

PROCEEDINGS OF THE MISSOURI STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

When convened at the First Free Will Baptist Church, Farmington, Missouri.

Tuesday Evening, May 28, 1985

The evening service was prefaced with special music by the Harvesters Quartet from Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. The service begin with congregation singing "My Saviour's Love" led by David Bates. Brother Jim McAllister led in prayer. A report was given by Howard Gwartney regarding Roll Call Sunday. David Bates sang "He is My Saviour and Coming King" and "We are Standing on Holy Ground." Dr. Robert Picirilli gave a brief report on Free Will Baptist Bible College, and then brought the evening message on the subject of Church Growth. His text was from Matthew 16:18; Acts 2:47; Ephesians 5:23-25; and I Corinth ians. The service was dismissed by prayer.

Wednesday Evening, May 29, 1985

The Seventy-second Session of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists convened on Wednesday evening, May 29, 1985, at 7:30 p.m., at the First Free Will Baptist Church, Farmington, Missouri. John Smith opened the service with congregational singing. Rev. Clarence Burton led in prayer, and the clerk, Joe Braddy, officially declared the Missouri State Association in session for 1985. He then introduced the guests on the platform.

Rev. Wayne Phillips, pastor of the Fellowship Free Will Baptist Church, Flat River, Missouri, gave a very warm welcome to the congregation. Rev. Jerry Fields, pastor of the Berkerly Church, gave the response.

The Moderator, Rev. Millard Sasser, made a few brief remarks and then Brother John Smith led the congregation in more singing. Following the evening offering the Farmington Men's Choral sang, then the Farmington Ladies Trio sang. Marilyn Bates accompanied them on the piano. Rev. Gary Fry preached the evening message on the subject of "The Church--Its Mission-To Edify."

Brother Sasser made announcements and read the Committee on Committees's report. Dismissed in prayer.

Thursday Morning, May 30, 1985

The Thursday morning session began with the congregation singing "He Brought Me Out." Prayer was given, and Dave Pinkston, pastor of the Parkview Church, gave a devotion from Ps. 126:5, 6.

The Moderator called the business session to order and asked for the Credential Committee's report. MSC to receive the report and seat the delegates.

The Moderator gave a message from I John 3:16. He then recognized the visitors and welcomed them to this 1985 session.

The afternoon session opened with the congregation singing "When We All Get to Heaven," directed by Rev. John Gibbs. A devotion was given from Acts 9:10-18 by Rev. James Crawford, pastor of the Liberty Free Will Baptist Church, Lebanon, MO. The Moderator continued with the business at hand.

- 8. Rev. Richard Gallent gave a report from Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College.
- 9. Rev. Howard Gwartney gave a report from the Sunday School/C.T.S. Board. MSC to receive this report.
- 10. Brother Jim Vallance was on hand to give a report from the National Master's Men Office.
- 11. The Youth Camp Board Report was given by the chairman, Rev. Dale Skiles. MSC to receive this report.
- 12. Brother Burton gave a report from the Retirement Village Board. MSC to receive the report and adopt the Board's proposal by admendment as follows:

delete the words "contingent upon the sale of present property being operated."

A motion was made and seconded to adjourn until Friday morning at 9:00. Motion carried. Dismissed in prayer by Earl Ames.

Friday Morning, May 31, 1985

This session began with the congregation singing "Victory in Jesus" led by Curt Gwartney. Prayer by Don MacDonald, missionary appointee to Japan. A devotion was given by Steve Reeves, Missionary appointee to Spain, from II Kings 7:9. The Moderator continued the business as follows:

- 3. A report from the Woman's Auxiliary was given by Shirley Bowden. MSC to receive this report and to commend the State Woman's Auxiliary for a job well done.
- 4. MSC to show the historical films of the State work at the State Meeting in the future.
- 5. The Resolution Committee's report was read. MSC to receive the report and adopt it item by item.
 - A. MSC to adopt Item #1 by admendment. Admended by leaving out the Scripture reference.
 - B. MSC to separate Item #2 into two different resolutions.
 - C. MSC to adopt Item #3 (formerly 2-a). A standing vote of thanks was given to the Farmington Church.

