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The Fifty Second annual session of the Mount Moriab Freewill Baptist Association of Alabama was held with Tabernacle church, Tuscaloosa county, Alabama, October 11th, 12th, and 13th, A. D. 1902 The introductory sermon was preached by Elder James D. Byars. His subject was, "The Way Back to God." After devotional service an intermission of one hour was taken for recreation and refreshments. At the appointed time the ministers and messengers repaired to the house, and after service in song and prayer the association was called to order by William E. Hardin, former moderator; former clerk officialing until organized.

The business was transacted in the following order:

1. Letters from the various churches were called for, handed in and read, and the names of the delegates enrolled as per statistical table.

2. Proceeded to elect moderator and clerk. Whereupon William E. Herdin was elected moderator and Thom-

- 3 Extended an invitation for the reception of new churches. Whereupon a letter form Hattle's Chapel church, asking admission into the association, was presented, and, on motion, was received and the messengers extended the right-hand of fellowship and brotherly love, and conducted to seals with us.
- 4. Called for correcponding messengers from sister associations. Received none.

On motion the report of the committee on programme

SERVICES SUNDAY.

Elder W. R. Lathan preached at 9 a m; text: St. John 9:4-5, subject, "Duty and Works." I lder Woods Springfield at 11 a m; text: Isa. 35, subject, "The Triumphal Reign of the Church." Elder W. J. Coward at 7:30 pm; text: Rom. 11:22. All the sermons were delivered to a . large concourse of orderly and attentive people. The midday service was commemorated by the taking of the Lord's Supper. All christians of orthodox churches, who were in good standing in their respective churches were invited to participate with no restriction save that of the scripture. "But let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread and drink of that cup, for he that eateth and drinketh unworthily, eateth and drinketh damuation to himself, not discerning the Lord's body."

Monday Morning, 8 O'clock.

The association met pursuant to adjournment. Moderator read 10th Matthew, followed in service by song and prayer; and the business was then conducted in the following order:

Articles of Faith were read. 3. Called for report of committees:

Order of Business.

We, your committee, beg leave to report: 1st. That we adopt and have printed in our minutes perpetually the programme written by Bro. Thomas Alexander.

2d. That he next annual se-stod of this body be held with Union church, Pickens county, Alabama, and convene on Saturday before the second Sunday in October 1903. That Elder W. R. Lathem preach the introductory sermon, and Elder W. J. Coward be his alternate.

34. That Bro. Thomas Alexander be continued treasurer; that he superintend the printing of the minutes and be allowed five dollars for his services.

4th. That this body elect and put out an evangelist to devote as much of his time to the work as the means and circumstances will admit. That they pay him one dollar and fifty cents per day for actual service rendered and

5th. That we continue the investigating committee, and that it look after and investigate the character of minis. ters and the condition of the churches of this association, and take an oversight of their usefulness. That it make a report to this body at its next annual sitting with such suggestions, reproofs, or commendations as it may think fit and proper, and that each minister make a report of his entire work for the associational year to the chairman of this committee on the first day of the next annual sitting.

On motion the report was received and the committee discharged. Whereupon, on motion, it was considered by sections and adopted entire.

Called for report of investigating committee which was appointed at the last annual session of this body.

Investigation.

We, your committee on investigation, be leave to report that Holly Springs church, perhaps in its majority, believe in the doctrine taught by Mr. McCaskill. We also find that Rev. Silas W. Williams is claimed not to be in the church, and he is not preaching. As to Enter W. H. McGee we beg the body to give us a few hours further time.

On motion, the report was received, and after being discussed, on motion, the association took an intermission of an hour for recreation and refreshments. In due time business was resumed and the investigating committee made a supplemental report as follows:

We, your committee, beg leave to report that we learn through the delegates from Holly Springs charen, and from other sources, that said church, perhaps in its majority, has accepted and does believe the doctrine of sanctification as taught by one Mr. McCaskill, and that they believe in the second instantaneous work of grace; and as we believe this to be a departure from our Articles of Faith, hence, we hereby suggest that we withdraw fellowship from them; but that we consider the position of those of said church who have not thus departed, if they shall send messengers and letter to meet with us at our next annual session. We upon further investigation also find that Elder W. H. McGee is living in adultry, and we hereby prefer a charge against him for the same.

Article 1. This Association shall be known as the Mount Moriah Freewill Baptist Association of Alabama, and being composed of delegates from the different churches forming the same, each church being entitled to th delegates.

2. This body shall be considered an advisory council, but having no authority over the affairs of other churches; unless they depart from the Articles of Faith of this Association. In case any church departs from the Articles of Faith and supports doctrines of heresy, or allows any minister of her body to teach hoctrines not in keeping with our Articles of Faith, the same shall be dealt with by this Association as it may deem proper and right. according to the teachings of the bible.

