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PROCEEDINGS OF THE MISSOURI STATE ASSOCIATION OF

FREE WILL BAPTISTS

When convened with the Trinity Free Will Baptist Church and the Pattonville High School of Bridgeton, Missouri.

Tuesday, 7:30 P.M. June 8, 1976

The sixty-third session of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists convened on Tuesday night at 7:30 p.m., June 8, 1976 at the Pattonville High School, Bridgeton, Missouri, Preconvention music was provided by the Rev. Al McFarland family. The service was opened by congregational singing led by Mr. Wayne Gunnoe. Rev. Clarence Burton, Promotional Secretary and GEM editor. led in prayer.

The session was convened by the clerk, Rev. Roger Harwell. The theme of the convention being: "Proclaiming True Liberty". Leviticus 25:10

Rev. James McAllister gave the Moderator's Message followed by a congregational song led by Mr. Wayne Gunnoe.

The host pastor, Rev. Russel Spurgeon, gave words of greeting and officially welcomed the State Convention to the St. Louis area. The response was given by Rev. Lawrence Thompson of Kansas City, Missouri. An offering for the expense of the State Convention was received. Special music was presented by the St. Louis Bicentennial Choir under the direction of Mr. Wayne Gunnoe. Rev. Tom Owens, state home mission pastor, delivered the keynote message. "Cherished Liberties".

At the conclusion of the message, the Moderator asked the clerk to read the appointment of the committees. The session was dismissed in prayer by Rev. Danny Martin, pastor at Salem, Missouri.

Wednesday, 9:00 A.M. June_9,_1976

Convention was convened by singing "Love Lifted Me* led by the host pastor, Rev. Russel Spurgeon. Prayer by Rev. David Joslin, visiting Promotional Secretary from the state of Arkansas. Rev. Kent Tallent, pastor of the Hazel Creek FWB Church brought the morning devotion from Acts 17:1-9.

The report of the Credentials Committee was presented. M/S/C to receive the report, the letters and seat the delegates. Moderator asked the new pastors of Missouri to stand and introduce themselves. Visitors were then recognized by the Moderator.

The report of the General Board was read. M/S/C to receive the report and consider it item by item. Discussion followed concerning the action of the General Board with regard to designating foreign missions co-operative funds to the Howard Filkins account. M/S/C that this body approve the action that was taken by the General Board in designating cooperative foreign missions money to the Howard Filkins deficit account in order that they might return to the mission field.

M/S/C that the Resolutions Committee submit proper guide lines for future action by the General Board regarding the de-

signation of cooperative funds.

Item I: M/S/C to adopt.
Item II: M/S/C to adopt.

Item III: Motion to amend Article 30 of the By-Laws. M/S/C to table until Thursday morning.

Item IV: M/S/C to adopt with the amendment of Part B: "Limiting the expenses of this committee to \$750.00 to be paid from the General Fund."

Items V, VI, VII, VIII, IX, X: Read for information of the convention.

Item XI: M/S/C to adopt.

Item XII: M/S/C to adopt as amended..."That the Southeast Missouri goals be divided as follows: St. Louis Association, \$500.00; St. Francois Association, \$500.00, and Madison County, \$400.00."

Item XIII: M/S/C to adopt.

Business session was adjourned until the afternoon session. Dismissed in prayer by Rev. Dennis Bowman, Kansas City, Mo.

Wednesday, 11:00 A.M. June 9, 1976

The session opened with congregational singing and prayer. Rev. Glenn Rehkop presided over the session. Mr. Wayne Gunnoe directed the singing. Special music was provided by Rev. Ted Wilbanks, pastor of Grant Avenue FWB Church, Springfield, Mo.

Rev. Dale Smith, pastor of Monett FWB Church, delivered the morning message from John 3:16 on the theme, "Cost of Liberty".

Announcements were made and dismissal prayer was led by Rev. Leland Horton. Des Moines. Iowa.

Wednesday, 1:30 P.M. June 9, 1976

Session opened with congregational singing and prayer. Rev. Steve Burton, Liberal, Missouri brought the afternoon devotion from Acts 12.

Words of greeting were given by Rev. Lonnie DaVoult, Promotional Secretary of Oklahoma Free Will Baptists.

The report of the State Home Missions Board was given by Rev. Lawrence Thompson. M/S/C to receive the report and adopt the budget. The report from National Home Missions was given by the director, Rev. Bob Shockey. He reported that in 1975, five (5) churches became self-supporting, eight (8) new missionaries went to the field and 885 conversions were reported by home mission churches. Greetings were also brought by two national home missions pastors; Rev. Vergel Maness, Wilmington, Delaware and Rev. Leland Horton, Des Moines, Iowa.

The report of the Promotional Secretary, Rev. Clarence Burton, was given. The cooperative monies received of \$82,426.66 was well above the proposed budget of \$70,000.00. M/S/C to receive the report and adopt the budget.

The report of the National Executive Office was given by Rev. Eugene Workman. Nashville. Tennessee.

The report of the Sunday School & CTS Board was given by Rev. Kent Tallent. M/S/C to receive the report and adopt the budget.

Report of the National Sunday School Department was given by Rev. Roger Reeds. Mr. Guy Tucker, field representative for the CTS Department also brought words of greeting.

The report from the Foreign Missions Department was given by the general director, Rev. Rolla Smith. He spoke concerning the Howard Filkins account and explained the promotional expenses charged to the missionaries.

Report of the Lebanon Bible and Book Store was given by Mr. Edwin Bowden, manager. Sales for the past nine months were up 22%. M/S/C to receive the report and adopt the budget.

A congregation song was directed at the request of the moderator. Convention stood with a very brief intermission before the next reports were given.

Rev. Billy Melvin gave an oral report concerning the work of the N.A.E. and expressed his gratitude to Missouri for their continuing support. Rev. Millard Sasser also reported on the N.A.E. convention which he attended along with other Missouri delegates.

