PROCEEDINGS OF THE MISSOURI STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

When convened with the First Free Will Baptist Church, Berkeley, Missouri.

TUESDAY, JUNE 5, 1979, 7:30 P.M.

The sixty-sixth session of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists convened on Tuesday night, June 5, 1979, at 7:30 p.m. at the First Free Will Baptist Church, Berkeley, Missouri. The service was opened with the congregation singing "Victory in Jesus" led by Brother Jim Mullen. Rev. Roger Harwell led in prayer.

The session was called to order by the clerk, Rev. Bill Van Winkle. He read Colossians 1:18 to introduce the theme, "Christ Pre-eminent".

The welcome was given by the host pastor, Rev. Nick Hollis. The response was given by Rev. Lynn Wood. The congregation sang "Amazing Grace".

The clerk introduced the officers of the association and the moderator, Rev. Bill Evans, for the Moderator's Message. He used 1 Kings 1:21 as his text developing the thought "The King of Your Life".

An offering for the associational expenses was taken.

Item 2. M/S/C To grant the requests of the Retirement Village Committee.

Item 3. M/S/C To receive the Greater Springfield Association.

Item 4. M/S/C To send National Cooperative funds undesignated.

Item 5. M/S/C To allow the General Board to purchase a Retirement Village unit.

Item 6. M/S/C To recommend National Association meet bi-annually, and no angency meetings be allowed.

Item 7. M/S/C To recommend National Association reconsider two-term limit on standing board members.

The report of the Free Will Baptist Bible College was given by Rev. Ronald Creech. He encouraged our state to complete the Missouri Project.

Adjourned for the worship service.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 6, 1979, 11:00 A.M.

The service was opened by singing hymn "To God Be the Glory" led by Rev. David Huett. Rev. Dale Skiles took charge of the service. Brother Glenn Campbell led in prayer and an offering was received.

The special music was provided by Rev. and Mrs. Keith Tallent. They sang. "I'm So Glad" and "The Name of Jesus".

The speaker, Rev. Nathan Ruble, developed the subject "Christ Preeminent in our Love" using Matthew 22:37 as the text. The service was closed with prayer by Rev. Malcolm Eudaley.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 6, 1979, 1:30 P.M.

The session was opened with prayer in behalf of Sis. Kathy Bowman led by Rev. Dale Skiles. The congregation sang "Love Lifted Me" led by Rev. David Huett. Rev. Richard Robinson brought the devotion entitled, "The Rediscovery of the Word of God" using 2 Kings 22:13 as the text.

Motion/Seconded/Carried to receive the report of the National Executive Secretary, Rev. Rufus Coffey, as information and to give him a standing vote of thanks for his 12 years of service as Executive Secretary.

Motion/Seconded/Carried to receive the Lebanon Book Store Report by Rev. Edwin Bowden and to adopt the budget.

Motion/Seconded/Carried to receive the National Master's Mem Report by Bro. Don Elkins as information.

Motion/Seconded/Carried to receive the State Promotional Secretary's Report by Rev. Clarence Burton and adopt the budget.

Motion/Seconded/Carried that the Missouri State Association write-off the \$3,000.00 borrowed from the Promotional Department by the Youth Camp Board as well as the interest. (For: 34; Against: 17)

The report of the National Home Mission Board was given by Rev. Roy Thomas. The report of Hillsdale College was given by Rev. Bailey Thompson. Motion/Seconded/Carried that these reports be received as information.

Motion/Seconded/Carried to receive the State Home Mission Board's Report given by Rev. Lawrence Thompson and that the budget be adopted.

Motion/Seconded/Carried to receive the report of the Retirement Village Committee given by Bro. Don Ruble and Rev. Andy Lay and that the budget be adopted.

Motion/Seconded/Carried to receive the report of the State Sunday School and C. T. S. Board given by Rev. Kent Tallent and adopt their budget.

Motion/Seconded/Carried to receive the report of the State Christian Education Board given by Rev. Andy Lay and adopt their budget.

Motion/Seconded/Carried to receive the report of the State Youth Camp Board given by Rev. Lynn Wood and adopt their budget.

Motion/Seconded/Carried to receive the World Vision Report as given by Rev. Malcolm Eudaley as information.

Motion/Seconded/Carried to adjourn until 7:30 p.m.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 6, 1979, 7:30 P.M.

The service began by the congregation singing the hymn "He Keeps Me Singing" led by Bro. Jim Mullen. Rev. Clarence Burton took charge of the service. Rev. Mark Vandivort led in prayer. The congregation sang the chorus "Let's Just Praise the Lord". Rev. Burton gave a welcome and the chorus was sung again.

Rev. Lawrence Thompson made presentations to the South Fremont Church, Hannon Church, Olivet Church and Oak Hill Church for their generous Home Missions giving. Our Home Missionaries were then recognized.