"Whereas the Planning Committee has provided a 10-year expansion and improvement program for Missouri Free Will Baptists, and Whereas this program needs to be watched over and added to as time goes by in order to attain these goals, it is suggested that this committee continue for the duration of the 10-year program and the committee be appointed annually by the General Board at the fall meeting of the General Board."

- 14. MSC to adjourn this State Association Meeting. Dismissed in prayer by Rev. Jim McAllister.

REPORT OF THE GENERAL BOARD

The General Board of the Missouri State Association recommends the following items to be received and adopted:

- Item 1. We recommend that the date of the Association revert back to the 1982 time (Tuesday evening at 7:30 following the first Sunday in June;) and that the Youth Camp sessions be divided into two weeks in June and two weeks in August; and that the first two weeks of camp be given to the teens. (See business on Page 9, Item #2.)
- Item 2. We recommend that we adopt the budget of \$248,000.00 for the 1986 calendar year.
 - Item 3. We recommend that the Study Committee's Report be adopted.
 - Item 4. We recommend that we adopt the Retirement Study Committee's Report.
 - Item 5. We recommend that the Wednesday evening offering be designated to State Home Missions for new work in the St. Louis area.
 - Item 6. Whereas the Minister's Retirement Program here in Missouri is functioning as expected, and whereas the present balance in the Retirement Fund would provide a \$10.00 per month increase to each eligible participant, we recommend that this action be approved.
 - Item 7. We recommend that the proposal from the Home Missions Board concerning church property assurance be received and recommended to the local churches; and further recommend that the General Board's name be on the local church's Warranty Deed if that church so desires. (See Item 7 of the Thursday morning's business.)

- Item 8. We recommend that the Missouri State Association approve the present policy of the State Home Missions Board to have their name on the deeds of Home Mission properties.
- Item 9. In reference to the Overseas Secretary's Report for Foreign Missions, we recommend that the State Association set a goal of \$100,000.00 to be raised in the State over the next three years for the Advanced Overseas Development Program of the National Foreign Missions Department.
- Item 10. We recommend that the executive officers of the State Association select a state chairman for the Advanced Overseas Development Program of the National Foreign Missions Department.
- Item 11. We recommend that the Retirement Village Board's report and recommendation be adopted (See report on following pages.)
- Item 12. We recommend that the Insurance Committee be retained to further pursue an acceptable cancer and health insurance plan for the State.

CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE REPORT

We recommend that the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptist meet at the Nelson Community Center in Lebanon, Missouri, in 1986.

RETIREMENT VILLAGE BOARD REPORT

Inasmuch as we feel that we will not be able to develop the present retirement village for at least three years, we have searched for alternatives that would be more positive and profitable.

We have located property on North Highway 5, Lebanon, that has a licensed boarding home that is operative. (A boarding home is similar to a nursing home with the difference being the patients must be ambulatory in a boarding home). The property consists of 55 acres (five acres less than the present property) and this property is only about ten minutes from Lebanon. The boarding home accomodates 30 beds and is presently full. This property can be purchased for \$75,000.00; \$15,000.00 down, and the balance be paid over a 15-year period.

This is our proposal and plan:

- 1. Purchase the above property. Use the income from the boarding home to make the payments on the property. (Based on the anticipated income and the anticipated operation cost, we believe that this can be done.)
- 2. See the present property (60 acres).
- 3. Develop the proposed property on North Highway 5 as soon as funds are available.
- 4. Designate property on Highway 5 frontage for new state headquarters building.

Benefits:

- 1. The proposed retirement village is presently operative and offers a way by which we can develop a Retirement Village Program for our people.
- 2. The proposed location is more accommodating than the present location of property. (No roads or streets to build before it becomes functional; still close to the

local hospital and shopping centers.)

- 3. The amount of traffic on Highway 5 would insure good improved highway.
- 4. Since the traffic flow will be large, it will be an ideal location for exposure for the State Office and a satelite bookstore.

RETIREMENT PROGRAM STUDY COMMITTEE'S REPORT

The Study Committee for the Minister and full-time Christian worker's retirement program has looked into the present retirement program and other possible alternatives and offers the following recommendations:

- 1. Recommend that the Missouri State Association stay with the Board of Retirement and Insurance Department for the present time.
- 2. Recommend that the Missouri State Association recommend to the General Board of the National Association that the members of the National Board of Retirement and Insurance be participants in the National Retirement Program.
- 3. Recommend the Missouri State Association purchase and go on a computer system when feasible. This would be handled through the Executive Committee.