The Youth Camp Board report was given by Rev. Lynn Wood. Dates for the camp this year are as follows: Senior High Camp, July 25-30; Junior High Camp, August 1-6; Elementary Camp, August 8-13. M/S/C to receive the report and adopt the budget.

Mr. Loyd C. Olsan gave a report from the National Layman's Board and requested that a layman be appointed as liaison between the National Layman's Board and the Missouri Free Will Baptists.

Moderator requested a motion to approve the showing of a film on the country of Bangladesh. The film is sponsored by the N.A.E. and is to be shown following Wednesday night service by Dr. Billy Melvin.

Adjourned in prayer.

Wednesday, 7:30 P.M. June 9, 1976

Preconvention music was provided by the Trinity Free Will Baptist Church choir. Mr. Wayne Gunnoe led the congregation in singing. Opening prayer by Rev. Bob Shockey. Rev. Cliff Bowman presided over the evening service.

Rev. Dale Skiles, on behalf of the State Home Missions Board, introduced the home and foreign missionaries, and presented a plaque to the Missouri Woman's Auxiliary Convention for the largest gift donated to the Perpetual Loan Fund. Mrs. Helen McAllister, vice-president of the Woman's Auxiliary Convention, accepted the plaque. Rev. Wayne Wagner accepted a plaque on behalf of the South Fremont FWB Church for the highest per capita giving for 1975-1976. Another plaque was presented to the Olivet FWB Church for the largest gift to State Home Missions, and was received by pastor, Rev. Cliff Bowman.

Special music was provided by the Ron Scott Trio of the Berkeley FWB Church. An offering was received for the Union Mission Land Fund. The St. Louis Bicentennial Choir under the direction of Mr. Wayne Gunnoe presented two choral arrangements.

Rev. Bill Jones, President of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Moore, Oklahoma, delivered a very inspiring message on the theme, "The Challenge of Liberty" from Deuteronomy 15:12.

Following the benediction, a film on Bangladesh was shown by Dr. Billy Melvin, N.A.E.

Thursday 9:00 A.M., June 10, 1976

Session was opened by congregational singing and prayer. Rev. Russell Johnson, Myrtle, Missouri brought the morning devotion from Hebrews 12:1-2.

Report of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College was given by President Jones. The state of Missouri had seventeen (17) students enrolled this past year and Missouri churches gave \$21,152.64 in gifts to the school.

Remaining items from the General Board report were as follows:

M/S/C to adjourn until the convention in 1977 which will convene with the First Free Will Baptist Church of Lebanon, Missouri.

The service was opened by congregational singing and prayer was led by Rev. Vergel Maness. Special music was presented by Debbie Williams.

Rev. Murray Southwell presided over the service, and introduced the morning speaker, Rev. Ken Goff, Flat River, Missouri. Rev. Goff delivered the message from John 14:1-6, "Coming Liberties."

Announcements were made and the service was dismissed in prayer.

GENERAL BOARD REPORT

The General Board met twice during the past year: August 22,1975 at Flat River, Missouri and November 20, 1975 in Lebanon, Missouri.

The Executive Committee met in the afternon of November 20, 1975 in Lebanon, Missouri. A quorum was present at each meeting and the following business was transacted by the Board and the Executive Committee.

- Elected the following men to the Executive Committee: Rev. Glenn Rehkop, Rev. Cliff Bowman, Rev. Dale Smith, and Rev. Millard Sasser.
- 2. Authorized the Promotional Secretary to compile a Digest of Reports for the 1976 State Association.
- 3. Planned the 1976 program for the State Association.
- 4. Designated the Wednesday night mission offering to the "Union Mission Land Fund Project."
- 5. Invited Brother Tryman Messer of Kansas to conduct a "Soul Winning Clinic" on Tuesday afternoon of the State Association.
- 6. On December 3, 1975, a letter was sent to the General Board recommending that allocated co-operative money to the Foreign Missions Department general fund be designated to the Howard Filkins account until the deficit in the Filkins account was satisified by the Foreign Missions Board. (See attached letter)
 NOTE: The above action only affected the Co-operative account for the months of January and February, 1976.
- 7. Reveiwed the Bookstore Manager's Contract.
- 8. Heard the Report of all Boards, their financial reports, and proposed budgets. The General Board forwards them to the State Convention with the recommendation they be approved.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Request that the action of the General Beard with regard to the designation of Foreign Mission money to the Howard Filkins account, be brought to the floor of the State Convention and that a vote of approval or disapproval be taken.
- 2. General Auditing Committee Recommendation:
 - A. That each department include a Balance Sheet with their report as outlined on page 42 of the 1975 State Minutes.
 - B. That all unused checks, voided checks, and broken sequence checks must be accounted for.
 - C. That all books should close on March 31.
- 3. Addition to Article 30 of the By-Laws......
 ...with the exclusion of the Auditing Committee who shall be appointed by the General Board. The first appointed shall serve a term of one year, the second, a term of two years and the third, a term of three years; thereafter, each shall be appointed for a term of three years. Members of standing boards, with exception of General Board, are not eligible to serve on the Auditing Committee. Their duties are to audit all state books and serve as Budget Committee.

