

When convened at the Nelson Community Center in Lebanon, Missouri, June 3 - 6, 1996

<u>Monday Evening, June 3, 1996</u>

Rev. Ken Dodson, Moderator, Presiding

The evening service began with Rev. David Bates leading the congregation in singing "He Brought Me Out". Rev. Ken Dodson led in prayer. Rev. 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

The theme for this eighty-third session of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists is "Empowering People to Change the World."

If we consider the number of people and the massive amount of land area involved, in our own power the Great Commission is too large a task for us. The Lord knew this and told His disciples, "But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." Plans concerning the Conference Center continue to move slowly as we wait for the Lebanon property to sell. It is still listed with a realty company. A broker in Camdenton is providing us with some real estate listings for lake property at this time. Those attending the All Boards Meeting/Preacher-Layman's Retreat at the Youth Camp were encouraged and enlightened by the speakers, Rev. Bill Evans and Rev. Ken Dodson. Brother Dale Skiles organized the annual golf tourament and reported that it had a large number of participants. The 1996 All Boards Meeting/Preacher-Layman's Retreat will be held at the Youth Camp September 16, 17.

I would encourage the churches to send in news items for the Gem. The Gem is one of the best ways of preserving our history. The price for the Gem remains the same with an individual subscription costing \$4.50 and the church plan costing \$4.00 per subscription.

Continue to pray for this ministry. Thank you for the prayers you have prayed and for your words of encouragement.

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MISSOURI CHRISTIAN EDUCATION BOARD OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

JUNE, 1996

The Missouri Board of Christian Education met twice since last State Association, at the All Boards Meeting in September, and a partial committee meeting in St. Louis in March. Most of our funds are being allocated for several different projects. First, we are happy to sponsor Keith Kenemer and Evangelical Teachers Association at this year's association. He will be presenting seminars on Tuesday afternoon. Keith is a graduate of Free Will Baptist Bible College, and is a real veteran in Sunday School work. We feel that he will benefit each of those who choose to attend.

Second, we are always seeking to expand and upgrade our Lending Library. We have added six new series to the library this year. These series can be used as a Sunday School elective, Wednesday night program, etc. A complete listing of available series is in this report. We will have many of these items at our CE Booth at the State Association. You may check out the items right at the booth. If you have a suggestion for a possible purchase of a specific series, please give the information to one of our board members.

Third, in lieu of a Family Life Conference, we will be working with the State Executive Department in some joint project regarding next year's Minister's Retreat. The dates will be March 17-19, at Stonecroft Conference Center.

Fourth, we are assisting, through equipment purchase, scholarships, and shared expenses, the External Studies program which meets at Cuba and Victory. We have been providing two minister's scholarships up to \$160.00 each based on need. We are expanding this program into the Mountain Grove area, and adding at least one scholarship. We are also looking to expand it into the St. Louis area. Scholarship recipients will be determined by the faculty. Hopefully, one of the instructors will be giving an oral report to the Association concerning the External Studies program.

Fifth, we continue to be the data gathering agency for Roll Call Sunday. The Roll Call presentation will be made during this segment of the CE Board Report. A full statistical report will be handed out at this time, and will be made available at the registration booth.

Sixth, our first "idea exchange" was mailed in May. This paper contains several items including: a spotlight church, promotional ideas, and Christian education helps. We include a sermon by one of our men with a "how I prepare" segment.

Seventh, we continue to provide a scholarship to deserving college students at Hillsdale College and Free Will Baptist Bible College. These scholarships are determined by the college administration.

Eighth, our Executive Secretary formed a Foreign Missions Task Force to look into the possibility of establishing a Missions program much like the Arkansas program. If such a program was feasible, a recommendation would come to the General Board and the Missouri State Association. Since no funds were available to promote this project, our Christian Education Board assumed the expense of the promotional piece.

Ninth, working with the administration of Hilldale College, we are seeking to provide credit for those who choose to go on the Holy Land Trip with our state leadership.