The congregation sang "When We All Get to Heaven". The special music was presented by a trio consisting of Cary Walls, Linda Walls, and Marilyn Jones. They sang: "There Is Something Different" and "Surely the Presence of the Lord is in This Place".

The speaker Dr. Roger C. Reeds, was introduced. He preached a message entitled "The Must of Christ's Pre-eminence in Our Labor" using John 6:24-29 as a text.

THURSDAY, JUNE 7, 1979, 9:00 P.M.

The session was called to order by the moderator. The congregation sang the hymn "Are You Washed in the Blood" led by Rev. David Huett. Rev. Dana Booth brought a devotion entitled "The Pre-eminence of Christ" using Revelation 1:8-10. Rev. Wayne Wagner led in prayer.

Motion/Seconded/Carried that we adopt the report of the Obituary Committee. The moderator had the body to stand and called on Rev. James Barker to lead in a prayer of remembrance.

Motion/Seconded/Carried that the moderator appoint a committee to begin gathering historical data on our past and present leaders of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists.

Motion/Seconded/Carried to receive the report of the Resolutions Committee and to adopt it item by item.

Item 1. M/S/C The proposal concerning the Stewardship Commission.

Item 2. M/S/C That we recommend to the National Association to have a committee study the feasibility of a Stewardship Commission.

Motion/Seconded/Carried that we adopt the recommendation of the Placement Committee.

Motion/Seconded/Carried to receive the report of the National Foreign Mission Board given by Rev. Rolla Smith as information.

Motion/Seconded/Carried to receive the report of the National Retirement and Insurance Board given by Rev. Bill Evans as information.

The moderator announced that an offering of \$491.95 was received during the session.

Motion/Seconded/Carried to receive the State Woman's Auxiliary Report given by Sis. Shirley Bowden.

Motion/Seconded/Carried to receive the Nominating Committee Report and the floor was opened for other nominations.

Motion/Seconded/Carried that nominations cease and we proceed to elect by acclamation all but the three-year term on the Sunday School and C. T. S. Board. Nominees for the three-year term replacing Rev. Roger Harwell were Bro. Jack Keesling and Rev. Wesley Bigelow. Rev. Wesley Bigelow was elected.

The new moderator, Rev. Dale Skiles, took charge.

Motion/Seconded/Carried that the General Board take appropriate action to show our appreciation to Rev. Bill Evans for his years of service to the Missouri State Association as moderator.

The new moderator expressed his appreciation for our prayers and concern over the physical condition of his daughter and that we continue to remember her in our prayers.

We were dismissed in prayer by Rev. James Stovall.

THURSDAY, JUNE 7, 1979, 11:00 A.M.

The worship service opened with singing hymn "Sunlight" led by Rev. David Huett. Rev. Bill Evans was in charge of the service. Brother Bill Reeves led in prayer.

The Registration Report was given: 71 ministers, 81 delegates, and 145 visitors, making a total of 297 registering for the session.

Our new moderator presented Rev. Bill Evans a beautiful plaque showing our appreciation for his years of service to our State Association. Rev. Evans accepted and expressed his love for the state of Missouri.

The special music was presented by a trio from the Grace Church. They sang "Look Up Our Redemption Draweth Night".

Rev. Glenn Rehkop was introduced as the speaker. He preached a message on the subject "Christ Pre-eminent in our Look" using Titus 2:11-15 as the text.

The service was dismissed with prayer by Rev. Darrell Ellis.

GENERAL BOARD REPORT

The General Board met three times this past year on June 8, 1978, October 9, 1978, and June 4-5, 1979. The Executive Committee met twice this past year on January 8, 1979 in Lebanon, Missouri and June 4, 1979 in Berkeley, Missouri. The following business was transacted:

- 1. Brother N. R. Smith was elected to another three year term on the Auditing Committee.
- 2. The following men were elected to the Executive Committee; Rev. Jim McAllister, Rev. Lynn Wood, Rev. Cliff Bowman, and Rev. Kent Tallent.

3. Authorized a loan of \$4,500.00 to the Youth Camp Board.

4. Authorized the advancement of up to \$3,000.00 to the Retirement Village Committee for their work.

5. Gave our Promotional Secretary the authority to sign all docu-

ments necessary to purchase property for the retirement center.

- 6. Instructed the Executive Committee to look into the possibility of purchasing a unit from the Retirement Village for retiring Promotional Directors.
- 7. Instructed the treasurer to retain the 2% no longer sent to the National C. T. S. Department in the general treasury until the State Association meets.
 - 8. Elected Brother Max Courtney to the Youth Camp Board to fill a

vacancy.

9. Discussed Cooperative Giving and how it is disbursed on the national level and the need of the Executive Department to be funded more equally by every state.