ROUGH DRAFT FOR CHURCH PROPERTY ASSURANCE

Both the National and Missouri Associations of Free Will Baptists have historically and traditionally believed in and practiced the autonomy of the local churches, and the use of any lands, and permanent improvements thereon that might be owned by the local churches. To continue the preservation of autonomy of ownership of local church lands, and any permanent improvements situated thereon; BE IT RESOLVED, that title to any such lands and permanent improvements thereon be taken in the names of the local church, together with the (a) Missouri State Home Missions Board, (b) the Executive Committee of the Missouri State Association or (c) the General Board of the Missouri State Association, or Local Association. Each local church shall have the choice of which of the three organizations aforementioned shall appear upon the deed, or other documents of title, together with the name of the local church.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the name of any one of the three organizations aforementioned shall appear upon the document(s) of title for the sole purpose of insuring that no dissident group, be it a majority or minority of the congregation, and either within or without the local church, shall take charge of, dispose of, occupy, use, or in any manner interfere with the use of the land and permanent improvements thereon for purposes other than a Free Will Baptist Church duly recognized by the Missouri State Association Free Will Baptists as such. Therefore, none of the three organizations aforementioned shall be considered to have any vested interest in the premises, other than to assure continued use thereof for Free Will Baptist Churches.

(suggested language for deed)

(one of the above) has no vested interest in the premises hereinabove conveyed, other than to assure the continued use thereof for a Free Will Baptist Church duly recognized as such by the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists. This provision shall automatically be null and void upon the subsequent voluntary conveyance of the aforementioned premises by the duly authorized officials of both grantees hereinabove named.

We, the Executive Committee for the Missouri State Woman's Auxiliary Convention of the Free Will Baptists, make the following recommendations for your consideration:


- We recommend that we have two Foreign Missions projects.

Report of the Executive Secretary

The Lord continues to do great things for our State Association for which we are glad. The reports this year will reflect that souls are being saved in the regular Sunday services, Evangelistic Endeavors and through our State Ministries.

The Lord has blessed and we reached our cooperative goal for 1984. The budget-goal was \$180,000.00 (This was a 9-month year. This year, 1985, the State Association goes on a calender year.) The total cooperative receipts for the 9-months was \$180,584.45! I must say, "Thank God for faithful pastors, and churches." Of course this is not the total giving. Designated giving compliments the tithe. When we pause and reflect how the Lord has blessed, with an increase from year to year, it causes the heart to fill with love and adoration.

The Executive Department, in cooperation with the Home Missions Board, sponsored the All-Boards=Missions Emphasis Meeting. This was blessed and used of God. 

Greetings: To our many friends and supporters of Missouri State

Home Missions. You are to be commended for your faithful support of this

Great Commission to go into all the world and preach the Gospel. Because

of your prayers and financial and moral support, we are able to share

with joy this report for 1984-1985.

We are happy to report the construction during 1984 of a new facility at Carthage which now provides good accomodations for a growing congregation led by Pastor Jim Williams. They also have a preschool five days a week.

Also, we report with joy the success of the Rolla church in assuming full financial responsibility which was one of their goals for 1984; and they were able to do it ahead of their proposed schedule. Bro. Bale Cochran and the Rolla congregation are to be commended for this enormous step of faith.

We also have another victory report. Just last night the Mission Board met with Pastor Gene Terry and the Seymour congregation for the purpose of organizing this work. This group of people under the capable leadership of Bro. Gene Terry obtained finance to repay the Board for the loan from the Perpetual Loan Fund and assumed all financial responsibility and leadership of this work. Praise the Lord! This has been a victorious year in the lives of these works.

The Moberly work is struggling with their proposed goal to become self-supporting. They have witnessed a number of souls saved this past year, and attendance has increased over the previous year. We covet your most earnest prayers that this congregation will support their pastor, Bro. Steve Hale, in his endeavor to establish this church and lead them

into self support.