Finally, we are here to serve you. If there is something that you feel that we can do to help you in your ministry, please share it with one of our board members.





#1 Call to see if the projector is available on the date desired.


#2 Reserve it for only the dates needed.





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HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE ACCREDITED TO THE NEXT CENTURY!

NEWS RELEASE:

The regulatory power which the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education has held over Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College since 1970 is ended. The amendment to House Bill No. 2466 made national or regional accrediting agencies recognized by the U.S. Department of Education equivalent with State accreditation. This makes the law in Oklahoma similar to that regulating higher education in every state, except New York. The effect is that as of May 31, 1996 Hillsdale is free to pursue institutional advancement without interference from the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education.

Hillsdale just finished one of the most effective years in the history of the College. The largest freshman class in twenty years started classes last fall and the applications for next fall were the highest of any May on record (another miracle in light of the circumstances over the last two months). Parents and students should not forget each student who is recruited to attend Hillsdale by another student will qualify the recruiter for a tuition waiver of up to \$400.

Many people have stood with the College during the difficult times of the last few years. The prayer and financial support have sustained Hillsdale to this point and made way for God to act on behalf of the College. It is a true saying, "We have come too far to turn back now!"

What is next at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College? We are free to focus our energies on the real business of a Christian college, educating men and women to serve Christ. The College's initial accreditation status is secure through the year 2000. The College plans to achieve full accreditation with the Transnational Association of Christian Colleges and Schools prior to 2000 which could extend our status as much as seven more years.



Greetings from the Executive Office:

The 1996 Denominational Digest gives a snapshot of the services provided by agencies of the National Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc. Please take time to peruse these pages which were especially prepared for you.

Capital Stewardship/Victory Campaign contributions through December 31, 1995, totaled \$271,233.82. Gifts for this campaign will be credited through December 1997. This allows additional time for district/state associations to reach their campaign goals, while coinciding with the final payment from the sale of the Murfreesboro Road property.

Contributions to national ministries in 1995 totaled \$8,777,067.71. Together Way Plan contributions totaled \$2,491,009.85, the highest in history. Of this amount \$362,694.52 was *Cooperative* and \$2,128,315.33 was *Designated*. Per capita giving was \$41.07; our goal was \$43.80. Together Way Plan notebooks can be ordered, at no cost, from the Executive Office. We encourage each church and association to adopt the Together Way Plan, the denominational plan for financial support.

Together Way Plan contributions designated for the Executive Office ministry in 1995 totaled \$117,223.58, while cooperative gifts totaled \$217,616.55. Total Together Way Plan contributions (cooperative and designated) for the Executive Office ministry were \$334,840.13.

The Rest of the Family Offering in September totaled \$5,931.36. After expenses, the balance was disbursed to participating national agencies. September 29, 1996, has been designated as the Rest of the Family Sunday. We encourage you to give generously in this offering.

Contact provides current information regarding denominational life. Subscriptions are \$12 per year. Life-time subscriptions cost \$500. Life-time subscribers totaled eight in 1995. We encourage each church to purchase a life-time subscription. This means the church would always have current information regarding the Free Will Baptist family. Each life-time subscriber, whether church or individual, receives a leather-bound copy of *The Free Will Baptist Hymn Book: Rejoice* (1988). Only a limited number are available, so subscribe today. Specify round or shaped note edition. *The Free Will Baptist Hymn Book: Rejoice* may be ordered from Randall House Publications. It is available in shaped or round note editions and three colors. *The Rejoice Hymnal for the Church at* Worship is also available in both shaped and round note editions in two colors. It is distributed by Tempo Music Publications, Inc., 3773 West 95th Street, Leawood, Kansas 66206. The International Fellowship of Free Will Baptist Churches, Inc. was officially organized October 16-21, 1995, in Brazil. Plans call for this Fellowship to meet every three years. The Executive Committee of the Fellowship consists of John Poole, president (Brazil); Ramon Sanchez, vice president (Cuba) and Melvin Worthington, secretary/treasurer (USA). The next meeting is scheduled for October 12-16, 1998, at a site to be sclected by the Fellowship Executive Committee.