- 4. A. Motion that we come to a decision in this State Association, whether or not, we want to enter into the Nursing Home ministry.
 - B. Upon the approval of Item A, the General Board recommends that Rev. Bob Francis be the chairman of this five (5) member committee and that the Nominating Committee nominate the other four (4) members. This committee is charged with the responsibility of reporting to the 1977 State Convention total information concerning a Home for Senior Citizens in order that the State Convention may make a decision on the Home for Senior Citizens. The expenses of this committee, with a \$750.00 limit are to be paid out of the General Fund.
- 5. Whereas, there is a need for an additional conference room at the office in Lebanon, it is recommended that the Promotional Secretary, Book Store Manager and the Moderator serve as a committee to investigate the possibilities for additional room and report to the fall General Board Meeting.
- 6. Seeing the need for additional storage room at the Book Store in Lebanon, it is recommended that the Book Store Manager research the possibility of building storage shelves and, in general, improve the handling of merchandise in the storage room, reporting to the fall General Board meeting concerning progress.
- 7. Whereas, there is a general understanding that the Bock Store inventory is hard to control, it is recommended that a flexible ceiling of \$35,000.00 inventory, excluding Sunday School and Vacation Bible School material, be maintained.
- 8. In order that all may understar! the financial policy of the Book Store, the Manager is to issue a policy statement concerning cash sales, charge sales and standing orders; and, include a copy with all orders shipped until the policy is fully understood.
- 9. Due to the rise of Accounts receivable, the Book Store manager is to bring an up-to-date record of Past Due Accounts and his recommendation concerning them to the next Executive Committee meeting.
- 10. We recommend that the Promotional Secretary be given a twenty five dollar (\$25.00) per week raise and mileage expense be increased to 15¢ per mile.
- 11. WHEREAS, the Lebanon Bible and Book Store, owned and operated by
 Missouri Free Will Baptist, serves the general public as
 well as the Free Will Baptist Church and its constituency,
 and the total Christian community of the Lebanon area, and,
 - WHEREAS, that in serving the general public, it becomes necessary to sell books, pamphlets, ect., which may neither convey nor reflect the exact doctrinal position of the Free Will Baptist Church, nor the personal doctrinal position of individuals within the Free Will Baptist Church,

Be it resolved that:

A. The doctrinal and theological position of the management of the Lebanon Bible and Book Store shall be in accordance with the doctrinal and theological position of Free Will Baptist as defined in the "Treatise of the Faith and Practices of Free Will Baptist".

- B. The Selling of other books and pamphlets that hold other doctrinal positions and beliefs, including the charismatic issues (tongues), or other related Christian materials, shall not be construed or interpreted that the Lebanon Bible and Book Store is aligned with, or in agreement with such positions or beliefs.
- C. Under no circumstances will the Lebanon Bible and Book Store sell books or religious materials endorsing the doctrinal positions of the CULTS, that is Mormonism, Jehovah's Witnesses, Christian Science, Armstrong's Church of God, and Seventh Day Adventism; or the doctrinal position of the Roman Catholic Church and other cults.
- 12. Report of the Committee to plan for financing of the National Association of Free Will Baptist in Kansas City, 1978.
 - A. We propose that the needed funds (\$5,000.00) be raised on an Associational level with the following goals for each Association:

In view of theological differences among various denominations and in view of the surge of cults and whereas Free Will Baptist have no seminary for further theological training of our pastors, the Board of Christian Education recommends that this Missouri State Association of Free will Baptist urge the National Association to enter into definite plans for the beginning of a Free Will Baptist Seminary.

If the National Association has no immediate plans for initiating such action, the Missouri State Association informs the National body that the Missouri State Association is prepared to initiate positive action for the beginning of a Free Will Baptist Seminary in connection with Covenant Theological Seminary in St. Louis, Missouri Copies of this recommendation will be sent to the proper persons on the National level, along with the ways and means it can be accomplished.

- 15. PLACEMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

AUDITING COMMITTEE REPORT

MISSOURI STATE HOME MISSION BOARD:

The Savings Account and Perpetual Loan Fund Account were in good order giving an accurate picture of their condition. The General Fund Account was basically correct but contained a \$10.00 error in entry.

This committee did not find a list of outstending loans nor property to which the Board holds title. The balance in the Perpetual Loan Fund Account was not listed with the report nor were the liabilities listed on the fund balance sheet.

In our opinion, the accompanying balance sheet presents fairly the financial position of the Missouri State Home Mission Board as of April 5,1976.

AUDITING COMMITTEE REPORT

SUNDAY SCHOOL AND C.T.S.

We have examined the official records of the Missouri Christian Education Board and recommend that they include a balance sheet in the Digest with their report this year.

In our opinion, the official records persent fairly the financial position of the Missouri Christian Education Board as of March 31, 1976.

THE FREE WILL BAPTIST GEM

We have examined the official record and income statement of the GEM. In our opinion, the income statement and balance sheet persent fairly the financial position of the GEM as of March 31, 1976.

THE STATE PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

We have examined the books of the State Promotional Office and State Treasurer and find them in order. In our opinion, the accompanying records persent fairly the financial position of the State Treasurer as of March31, 1976.

We recommend that the GEM records be included into the Promotional Department records.

LEBANON BOCK STORE

We examined the records and verified the cash sales, charges, paid-on-accounts, credit returns and bank deposits for three days which were picked at remdom (Oct. 13, Dec. 23 and March 20) and found all entries to be in order. The bookkeeping procedures are well designed and functioning properly. This report shows a net increase in working capital of \$2,785.65.

In our opinion, the profit and loss statement, the income statement and balance sheet present fairly the financial position of the book store as of March 31. 1976.

YOUTH CAMP BOARD

We have examined the official records of the Youth Camp Board. We did not have July, 1975 and August, 1975 cancelled checks or bank statements to verify income and disbursements for those two months. We did not have checks in changing Treasurers to verify check number 650 and up as unused on Citzens Bank of Belton, Missouri. We did not have checks in changing Treasurers to verify check number 33 and up as unused on the Bank of Thayer. The records show a receipt number for receipts but we did not have the receipt book to verify this.

The records show \$6,289.50 more than the report. This amount was transfered in changing Treasurers and shown through the books again. There are 2 returned checks for the year in the amount of \$88.00 that are still outstanding.

The journals and ledger do not balance because there were some items that were not posted. We recommend that posting references be used.

We recommend that the board have a purchase order system. We futher recommend that all invoices be signed that the merchandise was received and the Treasurer pay by invoice, stapling all invoices paid by a check with the date, amount of check, and check number written on it.