The work at Branson, Missouri, and the state of Missouri suffered a tremendous loss by the death of Pastor Bobby Francis. We extend our deepest sympathy to his dear wife, children, and congregation; and we commend them for their stedfastness and courage as they went through this great trial. They came through as gold tried in the fire. This congregation reflected a togetherness and love for the Lord and one another that actually resulted in an increase in attendance during this time. We are now in the process of securing a new pastor for this work. The building, which has been under construction, will most likely be completed during this year, 1985. We covet your faithful prayers on this behalf.

Plans to establish a new work in the Wentzville area as a joint project with the St. Louis District Association, the Missouri State and the National Home Missions Boards, is progressing rapidly at this point. A man has been interviewed and is scheduled to meet with several families and district pastors to further formulate plans to get this project underway. AUDITING COMMITTEE'S REPORT



Cooperative Channel



NATIONAL FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT MISSOURI STATE ASSOCIATION MAY 28-31, 1985

On this Fiftieth Anniversary of our department we praise the Lor for more than 127 organized churches, congregations and preaching points around the world. These groups are being led by 34 ordained national pastors, 10 licensed preachers, and 48 lay-preachers. Last year our churches on the mission fields witnessed more than 900 conversions, 255 baptisms, and averaged 4,869 in attendance.

Here are some news briefs.

STEYE AND JUDY LYTLE (Betania, Panama) reported 76 professions of faith and 24 baptisms in 1984 and averaged 63 in preaching services. On May 18 they organized the church. . .

KEN_AND_JUDY_BAILEY (Tokyo, Japan) are progressing in their study of the very difficult Japanese language. Ken is leading a Bible study at the Iriso church . . .

CHAROLETTE TALLENT (Lorient, France) is having a successful out-reach to children and adults . . .

STAN_AND_BRENDA_BUNCH (Edinburg, Texas) are progressing nicely in language school. They hope to go on to Panama early in 1986.

JIM_AND_OLENA_MCLAIN (Sapporo, Japan) report four baptisms and several seekers during 1984. One young man in their congregation feels the Lord is calling him to full-time service...

<u>DAYE_AND_SHARON_FILKINS</u> (Moore, Oklahoma) are anticipating leaving for service in the Ivory Coast this summer. They are available for a few more missionary services . . .

JERRY AND CAROL PINKERTON (Tanda, Ivory Coast) are on furlough until September. Jerry serves as field chairman in this strategic West African country. Contact them if you'd like a service. . .

<u>DONNIE_AND_RUTH_(POSTLEWAITE)_MCDONALD</u> (Nashville, Tennessee) are currently sharing their burden for Japan with congregations in your state. If you would like a service call (615/361-1010). . .

CARLISLE_AND_MARIE_HANNA (Sonapurhat, India) have just arrived home for a three month furlough. They report a record attendance of more than 500 people for their annual conference in March...

STEYE_AND_LINDA_REEYES (Neosho, Mo.) have just been appointed to serve in Spain. Contact them at (417/451-7940). . .

Through our regionalized support plan, we are trying to get your Missouri missionaries underwritten by your state. In the case of a married couple, in which only one partner is from Missouri, our goal is to get 50% of that family's support from your state. The following list shows the percentage of each missionary's support which came from Missouri during 1984.

In addition you supported the Mileys (13%), the Coscias (16%) and the Turnboughs (21%).

Please consider the support needs of these missionaries whose accounts are in the red: the Lytles - \$3208, the Baileys - \$989, and the Lynn Mileys - \$2383. The following missionaries need additional monthly support: the Baileys - \$1000 per month, the Lytles - \$600 per month, the Filkins - about \$1,000 per month, the McDonalds - \$2200 per month and the Reeves - about \$3,000 per month. Would you prayerfully consider adopting one of these missionary families as your partners overseas?

Thank you for sending \$19,133 last year for the general fund. Of this amount \$11,320 came through the cooperative plan. Through your gifts to the general fund you are helping every missionary. We regret that as of April 1 our general fund was \$29,643 in the red. We must have additional support for the operational fund or cut back sharply on services rendered missionaries and churches. If your church is not supporting the general fund, would you consider adding at least 10% to your present missionary gifts to help with these expenses?

Last year you gave \$143,423 toward your suggested foreign missions quota of \$175,000. Your goal for 1985 is \$187,000. Thank you for all of your support.