The 1996 Free Will Baptist Leadership Conference will meet December 2-3, 1996, at the Regal Maxwell House Hotel. We encourage each state leader to attend.

Reporting Forms 501, 502, 503 and 504 are designed to report statistical data. Using these forms enables us to compile an accurate statistical table. Recording and reporting statistical data remains a denominational problem. In order to provide accurate historical data, its necessary to record and report complete, correct and consistent data.

Greetings:

On behalf of the missionaries, our board and the home office staff, we express our gratitude for the prayer and financial support of Free Will Baptists across the country. Lives have been touched and changed through those whom you have sent to the regions beyond.

Your missionaries continue to minister in <u>Brazil, Côte d'Ivoire, France, India, Japan,</u> <u>Panama, Spain, and Uruguay</u>. In addition, we maintain a strong bond with our Cuban Free Will Baptists. Although our primary focus is church planting, our mission includes training national workers, providing medical service (in Côte d'Ivoire), community development (in India), and caring for street children (in Brazil).

In recent years Free Will Baptist young people have been teaching English to university students in China. God willing, we will be sending our first witness to Mongolia this year.

In 1995 we witnessed the opening of Russia and the Commonwealth of Independent States (the former Soviet Union) as a mission field for Free Will Baptists. We have provided some training materials, a copy machine, audio-visual materials and assistance on construction of seminary buildings. We are sponsoring a church-planting project in Noyabrisk, a city which has never had a Protestant church.

This year we have sent Professor Leroy Forlines and his wife, Fay, to teach Arminian doctrine in seminaries and Bible institutes. We also are sponsoring a pastors' conference for 100 Russian preachers and are sending 14 people to engage in house-to-house visitation and witnessing to help start a new church in Kopeysk.

 We will be assisting our Arminian Russian brethren to reach the nine million people who live in the eastern Ural region. We currently are sponsoring a church planter in Ekaterinburg, which has a population of 1.8 million and only five Protestant churches.

We thank you and praise the Lord for an income of \$4,362,686 during 1995. We appreciate every gift and personal sacrifice represented in this amount. Although we did not meet our budget we were able to keep our expenses within our income.

Please pray and give that we may be able to meet our 1996 budget of \$5,229,982 (including VISION funds). Through your partnership we hope to reach some of the two billion in our world who have not heard the message of Christ.





In 1939, when "Free Will Baptist Home for Children" was founded, no one imagined it would grow into what it is today. Functioning specifically as an orphanage when it first opened, it now gives abused and neglected children hope in Christ and helps them become productive members of society. ("Free Will Baptist Home for Children" is now known as "Free Will Baptist Family Ministries,

Inc.") Ministering to the individual needs of children and families, FWBFM has four separate divisions that each have a unique outreach.

*Trula Cronk Home for Children - In September 1994, Mrs. Trula (Gunter) Cronk honored us by allowing us to name our 6 long-term, residential homes after her. Mrs. Cronk was the first child placed at the home in 1939. She and her husband, Rev. Dan Cronk, served as FWB missionaries in India for over 20 years. Mrs. Cronk's attitude and accomplishments, in spite of her circumstances, make her an excellent role model for our children.

We strive to create a family-type atmosphere in each of these 6 houses. We have no dormitories or cafeterias, but each individual house functions as much like a "normal" home as possible. Each family has a household budget, shares meals together, attends a local FWB church, and participates in school activities, etc.

*The Stanley Foster Care Program - In July 1995, we received our Foster Care License. We are thrilled that this new avenue of ministry was opened to us. Since it's conception, the Stanley Foster Care

Program has cared for 10 children in Christian homes off campus. We hope to show those placed in our care the true meaning of "family" by placing them with dedicated, trained foster care parents willing to demonstrate God's love to these children in their own homes.

