PROCEEDINGS.

The Fiftieth Annual session of the Mount Moriah Freewill Baptist Association, of Alabama, was held with Antioch church, Fayette county, Alabama, October 13th, 14th and 15th, 1900. The introductory sermon was preached by Elder James D. Byars. His text was Matt. 17:5. After preaching an intermission of an hour and a half was taken for recreation and refreshments. At the appointed time the ministers and messengers repaired to the house, and after services in song and prayer the Association was called to order by William E. Hardin, former moderator; the former clerk officiating until the Association was organized. The business was transacted in the following order:

1. The letters from the different churches were called for, handed in and read, and names of delegates enrolled as per

etatistical table.

2. Proceeded to elect moderator and clerk, whereupon William E. Hardin was elected moderator and Thos. Alexder clerk.

3. Extended an invitation for the reception of new churches, whereupon a petitionary letter was presented from Philips' Chapel church of North River Freewill Baptist Association, borne by Bros. W. A. Sanford, J. W. Gregg and J. W. Hallman, having delegated power from said church. After an investigation as to the condition of said church, and having had the Rules of Decorum, etc., read to which the delegates pledged adoption, on motion, the church was received and the delegates conducted to seats with us.

4. Called for corresponding messengers from Sister Associations, whereupon Bros. T. A. Guin, I. P. Robertson and Elder T. G. Harrison from Vernon Association were received with brotherly greeting and conducted to seats with us.

5. Invited visiting brethren to seats with us.6. The following committees were appointed:

On Order of Business—Elders James D. Byars, J. E. Mathis, W. J. Coward, J. E. Strickland, and Bro. W. B. Montgomery with Moderator and clerk.

On Devotional Service-Bros. J. E. Woods, O. B. Hardin,

E P. Rhodes with deacons of Antioch church.

On Temperance—Bros G. V. Clardy and J. A. Pool. On Finance—Bros. R. S. Fields and I. J. W. St John.

On Sunday School-Bros. A. J. Taylor and T. M. Bailey.

On Deceased—Bros. J. T. Hardin and J W. Gregg.

On Resolutions and Queries—Bros. John H. Hannah, W. A. Sanford and J. P. Montgomery.

7. The committee on devotional service reported as follows:—We, your committee, beg leave to report that Elder T. G. Harrison preach Sunday at 9 a.m. Elder J. E. Mathis 11 a.m. Rev. J. E. Strickland 4 p. m. Elder James D. Byars 7:30 p. m.

On motion the report was received, adopted and the com-

mittee discharged.

On request of Holly Springs church the Association set Sunday 5 p. m., for the ordination of Rev. J. E. Strickland and he to select the presbytery.

On motion the Association now adjourned until Monday

morning at 8 o'clock.

SERVICES SUNDAY.

Elder T. G. Harrison preached at 9 a m. His text was Ps. 116:12. Elder J. E. Mathis at 11 a. m., his text was Luke 9:56. Rev. J. E. Strickland at 5 p. m., his text was Isa. 55:7. James D. Byars at 7:30 p. m., his text was Isa. 60:22. Rev. J. E. Strickland was ordained at 5:30 p. m. The presbytery was Elders James D. Byars, J. E. Mathis and D. G. W. Hollis.

Monday Morning, October 15.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment. After singing and prayer the Association was called to order by the Moderator.

1. Rell called and delegates answered to their names.

2. Minute of Saturday was read and approved.

3. Reports of committees called for, and presented as follows:

On Order of Business.

We, your committee, beg leave to report: 1st. That we proceed after the usual order of business. 2d. That the next annual session of this body be held with Shiloh church, That Elder W. J. Coward be appointed to preach the introductory sermon and Elder Woods Springfield te his alternate. 3d. That Bro. Thos. Alexander be continued as treasurer; that he superintend the printing of the minutes, and be allowed five dollars (\$5) for his services. 4th. That we appoint corresponding messengers to meet with Vernou Freewill Baptist Association to be held with Mt. Pleasant church, Lamar county, Ala., to convene on Saturday before the third Sunday in October 1900. 5. That we call for a report from the committee appointed by the Union Meeting on missionary work.

We offer for discussion to this body the following querry, to-wit: "Does any church in this Association have the right to excuse herself from the sacrament of the Lord's supper in the absence of a preacher?"

Called for the committee on drafting forms of business, which was appointed by the last annual meeting of this body. On motion the committee was continued.