This year, your foreign missions department is celebrating our Golden Anniversary with a nationwide emphasis on Advance. Jimmy Aldridge, newly appointed Overseas Secretary, is coordinating this celebration. He will be counting on you to join us in praising God for 50 years of blessings.

The members of our staff: Rev. Rolla Smith, General Director; Rev. Don Robirds, Director of Communications; Rev. Jimmy Aldridge, Overseas Secretary; Earl Larson, Treasurer-Administrative Assistant; and I appreciate your prayers and financial support. If we can help your church to make His last command your first concern please call us.

Dear Brethren:

It is a privilege to share this report with the Missouri State Association. I send greetings from our Department through this letter, assuring you of my prayers for your Association today.

In 1984 we had six chapters in Missouri. I look forward to having more of your churches begin Master's Men chapters. This year the method of chartering and renewing has changed. Now, when a group joins our organization, that month will be the date for paying dues in continuing years.

1984 saw Master's Men make significant strides in the work of Free Will Baptists. The theme, "Sharing the Load," signaled a call to action. Men across the country rallied behind Brazil Project by giving over \$8,500 through this Department. And Project Tool Shed funds provided a memory typewriter for missionary use in Ivory Coast, Africa. Individual chapters raised thousands of dollars for local, state and national endeavors.

The financial picture of Master's Men Department was enhanced last year through the blessing of Co-operative gifts. Undesignated and designated giving totaled \$31,376.81. I believe every local church should adopt this method of financing the National Association ministries. Your people gave \$6,544.70. Thank you for sharing our load. Our 1984 budget goal was \$81,500. Receipts totaled \$75,139.48, making it our best financial year.

The solution is near for one of this Department's greatest problems. On January 1, 1983 Master's Men owed over \$14,000. By December 31, 1983 that debt dropped to just over \$8,000. At the end of December, 1984 this debt was slashed to only \$708. Soon, we hope to be able to announce the liquidation of all our indebtedness.

In March the National Master's Men Board adopted a new method of presenting our needs to each State Association. Our 1985 budget totals \$83,321. If divided by the total number of church members in our denomination, each person's share of our budget is only 37 cents. For Missouri, your share is \$5,200.00. Planned proportional participation of every Free Will Baptist helps lighten the fund raising burden.

The 1985 theme, "Committed to Christ's Commission", challenges our men to become more like the Master. This is the first year in our Decade of Discipleship. Written material from Master's Men Department has pointed out the need for men to be more Christlike.

I am thankful for a successful Seventh National Master's Men Conference April 25-27, at Camp Linden. Rev. Keith Burden developed the theme, "Be My Disciple", and 15 workshops filled the time with helpful topics.

Tennessee Master's Men will usher at the National Association in Nash-ville this July. Dr. Melvin Worthington will speak at our Breakfast. Plan to eat with us Wednesday, July 24 at the Nashville Sheraton at 7 A.M.

Name

1. This Association shall be called the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists.

Purpose

2. The object of this Association shall be the bringing together of the Free Will Baptists of the State of Missouri in one annual gathering that we may become better acquainted with one another, the upholding of the Free Will Baptist Churches of Missouri, and a world-wide outreach of souls.

Membership

- 3. The Association shall be composed of the members of the various local affiliated Associations.
- 4. Any organized Quarterly Meeting, Yearly Meeting, or Association of Free Will Baptists may unite with this body at any regular session, through a letter or delegates by a two-thirds vote of all delegates present.

Officers

- 5. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, and Assistant Clerk, who shall be elected annually at the close of each session and hold their office until their successors are elected and qualified.
- 6. The officers of this body shall submit, at every session, a report of the work done for this Association.
- 7. The moderator shall be the principal executive officer of the Association and he shall sign, with the clerk or any other people, officer or agent of the Association there unto authorized by the General Board, any deeds, mortgages, bonds, contracts, or other instruments which the General Board has authorized to be executed, except in cases where the signing and execution thereof shall be expressly delegated by the General Board or by these by-laws to some other officer or agent of the Association, or shall be required by law to be otherwise signed or executed. The duties of the Moderator shall include presiding at the meetings of the State Association, the General Board, and the Executive Committee, to call special meetings of the General Board or Executive Committee when the conditions of By-law 44 are fulfilled, to appoint such committees as are created without provision for their selection, to set the time and place for the meetings of the General Board and Executive Committee, and in general, to fulfill whatever responsibilities that may be commensurate with his office or delegated to him by the body or General Board.
- 8. In the absence of the Moderator, or in the event of his death, inability, or refusal to act, the assistant moderator shall perform the duties of the moderator, and when so acting, shall have all the powers of and be subject to all

the restrictions upon the moderator. The assistant moderator shall perform such duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the moderator or by the General Board.