The Auditing Committee wishes to not that the note with the Citzens State Bank is on file and marked paid by the bank.

The Auditing Committee notes that there were 3 Treasurers for the board last year.

After examining the records with the above notes, it is our opinion that the statement of income and balance sheet presents fairly the recorded financial position of the Youth Camp Board.

THE MISSOURI COLLEGE COMMISSION :

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statement and balance sheet persent fairly the financial position of the Commission as of March 31. 1976.

MISSOURI STATE FREE WILL BAPTIST YOUTH CAMP

The Missouri State Youth Camp Board reported at the last state meeting that the last camp session (1975) was a record breaker with a total attendance of 1,232 of which, one-half that number, committed their lives to the Lord. There were 25 teenagers who announced their call to the mission field and the ministry.

It was a very special year in every respect. The Youth Camp Board is eternally grateful to all who worked so hard to make this possible.

The improvements at the camp since the last state meeting are as follows: The west playground has been black-topped for basket-ball, volleyball, etc. The swimming pool has been repaired and completely resurfaced. A 12 X 15 utility room has been built on the west end of the dining hall. An automatic dishwasher has been installed. Plastic kitchen utensils consisting of divided trays, cereal bowls, coffee cups, drinking glasses, and six large dispensers for tea and kool-aid, etc. have been purchased. This will eliminate the purchases of paper utensils saving approximately \$850.00 per camp session. New playground equipment that can satisfy the needs of all ages has been installed such as swing sets, parallel ladders and bars, and etc. In the way of teaching aids, the camp will supply books for each pupil along with the teaching equipment such as blackboards, etc.

In the way of future improvements, we are still trying to construct a lake. New rest rooms and showers are planned for the men. New classrooms and proper housing for the cooks and evangelist, etc. are being planned.

The Camp Board humbly thanks everyone for the generous gifts and offerings of the past year. We welcome any constructive criticism and suggestions for improving the Youth Camp.

We are thrilled at what has been accomplished this year. In just seven months, we have been able to offer our people three opportunities to better equip themselves to do the Lord's work. Workshops were conducted in Springfield, Kansas City and Festus. The last was a Teach 'N' Train sponsored and conducted by the National Sunday School office and our board. The editors and contributing writers for our literature were present at the TNT and conducted the individual seminars. The attendance at each successive meeting increased in such a way that our hopes are to promote more seminars next year. Those attending went back to their church and were more adequately prepared. Leadership and qualified personnel have long been the needs of Sunday School and CTS organizations. We hope to be able to help our churches to do something to alleviate the needs. We have a unified goal and purpose for existing and that is to provide learning centers and educational activities that will strengthen our churches statewide. Any constructive criticism from qualified individuals will be gladly received, examined and then applied when found useful. Pray for our Sunday Schools that there would be a revival statewide in churches of all sizes.

Once again our CTS competitions were highly profitable with the largest crowd attending ever. The participants were well prepared and will represent our state well. Our board is currently deciding on some organizational adjustments that will develop our CTS potential to its fullest and will allow it to function more adequately. We hope to promote the rebirth of old CTS groups and see the birth of new ones next year. CTS definitely has a place in every church and we ask all our churches to faithfully support and sponsor one. Your suggestions concerning ways that we may be better able to serve you would be welcome. We ask for your prayers and support.

REPORT OF THE CHRISTIAN BOARD OF EDUCATION

Your Christian Education Board has had an active and fruitful year. Upon the creation of the board, it was charged with the responsibility of planning and implementing a continuing program of christian education and training.

This 1975-76 Institute year, we have had a total of 179 students enrolled in three locations of Missouri Bible Institute. In addition, seminars have been held within our State Association with good enrollments.

It is our happy privilege to present four students of MBI with a Certificate of Bible, awarded to them from Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. These are, in fact, the first students to graduate from MBI and receive the award.

REPORT OF THE CHRISTIAN BOARD OF EDUCATION (CONTINUED)

As of this report, MBI is no longer an extension of Hills-dale College, Moore, Oklahoma. This change in our relationship results from a ruling of the Oklahoma Board of Regents. We find ourselves at a loss for words when trying to express our deep gratitude to Hillsdale College and President Jones for their untiring help in the infant days of MBI.

We look upon the above action as in the providence of God and as a blessing from God to Missouri Bible Institute. September, 1976, MBI begins a continuing program of Institute studies which will grant a Certificate of Bible from Missouri Bible Institute. Thus, for the first time, Missouri Free Will Baptists, will have a local program of christian education which will award them such a Certificate. We are excited about the opportunity.

Beginning in September 1976, MBI will have at least four two-year sites. MBI will no longer operate on a two semester basis. We are moving to a three semester system. There will be three semesters per year. Each semester will be 12 weeks in length. They will be Fall, Winter and Spring semesters with three classes being taught each semester in each Institue. Definite information concerning the program offered by MBI is now available. In addition to the four "permanent" locations of the Institute, "Satellite Institutes" will be held in various locations of the state as the needs are made known to the Board.

The Christian Education Board is also prepared to assist local churches through seminars and "short term" classes. Pastors who think the board can assist him and his church should contact a member of the board about his particular interest.

The Scriptures say: "And the things that thou hast heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also....Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth" (II Timothy 2:2,15). The Christian Education Board views these holy commandments as a Divine imperative. Thus we define its purpose as being: "To provide quality academic education and training, with practical application, which supplements the ministry of the local Free Will Baptist Churches in Missouri. Our aim is to accomplish this purpose through every means available to us.

