present.

Officers

- 5.) The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, and Assistant Clerk, who shall be elected annually at the close of each session and hold their office until their successors are elected and gualified.
- 6.) The officers of this body shall submit, at every session, a report of the work done for this Association.
- 7.) The moderator shall be the principal executive officer of the Association and he shall sign, with the Clerk or any other people officer or agent of the Association thereunto authorized by the General Board, any deeds, mortgages, bonds, contracts, or other instruments which the General Board has authorized to be executed, except in cases where the signing and execution thereof shall be expressly delegated by the General Board or by these by-laws to some other officer or agent of the Association, or shall be required by law to be otherwise signed or executed. The duties of the moderator shall include presiding at the meetings of the State Association, the General Board, and the Executive Committee; to call special meetings of the General Board or Executive Committee when the conditions of by-law 43 are fulfilled; to appoint such committees as are created without provision for their selection; to set the time and place for the meetings of the General Board and Executive Committee; and in general, to fulfill whatever responsibilities may be commensurate with his office or delegated to him by the body or General Board.
- 8.) In the absence of the Moderator, or in the event of his death, inability, or refusal to act, the Assistant Moderator shall perform the duties of the Moderator, and when so acting, shall have all the powers of and be subject to all the restrictions upon the Moderator. The Assistant Moderator shall perform such duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the Moderator or by the General Board.

9.) The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of all business transactions; shall superintend the printing of the Minutes and shall receive an honorarium of an

amount agreed upon by this body.

10.) The Clerk shall: (a) keep the Minutes of the Association and of the General Board meetings in one or more books provided for the purpose; (b) see that all notices are given in accordance with the provisions of these By-Laws or as required by law; (c) be custodian of the Association records and of the seal of the Association and see that the seal of the Association is affixed to all documents the execution of which on behalf of the Association under its seal is duly authorized; (d) in general, perform all duties incident to the office of Clerk and such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the Moderator or by the General Board; and (e) in the absence of the Clerk, or in the event of his death, inability, or refusal to act, the Assistant Clerk shall perform the duties of the Clerk and,

when so acting, shall have all the power of and be subject to all the restrictions upon the Clerk. The Assistant Clerk shall perform such duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the Clerk or by the General Board.

11.) No officer shall serve the same office more than three consecutive years.

Boards

- 12.) All standing boards shall be composed of five members, exclusive of the General Board. Standing Boards include the Home Missions Board, the Sunday School and Church Training Service Board, the Youth Camp Board, and the General Board.
- 13.) The duties of the various standing boards shall be to plan a program and supervise its operation in their respective fields, and to receive, hold, manage, use or convey and funds and property entrusted to said Boards.

Election

- 14.) The personnel of each of the foregoing, exclusive of the General Board, shall be elected as follows: The first named for a term of one year, the second for a term of two years, and third for a term of three years, the fourth for a term of four years, and the fifth for a term of five years, and thereafter each shall be elected for a term of five years.
- 15.) The personnel of the General Board shall be composed of the officers of the State Association; the chairmen of all standing boards and one member from each affiliated Association to be elected by the State Body whose term of office shall be two years and so constituted that the expiration date of the term of office of half of these shall expire one year and the other half the following year. This shall be determined by alphabetical order of the name of the affiliated Association.
- 16.) No person shall fill more than one office at the same time except as he may become a member of the General Board by virtue of being Chairman of the Board of which he is an elected member.
- 17.) Any vacancy occuring in the General Board may be filled by the affirmative vote of a majority of the remaining Board members though less than a quorum of the General Board, unless otherwise provided by law.
 - 18.) All Board members elected to fill a vacancy shall be elected for the un-

expired term of his predecessor in office.

19.) Any member of the standing board of the State Association who does not put forth any interest in or function on said board for the period of one year, shall have his office declared vacant and a new member be elected by this Association to fill his unexpired term of office.