- 9. The clerk shall keep an accurate record of all business transactions, shall superintend the printing of the minutes and shall receive an honorarium of an amount agreed upon
 by this body.
- 10. The clerk shall: (a) keep the minutes of the Association and of the General Board meetings in one or more books provided for the purpose; (b) see that all notices are given in accordance with the provisions of these by-laws or as required by law; (c) be custodian of the Association records and of the seal of the Association and see that the seal of the Association is affixed to all documents the execution of which on behalf of the Association underits seal is duly authorized; (d) in general, perform all duties incident to the office of clerk and such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the moderator or by the General Board; and (e) in the absence of the clerk, or in the event of his death, inability, or refusal to act, the assistant clerk shall perform the duties of the clerk and when so acting shall have all the power of and be subject to all the restrictions upon the clerk. The assistant clerk shall perform such duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the clerk or by the General Board.
- 11. No officer shall serve the same office more than three consecutive years.
- 12. All standing boards shall be composed of five (5) members, exclusive of the General Board. Standing Boards include the Board of Christian Education, the Home Missions Board, the Sunday School and Church Training Service Board, the Youth Camp Board, the Retirement Village Board, and the General Board.
- 13. The duties of the various standing boards shall be to (a) plan and supervise both short and long range programs of ministry, (b) manage as good stewards, all funds and properties entrusted to its care, (c) annually submit a detailed budget for approval by the State Association. The budget shall include 1. Projected income along with expected sources of income.

 2. Projects planned and the cost of said projects. 3. Maintenance along with it's cost. (d) work in harmony with and toward the common vision of the entire State Association.
- 14. No board shall initiate any litigation in pursuit of its ministry. Neither shall any board enter into any litigation in the pursuit of it's ministry except as required because suit has been initiated against the board. The only exception is that which the State Association may authorize while in session, or the General Board may authorize when the State Association is not in session.
- 15. The personnel of each of the foregoing, exclusive of the General Board, shall be elected as follows: The first named for a term of one year, the second for a term of two years, the third for a term of three years, the fourth for a

term of four years, and the fifth for a term of five years, and thereafter each shall be elected for a term of five years.

- 16. The personnel of the General Board shall be composed of the officers of the State Association, the chairman of all standing boards and one member from each affiliated Association, to be elected by the State body, whose term of office shall be two years and so constituted that the expiration date of the term of office of half of these shall expire one year and the other half the following year. This shall be determined by alphabetical order of the name of the affiliated Association.
- 17. No person shall fill more than one office at the same time except as he may become a member of the General Board by virtue of being chairman of the board which he is an elected member.
- 18. Any vacancy occuring in the General Board may be filled by the affirmative vote of a majority of the remaining board members though less than a quorum of the General Board, unless otherwise provided by law.
- 19. All board members elected to fill a vacancy shall be elected for the unexpired term of his predecessor in office.
- 20. Any member of the standing board of the State Association who does not put forth any interest in or function on said board for the period of one year, shall have his office declared vacant and a new member be elected by this Association to fill his unexpired term of office.

Duties

- 21. The General Board shall have power to act in behalf of, and for the State Association from one regular session to another, and shall have power to elect such officers as may be necessary to carry out the plans and undertakings of the State Association. The General Board shall have the right to employ an Executive Secretary who shall serve as treasurer of the Association except in cases where this responsibility shall be expressly delegated by the General Board or by these by-laws to some other officer, agent, or board of the Association. He shall make an annual financial report to the Association.
- 22. The General Board shall have the power to fill any irregular vacancies that may occur in its own body and shall also have power to fill any irregular vacancies that may occur in any department of work between sessions of the State Association. It shall be the duty of this Board to make written reports of all its work to each session.
- 23. An Executive Committee consisting of seven members of the General Board shall be composed of the moderator, assistant moderator, clerk of the State Association, and four other members to be elected by the General Board; two members to be elected for a two year term and two members to

be elected for a one year term and then two members to be elected each year thereafter, whose duty it shall be to act on all matters coming within the scope of the work of the Board when said Board is not in session. It shall also plan and execute the program for the annual sessions of the Missouri State Association. The Executive Committee shall be the governing board of the Lebanon Bible and Book Store and shall establish policy for the operation of the store. The Executive Committee shall have the power to employ and supervise the Bookstore manager. The Bookstore manager shall employ and supervise the other employees.