GENERAL FUND REPORT TO THE BRETHREN OF MISSOURI STATE ASSOCIATION FROM FREE WILL BAPTIST BIBLE COLLEGE

Dear Missouri Friends:

To report on your National operated and controlled college is indeed a privilege. Free Will Baptist Bible College has had a good year. Choice young people from across the denomination have received the best training the Free Will Baptist denomination offers tomorrow's leaders. Zealous young preachers with spiritual fire in their souls are going out to preach the Gospel. Students whose hearts beat for the cause of Christ in distant fields are offering themselves to our mission boards. Christian teachers have been readied to instruct young minds in the classroom of both public and Christian day schools. Church musicians are bringing even better music to our congregations. Still other students are actively assuming responsible places of service in the local church while they work at secular jobs.

Many churches and church people are taking a new look at Christian Education. More Free Will Baptist people are going to college than ever before in our history. For this reason, you are to be commended for What you have done this year to help with this costly but fruitful ministry. Hopefully this report will challenge you and the people of this state to do even more during the coming year.

Missouri Friends are being asked to give \$16,000.00 during the June 1976 - May 1966, college year. During this past year, your general fund gifts amounted to approximately \$14,213.12. This means you will need to give a monthly average of \$1,184.43.

Estimated total general fund gifts of \$315,500.00 for the 1975-76 year will exceed the previous year's gifts by \$18,268.85. Monthly general fund gifts averaged \$26,321.79. This has been a daily gift flow of \$865.38.

On May 1, there were 25,000 catalogued volumes in the campus library. Seven hundred forty-two of these volumes are in the Free Will Baptist Historical collection. Eight hundred twelve volumes make up the curriculum laboratory. This leaves 23,446 volumes in the regular library. During the 1975-76 year, a total of 1,739 books were added as follows: 70 Historical collection; 812 Curriculum laboratory; and 857 in the regular library.

Names of students from your state are listed in this report along with the vital statistics of interest to you.

Your continued prayers and financial support are vital to your National college. It means much to the administration, faculty, and staff to know we can count on you.

Continue to pray that the education our students receive at Hillsdale will prepare them for the particular ministry God has selected-----whether layman or preacher.

Reverend Andy Lay, Missouri's elected member to the Board of Trustees, has done a fine job representing the state this past year. He is a member of the Academic Committee and has contributed much to a recent development in curriculum that will be of great advantage to our students.

May God richly bless you during this Association.

OUR FIELD:

1975 was our greatest year: Five churches became self supporting. Eight new missionaries went to the field. GIVING - from Missouri to Foreign Missions over the past five years is as follows:

Your state quota for 1975 was \$100,000. Receipts for that year totaled \$93.084.67. You missed reaching the quota by \$6,915.33.

Glowing results were evidenced as the gifts to Foreign Missions were tallied for the first four months of 1976. The average monthly income for this period amounted to \$102,679.18. PRAISE THE LORD! This enabled us to exceed our budget (January thru April) by \$47.75. While this doesn't amount to much it represents a tremendous achievement for our department.

Glowing results were also recorded from my personal itinerary in response to our faith promise missionary conferences and rally days. Over a period of twelve weeks a record \$3,873.82 per month was tallied (January was set aside for surgery and convalescence). From May 18, 1975 through May 2, 1976, \$15,310.93 per month was recorded---making a total of \$183,373.16 for 51 weeks. GLORY TO OUR GOD:

A RECORD CALL-A-THON offering was reported for April 18. At last count the total stood at \$22,833.26. ANOTHER PRAISE ITEM:

GROWTH - We now have 88 missionaries serving in 8 foreign countries. Two couples and two single girls anticipate leaving for their respective fields of service this year. They are: Allan and Larue Crowson (Africa), Steve and Judy Lytle(Panama), Alice Smith (Africa), and Judy Smith (Japan).

Three new couples and one single girl completed Missionary Internship on May 13. Ron and Linda Callaway (Spain), Clint and Lynette Morgan (Africa), and Jim and Susan Moser (Brazil), have begun their deputational ministry. Mirial Gainer has been approved for an associate missionary relationship.

Another three couples, one single girl and a single young man are scheduled to enter Missionary Internship in September of this year. They are: Jim and Karen Cowart (Brazil), Ledgel and Sharon Ferguson (Africa), John and Pansy Murray (France), Charolette Tallent (France), and Tom McCullough (France). REMEMBER THESE AS YOU PRAY:

Ten summer missionaries will depart on May 23 and 24 for a 10-week stay in four countries assisting the missionaries. Sandra Tittle and June Lytle will serve in Panama. Cathy Crawford and Rebecca Rigby will spend their time in France. Neil Gilliland is scheduled for Brazil. Mike and Deleen Cousineau, Rick Sirico, Paula Coffman and John Rhodes will assist the missionaries in Ivory Coast, Africa.

Some of the newer items are Systematics, A Survey of the Pentateuch, The Unsealed Book, The Apocalypse, A Survey of the Gospels, Perseverance in Preservation, A Survey of the Books of History, The Bicentennial of the Sunday School, Volume III of Romans in paperback, and the complete hardback edition of Romans. In addition to these, the church covenant has been produced on a 3" x 5" plastic bookmark.

You will also want to note that the <u>Children's Church Guide</u> and <u>Missionary Stories</u> with visuals are complete for the four quarters.

Books soon to be released are A Survey of the Books of Poetry, A Survey of the General Epistles, and A Survey of the Pauline Epistles. These are valuable tools to aid and equip you in your ministry for Christ. Add them to your library and use them.

This report from the National Layman's Board is being written with much excitement. The Lord Jesus Christ has richly blessed the efforts of laymen and churches across our denomination as they have poured out their lives in the work of the Master. As you know the purpose of the National Layman's Board is to help local pastors to involve their laymen in the work of their church. In an effort to give our laymen an opportunity to share together in a national endeavor, two projects have been established by the Layman's Board. They are Project Tool Shed and Project Book Shelf.