*The P.A.T.H. Shelter - The function of our P.A.T.H. (Protecting Adolescents and Teaching Hope) Shelter is to provide temporary, emergency placements for children coming out of crisis situations. Serving as the only emergency shelter of this kind in Greene County, TN, the P.A.T.H. Shelter is open 24-hours a day, 7 days a week with a license to care for twelve children each day.

Because of the tremendous need for emergency shelters, we unfortunately have to turn away sometimes as many as 15 children in a single day. In 1995 alone, 624 children were denied because we were full. We praise God, though, that we were able to serve 127 different children last year through the P.A.T.H. Shelter.

*The OAKS Family Conference Center and Camp - One of the goals for THE OAKS is to minister to the families of the kids placed at Trula Cronk Home for Children, the Stanley Foster Care Program, and the P.A.T.H. Shelter. The goals also include counseling families to help prevent their breakdown and providing a place for retreat for individuals, families, and churches. As in the past, The OAKS will continue to offer a camping program that will evangelize and edify our youth.

In October 1995, we added 7 RV hookups that are available for anyone at a minimal cost. Having finished the winterizing of our dining hall to make it available for year-round use, we are in the process of doing the same for all of the cabins. We are excited about the possibilities of this ministry which will reach both youth and adults for Christ.

Missouri Board of Christian Education 1996 Roll Call Sunday Report

We want to thank the 175 churches and their pastors, superintendents, clerks and secretaries who reported a 1996 Roll Call Sunday attendance of 13,119. This represented a slight 3% increase over the 1995 Roll Call figures.

By-Laws

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BY-LAWS

NAME

1. This Association shall be called the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptist.

PURPOSE

2. The object of this Association shall be the bringing together of the Free Will Baptists of the State of Missouri in one annual gathering that we may become better acquainted with one another, the upholding of the Free Will Baptists Churches of Missouri, and a worldwide outreach of souls.

MEMBERSHIP

- 3. The Association shall be composed of the members of the various local affiliated Associations.
- 4. Any organized Quarterly Meeting, Yearly Meeting, or Association of Free Will Baptists may unite with this body at any regular session, through a letter or delegates by a two-thirds vote of all delegates present.

OFFICERS

- 5. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, and Assistant Clerk, who shall be elected annually at the close of each session and hold their office until their successors are elected and qualified.
- The officers of this body shall submit, at every session, a report of the work done for this association.
- 7. The Moderator shall be the principal executive officer of the Association and he shall sign, with the clerk or any other people, officer or agent of the Association there unto authorized by the General Board, any deeds, mortgages, bonds, contracts, or other instruments which the General Board has authorized to be executed, except in cases where the signing and execution thereof shall be expressly delegated by the General Board or by these By-Laws to some other officer or agent of the Association, or shall be required by law to be otherwise signed or executed. The duties of Moderator shall include presiding at the meetings of the State Association, the General Board, and the Executive Committee when the conditions of By-Law 44 are fulfilled, to appoint such committees as are created without provision for their selection, to set the time and place for the meetings of the General Board and Executive Committee, and in general, to fulfill whatever responsibilities that may be commensurate with his office or delegated to him by the body or General Board.
- 8. In the absence of the Moderator, or in the event of his death, inability or refusal to act, the Assistant Moderator shall perform the duties of the Moderator, and when so acting, shall have all the powers of and be subject to all the restrictions upon the moderator. The Assistant Moderator shall perform such duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the Moderator or by the General Board.
- 9. The Clerk shall keep and accurate record of all business transactions, shall superintend the printing of the minutes, and shall receive an honorarium of an amount agreed upon by this body.
- 10. The Clerk shall:
 - a. Keep the minutes of the Association and of the General Board meetings in one or more books provided for the purpose.
 - See that all notices are given in accordance with the provisions of these by-laws or as required by law. b.