3. Each church in this Association shall be considered an advisory body, and shall control its own enternal atfairs in matters of discipline, &c., though the church may in extreme cases call in aid from sister churches, but the Association shall rule in all matters of doctrine and gen. eral interest.

4. All questions of doctrine and matters of general interest shall be settled by two-thirds vote of the Association, and the decision shall be final.

5. The officers of the Association shall be Moderator, (Herk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen at each session by a majority of votes.

6. The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as may be agreed upon by the previous annual session, and shall not adjourn finally until all the business is transacted.

7. Churches wishing to become members of this Association must adopt its Articles of Faith and conform to its usages.

8. We agree as churches of this Association to use our best influence to promote the interest of all moral and benevolent institutions, such as the temperance cause, Sah. bath schools, missionary work, etc,

RULES OF DECORUM.

Article 1. The Association shall be called to order by the moderator who presided at the last session. Former clerk also officiating until the body is fully organized.

2. The Association shall be opened and closed with singing and prayer.

3. The moderator and clerk shall be chosen by ballot

at each session of the Association. A majority of votes by the delegates present elects.

4. The names of the delegates from the different churches shall be enrolled and called as often as neces.

sary during the session.

5. A majority of delegates present shall rule in all cases, except in the reception of new churches, then it

shall be un animous.

6. The moderator shall not be entitled to vote, evcept in case of a tie; and then he shall give the deciding vote. He shall be entitled to speak on any question after others bave spoken, provided, he shall appoint some one to the chair while he is speaking.

7. Only one person shall speak at the same time, who

shall arise and address the moderator.

8. No brother shall be interrupted while speaking. unless he depart from the subject under ciscussion, or use words of personal reflection.

9. No person shall be allowed to speak more than twice on the same subject, without leave of the associa-

tion, nor more than fifteen minutes at a time

10. No member shall talk or laugh during the time the debates are going on.

11. No member shall absent himself from the associ-

ation without leave of the moderator.

12. The moderator shall have power to call the association together at any time upon a petition of two-thirds of the churches composing the association over which he presides.

13. That the appointment of all committees by the moderator be confined to the ministers and delegates composing the association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

Article 1. We believe there is one true and living God, who is the Supreme Ruler of heaven and earth, self existent Creator of all things, and revealed under the personal distinction of Father, Son and Holy Ghost; equal in every divine perfection, and existing in distinct but harmonics.

nious offices in the great work of redemption.

2. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, truth for its matter and salvation for its end; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us, and therefore is and shall remain to the end of this world, the center of christian union, the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and opinions will be tried.

3. We believe that man was created holy, under the law of Lis maker, but from voluntary transgression fell from that happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are deprayed, and wholly unable of their own free will and ability to recover from the fallen state in which they are by nature.

4. We believe that God has not fixed the future state of mankind by an absolute and unalterable decree; but salvation is offered in the Gospel free to all, and if sinners

are lost forever it will be their own fault.

5. We believe that Christ by His death and sufferings made an atonement for the side of all mankind in general, and every individual in particular; however, that none but those who believe in Him can be partakers of the divine benefits.

6. We believe that true faith cannot proceed from the exercise of our natural faculties and powers, or from the force and operation of the free will, since man in consequence of his natural corruption is incapable either of

thinking or doing anything spiritually good.

of God for fallen man sufficient to enable him morally and actually to obey the requirements of the law of liberty—Jas. 1:25, this is to act saving faith. John 1:9. However none but those who believe, or acquiesce in Christ will be saved thereby; Acts 17:32; Rom. 2:9; John 3:19.

8. We believe in the free moral agency of man, by the grace of God, before and after conversion; that he is laid under no invincible necessity, by his creator, to act in a given way, that if he lives after the flesh he shall die, but if he through the spirit do mortiyfy the deeds of the body he shall live, and, therefore, man is always a proper subject of admonition and exhortation. Heb. 11:12 13, Rom. 12:14; Mark 14:12; Eze. 18:24; Rev. 2 and 3; Exe. 33: 13 and 28; 1st Tim. 4:1; Heb. 3:5; 1st Cor. 10:12 and 22; 1st Peter 1:10.

9. We believe that the visible church of Christ is a congregation of believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel, observing the ordinances of Christ, governed by His laws, and exercising the gifts, rights and privileges invested in them by His word, that its only proper officers are bishops, pastors and deacons, whose qualifications, claims and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.

10. We believe that christian baptism is immersion in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost,

and that believers are proper subjects.

11. We believe the Lord's Supper is of perpetual obli-

gation, by which the members of the church, in the use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ, preceded always by solemn self-exammation.

12. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and the general judgment; that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal upon principles

of grace and justice.

13. We believe in open or mixed communion and the churches of our body are authorized, through their pastors, to invite christiaus of all-orthodex churches who are in good standing in their respective churches to commune with us at the Lord's table.