Project Book Shelf gives our laymen an opportunity to support our missionaries with educational tools in up-to-date literature. In early Spring, our missionaries were sent a listing of books and booklets authored by Free Will Baptists. They were given an opportunity to select books they wanted. The books were grouped so that each missionary could select approximately \$5 work of books. A total of 248 books were sent out to 37 missionaries. The books were sent out to the missionaries in May. We plan to do this twice a year. Also, as funds are available, foreign missionaries returning to the field will be given books to take back with them to the mission field.

Project Tool Shed was initiated to involve our laymen in supporting our missionaries with tools which will help them in building new churches and maintaining existing buildings. For missionaries sponsored by the National Home Missions Board or joint national/state home missions boards, we want to establish a basic tool box consisting of hand tools (hammer, saw, screw drivers, etc.) which could be given to the missionary.

For foreign missionaries, our desire is to provide them with power tools as the need arises. Our first project was for Howard Filkins, Ivory Coast. The Master's Men provided him a wet/dry vacuum and a table saw, plus \$366 for tools he had

purchased out of his own money. These tools are for the school shop where he and his wife serve as house parents. Brother Archie Mayhew, missionary to Ivory Coast, said he did not know any place in the world that the tools would be more appreciated. The school has approximately 200 students, all of missionary parents. The skills learned will equip them for further service for the Lord.

REPORT OF THE 1976 NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF EVANGELICALS CONVENTION

The N.A.E. Convention was held February 22-25, 1976, at the Shoreham American Hotel in Washington, D.C. Those representing Missouri Free Will Baptists at this annual N.A.E. Convention were Andy Lay, R. B. Spurgeon, Millard Sasser, Edwin Bowden and Clarence Burton. Also accompanying this group representation at the convention was Donald Lombard, Missouri Free Will Baptist pastor having personal membership with NAE. Some of the observations of those attending were:

There was a good spirit prevailing throughout the convention of some 4,000 Evangelicals and the worship services would be acceptable to Free Will Baptists. The opening worship service on Sunday evening was especially noted as gathering members and guests were called to prayer for the nation for at least 45 minutes.

The theme, "Let Freedom Ring", for the joint convention of N.A.E. and N.R.B. (National Religious Broadcasters) was very well developed by the practical messages of the guest speakers among whom were: Congressman John B. Conlan of Arizona; Dr. Harold J. Ockenga, President of Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary; Dr. Joseph Jackson, President of the National Baptist Convention, and Dr. Francis Shaeffer, author and theologian of L'Abri, Switzerland. Congressman Conlan was noted in urging Evangelical involvement at the polls, "The nation's 40 million evangelicals are the largest single block of votes in the nation, but over 15 million are not registered to vote." Dr. Joseph Jackson called for national repentance. Dr. Francis Schaeffer closed the convention with an inspiring message dealing with the unchanging nature and authority of the Holy Scriptures.

There were several informative workshopes held during the afternoon session of the convention for those interested such as:

<u>Decency in Media, Organizing for Church Growth</u>, and <u>Training Laymen to Counsel</u>.

REPORT ON HOME FOR SENIOR CITIZENS

The Study Committee on the Home for Senior Citizens met at Lebanon, Missouri, on May 20, 1976 at 10:00 a.m. Present were chairman, Rev. Glenn Rekhop, Rev. N. R. Smith, Rev. Robert Francis and Rev. Lynn Wood. Separate and individual studies by committee members have resulted in the following findings:

- 1. The U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development will guarantee a mortgage of up to 90% of estimated value. This loan could be pro-rated over a 40 year period. Special factors would be (1) Cost certification is required. (2) Certificate of need from state agency is required.
- 2. There is a possibility of getting a package deal from various organizations, one of which is Christian Builders, Inc., Nashville, Tennessee, who would provide plans, supervise and build to our specification, using volunteer labor when feasible.
- Consideration of property at Mt. Grove (poultry experiment station) resulted in the finding that this property is not available for said project.
- 4. Existing Nursing Home property 10 miles north of Lebanon was looked at with no recommendation about this property at present.

We, as a committee, make the following recommendations:

- 1. That a professional Nursing Home type of facility be of primary consideration and retirement village or home be considered in future times.
- A survey indicates that according to Free Will Baptist population, Southeast Missouri to be the logical location.
- 3. That cities of Flat River, Farmington, Festus, Fredericktown be considered because of medical facilities, transportation and general conveniences. Respectfully submitted, Rev. Robert Francis, Rev. Glenn Rekhop, Rev. N. R. Smith and Rev. Lynn Wood.

Name

1.) This Association shall be called the Missouri State Association for Free Will Baptists.

Purpose

2.) The Object of this Association shall be the bringing together of the Free Will Baptists of the State of Missouri in one annual gathering that we may become better acquainted with one another, the upholding of the Free Will Baptists Churches of Missouri, and a world wide outreach of souls.

Membership

- 3.) The Association shall be composed of the members of the various local affiliated Associations.
- 4.) Any organized Quarterly Meeting, Yearly Meeting, or Ass. of Free Will Baptists, may unite with this body at any regular session, through a letter or delegates by a two-thirds vote of all delegates present.

Officers

- 5.) The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, and Assistant Clerk, who shall be elected annually at the close of each session and hold their office until their successors are elected and qualified.
- 6.) The officers of this body shall submit, at every session, a report of the work done for this Association.
- 7.) The moderator shall be the principal executive officer of the Association and he shall sign, with the Clerk or any other people officer or agent of the Association thereunto authorized by the General Board, any deeds, mortgages, bonds, contracts, or other instruments which the General Board has authorized to be executed, except in cases where the signing and execution thereof shall be expressly delegated by the General Board or by these by laws to some other officer or agent of the Association, or shall be required by law to be otherwise signed or executed. The duties of the moderator shall include presiding at the meetings of the State Association, the General Board, and the Executive Committee; to call special meetings of the General Board or Executive Committee when the conditions of by-law 43 are fulfilled; to appoint such committees as are created without provision for their selection; to set the time and place for the meetings of the General Board and Executive Committee; and in general, to fulfill whatever responsibilities may be commensurate with his office or delegated to him by the body or General Board.
- 8.) In the absence of the Moderator, or in the event of his death, inability, or refusal to act, the Assistant Moderator shall perform the duties of the Moderator, and when so acting, shall have all the powers of and be subject to all the restrictions upon the Moderator. The Assistant Moderator shall perform such duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the Moderator or by the General Board.