- c. Be custodian of the Association records and of the seal of the Association and see that the seal of the Association is affixed to all documents the execution of which on behalf of the Association under its seal is duly authorized.
- d. In general, perform all duties incident to the office of clerk and other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the Moderator or by the General Board.
- e. In the absence of the clerk, or in the event of his death, inability, or refusal to act, the Assistant Clerk shall perform the duties of the Clerk and when so acting shall have all the power of and be subject to all the restrictions upon the clerk.
- The Assistant Clerk shall perform such duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the clerk or by the General Board.
- 11. No Officer shall serve the same office more than three consecutive years.
- 12. All standing boards shall be composed of five (5) members, exclusive of the General Board. Standing Boards include the Board of Christian Education, the Home Missions Board, the Senior Adult Ministries Board, the Youth Ministries Board, the Youth Camp Board, and the General Board.
- 13. The duties of the various standing boards shall be to:
 - a. Plan and supervise both short and long-range programs of ministry.
 - b. Manage as good stewards all funds and properties entrusted to its care.
 - c. Annually submit a detailed budget for approval by the State Association. The budget shall include:
 - (1) Projected income along with expected sources of income.
 - (2) Projects planned and the cost of said projects.
 - (3) Maintenance along with its cost.
 - (4) Work in harmony with and toward the common vision of the entire State Association.
- 14. No board shall initiate any litigation in pursuit of its ministry. Neither shall any board enter into any litigation in the pursuit of its ministry except as required because suit has been initiated against the board. The only exception is that which the State Association may authorize when the State Association is not in session.
- 15. The personnel of each of the foregoing, exclusive of the General Board, shall be elected as follows: The first named for a term of one year, the second for a term of two years, the third for a term of three years, and thereafter each shall be elected for a term of five years.
- 16. The personnel of the General Board shall be composed of the officers of the State Association, the chairman of all standing boards, and one member from each affiliated Association, to be elected by the state body, whose term of office shall be two years and so constituted that the expiration date of the term of office of half of these shall expire one year and the other half the following year. This shall be determined by alphabetical order of the names of the affiliated Association.
- 17. No person shall fill more than one office at the same time except as he may become a member of the General Board by virtue of being chairman of the board which he is an elected member.
- 18. Any vacancy occurring in the General Board may be filled by the affirmative vote of a majority of the remaining board members through less than a quorum of the General Board, unless otherwise provided by law.

19. All board members elected to fill a vacancy shall be elected for the unexpired term of his predecessor in office.

20. Any member of the standing boards of the State Association who does not put forth any interest in or function on said board for the period of one year, shall have his office declared vacant and a new member be elected by this Association to fill his unexpired term of office.

DUTIES

- 21. The General Board shall have power to act in behalf of, and for the State Association from one regular session to another, and shall have power to elect such officers as may be necessary to carry out the plans and undertakings of the State Association. The General Board shall have the right to employ an Executive Secretary who shall serve as treasurer of the Association except in cases where this responsibility shall be expressly delegated by the General Board or by these by-laws to some other officer, agent, or board of the Association. He shall make an annual financial report to the Association.
- 22. The General Board shall have the power to fill any irregular vacancies that may occur in its own body and shall also have power to fill any irregular vacancies that may occur in any department of work between sessions of the State Association. It shall be the duty of this Board to make written reports of all its work to each session.
- 23. An Executive Committee consisting of seven members of the General Board shall be composed of the Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk of the State Association, and four other members to be elected by the General Board; two members to be elected for a two year term and two members to be elected for a one year term and then two members to be elected each year thereafter, whose duty it shall be to act on all matters coming within the scope of the work of the Board when said Board is not in session. It shall also plan and execute the program for the annual sessions of the Missouri State Association. The Executive Committee shall be the governing board of the Lebanon Bible and Book Store and shall establish policy for the operation of the Book Store Manager. The Book Store manager shall employ and supervise the other employees. The Executive Committee shall serve as the Budget Committee.
- 24. A majority of the number of the General Board members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the General Board, but if less than such a majority is present at a meeting, a majority of the Board members present may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice.
- 25. An act of the majority of the Board members present at a meeting of the General Board at which a quorum is present shall be an act of the General Board.
- 26. A Board member of the Association who is present at a meeting of the General Board at which action on any Association matter is taken shall be presumed to have assented to the action taken unless his dissent shall be entered in the minutes of the meeting.
- 27. The General Board may authorize any officer or officers, agent or agents to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of or on behalf of the Association and such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.
- 28. Any person or agent elected or appointed by the General Board may be removed by the General Board whenever in its judgment the best interests of the Association would be served thereby, but such removal shall be without prejudice to the contract rights, if any, of the persons so removed.
- 29. By resolution of the General Board, the Board members may be paid their expenses, if any, of attendance of each meeting of the General Board. No such payment shall preclude any Board member from serving the Association in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefore.