10. Elected Brother Millard Sasser to fill the unexpired term of

Brother Courtney who resigned from the General Board.

11. Rev. John Turner was elected as the General Board member from the Southeast Association and Rev. Darrell Ellis was elected as General Board Member from the St. Louis District Association.

The following Recommendations are given:

- I. That we adopt the recommendations of the Auditing Committee: A. The Bookstore:
 - The Audit Committee be responsible to do the inventory for 1979-80.
 - 2. Encourage our churches to send money with their Sunday school order. If not, send money upon receiving invoice.
 - Ask churches to make monthly payments on Sunday school literature when they cannot send money with order. Some churches wait until ordering new literature to pay for literature of previous quarter.

4. The Executive Committee take proper steps to collect delinquent accounts to the Bookstore. Example: One sizeable account is approximately 2 years old and the Bookstore Manager has been unable to collect.

B. The Audit Committee has examined the books of all the Boards of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Eaptists and have found that they present fairly the financial position of each board as of March 31, 1979.

- C. We recommend the adoption of a budget of \$170,000.00 for the Associational year of 1979-80.
- II. We recommend that the request of the Retirement Village Committee be granted.
 - A. That we approve their Articles of Corporation, their By-laws, the Decree of Restrictions, the Purchase Agreement, and elect a board of six directors.
 - B. That the Nomination Committee be instructed year by year that the directors elected by the State Association not be unit
 - That we permit the Directors to serve on other boards until June. 1980.
- III. We recommend that the Greater Springfield Association of Free Will Baptists be accepted into membership of our State Association and their delegates be seated.
 - IV. We recommend that the State Association change our policy and send all National Cooperative funds undesignated on a trial basis for one year beginning January 1, 1980.
 - V. We recommend that the State Association allow the General Board to purchase one unit in the State Retirement Village for the following reasons:
 - 1. To show our confidence in the project.
 - 2. To provide an investment project for our state and keep it in our state denominational program.
 - To possibly but not necessarily be used as a retirement home for fulltime State Association workers
 (rules to be stipulated by the Executive Committee).
 - 4. To be resold if need arises either for state financial needs or for purpose of making another unit available.
 - Thus we will be assuring our people that we have confidence in our Retirement Village Project.
 - To finance the investment:
 - 1. The down payment will be available from the General Fund (\$5,000.00).
 - That 2% of the Coop gifts will go to make the payments. (This 2% was previously given to C. T. S. Department.)
 - When built, property can be rented (under the Retirement Village rules), and all rent money to go on the principle.
 - 4. That the 2% of the Coop money between January 1, 1979, and the time of purchase go on the down payment in addition to the \$5.000.00.
 - VI. We recommend that the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists recommend to the National Association of Free Will Baptists to have the National Association Meeting on a bi-annual basis, and there be no other agency meetings the alternate years.
- VII. We recommend that the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists recommend to the National Association of Free Will Baptists that they reconsider the limitation of two terms on a standing board and that the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists favors such a change.

CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE REPORT

We, the Credentials Committee, submit the following report:

1. We recommend the following district associations be received and their delegates be seated:

Cave Springs, St. Louis, Central Western, Indian Creek, Greater Kansas City, Laclede County, Niangua, Bootheel, Northeast, Northwest, St. Francois, Kission Association, Southeast, and Liberty.

2. We recommend to the General Board that the Promotional Secretary be directed to emphasize to all district associations the importance of submitting reports which are complete and in good order.

The ministry of Vacation Bible School has seen a dramatic increase of 32.4%. This year's sales indicate a similar increase for this summer. This actually cuts your shipping and handling charges in half while avoiding future service charges. Both your church and the bookstore benefit from this.

I would encourage you to purchase for your own use and for your church library these new Free Will Baptist publications: Why We Are Happily Married, compiled by Harold and June Critcher; Planting and Growing a Fundamental Church, by Roy Thomas; and Christian Education: An Introduction to Its Scope, edited by Douglas J. Simpson. We are also glad to be able to serve you with the complete catalog of CTS materials and literature now. We appreciate each of you that have taken advantage of this new service. You will be receiving a new catalog of Free Will Baptist publications and other supplies in the next few months. We will be looking for your order.

MISSOURI STATE YOUTH CAMP BOARD REPORT

During the year April, 1978 to March 31, 1979, the State Youth Camp has enjoyed many blessings from the Lord. To accomplish this God has chosen special workers from across the state of Missouri Free Will Baptists. Churches and individuals have prayed, worked, given, and shared in this unique ministry. Our spiritual hats are off to each of you for a unified effort in reaching, teaching, training, and encouraging our greatest commodity, the youth of our state.

Some of our accomplishments are physical and visible, while many are of a spiritual nature and result in the molding of young lives to conform to the will of ${\tt God}$.