Duties

- 20.) The General Board shall have power to act in behalf of, and for the State Association from one regular session to another, and shall have power to elect such officers as may be necessary to cary out the plans and undertakings of the State Association. The General Board shall have the right to employ a Promotional Secretary who shall serve as Treasurer of the Association and be responsible for handling all monies of the Association except in cases where this responsibility shall be expressly delegated by the General Board or by these by-laws to some other officer, agent or Board of the Association He shall make an annual financial report to the Associa report to the Association.
- 21.) The General Board shall have power to fill any irregular vacancies that may occur in its own body and shall also have power to fill any irregular vacancies that may occur in any department of work between sessions of the State Association. It shall be the duty of this Board to make written reports of all its work to each session.
- 22.) An Executive Committee, consisting of seven members of the General Board, shall be composed of the Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk of the State Association, and four other members to be elected annually by the General Board, whose duty it shall be to act on all matters coming within the scope of the

work of the Board when said Board is not in session. It shall also plan and execute

the program for the annual sessions of the Missouri State Association.

23.) A majority of the number of the General Board members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the General Board, but if less than such majority is present at a meeting, a majority of the Board members present may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice.

24.) An act of the majority of the Board members present at a meeting at

which a quorum is present, shall be an act of the General Board.

25.) A Board member of the Association who is present at a meeting of the General Board at which action on any Association matter is taken shall be presumed to have assented to the action taken unless his dissent shall be entered in the Minutes of the meeting.

26.) The General Board may authorize any officer of officers. Agent or Agents to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of and on behalf of the Association, and such authority may be general or confined

to specific instances.

27.) Any person or agent elected or appointed by the General Board may be removed by the General Board whenever in its judgement the best interests of the Association would be served thereby, but such removal shall be without prejudice to the contract rights, if any, of the persons so removed.

28.) By resolution of the General Board the Board members may be paid their expenses, if any, of attendance of each meeting of the General Board. No such payment shall preclude any Board member from serving the Association in any

other capacity and receiving compensation therefore.

29.) The General Board shall provide an Association seal which shall be circular in form and shall have inscribed thereon the name of the corporation and the state of incorporation and the words, "Corporate Seal."

Committees

30.) The Moderator shall appoint a committee on committees consisting of

five members who shall appoint all committees.

31.) All resolutions and reports shall bear the name of all the members of the committee who favor them; and if the names be not a majority of all members of such committee, than the clerk shall not read the resolutions or report.

Representation

32.) The standing delegates of this Association shall be all ordained Free Will Baptist ministers and their companions, all ordained deacons, and Associational Clerks, provided they are members in good standing in some Free Will Baptist

Church belonging to this State Association.

33.) The number of elected delegates to the State Association shall be seven delegates from each affiliated local association or yearly meeting; one delegate from each church, plus one delegate for each fifty members or larger fraction thereof Each church which represents must be a member of a local association or yearly meeting holding membership in this body.

34.) This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other

religious bodies.

Voting

35.) Those entitled to vote at any annual or special meeting of this State Association, shall be the elected delegates and the standing delegates as defined in By-Law 32 and 33, and each elected delegate or standing delegate shall be entitled to one vote.

36.) A majority vote shall be final upon all subjects except to amend the By-Laws receive Quarterly Meetings or Associations, and the changing of the members of the committees appointed by the Moderator, then it shall require a

two-thirds majority.

Meetings

37.) The sessions of the Association shall convene on Tuesday evening at

7:30 P.M. following the first Sunday in June each year.

38.) The membership of the State Association may designate any place, either within or without the State of Missouri for any annual meeting. Any special meeting may be called by the General Board. A waiver of notice signed by all members entitled to vote at a meeting may designate any place, either within or without the State of Missouri, unless otherwise prescribed by statue, as the place for the holding of such meeting. If no designation is made, or if a special meeting be otherwise called, the place of the meeting shall be the principal office of the corporation in the State of Missouri.

39.) In the event the necessity arises from war, or pestilence, or any cause which prevents a regular meeting of the State Association, whether such a condition is of a local or general condition, then the General Board shall be privileged to call and act with full authority in all matters pertaining to the general welfare of the State Association, providing whatever transaction passed shall be by two-thirds vote of the members present, and providing that such transactions shall not conflict with the purpose and edicts of the By-Laws of the State Association.