30. The General Board shall provide an Association seal which shall be circular in form and shall have inscribed thereon the name of the corporation and the state of incorporation and the words "Corporate Seal."

COMMITTEES

- 31. The Moderator shall appoint a committee on committees consisting of five members who shall appoint all committees with the exclusion of the Auditing Committee who shall be appointed by the General Board. The first appointed shall serve a term of one year, the second a term of two years and the third a term of three years; thereafter, each shall be appointed for a term of three years. Members of standing boards, with the exception of the General Board, are not eligible to serve on the Auditing Committee. Their duties are to audit all state books.
- 32. All resolutions and reports shall bear the name of all the members of the committee who favor them, and if the names be not a majority of all members of such committee, then the clerk shall not read the resolutions or report.

REPRESENTATION

- 33. The standing delegates of this Association shall be all ordained Free Will Baptist ministers and their companion, all ordained deacons, and Associational Clerks, provided they are members in good standing in some Free Will Baptist Church in this State Association.
- 34. The number of elected delegates to the State Association shall be seven delegated from each affiliated local association or yearly meeting, one delegate from each church, plus one delegate for fifty members or larger fraction thereof. Each church which represents must be a member of a local association or a yearly meeting holding membership in this body.

35. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.

VOTING

- 36. Those entitled to vote at any annual or special meeting of this State Association shall be the elected delegates and the standing delegates as defined By-Laws 33-34, and each elected delegate or standing delegate shall be entitled to one vote.
- 37. A majority vote shall be final upon all subjects except to amend the By-Laws, receive Quarterly Meetings or Associations, and the changing of the members of the committees appointed by the Moderator, then it shall require a two-thirds majority.

MEETINGS

- 38. The sessions of the Association shall convene on Monday evening at 7:30, following the first Sunday, in June beginning 1987.
- 39. The membership of the State Association may designate any place, either within or without the State of Missouri, for any annual meeting. Any special meeting may be called by the General Board. A waiver of notice signed by all members entitled to vote at a meeting may designate any place, either within or without the State of Missouri, unless otherwise prescribed by stature, as the place for holding of such meeting. If no designation is made, or if a special meeting be otherwise called, the place of the meeting shall be the principle office of the corporation of the State of Missouri.
- 40. In the event the necessity arises from war, or pestilence, or any cause which prevents a regular meeting of the State Association, whether such a condition is of a local or general condition, then the General Board shall be privileged to call and act with full authority in all matters pertaining to the general welfare of the State Association, providing whatever transaction passed shall be by two-thirds vote of the members present, and

providing that such transactions shall not conflict with the purpose and edicts of the By-Laws of the State Association.