- 24. A majority of the number of the General Board members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the General Board, but if less than such majority is present at a meeting, a majority of the Board members present may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice.
- 25. An act of the majority of the Board members present at a meeting of the General Board at which a quorum is present shall be an act of the General Board.
- 26. A Board member of the Association who is present at a meeting of the General Board at which action on any Association matter is taken shall be presumed to have assented to the action taken unless his dissent shall be entered in the minutes of the meeting.
- 27. The Ceneral Board may authorize any officer or officers, agent or agents to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of an on behalf of the Association and such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.
- 28. Any person or agent elected or appointed by the General Board may be removed by the General Board whenever in its judgment the best interests of the Association would be served thereby, but such removal shall be without prejudice to the contract rights, if any, of the persons so removed.
- 29. By resolution of the General Board, the Board members may be paid their expenses, if any, of attendance of each meeting of the General Board. No such payment shall preclude any Board member from serving the Association in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefor.
- 30. The General Board shall provide an Association seal which shall be circular in form and shall have inscribed thereon the name of the corporation and the state of incorporation and the words "Corporate Seal".

Committees

31. The moderator shall appoint a committee on comittees consisting of five members who shall appoint all committees with the exclusion of the Auditing Committee who shall be appointed by the General Board. The first appointed shall serve a term of one year, the second a term of two

years and third a term of three years; thereafter, each shall be appointed for a term of three years. Members of standing boards, with exception of the General Board, are not eligible to serve on the Auditing Committee. Their duties are to audit all state books and serve as Budget Committee.

32. All resolutions and reports shall bear the name of all the members of the committee who favor them, and if the names be not a majority of all members of such committee, then the clerk shall not read the resolutions or report.

Representation

- 33. The standing delegates of this Association shall be all ordained Free Will Baptist ministers and their companion, all ordained deacons, and Associational clerks, provided they are members in good standing in some Free Will Baptist Church belonging to this State Association.
- 34. The number of elected delegates to the State Association shall be seven delegates from each affiliated local association or yearly meeting, one delegate from each church, plus one delegate for each fifty members or larger fraction thereof. Each church which represents must be a member of a local association or yearly meeting holding membership in this body.
- 35. This Association may correspond by messenger or other-wise with other religious bodies.

<u>Voting</u>

- 36. Those entitled to vote at any annual or special meeting of this State Association shall be the elected delegates and the standing delegates as defined in By-Laws 33-34, and each elected delegate or standing delegate shall be entitled to one vote.
- 37. A majority vote shall be final upon all subjects except to amend the By-Laws, receive Quarterly Meetings or Associations, and the changing of the members of the committees appointed by the moderator, then it shall require a two-thirds majority.

Meetings

- 38. The sessions of the Association shall convene on Tuesday evening at 7:30, following the first Sunday in June, beginning 19n 1985.
- 39. The membership of the State Association my designate any place, either within or without the State of Missouri for any annual meeting. Any special meeting may be called by the General Board. A waiver of notice signed by all members entitled to vote at a meeting may designate any place, either within or without the State of Missouri, unless otherwise prescribed by statute, as the place for the holding of such meeting. If no designation is made, or if a special meeting be otherwise called, the place of the meeting shall be the principal office of the corporation of the

State of Missouri.