9.) The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of all business transactions; shall superintend the printing of the Minutes and shall receive an honorarium of an amount agreed upon by this body.

10.) The Clerk shall: (a) keep the Minutes of the Association and of the General Board meetings in one or more books provided for the purpose; (b) see that all notices are given in accordance with the provisions of these By-Laws or as required by law; (c) be custodian of the Association records and of the seal of the Association and see that the seal of the Association is affixed to all documents the execution of which on behalf of the Association under its seal is duly authorized; (d) in general, perform all duties incident to the office of Clerk and such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the Moderator or by the General Board; and (e) in the absence of the Clerk, or in the event of his death, inability, or refusal to act, the Assistant Clerk shall perform the duties of the Clerk and,

when so acting, shall have all the power of and be subject to all the restrictions upon the Clerk. The Assistant Clerk shall perform such duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the Clerk or by the General Board.

11.) No officer shall serve the same office more than three consecutive years.

Boards

- 12.) All standing boards shall be composed of five (5) members, exclusive of the General Board. Standing Boards include the Board of Christian Education, the Home Mission Board, the Sunday School and Church Training Service Board, the Youth Camp Board and the General Board.
- 13.) The duties of the various standing boards shall be to plan a program and supervise its operation in their respective fields, and to receive, hold, manage, use or convey and funds and property entrusted to said Boards.

Election

- 14) The personnel of each of the foregoing, exclusive of the General Board, shall be elected as follows: The first named for a term of one year, the second for a term of two years, and third for a term of three years, the fourth for a term of four years, and the fifth for a term of five years, and thereafter each shall be elected for a term of five years.
- 15.) The personnel of the General Board shall be composed of the officers of the State Association; the chairmen of all standing boards and one member from each affiliated Association to be elected by the State Body whose term of office shall be two years and so constituted that the expiration date of the term of office of half of these shall expire one year and the other half the following year. This shall be determined by alphabetical order of the name of the affiliated Association.
- 16.) No person shall fill more than one office at the same time except as he may become a member of the General Board by virtue of being Chairman of the Board of which he is an elected member.
- 17.) Any vacancy occurring in the General Board may be filled by the affirmative vote of a majority of the remaining Board members though less than a quorum of the General Board, unless otherwise provided by law.
 - 18.) All Board members elected to fill a vacancy shall be elected for the un-

expired term of his predecessor in office.

19.) Any member of the standing board of the State Association who does not put forth any interest in or function on said board for the period of one year, shall have his office declared vacant and a new member be elected by this Association to fill his unexpired term of office.

Duties

- 20.) The General Board shall have power to act in behalf of, and for the State-Association from one regular session to another, and shall have power to elect such officers as may be necessary to cary out the plans and undertakings of the State Association. The General Board shall have the right to employ a Promotional Secretary who shall serve as Treasurer of the Association and be responsible for handling all monies of the Association except in cases where this responsibility shall be expressly delegated by the General Board or by these by-laws to some other officer, agent or Board of the Association. He shall make an annual financial report to the Association report to the Association.
- 21.) The General Board shall have power to fill any irregular vacancies that may occur in its own body and shall also have power to fill any irregular vacancies that may occur in any department of work between sessions of the State Association. It shall be the duty of this Board to make written reports of all its work to each session.
- 22.) An Executive Committee, consisting of seven members of the General Board, shall be composed of the Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk of the State Association, and four other members to be elected annually by the General Board, whose duty it shall be to act on all matters coming within the scope of the

work of the Board when said Board is not in session. It shall also plan and execute the program for the annual sessions of the Missouri State Association.

23.) A majority of the number of the General Board members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the General Board, but if less than such majority is present at a meeting, a majority of the Board members present may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice.

24.) An act of the majority of the Board members present at a meeting at

which a quorum is present, shall be an act of the General Board.

25.) A Board member of the Association who is present at a meeting of the General Board at which action on any Association matter is taken shall be presumed to have assented to the action taken unless his dissent shall be entered in the Minutes of the meeting.

26.) The General Board may authorize any officer of officers, Agent or Agents to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of and on behalf of the Association, and such authority may be general or confined

to specific instances.

27.) Any person or agent elected or appointed by the General Board may be removed by the General Board whenever in its judgement the best interests of the Association would be served thereby, but such removal shall be without prejudice to the contract rights, if any, of the persons so removed.

28.) By resolution of the General Board the Board members may be paid their expenses, if any, of attendance of each meeting of the General Board. No such payment shall preclude any Board member from serving the Association in any

other capacity and receiving compensation therefore.

29.) The General Board shall provide an Association seal which shall be circular in form and shall have inscribed thereon the name of the corporation and the state of incorporation and the words, "Corporate Seal."

Committees

30.) The Moderator shall appoint a committee on committees consisting of five members who shall appoint all committees with the exclusion of the Auditing Committee who shall be appointed by the General Board. The first appointed shall serve a term of one year, the second, a term of two years and the third, a term of three years; thereafter, each shall be appointed for a term of three years. Members of standing boards, with exception of General Board, are not eligible to serve on the Auditing Committee. Their duties are to audit all state books and serve as Budget Committee.

31.) All resolutions and reports shall bear the name of all the members of the committee who favor them; and if the names be not a majority of all members of such committee, than the clerk shall not read the resolutions or report.