- 41. Special meetings of the Association for any purpose or purposes, unless otherwise prescribed by statute, may be called by the General Board, and shall be called by the Moderator at the request of not less than fifty percent of all the delegate members duly elected by local Associations, Quarterly Meetings and local churches affiliated with the Association.
- 42. All committees and standing boards shall be permitted to take official votes on any item of business within the scope of their work by mail or by telephone conference call, provided such action is called by a chairman of a board or committee and has been proposed by at least two members of the board or committee.
- 43. Seven or more ordained ministers or deacons from two or more affiliated Associations belonging to the State Association shall constitute a quorum to transact business.
- 44. All business meetings shall be opened by singing, reading a portion from God's Word, and prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.
- 45. Special meetings of the General Board or the Executive committee shall be called when necessary by the Moderator, with the written consent of three other members of the Executive Committee. Special meetings of the General Board shall also be called upon written request of one-forth of its members. Special meetings of the Executive Committee shall also be called upon written request of a majority of its members.
- 46. Notice of any special meeting shall be given at least fifteen days previously thereto by written notice delivered personally or mailed to each Board member at his business address, or by telegram. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when the telegram is delivered to the telegraph company. Any Board member may waive notice of any meeting. The attendance of a Board member at a meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except where a Board member attends a meeting for the express purpose of objecting to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened.
- 47. Unless otherwise provided by law, whenever any notice is required to be given to any member or Board member of the Association under the provisions of these By-Laws or under the provisions of the articles of incorporation, a waiver thereof in writing, signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice whether before or after writing, signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice whether before or after the item stated therein shall be deemed equivalent to the giving of such notice.

DISCIPLINE

- 48. The State Association shall not usurp any authority over the Quarterly Meetings or Associations that shall be under its supervision, but shall be an advisory body to help them.
- 49. The fiscal year of the Association shall begin on the first day of January, and end on the 31st day of December each year.
- 50. All checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money notes other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the Association, shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents or the Association and in such manners as shall from time to time be determined by resolution of the General Board.
- 51. No loans shall be contracted, and no evidence of indebtedness shall be issued for which the State Association shall be legally or morally responsible except as approved by the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists while in session, or by the General Board while in session.
- 52. The General Board by a majority vote of the voting delegates of the State Association, shall be authorized to create or to increase any bonded indebtedness of the Association.

- 53. The General Board of the Association shall be authorized by a majority vote of the voting delegates of the State Association, to sell, lease, exchange, mortgage, pledge, or otherwise dispose of all, of the property and the assets of the Association.
- 54. All funds of the corporation not otherwise employed shall be deposited from time to time to the credit of the Association in such banks, trust companies, or other depositories as the General Board may select.
- 55. The salaries of employees shall be fixed from time to time by the General Board.
- 56. The meetings of the State Association and the General Board shall be governed by the rules of parliamentary law as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order, except in the case of those rules which are superseded by some rule of this organization.
- 57. The Clerk or Assistant Clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in age, shall call the Association to order for business, and call the Moderator or Assistant Moderator to the chair, and if neither moderator or assistant moderator is present, then the senior minister in age shall act as chairman to open the floor for nominations and carry out the election of a moderator pro-tem.
- 58. All business, except routine, shall be brought before the body by committee, but shall any committee refuse or fail to present to this body the business given it by any delegate of this Association, then such business may be presented to the body by any delegate, but cannot be discussed unless by a majority vote of this body.
- 59. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and say "Brother Moderator" but shall speak no further until he or she is recognized by the Moderator.
- 60. No one shall speak more than five minutes, or more than twice, on the same subject without the consent of the Moderator.
- 61. Any delegate of this body can appeal from the decision of the Moderator of the Association, and by a majority
 - vote thereon, the objection shall be sustained or rejected.
- 62. No one shall leave the Association when in a business session without the consent of the moderator.
- 63. The moderator shall stop all discussion when not carried on in a Christian spirit, or when he thinks it is likely to lead to discord or division.
- 64. All business coming before this Association shall be decided by secret ballet when there is any opposition or objection to open vote.

AMENDMENTS

65. These By-Laws may be amended at any regular session by a two-thirds majority vote after the proposed amendment has laid on the table one day