The swimming pool, without and within, has undergone quite a remodeling. Many improvements have been made in the kitchen/dining hall. Some of these are the result of recommendations from the State Health Department; others for the upgrading of our facilities: Steam tables, for the serving of meals; better water heating for dishwashing; a giant attic fan to relieve much of the heat from the kitchen/dining hall area has been installed. The old water tower has been removed and replaced with a pressure tank system. Repairs are made on electric lines and water lines with regularity. All incandescent lights have been replaced with more modern lighting. A laundry room equipped with a commercial washer and dryer has been completed. Money was raised for this project through the efforts of Francis Bowman.

With the spiraling costs of food, utilities, and upkeep in general, it has become a must that the cost for each camper be raised to \$20.00 per week. This may seem like quite a lot, but it is much less than most camps and can only be done with supplemental gifts from our churches, individuals, and through the Cooperative Fund.

Again this year we will have our own teaching curriculum written by men in our own state. This seemed to be one of the highlights of nice comments from last year. We are deeply indebted to those who write the curriculum, as well as those who give their time in teaching our young people. We feel confident that God will reward every effort put forth in the work of youth counseling.

Again we would urge your church to place the State Youth Camp in your budget for a regular monthly gift to the support of this work. Designated gifts from you will help us to continually improve the Camp facilities and upgrade every area of this great work of God and of Missouri Free Will Baptists.

This year, camp sessions will be as follows: Elementary, Ages 7 through grade 5th grade, June 10-15 with Ken Dodson as evangelist. Junior High, Grades 6-8, June 17-22, with Jeff Turnbough as evangelist. High School, Grade 9 through 19 years, June 24-29 with Stanley Jones as evangelist.

PERSONAL GREETINGS TO THE MISSOURI STATE ASSOCIATION Meeting June 5-7, 1979

Dear Brethren:

Free Will Baptists are alive and well except for a few aches and pains that come with aging. We continue to trudge along steadily with typical family accord. Like most brothers and sisters we have some fusses. Nevertheless, tension subsides whenever we allow reason to prevail. Our oneness in Christ mixed with love in the Spirit is the cement that binds the church of the living God together.

The manner in which you are faithfully supporting the various ministries of our denomination exemplifies an earnest effort to advance God's work. You are to be commended for your stewardship and cooperation in a world-wide outreach. Your venture in cooperation demonstrates the advantage of churches combining their resources and energies into a mutual task of giving an international witness for Christ.

The central purpose of our joining forces in a denominational endeavor is that we can accomplish more by working together than working independently! Mutual cooperation is the foundation of our district, state and national work. It is the keystone that binds us together in a common mission for our Lord. Our common goal is to work together in a program of united action to extend our witness at home and abroad. We rejoice together that God's work is being advanced through 155 churches in your state working in conjunction with each other to accomplish the paramount task of world evangelism.

God's blessings continue to be evident on our national outreach. Hundreds of choice young people are committing their lives to Christ and receiving training in our educational institutions. The surging interest in Christian education is reflected by the increased number of Bible institutes and the growing number of Christian day schools. Growing churches are demanding larger, and better trained staff members to implement their outreach. A significant milestone was reached recently in Columbus, Ohio, when the Heritage Temple Church recorded an attendance of 2681 in Sunday school. Another 2268 was recorded in Sunday school at the First Church in Newport News, Virginia.

However, most of our churches reflect only a very slow growth rate. Apathy, anemic leadership, a weak thrust in evangelism and a dearth of spiritual power are some of the obstacles that hamper numerical growth. Please join me in prayer that God will send a spiritual awakening in order that we may be aroused from our spiritual slumber.

I call attention to several specific ministries of the Executive Office.

1. FINANCIAL SUPPORT. This office serves more than a quarter million Free Will Baptists in 40 states. Yet, its primary support comes from a few states that give cooperatively. We appeal to our pastors and laymen to correct this inequity by including us in regular monthly support during the coming year if your church is not giving through the Cooperative Plan. Send your gift to Free Will Baptist Executive Office, P. O. Box 1088, Nashville, TN 37202.

2. <u>CONTACT MAGAZINE</u>. This 32-page national publication continues to receive enthusiastic support across the denomination. Monthly contents are filled with inspirational articles, discussion of contemporary issues, family oriented articles and denominational news. The magazine is designed to complement the ministry of the local church, strengthen the spiritual life of the families and help develop the spiritual life of believers. Pick up sample copies at the display table or write Jack Williams, Editor, P. O. Box 1088, Nashville, TN 37202, to learn how you can obtain and promote subscriptions for this national publication in your church.