Representation

32.) The standing delegates of this Association shall be all ordained Free Will Baptist ministers and their companions, all ordained deacons, and Associational Clerks, provided they are members in good standing in some Free Will Baptist

Church belonging to this State Association.

33.) The number of elected delegates to the State Association shall be seven delegates from each affiliated local association or yearly meeting; one delegate from each church, plus one delegate for each fifty members or larger fraction thereof Each church which represents must be a member of a local association or yearly meeting holding membership in this body.

34.) This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.

Voting

35.) Those entitled to vote at any annual or special meeting of this State Association, shall be the elected delegates and the standing delegates as defined in By-Law 32 and 33, and each elected delegate or standing delegate shall be entitled to one vote.

36.) A majority vote shall be final upon all subjects except to amend the By-Laws receive Quarterly Meetings or Associations, and the changing of the members of the committees appointed by the Moderator, then it shall require a two-thirds majority.

Meetings

37.) The sessions of the Association shall convene on Tuesday evening at

7.30 P.M. following the first Sunday in June each year.

38.) The membership of the State Association may designate any place, either within or without the State of Missouri for any annual meeting. Any special meeting may be called by the General Board. A waiver of notice signed by all members entitled to vote at a meeting may designate any place, either within or without the State of Missouri, unless otherwise prescribed by statue, as the place for the holding of such meeting. If no designation is made, or if a special meeting be otherwise called, the place of the meeting shall be the principal office of the corporation in the State of Missouri.

39.) In the event the necessity arises from war, or pestilence, or any cause which prevents a regular meeting of the State Association, whether such a condition is of a local or general condition, then the General Board shall be privileged to call and act with full authority in all matters pertaining to the general welfare of the State Association, providing whatever transaction passed shall be by two-thirds vote of the members present, and providing that such transactions shall not conflict with the purpose and edicts of the By-Laws of the State Association.

40.) Special meetings of the Association, for any purpose or purposes, unless otherwise prescribed by statue, may be called by the General Board, and shall be called by the Moderator at the request of not less than fifty percent of all the delegate members duly elected by local Associations, Quarterly Meeting, and local

churches affiliated with the Association.

41.) Seven or more ordained ministers or deacons from two or more affiliated associations belonging to the State Association, shall constitute a quorum to transact business.

42.) All business meetings shall be opened by singing, reading a portion from

God's Word, and prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.

43.) Special meetings of the General Board or the Executive Committee shall be called when necessary by the Moderator, with the written consent of three other members of the Executive Committee. Special meetings of the General Board shall also be called upon the written request of one-fourth of its members. Special meetings of the Executive Committee shall also be called upon the written request

of a majority of its members.

44.) Notice of any special meeting shall be given at least fifteen days previously thereto by written notice delivered personally or mailed to each Board member at his business address, or by telegram. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States mail so addressed, with postage thereon prepaid. If notice be given by telegram, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when the telegram is delivered to the telegraph company. Any Board member may waive notice of any meeting. The attendance of a Board member at a meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except where a Board member attends a meeting for the express purpose of objecting to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened.

45.) Unless otherwise provided by law, whenever any notice is required to be given to any member of Board member of the Association under the provisions of these By-Laws or under the provisions of the articles of incorporation, a waiver thereof in writing, signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice whether before or after writing, signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice whether before or after the time stated therein, shall be deemed equivalent to the

giving of such notice.

Discipline

46.) The State Association shall not usurp any authority over the Quarterly Meetings or Associations that shall be under its supervision, but shall be an advisory body to help them.

Fiscal Policy

- 47.) The fiscal year of the Association shall begin on the first day of April and end on the thirty-first day of March in each year.
- 48.) All checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money notes or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the Association, shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents of the Association and in such manner as shall from time to time be determined by resolution of the General Board.
- 49.) No loans shall be contracted on behalf of the Association and no evidences of indebtedness shall be issued in its name unless authorized by a resolution.
- 50.) The General Board by a majority vote of the voting delegates of the State Association, shall be authorized to create or to increase any bonded indebtedness of the Association.
- 51.) The General Board of the Association shall be authorized by a majority vote of the voting delegates of the State Association, to sell, lease, exchange, mortgage, pledge, or otherwise dispose of all, or substantially all, of the property and the assets of the Association.
- 52.) All funds of the corporation not otherwise employed shall be deposited from time to time to the credit of the Association in such banks, trust companies, or other depositories as the General Board may select.
- 53.) The salaries of employees shall be fixed from time to time by the General Board.

Standing Rules

- 54.) The meetings of the State Association and General Board shall be governed by the rules of parlimentary law as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order, except in the case of those rules which are superseded by some rule of this organization.
- 55.) The Clerk or Assistant Clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in age shall call the Association to order for business, and call the Moderator or Assistant Moderator to the chair, and if neither Moderator or Assistant Moderator is present, then the senior minister in age shall act as Chairman to open the floor for nominations and carry out the election of a Moderator Pro-Tem.
- 56.) All business, except routine, shall be brought before the body by committee, but shall any committee refuse or fail to present to this body the business given it by any delegate of this Association, then such business may be presented to the body by any delegate, but cannot be discussed unless by a majority vote of this body.
- 57.) Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and say "Brother Moderator" but shall speak no further until he or she is recognized by the Moderator.
- 58.) No one shall speak more than five minutes, or more than twice, on the same subject without the consent of the Moderator.
- 59.) Any delegate of this body can appeal from the decision of the Moderator of the Association, and by a majority vote thereon, the objection shall be sustained or rejected.
- 60.) No one shall leave the Association when in a business session without the consent of the Moderator.
- 61.) The Moderator shall stop all discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit, or when he thinks it is likely to lead to discord or division.
- 62.) All business coming before this Association shall be decided by secret ballot when there is any opposition or objection to open vote.

Amendments

63.) These By-Laws may be amended at any regular session by a two-thirds majority vote after the proposed amendment had laid on the table one day.