Appointed corresponding messengers to meet with Vernon Freewill Baptist Association to meet with Mt. Pleasent church, Lamar county, Alabama, on Saturday before the 3d Sunday in October 1900, to-wit: Elders James D. Byars, W. J. Coward, and Bros. J. M. McAdams, A. J. Taylor and B. D. Williams.

Called for report from committee on missionary work. The report being only partial, on motion, the pleasure of the body was the tabling of the report.

By request Bro. Thomas Alexander was given ten minutes to speak on education. Whereupon, he spoke of some of the advantages of the G. R. C. College, located at Henderson, Chester county, Tennessee.

The work of the Association now being ended the sacrament of the Lord's supper was administered, after which the parting hand was taken and the Association adjourned to meet with Shiloh church, Pickens county, Alabama, to convene on Saturday before the second Sunday in October 1901.

CONSTITUTION.

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Mount Moriah Freewill Baptist Association of Alabama, and being composed of delegates from the different churches forming the same, each church being entitled to three delegates.

2. This body shall be considered an advisory counsel but

having no authority over the affairs of the churches.

3. Each church in this Association shall be considered an advisory body, and shall control its own internal affairs in matters of discipline, etc. It may, however, in extreme cases, call aid from sister churches.

4. All questions of doctrine and matters of general interest shall be settled by two-thirds vote of the Association.

and the decision shall be final.

5. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen at each session by

a majority of votes.

6. The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as may be agreed upon by the previous annual session, and shall not adjourn finally until all the business is transacted.

7. Churches wishing to become members of this Association must adopt its articles of faith and conform to its usa-

ges.

8. We agree as churches of this Association to use our best influence to promote the interest of all moral and benevolent institutions, such as the temperance cause, Sabbath schools, missionary work, etc.

RULES OF DECORUN.

Article 1. The Association shall be called to order by the Moderator who presided at the last session. Former clerk also officiating until the body is fully organized.

2. The Association shall be opened and closed with sing-

ing and prayer.

3. The Moderator and clerk shall be chosen by ballot at each session of the Association. A majority of votes by the delegates present elects.

4. The names of the delegates from the different churches shall be enrolled and called as often as necessary during

the session.

5. A majority of delegates present shall rule in all cases, except in the reception of new churches, then it shall be unanimous.

6. The Moderator shall not be entitled to vote, except in case of a tie; and then he shall give the deciding vote. He

shall be entitled to speak on any question after others have spoken, providing he shall appoint some one to the chair while he is speaking.

7. Only one person shall speak at the same time, who

shall arise and address the Moderator.

8. No brother shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject under discussion, or use words of personal reflection.

9. No person shall be allowed to speak more than twice on the same subject, without leave of the Association, nor

more than fifteen minutes at a time.

10. No member shall talk or laugh during the time the

debetes are going on.

11. No member shall absent himself from the Associa-

tion without leave of the Moderator.

12. The Moderator shall have power to call the Association together at any time upon a petition of two-thirds of the churches composing the Association over which he presides.

That the appointment of all committees by the Mod-13 erator be confined to the ministers and delegates composing the Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

Article 1. We believe there is one true and living God, who is the Supreme Ruler of heaven and earth, self-existent Creator of all things, and revealed under the personal distinction of Father, Son and Holy Ghost; equal in every divine perfection and existing in distinct but harmonious of-

fice in the great work of redemption.

We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of beavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us, and therefore is and shall remain to the end of this world, the center of christian union, the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and opinions will be tried.

3. We believe that man was created holy, under the law of his maker, but from voluntary transgression fell from that happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are deprayed, and wholly unable of their own free will and ability to recover themselves from the fallen state in which they

are by nature.

We believe that God has not fixed the future state of mankind by an absolute and unalterable decree, but salvation is offered in the Gospel free to all, and if sinners are lost forever it will be their own fault.

5. We believe that Christ by His death and suffering made an atonement for the sins of all mankind in general, and every individual in particular; however, that none but those that believe in Him can be partakers of the divine benefits.

6. We relieve that true faith cannot proceed from the exercise of our natural faculties and powers, or from the force and operation of the free will, since man in consequence of his natural corruption is incapable either of think.

ing or doing anything spiritually good.

7. We believe in the general application of the grace of God to fallen man sufficient to enable him morally and actually to obey the requirements of the law of liberty—Jas. 1: 25, this is to act saving faith, John 1:9. However none but those who believe or aquiesce in Christ will be saved there.

by, Acts 17:32; Rom. 2:9, John 3:19.