3. NATIONAL CONVENTION. Highlighting our denominational year is the convening of representatives from almost 2500 churches in the United States as well as nine foreign countries. This international assembly for which the Executive Office is directly responsible for planning and promoting provides opportunity for fellowhsip, inspiration and enlarged vision of world missions. Business sessions provide a forum for discussing contemporary issues and establishing policies designed to strengthen our fellowship. This is why every church ought to send its pastor and a lay delegate to the national body which meets July 15-19 in Charlotte, North Carolina. Details of the convention were published in the May issue of CONTACT.

4. RECORD KEEPING. Accurate records are very essential to evaluate our growth and preserve our history. Churches have been very negligent in keeping proper records. We appeal to our pastors and church clerks to keep accurate records and report the same to the district, state and national association.

REPORT TO THE MISSOURI STATE ASSOCIATION May 1, 1979

1978-79 school year at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College ranks among the finest we have ever experienced. Young men and young ladies have responded to the call of the ministry and the mission field. Many others have been active in the local church outreach and are developing a tremendous oncern to extend the Kingdom of God.

Academically our faculty has gained in experience and stature as teachers. And that experience is translated into learning for the students.

The library has added to its book collection the beginning of a microfiche collection that will double the resources available without having to expand a single bookshelf.

Student involvement in activities to promote the school have been the best that have ever been. Students have acted as hosts at the missions conference and the Bible conference. They have raised money by special projects. But even more they have begun to discern the excellency in Christianity and reach for it.

In January 1979, I submitted my resignation to the Board of Trustees to be effective August 1. The Board is concerned that a new President be named by July 1, and it is a matter of sincere prayer that the right man be found.

It has been a good eight years. We have built buildings, expanded staff, and watched our student body more than double. It has been gratifying to hear both parents and pastors tell of the progress made in the lives of the young people.

There is still much to be done. More buildings to be built. More programs to be developed. And more high school seniors who need to be challenged with the possibility of a Hillsdale education. If we as Free Will Baptists are to ever accomplish anything for God, we must develop our young people into the image of Christ and help them to develop their potential to extend the Kingdom.

Last fall 183 students enrolled at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. Another 15 joined them in January for a total enrollment of 198. There were 31 students from Missouri:

YOU, YOUR CHURCH, AND YOUR STATE made possible another record year in world outreach through the Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions Department. Total receipts for 1978 came to \$1,633,920.82. Praise God for this accomplishment. Amid an uncertain world economy the Lord's unusual blessings and gracious provisions were again realized. TO HIM BE ALL THE HONOR AND GLORY!

ALONG WITH General Director Rolla Smith, Director of Communications Don Robirds, Director of Finance Harold Critcher and the rest of our office staff, I want, once again to say "thank you" for standing with us as we have labored to reach more of the world's population with the truth of God's redemptive plan through Jesus Christ our Lord.

RESPONSE FROM CHURCHES during my personal itinerary was gratifying indeed. Monthly faith promises from 37 churches totaled \$14,325.75. Of this amount \$3,853.24 was new support. In addition to this \$17,122.12 in cash was received from the services. The missionaries' deputational ministry also saw record responses from across the depomination.

They are: Patti Hiltibidal - Illinois (Brazil), Valarie Riley - Arkansas (Brazil), Gary Silence - North Carolina (Brazil), Pam Wilson - California (Ivory Coast), Sandra England - Ohio (Ivory Coast), Tommy and Deborah Allen - Oklahoma (Panama), James Hanniford - Arizona (France), Joseph Govreau - Missouri (France). THREE APPOINTEES will graduate from Missionary Internship in May of this year. Tom and Patti McCullough along with Elaine Allen will soon begin their deputational ministry.

Tom and Patti will need at least \$1,500.00 per month for their Total Ministry Cost and \$25,000.00 in accumulated cash before being approved for departure. Miss Allen will require a minimum of \$1,000.00 per month and \$15,000.00 in cash. They covet your prayers and support.

MORE CHURCHES are needed to stand with us in carrying out God's mandate for all of usto preach the gospel to, "All the World" and "To every Creature."

ADDITIONAL INCOME IS NEEDED IF we are to continue our witness to the ends of the earth. PASTOR, DO YOU HAVE FOREIGN MISSIONS IN YOUR CHURCH BUDGET? Even if your church gives through the faith promise offerings, why not also lead your church to allocate monthly through the church budget? This budgeted amount allows each giving church member to share in world outreach. (Some do not give through faith promise.)

FINALLY--I want to share several brief excerpts from L. E. Maxwell's book, "World Missions--Total War."

"World Missions under Christ's captaincy means war, total mobilization for total conflict--armed with complete steel.

Missionary zeal is slacking off in many of our evangelical churches. It might be expected that missionary interest would be minimal among the liberals as a natural consequence of their false theology. But when fundamental folk fail to fulfil the Great Commission, we must needs ferret out the cause thereof. Such a blight does not just happen any more than the curse causless does not come. In the scriptures must be found the cause and the cure.