- 40. In the event the necessity arises from war, or pestilence, or any cause which prevents a regular meeting of the State Association, whether such a condition is of a local or general condition, then the General Board shall be privileged to call and act with full authority in all matters pertaining to the general welfare of the State Association, providing whatever transaction passed shall be by two-thirds vote of the members present, and providing that such transactions shall not conflict with the purpose and edicts of the By-Laws of the State Association.
- 41. Special meetings of the Association for any purpose or purposes, unless otherwise prescribed by statute, may be called by the General Board, and shall be called by the moderator at the request of not less than fifty percent of all the delegate members duly elected by local Associations, Quarterly Meetings and local churches affiliated with the Association.
- 42. All committees and standing boards shall be permitted to take official votes on any item of business within the scope of their work by mail or by telephone conference call, provided such action is called by a chairman of a board or committee and has been proposed by at least two members of the board or committee.
- 43. Seven or more ordained ministers or deacons from two or more affiliated Associations belonging to the State Association shall constitute a quorum to transact business.
- 44. All business meetings shall be opened by singing, reading a portion from God's Word, and prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.
- 45. Special meetings of the General Board or the Executive Committee shall be called when necessary by the moderator, with the written consent of three other members of the Executive Committee. Special meetings of the General Board shall also be called upon the written request of one-fourth of its members. Special meetings of the Executive Committee shall also be called upon written request of a majority of its members.
- 46. Notice of any special meeting shall be given at least fifteen days previously thereto by written notice delivered personally or mailed to each Board member at his business address, or by telegram. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States mail so addressed with postage thereon prepaid. If notice be given by telegram, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when the telegram is delivered to the telegraph company. Any Board member may waive notice of any meeting. The attendance of a Board member at a meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except where a Board member attends a meeting for the express purpose of objecting to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened.

47. Unless otherwise provided by law, whenever any notice is required to be given to any member or Board member of the Association under the provisions of these By-Laws or under the provisions of the articles of incorporation, a waiver thereof in writing, signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice whether before or after writing, signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice whether before or after the time stated therein shall be deemed equivalent to the giving of such notice.

Discipline

- 48. The State Association shall not usurp any authority over the Quarterly Meetings or Associations that shall be under its supervision, but shall be an advisory body to help them.
- 49. The fiscal year of the Association shall begin on the first day of January, and end on the 31st day of December of each year.
- 50. All checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money notes or other evidences of indebtness issued in the name of the Association, shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents of the Association and in such manner as shall from time to time be determined by resolution of the General Board.
- 51. No loans shall be contracted, and no evidence of indebtedness shall be issued for which the State Association shall be legally or morally responsible except as approved by the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists while in session, or by the General Board while in session.
- 52. The General Board by a majority vote of the voting delegates of the State Association, shall be authorized to create or to increase any bonded indebtedness of the Association.
- 53. The General Board of the Association shall be authorized by a majority vote of the voting delegates of the State Association, to sell, lease, exchange, mortgage, pledge, or otherwise dispose of all, or substantially all, of the property and the assets of the Association.
- 54. All funds of the corporation not otherwise employed shall be deposited from time to time to the credit of the Association in such banks, trust companies, or other depositories as the General Board may select.
- 55. The salaries of employees shall be fixed from time to time by the General Board.
- 56. The meetings of the State Association and the General Board shall be governed by the rules of parlimentary law as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order, except in the case of those rules which are superseded by some rule of this organization.
- 57. The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in age, shall call the Association to

order for business, and call the moderator or assistant moderator to the chair, and if neither moderator or assistant tant moderator is present, then the senior minister in age shall act as chairman to open the floor for nominations and carry out the election of a moderator pro-tem.

- 58. All business, except routine, shall be brought before the body by committee, but shall any committee refuse
 or fail to present to this body the business given it by
 any delegate of this Association, then such business may be
 presented to the body by any delegate, but cannot be discussed unless by a majority vote of this body.
- 59. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and say "Brother Moderator" but shall speak no further until he or she is recognized by the moderator.
- 60. No one shall speak more than five minutes, or more than twice, on the same subject without the consent of the moderator.
- 61. Any delegate of this body can appeal from the decision of the moderator of the association, and by a majority vote thereon, the objection shall be sustained or rejected.
- 62. No one shall leave the Association when in a business session without the consent of the moderator.
- 63. The moderator shall stop all discussions when not carried on in a Christian Spirit, or when he thinks it is likely to lead to discord or division.
- 64. All business coming before this Association shall be decided by secret ballot when thre is any opposition or objection to open vote.

Admendments

65. These By-Laws may be amended at any regular session by a two-thirds majority vote after the proposed emendment has laid on the table one day.