8. We believe in the free moral agency of man, by the grace of God, before and after conversion, that he is laid under no invincible necessity, by his creator, to act in a given way, that if he lives after the flesh he shall due, but if he through the spirit, do mortify the deeds of the body he shall live, and, therefore, man is always a proper subject of admonition and exortation. Heb. 11:12-13, Rom. 12:14, Mark 14:12, Eze. 18:24, Rev. 2 and 3, Eze. 33:13 and 28, 1st Tim. 4:1, Heb. 3:5, 1st Cor. 10:12 and 22, 1st Peter 1:10.

9 We believe that the visible church of Christ is a congregation of believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel, observing the ordinances of Christ, governed by His laws, and exercising the gifts, rights and privileges invested in them by His word, that its only proper officers are bishops, pasters and deacons, whose qualifications, claims and duties are defined in the Epistles

to Timothy and Titus.

10. We believe that christian baptism is immersion in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, and

that believers are proper subjects.

11. We believe the Lord's Supper is of perpetual obligation, by which the members of the church, in the use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ, preceded always by solemn self examination.

12. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and the general judgment: that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal upon principles of

grace and justice.

13. We believe in open or mixed communion and the churches of our body are authorized, through their pastors, to invite christians of all orthodox churches who are in good standing in their respective churches to commune with us at the Lord's table.

UNION MEETING.

PROCEEDINGS.

The Union meeting of the Mt. Moriah Freewill Baptist Association met in its eleventh annual session at Mt. Moriah church. Pickens county, Alabama, on August 11th, 12th, and 13th 1900. The introductory sermon was preached by El-

der J. D. Byars. His text was Genesis 3:9.

After religious service a recess of one hour was taken for refreshments, after which the ministers and delegates assembled in the house and the body was called to order by the former moderator, W. B. Montgomery, prayer by Elder Woods Springfield. Business was then transacted in the following manner.

1. Letters from the different churches were called for,

handed in, read and contents noted.

2. Proceeded to elect a Moderator and clerk, whereupon Bro. W. B. Montgomery was elected moderator and George V. Clardy clerk.

3. The following committees were appointed:

On Order of Business—Elders J. D. Byars, Woods Springfield, W. J. Coward, Bro. Thomas Alexander with the Moderator and clerk.

On Preaching-Bro. E. G. Brooks with deacons of Mt,

Moriah church.

On Resolutions and Queries—Brethren G. V. Clardy, E. P. Rhodes and Rev. C. J. Blake.

4. On motion the committee on resolutions and queries was made a standing committee until the next session of

this body.

5. Called for report of committee that was appointed at the last Union Meeting to draft a constitution and rules of decorum, etc., for the government of the Union Meeting. Said committee not being ready to report, on motion the committee was continued until the next meeting of this body and Bro. Thomas Alexander was added to said committee.

6. Committee appointed on preaching submitted the following report: Elder C. J. Blake to preach at 9 a m Sunday; Elder J. E. Mathis at 11 a m Sunday; Elder Woods Springfield at 6 p m Sunday, and Elder J. D. Byars at close

of the Union Meeting Monday.

7. On motion Union Meeting adjourned until Monday morning at 8 o'clock.

Services Sunday.

At 9 a.m. Elder C. J. Blake preached, his text was 2d Kings 50:8. At 11 a.m. Elder J. E. Mathis preached, his text was Hosea 13:14. At 5 p.m. Elder Woods Springfield preached, his text was Luke 2:7. The sermons were all edifying and were delivered to a large and attentive consourse of people.

Monday Morning, 8 O'clock.

The Union Meeting met pursuant to adjournment. The body was called to order by the Moderator and prayer was offered by Elder J. D. Byars.

1. Roll called and delegates answered to their names.

2. Minute of Saturday read and approved.

3. Called for reports of committees:

Committee on order of business submitted the following report: Recommend 1st. That we reduce our Union Meeting to a minister's and deacon's meeting, and to convene on each fifth Sunday, and Saturday before, during the year. And that the first session be held with Tabernacle church in September next and to continue for an indefinite length of time at the option of the body.

2d. That we put an evangelist in the field for part or all of the ensuing Associational year, and that the Moderator of this body appoint a committee, composed of one member from each church, whose duty it shall be to obtain from his church means to aid in the support of said evangelist, and

report the same to the next Association.

"Is Mcrality Any Part of the Salvation of the Soul?" to be opened by Bro. J. N. Stuckey.

Resolved, That we tender our thanks to Mt. Moriah church and citizens of the community for the kind hospitality

shown us during our stay with them.