The whole Bible, read aright, is a missionary book. Bible teaching, expounded aright, begets missionary going and missionary giving. The Gospel message, proclaimed aright, produces missionary outreach 'among all nations.'

Oh, fellow-ministers, and missionaries, and church elders, and Sunday school teachers, Hearken! Let our teaching and preaching be crammed with Scripture expositions setting forth God's ultimate purpose to reach the regions beyond. Then, having laid well those foundations in fresh 'opening of our understanding to understand the Scriptures,' let those expositions be supplemented and illustrated with fresh facts and figures from foreign fields."

Name

1.) This Association shall be called the Missouri State Association for Free Will Baptists.

Purpose

- 2.) The Object of this Association shall be the bringing together of the Free Will Baptists of the State of Missouri in one annual gathering that we may become better acquainted with one another, the upholding of the Free Will Baptists Churches of Missouri, and a world wide outreach of souls.

 Membership
- 3.) The Association shall be composed of the members of the various local affiliated Associations.
- 4.) Any organized Quarterly Meeting, Yearly Meeting, or Ass. of Free Will Baptists, may unite with this body at any regular session, through a letter or delegates by a two-thirds vote of all delegates present.
- 5.) The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, and Assistant Clerk, who shall be elected annually at the close of each session and hold their office until their successors are elected and qualified.
- 6.) The officers of this body shall submit, at every session, a report of the work done for this Association.
- 7.) The moderator shall be the principal executive officer of the Association and he shall sign, with the Clerk or any other people officer or agent of the Association thereunto authorized by the General Board, any deeds, mortgages, bonds, contracts, or other instruments which the General Board has authorized to be executed, except in cases where the signing and execution thereof shall be expressly delegated by the General Board or by these by laws to some other officer or agent of the Association, or shall be required by law to be otherwise signed or executed. The duties of the moderator shall include presiding at the meetings of the State Association, the General Board, and the Executive Committee; to call special meetings of the General Board or Executive Committee when the conditions of by-law 43 are fulfilled; to appoint such committees as are created without provision for their selection; to set the time and place for the meetings of the General Board and Executive Committee; and in general, to fulfill whatever responsibilities may be commensurate with his office or delegated to him by the body or General Board.
- 8.) In the absence of the Moderator, or in the event of his death, inability, or refusal to act, the Assistant Moderator shall perform the duties of the Moderator, and when so acting, shall have all the powers of and be subject to all the restrictions upon the Moderator. The Assistant Moderator shall perform such duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the Moderator or by the General Board.

9.) The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of all business transactions; shall superintend the printing of the Minutes and shall receive an honorarium of an amount agreed upon by this body.

10.) The Clerk shall: (a) keep the Minutes of the Association and of the General Board meetings in one or more books provided for the purpose; (b) see that all notices are given in accordance with the provisions of these By-Laws or as required by law; (c) be custodian of the Association records and of the seal of the Association and see that the seal of the Association is affixed to all documents the execution of which on behalf of the Association under its seal is duly authorized; (d) in general, perform all duties incident to the office of Clerk and such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the Moderator or by the General Board; and (e) in the absence of the Clerk, or in the event of his death, inability, or refusal to act, the Assistant Clerk shall perform the duties of the Clerk and, when so acting, shall have all the power of and be subject to all the restrictions upon the Clerk. The Assistant Clerk shall perform such duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the Clerk or by the General Board.

11.) No officer shall serve the same office more than three consecutive years.

Boards

- 12.) All standing boards shall be composed of five (5) members, exclusive of the General Board. Standing Boards include the Board of Christian Education, the Home Mission Board, the Sunday School and Church Training Service Board, the Youth Camp Board and the General Board.
- 13.) The duties of the various standing boards shall be to plan a program and supervise its operation in their respective fields, and to receive, hold, manage, use or convey and funds and property entrusted to said Boards.

 Election
- 14) The personnel of each of the foregoing, exclusive of the General Board, shall be elected as follows. The first named for a term of one year, the second for a term of two years, and third for a term of three years, the fourth for a term of four years, and the fifth for a term of five years, and thereafter each shall be elected for a term of five years.
- 15) The personnel of the General Board shall be composed of the officers of the State Association; the chairmen of all standing boards and one member from each affiliated Association to be elected by the State Body whose term of office shall be two years and so constituted that the expiration date of the term of office of half of these shall expire one year and the other half the following year. This shall be determined by alphabetical order of the name of the affiliated Association.

16.) No person shall fill more than one office at the same time except as he may become a member of the General Board by virtue of being Chairman of the Board of which he is an elected member.

17.) Any vacancy occurring in the General Board may be filled by the affirmative vote of a majority of the remaining Board members though less than a quorum of the General Board, unless otherwise provided by law.