40.) Special meetings of the Association, for any purpose or purposes, unless otherwise prescribed by statue, may be called by the General Board, and shall be called by the Moderator at the request of not less than fifty percent of all the delegate members duly elected by local Associations, Quarterly Meeting, and local

churches affiliated with the Association.

41.) Seven or more ordained ministers or deacons from two or more affiliated associations belonging to the State Association, shall constitute a quorum to transact business.

42.) All business meetings shall be opened by singing, reading a portion from

God's Word, and prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.

43.) Special meetings of the General Board or the Executive Committee shall be called when necessary by the Moderator, with the written consent of three other members of the Executive Committee. Special meetings of the General Board shall also be called upon the written request of one-fourth of its members. Special meetings of the Executive Committee shall also be called upon the written request

of a majority of its members.

44.) Notice of any special meeting shall be given at least fifteen days previously thereto by written notice delivered personally or mailed to each Board member at his business address, or by telegram. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States mail so addressed, with postage thereon prepaid. If notice be given by telegram, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when the telegram is delivered to the telegraph company. Any Board member may waive notice of any meeting. The attendance of a Board member at a meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except where a Board member attends a meeting for the express purpose of objecting to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened.

45.) Unless otherwise provided by law, whenever any notice is required to be given to any member of Board member of the Association under the provisions of these By-Laws or under the provisions of the articles of incorporation, a waiver thereof in writing, signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice whether before or after writing, signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice whether before or after the time stated therein, shall be deemed equivalent to the

giving of such notice.

Discipline

46.) The State Association shall not usurp any authority over the Quarterly Meetings or Associations that shall be under its supervision, but shall be an advisory body to help them.

Fiscal Policy

47.) The fiscal year of the Association shall begin on the first day of July

and end on the thirtieth day of June in each year.

48.) All checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money notes or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the Association, shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents of the Association and in such manner as shall from time to time be determined by resolution of the General Board.

49.) No loans shall be contracted on behalf of the Association and no evidences

of indebtedness shall be issued in its name unless authorized by a resolution.

50.) The General Board by a majority vote of the voting delegates of the State Association, shall be authorized to create or to increase any bonded indebtedness of the Association.

51.) The General Board of the Association shall be authorized by a majority vote of the voting delegates of the State Association, to sell, lease, exchange, mortgage, pledge, or otherwise dispose of all, or substantially all, of the property and the assets of the Association.

52.) All funds of the corporation not otherwise employed shall be deposited from time to time to the credit of the Association in such banks, trust companies,

or other depositories as the General Board may select.

53.) The salaries of employees shall be fixed from time to time by the General Board.

Standing Rules

54.) The meetings of the State Association and General Board shall be governed by the rules of parlimentary law as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order, except in the case of those rules which are superseded by some rule of this organization.

55.) The Clerk or Assistant Clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in age shall call the Association to order for business, and call the Moderator or Assistant Moderator to the chair, and if neither Moderator or Assistant Moderator is present, then the senior minister in age shall act as Chairman to open the floor for nominations and carry out the election of a Moderator Pro-Tem.

56.) All business, except routine, shall be brought before the body by committee, but shall any committee refuse or fail to present to this body the business given it by any delegate of this Association, then such business may be presented to the body by any delegate, but cannot be discussed unless by a majority vote of this

body.

57.) Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and say "Brother Moderator" but shall speak no further until he or she is recognized by the Moderator.

58.) No one shall speak more than five minutes, or more than twice, on the

same subject without the consent of the Moderator.

- 59.) Any delegate of this body can appeal from the decision of the Moderator of the Association, and by a majority vote thereon, the objection shall be sustained or rejected.
- 60.) No one shall leave the Association when in a business session without the consent of the Moderator.
- 61.) The Moderator shall stop all discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit, or when he thinks it is likely to lead to discord or division.
- 62.) All business coming before this Association shall be decided by secret ballot when there is any opposition or objection to open vote.

Amendments

63.) These By-Laws may be amended at any regular session by a two-thirds majority vote after the proposed amendment had laid on the table one day.