18.) All Board members elected to fill a vacancy shall be elected for the un-

expired term of his predecessor in office.

19.) Any member of the standing board of the State Association who does not put forth any interest in or function on said board for the period of one year, shall have his office declared vacant and a new member be elected by this Association to fill his unexpired term of office.

Duties

- 20.) The General Board shall have power to act in behalf of, and for the State Association from one regular session to another, and shall have power to elect such officers as may be necessary to cary out the plans and undertakings of the State Association. The General Board shall have the right to employ a Promotional Secretary who shall serve as Treasurer of the Association and be responsible for handling all monies of the Association except in cases where this responsibility shall be expressly delegated by the General Board or by these by laws to some other officer, agent or Board of the Association. He shall make an annual financial report to the Association.
- 21.) The General Board shall have power to fill any irregular vacancies that may occur in its own body and shall also have power to fill any irregular vacancies that may occur in any department of work between sessions of the State Association. It shall be the duty of this Board to make written reports of all its work to each session.
- 22.) An Executive Committee, consisting of seven members of the General Board, shall be composed of the Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk of the State Association, and four other members to be elected annually by the General Board, whose duty it shall be to act on all matters coming within the scope of the work of the Board when said Board is not in session. It shall also plan and execute the program for the annual sessions of the Missouri State Association. The Executive Committee shall be the governing Board of the Lebanon Bible and Bookstore and shall establish policy for the operation of the store. The Executive Committee shall have the power to employ and supervise the work of the Bookstore manager. The Bookstore manager shall employ and supervise the other store employees.

23.) A majority of the number of the General board members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the General Board, but if less than such majority is present at a meeting, a majority of the Board members present may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice.

24.) An act of the majority of the Board members present at a meeting at which a quorum is present, shall be an act of the General Board.

25.) A Board member of the Association who is present at a meeting of the General Board at which action on any Association matter is taken shall be presumed to have assented to the action taken unless his dissent shall be entered in the Minutes of the meeting.

26.) The General Board may authorize any officer of officers, Agent or Agents to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of and on behalf of the Association, and such authority may be general or confined

to specific instances.

27.) Any person or agent elected or appointed by the General Board may be removed by the General Board whenever in its judgement the best interests of the Association would be served thereby, but such removal shall be without prejudice to the contract rights, if any, of the persons so removed.

28.) By resolution of the General Board the Board members may be paid their expenses, if any, of attendance of each meeting of the General Board. No such payment shall preclude any Board member from serving the Association in any

other capacity and receiving compensation therefore.

29.) The General Board shall provide an Association seal which shall be circular in form and shall have inscribed thereon the name of the corporation and the state of incorporation and the words, "Corporate Seal." Committees

- 30.) The Moderator shall appoint a committee on committees consisting of five members who shall appoint all committees with the exclusion of the Auditing Committee who shall be appointed by the General Board. The first appointed shall serve a term of one year, the second, a term of two years and the third, a term of three years; thereafter, each shall be appointed for a term of three years. Members of standing boards, with exception of General Board, are not eligible to serve on the Auditing Committee. Their duties are to audit all state books and serve as Budget Committee.
- 31.) All resolutions and reports shall bear the name of all the members of the committee who favor them, and if the names be not a majority of all members of such committee, than the clerk shall not read the resolutions or report. Representation
- 32.) The standing delegates of this Association shall be all ordained Free Will Baptist ministers and their companions, all ordained deacons, and Associational Clerks, provided they are members in good standing in some Free Will Baptist Church belonging to this State Association.
- 33.) The number of elected delegates to the State Association shall be seven delegates from each affiliated local association or yearly meeting; one delegate from each church, plus one delegate for each fifty members or larger fraction thereof Each church which represents must be a member of a local association or yearly meeting holding membership in this body.

34.) This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other

religious bodies. Votina

- 35.) Those entitled to vote at any annual or special meeting of this State Association, shall be the elected delegates and the standing delegates as defined in By-Law 32 and 33, and each elected delegate or standing delegate shall be entitled to one vote.
- 36.) A majority vote shall be final upon all subjects except to amend the By-Laws receive Quarterly Meetings or Associations, and the changing of the members of the committees appointed by the Moderator, then it shall require a

two-thirds majority.

Meetings

37.) The sessions of the Association shall convene on Tuesday evening at

7:30 P.M. following the first Sunday in June each year.

38.) The membership of the State Association may designate any place, either within or without the State of Missouri for any annual meeting. Any special meeting may be called by the General Board. A waiver of notice signed by all members entitled to vote at a meeting may designate any place, either within or without the State of Missouri, unless otherwise prescribed by statue, as the place for the holding of such meeting. If no designation is made, or if a special meeting be otherwise called, the place of the meeting shall be the principal office of the corporation in the State of Missouri.

39.) In the event the necessity arises from war, or pestilence, or any cause which prevents a regular meeting of the State Association, whether such a condition is of a local or general condition, then the General Board shall be privileged to call and act with full authority in all matters pertaining to the general welfare of the State Association, providing whatever transaction passed shall be by two thirds vote of the members present, and providing that such transactions shall not conflict with the purpose and edicts of the By Laws of the State Association.

40.) Special meetings of the Association, for any purpose or purposes, unless otherwise prescribed by statue, may be called by the General Board, and shall be called by the Moderator at the request of not less than fifty percent of all the delegate members duly elected by local Associations. Ouarterly Meeting, and local

churches affiliated with the Association

41.) All committees and standing boards shall be permitted to take official votes on any item of business within the scope of their work by mail or by telephone conference call, provided such action is called by a chairman of a board or committee and has been proposed by at least 2 members of the board or committee.

42.) Seven or more ordained ministers or deacons from two or more affiliated associations belonging to the State Association, shall constitute a quorum to trans-

act business.

43.) All business meetings shall be opened by singing, reading a portion from

God's Word, and prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.

44.) Special meetings of the General Board or the Executive Committee shall be called when necessary by the Moderator, with the written consent of three other members of the Executive Committee. Special meetings of the General Board shall also be called upon the written request of one-fourth of its members. Special meetings of the Executive Committee shall also be called upon the written request of a majority of its members.

45.) Notice of any special meeting shall be given at least fifteen days previously thereto by written notice delivered personally or mailed to each Board member at his business address, or by telegram. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States mail so addressed, with postage thereon prepaid. If notice be given by telegram, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when the telegram is delivered to the telegraph company. Any Board member may waive notice of any meeting. The attendance of a Board member at a meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except where a Board member attends a meeting for the express purpose of objecting to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened.

46.) Unless otherwise provided by law, whenever any notice is required to be given to any member of Board member of the Association under the provisions of these By-Laws or under the provisions of the articles of incorporation, a waiver thereof in writing, signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice whether before or after writing, signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice whether before or after the time stated therein, shall be deemed equivalent to the

giving of such notice.

Discipline

47.) The State Association shall not usurp any authority over the Quarterly Meetings or Associations that shall be under its supervision, but shall be an advisory body to help them.

Fiscal Policy

48.) The fiscal year of the Association shall begin on the first day of April and end on the thirty-first day of March in each year.

- 49.) All checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money notes or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the Association, shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents of the Association and in such manner as shall from time to time be determined by resolution of the General Board.
- 50.) No loans shall be contracted on behalf of the Association and no evidences of indebtedness shall be issued in its name unless authorized by a resolution.

51.) The General Board by a majority vote of the voting delegates of the State Association, shall be authorized to create or to increase any bonded indebtedness of

the Association.

52.) The General Board of the Association shall be authorized by a majority vote of the voting delegates of the State Association, to sell, lease, exchange, mortgage, pledge, or otherwise dispose of all, or substantially all, of the property and the assets of the Association.

53.) All funds of the corporation not otherwise employed shall be deposited from time to time to the credit of the Association in such banks, trust companies,

or other depositories as the General Board may select.

54.) The salaries of employees shall be fixed from time to time by the General Board.

Standing Rules

55.) The meetings of the State Association and General Board shall be governed by the rules of parlimentary law as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order, except in the case of those rules which are superseded by some rule of this organization.

56.) The Clerk or Assistant Clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in age shall call the Association to order for business, and call the Moderator or Assistant Moderator to the chair, and if neither Moderator or Assistant Moderator is present, then the senior minister in age shall act as Chairman to open the floor for nominations and carry out the election of a Moderator Pro-Tem.

57.) All business, except routine, shall be brought before the body by committee, but shall any committee refuse or fail to present to this body the business given it by any delegate of this Association, then such business may be presented to the body by any delegate, but cannot be discussed unless by a majority vote of this

body.

58.) Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and say "Brother Moderator" but shall speak no further until he or she is recognized by the Moderator.

59.) No one shall speak more than five minutes, or more than twice, on the

same subject without the consent of the Moderator.

- 60.) Any delegate of this body can appeal from the decision of the Moderator of the Association, and by a majority vote thereon, the objection shall be sustained or rejected.
- 61.) No one shall leave the Association when in a business session without the consent of the Moderator.
- 62.) The Moderator shall stop all discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit, or when he thinks it is likely to lead to discord or division.
- 63.) All business coming before this Association shall be decided by secret ballot when there is any opposition or objection to open vote.

Amendments

64.) These By-Laws may be amended at any regular session by a two-thirds majority vote after the proposed amendment had laid on the table one day.
